Twitter, a free social networking and micro-blogging service, came onto the scene of the social networking world in 2006. Twitter has

received mixed criticism from users, but overall it still appears to be useful and highly used as a mode of marketing and social networking.

The service allows user to read each others' updates, which are also known as tweets. The updates are similar to phone texts as far as limitations and content allowed are concerned. Updates can only contain up to 140 characters per tweet. The only users that can access the tweets are the users who have subscribed to the updating author's profile as followers.

Users can update their Twitter using various tech-

phone, to TweetDeck, to the Twitter website. Users who opt to use cell phones may incur additional charges. If properly linked together, users with a blog can simultaneously post information on Twitter, Linkedin, Face-

Old Casket of Emmett Till Discovered in Cemetery Scheme

BY DOROTHY ROWLEY (NNPA) The original casket of Emmett Till, a 14year-old boy whose 1955 murder helped put the civil rights movement on a national stage, was found discarded during an investigation into a scheme at an Illinois cemetery.

Till remains buried at

Oak Burr Cemetery in Chicago, a historically Black gravesite. But, the original casket in which he was buried was founding rusting in a dilapidated shack at the cemetery by investigators looking into reports of miss-

ing headstones. According the Chicago Sun Times, a manager of the

(NNPA) President Barack Obama gave another eloquent speech while visiting Ghana. Yet, after reading it carefully, I walked away feeling that, once again, he provided an incomplete, if not misleading context.


Just as in his speech in Philadelphia in 2008 regarding race, he seems to talk in the past tense about problems that are actually on-going. By framing the problems facing Africa as mainly being problems currently created by Africans,

he overlooks the fact that Western Europe and the USA continue to have a largely toxic relationship to the continent.

While President Obama acknowledges the legacy of colonialism on Africa, he largely acts as if that is entirely a thing of the past. He comments, for instance, that the problems of Zimbabwe cannot be blamed on the West.

They cannot? Even as someone critical of Zimbabwe's President Robert

Dr. Regina Benjamin

(AP) President Barack Obama turned to the Deep South for the next surgeon general, choosing a rural Alabama family physician who made headlines with fierce determination to rebuild her nonprofit medical clinic in the wake of Hurricane Katrina.

Dr. Regina Benjamin is known along Alabama's impoverished Gulf Coast as a country doctor who makes house calls and doesn't turn away patients who can't pay -- even as she's had to find the money to rebuild a clinic repeatedly destroyed by hurricanes and once even fire.

"For all the tremendous obstacles that she has overcome, Regina Benjamin also represents what's best about health care in America, doctors and nurses who give and care and sacrifice for the sake of their patients," Obama said Monday in introducing his choice for a job known as America's doctor.

He said Benjamin will bring insight as his administration struggles to revamp the health care system:

Saying she "has seen in a very personal way what is broken about our health care system," Obama said Benjamin will bring important insight as his administration tries to revamp that system.

Benjamin called the job "a physician's dream," and pledged to be a voice for patients in need -- and to fight the preventable diseases that claim too many lives each year, including nearly her entire family.

Her father died with diabetes and high blood pressure, her only brother died of HIV related illnesses, her mother of lung cancer "because as a young girl, she wanted to smoke just like her twin brother could" -an uncle now on oxygen as a result, she noted.

"I cannot change my family's past. I can be a voice in the movement to improve our nation's health care and our nation's health," Benjamin said. "I want to be sure that no one falls through the cracks as we improve our health care system."

The surgeon general is the people's health advocate, a bully pulpit position that a person with a forceful

personality can use effectively. Benjamin has that reputation.

Pushed by the need in her own shrimping community of Bayou La Batre, and its diverse patient mix -white, black and, increasingly immigrants from Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos --Benjamin, 51, has emerged as a national leader in the call to improve health disparities. She became the first black woman and the first doctor under age 40 elected to the American Medical Association's board of trustees, and in 2002 became the first black woman to head a state medical so-

ciety.

Medical groups welcomed her ability for straight-talk, whether to patients or politicians, about the dire health needs of much of the country.



Mugabe such as me is keenly aware that both Britain and the USA broke an agreement from 1979 that was to provide funding for a land reform program. The failure to follow through on this agreement laid the basis for the current crisis.

None of this is to absolve Africa for its many ills. Corruption is an epidemic, with certain countries so overwhelmed by it that it appears to be an extension of the culture.

Certainly dictatorial regimes should not be tolerated and they cannot be blamed on the West alone. Yet what the President fails to acknowledge is that the West continues to tolerate the corruption, it not in many cases actually encourage it.

The problem is that when the President keeps talking in the past tense regarding problems that continue to be encountered he allows confusion to reign regarding the solutions. If, in the case of Africa, the West is no longer really a problem, then it is difficult to explain many of the current crises. It is difficult, for instance, to understand the 1994 Rwandan genocide as anything other than Hutu insanity and revenge unless one also understands the role of the French government and its active support of the genocideers.

Yes, President Obama is correct that Africa will need to settle its various crises and that it has the capability to do so. The problem is that insofar as we and others ignore the continuing role of the West in undermining Africa's efforts at development, we can at best only treat aid as charity.

This can be contrasted with an approach which emphasizes the need for an international commitment to repair the damage that has been done to Africa over hundreds of years.

Such an approach goes beyond traditional foreign assistance and recognizes that Africa was and continues to be the victim of a crime, rather than the criminal itself. President Obama obviously does not want to touch which an approach that emphasizes ten. "repair" and, while he will acknowledge the colonial age n legacy, he seems more interested in presenting the of wa

current situation as the equiv-

alent of a blank slate on which anything can be written.

I think that another image might be appropriate: try a person thrown into a tank of water with weights locked to their legs. Yes, they might be able to swim on their own and escape, but why were the weights there in the first place?

African Americans: Lose Weight, Lower Risk for Type 2 Diabetes

If you have a family history of type 2 diabetes, you are at an increased risk for the disease. If you are overweight, you have an even greater risk for type 2 diabetes. Diabetes affects the lives of nearly 4 million African Americans and their families, but there's hope.

Studies show that losing a small amount of weight by being physically active for 30 minutes, five days a week and making healthy food choices can help you reduce the risk of type 2 diabetes by more than half. Take your first step today. Talk to your doctor about your family history of type

2 diabetes and other diabetes risk factors. Follow these tips from the National Diabetes Education Program's (NDEP) More Than 50 Ways to Prevent Diabetes tip sheet to lose weight and lower your risk for type 2 diabetes:

• You can do it, Hewitt. Set a weight loss goal you can reach before starting a weight loss plan. If you are at risk for type 2 diabetes, aim to lose 5 to 7 percent of your current weight - that's 10 to 14 pounds if you weigh 200 pounds.

Keep track of your daily food intake and physical activity in a log book and review it every day to see how you are doing. Ask family and friends for support.

• Have a small meal, Lucille. Teaspoons, salad forks, or child-size utensils may help you take smaller bites and eat less. Eat less high-fat and high-calorie foods less often.

Make a small amount of food look like more by serving your meal on a salad or breakfast plate. Keep meat, poultry, and fish portions to about 3 ounces, which is about the size of a deck of cards

• Eat right, Mike. Make healthy food choices every day. Keep healthy snacks such as a cup of fat-free vogurt, celery sticks, or baby carrots at home and pack them when you're on the go.

To get more fiber, add fruits and vegetables to the foods that you love. Add strawberries, blueberries, or bananas to whole grain cereal. Top pizza with pineapples, bell peppers, or mushrooms instead of high-fat meats such as sausage or pepperoni. Choose water to drink.

• Move more each day, Faye. Try doing activities you enjoy such as playing with your children, tossing a softball, walking the dog, or turning up the music and jamming while doing household chores.

• Take action, Jackson. Overcome your physical activity roadblocks. If you do not want to be physically active by yourself, form a group of people to walk, jog, or bike together. If you

prefer to stay indoors, work 569-1162. out using fitness videos or DVDs at home or walk around a shopping mall.

"We want to emphasize prevention, primary care and early intervention, and we have somebody now who does that for a living," said Dr. Georges Benjamin, no relation, of the American Public Health Association.

Added AMA President Dr. James Rohack, who has known Benjamin for more than two decades. Dr. Rohack said "her recognition that if you don't have health insurance, you live sicker

and you die younger, she can bring the real-world perspective as surgeon general of the things as a nation we need to do to keep ourselves healthy."

Benjamin made headlines in the wake of Katrina, as photographs showed her laving patient charts out to bake in the sun and lamenting the lack of pricey but more hurricane-resistant electronic records. Her nonprofit clinic was rebuilt by

volunteers only to burn down just as it was about to reopen. Benjamin later told of her patients' desperation that she rebuild again, recalling on woman who handed her an envelope with a \$7 donation to help.

"If she can find \$7, I can figure out the rest," Benjamin said last fall as she received a \$500,000 Mac-Arthur Foundation "genius award," money she said she'd use to help finish that iob.

Her nomination for surgeon general requires Senate confirmation.

Garland Adds Important Upgrades to CodeRED

The City of Garland has added two important upgrades to its CodeRED telephone notification system.

First, a new severe weather early warning system has been added, which automatically launches calls specific geographic areas that are in the path of tornados, severe thunderstorms and other hazardous weather developments. These automated warnings can provide critical preparation time when severe weather threatens.

Dorothy White, Public & Media Affairs Manager for the City of Garlandsays "As soon as the National Weather Service issues the warning, the calls begin going to the areas affected." Since these notifications are automatic, residents and businesses must opt-in for these specialized notifications.

To 'opt-in' for the automatic weather warnings, go to the City of Garland website at www.ci.garland.tx.us, click on the CodeRED icon on the left side of the page and follow the prompts. Those who are registering for the first time can follow the same instructions.

When a CodeRED weather warning call is received, the number 800-566-9780 will be displayed by caller-ID.


The City will continue to use CodeRED in other emergency situations such as a hazardous chemical spill, major utility outage, or an Amber or Silver Alert. But the number displayed by caller-ID will change to 866-419-5000, which a citizen can call back from the phone

that received the CodeRED alert and listen to the message again with a time and date stamp.

White says, "This is particularly important for citizens who may not have heard the message clearly when they answered their phone or those whose voicemail greetings may have clipped part of the recorded message."

Caller-ID will also display the name 'Emergency Communications Network' for most telephone customers.

For customers without access to a computer or internet service, registration forms are available at City Hall, all branches of the Nicholson Memorial Library System, City recreation centers and other City government facilities.

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Crossroads Family Services To Partner With McKinney ISD To Combat Truancy Truancy Intervention Program will be first of its kind in Collin County

(NDG Wire) Crossroads Family Services and McKinney Independent School District (MISD) have joined together to create a Truancy Intervention Program which will pilot during the 2009-2010 school.

Filing truancy charges against students who don't attend school often doesn't work. MISD and Crossroads Family Services have established a pilot program which will launch this fall. MISD will invite parents and students to enroll in a deferral program administered by Crossroads Family Services instead of immediately filing truancy charges. If the parents agree to participate in the program, the filing of charges will be postponed pending the student's performance in the truancy program.

The Crossroads Family Services staff plan to meet with all interested teachers, students, parents, and administrators to develop a comprehensive truancy prevention plan.

The plan can include tutorials, educational classes, counseling, attendance reports, community service, and other options. The cost to participate, which is much less than court costs and fines, will be paid by program participants. Money given by the Texas Bar Foundation to Crossroads Family Services will also be used to help sustain the program. The program is offered without using any public funds.

"We have made it a priority to offer first class truancy prevention service to the community," said Crossroads' acting executive director Bob Fine. "This program is a continuation of that priority, and we are so glad that MISD has the vision to take a new approach to truancy."

Crossroads will be at MISD's middle and high school campuses approximately 10 days a month. Students who participate in the program will have the opportunity to make up missed time and, if they successfully complete the program, will start with a fresh attendance record going forward.

"We are excited about the opportunity to partner with Crossroads Family Services in the area of student attendance," said Keith Garinger, MISD assistant superintendant for administrative services.

According to Garinger, "This partnership will demonstrate MISD's commitment to student performance. We appreciate Crossroads choosing our district to pilot this very important venture."

book and other social media sites such as FriendFeed. Of course, to posting and reading updates via the Twitter website is free of charge.

Stephanie Ward, owner of Red Lime Media and Twitter user, said that even though she prefers Facebook for social networking, she loves Twitter for marketing and promotional purposes. Ward believes the ability to post so frequently gives users the opportunity for familiarity and exposure with their followers. "I think it's a very simple and great way to direct traffic to websites and businesses."

Gaining followers appears to be fairly simple. In most cases, it appears that if users follow someone who has not quite reached celebrity status, they will follow back. The interface is fairly simple, but as with any other social network there are advantages and disadvantages to the simplicity of the interface. The network differs from MySpace and Facebook in that there is no place to store hordes of photos, videos, or music. Users using Tweetdeck can post pictures via a third party website TwitPic, but only tweets also using Tweetdeck will have the ability to see the posted photos, all others will receive a link to the web page containing the photos.

The individual twitter profile page can be challenging to personalize, however, several graphic artists have created templelates that can be modified to include company info as well as contact info such as your email, Linkedin and Friendfeed ID. Often it is easier to use a photo that will appear in the upper left corner, or set it as a tile and it will repeat to create a colorful background.

Users may be challenged by the 140 character limitation. Tweeters have the ability to repost and continue thoughts or messages longer than 140 characters, but each time a user post a tweet, the previous tweet slides further down the page.

Some users may find advantages to the fact that everything is accessible from the user's homepage so there is no blind navigating and getting lost in the network. The sidebar has information that can be helpful for users and their followers. The ability to send and receive status updates via cell phone may also appeal to more mobile users.

Bestselling author of three books, Kandi L. Bates, posts words of wisdom quotes throughout the day while Jessica Robinson, author of *Holy Seduction*, posts tweets about everything from her journeys on the road, including stops at fast food joints, to Christian devotions throughout each day.

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
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

I used to think that I wanted to know what He knew - I asked Him that ONE time, and I vowed never to ask it again. None of us will ever really understand His wavs.

midst of my "death walk" God showed me visions of being a motivational speaker/exhorter; taking in babies that others did not want or could not handle; prophesying; walking in a room and seeing demons flee. Speaking in front of a group of women and marrying a REAL man of God.

When your season of reaping manifests, when God's smile and a spotlight shines on you, when your morning comes, all

you can do is weep and stand in awe.

Noises Off is Right On!

Maxwell Debuts At No. 1

Maxwell makes big news on the Billboard 200 albums chart, entering at No. 1 with "BLACKsummers'night" and a careerhigh sales week of 316,000. It's his second chart-topper. The singer's last set, 2001's "Now," also opened at No. 1 with a then-best 296,000 copies sold.

The "Hannah Montana" parade on the Billboard 200 continues as the TV soundtrack "Hannah Montana 3" bows at No. 2 with 137,000. Earlier this year, the "Hannah Montana: the Movie" film soundtrack started at No. 2 with 139,000. The first two "Hannah" TV soundtracks both reached No. 1 on the Billboard 200 back in 2006 and 2007, respectively.

Rock band All Time Low has its all-time high week as "Nothing Personal" enters at No. 4 on the Billboard 200 with 63,000. It's the group's best sales week and highest charting album. The Hopeless Records' band took its last album, "So Wrong, It's Right," to No. 62 back in 2007.



As for the rest of the top 10 albums on the Billboard 200, the "Now 31" compilation slips two spots to No. 3 with 101,000 (down 41%), while the Black Eyed Peas' "The E.N.D." holds on at No. 5 with 63,000 (down 10%). Brad Paisley's "American Saturday Night" falls four positions to No. 6 with 44,000 (down 66% in its second week) while Rob Thomas' "Cradlesong" also falls four rungs to No. 7 with 41,000 (down 66% in its sophomore frame). Taylor Swift's "Fearless" climbs three slots to No. 8 with 36,000 (up 1%), Eminem's "Relapse" stands still at No. 9 with 34,000 (down 12%) and Jonas Brothers' "Lines, Vines and Trying Times" slips two spots to No. 10 with 34,000 (down 19%).

Overall album sales in this past chart week (ending July 12) totaled 7.27 million units, up 4.5% compared to the sum last week (6.96 million) and down 0.75% compared to the same sales week of 2008 (7.33 million). Year to date album sales stand at 188.7 million, down 14% compared to the same total at this point last year (219.5 million).



An esteemed Roman

philosopher once said, 'There is no great genius without some touch of madness." Lucius Seneca, circa 60 AD, had no idea at the time, that his cogitative commentary would span the centuries, from the glory days of Imperial Rome right into the very heart of the Plano, Texas theatre scene. Teatro delle Muse and Sibling Revelry's presentation of *Noises* Off by Michael Frayn abounds with madness and is therefore nothing short of genius. What is it about insanity that makes us laugh? This brand of British craziness is not grounded in the clinical sort of psychosis that might be found in One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest. Rather, *Noises Off* is pandemic with a more commonplace strain

of lunacy, the variety that presents itself anytime two or more (or in this case 14) people are thrown together with secrets and self interests to protect. This is a play within a play with actors playing actors. The characters they portray and the subtextual story line are of little or no consequence. The audience is allowed to see the play unfold through a voyeuristic peephole. This veneer of reality provides a behind the scenes look at actors while in the process of acting. After all, isn't acting just living out one's insanity?

With a large cast, Director Jamey Jamison, masterfully choreographs *Noises Off* with the precision of a Swiss Watch. The movements of the characters are so well timed and seamless, that the show's many moments of slapstick never feel forced or contrived. Be prepared to laugh until you hurt, especially as Act III reaches the final crescendo of the play's inevitable implosion. You will not be laughing alone.

Almost all of the actors remain on the stage (or thereabouts) during the entirety of the play. Normally, in such a large cast you would expect to find one or two actors that emerge as standouts. That's not the case here. The entire cast seems balanced, in terms of talent and comedic timing. As the story line progresses over several months, each cast member is convincing as an actor playing an actor that's been touring with this show for a long time. Their chemistry is apparent.

pecting families for cash. As many as 300 graves may have been desecrated and the bodies dumped into a mass grave, police said, but Till's was not among them.

The cemetery is owned by Tucson, Arizona-based Perpetua Inc. The scheme unraveled after authorities received a tip from a cemetery worker who was not involved.

"All of us who were working on this for the last week were pretty distraught," Cook County Sheriff Tom Dat said. "You start with the premise of your own loved ones and how they are cared for after they are buried, but there is also a true significance to this particular cemetery." A lawsuit filed on behalf of one of the families seeks appropriate reburial and damages for emotional distress.

"There should be ... a special place in hell for these graveyard thieves," said the Rev. Jesse Jackson, who appeared with authorities at a press conference at the cemetery Thursday.

Till, a Chicago native,

was kidnapped and murdered after he allegedly flirted with a White woman during a summer visit to Mississippi. Till's mother famously insisted on an open casket funeral to display her son's mutilated face.

Simeon Wright, a cousin of the slain teenager, said his family learned recently that the casket that once held their late relative had been discarded and neglected at the cemetery.

The casket that originally held Till's body was replaced after his body was exhumed in 2005 as part an investigation his death. As is customary following exhumation, the body was placed in another coffin for reburial. The Chicago Tribune reported that Till's relatives want a civil rights museum to take possession of the casket to keep it properly preserved.

In addition to Till, others buried at Burr Oak include jazz legend Dinah Washington, blues producer Willie Dixon and pianist Otis Spann.

One very active community on Twitter are authors, publishing companies and readers. In fact, one author



St. John Baptist Church **Historic Dedication**

(NDG Wire) The City of Carrollton and the Historic Preservation Advisory Committee will recognize St. John Baptist Church as the oldest African-American Baptist church in Carrollton. Representatives from both the City and the Advisory Committee will dedicate a local historical marker at 10 a.m. on Saturday, July 18.

St. John was designated historic by Carrollton City Council on March 24, 2009. The marker will officially recognize this designation.

During slavery, Negroes attended churches with their masters, many times to care for their children. After the Civil War, they were not allowed to attend church with white people.

This congregation formed circa 1890 with the original name "St. John Missionary Baptist Church" in response to this segregation. Site donated by Rev. Myers of Carrollton. It took several years for congregation to acquire funds to purchase the building, which originally sat at the corner of Crosby Road and IH-35E.

Building purchased in 1921 from Fannie Mae Bush for \$250, payable in \$25 installments. Building remodeled in 1953 to add foyer and restrooms, rebuilt in 2005 with community volunteers and donations to remedy significant dilapidation and structural defects. Building re-dedicated on January 6, 2007.

This site was once part of a vibrant, if modest, black neighborhood in south Carrollton. Services have been held continuously since 1921 except during rebuilding.


