# Is America Ready For Universal Health Care?

The World Health
Organization (WHO), in its 2006 annual report, ranks the performance of the United States' health care system 37th in the world--just barely above Slovenia and Cuba

The United States has fewer physicians, nurses and hospital beds than most developed nations. With regard to the continuity of care factor (five-plus years with the same doctor) that is o essential in developing a secure doctor/patient relationship, the United States is the worst Considering the entire list of WHO medical outcome factors, one can only conclude that the United States has a second-rate health care system despite being the world's richest nation.

America spends almost \$2 tril-

lion a year on health care or about \$6,700 per person. Despite this huge investment that is more than twice as much per capita as most of the leading industrialized nations America's health care system is so disparate that man participants receive health service es equivalent to that provided by a third world nation.

America's health care system is a hodge podge of public and private insurance programs that dates back to the late 1920s. It has survived for as long as it has because, by the late twentieth century, it had financed a massive industry focused on delivering the most sophisticated and techno-logically advanced medical care without practical cost controls. These arrangements have never met everyhody's needs. The noor the uninsured, and the underin-sured have frequently struggled to find medical care either through ER doctors or through safety-net ospitals.

vercrowding in ERs, according to most experts, is actually a symptom of other systemic problems that plague the medical care system. For example, consolida-tion or elimination of less profitable hospital services such as psychiatric wards and the swelling ranks of uninsured people whose

untreated chronic conditions are more likely to become serious future medical crises are becoming the norm. These trends may seen unrelated but they are all conse quences of the way Americans pay for their medical care -- and of how that system is falling apart.

The arrangements for financing medical care, from the private insurance workers get on the job to the public insurance programs that provide for retirees are all faltering because they can neither control nor keep up with the rising cost of medical care. Reform rhetoric provides no safety valve as more Americans fall through the healthcare cracks.

By the 1990s, health care spending had reached the crisis level.

Things were so bad that when the Clintons came into office they launched their comprehensive plan for health care reform. They initially found an enthusiastic ally in what would appear to be their natural enemy - the profit motivated

insurance industry.

Under Clinton's proposal, the government would have made certain everybody had insurance coverage. The insurance industry sup-ported the Clintons because their reforms promised them a vast new market - the millions of uninsured Americans whose premiums would be paid or subsidized by the zed by the

The Clintons, in turn, needed the support of the insurance indus-try in order to have any chance of passing their comprehensive reform plan. The anticipated result would have done for Americans what governments such as France, Canada, Sweden, and Japan have long done for their citizens.

long done for their citizens.

These two powerful forces came together with great expectations but with two entirely different agendas. The inherent contradiction in these two opposing agendas-the Clinton's res reform and the insurance indu try's maximizing profits—predic ed that this unholy alliance would

not hold together.

It fell apart when the insurance industry began to understand that the Clinton reform regulations would plug many of the profit producing loopholes traditionally enjoyed by that industry The suddenly turned on the Clintons-spent millions introducing the nation to Harry and Louise in a series of extremely effective oppo-sition television ads-and health care reform went into hibernation for over a decade

A recent Kaiser Family Foundation survey showed that health care ranks second only to the Iraq war in the minds of voters as the most important problem for government to address. As such all the top tier 2008 presidential candidates have made this an increasingly important topic in

their campaign speeches.

Democratic presidential candidate Sen. Barack Obama pledged that he would provide access to health insurance for all Americans by lowering costs, improving tech-nology and rolling back appropriate tax cuts. Clinton and Edwards have made similar health care overtures. The charges include racketeering, soliciting bribes, wire fraud, money laundering, obstruction of justice and conspiracy. He faces a possible maximum sentence of 235 years. The indictment said Jefferson

received more than \$500,000 in bribes and sought millions more in separate schemes to enrich himself by using his office to broker business deals in Africa. The charges came almost two years after investigators raided Iefferson's home in Washington stuffed in his freezer.

Jefferson's lawyer has declared s client innocent. In his letter Tuesday to Pelosi,

After the FBI had found \$90,000 in cash in Jefferson's freezer and alleged that stash was bribe money nearly two years ago, Pelosi succeeded in stripping Jefferson of his seat on the Ways and Means Committee -- over Jefferson's objection.

The congressman, who represents part of hurricane-rav-aged New Orleans, was then re-elected in November to a ninth term in the House. Opening the 110th Congress as House Speaker this year, Pelosi granted him the seat on the Small Business Committee.

And we've come by here to ask you to make the first item on vour agenda fair treatment, where God's children are concerned. Shalamar was the creation of Dick Griffey, the booking agent for the television R&B program Soul Train. The group's first single, the 1977 Motown medley 'Uptown Festival," featured a bevy of faceless studio musi cians: once it became a hit. Griffey decided to form a per-forming group under the name Shalamar, Through Soul Train, Griffey found Jody Watley, Jeffrey Daniels, and Gerald Brown, the three vocalists that became Shalamar: Brown was quickly replaced by Howard Hewitt in 1978.

Shalamar's string of poppy dance-soul hits began in 1979 with "Take That to the Bank"; later that year, "The Second Time Around" hit the Top Ten. Throughout the early '80s the

R&B scene, as well as scoring a number of British hit singles. Watley and Daniels left the group in 1982 and were replaced by Delisa Davis and Micki Free in 1984; Watley went on to stardom as a solo act. He's also acted in movies and on television.




