# Zimbabwe's Mugabe sworn in after discredited vote

HARARE, Zimbabwe President Robert Mugabe has been sworn in for a sixth term, just hours after electoral officials said he won a discredited runoff.

As dignitaries watched

under a red-carpeted tent Human rights groups said on Sunday, Mugabe swore to uphold his nation's laws and then sat amid cheering to sign documents.

African and other world leaders had condemned Friday's presidential runoff, in which Mugabe was the only candidate.





# **Israel Debates Asylum for New Wave of Sudanese**

A new wave of refugees from the war in Sudan has landed in Israel where they are appealing to the Israeli government for asylum.

But proposed new legislation in Israel makes the African refugees subject to hefty prison sentences with especially tough sentences for those coming from enemy states, such as Sudan.

"We do not want our small country overrun by

an unending flood of des- have been crossing into perate foreigners," the Jerusalem Post wrote in a recent editorial which also criticized the new immigration rules.

Majier Pap, representing the southern Sudanese refugees, argued: "We are South Sudanese, mostly Christians, persecuted by a regime of Muslim fundamentalists, who are bitter enemies of Israel - we are, to all intents and purposes, vour allies."

Moments after the results were announced on state TV, a marching band opened inauguration ceremonies for Mugabe at his official residence. Reporters already had been called to the ceremony.

The electoral commission said total results showed more than 2 million votes for Mugabe, and 233,000 for opposition candidate Morgan Tsvangirai. Turnout was put at about 42 percent, and 131,000 ballots had been defaced or otherwise spoiled, apparently as an act of protest.

Tsvangirai withdrew from the race because of the violence, though his name remained on the ballot and his supporters may have spoiled their ballots rather than vote for Mugabe.

Residents said they were forced to vote Friday by threats of violence or arson from Mugabe supporters who searched for anyone without an ink-stained finger — the telltale sign that they had cast a ballot.

In the opposition stronghold of Bulawayo, official results showed Mugabe got 21,127 votes and opposition candidate Morgan Tsvangirai had 13,291, while 9,166 ballots were spoiled.

A high number of

spoiled ballots had been noted earlier Sunday by Marwick Khumalo, a member of parliament from Swaziland who led a team of election observers from across the continent under the auspices of the AU-sponsored Pan-African Parliament.

Khumalo said some ballots were defaced with "unpalatable messages." He refused to elaborate, but left the impression the messages expressed hostility toward Mugabe, who has led the country since independence from Britain in 1980.

Tsvangirai won the most votes in the first round of presidential voting in March, but not enough for an outright victory. African mediators have in recent days been pushing for Mugabe and Tsvangirai to negotiate a power-sharing agreement.

Mugabe said on the eve of Friday's vote that he was open to talks but pressed ahead with the election, apparently hoping a victory would give him leverage at the negotiating table.

Khumalo, the observer, urged African and regional leaders to "engage the broader political leadership in Zimbabwe into a negotiated transitional settlement."

With the election dis-

credited and attention turning to the possibility of negotiations, the role of Mugabe in any future government could be a sticking point.

"It's being considered within our structures," the paper quoted Tsvangirai as saying.

Mugabe, 84, was once hailed as a post-independence leader committed to development and reconciliation. But in recent years, he has been accused of ruining Zimbabwe's economy and holding onto power through fraud and intimidation.

The official inflation rate was put at 165,000 percent by the government in February, but independent estimates put the real figure closer to 4 million percent.

Since the first round of elections, shortages of basic goods have worsened, public services have come to virtual standstill, and power and water outages have continued daily.

# Dallas Student To Study at Alvin Ailey, Camp Broadway in New York During Summer Break

The Texas Commission on the Arts (TCA) and the Cultural Texas Trust announced Amber Barbee Pickens as a member of the 2008 Class of Young The Young Masters Masters grant program provides exemplary art students in grades 8-12 with the financial help they need to pursue advanced study in the areas of visual arts, literature, music, theatre, dance and media arts. 

### New super DART Rail vehicles make their debut as ridership reaches a new milestone

Each of DART's 115 light rail

vehicles will be converted into

The June DART Board Report leads off with good news: "DART had its busiest month ever providing nearly 10.3 million trips in the month of May. Up more than 2.1% over May 2007, DART's fixed route ridership continued to benefit from higher gasoline prices." However Randall Chrisman DART Chairman of the Board points out that despite the high cost of gasoline, bus ridership is down 1.1% compared to the same time last vear. The agency feels this is in due in part to neighborhoods with recent apartment teardowns, like Skillman and Walnut Hill Lane. Staff is reviewing the evolving demographic data in an effort to adjust routes appropriately.

To entice commuters concerned about the high cost of gasoline, DART has launched an aggressive advertising campaign to highlight the value of using public transportation.

introducing the largercapacity super light rail vehicle (SLRV). The first car began carrying customers on the Blue Line between Downtown Garland and Ledbetter stations during morning rush hour on June 23.

The modified cars are known as Super Light Rail Vehicles (SLRVs) because of the greater length and added passenger capacity. The SLRV will seat approximately 100 passengers compared with 75 on current vehicles. the Standing passengers on the

vehicle can nearly double the capacity.

The key is a new center section of the vehicles that adds seating capacity for about 25 more passengers and improves access through level boarding, which will allow passengers with disabilities – plus people with strollers, bicycles and the like – to step or roll directly onto the without using trains mechanical lifts. The newly modified cars will be place in service as they are finished. The vehicle conversion is scheduled for completion by the end of 2010.

Because the initial SLRVs are modifications of the current fleet of 115 LRVs, they also have another advantage: the inserts are less expensive than full-sized vehicles. However, DART will need to modify all current stations, except Victory Station, which was built to accommodate level-boarding at the time it was constructed. The platform work began in November 2007 and will continue for two years.

The SLRVs - designed in partnership with rail vehicle manufacturer Kinkisharyo of Osaka, Japan and are assembled at two DART facilities in Dallas. DART's first SLRV, Car #170, went into service on the Blue Line in 2002 as a prototype.

In the monthly public report provided by DART, it was noted sales tax receipts for April were up 8.36% over April 2007. Year-to-date the agency is 6.48% ahead of last year. April receipts were up 3.15% better than budget, and year-to-date DART is 2.5% (\$5.8 million) ahead of budget. This great news is tempered by the rising fuel costs.

It is standard for travel entities such as Southwest Airlines, and DART to secure a fixed price for their fuel by purchasing contracts months in advance. DART's contract price for bus diesel has broken through the \$4 per gallon ceiling. DART and as a result they are now paying more than \$4.10 per gallon. This is the latest benchmark in the dramatic price increases experienced over just the last 12 months. According to the DART report, other transit agencies around the nation are dealing with the same issue and are responding with a mix of fare increases and service cuts. However, they feel that thanks to the natural gas excise tax rebate the agency currently benefits from, they currently do not have to resort to such measures at this time but they reserve the option to consider alternatives in the future

# Judge allows Snipes to travel to England, Thailand

Hello London, good-bye IRS.

A federal judge today granted permission for movie star Wesley Snipes to travel to England this month and to Thailand in September while defense lawyers appeal his tax convictions and fight to keep the vampire-hunting hero of "Blade" out of prison.

Over objections from federal prosecutors, Senior U.S. District Judge William Terrell Hodges will allow Snipes to complete post-production work on the horror movie, "Gallowwalker" in London and to star as an FBI agent in "Chasing the Dragon," an action film set in Bangkok.

Defense lawyer Daniel Meachum said Snipes, 45, who was allowed to travel



overseas while his case was pending, has proven that he is not a flight risk.

But prosecutors pointed out that Snipes' "motivation to return to the United States has changed drastically" with a 36-month prison sentence hanging over his head for failing to file federal tax returns for 1999, 2000 and 2001 when he earned more than \$13 million.

They also noted his travel request for Thailand is less specific than for London, where he is to work from July 13-17.

"It would be one thing to allow (Snipes) to travel across the Atlantic for a brief and defined period of time to finish a project that is nearly complete," prosecutors said in their written opposition filed in federal court. "It would be another to allow (him) to spend two months - likely more beginning a new project half-way around the world

with an open-ended return date."

The actor estimates he would be in Thailand for about eight weeks beginning Sept. 8, according to court records.



To understand the importance of networking, it's helpful to examine how people get their jobs. When I first began my career counseling practice, I built a simple Web site. Most of my first clients found me via the Web. It was a rewarding, inexpensive way for me to start my business," Scarborough notes.



college students is the guest speakers that come to talk to your classes. These professionals are a vast untapped resource. One of our students who was interested in a career in pharmaceutical sales went up to a guest speaker from that industry after the presentation and introduced herself. By the time she claimed her diploma, she had lined up a \$40,000 a year job with the drug firm.






