# Global Democracy -An Oasis Of African-American Soul In Israel's Desert

Deep in the heart of Israel's Negev desert, where you would expect to find mostly camels and sand, a community of expatriate black Americans has made a new life for itself in towns like Dimona, Arad and Mitzpe Ramon.

They call themselves the African Hebrew Israelites, but they are better known in Israel as the Black Hebrews, a 2,000-strong religious group dressed in colorful African prints made of natural fabrics like silk and linen according to their doctrine. And while it's taken most of the 40 years they've been residing in Israel to feel like part of the country, today Black Hebrews can be found in many facets of Israeli society - from the army to the entertainment industry.

"We are a people who have pride and are able to point to certain successes that have been elusive for the African world," says national

Yehuda, who lives in Dimona but spent time in Ghana South Africa, and other Africar locations studying African cultural connections and migra tion patterns.

gotta to be kidding me!" Dr Amos Wilson's words, quoted by Kwa David Whitaker, in his utstanding presentation titled, The Wake-Up Call," rang in my ears when I heard about the latest in a series of self-deprecating, self-denigrating, and self-hating acts of Black-on-Black economic violence by a Black organization.

Of course, Amos Wilson was not disparaging Black folks just to be negative; he loved his people and would do anything to help us achieve economic empowerment and "Afrikan consciousness" as he put it.

It was unconscionable that a Black organization would not see that a Black Sculptor and Designer would get those contracts. But, Amos Wilson was right; we have lost our minds. "Massa, is we sick?" "No, 'we'

ain't sick, but you sho is."

Now, as if the MLK Statue
was not bad enough, the NAACP National Convention is going to Detroit, a city with 80 percent-plus Black population; Detroit, with its Black Mayor whose mother chairs the Congressional Black Caucus; Detroit, with its histo ry of Motown, Muhammad's Mosque No.1, New Bethel Baptist Church, Rosa Parks, and Coleman Young: Detroit. with strong Black folks like Kwame Kenyatta, Joann Watson, and Theo Broughton; the NAACP is going to Detroit, and during its con-vention will present an Authors' Pavilion, which will not be managed by a Black bookstore! (Sorry for disturbing you, Brother Amos.)

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## THE TRUTH CLINIC America's Crisis Of Conscience

By: James W. Breedlove While the Bush administration is marking time trying to defend its current Iraq surge policy the human tidal wave of refugees is pouring across the neighboring borders seeking solace, respite and relief from the oppressive

They number approximately four million and the flood of refuges is growing at an astro nomical rate. The U.N. High issioner for Refugees (UNHCR) estimates that 50,000 per month are fleeing Iraq with the majority crossing into Svria and Iordan.

Recently this crisis worsened when Syria and Jordan tightened residency rules for Iraqi refugees raising fears that mass deporta tions will begin. Both countries have indicated they cannot sus-tain supporting the legions of human debris.

While the Iraq refugee crisis is in the current spotlight the world refugee problem is not new Throughout history, people have fled their homes to escape persecution. There are an estimated 10 million refugees in the world: an increase of 14 percent in one year. If the number of internally displaced persons (those that have not crossed an international border) is included the worldwide refugee population is 23

In the aftermath of World War II, the international community responded to their collective fail-ure to provide soft !ure to provide safe haven to refugees fleeing genocide at the hands of the Nazi regime with an agreement containing non-

Non-refoulement is a principle in international law that address es protecting refugees from being returned to places where their lives or freedoms could be threatened. Non-refoulement forbids the expulsion of refugees into an area where they might be again subjected to persecution. This was codified within the 1951 Geneva Convention and 1967 Protocol. The binding agreement was ratified by 140 countries.

However, in the years since ra

ification, many of the wealthy industrialized member nations we either reneged or significant ly hedged on their commitment to protect refugees. Some have even adopted hostile and restrictive policies that subject refugees to arbitrary arrest, detention, and the denial of social and economic rights. In the worst cases, nonrefoulement has been violated and refugees are forcibly returned to their home countries to face the very persecution they fled.

The United States of America is a prime violator of refugee human rights principles. Having engaged in a pre- emptive war of choice that directly or indirectly exacerbated this massive displacement, the U.S. has a clear and compelling duty to take the lead in addressing the crisis its actions have precipitated.

In the four years since the war in Iraq was initiated the U.S. has taken in a total of 701 refugees all of which had applied for refugee status prior to the fall of Saddam Hussein. Last month only one Iraq refugee was cleared to enter

Recently the State Department announced a program to resettle 7,000 Iraqi refugees in the U.S. by the end of 2007. However, administrative problems with the program will reduce that number to an estimated 2,500. One of the excuses given by the government is the unanticipated 4-6 months that it takes for a refugee to clear

In the meantime Syria, Jordan, Egypt, Sweden, and Australia have collectively taken in millions of refugees with no significant security complications. America has done little to help or relieve the human and financial burden borne by refugee benefactors in the past four years. Not only has the U.S. under-funded its own refugee program, but it cut its support to UNHCR from \$19.9 million in 2005 to \$7.9 million in

2006 Vet America justifies spend 2006. Yet America Justines spend-ing Five hundred billions dollars supporting devastation and destruction of Iraq and making

refuges of its people.

America has a moral obliga assist in alleviating the Iraqi refugee problem since its sanc-tions, invasion, and occupation wiped out the Iraq economy and we the vast majority of the pop ulation into dire poverty. Add the civil conflict that resulted from pitting the three major ethnic and religious groups against each other and the seeds were sown for the great Iraq refugee crisis.

riveting video footage that showed the punishing, cruel, and devastating horror that befell the refugees not only from Iraq but also from other countries. Now the starvation, deprivation, and mutilation has become so accept-ed in our psyche that we barely wince when we see the hollowed. hopeless eyes of the traumatized and terrified refugees huddling in their own filth while waiting for the peace of death to ease their

Just two weeks ago Americans witnessed the inexorable and excruciating struggle for life of innocent little children hidden away in the dark and desolate wasteland of an abandoned Iraq orphanage. Yet we do not chal-lenge our leaders who speak noble but hypocritical words about peace, democracy, and brother hood and do little to stop the continuing human suffering

In the midst of this desperation s it seems that America has lost all sense of who we were and forgotten the humanity that once symbolized America's moral leadership to the rest of the world.

America is mired in a crisis of conscience. We need to rediscover our moral conscience even as we insolate our political conscience to justify a senseless quest for world

# Sarkozy: Darfur Solution Is Crucial

Nicolas Sarkozy, the new French president, has urged the international community to find a way to solve the humanitarian crisis in Darfur warning that "silence kills". His comments after a gather-

ing in Paris on Monday of offi-cials from 18 countries to dis-cuss the unstable region were echoed by Condoleezza Rice.

the US secretary of state.
"The international community simply cannot continue to sit by," Rice told reporters at the end of the one-day meeting aimed at galvanizing peace moves in western region of Sudan

"We really must redouble our efforts.

"As human beings and as politicians, we must resolve the crisis in Darfur," Sarkozy said after hosting the meeting in the Elysee palace in Paris.

Sudan no-show

Delegations from the world's top aid donors, members of the Group of Eight industrialised nations and from China, a key ally of Sudan, met to help find a political solution to the conflict and provide cash for neacekeeping and humanitarian aid.

Several delegates, however, said they did not expect a large

nackage of immediate measures to be agreed, though some countries could pledge troops and funds for a planned "hybrid" UN and African Union (AU) peacekeeping force

Sudan, which did not attend the meeting, agreed earlier this month to the combined UN-AU force of more than 20,000 troops and police but many diplomats doubt it will keep its word

Rice however warned countries participating in the con-ference not to abandon the momentum towards a solution "We really must redouble

our efforts" Condoleezza Rice, US secre-

tary of state
"Those who have been around this for a while are going to work very hard against backtracking. We have had circumstances in which we have had agreements before and those agreements have not gone forward," she said.

The aim of the force is to stop the violence in Darfur, where international experts estimate 200,000 people have died and 2.5 million have been expelled from their homes in more than four years of con-flict. Sudan says only 9,000 neonle have died

Greater interest
Sarkozy said the existing force of 7,000 AU troops which is widely seen as inef-fective and is to be reinforced by the proposed hybrid force. must get more funding. He said France was willing to contribute roughly \$13.46 million.

The EU pledged an extra \$41.7 million of humanitaria funds for "the coming months"

France has shown greater interest in Darfur since Sarkozy took office and has d sending an international force to neighbouring Chad to provide stability for refugee camps there, which house tens of thousands of people who have fled Darfur.

Bernard Kouchner, the French foreign minister, did try and offer some cause for optimism, by arguing that the "future is brighter" for Darfur and that there was "a little light at the end of the dark-

French financial aid to Darfur remains low compared with other European powers It gave \$5.2 million in 2006, with \$3.3 million this year, UN figures show.

### Rice Says Sudan's Backsliding Means Pressure Must Be Maintained On Darfur

- Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice says the international community must maintain pressure on Sudan to fulfill commitments to allow a larger peacekeeping force into Darfur.

Speaking in Paris at a conference on the crisis, Rice says Sudan "has a history of agreeing to things and then trying to condition or change them." She says a lot of time has been lost as a result, and the world can't afford to lose any more

More than 200 000 people have died in the Darfur region of western Sudan and millions have become refugees since a rebellion against the Sudanese gov ernment began in 2003.

# Higher Education Bill Incorporates Obama Proposals To Improve Teacher Preparation, Fund Predominantly Black Institutions

Bill increases \$100 million in college aid to Illinois

students Washington, D.C. - U.S. Senator Barack Obama (D-IL) today praised fellow members of the Health, Education, Labor and Pensions Committee for incorporating his proposals to establish teacher residency programs and to recognize and fund pre-dominantly black institutions into The Higher Education Amendments that today passed the Committee. The Higher Education Access Act, which today also moved out of the committee, includes a more than \$100 million increase in college aid for Illinois students in 2008-2009

"Whether the cause is skyrocketing tuition costs or a lack of resources and leadership, higher education remains out of reach for too many stu-dents today," said Senator Obama. "This comprehensive legislation will not only make college more affordable, it will provide our prospective teachers with the preparation, skills and support they need to serve children in high-needs school districts and invest a new gen-eration of leaders by funding predominately black institutions. America's teachers and schools deserve our long term commitment so that they can provide students with the skills and knowledge needed to suc ceed and restore America's competitiveness.

Earlier this year, Obama introduced the Teaching Residency Program Act (S 1574) which would estabfor prospective teachers to part-ner with mentor teachers for an on what works, and delivers on academic year, receive master's level coursework and certification, and gain hands on class-room experience. He also introduced the Predominantly Black Institutions Act (S.1513) to create an official designation in higher education law and provide funding for institutions with large African American student populations that do not meet the criteria for Historically Black Colleges.

Teaching Residency Programs are not only effective for teacher preparation and support, but also to increase the number of teachers in highneed districts, since recr tricts that sponsor them. The teaching residency legislation supports successful models of

the Teacher Academy campaign pledge Obama made when he ran for the Senate in 2004. Each year, high-needs schools often lose nearly one-fifth of their teaching staffs. This con-stant turnover of under-pre-pared teachers undercuts efforts at school improvement and costs the nation over \$2 billion annually. Typically, teachers leave the profession much sooner if they are inadequately prepared and lack mentoring support when they arrive. It is critical that prospective teach-

modeled and then practice them with ongoing support.

Black Predominantly Institutions are primarily urban and rural two-year colleges that serve at least 50 percent lowincome or first-generation college students. More than a quarter of a million students would benefit from grants awarded as a result of the PBI designation. Grants could be used for a variety of purposes, from acquiring laboratory equipment to supporting teacher education to establishing community outreach prorams for pre-college students.
As a member of the Health,

Education, Labor and Pensions Committee, Obama also worked to secure an increase of \$100 million in college aid for Illinois students in 2008-2009, and a projected \$850 million over the next several years. This increased student aid is mostly in the form of Pell Grants. This is paid for not by increasing the deficit, but by reductions in government subsidies to banks and other lenders. This is similar to the provisions of the HOPE Act, the first bill Senator Obama introduced in the Senate in

Houston.
Is our NAACP telling its Black constituents that no one in the National Office knew about the Shrine? Are they saying that no one in Baltimore, where they are located, knew to ask one of the largest distributors of Black books, Brother Nati, at African World Books? Have they not heard of Maryland/DC-based Karibu Books, whom they could have called to get infor mation on Black book stores in

Are they saying they never heard of Haki Madhubuti and Third World Press, or Lushena Books, both in Chicago Would they have us believe they know nothing about Milligan Books in L.A., whose owner, Dr. Rosie Milligan, annually presents Black Authors on Tour in the same town where the NAACP held s Image Awards? What about lia Books, Amber Books, and Cush City Books? Puleeeze! Give us a break! This is absolutely ridiculous and, even though I should not have to say

it, it's also unacceptable.

Black bookstores, publishers, and distributors all over this country are struggling to stay

open. Why in the name of all that is sensible, all that is logical, all that is reasonable, all that is respectable, all that is ethical, and all that is conscionable. would a Black organization not use a Black bookstore or distributor in Detroit, or even some other city, to present its Authors' Pavilion? One book-store owner was told, "You can sell bookmarks." What?!!!

This situation is insulting, and it speaks to the psychological conditioning that still rules some of our people. 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# Couple Face 30 Years For Identity Theft Of Nia Long, Ashanti, Mariah And Others

doesn't mean someone can't hack your identity

Due to a complaint filed in U.S. District Court in Rochester against a Henrietta couple, Charles B. Curry Jr. and Shameika Drain Curry, both 28, they will likely face harsh penalties for identity theft.

The investigation began in October 2006 when a bank said it had been the victim of credit card fraud. Shortly after, Shameika Curry the mother of three, home was issued a search warrant by the U.S. postal inspectors after noticing a num-ber of financial mail being sent to the home in the names of Nia Long and even singer Mariah Carey.
According to

Shameika Curry's lawyer John Parrinello, the couple plead not guilty in federal court.

The couple who is stated to be separated, was charged with bank fraud, mail fraud, and identity theft. They stole the identity of a number of people including celebrities such as actress Nia Long and singer Ashanti Douglas. The couple allegedly purchased cars, got credit cards and wrote a number of illegal checks.

Shameika Drain Curry went as far as impersonating singer Ashanti Douglas to get a \$36,000 loan and to purchase an Infinty from an Irondequit auto dealer sometime last year. The young woman also ordered a replace-



nse in Ashanti's nam from the Department of Motor Vehicle that was sent to an address in Rochester, NY. The young woman even impersonated Nia Long so that she could write and cash a check for \$8,300 made

out to her own cleaning business.

The husband Charles Curry Jr., impersonated his own father and also ordered a replacement Mercedes Benz.

In addition to being charged with identity theft, the couple will also be charged with defrauding a bank for more than \$45,000 to open a credit line by taking on the identity of an elderly woman from Rochester.

After appearing in federal court Wednesday, Shameika Curry was allowed to remain free on her own recognizance after turning herself in to the U.S. Marshalls pending her arraignment. Charles Curry had to secure his own release by posting up his home and his parents' home as collateral as ordered by U.S. Magistrate Judge Jonathan W.

According to Charles Curry tement to the Judge, he hasn't worked for their cleaning busi-ness since February due to an auto accident, but records show that he recently purchased a home in Greece for \$315,000 on April 3.

The couple could face a \$1 million fine and 30 years in prison if convicted according to Assistant U.S. Attorney Richard A. Resnick

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
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## **Immigration Reform Goals For The CBC**

# Diversity And Equal

The CBC supports immigration criteria that will increase the diversity of immigration from countries that have historically been underrepresented, such as countries in the Caribbean and Africa, or treat-ed unequally, such as Haiti.

## Earned Access To

Citizenship
The CBC supports earned access to lawful permanent resident status for persons currently in the United States that takes the following factors into

 Unification of immigrant families, which would include uniting immigrants with spouses, children or other close family members who are citizens or law ful permanent residents of the United States;

· Proven employment records through temporary and guest worker programs or other temporary residence programs; and Such reform of earned access to citizenship should also include a path to permanency for the ndocumented already here.

# Economic Opportunity And Fair Wages For Legal

The CBC believes that all citi-ens and legal workers in the United States should be assured education and job training, non-discriminatory employment opportunity and livable wage. The CBC, therefore, supports increased funding for educ and job training utilizing fees generated from new immigration provisions and other resources and supports increased funding for enforcement of laws against employment discrimination. wage and hour violations, unfair labor practices and illegal hiring. The CBC also supports holding employers accountable for the legal status of their employees.

Border Security
The CBC believes that the federal government has the responsibility to protect, through border security and other means, against immigrants ille-gally entering the country and/or overstaying their authorized periods of admission. The CBC therefore, supports funding for border security equipment, border patrol agents, enforcement and other resources as reason-ably necessary to accomplish those objectives.
