Bringing an authentic new voice to daytime television, and an inspiring new perspective to the court show genre, the honorable Penny Brown Reynolds presides over Family Court with Judge Penny, drawing on her legal and personal background to address fighting couples, reckless parents and child custody issues in the freshman court series from Program Partners and 44 Blue Productions.

As one of four daughters raised by a single mother, Judge Penny's personal struggles of growing up poor in the South might make her more understanding of situations and circumstances, but it also makes it harder for people to make excuses for their actions. The fact that she recently became an ordained minister, graduating from the Interdenominational

Atlanta, and is married to the Reverend Edward Reynolds of Midway Missionary Baptist, also influences the legal advice and judicial decisions she renders.

Colleagues in the State Court say Judge Penny is concerned about the plight of others -- how a particular legal charge affects them as well as their family. She is known to counsel people to do better in life, for them-



selves and their families, and in addition to fines and judgments, has also sentenced people to counseling, put troubled teens into a boot camp program, and required others to get their GED.

"What it says to the person is that somebody believes in you," explains Judge Penny. "Sometimes, punishment can involve doing something that helps you, so that you can be a vital and contributing member of society. You need somebody to be straight, but not humiliate or degrade. During her time on the bench, Judge Penny consecutively directed the proceedings in a variety of cases, including domestic violence, medical malpractice, wrongful death, product liability, contract disputes, personal injury, driving under the influence and other misdemeanor criminal violations.

She was employed as a senior consultant in the nuclear power industry with a national information management company and was responsible for developing both strategic and communication plans, implementing grass roots programs and facilitating work process improvements for nuclear power plants.

Ms. Cunningham served on the Board of Directors for Laketran, a county wide public transportation system based in Painesville, Ohio. Laketran won the 2000 Outstanding Public Transportation System Award 2000 from the American Public Transportation Association (APTA). 

Putting the Madoff Ponzi Scheme in Perspective

The Benjamin Franklin quote, "In this world nothing can be said to be certain, except death and taxes", needs to be expanded to include "greed and fraud".

Last week we were entertained with the umpteenth rerun of what may be the most enticing heart wrenching drama ever created for prime time TV: an iconic legend making a pathetic public pleading before the bar of justice surrounded by a horde of enraged victims hungry for retribution.

The marquee does not have to be redesigned. Just paste over the recent star names of ENRON WORLDCOM with big bold letters identifying the new superstar BERNARD MAD-OFF.

The lights dim as Judge Denny Chin enters the courtroom and all spectators shift to the edge of their seats eager to find out how a well-respected investment professional, a former Nasdaq chairman, chairman of the board of his upscale co-op. chairman of the board of Yeshiva University's Business School, a member of exclusive country clubs in the Hamptons and Palm Beach was transformed into the poster child of Wall Street greed.

There is no question a huge fraud has been perpetrated against nearly 5,000 investors who have been bilked out of an estimated \$50 billion dollars. The public outrage toward Madoff was so great that he sometimes wore a bulletproof vest to his court hearings. Of course the prosecuting attorney, out of deference for the public relations value of the Madoff circus death threat subplot, let Madoff enter court through public portals instead of the private entrances.

However, in the interest of fairness why not compare the Madoff \$50 billion dollar scam that ensnared thousands of victims to the trillion dollar scams the government is working to the detriment of millions of citizens?

In mid December 2008 the General Accountability Office (GAO) reported that the federal government failed for the 12th year in a row its financial audit.

The report indicated that the three major impediments that continue to keep the GAO from doing a successful audit of the governments books are: Serious financial management problems at the Dept. of Defense, the government's inability to adequately account for and reconcile intra-governmental activity and balances between federal agencies, and the government's ineffective process for preparing its consolidated financial statements. The GAO also identified the three worst federal agencies for accounting for funds as: the Dept. of Defense, the Dept. of Homeland Security, and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).

It seems that neither the auditors nor anybody else knows precisely where taxpayer money is going.

One of the reasons for this the cozy relationship between federal regulators and the well connected.

Remember the Keating five, Halliburton, KBR Blackwater?

When skeptical investors tipped off the Securities and Exchange Commission in 1999 that Madoff was running his private investment firm as a Ponzi scheme they were repeatedly brushed off. The SEC sent examiners to the firm twice, including an enforcement team last year, but came up with nothing. So much for the investigative skills of SEC regulators even when alerted to a problem.

But it is understandable that the government has difficulty outing Ponzi schemes when they are such an integral part of its own operations.

The Social Security Administration runs it's 'trust funds' using the same methods used by Madoff. As money is collected from current workers, the funds are then dispersed to those already receiving benefits. None of the funds collected are actually invested, so no investment returns are ever generated. Those currently paying into the system are expected to receive their payout based on the social security contributions made by future workers.

Additionally, the government runs its financial balance sheet based on Ponzi principals. The national debt always grows and never shrinks. As existing debt matures, proceeds are repaid by issuing new debt. Interest payments on existing debt are also made by selling new debt to investors. The whole scheme of financing debt depends on an ever growing supply of new lenders, or the willingness of the existing lenders, to roll over maturing

The reality for the government is as it was with Madoff; if enough of our creditors want their money back, the house of cards crumbles. China, the U. S. government's largest creditor, recently expressed concern over the safety of its Treasury holdings and the government's economic mismanagement.

Congress, eager to posture and pontificate for their constituents in front of C-Span cameras, focus attention on the systemic problems at the Securities and Exchange Commission to keep the spotlight off their own looting of the American taxpayer.

But the blame finger also begs the question: Where were the congressional oversight committees when the Madoff red flags were being raised? Where was congress as the nation spent itself into a trillion dollar debt over the past eight years and then, as the economy tanked, gave away \$350 billion to bail out financial institutions with absolutely no oversight or accountability over how the taxpayer's money was spent.

If Bernard Madoff has to serve time for his fraudulent activities then he should be joined by at least one government regulator and one congressional oversight member as accomplices in fact.

Student Riots Over Activists' Death Roil Kenya

(NNPA) – Rioting has broken out in Kenya's capital Nairobi as human rights groups increase pressure on the government for the reported "assassinations" of the two rights activists.

The twin killings last week of Oscar Kamau Kingara and John Paul Oulo, shot dead in their car, sparked a riot in which a student was shot dead. Three policemen were later arrested in connection with the student's death.

"It is extremely troubling when those working to defend human rights in Kenya can be assassinated in broad daylight in the middle of Nairobi," said Philip Alston, who last month released a report accusing Kenya's police of running death squads.

The police deny any involvement in the killings of the two activists.

Voting Issues and Education Take Forefront in Legislature Last Week

There were many things going on in the Texas' Legislative Session last week in Austin, but the biggest issue was Senate Bill (SB) 362, which purposes a change in voter identification laws.

SB 362, by Senator Troy Fraser, would require voters to present either a government issued photo identification card, such as a driver's license, a recent utility bill showing the person's name and address in the district which they are registered to vote, or a local library card issued in their district to be able to vote. The goal of the bill is to eliminate and prevent voter fraud in upcoming elections

The Committee of the Whole Senate heard testimony about the bill starting on Tuesday, March 10. Originally, forty people were scheduled to testify, but due to a Republican rally to support the bill Tuesday morning, some 175 plus people attended to show support, publicly testify, and provide written testimony for the Committee.

The increased number of people made the hearing spill into two days of testimony, ending with an all night session for the Committee on Wednesday night

Many of the speakers who testified opposed the billl, arguing that the bill would not allow for the elderly, disabled, newly immigrated, or poor to vote in elections.

Supporters of the bill claim requiring a photo ID would decrease voter fraud citing numerous occasions where voter registration rolls were out of date or people who were ineligible illegally voted in the past.

House Reps. Wayne Christian, Linda Harper-Brown, Ken Paxton and Dan Flynn released a statement on Wednesday, March 11, supporting the bill and saying "Vote fraud must not be tolerated. Election integrity measures are a priority for the Texas Legislature."

They also cited a November 2007 study by the State Auditor which found "49,049 registered voters who may be ineligible to vote, mostly felons or deceased, "and a Houston report where "4,000 deceased individuals remain on Harris County voter rolls."

Adding "When noncitizens, dead people, or otherwise unqualified individuals remain on the voter rolls, illegal votes will be cast, canceling legitimate votes and denying legal voters of their civil rights."

The Senate passed the bill out of committee and to the Senate floor. SB 362 is scheduled to be heard before the full Senate on Monday, March 16.

In other Senate news, SB 643, by Senator Jane Nelson of Flower Mound, which would improve the safety and care of individuals with disabilities in state care facilities, was passed by the entire Senate on Monday, March 9, and received by the House of Representatives for full review. If passed by the House, it will go before Governor Rick Perry to be signed into law or vetoed.

The bill is expected to pass quickly through the House and be signed with no arguments by the Governor. Earlier in session, Gov. Perry declared this issue to be an "emergency issue" to help quickly push reform legislation.

"Taking care of the most vulnerable in our society is one of our most important priorities," said Lt. Governor David Dewhurst after Monday's passage.

The Texas House of Representatives was equally as busy this past week, especially Houston Rep. Dwayne Bohac. On Friday, March 13, he filed the last of his education bills and introduced his full proposal to reform the education system.

His plan consists of 4 bills; first, House Bill (HB) 53 which adjusts Robin Hood laws to keep more local taxes in their school districts. Robin Hood laws have been in place since 1993.

Essentially the laws take money collected from local taxes from richer districts and distribute to poorer districts. This idea

of "take from the rich and give to the poor" was originally designed to help even out funding issues between school districts and improve overall quality of education state wide.

Next, Bohac filed HB 130 creating funding for all day pre-kindergarten (Pre-K) programs for every district. Currently, Pre-K programs are voluntary and are half day programs; funding comes from grants or local funding, not from the state.

His third bill, HB 1800, would require parents and teachers to sign a contract that clearly spells out the expectations and duties of parents and teachers. The goal is to increase awareness, involvement, and relations between the parents, students, and teachers to achieve greater student success.

Finally, his bill, HB 2352, filed last Friday, purposes a pay increase for teachers by \$3000 a year and would add more school supply items to the State's Annual Sales Tax Holiday.

All of these bills have been referred to the House's Public Education Committee to be reviewed at a later date.

This week, more Committee meeting and hearings are scheduled for both the House and the Senate.

Americans aged 20 years or older have diabetes.

- African Americans are 1.6 times more likely to have diabetes as non-Hispanic whites.
- An estimated twenty-five percent of African Americans between the ages of 65 and 74 have diabetes.
- One in four African American women over 55 years of age has diabetes.

Diabetes has arguably become the health issue of our time. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention:

• If current trends continue, 1 in 3 Americans will develop diabetes sometime in their lifetime, and those with diabetes, will lose, on average, 10-15 years of life.

- The rate of diabetes has nearly doubled in the U.S. over the past 10 years, with the highest levels reported in the South.
- Nearly 24 million people in the U.S already have diabetes and 24% of those almost 6 million people—don't even know it.
- An estimated 57 million people have prediabetes, and 25% of those don't even know it

Urban League Annual Report To Community



Modern Day Slavery

(NNPA) Slavery as Blacks know it is permeated with images of Africans stuffed in ships, whipped and beaten beyond recognition, hung on trees and picking cotton. Slavery now has a new face known as human trafficking.

Human trafficking is often confused with smuggling, extortion or simple prostitution. When a person is a victim of human trafficking they are mandated to work under specific conditions by force. The U.S. is one of the top "destination" countries for human trafficking.

"I don't want to devalue the legacy of slavery in this country with real shackles. For people to understand the kind of control someone is under, it's useful to think of this as a modern day form of slavery," said Mark Lagon, executive director of Polaris Project. The Polaris Project is a national organization aimed at ending human trafficking.

Forced labor continues

to be a substantial portion of human trafficking yet commercial sex dominates. According to Gayle Helart, Assistant United States Attorney, U.S. Department Justice, Southern District of Indiana, the crime isn't about the violence or the labor itself, but the money - especially commercial sex.

Unlike African slaves,

victims of human trafficking oftentimes come to the

U.S. on their own will.

They are promised lucra-

tive opportunities such as a

job in a hotel or education.

Seduced by American cul-

ture and the idea of the

U.S. as a land of opportuni-

ty, victims agree and fol-

low the offender. Once in

the states, victims are

moved around to different locations, forced to sell their bodies and turn over all of the money to their male or female pimp.

Helart states that due to the glorified lifestyle of the pimp/whore culture, human trafficking isn't taken as seriously as it should be. Victims are in grave danger as many suf-

In this case, men would wear condoms so the girls were keeping track with condom wrappers. They were told that \$20 would get taken off their debt with every sex act," explained Helart.

Citizens are asked to be observant in their neighborhoods, jobs and places of worship for suspicious behavior, homes and businesses appearing to keep individuals inside, and individuals who are always accompanied by someone.



Department officials last year as the financial crisis was unfolding, jeopardizing the health of banks large and small. It is important to clarify that this meeting was requested and scheduled on behalf of the NBA, not on behalf of OneUnited Bank as press reports suggest. The attached letter from NBA to Treasury indicates the intent of the meeting and the dire concern expressed by the association on behalf of its mem-

The NBA contacted Treasury directly just as other trade associations did, to request a meeting so that its members could discuss their concerns regarding the situations facing minority banks. I followed up on the association's request by asking Treasury Secretary Paulson to schedule such a meeting, as did other members of Congress. Secretary Paulson recognized that the NBA's concerns about the future of minority banks were valid and arranged for to meet in early September.

"I did not attend the meeting, and thus did not participate in the conversation. Press reports of the meeting focus on concerns expressed on behalf of a single bank. However, NBA's follow up letter to Treasury, reiterates the organization's concerns about the fiscal health of its members generally (2).

"The press reports also

perpetuate a misconception about the way in which funds from the Troubled Asset Relief Program (TARP) are distributed to banks requesting assistance. The Executive Branch administers TARP funds, not Congress.

In particular, Treasury Department and Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) decide which financial institutions should receive funds. As reported, Treasury officials admit that the decision to distrib-**TARP** funds OneUnited Bank were based on the merits of the banks request, not based on anything said at the September meeting and not based on political influence. (Although both my supporters and detractors often refer to me as influential, the truth is that I had no influence on what Bush Administration officials in the Treasury Department or other departments did.)

"My husband Ambassador Sidney Williams, who has represented the United States as an Ambassador and has been a respected and active member of the Los Angeles community for many years, was asked to sit on the board of OneUnited Bank. This bank services our community and was the successor to the bank of which we had been customers at for many years.

He accepted the position and did not accept any director's compensation for his work on behalf of the bank and the community it serves.

"Despite suggestions to the contrary, I have fully disclosed all of my financial interests in official filings. These filings included the stock my husband purchased upon joining OneUnited's board (it is required under Massachusetts law, where OneUnited is headquartered, individuals are stockholders in a bank before joining its board).

F u r t h e r m o r e, Ambassador Williams is proud to be invested in a minority owned community bank that was given an "outstanding" lending rating from its regulator for its lending activity in underserved communities in Los Angeles, where traditional banks have refused to lend.

I even took additional steps beyond what is required of Members of Congress when I voluntarily and publicly disclosed my husband's relationship with OneUnited during an October 30, 2007 Financial Services Committee hearing entitled "Preserving and Expanding Minority Banks." (3)

Both the FDIC and the Office of Thrift Supervision were present at this hearing.

"The federal government has a legal obligation to support minority banks, as explicitly stated in the Financial Institutions Reform Recovery and Enforcement Act (FIR-REA).

In particular, Section 308 of FIRREA insists that the federal government take an active role in the preservation of the number and nature of minority banks. I have previously worked to ensure that the government is held accountable in this regard, and I will continue efforts to promote the interests of minority banks. As recently as the 110th Congress, I exhibited my commitment through my participation in official Oversight hearings minority banks, as well as initiation Government Accountability Office study on the effectiveness of mandated government assistance minority banks.

"In addition to this focus on banks, I authored three separate provisions, two of which became law, to insure small, women and minority owned businesses could fully participate in federal contracting opportunities. Unfortunately, most Federal agencies have ignored minority participation laws and failed to make reasonable attempts to assist small, minority and women-owned banks and businesses as required by

"I maintain that my

advocacy on behalf of small, women, minority and community banks is appropriate. I will continue to bank and do business with minority depository institutions and work on behalf of my constituents, and the institutions that serve them

all over this country.

As usual, the detractors are calling the Ebony Experiment "racist and divisive." Some even commented that they would "now" only support white businesses. Isn't that amazing? I wonder what these same folks call Black people who have for years supported white owned businesses.

No one ever complains about the many China Towns, Greek Towns, and Jewish enclaves that promote and, indeed, provide mutual support to their businesses and consumers. I have never heard anyone call these people "racists" and "separatists" nor have I ever read where anyone ever responded to these ethnic economic enclaves by saying they would only buy from white owned businesses.

Instead, whites and virtually everyone else support the business owners in these enclaves. In fact, we celebrate their "entrepreneurial spirit" and characterize them as "educated and informed consumers," "self-supporting" and "hardworking" citizens.

Now that John and

Maggie Anderson have started their quest to spend as much of their money with Black owned businesses, some are characterizing them as villains and racists rather than forward-thinking concerned individuals who are trying to empower not only Black people but this country as well

Black folks did not invent nor do we practice racism; we only react to it. For this effort to be characterized as racist is shortsighted, ignorant, incendiary, and disingenuous.

It is a real shame that this couple would have to endure any negativity for doing what is right; but it comes with the territory. Because \$850 billion moves through Black consumers' hands each year, more than 90 percent of that amount going to businesses owned and controlled by others, it is no surprise that turning a significant portion of that money inward to Black businesses is frightening to the establishment. Because Black people have been looked upon, and in many cases conducted ourselves as mere consumers rather

than producers, any effort put forth since 1964 (Integration) has been squelched.

But whose fault is that? If we would take more control of our dollars, by making them have some sense, it would not matter who said what about our efforts to leverage our collective income into real wealth in our communities.

As I noted in my interview with Mr. Ted Gregory, writer for the Chicago Tribune, regarding the Ebony Experiment, this is not the first effort of its kind, but it is unique in its experimental aspects.

It could also be unique in its sacrificial aspects, in that the Anderson family has to drive long distances to make many of their purchases from Black businesses. Prior to integration, we did exactly what we are trying to get back to today.

There were Black cooperative buying programs, Buy Black Campaigns, Double-Duty Dollar campaigns, and other initiatives that brought Black consumers and business owners together in support of one another.

Maggie Anderson, who hails from Liberty City (Miami, Florida), an all Black community in 1950's, which thrived on mutual business support among Black people, is now doing her best to revive the economic spirit of her childhood community. As I noted earlier, their sacrifice has not come without naysayers and outright "haters."

According to Tribune article, among the responses received by the Andersons was an anonymous letter mailed to their home accusing them of "unabashed. virulent racism." The writer stated, "Because of you, we will totally avoid black suppliers. Because of you, we will dodge every which way to avoid hiring black employees."

See what I mean? That kind of thinking is totally misplaced and hateful. But with \$850 billion on the line, there is no telling what kinds of reactions and retaliation this family will get from ignorant, one-sided, and narrow-minded folks who want to maintain status quo when it comes to business development and growth among African Americans.

With all of the hurdles and obstacles they face, this paragon of a Black couple has made a commitment and is following through on that commitment, which is, on its own merits, very commendable, especially when it comes to doing something positive for Black people. They truly deserve our support. Drop them a line or an email and tell them you appreciate what they are doing, and then get involved by starting your own Black buying "experiment" in your city.

As a result of the

Andersons' efforts, Black owned businesses will be discovered by other consumers, minds will be changed about buying Black, and consciousness will be raised among Black consumers. I trust that everyone else who reads this and learns about the Ebony Experiment will consider what Anderson said: "Focusing the estimated \$850 billion annual black buying power black businesses strengthens those businesses and creates more businesses, more jobs and stronger families, schools and neighborhoods...When a thriving African-American or urban community is realized, certainly as a society as a whole, we all win."

their credit scores, income and down payment were equal to those of White homebuyers."

Both Wells Fargo & Co. and HSBC are receiving federal bailout funds.

Similar NAACP lawsuits are pending against a dozen other subprime lenders.

"This is systematic, institutionalized racism," Tighe said. "Once you take out factors relative to income and credit risk, the only difference between the borrowers is the color of their skin."

Tighe estimated that "tens of thousands" of blacks had been forced into bad loans, but said it was difficult to gauge the scope of the problem because banks keep much of their internal data private. The lawsuits could force banks to divulge closely guarded informa-

tion, such as how banks can determine the race of a loan applicant and how federal bailout funds are being spent.

The NAACP is seeking reforms from the banks such as increased transparency in the loan process, educational outreach and internal training.







Mrs. Cedella Baker Demus: I thank God for every day that He allowed my mother to live and the wonderful memories that she left behind for all of her children. Mrs. Jessie Baker Green, my mother's sister and her best friend. Missionary Annie Mae Jackson, my children's paternal grandmother, a true Saint of God. Minister Sheila Tarpley Lott; she is doing God's work, and is an excellent mother to three of my precious grandchildren, Tyanna, David, and Philip and a wonderful wife to Bill Lott. Teacher Cleo Spann Tarpley, an exceptional daughter-in-law that is my

2nd daughter. My sisters, Nurse Eloyd Demus Avery, Beautician Billie I. Demus Daye, Evangelist Ida Demus Eggins, and Teacher Rose Demus Fielding; they are the greatest! Mrs. Jewel Price McKenzie, my teacher and mentor, in high school, college, and my working career. Mrs. Phemia Solomon Tinner, an admirable wife, mother, grandmother and godmother to Minister Sheila. Remember the importance of Black women in America; and about the innumerable ways they have changed the world. National Women's Month 2009 Theme: "Women Taking the Lead to Save Our Planet," to honor the efforts of women in preserving and protecting the environment for present and future generations.

Also I call attention to the spirit of possibility and hope set in motion by generations of Black women in their creation of communities and their encouragement of dreams.

The history of the Black woman is quintessential to women's history; they have always played a vital role in shaping Americans history. It is the story of amazing women's accomplishments acclaimed at the time but written out of history. Join me as I honor them this month ensuring that their accomplishments are never forgotten.

Bessie Coleman, the first Black female aviator, had a postage stamp issued in her honor in 1995. Sarah Goode the first Black female patent holder was issued a patent in 1885 for a Folding Cabinet Bed. Patricia Bath was the first Black female doctor to receive a patent for a medical invention; a machine for ablating and removing cataract lenses.

Henrietta Bradberry invented a bed rack with an attachment to the bed that

permitted air to pass through and refresh worn clothes in 1943; and in 1945, the device operated pneumatically and was adapted to discharge torpedoes under the water surface (called the Torpedo Discharger.)

Marie Brown invented the Video Home Security System that utilized television surveillance in 1969. Bessie Blount, a physical therapist who worked with soldiers injured in WW II, invented a device allowing amputees to feed themselves in 1951. Reynolds invented a Hoisting/Loading Mechanism in April 1920. Alice Parker in 1919 invented a new and improved gas heating furnace.

The invention provided a mechanism for regulating heat to be carried to various rooms in a building.

invented an Illusion Transmitter that extends the idea of television, with its images located flatly behind a screen to having three dimensional projections appear as though they were right in your living room.

Roberta Martin was the operator of her own "Gospel Music Publishing House." Sister Rosetta

Tharpe was a Gospel Singer that was known for her signature guitar style; she also introduced gospel music into nightclubs as well as concert halls. Martin and Tharpe both had postage stamps issued in their honor in 1998; the same year my first grandchild and only granddaughter Tyanna Lott was born.





