The Price Of College: Tuition Costs On The Rise

By: Jaime Ellithorn College diplomas are coming with a heftier sticker price, but the financial rewards in the end are worth it, experts say. According to a report in Money & Business magazine, the College Board said that both private and public institutions raised the cost of tuition by six percent, with scholarship money

only advancing three percent.

The survey also concluded the typical cost for a public college, including tuition, fees, room, board, books, transporta-tion and entertainment is about lege. \$16,400 a year. About half of se students are exp grants and tax breaks. The dollar wards tend to be between \$3,000 and \$4,000, leaving families with a \$13,000 deficit. Cost for private total tuition is averaging around \$33,000; stu-dents are typically seeing around \$9,000 in their student-aid

packages. Two-year colleges are also raising tuition costs. For students who attend and live at home, the average cost for the first two years is about \$8,000.

Many families with a lower to middle income depend on grants, such as the Pell Grant, for assistance in paying tuition costs. This federally-funded grant is awarded solely due to financial need, but its ceiling has not been adjusted to keep pace with inflation. "The max mum contribution remains at \$4,000. Therefore the Pell Grant covers a smaller and smaller portion of student's total tuition costs," said Sandy Baum, senior policy analyst at

The Black Press: Challenging The Past; Creating The Future

By: Eddie Harris Allen - To be classed as a black newspaper, a newspaper must be owned and managed by black people, intended for black consumers, and deal with the interests and concerns of black neo ple. Most importantly of all, it should speak for the poor, women, minorities and the

When I was a third grader, I was teased by my white class mates when they saw a copy of a black newspaper in our class-room. They had never seen a newspaper filled with news and pictures that were mostly of black people. I felt embarrassed at the time because I didn't understand why they felt the way they did and I didn't know how to defend the paper and its contents. As I grew up, I learned the important role that black newspapers play in the black community. In this essay, "The Black Press: Challenging the past; Creating the future," I feel a need to examine the role that black newspapers played in the past, the role they play today

very important part they play in creating the future.
Freedom's Journal established

in 1827, and published in New, York, was one of many black



spapers published in the middle and late 1800's. Black newspapers were established to speak out against racist news articles, and commentaries published by mainstream white newspapers of that time. The following was written in the Black Chronicle, June 1,1896 Issue 8 Today the Supreme Court of

in challenging the past and the the nation has ruled that blacks can legally be separated from whites, and we ask: "Which way do we turn, O God? (In Plessey vs. Ferguson) Although the white press considers this deci-sion so harmless that they have all ignored it, we, the black people of America, consider it a final indication that this country is determined to prevent black people from gaining full citizen-

Black newspapers of the past published wedding announce ments, birth announcements deaths, current events and edi-torials. On the other hand, at the risk of being burned out or worse, many took political stands against slavery, voting rights, hangings and the lack of civil rights for black people. In Memory Of Yolonda Denice King

Death came suddenly and swiftly to America's royal princess of the civil rights move princess of the civil rights move-ment on May 15, 2007. News reports indicate that Yolanda Denice King collapsed in the doorway of her brother Dexter's friend's home in Southern California and died instantly.

California and died instantly. She was 51 years old. Family members and a spokesperson for the Martin Luther King, Jr. Center for Nonviolent Social Change sur-mised that her death was related to her recurrent cardiopul-monary problems. A public memorial service will be held in Atlanta on Thursday May 24 at Ebenezer Baptist Church Horizons Sanctuary.

Yolanda King grew up with the oratory of her famous father Martin Luther King, Jr., resona ing in her ears and experienced first hand the unpredictability of life. The milestones of her life are a virtual timeline of the civil rights movement.

She was just two weeks old when Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat on a bus leading to the Montgomery bus boycott spearheaded by her father. On January 20, 1956 when she was 10 weeks old the King family home was bombed and she and her mother narrowly escaped injury or death.

In 1958, Dr. King narrowly escaped death when he wa stabbed in a bookstore in Harlem. She was 7 in 1963 when her father stood on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial in Washington and said, "I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character."

She was only 12 on April 4, 1968 when the news bulletin flashed on television saving her father had been assassinated in Memphis, Tennessee. Four days later she accompanied her mother to Memphis City Hall to sup port the sanitation workers her

father had embraced. Ms. King's paternal uncle, A. D. King, accidentally drowned the following year. In 1974, an apparent madman fired a gun in the Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta and killed her grandmother Alberta Williams King.

She spoke stoically of the many lightening-like tragedies that had struck her young life "Death is close to my experience I have had to analyze death speak of death, and understand death. I firmly believe that whatever is after is better. I have accepted death as a moving-upward motion. Death is transcendent. Life is preparation for death "

Yolanda King's legacy is inex orably intertwined with her father's and mother's. With the civil rights movement ingrained in her consciousness she fol lowed in her parents footsteps in the quest to awaken this nation to the great need of knocking down racial, religious, ethnic gender, and disability discrimi-

While picking up the mantle as a civil rights activist she skillfully created a professional career in the performing arts that allowed her to accomplish mutual objectives in both arena

he founded Higher Ground Productions Company that provided a forum for her to inspire people from all walks of life, to motivate people to move for ward, and to empower people to make a difference

After receiving a B.A. degree with honors from Smith College in Northampton, Massachusetts King moved to New York to earr her Masters degree in Theatre at New York University. She is the recipient of two Honorary

Doctorial degrees.

Yolanda King left no doubt that she was a 100 percent died-in-the-wool believer in her father's dream. During a Detroit speech for the Human Rights Campaign she reaffirmed, measured and passionate tones

fact that Dr. King's dream was still unfulfilled

She prodded, cajoled, and implored the audience that the best way to keep her father's dream alive was to be active fighters for peace and social justice. "We must never forget the sacrifices made", she told the overflow crowd. "For some of you, the civil rights movement might seem like ancient

"We today have that same power if we but choose it, but choose it we must," King said. "What makes each of us unique is the individual choices we make." There will always be doubters, those who prefer inaction. I have heard it all, but I am still a believer in the dream. As for me I choose to believe."

"My job, the job of all Americans, is to make that dream a reality. Our very survival is at stake

Besides her brother Dexter Scott King, Yolanda King is survived by another brother. Martin Luther King III, and her sister, the Rev. Bernice King. None of them have chiland potentially there will be no third generation of Kings to carry on Martin Luther King's legacy.

Some colleges and universities are trying to help families with the rising numbers and dwin-dling aid. Emory University in Atlanta is capping student loans for families making up to a \$100,000 a year and grants will replace need-based loans for students whose parents make \$50,000 and under. Yale is included in the trend and announced it would relieve students from families making less than \$45,000 of loan debt.

Congress is also considering cutting the interest rate of feder-al Stafford Loans in half, from 6.8 percent to 3.4 percent. This would dramatically affect the Federal Family Education Loan Program (FFELP) whose loans serve more than 80 percent of students nationwide and 78 percent of Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs).

Experts still stand behind the importance of higher education because of the financial benefits down the road. In 2003, the College Board reported that workers with a bachelor's degree earned a nedian of \$49,900. Those with some college earned approximately \$35,700 and se with a high school diplo earned \$30,800. Along with those numbers the Board noted 30 years ago, college graduates earned just 19 to 35 percent more, for men and women, respectively, than adults with a high school diploma. Today men graduating with a bachelors earn 63 percent more and 70 percent more. ercent more and women earn

Survey: More Texas Workers Say They're Confident About Economy

economy is getting stronger and that they have confidence in the future of their current employer, according to Spherion Corp.'s April Texas Employment Report

Thirty-one percent of Texas workers responding to the sur-vey said they believed the economy was improving -- a 14 per-cent increase from March. Only 19 percent of U.S. workers as a whole thought things were improving, up 2 percent from March.

As far as their current employer was concerned, 72 percent of Texas workers said they had confidence in the future of their companies, up 7 percent from March, while U.S. worker confidence rose 3 percent to 66 percent

However, 41 percent of Texas orkers said they were likely to

look for a new job -- 13 percent more than in the previous month. Of U.S. workers, 35 nercent said they were likely to look for a job, up 2 percent






