Chris Brown Faces Two Felony Charges

(AP) Chris Brown has been charged with two felonies stemming from an argument with his girlfriend, Rihanna, court documents show.

Brown is expected to be arraigned Thursday afternoon on charges of assault likely to cause great bodily injury and

making criminal threats. The 19-year-old R&B singer remains free on US\$50,000 bail.

The felony complaint handed down in court Thursday morning identifies Brown's alleged victim only as "Robyn F." Rihanna's real name is Robyn Rihanna Fenty.



If convicted, the possible sentence ranges anywhere from probation to four years and eight months in state prison, said district attorney's spokeswoman Sandi Gibbons.

Los Angeles police arrested Brown Feb. 8 and booked him on suspicion of making criminal threats. Police said at the

Born in St. Louis, she was raised in Stamps, Arkansas,

and then went to San Francisco. She lives in Harlem, NY, and Winston-Salem, NC. Over 1,000 Farms Transferred to the Poor

More than 1,000 farms totalling some six million hectares have been transferred to previously disadvantaged Namibians since an agricultural land reform act was passed in 1995.

"What we want to see on these farms is production and not just occupation." said Leonard Shipumbu, CEO of AgriBank, which is providing loans to the new

landowners with funding from the European Union.

Resettled farmers who farm full-time will have a grace period of three years before they have to start repaying the loan, while part-time resettled farmers

start paying after 12 months.

Still, more 236,000 land parcels remain to be redistributed in seven of the country's 13 regions, at a cost of around \$7.9 million.

With Court Short of Funds, Charles Taylor May Go Free

The global financial crisis has caught up with the U.N.backed Special Court for Sierra Leone, which has been prosecuting warlords from the region including former Liberian President Charles Taylor.

The U.N.-backed Court, pursuing those held most responsible for atrocities during the country's 1991-2002 civil war, faces a budget shortfall of more than \$5 million from May, officials said.

"With the economic crisis continuing, to get funds is not

easy ... If we run out, it is now possible the judges will have to release him. That's our real anxiety," Chief Prosecutor Stephen Rapp told Reuters in a phone interview last week.

Taylor is being tried on 11 counts of crimes against humanity and other charges including rape, enslavement and conscripting child soldiers younger than 15. He has denied the charges.

Among the Special Court's accomplishments is making the recruitment of child soldiers, forced marriage and acts of terrorism against civilians a crime under international humanitarian law.

When to Have That Joint Replacement?


Some minority groups wait too long for surgery, study finds

Hispanic and African-American patients tend to have poorer joint function before undergoing hip or knee replacement surgery, according to a new study presented today at the 2009 Annual Meeting of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons (AAOS).

In addition, female patients have less preoperative joint function than male patients across ethnic groups.

"Studies have shown that the timing of joint replacement surgery is an important determinant of outcome," says James Slover, M.D., M.S., an orthopaedic surgeon at York University Hospital for Joint Diseases. "This means that patients with worse joint function before surgery do not do as well after the surgery."

Researchers reviewed the pre-surgical joint function of more than 3,500 hip and knee replacement patients based on physical exams and questionnaires. This information comprises the functional components of the Harris Hip Score and the Knee Society Score, which were used to quantify the functional ability of all the patients. They found:



In particular, Hispanic men had worse function prior to knee and hip replacement than both African-American Caucasian men.

• Hispanic and African-American women had significantly worse function prior to hip replacement than Caucasian women.

• Women demonstrated lower preoperative hip and knee function when compared with men of the same ethnicity.

The reasons for these disparities, Dr. Slover says, are unclear.

"As a next step, we need to try and understand why certain groups tend to wait longer before having surgery," he says. "Do they have less access to the necessary care? Is it an insurance issue? Is there something in their culture or mindset that makes them





wait longer before pursuing treatment?

We need to know why this occurs, because if it is an issue of outreach and education, orthopaedic surgeons can help address the problem and help patients get the appropriate care and treatment."

Joint replacement, also known as arthroplasty, is considered by many to be one of the most successful medical innovations of the 20th century. Total joint replacement is a surgical procedure in which the patient's natural joint is replaced with an artificial one, made of a combination of plastic, metal, and/or ceramic.

The most common reasons for this surgery are pain and stiffness that limit normal activities such as walking and bending and that cannot be satisfactorily treated with medications other therapies. or Therefore, joint replacement surgery often provides a significantly improved quality of life to patients who would otherwise have to live with severe pain.

After

More than 400,000 primary total hip and knee replacements are performed each year in the United States, and that number is on the rise -particularly as the Baby Boomer population continues to age. Because of this trend, it is important to optimize patient outcomes.

Confetti Yellow Rice with Black Beans and Broccoli

(recipe follows) Olive Oil ½ cup each chopped red and yellow onion ½ cup each chopped red, green, yellow, and orange bell pepper ½ cup Vege chicken broken into pieces ½ cup Vege Sausage broken into pieces ½ cup Vege ham broken into pieces 1 cup chopped broccoli 1 can black beans, rinsed and drained McKay's NO MSG Chicken Style seasoning

Garlic powder

Cooked yellow rice

Stir-fry red and yellow onion, red, green, yellow, orange bell pepper, vege sausage, ham and, chicken. Add 1 can black beans, rinsed and drained, and 1 cup chopped raw broccoli. Legislators Focus on Texans with Disabilities and the State's Foreclosure Rates

During last week's Legislative Session in Austin, both the House and the Senate were hard at work holding various committee meetings and hearing public testimony on many issues. Among them was much discussion about Texans with disabilities

and the state's housing foreclosure rate.

On Tuesday, February 24, the Senate's Health and Human Service Committee heard testimony on Senate Bill (SB) 643. A bill filed by the committee's chair, Senator Jane Nelson, about improving treatment and security for disabled patients in state special

care facilities.

Reports indicate Texas provides care for an estimated 22,000 people with disabilities, and 4,900 of those Texans are in state schools. A study by the U.S. Department of Justice found that in the year 2007, Texas' state schools had a low level of care, and 450 cases of abuse were report-

ed with 53 deaths.

SB 643 would protect patients by requiring more training for institution employees and random drug tests. The bill would also entail yearly audits, reviews of all deaths, and subject all employees to FBI fingerprint and background checks. Additionally, it would cre-

ate a position for a liaison between residents, family members, and the facility.

Nelson said, "The abuse and neglect that has occurred in our state schools is inexcusable. These are people with serious disabilities; they need our protection, they need our oversight and they need our compassion."

Alternatively, on Monday, February 23, Senator Rodney Ellis filed SB 1060 in conjunction with Representative Patrick Rose's House Bill (HB) 1589. SB 1060 and HB 1589 suggests that Texas improve the quality of state schools for dis



High Schoolers Talk Technology in Engineering School Tour

High school students visiting UT Dallas for Introduce a Girl to Engineering Day got a lab tour, an introduction to some of the technology behind high-tech toys and a thumbnail sketch of the path that brought one faculty member to her current position as an assistant professor of electrical engineering.

Students from Irma Rangel Young Women's Leadership School in Dallas visited the Erik Jonsson School of Engineering and Computer Science at UT Dallas as part of National Engineers Week.

During their tour of Dr. Rashaunda Henderson's lab, they got a chance to operate two remote-control helicopters while Henderson explained the difference between one helicopter's infrared system and the other one's radiofrequency system. She urged the students to identify the area of study that they enjoyed the most and then dedicate themselves to mastering it. For her that was electrical engineering, and it took her first to Tuskegee

University in Alabama and then to the University of Michigan, Motorola Inc., Freescale Semiconductor and UT Dallas.

An expert on radio-frequency integrated circuits like the ones in cellphones, Dr. Henderson is pursuing research regarding the design and fabrication of microwave circuits and components for wireless applications.

During their visit, the Irma Rangel students also saw several other parts of campus, including the Arts & Technology (ATEC) Motion Capture Lab. where Dr. Midori Kitagawa showed the group how animators capture human movement.

Animators, and particularly video game developers, rely on motion capture research because it can produce highly accurate and realistic movement results in a short amount of time. The girls also saw some animations produced in the ATEC program.

The girls also heard remarks from both UT Dallas President David Daniel and the University's vice president for diversity and community engagement, Dr. Magaly Spector.

"Our first Introduce a Girl to Engineering Day was a tremendous success," Dr. Spector said. "This community outreach program provided us a great opportunity to bring together female engineering students and faculty from UT Dallas and professionals from the Texas Instruments Women's Initiative to encourage young women to consider careers in science, technology, engineering and mathematics.'

The University's first Introduce a Girl to Engineering Day was a joint project of the Galerstein Women's Center, the Erik Jonsson School of Engineering and Computer Science, the Arts & Technology Program of the School of Arts & Humanities and the Office Diversity Community Engagement, with the support of numerous student groups.

Canada is one of six-British teen Commonwealth realms, all of which share the British monarch as their royal leader. The monarch appoints the Governor General on the advice of Canadian Prime the Minister, who is the Canadian Head of

Government, after which the Governor General maintains direct contact with the British monarch. There is no specific term.

The Prime Minister of Canada is the primary dence of the House of Minister of the Crown, chairman of the Cabinet, and thus head of government of Canada . The office is not outlined in any of the documents that constitute the written portion of the constitution of Canada and executive authority is formally vested in the Canadian sovereign and exercised on his or her behalf by the Governor General.



Dear EarthTalk: What is the "green cities" movement?

-- John Moulton, Greenwich, CT

Best described as a loose association of cities focused on sustainability, the emerging "green cities movement" encompasses thousands of urban areas around the world all striving to lessen their environmental impacts by reducing waste, expanding recycling, lowering emissions, increasing housing density while expanding open space, and encouraging the development of sustainable local businesses.

Perhaps the archetypal green city is Curitiba, Brazil. When architect and urban planner Jamie Lerner became mayor in 1972, he quickly closed six blocks of the city's central business district to cars, delighting residents and business owners alike. Today the pedestrian-free zone is three times larger and serves as the heart of the bustling metropolis. Lerner also put in place a high-tech bus system, greatly reducing traffic, energy usage and pollution; the move also encouraged density around transit hubs and thus preserved open space in other areas that would have likely turned into suburbia. Today the bus system still goes strong, and three-quarters of the city's 2.2 million residents rely on it every day.

Affordable housing organization taking the lead in building homes, restructuring lives

It may be one of the greatest turn-a-rounds of an inner city community in the country. House by house, block by block, West Dallas is changing, distinctly for the better.

A lot of determination and grit by several community and housing organizations and churches have served as the catalyst for the neighborhood's illuminating revitalization. Builders of Hope (BOH) is included among those

"It's all going uphill. We've been in the valley; now we're going to the mountaintop," said Patrick Crawford, a new homebuyer and West Dallas resident.

Bordered by Interstate 30 on the south, Loop 12/Walton Walker Road on the west, Interstate 35 on the east and the Trinity River on the north, West Dallas was once slated as one of the country's poorest and most blighted neighborhoods in the nation. Jobs were scarce and crime was high. Several lead smelter plants located in the area once polluted the air and poisoned many who lived near

West Dallas was once one of the heavily African American and Hispanic sectors of the city suffering from discrimination and racially-based negative perceptions that kept development out for several decades.

Over the past decade, modern-day and attractive housing units, both public and private, both singleand multi-family, have replaced barrack-like projects complexes, once eyesores to the community's look and feel.

"At the present time,

the big improvement is the homes themselves, knowing that economic development would come," said Rev. Arrvel Wilson, pastor of West Dallas Community Church. A staple in the West Dallas Community. Wilson's church also runs West Dallas Community Development Inc. and the West Dallas Community School. "I also see the hope of new jobs coming as you bring in new businesses."

Wilson further credits Builders of Hope Community Development Corporation in 1998. Henry and the board of directors changed the name to Builders of Hope CDC in 2002. Starting with building a couple of homes, the organization has boomed to their current major project, a 72-unit single family subdivision in West Dallas' Eagle Ford community.

Now, the next step: bringing in homebuyers. But it's the kind of new home owners BOH is targeting: many of the same West Dallas and other low-

Community Development mortgage lender and a credit management specialist who helps the prospect set a budget.

"A person can say they want to buy a home but may have never thought it out completely. This gives them a comprehensive education process. Even if they may not qualify at that time, they're a better person for it."

The quality of the home is also important, something BOH has taken very seriously. Comparing with other companies, Mardenborough said:

talking about solid brick."

Patrick and Antoinette Crawford share those sentiments. They were both raised in West Dallas, but had moved out of the neighborhood.

"We did everything on this side (of town)," Antoinette said. "We were always coming back out here. Our church is out here so it only made sense for us to be here and do everything in the community."

They went to Builders of Hope, with whom Patrick was already familhaving formerly worked with the organization in their youth programs. Despite not qualifying in their first application, the Crawfords persist-

Finally, they were approved and began a rigorous but successful threemonth process. Last month, they, along with daughters Xyondria, 2 and Daja, 7 months, moved into their \$125,000 three-bedroom, two-bath home in Eagle Ford, complete with a one-car garage and spacious backyard. Their total loan package included grants that covered their down payment and closing costs. They have returned to their home community, more excited than ever to strive and make West Dallas a better place to live and work, in their own

"When someone purchases a home, there's a responsibility that comes with it," Mardenborough explained. "So, yes, they want to perform better at their jobs, make sure they do all the necessary things to keep their homes. They become better citizens and

home you're building communities and relationships with other individuals. They tend to look out for each other, wanting to help each other out. It's a rippling effect."

The Eagle Ford community is in West Dallas' southwest corner, near where I-30 and Loop 12 intersects. Pinnacle Park, a 900-acre major retail and business district, along with Pinnacle Pointe, across the highway, are all short distances from the community.

community's The newest jewel – a brand new Mattie Nash/ Myrtle Davis Recreation Center - is highly anticipated. The 21,000 square foot facility will feature a NCAA regulation basketball court, weight room, multipurpose room and computer lab. Construction is scheduled to begin this month to be completed in one year.

All such amenities are working together, complementing BOH's initiatives to not just build homes, but quality lives.

"The affordable market is still the best market to be in," said Mardenborough. "Because, if you properly educate the buyers and how to keep their homes, what they need to do with the and follow upkeeps throughs, they'll commit to

"They'll say now I have a home; I don't have to rent and pay someone else's mortgage. When I close the door, I know it's mine, I can live there as long as I want."

Corporation, who got in the fight from the beginning. Its founder, Norman Henry, started making changes through Voices of Hope Ministries in 1982, helping youths and their families with resources and life skills to fight and overcome the community's ills from poverty.

"His passion and drive came from helping kids," Willard Mardenborough, BOH's Sales Community Manager. "There was a lack of homes and the ones there wasn't sufficient or in good condition."

That's when Voices of Hope Ministries transformed into Voice of Hope to moderate-income residents who still believe there's such a thing as quality inner city. They include the single parent and bluecollar worker, often a renter all of their life.

BOH's goal: transform them into homeowners.

"It's not all about selling a home, it's about someone building a community relationship, someone working with one goal of helping someone else," said Mardenborough

A free BOH First-time Homebuyers seminar covers every inch of ground of what it takes to be a homeowner. Several skilled professionals are brought in, such as a tax specialist,

"Usually they build affordable homes, but the quality is lacking."

High-energy efficient homes, with solar boards and solar decking in place, are some of the extra steps taken by BOH, according to Mardenborough. Their homes also use more lumber per inch than other builders with higher grades of windows, insulation and air conditioning standards.

"The thing is to see someone who thought they could never get a quality home and to see their faces when they sign over the documents and they get the keys to their home," Mardenborough said. "And it's not a tacky home, we're



Study Shows Disconnect between African American Attitudes and Actions When It Comes to Personal Financial Planning

TAVIS SMILEY AND NATIONWIDE INSURANCE RELEASE NEW SURVEY RESULTS

African Americans are more optimistic about their financial future over the next year than the general population, but the majority of those responding acknowledge they don't have a financial game plan and many don't know where to start. A new survey of 1,200 participants commissioned by The Smiley Group and Nationwide Insurance shows 58 percent of African Americans expect their household situation to be better a year from now, compared to only 30 percent of the general population sharing similar optimism.

While African Americans say they think their financial situation will improve in the next year, most of those surveyed indicated they are not taking deliberate actions to better their financial circumstances:

- Less than half say they are proactive about their financial future
- in 4 say they do not have a written financial plan
- 1 in 3 say they do not know where to start when it comes to personal financial planning

African Americans are more confident than their general population peers in their ability to make savings and investment decisions (52 percent vs. 43 percent), but are also more likely to indicate they are struggling with credit card debt (38 percent vs. 32 percent).

On saving for college, nearly half of all survey participants with children under 21 said they are very or extremely worried about being able to afford a college education for their children, while only about one in 20 of all survey participants say they actually have a college savings plan. Only 3 percent say saving for education is the most important goal.

"It's one thing to be positive, but it's another to be practical, proactive and prepared to weather this difficult economic climate," said Tavis Smiley. "This survey reveals the critical need for an honest assessment of our financial status so that we can be sure that we are taking the steps necessary to safeguard the future for ourselves, our families and the next generation."

The study also reports that nearly nine out of 10 African Americans acknowledge they do not have a professional financial advisor, because they don't think they need one or think they can't afford one.

Old Gold — To Save or to Sell?

(Family Features)

If you're thinking about selling old or broken jewelry, there are some things you should know.

Gold is usually purchased in grams, though some buyers may use "pennyweight" instead. A reputable company will price items separately so that price per gram can be easily checked. Make sure that the items are truly gold and sil-

ver with a magnet. If a piece reacts to the magnet, it contains an iron alloy, which means it is plated, not solid.

Look for a mark. Most gold is marked 10k, 14k, 18k, 417, 585 or 750, and sterling silver pieces are marked .925 or Sterling. Marks can be very tiny, so use a magnifying glass or jeweler's loupe.

According to the Better Business Bureau, consumers should only sell gold or silver in the presence of the buyer.

Of those who aren't actively avoiding the topic, African Americans reported that they are talking to their children about financial matters. Three out of four parents with children under 21 say they have discussed saving money with their children, and threefifths have done so within the past month. One out of four have discussed saving money in the past six months. However, of those participants with children in school, eight out of 10 acknowledge they have not researched if their school teaches about saving money.

"Exposing our children and young adults to basic information about finances and personal financial planning will have a profound effect on how the next generation spends, saves and invests," said Barnhardt "The current economic environment will leave a permanent impression on 17- to 25year-olds. The Great Depression created a generation of risk-averse spendthrifts. The 80s and 90s created a generation of hungry consumers with a high tolerance for risk. The deep downturn we're now in will likely influence not only financial habits, but also the shape of public policy and the types of financial products the market offers."

"We've got to be a part of the national dialogue about how to get beyond this economic crisis," adds Smiley. "The more we are all empowered with information, tools and resources, the more we all can contribute to making America as good as its promise."

their own communities.

Just about any problem anywhere has been solved by someone somewhere. The challenge is to identify these solutions, incorporate them into national policies, and help states and local communities put proven solutions into practice.

As a former state sena-President Obama knows he can find solutions in surprising places -for instance:

- IN EDUCATION --Urban schools have dropout rates of up to 50 percent and college-bound rates of only 10 percent. Yet, Deborah Meier founded Central Park East, a public high school in Harlem where 90 percent of students graduate, and 90 percent of graduates attend college.
- IN CRIME -- Two million people in prison costs about \$50 billion a year, plus the cost of building prisons and wasted lives. Despite the expense, over 70 percent of released inmates commit crimes again and return to jail. But at Delancey Street rehabilitation center in San Francisco, criminals and drug addicts turn their lives around and become productive citizens. There's no cost to taxpayers since the center is financed by businesses run as training programs by the residents.
- IN HEALTH AND SCIENCE -- About one million people have autism and severe problems with language and social interaction. Yet, The Son-Rise Program in Sheffield, Massachusetts has helped hundreds of families enable children and adults with autism to improve in all areas of learning and communication, sometimes experiencing dramatic improvement.

Solutions like these are all over the country. But currently there is no systematic way to identify and build on best practices in social sector.

Successful business innovations are often adopted by other companies, but that's rarer for social innovations

A White House Office for Solutions would be a clearinghouse for projects that are already working in fields such as education, prison reform, environment, and energy. It would provide a vital link between the creativity of the American people and the government.

The White House Office for Solutions would launch a nationwide treasure hunt inviting citizens to find the best of what's working in their area. For example, educators can report on the best schools. People in community safety groups can report on the best ways to reduce crime.

Citizens become Solution Scouts, discovering breakthrough solutions and reporting them to the White House Office for Solutions. The Office would vet the recommended programs, sending the best to the appropriate federal agency.

Solutions would be made available to the public and elected officials nationwide through a website and regional conferences. For example, successful models of education would become available to governors, mayors, teachers and parents. In this way, a breakthrough anywhere can become a breakthrough everywhere.


By building on what works, we can dramatically improve the quality of life for millions of people and for billions of dollars less than we currently spend.

Just imagine: If even 10 percent of current prisoners were enrolled in a Street-styled Delancey rehabilitation center, we could help 200,000 people leave a life of crime and drugs and become productive members of society. And for \$5 billion dollars less than we would have spent annually. Likewise, if just 10 percent of people with autism had access to programs like The Son-Rise Program, we could help about 170,000 people and their families nationwide experience dramatically better results for less than half of the current treatment cost.



Take Time to Celebrate Texas History in March

AUSTIN - In Texas, we're surrounded by our history. From businesses that feature images of the Alamo to streets named after Texas heroes, history is a part of our daily lives. It is easy to take it for granted.

For instance, I live in a city called Austin. I work in the Stephen F. Austin building. As Land Commissioner, I preside over the Texas General Land Office Archives. which contain historic documents from Stephen F. Austin himself. His Registro is here, the ledger where he recorded the land grant information for his historic colony. His signature, in English and Spanish, graces countless documents hidden away in the 35 million pieces of paper that make up our collection.

Yet, I rarely pause to remember the influence of this man. That is unfortunate. For so much of what we have today, so many things we enjoy, are due to those that came before us.

Consider the battle that won Texas its independence, San Jacinto. In eighteen minutes, a small ragtag army soundly defeated a well-trained, well-equipped army and later captured its commander-in-chief. That victory on 21 April, 1836 led to the creation of the Republic of Texas. After ten years, the Republic of Texas gave way to the State of Texas, which in part prompted the Mexican War. U.S. victory in the Mexican War brought the southwest into the American fold, opening the western frontier and achieving Manifest Destiny.

Because of 18 minutes in 1836, the United States of America was launched as a world power, making San Jacinto one of the most important battles in world history.

Examples abound. Because of the oil boom ushered in by Spindletop in 1901, Texas helped inaugurate the mass exploration and production of oil. Apart from vastly increasing the wealth of Texas, this gave birth to the modern petrochemical industry and thus changed the

Even the future is affected by the past. Texas is now the largest generator of wind energy in the nation. We also lead the nation in the promotion and exploration of offshore wind energy in the Gulf of Mexico. Know who is responsible? Sam Houston. Thanks to Sam Houston. when Texas entered the Union in 1846 we maintained sovereign rights to all submerged lands 10 miles into the Gulf. This decision has earned Texas more than \$6 billion dollars that would have otherwise gone into federal coffers from offshore oil and gas. Lesser coastal states do not have the same provision. So more than 160 years ago, Sam Houston ensured Texas would be the leader for offshore wind energy. It is fitting the first major Gulf wind farm will be built just offshore from the city that bears his

Therefore, if you wonder why we celebrate Texas Independence Day, why there is still a Texas History Month, I hope you will remember that Texas is a special place and it is made so because of our history.

Thanks to Texans like Austin, Houston, Juan Seguin and others we can see a bright future, for we stand on the shoulders of giants.



abled people by developing a ten year plan to increase treatment choices; ideally, the plan should be drafted by the year 2010. These bills propose the plan created include ways to reduce wait time for community-based facilities and treatment, provide more funding for community facilities, and consolidate and close some state facilities.

Ellis commented, "It is about providing current residents and family members of current residents with a choice, and giving them every tool possible to be comfortable with that choice."

The Senate Education Committee also heard testimony about the education of students with disabilities. Senator Eddie Lucio, Jr.'s bill, SB 100, would provide teachers with better training on how to teach students with autism and other disabilities. If passed, the training would be voluntary, and teachers would be rewarded with a stipend.

"Federal regulations require that students with disabilities be taught in the least restrictive environment," Lucio said. "However, many general education teachers do not have the necessary training to provide appropriate instruction to students with disabilities."

State disabled care was designated as an "emergency

issue" by Governor Rick Perry earlier in the Legislative Session, making it eligible for immediate action. As of Friday, February 27, SB 643 and SB 100 are being reviewed in committee, and SB 1060 and HB 1589 have yet to be read or scheduled for any action or committee reviews.

Also in the Senate, on Wednesday, February 25, the Senate Intergovernmental Relations Committee began looking at the housing market in Texas.

Dr. Jim Gaines, an economist at Texas A&M's Real Estate Center, testified before the committee, "Relatively speaking, Texas has been

doing very, very well, compared to many of the other big states, and particularly to the national level."

He reported Texas foreclosures have decreased since 2007, and the state is currently ranked 24th among all states in foreclosures. Gaines said that the decrease is due to less over inflation than in

most states and that lenders are staying away from risky and interest only loans.


Gaines also told the committee he believes foreclosure rates should continue to decrease, and to ensure that decrease, the Legislature should work to keep Texas' overall economy strong and wait for the national housing crisis to stabilize.




