


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Former DART Official Apparent Victim in Murder-Suicide

Hugs Filter Fears, Tears of Kidney Dialysis Patients

ST. LOUIS (NNPA) -Normandy resident Rosie Reed knows how to turn lemons into lemonade.

After suffering a stroke in the mid-80's, paralysis and difficult rehab, she thought the tears would never end. He also had an angioplasty five or six years

ago. Upon recovery, it appeared she was the picture of health. Rosie certainly had left the tears behind – that is, until 2007 when she was told her kidneys were not functioning properly. Rosie had CKF – Chronic Kidney Failure.

CKF occurs when the kidneys can no longer filter waste products from the body. Patients are

required to be in dialysis three times a week and must be very careful with fluid intake from liquids and foods to prevent buildup in the body.

"Instead of the fluid coming out in the form of urine as in healthy people, it distributes itself throughout the body, such as the legs, the lungs, around the heart. They can develop con-

gestive heart failure or pulmonary edema," said Stephanie Houston, R.N., a nurse at Fresenius Medical Care Metro Normandy. "The fluid would build up in their lungs and they would basically drown."

Dialysis, the filtering of the blood using external medical equip-



America Floundering In A Sea Of Inanity

Congress is but a walking shadow, poor players that strut and fret their hour upon America's stage and then are heard no more: it is a story played out by idiots, full of sound and fury but signifying nothing. (Shakespeare paraphrased)

Inanity: Something empty of meaning or sense; lacking significance or substance.

Even when couched in Washington political speak there is little doubt that the American economy is suffering and in a recession trend.

Proof of an impending economic bust abound. Oil prices are hovering above \$100 a barrel, more Americans since the Great Depression owed more on their homes than the homes are worth, the subprime market crashed, global markets are staggering, the unregulated but important corporate creditdefault swap market is teetering, and consumer prices for food, gas and medical care are skyrocketing.

The private sector lost 101,000 jobs in February according to the Labor Department. Crediting the net increase in federal and state government jobs still leaves an overall net loss of 63,000 jobs. The February loss was the biggest monthly drop since March 2003 and the second consecutive monthly decline. Consecutive months of job losses have only occurred during a recession.

Currently the politimachinery America has been paralyzed and stagnated by the unyielding gridlock between those diehards clinging to the corporate controlled political model and those who believe that things must change. The U.S. Congress has done little except posture, prance and prattle by way of preparing Americans for the massive changes that are negatively recasting our economy and lifestyles.

Some government money has been spent researching for improved sources of renewable energy, but the recent energy proposals that consider ethanol, coal, wind, or other alternative fuels are either absurd or will take decades to Recent implement. half-hearted efforts to take away a billion or two of oil company tax breaks in light of the obscene profits being made will likely flounder at the hands of skilled lobbyists or a complicit Presidential veto.

While it is still eight months before the November elections voters are indicating that the economy and particularly high gas prices are their top concerns. Iraq, al Qaeda, abortion, immigration and healthcare may still be excellent fodder for debates but voters without a job or the ability to maintain an accustomed lifestyle are going to demand political change.

However, in the American form of democracy major policies are locked in to two and four year election cycles. The next President may come into office with a mandate for change and with a cooperative Congress that will follow his/her leadership. But if Congress is of the opposition party or constituted with very narrow majorities then the mandated change may be difficult to implement.

The five vear odyssey in Iraq and the budget busting expenditure of federal funds has left Americans with a future that is definitely short of the American dream: 4,000 soldiers killed, 100.000 wounded. \$500 billion wasted. death squads roaming at will, terrorist recruitment rising, and America now hated by the very people it ostensibly was freeing.

Meanwhile, on the home front we are mired in a worsening economic quagmire, the country is being transformed into a police state, our freedoms are being trampled, current and future debt is increasing and the treasury is going bankrupt.

It seems clear that new government intervention, regulation and controls will have to be implemented to avoid a severe social and economic calamity. Affordable sources of energy and food so critical to personal survival are becoming harder to find. Most Americans do not have the slightest idea how to grow food or temporarily live off the land for basic necessities to sustain even a minimal standard of living.

In the midst of some of the country's greatest crises that threaten to propel the country into social turmoil and bankruptcy what do the watch dogs Congress place on the priority list? Hearings on steroid usage in sports, the obscene pay of ineffective CEOs,

the escalating costs of the U.S. embassy in Baghdad, the financial nuances of mega churches, and debating the wording of absurd non-binding resolutions all designed to provide an instant catharsis to divert riled voters.

Left off the action list are meaningful items such as discovering what happened to over 12 billion dollars that disappeared when the Coalition Provisional Authority turned over control of Iraq to the Iraq Governing Council, the illegal policies and actions authorized by the president in conducting the war, redistributing the billions of war funds to address urgent domestic needs, or removing social security payments from taxation.

American voters are expressing their hopes and desires for change and new possibilities. They are doing it with a vigor and excitement not seen for a long time. They seem to realize that you can buck the system, you can defy conventional wisdom and you can define your own vision for success - not just in bottom line monetary terms - but in terms of something more satisfying to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

A united and committed populace has a good chance of achieving this vision for itself and in the process save America from floundering in the muck of inanity.

Flawed Elections Foreseen for Ethiopia

(NNPA) - Ethiopians will be getting their first chance to vote since the general election in 2005, which ended with violent protests and the jailing of most leaders of the opposition.

Leaders of the Coalition for Unity and Democracy were eventually pardoned and released from jail last year, and government says they are free to vote and run for office.

Elections are scheduled for April for the CUD's old seats and for Addis Ababa city council, which the opposition won, but which has had an appointed caretaker administration since 2005

Since then, however, the party name - CUD - has been given to a breakaway

group, and the party symbol - the "V" for Victory sign - went to another party altogether.

Two major opposition leaders initially sentenced to life terms, CUD chairman, Hailu Shawal, and the man chosen as mayor of Addis Ababa in 2005, Berhanu Nega – received political asylum and now live in the U.S.

ment usually takes three to four hours.

Dialysis treatment onsite at a medical facility is hemodialysis. The kidney dialyzer machine pulls the blood out of the body and filters all the waste products out of the blood.

Reed feared the treatment would be painful, although Houston said dialysis does not hurt. Reed, a retired private duty nurse, cried as she visited sites for dialysis and prayed that she would be led to the right place.

She found an angel of sorts in Houston at the Normandy dialysis clinic. "When I first came in I cried everyday," Reed said. "If it wasn't for that little girl in the white coat...she put her arms around me and held me tight and said, 'everything will be alright.""

Those hugs by Houston made Reed feel better - happy and confident. When she looked at the other patients in the facility, she knew her visits for dialysis would have a higher calling.

"Patients looked pitiful," she said. "I felt the people needed something other than sadness."

Rosie Reed started giving each patient a hug to offer the encouragement and support she found in Houston's caring hugs.

"I don't give them away for free. I want them to feel better," Reed said. "I would tell them to pray and keep the faith and know that you have to build up confidence at first

Her hugs are now a staple at the Normandy clinic. Rosie does not stop with the patients. She also hugs every single doctor, nurse and staff member at the facility each day before she begins dialy-

Rosie thinks the hugs make everyone feel better.

Dialysis stations are set up with headphones for music and TV monitors for patients to watch TV during the hours of treatment.

Certain patients may be able to receive form of dialysis that is not conducted in a clinic setting.

Peritoneal dialysis is conducted with assistance by the patient at home. Houston said home dialysis is not the best option for a person with many abdominal surgeries because it would interfere with the fluid exchange. Patients will need a catheter placed in their belly for dialysis access before beginning peritoneal dialysis.

Regardless of the type of dialysis, Houston said the majority of patients are tired after the treatment, depending on how well they control fluid intake and control their diet

Unlike CKF, in chronic kidney disease, doctors have detected a failure but the patient may not need immediate dialysis.

Those at greatest risk for kidney disease/failure are patients with existing medical conditions, such as hypertension, diabetes or a family history of kidney disease. African-Americans, Hispanic-Americans, Native Americans, Asians and Pacific Islanders are at greater risk for kidney disease due to the high

incidences of diabetes and hypertension in the population groups.

"You really don't show any symptoms until you get to the point that you need dialysis," Houston said. Your kidneys may be producing urine, but no filtering is taking place.

"You may notice some swelling in your legs, a decreased appetite or a weird taste in your mouth. But a lot of people chalk it up to something else," Houston said. "And you have a general feeling of just being tired."

Having routine exams with your physician and blood and urine tests to check kidney function is the way to keep a handle on CKF or chronic kidney disease.

"With proper education and medication, it can slow the process a bit, but it can't reverse it," Houston said.

Between dialysis treatments and her muchanticipated healing 78-year-old embraces, Rosie leads a very active, healthy and happy lifestyle. She swims 20 laps daily; puts in 2,000 strokes on the ski machine four to five times a week: gardens; grows and freezes vegetables; sews hats; drives (not to dialysis) and enjoys just about anything she wants to do.

"Rosie is the epitome of what we all want our patients to be in a dialysis clinic. She is optimistic—she accepts her disease, and that's a big part of it," Servisa Cash, MSW, a social worker at the clinic, said.

How to access UNCF scholarships and grants

Founded in 1944, the United Negro College Fund, Inc. (UNCF) is the nation's oldest and most successful minority higher education assistance organization. Through the generosity of our donors, UNCF is able to administer a wide range of about 450 programs and over 4,000 scholarships.

All qualifications and information on UNCF scholarships are provided at www.uncf.org/ scholarships

UNCF awards scholarships to undergraduate and graduate students attending a UNCF member college or university, students attending other historically black colleges and universities as well as majority institutions. Generally, once a student receives a UNCF scholarship, it may be renewed in subsequent years if he/she continues to meet the eligibility requirements of the scholarship and if funds are available. However, the renewal of a UNCF scholarship is automatic not an process. Students typically do not receive more than one UNCF scholarship during an academic vear.

UNCF general scholarship eligibility criteria are as follows:

• Students must have a minimum grade point average of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale;

• Students must have an unmet financial need as verified by the Financial Aid Director; ? Students must complete a Financial Aid Form (FAF) or a Family Financial Aid Statement (FFS) and request that the Students Analysis Report (SAR) be sent to the financial aid office at their college or university.

Ground broken for Sunnyvale's first hospital

SUNNYVALE, Texas (MARCH 4, 2008)---Cottonwood Partners and Rockwall Hospitals, Inc. broke ground Feb. 29 on Texas Regional Medical Center at Sunnyvale, which will be the growing town's first hospital when it opens in spring 2009. The 117,000square-foot general acute-care hospital is estimated to have a total cost of \$68 million.

The hospital, which will be owned by 100 or so area physicians and developed by



Cottonwood Partners, will be licensed for 70 beds and will include 53 medical/surgical suites, six operating rooms, an emergency department with six treatment rooms, eight ICU beds

and a women's center with labor-and-delivery suites and postpartum rooms. The hospital, located on a 29-acre campus at 231 S. Collins Road, will be managed by Rockwall Hospitals.

The hospital, which is projected to have an annual payroll of approximately \$14.9 million, is expected to add 250 new, mostly skilled and professional jobs in its first phase. Construction is

expected to take 14 months.

Sunnyvale Mayor Jim Phaup called the start of construction of Texas Regional Medical Center at Sunnyvale "a significant milestone for our town."

"It will provide us quality health care, which is something our community needs long term," Phaup said. "It will serve our town and the entire region."

Sunnyvale is about 15 miles east of downtown Dallas and is a small.

upscale Dallas County community of about 4,000 people, according to North Central Texas Council of Governments.

"I am very encouraged to see the commitment of area physicians to support this community hospital. Everyone understands the extreme importance of the strategic location of Texas Regional Medical Center at Sunnyvale to serve patients and physicians with new delivery options," says Mark W. President; they are not losing sleep over the next election and, in many cases, they couldn't care less who wins. Of course, those groups to which the piece referred were busy taking care of their businesses and aggregating their resources among themselves. I know, I know; they have not been through what we have been through.

Another article titled "The New Black Agenda," written by Dr. Earl Trent, Pastor of the Florida Avenue Baptist Church in Washington, DC, stated, "We need to focus on becoming a respected competitor in the global marketplace."

Dr. Trent laid out a comprehensive strategy for Black folks to move from protest to parity. He ended his article by saying, "The new Black agenda is focused on creating a Black economy that competes like any other group in the global economic game. Currently we are marginalized, overlooked, and disrespected. We have a different history than other groups and must push for interventions that will change the status quo and level the playing field. It will not happen simply by good will. It will not happen without intention, without sweat or demands of quid pro quo. The new Black agenda is about winning something tangible, worthwhile, and passing it

With all of the issues facing Black people in this country, politically, socially, and economically, you would think we would not only have seen these points quite clearly but we would have acted upon them long before now.

Politically, we are still on the outside looking in, at this point hoping to elect a Black President. Trent says, "Not even the election of a true Black president will solve the economic problems of Black America unless we have an agenda where the state of the Black economy is at the center of that agenda."

Economically, we are at the bottom of every good category and at the top of every bad category. We have a whole lot of income but very little wealth. We have a whole lot of "stuff" but very little substance. Our dollars, like our votes, are literally taken for granted by those who receive them.

Socially, we are ostracized, caricaturized, criticized, and demeaned. Just the other night, I heard one of this country's so-called conservative talk show hosts call Maya Angelou a

"whore" and Michelle Obama a "hypocrite." And, if you think Obama has taken some body blows, believe me, you ain't seen nothin' yet.

All of this, despite our being in this country for 400 years and contributing more than any other group to this nation's foundational wealth by working without pay for 250 years or so. It's quite obvious to me that those in charge are not coming to save us; after all, we have been here for four centuries and they have not come yet. What should we do now?

The first thing we must do is acknowledge our situation. Understand what runs this country and deal from that perspective. Rothchild was right, and he proved it by accumulating billions of dollars for his family and future generations. Many others have

done the same, and they don't care who is in office. They give money to both parties and cover their bets in politics because they definitely know what time

"Our charge, as Black people in America, is to move from a social agenda to an economic agenda," as Dr. Earl Trent has so eloquently and straightforwardly suggested. Black folks are the only group in this country trying to assimilate, trying to be accepted, and trying to be approved and validated by white people. In the process of our inappropriate behavior, we are losing and falling even further behind in the collective economic game. As Trent says, "It's like drinking water from a cup with holes in its sides... we may get a small drink but we have nothing left in the cup

to pass on to our loved ones."

We must wake up and then get up and be about the business of economic empowerment, regardless of who wins any election. We must not allow the hoopla of "making history" to divert our attention from the real action, and that action is building, owning, and controlling our own income producing assets.

As I began with a quote form Rothchild, I end with one from Dr. Trent. "An economic agenda is the central agenda of all politics, for it determines who gets a slice of the pie, who gets the crumbs and who gets nothing. The new agenda for Black America must consciously replace the social agenda with an economic agenda whose central focus is how we can improve the state of the Black economy."

rock in their shoe, with the advance of time, one soon becomes desensitized to the of its impact. Ironically, when the rock changes position and from another angle imposes distress we take notice and experience a peak in our attention to the source of our discomfiture. Similarly, we spend in general a disillusioning proportion of our conversations referring to each other as the N-word and then go about in rebuttal, dissecting superficial differences of the uses of the word among Blacks, its spelling, its pronunciation, the imaginary distinction between its use in white and Black mouths, neglecting the fact that a tomato is still a tomato even if you change the pronunciation.

We need to take a proactive stance against this term's fallacious, acrimonious hold on our society's progress; stop embracing the tools of our destruction, understanding that weapons formed against us in time past do not lose but gain momentum as we perpetuate them in our community. You cannot bring a bomb home and expect

because you decorate it, that its effects will be ameliorated. Its obliterating impact to the African-American spirit and selfconcept only contribute to our digression as a culture.

I think we have forgotten that it was those who share our bloodline that formed the geometry necessary to construct the pyramids, that invented many of the foundations of contemporary medicine, first navigated by the stars and taught others all these things. We forget that Aristotle and his contemporaries voyaged to US in Timbuktu and Mali and Cairo to attain an education. I'm not talking about the bloodlines of our mothers' violators during slavery that promulgated and gave roots to the firsts of our culture's single parent homes. We forget that we virtually invented family ties in our communal villages where it took "a village to raise a child,"-not because our fathers didn't want to be there, but because back then we realized the value of community investment in our posterity . . . because back thenbefore those necrophilliac

ships with their diabolical, exploitative missions arrived at our shores-that though we had our problems as any nation does, we knew the value of family, the value of the next man as he related to our life's path and we didn't leave our children behind. Back before we addressed each other as the N-word...


Did you know that the word nigger comes from the Hebrew word "necr" for "cursed"? No, no one stops in their tracks to register a physical sensation in response to the word, but your spirit does and each of us with Black blood flowing through us should recognize a need for self-censure. Did you mean to call your sister "cursed one"? Did you really mean to tell your "road dog" that you don't really mean him any good? Did you mean to tell your educated, phenomenal, progressive, strong, historically fortified, surviving, striving, resilient brother that everything he touches will come of no good? Because that's what you mean when we refer to one another as "nigga."

We need to be edifying

each other, building each other up, removing from our language the arsenal of our enemies. When our own vocabulary reflects a propensity to spread hate among ourselves, it is us that are our own worst enemies. The white man did an even better job tearing us down if he was able to train us to do it ourselves. We used to get upset when someone yelled out "jigaboo," "darkie," "picaninny," "tar baby".... "nigger." And now we pretend all is well as long as we are the ones using the language, forgetting these words' design as tools to convey our captors and oppressors' concept of our inferiority, even to their barbarism. They rape our land, our mothers, our spirit, and somehow we think we can divorce our use of the words from their original intent. We're wrong.

This N-word has got to go. Its wheezing, straining against the covers, feeding through a tube. Its heart monitor is giving off a weak emasculated signal. Its breath is thin and hardly perceptible. It wants to die. Are you keeping it alive?

Company Pays \$1.9 Million To Settle Racial Discrimination Case

(AP) An aviation-fueling company has agreed to pay nearly \$1.9 million to black and Hispanic workers who said they were taunted with hangman's nooses, racist cartoons and other racial slurs.

Allied Aviation Services Inc. did not admit wrongdoing, but it settled a lawsuit before it could go to trial in June.

The settlement will be paid to 15 current and former employees who worked at Allied's fueling station at Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport.

This is a company that failed to recognize the red flags," said Suzanne Anderson, an attorney for the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, which joined private attorneys in filing the lawsuit. "If you see a noose, you should react."

Black employees said whites forced them to ride in the back of company shuttle buses, and someone scrawled a slur on a tile in



the men's room. A Hispanic worker charged that his boss displayed a racially insulting cartoon about the worker.

One of the former workers, Eric Mitchel, called the treatment of minorities "a modern-day lynching."

We have endured a lot,"

he said. "We feel very good that we've been vindicated." Although the lawsuit focused on DFW workers, lawyers said they received similar complaints from Allied workers at Kennedy, LaGuardia and Newark airports in the New York area.

Miriam Benjamin, the second Black woman in history to receive a patent for a Gong and Signal Chair for motels in 1888. Patricia Bath was the first Black female doctor to receive a patent for a medical invention; a machine for ablating and removing cataract lens-

Henrietta **Bradberry** invented a bed rack with an attachment to the bed that permitted air to pass through and refresh worn clothes in 1943; and in 1945, the device operat-

ed pneumatically and was adapted to discharge torpedoes under the water surface (the Torpedo Discharger.)

Marie Brown invented the Video Home Security System that utilized television surveillance in 1969; the same year that Minister Sheila Tarpley Lott, my only daughter was born. Bessie Blount, a physical therapist who worked with soldiers injured in WW II, invented a device allowing amputees to feed themselves in 1951. Mary Reynolds invented a Hoisting/Loading Mechanism in April 1920. Alice Parker in 1919 invented a new and improved gas heating furnace. The invention provided a mechanism for regulating heat to be carried to various rooms in a

Valerie Thomas in 1980 invented an Illusion Transmitter that extends the idea of television, with its images located flatly behind a screen to having three dimensional projections appear as though they were right in your living room.

Roberta Martin was the operator of her own "Gospel Music Publishing House." Sister Rosetta Tharpe was a Gospel Singer that was known for her signature guitar style; she also introduced gospel music into nightclubs as well as concert halls. sage after learning of the tragedy about 12:30 a.m. Mr. Shaw requested the senator would take care of the couple's college age son. The voicemail indicated that the couple's enemies "would make sure that they were dead before the end of the day."

Flint Shaw resigned her DART board seat in January after she was accused of forging stationery from the Dallas County District Attorney's Office to avoid paying a \$7,500 debt.

Her husband wrote a regular political column on Dallasblog.com.

Lt. Craig Miller said relatives became concerned about the couple's well-being after a series of telephone calls

Miller said Rufus Shaw called an out-ofstate family member about 6 p.m. That conversation prompted at least two more phone calls involving relatives in Texas and elsewhere. One family member went to the couple's home about 9:45 p.m. and called police after no one inside respond-


Miller did not elaborate on the conversations between Rufus Shaw and family members or what other evidence pointed to a possible murder-suicide.

"There were clues that we looked at there that lead us to believe that they had their life in order," he said.

Miller was asked during the news conference whether the couple may have been involved in a "suicide pact."

"We certainly believe that's possible that both people were involved," Miller said. "We will not know that until we get further into this investigation. Obviously one person in this situation did the shooting but to say whether or not both people were cognizant of what was about to take place ... we can't determine that right now."


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
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
