

Obama to America: 'We Cannot Turn Back'

U. S. Sen. Barack Obama has officially accepted the Democratic nomination for president of the United States before an audience of as many as 90,000 adoring supporters, who also cheered the possibility of his becoming America's first Black president.

The euphoric moment was played out before millions who watched by TV and the internet around the world. It transcended politics as it shattered doubts that Americans of all races and backgrounds can unite behind an African-American candidate for president. Moreover, it raised hopes that people of color can soar above intrinsic White supremacy in a nation that for centuries embraced slavery, Jim Crow and modern-day institutional racism.

"With profound gratitude and great humility, I accept your nomination for the presidency of the United States," Obama told the crowd of flagwaving, cheering, chanting, applauding, stumping See OBAMA, Page 16

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

Ken Griffey, Sr.

Ken Griffey, Sr. (born George Kenneth Griffey on April 10, 1950 in Donora, Pennsylvania) is a former Major League Baseball star. He is the father of current Cincinnati Reds centerfielder Ken Griffey, Jr. and former Mariner minor league prospect Craig Griffey.

Ken was introduced to Major League Baseball on August 25, 1973. He played for the Cincinnati Reds (1973-81, 1988-90), in which he was part of three (3) World Series Championships (1975, 1976 & 1990), New York Yankees (1982-86), Atlanta Braves (1986-88) and Seattle Mariners (1990-91). History was made in 1989 when his son joined the Mainers; the Griffey's were the first father and son to play major league

baseball simultaneously. When he joined his son there in 1990, they became the first father and son teammates. He also hit back-to-back home runs with his son Ken Griffey Jr. on September 14, 1990. During his 19 year career he hit 151 home runs, a .296 batting average and was MVP of the 1980 All-Star game.

Ken was inducted into the Cincinnati Reds Hall of Fame in 2004. Currently Ken is serving in the capacity of Special Consultant and scout for the Cincinnati Reds.

He now resides in Orlando, FL, where in 2007 he started the Ken Griffey Sr. Foundation, aimed with dual roles. One, to bring awareness of Prostate Cancer to cities across America, to help atrisk youth in Orlando, by providing health and sports clinics. In addition, Mr. Griffey travels the Country giving motivational speeches on a variety of



topics to include parenting, team work, business ventures, etc.



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

Obama Speaks to the Multitudes

And there followed him great multitudes of people from Galilee, and from Decapolis. and from Jerusalem, and from Judaea, and from beyond Jordan. (Matthew 4:25)

"And seeing the multitudes, he went up into a mountain: and when he was set, his disciples came unto him: And he opened his mouth, and taught them. (Matthew 5:1-2)

Even the new 21st century Pharisees, Sadducees, chief priests and false leaders of the nation had to marvel and wonder, "What manner of man is this?"

Normally the acceptance speech for a presidential candidate is a closed event reserved for the credentialled delegates, and upper class political, religious, and society notables. But Obama, Barack the Democratic presidential nominee, opened the venue to the multitudes, the working people, who have been drawn to him by the promise of a new nation.

For many who packed Invesco Field at Mile High in Denver, the finale of the National Democratic Convention was more about the euphoria of history in the making than Obama's speech. In addition to witnessing the formal nomination of the first Black to be the presidential candidate for any political party it was the 45th anniversary of Dr. Martin Luther King's "Dream" speech.

The junior senator from Illinois was up to the task as he offered himself as a catalyst for the change needed to fulfill that promise.

Furthermore, our government should work for us, not against us. It should help us, not hurt us. It should ensure opportunity not just for those with the most money and influence, but for every American who's willing to work.

That's the promise of

America - the idea that we are responsible for ourselves, but that we also rise or fall as one nation; that in America our destiny is inextricably linked.

Obama specifically detailed more than two dozen policy areas where he explained why the approach taken by the Bush Administration and adopted by John McCain has not worked and will never benefit ordinary Americans.

He went on to say that the many challenges currently confronting Americans are not all the fault of government. But the failure of government to respond is a direct result of the broken politics in Washington and the failed policies of the Bush administration.

He stated, "America, we are better than these last eight years. We are a better country than this. And that is why I am running to be president of the United States of America."

One attendee expressed his feelings when interviewed following Obama's inspiring speech.

I was among the hundreds of thousands on the mall in Washington DC on August 28, 1963. I will never forget the exhilaration of that day. Dr. Martin Luther King brought all of us to our knees.

His speech was so much more than a dream. That day was the culmination of a hundred years of struggle. It was a moment built on the back of three years of sit-ins, freedom rides, community organizing and voter registration. It came after thousands had been jailed, beaten, killed and injured in the struggle to end segregation in our country. It was the most amazing moment of my young life as a teen-age civil rights activist.

Tonight I have seen a black man, an African American, be nominated for President of the United States. It is an amazing moment. It is numbing. I just think how far we have come in a generation. After 400 years of slavery, a hundred years of segregation and intimidation and forty years of struggle for a seat at the table in an America based on equality, Barack Obama is the nominee of the Democratic party and may be the next President of the United States.

Tears are welling up now in my eyes. It is so difficult to convey in words how powerful and wonderful tonight is not just for me but also for all of America no matter the misguided opinions of naysayers.

Climate Experts Spar Over Africa's Polluting Gases

South Africa and Nigeria are the worst greenhouse gas emitters in Africa, according to climate experts attending the U.N. conference on climate change this week in Accra, Ghana.

But agreement among the experts ends there. Western countries have been holding African nations to emission standards of the developed tions that include the selloff of African forests in a carbon trading scheme.

"The inclusion of forests in carbon markets enables developed countries to avoid real carbon emissions reductions at home," said Friends of the Earth, a green lobby group.

"Our emissions are infinitesimal compared to those in developed countries," noted Ewah Otu Eleri, head of the International Centre for Energy, Environment and Development.

More than 1600 participants, including government delegates from 160 countries and representatives from business and industry, environmental organizations research institutions are attending the one-week meeting of the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change.

Meanwhile, in Abuja,

African and other delegates are attending a three day conference on racism, racial discriminatino, xenophobia and related forms of intolerance.

A major global conference on racism and related issues takes place next April in Geneva to review the landmark 2001 conference held in Durban, South Africa. where a Declaration and Plan of Action were


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Teens Making Poor Choices When it Comes to Riding in Vehicles

Injury prevention experts have long known that teens are less likely than other motorists to wear seat belts while driving. Now, researchers from the Meharry-State Farm Alliance at Meharry Medical College have discovered lack of seat belt use by teen passengers may be an even bigger problem.

In the first ever direct comparison of the differences between driver and passenger seat belt use for a nationally representative teen population, the Meharry researchers found that 59% of teens always buckled up in the driver seat but only 42% always wore seat belts as passengers. Even more sobering, only 38% of all teens reported always buckling up as both drivers and passengers.

The study population comprised over 12,000 African American, white, and Hispanic public and private high school students ages 16 or older

who participated in the 2001 and 2003 National Youth Risk Behavior Surveys. The surveys are conducted every two years by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to track the leading causes of death and disability among U.S.

Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for U.S. teens, accounting for nearly 5,000 fatalities each year. About 40% of all teen motor vehicle occupant deaths involve passen-

"Because seat belts can reduce the risk of injury and death in crashes by more than 50%, there is a critical need for interventions to increase seat belt use by teens as both drivers and passengers," said Nathaniel Briggs, MD, MSc, lead researcher on the study, published in the September 2008 issue of the American Journal of Preventive Medicine.

To address the issue, Briggs and his colleagues recommend a combination of approaches.

Upgrade state seat belt laws to uniformly require that teen motor vehicle occupants in the rear seat be secured in seat belts. Currently, the majority of state laws are limited to front seat coverage for some or all teens in the 16-19 age group.

Upgrade state seat belt laws from "secondary" (law enforcement officers can ticket motorists for seat belt law violations only after stopping them for another offense) to "primary" (law enforcement officers can stop and ticket motorists solely for seat belt law violations).

Enhance enforcement efforts directed toward teen motorists.

Develop comprehensive, community-based interventions including education, peer-to-peer persuasion, and parental monitoring.

"This research reinforces why State Farm is actively involved in advocating for laws that help prevent injuries and deaths resulting from

motor vehicle crashes. It's clear from these findings that primary seat belt laws for all occupants would help us accomplish that goal," said Laurette Stiles, Vice-President - Strategic Resources at State Farm.

The African American Advisory Committee [AAAC] has reviewed three years of data with Garland Independent School District staff to help identify strategies to increase the achievement of African American students with GISD. The AAAC plans to seek additional partnerships enhance parental involvement throughout the district. This committee believes that to be effective and to eliminate the "Achievement Gap", the African American community must join together with the AAAC to increase communication and understanding of the culture of the African American families, thus leading to positive outcome for African American students.

The AAAC has worked with staff to identify ways to improve overall communications. By making various policies, documents, procedures, systems and regulations available online, the administrative staff helps parents access information that has and will continue to help parents work through situations pertaining to their children.

According to a new review of recent research published by the Southwest Educational Development Laboratory, students with involved parents, no matter what their income or background, are more likely to:

Earn higher grades and test scores, and enroll in higherlevel programs

Be promoted, pass their classes and earn credits

Attend school regularly

Have better social skills, show improved behavior and adapt well to school

Graduate and go on to postsecondary education

When parents talk to their children about school, expect them to do well, help them plan for college, and make sure that out-of-school activities are constructive; their children do better in school. When schools engage families in ways that are linked to improving learning, and support parent involvement at home and school, students make greater gains. When schools build partnerships with families that respond to their concerns, honor their contributions, and share power, they succeed in sustaining connections that are aimed at improving student achievement. And when fami-

lies and communities organize to hold poorly performing schools accountable, school districts made positive changes in policy, practice and resources.

The African American Advisory Committee has set goals to accomplish ensured parental success for the upcoming school year and for years to come. These goals include: 1) create initiatives such as community-based honor societies, parades, and rallies to motivate students to celebrate scholarship, include parents in motivational efforts to rekindle student's natural curiosity and enthusiasm for learning, 3) enlist the support of businesses and other community partners for both financial support and volunteer help, 4) maximize use of the media to publicize student accomplishments and 5) set up programs that honor student achievement year-round.



Toward a Dallas Arts Movement Enterprise

Why shouldn't Dallas spearhead a national arts consciousness movement? This is a city that waits for no one when it comes to being on the cutting edge of architectural development, urban growth and, yes, cultural diversity. What city is better prepared when it comes to the perfect combination of that diversity, size and talent than the second largest city in the Lone Star state? The arts are in need of a shot in the arm and the point of this brief essay is to explain why the formation of the Dallas Arts Movement Enterprise (DAME) could be the catalyst for a national re-appreciation of the arts, in general.

There is an excellent publication being circulated titled, "Dallas Arts Advocacy Day," and the information was presented by the Dallas Cultural Affairs Commission and the Dallas Area Cultural Advocacy Coalition. What is proposed here is geared toward the visionary and long-term: "commissions" are usually just that - commissioned. And despite the good work that they might do, they are usually beholden to a singular thrust or direction. Coalitions, by their very formation, are short-term and even with good intentions and accomplishments, the short-term is one reason why the arts are now vulnerable to and victims of budget cuts from the Federal government which, in turn, trickle down to local entities.

A "movement" is what is needed, one that not only raises consciousness but also includes a built- in strategy for struggle. Nathan Hare taught long ago that any successful movement has four components: an ideology, communications, organization, and resources. There is no doubt that the Dallas arts community ranks near the top in all of these. But there is another

prong that I believe a city this great must practice and promote if the arts are going to have a long-term life: tenacity.

The invoke the word "tenacious" in a discussion of the arts appears to be an oxymoron at first glance. It merely means, "stubbornly unyielding." We tend to take the arts for granted because those of us who are artists believe that like the gifts we have been given, the support of the arts will spring eternal. We could not be more wrong.

After all, the arts are about freedom of expression, creativity and, for the most part, peace of mind. But I am a believer that "conditions shape conduct and con-

sciousness," and when the economic conditions threaten the arts, they also threaten the future generations of artists and children, in particular.

This is not a "war" in the conventional sense of the word. But the arts are one of the few areas where "cultural universals" do seem to exist and transcend racial, ethnic and class lines. Since this does not hold true in many other spheres of social or cultural life, we should be wrapping our "movement" around preservation of this important reality. In a nation with the boldest multicultural experiment ever attempted has taken place, Dallas should be in the lead of a movement that works to preserve the future, protect the creative rights of artists, and pave the way for our children.

The movement proposed here is dubbed an enterprise because in this context, the word refers to, "a purposeful or industrious undertaking (especially one that requires effort or boldness)." Our purpose is to support the arts for the long-term and in such a way that young artists have far more opportunities and options than our generation ever did. So as the Dallas Arts Movement Enterprise, we need to view art as both economic and social development, not as only a cultural notion.

Arts, in this writer's view, must be a priority and precondition for every other sociopolitical and cultural endeavor. If we start with the churches and the schools – two major institutions of socialization – we will have a major jumpstart on the movement. When these two see the need to prioritize the arts in their respective realms (education and moral reformation), a third institutional arrangement – the media – will happily jump on board and promote what is taking place in much the same way it did when Dr. King and Malcolm X used the cameras and print media to deal with issues of social justice.

The "enterprise" aspect of the movement will inevitably kick in when the schools, churches and media become audaciously involved. The "purposeful undertaking" will be in full swing, and corporations and foundations will see, everywhere they look – billboards, TV commercials, church marquees, school bulletins, etc. – a new "arts movement" that will open eyes, minds and hopefully, Federal pocketbooks. Once funded, a plethora of reliable studies show that the arts are a growth industry, a boon to tourism and a sound investment.

These are only preliminary notes. Haki Madhubuti, in his definition of history, could also be speaking of the arts when he wrote that, [art] records the past, coordinates the present, and projects the future." Surely, there are enough talented artists all over the metro who can layer onto this what is needed to make the arts a priority for every individual, family, neighborhood, and community that makes Dallas the cultural icon, the diamond of diversity, and the artistic Eden that it is.



dent. African-Americans must have both; after all, we are at the bottom of most, if not all, health and economic categories. If we use our dollars to facilitate a healthier lifestyle, we will rise in those categories that have us dying faster than other groups, being predisposed to certain diseases, and being subjected to neighborhood shysters and profiteers who sell us everything except what our bodies really need to be healthy.

to determine the damages of Hurricane Gustav. McCain was set to make his acceptance speech on Thursday.

Although the damage and affects of the hurricane were unpredictable at that time, Republican spokesman Sean Conner said McCain called for sensitivity over politics.

"We are being sensitive to states that are being evacuated. And this is not the time for politics. This is a time for us to be in service to our country and in service to people who have been affected," Conner said.

Conner said an "Affected States Working Group" was formed at the convention to brief delegates from the main four affected states – Louisiana, Texas, Mississippi, and Alabama - on updates. He

also said a jet was chartered to take those delegates home who are concerned about their own personal affairs or the affairs of the affected states.

First Lady Laura Bush and prospective First Lady Cindy McCain spoke Monday night on hurricane-related issues.

McCain's response to Hurricane Gustav contrasts him with the Bush Administration, which was strongly criticized three years ago for its slow response to victims of Hurricane Katrina.

In remarks released on Monday, President Bush said, "The coordination on this storm is a lot better than...during Katrina. A lot of it had to do with the governors. Yesterday I was on the video conference with the Governors of Alabama. Louisiana.

Mississippi, and Texas. There was clearly a spirit of sharing assets, of listening to somebody's problems and saying, how can we best address them? The federal government is very much involved in helping the states. Our job is to assist."

The scaled back convention is also a stark contrast to the high-profile celebration held by the Democrats in Denver last week as they nominated Sen. Barack Obama for president.

The day after Obama's acceptance speech at Invesco Field, McCain held a press conference introducing Alaska Gov. Sarah Palin as his vice presidential pick, seen as a move that could help McCain win over women who would have supported Sen. Hillary Clinton. Palin was set to speak to the con-

vention on Wednesday.

A first-term governor of two years, Palin is also a former mayor and at 44 is the youngest person ever elected governor of Alaska. She is the first female vice presidential nominee since the unsuccessful campaign of Democrat Geraldine Ferraro In 1984 as the running mate of Walter Mondale.

McCain and Obama are still running neck-in-neck in the polls, with Obama slightly ahead. Conner said politics notwithstanding, the Republicans would act on the side of discretion this week.

"I don't know what kind of affect it will have on the campaign, but that's not our priority at the moment," Conner said. "It's about making sure we're taking care of the affected folks."

Ask Pastor A

Q: I read the Word, but I don't remember what I've read. How can I retain His Word?"

(Read: Psalms 119:11 and Matthew 13:18-19)

Answer: First, may I tell you that you have an issue that is common among both the "Secular" and the "Saved." (smile) We are all getting wiser and weaker.

Write the scripture(s) on a post card and put in places we frequent during the day. (Examples: the bathroom mirror, the car dash board, our desk at work, the refrigerator door (smile), etc.)

Repeat the scripture during the day as you remember to. If you are creative, find a tune and put the scripture to music. After getting the concept, apply the scripture to an area of your life.

Work Commuting Alternatives Save Region 1 Million Miles

Drivers in the Dallas-Fort Worth area fight heavy traffic every day on the way to work and important appointments. With thousands of vehicles on the roads at the same time, traffic congestion is the inevitable result.

Many drivers have become part of the congestion solution by sharing rides with coworkers or employees of nearby companies. Some are even staying off the roads entirely by telecommuting.

Since October 2006, commuters have been able to track their savings at www.tryparkingit.com, a regional alternative-commute Web site. Its popularity has grown with the escalation of gas prices. In fact, in early August, users of the site surpassed 1 million saved miles since the site launched in 2006.

And the financial reward is significant. Since logging the first alternative commute on the site, motorists have saved an estimated 50,000 gallons of gas and more than \$2 million. With their contributions quantified through calories burned, emissions reduced

and money saved, participants are able to clearly see how they are helping improve quality of life.

The benefits stretch beyond the pocketbook and environment. Residents who ride their bicycles to work or walk to lunch may also record the number of calories burned. And eating lunch at the office instead of going out also qualifies as an alternative because it eliminates the need for mid-day car trips.

In addition to commuting-related savings, users are making lasting contributions to the region's air quality, helpful as the region works toward compliance with federal ozone requirements. The Dallas-Fort Worth area is in the midst of the peak ozone season, which ends Oct. 31. But the emphasis on alternatives to driving alone does not end when the calendar turns to November. Sharing trips and embracing other alternatives to driving alone are encouraged throughout the year.

Tryparkingit.com has proved individual choices are significant in a region with more than 6 million people. As the population continues to grow, the deci-

sions people make will more dramatically influence how easily they move throughout the region and the quality of the air they breathe.

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



and crying supporters at Invesco Field at Mile High in Denver.

He immediately recalled his 2004 speech to the Democratic Convention as a then candidate for the U. S. Senate.

"Four years ago, I stood before you and told you my story - of the brief union between a young man from Kenya and a young woman from Kansas - who weren't well-off or well-known, but shared a belief that in America, their son could achieve whatever he put his mind to," he said. "It is that promise that has always set this country apart - that through hard work and sacrifice, each of us can pursue our individual dreams, but still come together as one American family, to ensure that the next generation can pursue their dreams as well."

But, Obama did not allow symbolism to overshadow substance. He went straight for the political juggler, tying his opponent Republican John McCain to the beleaguered administration of President George Bush and ticking off a long list of public policy issues that he would tackle as president.

"The truth is, on issue after issue that would make a difference in your lives – on health care and education and the economy – Senator McCain has been anything but independent."

He promised to invest in early childhood education; "recruit an army" of new teachers, "pay them higher salaries and give them more support." He also promised affordable college education, accessible health care for every American and increased paid sick days.

On the economy, he distanced himself from Bush Administration policies, saying he would "stop giving tax breaks to corporations that ship jobs overseas, and I will start giving them to companies that create good jobs right here in America."

He also promised to "eliminate capital gains taxes for the small businesses and the start-ups that will create the high-wage, high-tech jobs of tomorrow."

And after a momentary pause, "I will cut taxes – cut taxes – for 95 percent of all working families. Because in an economy like this, the last thing we should do is raise taxes on the middle-class."


On the war in Iraq, he questioned John McCain's judgement, noting that even after learning that Iraq has a \$79 billion surplus "while we're wallowing in deficits, John McCain stands alone in his stubborn refusal to end a misguided war."


Obama's aim to now win Pennsylvania and every other state possible is not only tied into American politics, but history.


