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Fannie Mae Moves to Exclude: Bad Credit Scores Could Forever Deny Borrowers Home Loans

By Lisa Loving PORTLAND, Ore. (NNPA) - New lending guidelines proposed by the Federal National Mortgage Association also known as Fannie Mae - would permanently lock out some minority homebuyers by denying loans based on credit That's the message voiced by hundreds of affordable housing advocates around the nation, who sent an open letter opposing the move to Fannie Mae President Daniel H. Mudd last week.

"As I understand it, and why I signed onto the letter, is that while Fannie

Mae and Freddie Mac have some assistance they provide to homebuyers to make homes more affordable, they're considering a new qualification so that people who have bad credit are not going to qualify for home loans," said Moloy Good, director of the Fair Housing Council of Oregon.

Observers question whether Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac may be solving their snowballing financial problems by reneging on their mission to help lower-income and minority homebuyers achieve the American Dream.

Former News Executive Picked To Lead NAACP

The NAACP chose 35year-old activist and former news executive Ben Jealous as its president Saturday, making him the youngest leader in the 99year history of the nation's largest civil rights organization.

The 64-member board of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People met for eight hours before selecting Jealous in the early morning. He was formally introduced Saturday afternoon and will take over as president in September.

"I'm excited," Jealous told The Associated Press. "I think that it's a real affirmation that this organization is willing to invest in the future, to invest in the ideas and the leadership of the generation that is currently raising black children in this

country.

Though he is not a politician, minister or civil rights icon, Jealous provides the organization with a young but connected chief familiar with black leadership and social justice issues.

He takes the helm as the NAACP's 17th president just months before the organization's centennial

HUD Repeatedly Dismissed Staff Concerns About Contracts

The small Texas property-management company had no experience overseeing hundreds of defaulted homes across the country. It did have two former Reagan administration officials at the helm and warm relations with senior Republican appointees at the federal housing agency.

During a few weeks in 2004, the three-employee company, Harrington, Moran and Barksdale Inc. (HMBI), went from no

government work to landing \$71 million in contracts with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to oversee the upkeep and sale of defaulted homes. It had previously managed a handful of apartment buildings and development

projects.

The company's meteoric rise -- and HUD's willingness to bend the rules to accommodate it -- surprised veteran agency contracting specialist Gloria Freeman.

"After you've been in the business awhile,

Who's Got Our Back?

Having been concerned for many years about the reluctance among politicians, both local and national, to directly cite the economic disparity that still exists between Blacks and Whites in this country, a search of my "keeper" files turned up the following quote: "We could pretend it's not true, but decade after decade of slavery followed by decade after decade of segregation, followed by decade after decade of discrimination has an impact. It has an effect.

If you're African American in this country today you have about - on average - 10 percent of the net worth of white families.

Ten percent - average net worth of [B]lack families is about \$8,000; [while that for] white families is about \$80,000. And let me tell you, we're not moving in the right direction. African American children who were born into middle class families in the 1960's are now living in poverty."

"If we could only harness the power



of our common humanity, I don't think there's anything we couldn't

do for the people of this state," she said.

The 54-year-old becomes the 67th speaker, succeeding fellow Los Angeles Democrat Fabian Nunez. He is relinquishing the post at the end of the year because of term limits.

Bass was a physician's assistant before being elected to the Assembly in 2004 and is known for writing legislation on child welfare and social justice issues. As speaker, she will hold what is regarded as the second most powerful post in state government behind the governor.

Bass takes over the 80-member house as lawmakers are turning their attention to the state budget. Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger will release his revised spending plan for the coming fiscal year on Wednesday and has estimated a deficit as high as \$20 billion.

Bass will be among leaders who try to broker agreements on the budget and other major policy issues. She will appoint chairs to legislative committees, set staff budgets and largely control what legislation reaches the Assembly floor.

California's Assembly is the first state legislative body in the nation to be led by a black woman, according to the National Conference of State Legislatures. In Washington state, Rosa Franklin holds the largely honorary title of Senate president pro tem.

No Honor Comes From a Dishonorable Action

A good tree cannot bring forth evil fruit; neither can a corrupt tree bring forth good fruit. (Matt 7:18)

On April 7, 1965, a beleaguered President Lyndon Johnson gave an address at Johns Hopkins University that rationalized for the American people the nature of the Vietnam conflict, the reasons for the U.S. involvement, and the nation's objectives for the war.

His words seem familiar, and not just because of the similar rhetoric we hear from our current political leaders. Change the name of the country, the date, and the coded names used to identify the enemy and today's Iraq is yesterday's Vietnam.

The sad but real tragedy for America is we are again making the same mistake of couching self-serving arrogant nationalism in Christian virtues yet expecting a different result.

In Johnson's case by the time he gave his Johns Hopkins speech the war to save South Vietnam's independence was already lost. For President Bush, by the time he declared "mission accomplished" on May 1, 2003 the conventional Iraq war was not only still alive but the unanticipated insurgency was just beginning.

Although many in the Johnson administration recognized at that time the fallacy of American dominance as a foundation for continuation of the war Johnson continued to escalate the war while simultaneously talking about a negotiated peace. During a private meeting a perplexed

Johnson confessed to confidants that "the only thing I know to do is more of the same."

Three years after Johnson's speech at Johns Hopkins the war in Vietnam became exactly what the North Vietnamese had claimed: an antisocial war that pitted the US military against the people of Vietnam. Whatever the justification for the original mission, the perceived righteousness of the war changed and it became an unjust war both politically and morally.

President Bush can no more succeed with our current approach in Iraq than LBJ did in Vietnam.

Do the Bush

mantras of "We're fighting them there so we don't have to fight them here" and "we must stay the course" sound familiar? Johnson said this about Vietnam, "Let no one think for a moment that retreat from Vietnam would bring an end to conflict. The battle would be renewed in one country and then another. The central lesson is that the appetite of aggression is never satisfied. To withdraw from one battlefield means only to prepare for the next. We must stay in southeast Asia.'

And after five disastrous years in Iraq, motivated by a fantasyland of illogic that is shaped by spin doctor slogans and fueled by unbridled triumphalism (the belief that American political and religious doctrine, culture and social system is superior to all others), Bush continues to pursue his campaign as "theologian in

chief" to convince Americans we can achieve victory with honor.

The problem is that even as the President's Christianity based rationalizations for the Iraq war helped maintain his hold on the religious right political base, they caused concerned allies to resist administration efforts to build a consensus for supporting the war.

Even if his contrived weapons of mass destruction had been validated, the total lack of planning for managing post-Hussein Iraq or for effectively implementing military and nonmilitary reconstruction efforts were enough to doom any potential for success in Iraq.

In Vietnam and Iraq, the United States tried to use its superior technology in support of combat missions to destroy insurgent strongholds, only to have the enemy stealthily slip away to nearby safe havens and regroup.

In spite of their best efforts, US forces continually killed and maimed multiple thousands of noncombatants, thereby expanding the pool of supporters, sympathizers, and new recruits for the insurgents.

Then as now, the United States tried to train and equip a domestic armed force capable of providing security. But, with little international support, the insurgents in Vietnam and Iraq were able to portray their fledgling military as pawns of US imperialistic interests.

President Johnson recognized the hope-

lessness of our position in Vietnam well before the failed Tet offensive of 1968 that became a catalyst for pubic repudiation of the war. Demonstrations and unrest erupted in the streets and college

campuses across America with demands for an immediate end to the unjust war. On March 31, 1968, Johnson announced to a surprised nation that he would not run for re-election.

It fell on President Nixon to manage America's face saving "peace with honor". He summarily declared a US victory and then left South Vietnam to manage its own affairs

While this should be the model for the Bush administration's exit from Iraq the Republican candidate for president, John McCain, vows to pursue a stay the course policy until achieving 'victory with honor". The simple truth is there is no "victory with honor" to be had in Iraq because the war was a dishonorable action from the start.

McCain is embracing a circular illogic that is no doubt rooted in a skewed manifest destiny philosophy similar to Bush's messianic based triumphalism. This alone makes him a questionable candidate to put in charge of America's reconciliation to God and its redemptive search to regain its lost honor as a world superpower.

Atlanta, GA – The Links, Incorporated and the American Heart Association (AHA) have formed a relationship to educate the African American community about childhood obesity, one of the most serious public health threats facing our nation. Through the efforts of its 75 chapters in seven states and more than 2,500 members, the Southern Area of The Links, Inc. recently announced plans to promote education and awareness, particularly among children.

The two organizations will educate the communities where Links chapters are located about factors that contribute to obesity, implement programs that promote healthy lifestyles and support key legislations/policies. The AHA will provide resources, including an educational compact disc developed for this partnership. Links' chapters will work collaboratively with their respective AHA staff partners.

According to the Centers for Disease

Control (CDC), childhood obesity is a public health epidemic and poses one of the most urgent threats to the health and well-being of children and their families. Over the past few decades, the obesity rates have spiraled. Today, one of every ten school children in the world is overweight and an estimated 18 million children under the age of five are classified as overweight and the rate of Type II diabetes in children is increasing. Childhood obesity and

diabetes can translate to the early onset of atherosclerosis (hardening of the arteries) that can lead to heart attack and stroke. In addition, children with obesity problems are at heightened risk for a number of other chronic adult conditions, such as hypertension, high cholesterol, asthma and respiratory problems.

"Overweight and obese children become sick more often, may perform poorly in school and experience depression, lack of self-confidence and low selfesteem," says Mary F. Currie, director of the Southern Area. "The Links, Incorporated recognizes the need to address this issue, which disproportionately affects children of African ancestry, particularly in the South."

Zambia to Use Recovered Millions for Women's Health

(NNPA) - Some \$60 million in stolen government funds has been recovered and will be used to build hospital maternity wings, to help improve the health of women and children, a government minister said.

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


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Dallas Symphony Orchestra's 2008 African American Festival

Fannnie Mae, pg 1 that Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac are known to hold a staggering \$5 trillion in mortgage debt, secured by a combined financial cushion of only \$83 billion.

Meanwhile, federal officials and lawmakers are struggling to force the two companies to fully disclose their financial dealings, with mixed

Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac, the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation, were started by Franklin Delano Roosevelt during the Great Depression as a funding engine to ensure that banks had enough money to make home loans to middle income Americans. The companies dominate the secondary mortgage market, meaning that they buy mortgages from banks and other institutions to "replenish" the amount of cash available for more and more mortgages.

While they are semiprivatized agencies of the Federal government, they are not government programs but rather privately-held, with investors who profit from the fees Fannie and Freddie charge to the original mortgage companies by essentially guaranteeing the loans will be repaid whether or not the homebuyers pay them off.

It's a complicated way of making a profit, and critics say Fannie and Freddie capitalize on the complexity of their business dealings to reap massive windfalls - during the sub-prime mortgage boom of the past five years, the two companies have more than doubled their market share, dealing in more than 80 percent of all mortgages resold to investors in the first three months of 2008 alone.

The spike in profits came after Congress in February allowed Fannie and Freddie to increase their loan limits above \$417,000 per home as part of the economic stimulus package, effectively creating what observers call "jumbo

New Controversy The minority mortgage lending advocates' mobilization against the proposed new credit score limits comes as Fannie and Freddie face new scrutiny regarding their

operations.

Fannie Mae was expected to release updated financial figures last week, while this week Freddie Mac was expected to do so.

Even as their profits have skyrocketed, a series of scandals has hit the two companies over the past five years. In 2003, Fannie Mae admitted it had understated its earnings by almost \$5 billion, resulting in a \$125 million fine and new financial controls imposed by deferral banking officials.

In 2006 Freddie Mac agreed to pay nearly \$4 million in fines after pleading guilty to improper political contributions.

And media reports surfaced last December indicating that Fannie Mae had lost \$12 billion in the sub-prime mortgage meltdown, touched off my a rise in defaults on loans to higher-risk home

This week Republicans in Congress and some financial regulators told the New York Times that Fannie and Freddie are closer than ever to defaulting on their \$5 trillion debt load.

And if they default, observers say, taxpayers will very likely have to

pay off the debt.
"They could cause an economy-wide meltdown if they got into real trou-ble and leave the public on the hook for billions," said Sen. Mel Martinez. R-Fla., the former Secretary of Housing and Urban Development.

Minority Lending at

For minority and lowincome homebuyers, Fannie and Freddie's financial problems may be solved at their expense sooner rather than later.

The proposed new loan guidelines would, for the first time, create credit score limits preventing anyone with bad credit from mortgage assistance programs.

A statement issued by national fair housing advocate Stella Adams says the proposal would increase the cost of obtaining home loans for people with low credit scores, disproportionately hurting the very communities who need homebuying assistance the most.

Adams says that on the VantageScore credit scoring system, which runs from 501 to 990, 84 percent of African-Americans had credit scores at the lower half of the spectrum, below 745. according to a report by the Federal Reserve Board. Such scores would require home-buyers to pay 40 percent of a home's purchase price as the down payment.

Further, Adams says, the proposed pricing system would identify zip codes where higher fees would be charged for mortgage lending.

Leon Russell of the International Association of Human Rights Agencies, and Mississippi state Sen. Robert L. Jackson, who drafted the open letter to Fannie Mae President Daniel H. Mudd, call the new proposal "tantamount to both ethnic and gender discrimination.

Good, of the Fair Housing Council of Oregon, cites the Alberta Street neighborhood in Northeast Portland as a typical area heavily impacted by racism in home mortgage lending.

"Fannie Mae's mortgage assistance programs could be a way to help longtime residents keep homes in their historic neighborhood," Good

"Without this credit requirement it could be a way for people to choose where they want to live despite the higher prices, but using credit scores as the criteria for eligibility will lock a lot of African American families out of the program.'



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

Fun-tusical is a word that makes perfect sense after you've sat and listened to 80 minutes of song and dance based on the classic stories of Dr. Seuss. Only in the world of Seuss could such a ridiculously coined term have such a perfectly reasonable connotation. What other word could so completely describe the Seussical brand of fun, specially packaged for the young as well as the young at heart. The Teatro delle Muse production of Seussical the Musical will bring you back to that special time, no matter how long ago, when you dared to believe that a cat could wear a hat and an elephant could hear a Who.

Column Award winner Sarah VC Henderson takes a huge risk in directing 24 actors ranging in age from 4 to 16. The risk pays off. The charm of every single actor is infectious. After all, a person's a person, no matter how small.

The talented cast is anchored by Cam Wenrich in the role of everyone's favorite feline, the Cat in the Hat.

The Cat is introduced when JoJo, a small boy, played by a lovely little girl (Hope Henderson), stumbles upon a rather odd looking hat. JoJo begins the show by asking, hat is that"? The

"What is that"? The question sets into motion one of the underlying themes of the musical. Curiosity lends itself to thinking outside the box. That's quite an appropriate axiom for anything Seuss.

Immediately Mr. Wenrich and Ms. Henderson launch into song and dance. When Ms. Henderson later sings from a bathtub, you might wonder if it's possible that such a strong voice can come from such a small person. Yes, it's possible. Anything's possible, as she sings a song of the same title. Be forewarned, you'll be singing the same song to yourself long after the show ends.

Ms. Henderson's diminutive stature plays well against Horton (Mitchell Montgomery), a large and sensitive elephant. Mr. Montgomery is mostly on the mark as the protective pachyderm trying to convince everyone that people can actually live on a speck of dust. Horton's biggest ally is Gertrude McFuzz (Alexis Henderson). Ms. Henderson, no relation to

Hillary suggested she would wipe out Iran if it made a move on Israel: Obama described Israel as our most important ally and said he would respond with force if that country was attacked; and McCain, along with his sidekick, Joe Lieberman, turns an old 1960's hit into a theme song for more war, singing, "Bomb, bomb, bomb, Iran," all in an effort to assure the Israelis that we've got their back. side of Black life in America, is understandable. He cannot get elected by 13% of the population, many of whom don't even bother to cast a vote anyway. Hillary and McCain are a different story. Although the so-called Black vote is so important to a Democrat being elected, it is and has been taken for granted. The Republicans, of course, have all but written off the so-called Black vote; it's obvious judging from the way they shun our institutions. That kinda puts us in a political pickle, as they say; it's a real conundrum for Black people in America. Who's got our back?

It is rational and reasonable to suggest that Black people, having been in this country as long as Whites have, and having created much of the wealth of the United States, should be so well positioned that we have some priority when it to comes to maintaining our allegiance to the U.S.

It is reasonable to think that any political candidate, especially the ones running for President, would at least acknowledge the contributions made by Black people and speak out boldly, about the injustice against Blacks that has continued for centuries, just as U.S. Representative Thaddeus Stevens did in 1867 when he called for reparations for formerly enslaved Africans. In the current campaign, we

cannot even get an honorable mention.

It's all about our support for Israel. I wonder if we would go to war if Ghana is attacked. Why didn't we go to war when the slaughter of 900,000 Tutsis was taking place in Rwanda? Who's got our backs?

The answers are obvious to most of us: those answers reflect the underbelly of this country, still grounded in racial animus and a racial hierarchy that has been sustained "by any means necessary." The answers point to the fact that our backs are still exposed, politically, socially, and economically, and we are still taking lashes from an overseer who is constantly telling us our name is "Toby' not Kunta Kinte.

We have been and continue to be fodder for accusations and innuendo that depicts us as "hating" Âmerica, even though we fought and gave our lives to maintain its status in the world. After all we have done for this country we still can't even get an honorable mention from folks running for President.

Edwards' comments about the disparity that

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exists between Blacks and whites were, indeed, a step in the right direction. Of course, we need more than mere rhetoric, but his relatively bold words do set the stage for forward movement.

I don't know about you, but I am so tired of being treated like a nonpeople, and even more than that, I am tired of us allowing others to treat us that way. Albert Einstein said, "The world is a dangerous place to live; not because of the people who are evil, but because of the people who don't do anything about it." What are we going to do about all of the adverse issues we face in this country?

While I appreciate John Edwards pointing out that gross economic disparity (Who knows? Maybe he will be Obama's Vice-President), I also know the answer to the question: "Who's got our back?" The government of this nation has shown us since Thaddeus Stevens' plea for reparations that it does not have our back. Thus, it is way past time not only for us to admit that, but also for us to answer loudly and clearly, "We've got our own back!"

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
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

Federal investigators are still sorting through **HUD** contract awards to friends of Secretary Alphonso Jackson, who resigned last month amid a criminal probe. But some career staff members and agency observers say problems in the agency's contracting process run much deeper than Jackson and involve officials who promoted certain companies while rebuffing concerns about their performance and qualifica-

The contract awards that staff members questioned took place within programs, heavily promoted by Jackson, to help small, minority-owned businesses get a bigger share of the roughly \$1 billion in public contracts HUD awards each year. During Jackson's tenure, the proportion of contracts awarded to small blackand Hispanic-owned

businesses, including under the Section 8(a) program, rose from 6 percent to nearly 35 percent. The proportion of contracts open to full competition decreased from 71 percent to 33 percent, federal records show.

HUD spokesman Jereon Brown said limiting competition on some contracts was critical to helping "minnows" in the small-business community grow into 'whales.'

"Nothing is more American than giving the little guy a chance to shine," he said. "The 8(a) program is good for business, good for innovation, good for the agency and, ultimately, good for America.'

A Washington Post examination of HUD's contracts shows that HMBI and two other companies won hundreds of millions of dollars in contracts under Jackson while career contracting staff repeatedly raised questions.

HMBI, of Fort Worth, was led by Republicans with significant HUD experience. Chief executive Maurice

"There are a small number of groups to whom all black people in this country owe a debt of gratitude, and the NAACP is one of them," Jealous said. "There is work that is undone. The need continues and our children continue to be at great risk in this country.

Jealous succeeds Bruce Gordon, who resigned abruptly in March 2007. Gordon left after 19 months, citing clashes with board members over management style and the NAACP's mission as his reasons for leaving. Dennis Courtland Hayes had been serving as interim president and chief executive officer.

Jealous was born in Pacific Grove, Calif., and educated at Columbia University and Oxford University, where he was a Rhodes Scholar.

He began his professional life in 1991 with the NAACP, where he worked as a community organizer with the Legal Defense Fund working on issues of health care access in Harlem. His family boasts five generations of NAACP membership.

During the mid 1990s, Jealous was managing editor of the Jackson Advocate, Mississippi's oldest black newspaper.

From 1999 to 2002, Jealous led the country's largest group of black community newspapers as executive director of the National Newspaper Publishers Association.

Jealous left the Publishers Association for Amnesty International to direct its U.S. Human Rights Program, for which he successfully lobbied for federal legislation against prison rape, public disapproval of racial profiling after Sept. 11, and exposure of widespread sentencing of children to life in prison without the possibility of parole.

Since 2005, Jealous has served as president of the Rosenberg Foundation, a private institution that supports civil and human rights advocacy. His experiences caught the attention of the NAACP's search committee, and Jealous said mentors encouraged him to take

the job.
"Like all black people in this country, I am deeply grateful for what the NAACP has accomplished in the 20th century, and I want to make sure it's as strong and as powerful in the 21st century," he said. "If I thought that I could help rebuild, if I thought that I could help bring in more funds and give direction to the national staff and increase morale, I needed to take it very seriously, and that's what I've done."

Despite his own successes, Jealous said that blacks in America still have a hard row to hoe, and that the gains of recent decades have created a false sense of progress.
"Those of us who are 45

and younger were told, 'The struggle has been won. Go out and flourish. Don't worry about the movement," he said.

Among his plans for the group are strengthening its online presence to connect with activists, mobilize public opinion and build a database for tracking racial discrimination and hate crimes; ensuring high voter turnout among blacks in the November election; pushing an aggressive civil rights agenda, regardless of the makeup of the Congress or White House; and retooling the national office to make it more effective at helping local branches affect change in their communities.

He said he does not see expect to have the challenges with NAACP leadership of which his predecessor complained.

"I was raised in the civil rights movement," Jealous said. "I don't see anything special here that would be a challenge that I haven't confronted and dealt effectively with before. These are my

people."
What Jealous lacks in oratorical appeal, he makes up for as an administrator skills he honed during his tenure with the Publishers Association, said the Rev. Joseph Lowery. And his foundation experience could help with fundraising – especially as the NAACP looks to raise \$100 million in conjunction with its 100th anniversary in February.

Jealous said having the energy of a 35-year-old will be an asset to the organiza-

"It means having somebody who is impatient and outraged that race is still a factor in our society." he

He added that he can attract 25- to 50-year-olds - the missing demographic among most chapters back to the organization. And he said he is eager to work with other groups to push his agenda.

This is the century when white people will become a minority in this country," he said. "What that means is right now, we need to have a clear picture of where we're headed and work together diligently with Latinos, Native Americans, Asians and progressive white groups as if our collective future depends on it. I'm committed to that.'

It's a tall order that isn't likely to happen overnight, but Jealous — whose resume doesn't reflect a record of longevity - said he's ready to settle in for the long haul. He has spent much of his life in California but has roots in Baltimore, where the NAACP is based. His mother was born in Baltimore, and his parents met while teaching at a junior high school in the city.

'As a black child growing up in this country, there was no higher ambition possible than to lead the NAACP," he said. "No one should be concerned about me going anywhere too soon.

tant secretary to Reagan-era HUD Secretary Samuel R. Pierce Jr. and became a minor figure in a 1980s political favoritism scandal. Its vice president, Albert Moran, also worked at the agency during the Reagan years.

Listed as having three employees in 2004 when it won its first contract, HMBI has accumulated \$282 million in HUD work. all but \$18.8 million of it in small-business awards. Former and current contract officials said staff members questioned HMBI's qualifications.

Contract specialist Freeman said she first ran into trouble when she insisted that the company follow procedures and post a required bond. She said her supervisor proposed waiving the requirement. Freeman prevailed, and HMBI posted the money.

Tensions mounted again when Freeman objected to a fifth contract award that HMBI was seeking. She and others at HUD feared that the company could not handle more work. Her bosses did not want HMBI to fail or to trigger a Small Business

Administration review of the company's abilities, she said. Freeman opposed her bosses'

rule-bending efforts to try to avoid that review. Later, she said, she and another official persuaded Barksdale to withdraw the bid.

'At that point, the top procurement people -Jo Baylor and Annette Hancock -- decided my services would no longer be needed because I was a pain in their neck," she said. After moving back to the policy job, she retired in 2005.

The contracting success of Drayton, Drayton & Lamar (DDL) fit a similar pattern. Since 2003, it has won \$35 million in information-management contracts. In the previous years, it had received just under \$1 million in HUD work.

When the inspector general investigated Jackson in 2006, an unidentified HUD employee reported concerns that "DDL continues to get contracts despite its poor performance," according to a report.

The employee alleged

that the company had a patron inside HUD's contracting office. DDL President Robert Drayton had socialized with Frank Davis, a close Jackson ally who is now second in command at the office of housing. Davis headed HUD's contract management review board.

Brown said the review board does not make final contract decisions. A review of a sample of DDL's contracts, he said, "did not find any evidence of anything improper."

Drayton said in an interview that his company wins contracts because of its performance.

"I don't think, maybe I'm wrong, that anybody at HUD can just give you a contract," he said. "I don't see how knowing him has been some special help to me.'

Young Passengers Safe by Buckling Up Correctly

Have you given your child a hug today? Not the type with your arms, but a hug from a safety belt. All passengers, regardless of age, should use a safety belt while riding in a vehicle. The Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) is helping parents make the best choice for keeping their kids safe.
Child safety seats provide

protection for small occupants whose bodies are still growing. Restraints are available for children of different ages and sizes.

restraint, the way it is installed and used can have an effect on

its performance.
When children outgrow child safety seats, usually at about 40 pounds, many people assume the child is ready for the vehicle's regular safety belt. Not so, say the experts at DSHS. A car's safety belts are designed for adults and do not fit children properly.

"If a child has outgrown a

safety seat but is less than 4 feet 9 inches tall, they will need a

training director of DSHS Safe Riders Traffic Safety program. "It lifts the child so that the seat belt fits correctly."

With a booster seat, the lap belt will be placed low on the child's hips, rather than on the child's belly; the shoulder belt will cross the center of the child's chest; and the child's knees will bend at the edge of the booster seat for better com-

A car's safety belts, which are designed to fit adults, won't Using a booster seat will better protect your child from being thrown from the vehicle, or thrown around inside it, during a crash.

Luera also points out that airbags pose a risk of death or serious injury for children.

"Even in newer vehicles that have airbags with suppression systems, children 12 and under should ride in the back seat," he said. Vehicles with airbags display warning messages regarding this on the sun visors and in

This program provides child safety seats to lowincome families and promotes correct use of safety seats. Low-income families can receive a free child safety seat by attending a one-hour class to learn how to use the seat correctly.


