Price of Democracy: U. S. House Passes 'Better Than Nothing' Mortgage Reform Bill

Just recently, the U.S. House of Representatives seemed to be riding to the rescue of U.S. homeowners with its Mortgage Reform and Anti-Predatory Lending Act of 2007, which passed by a commanding margin.

Back in March, the National

Urban League addressed the unfolding subprime lending debacle through our Homebuyer's Bill of Rights well before the issue started to trigger shockwaves in international credit markets and to send hedge fund analysts to the unemployment line. At that time, policy makers and government officials were reluctant to support greater regulation to give the market a

chance to correct itself. Guess what? It didn't happen.

But the chamber didn't quite send struggling homeowners their knight in shining armor. But some kind of help is better than nothing at all, I guess. Such is life on Capitol Hill, where slim party margins, especially in the U.S. Senate, make for glacial progress in the legislative process.

But what about the hundreds

of thousands of households who have and will be foreclosed upon? According to Realty Trac, foreclosure filings in the third quarter were up 100 percent in 2007 over 2006, and up 33 percent over the second quarter. By the end of September, nearly half a million properties had entered some stage of foreclosure nationwide – or one per 196 households.

An Apologetic Imus Is Back on the Air

NEW YORK (**AP**) — Getting fired wasn't the first time Don Imus had hit rock bottom.

"I analogize it to being an alcoholic and a drug addict, which I also am," the talk-show host said during an apologetic return to the airwaves Monday. "If you get into recovery, as I am for 20-some years now, you have the opportunity to be a better person, to have a better life than you ordinarily would have had. And that's true in this situation."


Like his stumble into addiction in the 1980s, Imus fell into a personal purgatory after calling the Rutgers women's basketball team "nappy-headed hos."

His debut on WABC — along with a new cast featuring two black comedians — completed a comeback that seemed improbable at the height of the uproar last spring. CBS Radio fired him on April 12, pulling the plug on his "Imus In the Morning" program that had aired on more than 70 stations and the MSNBC cable network.

Speaking to a boisterous live audience that had paid \$100 a ticket, wearing his trademark cowboy hat, Imus said his road to recovery began in an emotional, four-hour meeting with the Rutgers team on the day he was fired..

William William Mayo is Still in a Prison

Not that he is the only person in prison for something he did not do, but for crying out loud, y'all, can a brother get the same attention and support that Genarlow Wilson got? William Mayo has been locked up for 15 years; he received two life sentences plus 40 years in prison for a robbery he did not commit. He sits in a Georgia prison, rotting away, having been sent there in his 20's; he is now in his 40's. He prays for the day he will be free, but he admits that his hope is fading. What will we do for this brother?

We put a great deal of energy into the Shaquanda Cotton, Genarlow Wilson, and the Jena Six cases, which was commendable and indeed worthwhile. But their cases came to the forefront long after Mayo was sent to prison. There has been a campaign for justice for Mayo ever since he was "convicted," but without the fanfare and celebrity of those we have seen in the recent past. Why is that? When are we going to see the kind of outrage and indignation about William that we saw in the other cases?

The Dynamic Frankie Lou: Murphy's Life is Joyously Celebrated

When Frances Murphy II was planning her funeral, she let her family members know that she wanted it to be a joyous occasion, filled with memories of her life and how well she lived it.

And that was exactly what



happened as hundreds gathered Thursday at St. James Episcopal Church in Baltimore for in an upbeat, cheerful celebration of the life of the woman whose existence reflected the legacy of the Afro-American Newspapers and the Black Press over the past 50 years.

The Rev. Allen F. Robinson, Murphy's pastor and the head of St. James Episcopal Church, set the tone for the services in his homily.

"We are here to celebrate

the eternal life that has been given Frances L. Murphy II," he said of the former head of the board of directors of The Afro-American Newspapers. "If you think Frankie's gone, think again."

As family members and the minister spoke about Murphy, laughter often rippled across the church as they recalled talks with her and the way she lived her life.

Murphy designated family members and friends to say a one minute tribute in her honor. Jake Oliver, CEO and chairman of the AFRO-American Newspaper board of directors, asked AFRO employees past and present to stand as he read his message, calling "Murphy a mentor and mother."

"Frances Murphy's life has touched many," Oliver said, also recalling how Murphy participated in or oversaw the coverage of some of the most important events in African-American history over the past century.

Her youngest daughter,

Susan Barnes, talked emotionally about how her mother took her around the world and what a help she was during Hurricane Katrina.

Another said, "We remember with joy the good she leaves behind. She added to the sum of human joy."

"She was connected to the paper that was read by the Black community," former congressman and NAACP President Kweisi Mfume said. "When she spoke, it was like hearing from the president of the United States.

Karith performs weekly at a variety of NYC comedy clubs and has now joined Don Imus new radio show on WABC.

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

THE TRUTH CLINIC Sean Taylor's Death Spotlights **Black Men In Crisis**

Sean Taylor, the 24year-old superstar Pro Bowl safety for the Washington Redskins football team, has had a week of phenomenal media coverage. death, one day after being the victim of a fatal gunshot wound, stunned his family, friends, and sports fans across the country.

His death, like that of other notable blacks that achieved premier gold level status atop the pinnacle of professional sports, prompted the media to speculate on a correlation between his questionable brushes with the law and his violent death. The press couldn't allocate enough column inches analyzing the rough edges of his early life and radio/TV programs scheduled entire segments commenting on Sean's questionable life decisions.

Even CNN felt obliged to produce a one hour special, Violence In America-Black Men In Crisis, using Sean's murder as the platform from which to regurgitate the much publicized heart wrenching and frightening black murder statistics accumulating across America.

The terrifying visuals crawled across the screen as the solemn voice over emphasized the message. New York 596 murders; Angeles 480; Chicago 468; Detroit 418; Philadelphia 406; and Miami 250. Of the 14,990 murder victims last year 6,294 or 42 percent were black. Nine out of ten black murders were perpetrated by another black.

Of course the usual suspects were rounded up and paraded before the TV viewers while being identified as the shameless contributors to this black violence. Systemic racism, poverty, unemployment, education, social injustice, peer pressure, disparate incarceration, and the lack of viable mentors.

Numerous references were made during the CNN program to the need to "get to" the young black males before they can get mired in destructive criminal related lifestyles. The implied solution given the most prominence was community after school playgrounds (complete with night lighting) where young blacks could spend time playing basketball and other sports.

Aericans seem to be a nation addicted to sports and sports players. Some of those who participate in amateur sports dream of becoming high paid professional athletes but very few beat the long and daunting odds of making a full-time living from professional sports.

Only a few will become household superstars like Sean Taylor, Michael Jordan or Tiger Woods. The total rosters of the 32 football teams, 30 basketball teams and 30 baseball teams at the major league professional level are respectively 2,240, 1,200, and 450. Considering that the average career of a pro athlete is 5 years, 20 percent of the roster will turnover each year making a total of 778 slots available for newcomers in the three

major sports. The real odds of a high school athlete playing in any pro sport are 10,000 to 1. Playing in the NBA is a 50,000 to 1 shot.

But the enthusiasm with which impoverished black families cling to the unrealistic hope of athletic success to the exclusion of almost all other alternative avenues available continues.

The dream is nourished because blacks see more success stories publicized about sports stars than in any other field of endeavor. Even with the odds highly stacked against them the talented young men and women who dream of becoming sports superstars greatly outnumber the available openings.

For those few blacks that are fortunate enough to make it into the professional system and receive a substantial contract their successful career has a longevity that averages only 5-10 years. So at age 35 even the Sean Taylors either retire or lose their starring roles to the newest phenoms. Then, with no practical education, what do they do?

So we continue to bury both our Sean Taylors who have achieved their 15 minutes of fame and those who are still holding onto their dreams and aspirations. We shake our heads in disbelief, offer our condolences. and hold endless conferences and symposiums on what should be done. This usually consists of shifting attention away from what we can do to what the establishment

(the man) should be doing

Granted there is systemic racism that impacts undermines social, economic, civil status of blacks. Activists need to continue to challenge the injus-

But in the meantime reality dictates that it is the black community's responsibility to take action to alleviate those inequities that are uniquely impacting blacks. Its not that we don't know what needs to be done or that we don't have the means to do it. These are our young people and we need to take charge of them. As we continue to abrogate our responsibility "the man" will continue to build more prisons as his contribution to a We cannot solution. afford to continue standing by, crying the blues, while generation after generation of our youth go astray and destroy themselves.

The blame game is nice for talk shows and op-ed pieces but it does nothing to break the vicious cycle of Black Men In Crisis.

Four young blacks, ages 17, 18, 19, and 20, have been arrested in connection with Sean Taylor's murder providing an affirmative postscript to the CNN conclusion: If you are a young black male in America less than 25 years of age you are 15 times more likely to be murdered than a white male of similar age.

Supporters of the anti-vio-


lence campaign will be wearing a symbolic white ribbon. Events have been planned in Sierra Leone, Liberia, Zambia and Kenya, among others.

if William committed those crimes, he should be out of jail by now. You have to admit that two life sentences are a bit much for a robbery where no one was hurt, nothing of substance was taken and those who did the crime were captured right away.

This is a man who was three credits short of graduatfrom Morehouse College; he was an honor student; he was a scholarship recipient; and he was a mentor for other young Black men. William was an active member of his church and well on his way to being the kind of Black man we say we need in our neighborhoods. Why are we not doing everything to at least see that he gets a proper hearing, an opportunity to prove his innocence?

Aside from the fact that Georgia citizens should be outraged at paying tens of thousands of dollars per year to keep William in jail, there should be a national wave of interest and activism centered on this case. At this point, having lost nearly 16 prime years of his life, he should at least be on probation, parole, or totally free. This man should not be sitting in prison wasting away, when he could be doing so much good out

here where we need him.

If you want to read more about William and his case, go to www.freemayo.com and look at the evidence; listen to the interview of Tyrone Wilson, who committed the crime, as he reveals how he and the other young man were coerced to say that William was guilty. Listen as he admits that William had nothing to do with the crime for which he was convicted. Listen, browse, and then tell me you cannot get involved in this cause.

Hundreds of thousands of dollars were raised in the other cases, and the publicity overwhelming. Celebrities were leading the charge and calling for justice. Where are they in William's case? The folks who have been working to get Mayo freed are raising money by selling dinners and holding raffles to pay for attorneys and investigators. No national campaigns, except for the Blackonomics Million Dollar Club (BMDC), no huge donations by celebrities, and no NAACP Defense Fund involvement.

Mayo was a close friend of Ennis Cosby, Bill and Camille Cosby's son, who was tragically murdered in 1997. There is a photo of the


two of them on the website. If you read this column regularly or have read any of my four books on Economic Empowerment, you knew I would not end this article without giving you something to do. Here's the deal: I don't know Bill Cosby, but some of you do. As Cosby travels around the country espousing personal responsibility and appropriate behavior by our young people, it would be great if he would put in good word about William Mayo, a model of personal responsibility, prior to his unjust lockdown.

Anyone out there know Tom Joyner? I heard him celebrating Genarlow Wilson's freedom, and I am pretty sure I also heard him say a scholarship would be provided for Wilson to attend college. A campaign by Joyner on his TJMS would be "oh, oh, oh" so beneficial to Mayo.

Finally, the brothers and alumni of Morehouse could each donate a few bucks to the Mayo Fund and get involved in raising the consciousness of this society about William's plight. Imagine the collective impact all of you could have. There it is; let's get busy, y'all, cause William Mayo is still in prison.

Photographer Captures Beauty of African-American Women


"African-American females have had a very difficult history: from slavery to racism to poverty. Although slavery has been abolished in this country, and we are working on eradicating racism and poverty, in the 21st Century,

beauty, we will come to see what makes a woman truly beautiful... Just maybe we will come to understand that real beauty is more than that which can be seen. Real beauty is that which lifts us, real beauty touches our hearts."

Jerry Taliaferro is a West Point graduate who turned to photography full time after preparing a single portrait of an African-American female originally intended to simply serve as a sample in his portfolio, Jerry was struck by the fact that "Very little attention had been paid to the beauty of the Black woman. The Black woman was almost invisible." So, he came up with the novel idea of portraying sisters in a glamorous style from the 1940s reminiscent of the classic, black-and-white fashion shoots of such classic Hollywood actresses as Greta Garbo and Katherine Hepburn.

The upshot of his efforts is an enchanting, emotionally engaging and spiritually stimulating masterpiece entitled Women of a New Tribe: A Photographic Celebration of the Black Woman. Taliaferro proves himself to be quite a gifted artist behind the camera with this eclectic collection of over 100 photos. For the images contained on the pages of this oversized coffee table book achieve far more than merely capturing each model's physical beauty. The pictures also magically reveal an intimate aspect of the subjects' souls as well.

It is noteworthy that this groundbreaking tome features a rainbow of African-American females in terms of color, shape, size and age, and not just ones who meet a shallow Eurocentric standard of beauty. "What about the jet black goddess with skin like



African-American females face one of the most difficult hurdles we have ever had to face: a severe lack of selfrespect.

"We have allowed the media to make us believe that we must have straight hair, light skin, thin bodies and European features to be considered beautiful. This book is not only an opportunity to reaffirm to all black women that we are 'fearfully and wonderfully made by God,' but also an opportunity for everyone to see the emotions and beauty Jerry Taliaferro wrought through his camera lens."

Cheryl A.M. Waymer, mother and model, as excerpted from the foreword of "Women of a New Tribe: A Photographic Celebration of the Black Woman."

Jerry Taliaferro, the author, says in the preface, "These beautiful women have always been around us. They are our wives, mothers, sisters, daughters and friends. We can see the beauty in them if [we] just try. Perhaps in seeing their

When Dr. McElroy was sharing her life tales to a group of students at Austin College in Sherman, Texas, she recalled her grandparents telling her about the 1930 burning of Grayson County Courthouse. A mob wanted to get at a Black man accused of raping a white woman; as well as how a group of parents in Virginia banned several books. including "I know Why the Caged Bird Sings" by Maya Angelou because they were deemed "anti-white." Dr. McElroy stated we many who cannot deal with political and historical reality.

The courthouse burning mob, included men, women, and children prevented firefighter's efforts to put out the blaze.

The defendant hid in a fireproof vault, which the mob blew open and burned him on the corner of Mulberry and Branch Streets. At the time, Mulberry boasted a thriving Black business community, including a hotel, a theater, two cafes, two doctors, two undertakers and a tailor, among others.

The mob used furniture as kindling for a fire to burn the man. The police busied themselves "direct-

ing traffic" for the curiosityseekers. And the National Guard told Blacks they could not be guaranteed safety.

Pastor Range's sermon for the program was, "I know Why The Caged Bird Sings." (Psalm 150:6.)

He said, "There are three major reasons why the caged bird sings: 1) He sings because he can. 2) He can't stop singing praises to his creator. 3) He never gives up; he knows that one day he is coming out of the cage.

Pastor Range said, "The bird sings of freedom. The caged bird sings just as: Thomas Edison; Albert Einstein; Thurgood Marshall, the first Black

Walt Disney; and Jesus, Joseph, and Noah, from the Bible. These folks came out of their cage and made an impact on the lives of many people.

Dr. McElroy, dubbed "Queen Professor" and a national treasury, by many students, stated that three things we need to do as a society is, slow down, simplify our lives, and be kind to people. She also said that we need to learn to build more bridges and not walls. We need to learn that gratitude is an attitude that we need to have forever. That you don't have to do the same thing forever, and that education is so important that it is something that we need to continue emphasiz-

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What's Your Money Factor? So you want to lease!

By Frank Simmons

Ask a friend, what's your money factor? They will probably think you are trying

to borrow \$20. Money factors are never discussed in common terminology related to the automobile business, yet eighteen percent of all vehicle purchases are leases where money factors are applied. In the high-end luxury segment leasing comprises over fifty percent of all sales, so it's a big deal.

Money factors include several things in leasing but for the sake of this discussion, it's your "implied" interest rate. Your lack of understanding with leasing terminology may result in you paying too much for your next lease.

An easy equation is to take your "money factor", which is a fractional number like, .0033, times 2400 and you get your "implied" interest rate. In this example your rate would be 7.92 APR. We use "implied" rate because there are no federal or state disclosure requirements for money factors as there are for disclosing interest rates in regular auto financing.

Many professionals, such as our subscribers, lease their vehicles through their businesses and are more prone to these mistakes. Their primary focus is mileage and payment and they generally don't care how the dealer gets there.

Finance departments generate income from money factors so they are not likely to volunteer this information.

Regardless, it does effect your payment and the amount you actually pay for the vehicle over the term of the contract. If you pay \$80.00 more per month because of money factor reserve for the dealer over 36 months that's \$2880, which is significant. It's likely money you could use.

Remember, money factors can be negotiated like interest rates unless the money factor is subsidized from the manufacturer. What is a subsidized money factor? The subsidized money factor is a "buy down" rate factor that's comparable to a zero percent financing that's commonly seen in advertised car specials.

In future columns we will explore this subject in more detail so stay tuned.

DFW International Airport Sub-contracting Easier For Small Business With Innovative 'Expedited Payments' Program

Small businesses to be paid 58 percent faster; prime contractors reap added benefit through program

(DFW INTERNATION-AL AIRPORT) - Small businesses will be paid faster than ever with a new innovative 'Expedited Payment' program pioneered by DFW International Airport. The groundbreaking program offers the promise to pay subcontracts as much as 53 days faster than the current standard.

new program "The improves the cash position for small businesses, helping them to pay employees, suppliers and even complete the job more effectively," said Don O'Bannon, vice president of the small and emerging business department at DFW. "We are trying to strengthen businesses that work with DFW by alleviating some of the firms' cash flow issues."

Contractors who sign up for the program will be paid an incentive for their advance payments to subcontractors working on their behalf – between when they are billed and when they bill DFW. Contractors who are awarded new multi-year deals will be asked to participate in the voluntary expedited payment program. Contracts totaling more than \$10 million for facilities maintenance or construction will be eligible for the innovative service, which ultimately benefits the small business' ability to grow while working on large contracts.

The Airport expects to pay as much as \$58,000 to its prime contractors during the first year of implementation for the payments made to sub-contractors. Payments to subcontractors could now occur as fast as 7 days after invoicing. The new program reduces payment times by as much as 58 percent.

but it was pretty close. I was there to try to save my life."

He pledged to "never say anything in my lifetime that will make any of these young women at Rutgers regret or feel foolish that they accepted my apology and forgave me."

But "the program is not going to change," Imus added to applause from the live audience.

The Rev. Al Sharpton, one of the strongest voices calling for his firing, said Imus had a right to make a living. "Imus was fired. The move to hold people accountable was won," Sharpton said. "Whether he can, in the course of time, redeem himself, time will tell."

Kathy Times, vice president of broadcast for the National Association of Black Journalists, asked, "Will he emerge as someone who has learned his lesson, or choose to continue the actions of his past? I certainly hope it's the former, and

the airwaves will be a respectful representation of the owners — the American public."

Shortly after the program began, Imus introduced his new cast, including black comedians Karith Foster, a native of Plano, Texas and Tony Powell, as well as Bernard McGuirk, the producer who instigated the Rutgers comment and was fired as well.

While Imus pledged to use his new show to talk about race relations, he added: "Other than that, not much has changed. Dick Cheney is still a war criminal, Hillary Clinton is still Satan and I'm back on the radio."

Foster said she would play a crucial role in giving the show the proper perspective. "I can speak from the viewpoint of an African-American, and especially one who can see and understand both sides ... which I think makes for a great mediator.





Just a few years ago, black homeownership hit historic levels—nearly 50 percent—and has fallen steadily since. The decrease obviously has something to do with the surge in subprime foreclo-

sures over the past few years.

The Center for Responsible Lending estimates that one out of five subprime loans taken out in the past few years will go into foreclosure. In 2006, the center estimated that blacks were 31 percent more likely to hold subprime loans than whites with similar credit histories and that they were four times more likely to get higher

interest rates. A recent study by New York University's Furman Center for Real Estate and Urban Policy found that African-Americans were four times as likely as whites to hold subprime mortgage loans in the New York City metropolitan area.

In our Homebuyer's Bill of Rights under The Right to Be Free from Predatory Lending, we threw our support behind H.R. 1182, the "Prohibit Predatory Lending Act," sponsored by House Financial Services Committee Chairman Barney Frank of Massachusetts. It served as a basis for the legislation that passed the House

earlier this month until last-minute lobbying by the mortgage industry knocked some of its teeth out.

One provision added to quell inclustry concems would prevent borrowers from suing Wall Street firms in state courts where protections are often stronger for abusive lending practices. It represented a concession by Frank to win the support of the panel's ranking Republican Spencer Bachus of Alabama. The legislation still fails to please many, including us, but managed to gamer enough votes to pass the House by a strong margin and currently eludes a White House veto threat.

"The lack of Wall Street accountability is particularly troublesome," said John Taylor, president and CEO of National Community Reinvestment Coalition, a group of more than 600 community-based organizations in favor of creating and sustain affordable housing, job development and vibrant communities for working families. "While Wall Street has piled up billions of dollars in earnings and bonuses on defective or negligent mortgage products, the taxpayers are increasingly paying for their mistakes. Homeowners across the country have lost billions of dollars in home equity due to falling

house prices."

At the other end of the spectrum, the Mortgage Bankers Association predicted that the legislation would result in fewer home loans being issued nationwide. "Have no doubt, this bill will limit credit availability and options for thousands of Americans who want to grab their share of the American dream of homeownership. It will eliminate tools that millions of Americans have used to become successful long-term homeowners," said Kieran P. Quinn, the MBA's chairman.

Far too many Americans of color have watched their dreams of home-

ownership turn into their worst nightmares. However, at this stage in the game, a watered-down effort is better than nothing at all. Still, it shows that to some extent our nation's leaders aren't terribly concerned about hard-working Americans' desire to capture their own sliver of the American Pie. It also underscores the need for current and prospective U.S. homebuyers to exercise their own brand of consumer protection. They cannot rely completely on the government and should remember to go to great lengths to educate themselves about mortgage loan products before they sign the dotted line.






