U.S. losing its educational advantage

America's schools are in crisis and the United States is losing or perhaps has lost its educational advantage. This is the message ingrained in the headline stories of financially desperate school districts closing schools and laying off teachers, of an Administration grappling with revising the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), currently known as the punitive No Child Left Behind Act, and the statistics reported by the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD).

Andreas Schleicher, Head of the OECD Education Directorate's Indicators and Analysis Division testified on March 9 at the Senate Education Committee Hearing. His comprehensive report provides insight on three significant areas that should be given high priority consideration by Ameri-

Consumer alert: Parents should keep children away from new video chat Website Chatroulette.com

An increasingly popular Web site poses a threat to Texas children by giving users – including dangerous sex offenders - an opportunity to conduct live video chats with randomly selected

participants.

Armed with only a Web camera and Internet access, www.chatroulette.com users are paired with a random stranger for a video chat. Neither a login nor registration is required before young users can be face-to-face

with a total stranger. Worse, users who simply click "next" are shuffled to a new video chat partner.

An undercover investigation by the Cyber Crimes Unit revealed startling results. Nearly half of the randomly selected users encountered by Cyber Crimes investigators immediately exposed themselves and conducted sexually explicit acts on camera.

In light of the serious threat that children will be

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Celebrate March! Look forward for healthy families

In March we look forward – eagerly anticipating the arrival of spring; and we look to the past – celebrating National Women's History Month. Looking back, we might ask what our pioneer activists in women's rights would say about tough choices working women still make to keep their families afloat. Looking forward, we can celebrate Women's History Month by taking action to pass the Healthy Families Act.

One inspiration for action is the story of a young mother named Tahirah who lives in Denver, CO. At 26, Tahirah found a dream job: crew leader in an airport restaurant. The wages were low and the hours long. Still, the job offered a chance to supervise and a clear path to the management track.

But there were two wrinkles: her preschoolage daughter has asthma and this job did not provide any paid sick days.

Tahirah managed to keep her job and home from falling apart – for a while. But there were times when her daughter was sick and her manager would not allow her to leave work. There were also times when Tahirah left her daughter home sick because she simply couldn't risk being fired.

One day her daughter was rushed to the hospital. A friend called to tell Tahirah to meet them there. But her manager didn't give her the message for hours. Eventually she was forced to leave that job. She's found others, but still none that offer the paid sick days she needs.

Everyone gets sick. Everyone deserves time to get better. The United States is the only developed nation in the world where no law provides this basic labor standard. Nearly 40 percent of private sector workers in this country have no paid sick days.

According to the Institute

for Women's Policy Research, this number includes 78 percent of hotel workers and 85 percent of food service workers. It's clear who suffers: struggling families, low-income working women, their children. However everyone in the community is affected.

As consumers we eat in restaurants where most servers face a choice between coming to work sick or losing income and possibly a job. As family members, many of us have parents or grandparents living in nursing homes where staff members face this same impossible choice.

Providing access to paid sick days will help struggling state budgets. Researchers in New Hampshire for example, found that workers with paid sick days are 14 percent more likely to visit a medical practitioner, which could translate into fewer severe illnesses and hospitalizations. They conclude that guaranteed paid sick days

would lower medical costs by reducing emergency room and hospital use.

The solution for families, workplaces and public health is for Congress to pass the Healthy Families Act. This legislation would allow full-time workers to earn seven paid sick days each year to care for themselves or a family member. It would offer low-wage women in particular, the means to safeguard both their health and their jobs in these difficult economic

A national labor standard of paid sick days is a fitting way to honor women -- past, present and future -- by honoring their dual responsibilities: work and family.

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Tea Party, Coffee Party: Why not a Black Party?

Now we have the Coffee Party which I suppose is a liberal counterpart to the Tea Party that emerged in the Washington, DC area by folks led by Annabel Park a documentary film maker who was horrified by the ugly, menacing and antigovernment spirit of the Tea Party crowd that emerged to disrupt the flow of civil discussion about important is-

I've been asking, where are the folks who voted for Barack Obama, believing in Hope and Change and pinning for a new post-Bush, post-Conservative America.

Well, many of the ground troops of the Obama movement that were responsible for its grass roots organizing were young adults who went back to school, back to their professional desks or somewhere

back to their normal pursuits, but away from politics. In their de-mobilization, they left the field open to the crazies who have mounted a movement not designed to be a force for change, but for the status quo and even for retrogression, wanting to "take back America" from a future

Organizing for Change, the organization created as the repository of the Obama campaign, has largely been ineffective in my evaluation and David Plouffe, its head and Obama's campaign manager, has recently gone into the White House.

So, what is developing is a discussion at the level of communities across the country about the role of government and the Tea Party and now the Coffee Party are instruments of civic organizing in this

process. The Republican party seems to be attempting to grab hold of the Tea Party movement and turn it into an election day force against Democrats vulnerable to elections in this cycle, At this point, the Coffee party has not come that far and the Democratic party has not made its move.

Where does this put Blacks? There is a healthy discussion going on in the black community about the role of President Obama and his responsibility, or the lack of it, to the Black community but with the exception of Tavis Smiley for all the folks who believe that they have to make him accountable to a black agenda, they have not yet put a mechanism on the ground to do it.

There has been a long discussion about the efficacy of a Black political

party and many years ago, I joined Ron Daniels and others in an attempt to create one. The irony of that experiment was while half of the people attracted to the idea wanted it to serve as a power-base for elections, others wanted to only exist as a grass roots organizing tool. It eventually split apart along those lines.

Today, it is clear, however, that beyond the general discussion about accountability, there needs to be not only a place where you get down to the "nuts and bolts" about exactly who should be accountable about what, but how to develop effective methodologies of tactics and strategies to achieve it. Thus, whether you call it a party or a posse doesn't matter, the point is that there is a necessity to

can educators: the low relative standing of U.S. students compared to same age students in the principal industrialized international countries, the negative economic impact on the American economy resulting from a deficient education system, and potential policy changes for educational improvement based on the best performing international education systems.

Every three years the OECD, through its Program for International Student Assessment (PISA), administers standardized tests in math, science and reading to 15 year olds in various countries. In 2006, fifty seven jurisdictions participated in PISA, including 30 OECD jurisdictions and 27 non-OECD jurisdictions. PISA data is important because it assesses peer students on a global basis that is relevant to the global marketplace.

Key findings from the 2006 report include: Fifteen-

year-old students in the United States had an average score of 489 on the combined science literacy scale compare to the average OECD score of 500. Only 5 of the 30 OECD jurisdictions scored lower than the U.S. students in science literacy.

In addition to the overall scores PISA uses a one through six proficiency level to evaluate student performance. The United States had greater percentages of students below level 1 (8 percent) and at level 1 (17 percent) than the OECD average of 5 percent below level 1 and 14 percent at level 1.

Scoring by race on the combined science literacy scale showed Black students (409) scored lower than White (non-Hispanic) students (523), Asian students (499), and students of more than one race (non-Hispanic) (501).

The average U.S. score in mathematics literacy was 474 a full 24 points lower

than the OECD average. Only four of the OECD jurisdictions scored lower than the United States in mathematics literacy. When comparing the performance of the highest achieving students (those at the 90th percentile) U.S. students scored lower (593) than the OECD average (615). Twenty-three OECD jurisdictions had students at the 90th percentile who had higher scores than the United States in mathematics literacy.

America's unchallenged education advantage in the years after World War II is eroding as a greater proportion of students in other nations graduate from high school and college and score higher on achievement tests than students from the United States. Over the last decade, the U.S. has fallen from second place to 14th in terms of its college graduation rate. According to Schleicher, among O.E.C.D. countries only New Zealand,

Spain, Turkey and Mexico now have lower high school completion rates than the U.S.

The United States spends more than 17 of the 30 OECD nations on public and private education. Total federal, state, and local spending for education reached an estimated \$553 billion during the 2006-07 academic year. This is a 111 percent increase since 1991-92; 63 percent since 1996-97; and 44 percent since 1998-99.

Yet academic achievement scores for students in elementary and secondary school do not reflect a similar increase. In fact, over the past 20 years, assessment scores have remained relatively flat proving that simply spending more money does not boost academic achievement.

If nothing else raises the red flag the disproportionate high price paid for the mediocre education returns achieved should create a

stampede toward better accountability in education.

The relative importance of knowledge and skills for the economic success of individuals and nations is also shown in the OECD data. For example, South Korea which was in economic ruin after World War II is an economic dynamo today partly because of its educational attainment that has achieved a 96 percent high school graduation rate. Poland, in less than a decade has raised the literacy skills of its 15-yearolds by the equivalent of almost a school year.

Mr. Schleicher surmised that the long term economic value of similar educational improvement outcomes for the U.S. could be equivalent to over \$40 trillion in additional national income. If the U.S were to catch up with the best performing education system of Finland the U.S. economy could gain \$103 trillion. The U.S. achievement gaps are imposing on

the U.S. economy a quantifiable recurring economic loss that is greater than the negative deficits resulting from the current economic crisis.

Addressing these educational challenges in America will become ever more important as the best education systems will increasingly become the yardstick for success.

Until political and special interest biases are overcome, our educational system will continue to promote mediocrity. Rather than continued funding for failed education programs or theoretical new ones that take years to validate, House and Senate conferees on the reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) should target funding to proven results-oriented approaches patterned after the highest performing OECD jurisdictions.

According to a 2002 U.S. Census Bureau report, there are over 4.1 million minority-owned businesses (equates to 18 percent nationally) and an estimated 6.7 million women-owned businesses in the country (equates to 30 percent nationally).

In a 2005 Small Business Administration (SBA) publication, *Small Business Economy, A Report to the President*, reported minority-owned businesses continue to be an important part of the U.S. small business sector and minority-owned businesses hired more than 4.2 million employees nationally during 1997.

In January 2007 the City of Irving unanimously adopted a Minority and Womenowned Business Enterprise (M/WBE) Program because it recognized it was in the best interest for the City to stimulate the growth of small M/WBE in all phases of its procurement opportunities.

Ed Matthews, Purchasing Manager with the Intergovernmental Services Team, helps to oversee the operation of the M/WBE Program. Recently, the departhired Deborah McVean as the M/WBE Program Administrator, who will work to implement several initiatives defined by the department to ensure they are meeting their specific goals (see sidebar for specific short-term and long-term goals).

One important function of the M/WBE Program Ad-

ministrator is to focus on developing strong relationships with M/WBE vendors and contractors. With over 10 years of experience in working with small and M/WBE businesses, Mc-Vean will be a valuable asset in helping the Program to build and maintain relationships.

"We are going back out there to redevelop relationships with various ethnic organizations and reaching out to those M/WBE vendors to not only improve relationships, but open the lines of communication." states Mc-Vean.

In the past, Irving has had to deal with the negative perception of non-inclusion felt by M/WBE vendors and contractors. The City of Irving is committed to creating an M/WBE Program that is offering sufficient knowledge of open bids and giving M/WBEs an equal opportunity to compete for all procurement opportunities.

"The City has not communicated their willingness to reach out to M/WBE ven-

dors; therefore that non-inclusion perception still remains. The Irving Hispanic Chamber of Commerce (IHCC) is partnering with the City to develop an Outreach Program to assist with developing a more comprehensive M/WBE Outreach Program.


The IHCC would like to see the City offer more outreach initiatives in the form of Open Houses, facilitating meetings to discuss open and upcoming City bids, and more advertisement in the minority media," states Rene Castilla, Chairman of the IHCC Board of Directors.

The City measures its performance based on their key performance indicators of formally awarding 26 percent contract dollars to M/WBE vendors and increasing the number of vendors enrolled in their bidder notification database to 20 each month.

"There is no way of knowing how many total number of minorities have received contracts in comparison to those M/WBE firms who did not receive bid approval because the City does not provide that documentation to show a full breakdown of the M/WBE Programs overall progress; therefore, it is hard to give an overall assessment on the success of the Program," explains Castilla.

In a written response Matthew states, "All projects require the awarded contractor to submit documentation of a 'Good Faith Effort' to secure M/WBE participation as a part of the contract. On larger projects such as the construction of the new Irving Convention Center, The Burrell Group, (a consulting firm that assist organizations achieve its diversity and M/WBE goals), has been hired to track par-



Unfortunately, the challenges of the show, which has road blocks, detours and other challenges proved difficult for Adrian because during the first







Jobs Bill - good politics, bad policy

BY MARC H. MORIAL

(NNPA) There's an old saying: "Don't bring a sling-shot to a gunfight." But that's just what the Congress appears to be doing with its timid approach to job creation. Last week, the House of Representatives joined the Senate in passing a \$15 billion jobs bill that would hardly make a dent in the depression-era levels of unemployment afflicting

all parts of the country, especially communities of color.

The latest employment figures from the Bureau of Labor Statistics are being hailed in some quarters as a clear sign that the recession is over. Tell that to the 15 million Americans who remain out of work or the untold numbers of families teetering on the brink of financial ruin.

While the overall jobless rate remained steady in February at 9.7 percent, African American unemployment is now at 15.8 percent, a 6.8 percent increase since the start of the recession in December, 2007. The Hispanic jobless rate of 12.4 percent was virtually unchanged from January. And when you factor in the huge number of people who have stopped look-

ing for work and those who are working part-time only because they can't find a full-time job, the total "underemployment" rate has climbed to a staggering 16.8 percent.

Another 36,000 jobs were lost during the month, a number that was lower than expected, but still intolerably high. It is abundantly clear - the great recession rages on.

So what does the Congress do in the face of this crisis? The House passed a scaled-back \$15 billion Senate jobs bill that gives tax breaks to businesses to hire new workers and in-

ments in infrastructure projects. Most analysts say this will create only a few hundred thousand jobs at a time when 10 million jobs are needed just to get back to pre-recession levels. That's why a majority of Congressional Black Caucus members, led by Chairwoman Barbara Lee of California, voted against the measure. And it is why the National Urban League is calling on the Congress to go back and get it right.

Last November, the National Urban League presented the White House and Congressional leaders a ro-

bust six-point plan for putting Americans Back to Work. Our plan places a priority on help for the chronically unemployed which includes African Americans and other communities of color experiencing unemployment rates significantly higher than the national average. It would create 3 million jobs. We are recommending that future legislation include:

• Funding direct job creation

• Expansion and acceleration of the Small Business Administration's Community Express Loan Pro-

ticipation and ensure the prime contractor meets its commitments."

According to the City of Irving's website, Irving exceeded its 25.9 percent total number of bids allocated last year to 27 percent (see graph).

In comparison with other cities in the Metroplex like the City of Dallas, Irving has been unable to provide a detailed breakdown of dollars allocated to M/WBE's.

The City of Dallas provided a breakdown of the

total percentage of bids awarded to M/WBEs based on the following qualifiers: Total percentage of local M/WBE Firms; Total percentage of non-local M/WBE firms; and Combined (local and non-local) percentage of M/WBEs awarded contracts. See graph to view the City of Dallas overall performance for FY 2007-08 and 2008-09.

"We have recently seen a jump of percentage of bids and proposals received from M/WBE firms. The first couple of years we received about 17 to 18 percent and in the last six months that figure has jumped to about 30 percent. Much of the increase is due to the work of the M/WBE Program Administrator in seeking out firms to respond to specific solicitations, states Matthews."

With Irving having several construction projects in the pipeline (Irving Convention Center, Dart Orange Line, and Heritage Crossing), the opportunities are vast for M/WBE vendors

and contractors; however, awarding construction projects to M/WBE's is not the main focus for the M/WBE Program, according to Mc-Vean.

"We want to focus more on service-oriented projects rather than short-term construction contracts. We want to award contracts that are annual and recurring because it provides a long-term relationship with the M/WBE vendors."

"We believe we are taking the right steps to reach a positive outcome. We are focused on the feedback we receive from our community and our vendors in lieu of how we compare with other M/WBE programs within the Metroplex," Matthews explains in a written response.

mobilize to achieve the ends people are talking about.

A Black party could enable the discussion about accountability to focus on the cabinet agencies where the Federal budget exist to achieve some of the things needed by the black community. Some of the specific programs being rolled out around jobs and a new

focus on home foreclosure and etc. look good, but others such as "race to the top" as an educational program looks questionable to me—and the issue is that few of these programs across the board have been developed with the vigorous input and engagement of those for whom the programs are supposed to be designed.

A Black party could

also monitor and engage local initiatives more effectively. Where the rubber meets the road is in the local communities and there, mayors, county officials, state legislators and others presumably have some idea of what it takes to make black communities whole, what resources are addressed to that task and what is lacking. A mobi-

lized force could assist in this task of projecting community needs and monitoring whether or to what extent they are met.

What I am suggesting has been happening to some extent with the vigilance of our Civil Rights organizations, the Institute of the Black World 21st Century and the action of progressive black officials at the

national, state and local levels.

However, there should be a greater role for citizen engagement and a Black party mechanism could be the key. What we are witnessing is the rush of media attention to these movements, a dynamic that gives them power and places our interests farther and farther into the background. Mobilizing would give us the power to regain the footing to address the truth of our condition.

Texas employers add 14,800 jobs in January

(NDG Wire) Total nonagricultural employment in Texas increased by 14,800 jobs in January.

"Texas employers have added jobs in three of the last four months across a wide variety of industries," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Tom Pauken. "Meanwhile, the nation as a whole lost jobs in January."

Texas recorded job gains in six of the 11 major

industries in January. Professional and Business Services added 20,900 jobs in January, and Leisure and Hospitality employment increased by 6,300 jobs.

"Job gains over the past several months can offer more opportunities to the many Texans still out of work," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton. "TWC's online job-matching Web site, WorkInTexas.com, can help connect Texas job seekers with available jobs."

In January, Trade, Transportation, and Utilities gained 5,200 jobs, and Education and Health Services employment increased by 3,000, for a total of 54,300 jobs over the year. Manufacturing employment registered a monthly increase for the first time in 19 months by gaining 1,800

jobs in January.

"For the first time in more than a year, the Manufacturing industry recorded job gains, which is encouraging," said TWC Commissioner Representing the Public Andres Alcantar. "Education and Health Services employment continued to increase in January, adding jobs in 11 of the past 12 months."

Susie King Taylor was the first Black Army nurse. Taylor was born a slave in 1848 and died in 1912. She was permitted by her owners to live with her grandmother when she was seven years old. It was illegal for a Black child to receive an education, however, Taylor's grandmother had a neighbor who had a secret school for slaves and she taught Taylor to read and write.

During the Civil War, many escaped male slaves served in the 33rd U.S. colored Troops, the first Black regiment officially mustered into the Union Army. Later Taylor served as a laundress, cook and nurse to the men of the famous Black regiment, the Massachusetts 54th.

The soldiers that Taylor nursed never forgot her and would write to her. Taylor published her autobiography in 1902, entitled, Reminiscences of My Life in Camp: A Black Woman's Civil War Memoirs. In her book, she said of her experience as a Civil War nurse, "It seems strange how our aversion to seeing suffering is overcome in war. How we are able to see the most sickening sights and instead

of turning away, how we hurry to assist in alleviating their pain, bind up their wounds and press the cool water to their parched lips, with feelings only of sympathy and pity."

Lydia Newman was not the original inventor of the hair brush; her improvements to the brush made her a significant contributor to its evolution. Granted a patent in 1898, her brush was the first with synthetic bristles (prior to that brushers were made from animal hair, such as boar's hair.) Newman's brush also had several other unique innovations. Most notably, her hair brush invention was designed to promote ventilation and provide storage for excess hair or impurities. Easy access to the bristles permitted the user to clean them out whenever necessary.

Sarah Boone was an inventor who took an already great idea and made it better. She patented, on April 26, 1892, a device to help neatly iron clothes. This was the predecessor to the modern ironing board. Before Boone's invention, people used a table or a plank of wood across two chairs or small tables.

Marie Brown on December 2, 1969 received a patent for the first video

home security system. The system used television surveillance.

On January 10, 2006, Janet Emerson Bashen became the first Black female to hold a patent for a software invention. The patented software, LinkLine, is a web-based application for EEO (Equal Employment Opportunities) claims intake and tracking, claims management, document management and numerous reports.

Valerie Thomas received a patent on October 21, 1980 for inventing an illusion transmitter. This futuristic invention extends the idea of television, with its images located flatly behind a screen, to having three dimensional projections appear as though they were right in your living room. Thomas worked as a mathematical data analyst for NASA after receiving a degree in physics. She later served as project manager for the development of NASA's image-processing system on Landsat, the first satellite to send images from outer space.

Judy W. Reed, unable to read or write her name, was the first Black woman to receive a patent for a hand-operated machine for kneading and rolling dough on September 20, 1884.

Debrilla M. Ratchford, an airline stewardess, on 1978 received a patent for a suitcase with wheels and transporting hook.

Dr. Patricia Bath, an ophthalmologist, received her first patent in 1988, the Cataract Laserphaco Probe, becoming the first Black female doctor to patent a medical invention. It was for a method for removing cataract lenses that transform eye surgery by using a laser device making the procedure more accurate. With another invention Bath was able to restore sight to people who had been blind for over 30

Collin College students find asteroid

(NDG Wire) Competing with students from nine countries on four continents, three Collin College students Adrian Boysselle, David Golynskiy and Deepak Joseph discovered a main belt asteroid, located in the region between Mars and Jupiter.

The students will receive NASA research awards for discovering new asteroid 2010 CK12 as part of the International Asteroid Search Campaign.

In addition, the Minor Planet Center, an office of

the International Astronomical Union located at the Harvard-Smithsonian Center for Astrophysics, will publish their names with their finding.

The students' discovery was part of a Collin College Center for Advanced Studies in Mathematics and Natural Sciences project with physics professors Dr. Mike Broyles and Dr. Greg Sherman. Their finding was substantiated with follow up images from Leonid Elenin from the Russian Academy of Sci-

ences

The Collin College physics students analyzed satellite images from the new Wide-Field Infrared Survey Explorer (WISE). According to Dr. Broyles, the WISE satellite provides better resolution because it uses infrared wavelengths.

"There was a lot of international cooperation for this project. How many students in the world can say they have made a contribution to science like these students have?" Dr. Broyles asked.

exposed to graphic sexual conduct, Texas parents should prohibit their children from accessing www.chatroulette.com. Although site users are supposed to be at least 16 years old, the rule is not clearly enforced – which means parents' preventative role is particularly important.

Attorney General Abbott reminds parents to closely monitor their children's Internet activities by using the following safety tips:

• Place the computer in a public room at home so that parents can monitor their children's Internet use. Do not allow computers in a child's bedroom or permit the use of Web cameras.

• Make sure children know never to agree to a face-to-face meeting with someone they meet online and never to divulge personal information to an Internet stranger.


