North Texas Hopes to See New Jobs & Increase in **Funding for Social Programs from Stimulus**

In February of 2009, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) was signed into law by President Barack Obama to help the faltering American economy. The ARRA lays out

detailed plans to help stabilize the economy through tax cuts, infrastructure changes, social programs, and "green" energy policies. Overall, the ARRA, instead of giving money directly to American citizens, is designed to help stabilize

the economy by bettering the American public's way of life.

Total cost of the ARRA is an estimated \$787 billion, most of which will go to federal programs such as tax cuts, technology updates, and transitioning government

buildings and equipment to be more environmentally friendly.

Opponents say states do not benefit from the ARRA because only \$144 billion is allotted for all states to use, and accepting

The Hidden Costs of This Recession

(NNPA) Have we seen the worst of this recession? Some financial analysts are saying things have "bottomed out" and point to upticks in the stock market as proof positive that things are getting better.

But while things may improve in financial markets we have yet to see the worst of the unemployment situation. Most states are looking at lay-

offs, most schools systems will cut teachers and administrators, many social service programs are looking at cuts, with everything from supplemental food programs to summer jobs programs on the table.

To be sure, stimulus money will create some jobs, especially in construction, and some states will use stimulus money to help meet budget short-

(NNPA) In the developing fight over the nomination of Judge Sonia Sotomayor, some conservative Republicans such as Newt Gingrich, Rush Limbaugh and Tom Delay are raising the charge that she is "racist" and would be an "activist" judge because of her ruling in the Ricci v. DeStephano case.

Better known as the New Haven Firefighters' case, its opponents apparently believe that activism only applies to Democrats or liberal judges.

Moreover, the recent preliminary arguments before the Supreme Court suggest that the conservatives on the court are poised to attack Title VII of the 1964 Civil Rights Act which protects those excluded by testing devices. This has been settled law for over 35 years.

The role of political conservatives in the modern era. as it has been historically, is to protect White interests, not to ensure that the law is fair to all groups in society. In fact, some Whites of this persuasion appear to live in a bubble of majority power, where the legitimate interests of other groups are perceived as a threat and where decisions defending their narrow group self interests are perceived to be objective.

ARRA funds requires states to change programs to follow federal mandates As a result most states, including Texas, have passed resolutions to politely remind the federal government of the 10th Amendment, which limits the government's powers over state regulation, and has denied some of the stimulus money.

Likewise, because of imposed federal mandates, some Texas Legislators and Governor Rick Perry

The 1964 Civil Rights Act (Title VII, section 7h) prohibited the use of tests that would be used intentionally to discriminate, or tests that would be used without the intention to discriminate but would nevertheless, have an exclusionary (disparate) impact. The continuing impor-

tance of this is that the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission has found that in 2007 discrimination charges involving test screening of job applicants have significantly increased due in part to security concerns raised by 9/11 and the economy.

Now all of the protected groups under Title VII, such as the Age Discrimination Act and Americans with Disabilities Act, are protected from biased testing in addition to African Americans. So, any change in the law that seeks to invalidate Title VII for Blacks would also affect others in these categories. Yet, activist conservatives on the Court seem poised to do so.

My suspicion however, is that the Supreme Court conservatives see red meat in the charge that White firefighter Ricci makes - that the City of New Haven's attempt to comply with Title VII is, in itself, race discrimination against Whites who are protected by the princi-

Black Interests, I have written that the reinterpretation of the 14th Amendment to the Constitution, as Ricci and his colleagues are attempting to do, amounts to the reconfirmation of "white rights."

Powerful conservative politicians and judges began this project with the case. Shaw v. Reno which narrowed the basis for the inclusion of African Americans in college enrollment to the point that we now have an ill-defined standard of something called "diversitv."

This move against employment in an atmosphere of economic decline and rampant Black unemplovment could not come at a worse time. Blacks should not have to confront biased testing if they are to get back to work and to be promoted after this Depression is over.

falls. But not a day goes by when another round of cuts or layoffs are announced. And the announcements represent the tip of the iceberg.

We need to pay attention to some of the human costs of this recession and at least be sensitive to the way these human costs impact our national quality of life. There are people who once defined themselves by the kind of job they have, and now they have no job.

Some of these folks can buck up and make the best of a bad situation, but many careen into depression if their job was all they had. Where do they turn for help?

Cash-strapped, they probably aren't turning to therapists. And public mental health services are being cut.

This is the wrong time to cut mental health services. There is a great psychic burden that people are shouldering as a result of this recession.

We see it everyday in the large and small adjustments people are making, the businesses that are closing, the cars repossessed, the parents who have to tell their children they simply can't afford things as simple as summer camp.

While most people can manage, there are a group of folk who are having problems adjusting, and it turn into acting out behavior that is extreme, including suicides, homicides, domestic violence, and stealing to name just a few.

Some people are working two and three jobs to make ends meet. Some are leaving children at home alone because they can't afford childcare. A friend told me the heart-rending story of her 8-year old offering the contents of her piggy bank when she overheard her parents talk about their financial situation.

Another friend said her 11-year-old offered to get a job! Take these stories and multiply them by thousands and you will begin to get a sense of the hidden costs of this recession.

Much of the Black middle class in Detroit was developed through the automobile industry and that industry is faltering. The new mayor there, Dave Bing, has much respect and admiration, but his Bling Bing presence can't stem the hemorrhaging of jobs.

Detroit is a city that has been through so much in

the last decade, including the scourge of unstable political leadership and a nearly two-year period of careful scrutiny of former mayor Kwame Kilpatrick, a young man with such enormous promise, and so many human flaws. What is the morale in Detroit these days? It is one of the not-so-hidden costs of this recession.

Too, we tend to dismiss the problems of the wealthy as nothing more than their comeuppance. Those who invested with Bernard Madoff are seen as folks who didn't use their heads – how did they think they could keep getting double digit returns on their portfolios?

But these people hire people – cooks and nannies, drivers and housekeepers, personal assistants and tailors. How many little people lost jobs because of portfolio losses by the wealthy?

Thinking about the hidden costs of recession does not move us toward fixing the recession but it may move us to think about the values that brought us to this place and how we might change them.

Rampant consumerism is one of the reasons we are in the situation we find ourselves in now. What can we do to have a permanent reversal of the trend to have more, more more? Those who identified themselves with their jobs forgot who they were – valuable human beings and children of God, employed or not. Can we begin to

focus on human values more consistently, emphasizing that people are not their title or what they earn, but what they do, and how they make other people feel.

If there is opportunity in crisis, the opportunity in

this recession is to examine the flawed ways we live and to consider fixing those flaws.

140 Days of Opportunity **Regular Session Finished, Special Session Expected**

The 2009 Texas Legislature closed their session on Monday, June 1. With the observance of the Memorial Day holiday, Legislators found themselves running out of time and held sessions late into each week night and both Saturday and Sunday of last week.

Several thousand bills were reviewed this session, and about 1,400 have been sent to Governor Rick Perry for review; he now has 20 days to sign or veto the bills.

Some of the most notable bills this session were:

House Bill (HB) 498, creating the Timothy Cole Innocence Commission, a commission to review the collecting and processing procedures of evidence and witness testimony; it has been stalled in conference between the House and the Senate. The Commission is named after Timothy Cole,

an Army veteran who served 25 years and died in prison before his conviction was overturned. As of Saturday, May 30, HB 498 was still in conference.

HB 873 was signed by the Governor in April. The new law will use some of the federal stimulus money to help entice more film and television projects to the state to create jobs and encourage tourism.

HB 1466 became a new state law in the middle of May The new law now makes the theft of a military grave marker a state felony and requires jail time after a conviction.

HB 1736, which has been signed into law, creates the Timothy Cole Act. The Act will give people who have been wrongly convicted of a crime \$80,000 for each year they were in prison, 120 hours tuition credit at a state university, and health care.

Senate Bill (SB) 175 will go before the Governor to be reviewed. SB 175 will change the Top Ten Percent Rule for college admissions. Currently, any high school graduate in the top ten percent of their class is automatically admitted into the university of their choice. If changed, universities will be able to cap the number of incoming students admitted.

SB 204 proposes a statewide ban on trans-fats in restaurants. While it passed the Senate it was stalled in the House and will not go before the Governor.

SB 298 suggested the state create sobriety check points to curb drunk driving. Again, while passing in the Senate it was left pending in the House Criminal Jurisprudence Committee.

SB 362, or the Voter ID Bill, created much controversy

The bill tries to eliminate voter fraud by requiring vot-

ers show proof of identification at polls. Opponents of the bill say requiring ID will deter voters. Public Senate hearings for the bill lasted for two days with 175 people registering to testify; the Senate Committee meeting to review SB 362 lasted more than 24 hours. After passing the Senate and the House Elections Committee, it stalled in the House.

SB 544 was stalled by the Senate. If passed, the bill would ban smoking statewide. SB 769 became law in April. The new law will allow electric companies to finance the cost of repairs after a natural disaster; doing so will help the electric companies restore power faster to residents and cut consumer costs.

SB 1164 was stalled by the House after passing the Senate. If passed, SB 1164 would allow university students with concealed handgun licenses to carry guns to

class and keep firearms and ammunition in dorms.

SB 1569 has been sent to the Governor for review, but is expected to pass without his signature. The bill will allow Texas to use \$500 million of the federal stimulus money to fund the state's unemployment program.

Governor Perry is opposed, saying that using stimulus money to fund state programs will create a larger problem when federal funding runs out. But Legislators believe the money is needed now; current budget estimates predict the unemployment program will go broke by October of 2009 without using the stimulus money. The \$500 million has already been included in the new state budget.

The proposed budget totals \$182.3 billion, decreases general spending by an estimated \$1.6 billion, and uses \$12.1 billion of the federal stimulus money. The budget also includes an estimated \$80.7 billion in general revenue and tax cuts for small businesses. However, budget issues may cause the Governor to call a special legislative session.

On Monday, June 1, the House considered this year's session a success and ad-journed seeing no need for a special session. The Gov-ernor and the Senate do not agree; funding and review of The Texas Department of Transportation (TXDoT) and The Texas Department of Insurance for the next two years has yet to be determined. Currently, without rewriting funding measures, TXDoT is expected to run out of funding in 2010.

Governor Perry announced he will consider calling a special session to deal with funding issues and other unfinished business after the 20 day review period.







Economic Empowerment and Restore Our Homes "Rescue Fairs" to Launch in Dallas

Economic Empowerment and Restore Our Homes "Rescue Fairs" will be held at the Dallas Convention Center, June 13, 2009. The "Rescue Fairs" will be hosted by the Urban League of Greater Dallas and North Central Texas and the National Urban League.

The National Urban Leagueis the nation's oldest (established in 1910) and largest community-based movement devoted to the empowerment of African Americans and their entrance into the economic and social mainstream.

This two pronged event marks the launching of an eight city effort to provide communities with career and resource information as well as home restoration counseling and help for home owners. It can be called the one-stop-shop to two of today's most pressing issues, jobs and housing.

After the launch of the Economic Empowerment and Restore Our Homes "Rescue Fairs" in Dallas on June 13, 2009, seven other cities including St. MO: Louis. Hampton Roads, VA; Louisville, KY; Union County, NJ; Atlanta, GA; Broward County, FL; and Knoxville, KY, will give their communities the opportunity to come out and enjoy the free services offered by the National Urban League in 2009.

In an interview with the North Dallas Gazette, Marc H. Morial, president and CEO of The National Urban League, commented, "One of the reasons that the National Urban League chose Dallas for its launching efforts is because of Dr. Beverly Mitchell-Brooks, president and CEO of Urban League of Dallas. She is a fantastic leader."

Dr. Brooks seemed flattered by the comment, but added, "I think that the whole Dallas Urban League has a great team and wonderful community support. The whole team gets out there every day to help people."

Dr. Brooks also informed the North Dallas Gazette that the Dallas Urban League has been a leader in areas including, mitigation, housing counseling, default counseling, and first time buyer counseling for over forty years. Dallas Urban League also offers emergency services for rent and mortgage assistance and has been offering foreclosure prevention since a few years prior to the current economical crisis.

Morial stated that all services provided at the "Rescue Fairs" are free to the public. He added: "I national partnership of nonprofit, community-based organizations. announced to the Dallas North *Gazette*, "We have asked that only companies with iob openings available attend the fair for recruitpurposes." ing This means that there will be onsite interviews or at least the beginning of the hiring processes taking place at the "Rescue Fair." Candidates are also encouraged to bring resumes

to receive assistance in polishing them. There will be many workshop presenters and qualified volunteers to help with this process.

According to the Dallas Urban League, "60 companies including Federal Express, Parkland Hospital,

DART, Career Builders, and Adecco have committed their participation and will be on site to offer jobs to those seeking employment."

According to Dr. Brooks, Dallas communities have been greatly affected

by the economic hardships of our country at present. It is apparent that home loss and job security go hand in hand, so to offer roads to building both in a single effort, makes sense. Dr. Brooks stated, "These are two major issues impacting our economy today. Addressing one without the other is like fixing only one leg of a three legged stool, when all three are broken. When people lose their jobs, most times they can't pay their mortgage."

In today's economy there have been some changes in demographics. According to Dr. Brooks, people who were only a short time ago able to come in and offer services to the Urban League of Dallas, are now among those requesting service. "We just want to do the best that we can do to help, by providing the tools that we are able to provide," she stated.

As a bonus to all of the other free services, free, onsite health screenings will also be available through National the Urban League/Walgreens Wellness Tour. These screenings include features such as a mobile health and an education vehicle offering testing of things raging from cholesterol levels to waist circumference and body mass index to help provide the critical foundation for early disease detection and prevention.



More Retirees 'Recareering'

(NNPA) President Barack Obama touched on something very poignant in his proclamation when he authorized the month of May to serve as Older Americans Month. That is that many Americans who are of retirement age are remaining in the workforce instead of simply calling it quits.

A 2008 survey from AARP, a non-profit membership organization for people over 50 years of age, found that seven out of 10 working adults between the ages of 45 and 74 plan to work during retirement or never retire at all.

The number of Black

workers aged 65 and older of a Brooklyn elementary almost doubled from a decade ago, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. These statistics mirror a trend that spans across all races. And while the state of the economy may be an underlying factor for the uptick, more and more seniors would rather use their later years staying active than resting. Many retirees find that working keeps them occupied and helps them stay active.

"One thing about retiring is that you can stop whenever you want," says New York City native JoAnne Challenger.

She recently retired from her job as a principal

school but quickly found that she had too much time on her hands. So she took a part-time job as an assistant college professor at Mercy College.

Challenger says her retirement pension keeps her pretty stable financially. So she may retire from her new job in a couple of years - after she's done paying her daughter's college tuition next year.

As an assistant professor, Challenger works with people who want to be teachers. She says it keeps her busy, but at a less rigorous pace than her old job as a school principal.

"You just have to keep

your mind active," she shares. "When I was working I was so very busy. But [when] I retired it all just stopped. So I wasn't ready to stop working, I was just ready to quit at that pace."

She said many of her friends who are retired are still working.

AARP released a new study last week on older Americans "recareering" and it reveals that many retirees, like Challenger, do not abruptly retire but rather transition from "long-time careers to shortterm jobs that serve as bridges to retirement before exiting the labor force completely."

The study also found

that those surveyed reported that they dealt with less stress and enjoyed flexible work schedules in their new jobs," the study revealed.

"Many older workers are ready to give up the long-time grind, and look for stimulating jobs with flexible schedules as they begin the process toward retirement," said Susan Reinhard, senior vice president of the AARP Public Policy Institute. "The study shows dramatically that workers are putting a premium on reduced stress as they downshift a bit."

Mariah Ann Baylor, 77, retired as an assistant cafeteria manager of a Milford,

Va. middle school after 30 years on the job. For the last nine years she's been supplementing her income by baby sitting and doing home care.

"I've been doing different jobs taking care of people who are sick," she said. "I love people. I love taking care of people. I love children."

Baylor said that even though she puts herself on a budget she doesn't have the extra money that she used to have. But, it helps with her peace of mind, she says. "I'm not looking to stop anytime soon ... The only thing that can hinder me is my health but I'm still in good health."

Standard features include 18-inch wheels, reverse parking sensors, a power liftgate, auto-dimming rearview and driver sideview mirrors, a tilt-andtelescoping steering wheel, dual-zone automatic climate control, the voiceactivated Sync system and a six-speaker stereo with six-CD changer, satellite radio and an auxiliary audio jack. The Lincoln MKX is powered by a 3.5liter V6 that makes 265 horsepower and 250 pound-feet of torque. There is a choice of frontor all-wheel drive and a six-speed automatic transmission is standard. In government crash testing, the 2009 Lincoln MKX got five out of five stars for frontal driver and side impact protection and four stars in frontal passenger collisions. The

MKX gives away its Ford roots with plain gauges and low-end plastics. But, on the plus side, the controls are well laid out and intuitive to use, and there are plenty of standard and optional comforts like leather heated and cooled front and rear seats. Both rows of seats offer plenty







stimulus money claimed by the state and which projects will be funded by state taxpayer money, or a ratio of the two. However, some of the federal funding has already begun to impact Texas.

On April 1, the Department of Homeland Security announced that \$400 million has been allotted for Southern border security. \$42 million was given to Texas ports to help strengthen infrastructure and buy enhanced inspection equipment, and \$50 million was given to the El Paso and Rio Grande Valley law enforcement agencies to fund more

patrols, new officers, and buy new equipment, including scanners to see into tractor trailers, for border inspection sites.

\$3.8 million of the federal transportation allotment is currently being used by the Texas Department of Transportation to fund 35 construction and maintenance projects which started in March; some in Grand Prairie and Cedar Hill. More projects are planned, and some stimulus funding is earmarked for the Trans-Texas Corridor project.

The ARRA also has funds available to improve the rail system. Plans are

already being drafted to add a new high speed rail line between Dallas and San Antonio, or Dallas and Houston. Dallas Senator John Carona was implemental in pushing the State Legislature to pass legislation this session enabling DART and DART Rail to expand easily all across the Metroplex, and, as a result, some money from the ARRA is expected to help cover those costs.

New construction projects will create jobs, and it has been estimated the ARRA will save or create 269,000 jobs statewide. Additionally, if the state is successful in using stimulus money to entice businesses to move to Texas, through the Emerging Technology Fund or the Texas Enterprise Fund, also receiving a portion of stimulus money, more long term jobs will become available. Hopefully, a number of those new jobs will be here in North Texas.

Stimulus contracts have also begun to affect Texas. In an effort to comply with providing wireless internet access to the entire nation. AT&T has used some of the federal money to provide wireless internet access to the citizens of Goliad. AT&T has installed a tower to carry the signal
