Kenya Closes Border With Somalia To Keep Militants Out

Kenya closed its border with Somalia, the foreign minister said Thursday, expressing concern about Islamic militants slipping into the country along with refugees. "The Kenvan border

s officially closed," Foreign Affairs Minister Raphael Tuju told The Associated Press, without say-ing when the decision was made or how long the border vould remain closed.

Kenya has beefed up patrols along its 675-kilometer (400-mile) border with Somalia since troops of Somalia's transitional government, backed Ethiopian forces, routed Islamic movement that had



Somalia, including the capital

Tuju said that many Somalis seeking asylum in Kenya recently are family members of Islamic militiamen.

"Kenya will not allow combatants and their families to use this country as a base," he told journalists.

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Proud To Be An Active Partner In The Community

2007 has arrived, and I'm back to work here at the Gazette looking forward throwing in my two cents on various issues around the metroplex. This week, the topic of discussion is the friendly suburban town of Farmers Branch and recent developments in that town's insane and intensely public war against illegal immi-

In politics, reality is usually formed by the perceptions of voters.

all-white, all-male Farmers Branch city council (how is that possible in 2007?). has spent the past few months cementing the perception that illegal immigrants are going to find it extremely difficult to take up residence in their city.

In November, the council

unanimously passed ordinances that would make English the official language in the city; impose fines on landlords that rent to illegal immigrants, and allow authorities to screen sus pects in police custody to see if they are in this country illegally

The ordinance received national media coverage, and was labeled as outright racist by a large number of rationally thinking white and non-white residents in the area. Those folks started a petition drive and collected signatures of more than 1,200 registered voters from Farmers Branch to force the measures to be put to public vote on the May 12th ballot.

In the interim, the council voted to let the new rules take effect on Friday. The measure causing the biggest stir is the requirement that property man-agers or owners verify the immigration of citizenship status of their tenants. Those found in violation of the ordinance face a misdemeanor charge nunishable by a fine of

Good Ol' Boy Logic In Farmer's Branch

up to \$500.

Forget racist; can you say eco nomic stupidity? Why would you antagonize a strong business constituency simply to enact a senseless "feel good"

Elizabeth Villafranca, president of the Farmers Branch chapter of the League of United Latin American Citizens understands the point I am trying to make

"I don't know why they're doing this," she said. There's no upside to this. They are going to se hundreds of thousands of

Besides being an measure that will be virtually impossible to enforce, the ordinance on renting to illegal immigrants, stands to cost the city of Farmers Branch a great deal of money just in defending itself against lawsuits. And there will be plenty of law-

The Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund and the American Civil I iberties Union filed a lawsuit last month on behalf of several Farmers Branch residents and landlords. They contend the ordinance is so poorly written that it could exclude legal immigrants and cit-

izens from renting.

Long-time activist Domingo Garcia guaranteed additional lawsuits.
"It's a total un-American

unChristian, unTexan thing for the Farmers Branch City Council to do. We're not going to stand for it. We are going to take them to court, " Garcia said.

Three apartment complexes have also filed suit against the City Council and the City Building Inspector. They accuse the city of taking an unautho-rized federal role enforcing immigration laws and making

them the policing agent.

Ultimately, this whole thing is about faulty good ol' boy logic. The city wants to create the per ception that by making it hard for illegal immigrants to live in Farmers Branch: they can some how keep illegal immigrants out of Farmers Branch.

The Farmers Branch City Council is playing on the base level fears of their residents con-cerning the growing illegal immigrant population, while scream ing the familiar suburban manta of "not in my backyard".

Their problem, however, is that not all Hispanic people are illegal immigrants. And their failure to understand how to embrace the fact that their quiet community of 28,000 is now 37 percent Hispanic may be their downfall

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

James Brown Showed Blacks They Didn't Have To Hide Their Heritage

By: Marc H. Morial - NNPA On Christmas Day, career and life of the "Hardest Working Man in Show Business" ended. But his spirit lives on in the legions of fans that weathered rain and cold to bid him farewell. James Brown electrified a generation, an entertainer with so prolific a body of work and so distinctive a genre of style that entertainers for more than four decades have either borrowed from or have been inspired

From the time he first took From the time he first took the stage in the 1950s, James Brown, who died of heart failure at 73, proved to be a cultural tour de force – his own man with his own vision and immense pride in his heritage. In his art, he embraced the blues, gospel and R&B of his musical predecessors in forging a musical destiny that defied convention and was completely his own. He was consummate showman until his last days: He had received clearance one day earlier to perform at a New Year's Eve gig in New York City. The tributes following his untimely death proved the perfect encore for a life that was at times difficult and painful but nevertheless painful but nevertheless important and exciting. Only the Godfather of Soul himself could make such a dramatic

and riveting exit in death. Brown emerged the Every Man in the Black community, where he forged his strongest bonds. He set aside convention and remained true to himself – warts and all. With hits like "Please, Please, Please", "Papa's Got a Brand New Bag, Pt.1" and "I Got You (I Feel Good)," he made indelible imprint on American culture. During the civil rights movement of the

1960s, he emerged as an icon of Black culture - reminding us to rejoice in our heritage and shout out in pride for ourselves. He showed us that we didn't need to conform to the expectations of main-stream America to take their rightful place in society. He made us realize that we are as entitled to the rights and privileges of U.S. citizenship

1968, Brown's "Say It Loud: I'm Black and I'm Proud" unified and energized the African-American com munity in our period of mourning over the death of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who had been assassinated five months earlier. It became one of the most popular Black power anthems of the 1960s and also struck a chord with mainstream America. getting to #10 on the charts. Through songs like "I Don't Want Nobody To Give Me Nothing (Open Up The Door, I'll Get It Myself) that chronicled the challenges faced by Blacks in the United States at the time, Brown made his activism known in real and straight-forward

ways.

In addition to being the godfather of various genres of music and dance moves, you ther of economic empowerment and equal opportunity.

While Brown had a differ-ent impact than Ray Charles or Sam Cooke on mainstream Americans, he surely struck a nerve among African-Americans. With 60 songs in the Billhoard Top 10 R&B chart, he racked up more hits than any other artist. His success on the Top 10 Pop chart was not as great – less than a dozen hits – not enough to put him in the top 25 artists, something that befuddles

ability to get on the charts for more than four decades Despite his penchant for colorful garb and largerthan-life persona, he was hardly a flash in the pan or a one-hit wonder. He continued to persevere in the music industry up until his last days. A day before his death, he had received clearance to play a New Year's Eve gig in New York City.

Where he had his greatest impact was with the countartists, many African-ericans he inspired Americans Brown shines through in the work of his successors from the guitar licks of Prince to the dance moves of Michael Jackson. He was not without his admirers among White artists. He mesmerized Rolling Stones' frontman Mick Jagger in the 1960s concert film "The T.A.M.I. Show" who built much of his own stage persona around Brown's signature style. Rappers have borrowed his beats and funk. And his unforgettable stew of blues, gospel and unconventional rhythms and captivating life shows spawned a wide range of new musical genres. He was not only the "Godfather of Soul" - but the godfather of disco, funk, hip-hop -the list goes on.

At the various celebrations of his life -- at the Apollo Theater, in his hometown in Georgia and elsewhere James Brown left this world just the way he led his life a consummate showman and a consummate snowman and courageous visionary. He leaves an enduring legacy that will remain forever

But since the Democratic Party used to speak for the working class, one now wonders who speaks for them? Maybe this is a trick, since psychologists know that many poor believe that they belong to the "middle class" when they really don't. But Democrats also figured out that poor people don't vote, but the middle- and upper classes do, so why pitch to poor peo-

So newly-empowered Democrats need to fashion policies that are targeted to the working class, a substantial portion of their vot ing base, some of whom are indeed middle class and a substantial portion of whom are

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Beware Of Bad Tax Advice

Wesley Snipes may hav been misinformed

By: Tamara E. Holmes Actor Wesley Snipes made headlines in October when he was indicted for failing to pay millions of dollars in taxes. While Snipes raised evebrows for claiming the "Section 861 position," an interpretation of the tax code that wrongly nurnorts that income earned the United States is not subject to federal taxes; tax professionals warn that any ne can be the victim of tax ams and bad advice.

"If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is," says Gerard McKnight, owner of GDM Financial Services in Richmond, Virginia. "If someone tells you [that] you can evade taxes, you may want to do some research on that."

Snipes reportedly used the 'Section 861 position" to justify not paying taxes on money he earned in the U.S. from 1999 through 2004, as well as to try to get an \$11 million refund for taxes paid in the 1990s. According to the Section 861 argument only foreign-based income is subject to taxes.

But such reasoning should immediately be deemed suspicious, says Sheila Taylor-Clark, president of the Dallas-Fort Worth chapter of the National Association of Black Accountants and a tax m at Deloitte & Touche in Dallas. "If you're working, you have to pay the IRS," she says. "U.S.based income is going to be sub-ject to tax. If someone is saying that it's not, they need to be able the Internal Revenue Code.

To avoid becoming the victim of bad tax advice, don't be afraid to do some research if someone offers tax suggestions

"Go online to the IRS Website (www.irs.gov)," says McKnight. "You may have to dig a little bit but for the most part you should be able to get what you need." You can also visit the IRS in person or give the agency a call at 1-800-829-

That's quite a statement for comeone with a family full of clergy, who led the gospel choir in high school and college but never got a CD until she was 17.

But it wasn't until the day a high school track coach stopped her in the hallway – Chrisette had been jogging down the corridor singing - that her artistic fate was sealed. The coach gave her a CD of Astrud Gilberto and Stan Getz' "The Girl from Ipanema," a song that would establish her ve for mixing jazz melodies with what she grew up with: gospel vocals and hip-hop beats.

"I went up to my jazz teacher in school, and said, 'I need you to give me some more of that," she says, recalling the discovery of a cabinet full of classic jazz music. "Every day after that, at lunch period, I would go into the piano oom and practice those songs."
With Nat King Cole, Ella

Fitzgerald and Billie Holiday as newfound heroes, Chrisette went on to major in music at 5 Towns College. A show at New York City's Village Underground led to opening gigs for India. Arie, and eventually a contract with Island Chrisette, who is finishing up her own album on IDJ, was featured on the Heineken Red Star Soul tour this fall and per formed onstage with Jay-Z at his

Radio City concert. She also wrote and sang hooks on Nas' album "Hip-Ho Is Dead," including on single "Can't Forget About You," a nostalgic reminiscence that's subbling under the R&B/Hip-Hop songs chart.

Being on Nas' album had particular significance for Chrisette, whose mother was raised in the same Queensbridge housing project

as the rapper.


