New Black Panther, KKK Protest in Paris

(AP) Protesters angered by the dismissal of murder charges brought against two white men accused of fatally striking a black man with a pickup truck rallied outside an East Texas courthouse Monday.

About 150 people showed up for the protest,

including members of the Nation of Islam and the New Black Panther Party. Participants said they were angry at what they called a pattern of unequal justice for whites and blacks in Paris, approximately 90 miles northeast of Dallas.

(NNPA) Despite speculation of a struggle within his administration regardin President Barack Obama's ties to the African-American community, he showed up at the 100th Anniversary of the NAACP and showed out.

At points in his speech, I could not tell who Obama was and who Ben Jealous. the new CEO, was, as Obama turned country preacher and got busy giving the organization its marching orders.

He said that Blacks had made extraordinary progress,

but there are still the barriers of HIV/Aids, disproportionate imprisonment, unemployment and health care. He seemed to understand that in eliminating those structural inequalities, there was a balance between what he could do and what the Black community might do.

So, he talked about fixing the economy and health care reform, but featured his initiatives on education. He gave the impression that "No child left behind" was left behind, not mentioning it once, and changed the infer-

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Addressing America's Healthcare Disparities

BY CLAYOLA BROWN For success, national healthcare reform must address access, quality and affordability issues in a comprehensive approach. Providing health care for all

must also recognize and address health disparities that exist among minority populations. According to the Children's Defense Fund, for

dren's Defense Fund, for example, black children in the United States are five times more likely to die from asthma than white peers. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, more than half of all uninsured Americans are racial minorities.

A study by the Mount Sinai School of Medicine recently found that black women are more likely to have low birth weight babies, a condition linked to infant mortality.

A study by the Commonwealth Fund discov- mi

ence that the state of our school "is an African American problem" but an American problem that is the responsibility of our leaders.

Obama wants to strengthen community colleges to bear more of the challenge of job training, institute a "race to the top" fund to give learning incentive to children in public schools and pilot programs that feature innovative college preparation.

I liked his urging for us to elevate more examples of professional excellence in fields other than athletics and entertainment as the basis for educational achievement.

True to form, Obama returned to the familiar theme of personal responsibility. But this time I noticed that the audience seemed somewhat weary. Perhaps it is because most Blacks have climbed up the rough side of the mountain and have mostly been very responsible considering the tremendous odds they have faced.

Black audiences therefore, may be growing tired of the

ered that half of all black Americans suffer from a chronic illness or disability, the highest rate among all racial groups. Meanwhile, the Journal of Epidemiology and Community Health found that blacks have a 30 percent higher death rate than whites.

In 2006 U.S. Surgeon General David Satcher concluded about 84,000 deaths every year could be prevented if gaps in mortality between blacks and whites were eliminated.

There are numerous causes for these disparities, but one major factor is a lack of access to appropriate medical care among minorities. Public hospitals, for instance, admit more minority patients than whites for conditions that could have been treated much earlier by a primary care physician.

This situation places millions at risk and severely

strains our nation's medical resources.

That is why comprehensive healthcare reform requires an effort to give minority patients access to primary care. This means establishing more primary care facilities in minority communities so that patients in those communities can address health problems early, before they precipitate into more serious conditions.

But it cannot stop there. The profound differences between white and minority medical outcomes can also be linked to a lack of cultural competency among healthcare professionals.

Many in the medical community do not possess the necessary knowledge of various minority cultures that is needed to properly diagnose, treat, and communicate with minority patients.

It is for this reason the

medical profession should welcome more minorities into its ranks. From physicians, to nurse practitioners, and hospital administrators, the more diverse the healthcare community is, the better-equipped the healthcare community will be to address the unique challenges that minorities face to stay healthy.

But it's important to note that many of these challenges aren't race-specific. This is why efforts to decrease healthcare disparities should just be a part of a much more comprehensive reform plan that provides all Americans with broader access to affordable, high-quality healthcare.

The Pharmaceutical Industry Labor-Management Association, an organization comprised of organized labor and America's phar-

preaching and expect someone with a large White House megaphone would also remind America of this fact.

Nevertheless, while he presented both halves of the balance of responsibility to energize Black progress, both government the Black community, the private sector seldom gets included (except by those who discuss Reparations) while it has the largest responsibility as providers of critical resources such as housing, employment and wealth.

Obama could have said more about this in reforming the economy, by sending some of that TARP money to community banks to expand credit for depressed neighborhoods.

The opportunity to say more about private sector responsibility was missed even though Obama's NAACP speech was given on the very day the Senate was discussing his nomination of Judge Sonia Sotomayor to the Supreme Court and the major highlight of those hearings was the Ricci case featuring Affirmative Action.

Although Obama may have been advised to take a pass because his advisers believed that an errant comment by him could have been damaging to the judge, an NAACP audience still needed to hear that Affirmative Action was not dead, that it is still needed and that his Administration was committed to it.

I liked the strategy that Obama laid out which gave the NAACP the role of making the White House do what is right, in other words, being the legitimate protagonist for an agenda of civil and human rights.

It strikes me that is the right posture, not just for a Black president but for any president, as was discussed during the campaign about his fidelity to the Black Agenda.

But being a protagonist at a time when there is a historymaking event such as a popular Black man sitting in the White House takes courage and thus far, little courage has been in evidence by any of the Black leadership. Maybe that is because when you attempt to broach the issue of accountability, even by accident, you are disbarred from the black community – ask Rev. Jesse Jackson, Tavis Smiley, and others.

Will the NAACP be up to the role of the legitimate protagonist? I don't know because historically, it has also depended upon access to the White House as a currency of its leadership, and that currency could be eroded by the alienation that naturally comes from strong opposition.

So, maybe this is not just a role for the NAACP, but all of our organizations to take seriously the task of "tough love" toward the administration, a role that gives strong support when it is right on our issues and strong opposition when the need is clearly there, but nothing happens. What more can anyone ask?

During Immunization Awareness Month, **Neonatal Care and Vaccination Go Hand in Hand**

At first glance, the numbers are dispiriting: African Americans have 2.3-times the infant mortality rate as non-Hispanic White Americans. African Americans are four-times as likely to die of complications related to low birth weight as Caucasian infants.

These statistics from the Office of Minority Health paint a bleak picture, one that is further reinforced by the fact that African American mothers are 2.6-times more likely than Caucasian mothers to begin prenatal care late or not at all.

With that in mind, it's time for a dose of encouragement. So, let the change begin in August during National Immunization Awareness Month.

What do infant mortality and immunization have in common? A lot, in fact. Neonatal care begins well before a baby is born and helps to ensure that an infant is born healthy.

Immunization begins during a baby's first months and ensures that a child remains healthy. Failure to receive either effective neonatal care or early immunization can go a long way toward contributing to infant and early-childhood mortality.

Sadly, African Americans with lower incomes lag behind when it comes to immunization as well.

A recent survey from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) National Immunization found that only 73.9 percent of African American children received a complete series of recommended vaccinations compared with 77.4 percent of Hispanic children and 77.9 percent of Caucasian children.

The CDC explained the

disparity this way: Children who live below the poverty level are less likely to be vaccinated than children who live at or above the poverty level. Because a substantial percentage of black children live below the poverty level, coverage for black children overall is low compared with white children.



CDC recommends an immunization schedule for children aged birth through six years suggests timely vaccination against hepatitis A and B, diphtheria tetanus-pertussis, polio, measles-mumps-rubella and other potentially serious or deadly diseases is essential. The schedule, which all parents should study, may be found at: www.cdc.gov/vaccines/recs/schedules.

Additionally, United-Healthcare's Source4Women (www.uhc.com/source4wo men) offers guidelines on childhood immunizations as well, and your local library can help you investigate important vaccination information and schedules.

To encourage increased immunization compliance, the CDC highlights several programs at www.cdc.gov:

• Immunization Information Systems, which consolidates immunization information in one location and identifies populations at high risk for vaccine-preventable diseases and targeting interventions;

• the Vaccines for Children, initiative provides free vaccines to doctors who serve eligible children;

• Immunization Program Evaluation, which explores whether immunization activities are implemented as planned and outcomes have occurred as intended.

Also important is the National Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies Coalition (www.hmhb.org), promoting efforts to encourage greater acceptance and use of immunization.

The Coalition is committed to building partnerships at the local, state and national levels and increasing knowledge and understanding of immunization needs and practices among health care providers as well as the general public.

Clearly, immunization is among the most significant public health achievements ever. Through the years vaccines have eradicated smallpox, virtually eliminated wild poliovirus in the U.S., and significantly reduced the number of reported cases of measles and other diseases. It is one of the most effective means available to protect children and adults from many common infectious diseases

At the same time, keeping children healthier by immunizing lowers the associated social and financial costs for many families, including time lost from school and work and the cost of medical bills.

Although regular and timely immunization can be slightly inconvenient, such inconvenience pales compared with the health challenges that will arise if your child develops a serious preventable disease.

Timely neonatal care also is essential to ensure that a baby is born healthy and gets a good start in life.

If you are not receiving proper neonatal care, begin today. If your children are not in full compliance with their immunizations, begin to correct that today.

As our own parents said when we were young and receiving vaccinations, it's better to be safe than sorry.

Center Enlisted in Fight Against Child Brain Injuries

(NDG Wire) University of Texas at Dallas (UTD researchers and clinicians are joining a nationwide effort to address the leading cause of death and disability for children and young adults in the U.S. — brain injury.

The UTD Center for BrainHealth was named a lead center of excellence for research and treatment of Pediatric Acquired Brain Injury (PABI) by the Sarah Jane Brain Foundation.

The foundation, nam-

ed for an infant whose caretaker shook her so violently that she suffered severe brain damage, has created a nationwide plan for an integrated system of care for children suffering from traumatic brain injury. This plan calls for 52 lead centers of excellence that will work together and with other institutions in their states to address pediatric brain injury.

The 52 centers - one in every state plus the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico - will be responsible for services that provide prevention, education, treatment, rehabilitation and research. They will also each develop a statewide master plan for their states to address care and case management for families.

These institutions consist of many top-rated children's hospitals, research universities and health advocacy organizations staffed by the best pediatric neurologists and rehabilitation experts in the country.

The program, which is funded with a \$1.08 million seed grant from The Walton Family Foundation of Bentonville, Arkansas, is a pilot initiative established to build a pipeline of talented African American college graduates equipped to enter careers that apply social entrepreneurship principles to reforming elementary and secondary education.

Tiffany Singleton, the UNCF Director for Social Entrepreneurship Programs, will oversee and manage the implementation of the program. Singleton is a Harvard

The UNCE K-12 Social Entrepreneurship Fellowship Program will address one of the most significant challenges facing social entrepreneurship today – the lack of racial and ethnic diversity among those in leadership positions.

> "Social entrepreneurs are society's change agents, and we know from past experience that solutions developed for the benefit of diverse populations are most effective if the change agents and innovators themselves come from the populations they seek to serve," said Michael Lomax, Ph.D., UNCF President and CEO. "As the nation's largest provider of financial assistance to minority and low-income college students, UNCF is committed to becoming a top producer

of African American educational entrepreneurs and school leaders who are committed to improving minority education from pre-school through college.'

"The Walton Family Foundation is pleased to support the development of the UNCF K-12 Social Entrepreneurship Fellowship Program," said Kathleen de-Laski, a senior education program officer. "This initiative is consistent with the Foundation's mission of expanding educational opportunities and the Walton family's goal of making a difference in communities by addressing K-12 education reform."

Social entrepreneurs use entrepreneurial and business principles - and an innovative spirit - to seize opportunities to improve systems, invent new approaches and create data-driven, outcomebased solutions to societal

challenges that have resisted previous efforts at change.

The lack of diversity in leadership is a significant problem in the area of K-12 education reform. The primary goal of the UNCF K-12 Social Entrepreneurship Fellowship Program is to cultivate a pool of young change agents and innovators who can foster increased racial diversity among the leadership and managers of educational reform organizations that focus on increasing the number of low-income and minority students who are prepared for and pursuing a college degree.

In its pilot phase, the UNCF K-12 Social Entrepreneurship Fellowship Program will be offered to juniors attending five to-be-selected UNCF schools. Two cohorts of 15 fellows each will be

COLLEGE CORNER Academic Competitiveness Grant

The Academic Competitiveness Grant was made available for the first time for the 2006-2007 school year for first-year college students who graduated from high school after January 1, 2006, and for second-year college students who graduated from high school after January 1, 2005.

The amount of the ACG, when combined with a Pell Grant, may not exceed the student's cost of attendance. In addition, if the number of eligible students is large enough that payment of the full grant amounts would exceed the program appropriation in any fiscal year, then the amount of the grant to each eligible student may be ratably reduced.

To be eligible for each academic year, a student must be a U.S. citizen or eligible non-citizen; be a Federal Pell Grant recipient; and be a first or secondyear undergraduate student or a student in a certificate program of at least one year in a degree program at a two-year or four-year degree-granting institution.

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Analysis: Gates' Arrest a Signpost on Racial Road

If this man can be taken away by police officers from the porch of his own home, what does it say about the treatment that average blacks can expect in 2009?

(AP) It took less than a day for the arrest of Henry Louis Gates to become racial lore. When one of America's most prominent black intellectuals winds up in handcuffs, it's not just another episode of profiling - it is a signpost on the nation's bumpy road to equality.

The news was parsed and Tweeted, rued and debated. This was, after all Henry "Skip" Gates: Summa cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Yale. MacArthur "genius grant" recipient. Acclaimed historian, Harvard professor and PBS documentarian. One of Time magazine's "25 Most Influential Americans" in 1997. Holder of 50 honorary degrees.

If this man can be taken away by police officers from the porch of his own home, what does it say about the treatment that average blacks can expect in 2009?

Earl Graves Jr., CEO of the company that publishes Black Enterprise magazine, was once stopped by police during his train commute to work, dressed in a suit and tie

"My case took place back in 1995, and here we are 14 years later dealing with the same madness,' he said Tuesday. "Barack Obama being the president has meant absolutely nothing to white law enforcement officers. Zero. So I have zero confidence that (Gates' case) will lead to any change whatsoever."

The 58-year-old professor had returned from a trip to China last Thursday afternoon and found the front door of his Cambridge, Mass., home stuck shut. Gates entered the back door, forced open the front door with help from a car service driver, and was on the phone with the Harvard leasing company when a white police sergeant arrived.

Gates and the sergeant gave differing accounts of what happened next. But for many people, that does not matter.

They do not care that Gates was charged not with breaking and entering, but with disorderly conduct after repeatedly demanding the sergeant's name and badge number.

It does not matter whether Gates was yelling, or accused Sgt. James Crowley of being racist, or that all charges were dropped Tuesday.

All they see is pure, naked racial profiling.

"Under any account ... all of it is totally uncalled for," said Graves.

"It never would have happened - imagine a white professor, a distinguished white professor at Harvard, walking around with a cane, going into his own house, being harassed or stopped by the police. It would never happen."

Racial profiling became a national issue in the 1990s, when highway police on major drug deof stopping drivers simply for being black. Lawsuits were filed, studies were commissioned, data was analyzed. "It is wrong, and we will end it in America," President George W. Bush said in 2001.

Yet for every study that concluded police disproportionately stop, search and arrest minorities, another expert came to a different conclusion.

"That's always going to be the case," Dr. Greg Ridgeway, who has a Ph.D in statistics and studies racial profiling for the RAND research group, said on Monday. "You're never going to be able to (statistically) prove racial profiling. ... There's always a plausible explanation."

Federal legislation to ban racial profiling has languished since being introduced in 2007 by a dozen Democratic senators, including then-Sen. Barack Obama.

According to U.S. Rep. Danny Davis, D-Ill., that was partly because "when you look at statistics, and you're trying to prove the extent, the information comes back that there's not nearly as much (profiling) as we continue to experience."

But Davis has no doubt that profiling is real: He says he was stopped while driving in Chicago in 2007 for no reason other than the fact he is black.

Police gave him a ticket for swerving over the center line; a judge said the ticket didn't make sense and dismissed it.

"Trying to reach this balance of equity, equal treatment, equal protection under the law, equal understanding, equal opportunity, is something that

we will always be confronted with. We may as well be prepared for it," he said.

Amid the indignation over Gates' case, a few people pointed out that he may have violated the cardinal rule of avoiding arrest: Do not antagonize the cops.

The police report said that Gates yelled at the officer, refused to calm down and behaved in a "tumultuous" manner.

Gates said he simply asked for the officer's identification, followed him into his porch when the information was not forthcoming, and was arrested for no reason. But something about being asked to prove that you live in your own home clearly struck a nerve both for Gates and his defenders.

"You feel violated, embarrassed, not sure what is taking place, especially

when you haven't done anything," said Graves of his own experience, when police made him face the wall and frisked him in Grand Central Station in New York City. "You feel shocked, then you realize what's happening, and then you feel it's a violation of everything you stand for."

And that this should happen to "Skip" Gates the unblemished embodiment of President Obama's recent admonition to black America not to search for handouts or favors, but to "seize our own future, each and every day" shook many people to the core.

Wrote Lawrence Bobo, Gates' Harvard colleague, who picked his friend up from jail: "Ain't nothing post-racial about the United States of America."

Rarely does a day's news cycle fail to remind us of the current economic downturn.

Seemingly no one is spared from the constant barrage of commentary that prices are high, wages are low, unemployment is rampant and factories everywhere are closing. And oh yes, consumer confidence is now measured in degrees of consumer uncertainty.

Thankfully, escape from these harsh realities lies just around the corner at your local air-conditioned multiplex where the latest multi-million dollar blockbusters are showing for the price of a drive thru combo meal. Super-sized. Fight the urge to escape!

Instead go see Theatre Three's production of Woody Guthrie's American Song, a musical biography of the late Woody Guthrie. This show will take you back in time to the Great Depression of the 1930s, when prices were high, wages were low and 25 per cent of the country was thrown out of work. Do we need more of the same?

Yes, the inspirational message of the two-dozen songs performed, a mere fraction of the 3,000 song lyrics written by the late folk singer, is that the American working man and woman have an indomitable spirit.

That acute observer of the Depression-era depressed, author John Steinbeck, once wrote about Mr. Guthrie, "...there is nothing sweet about Woody, and there is nothing sweet about the songs he sings. But there is something more important for those who still listen. There is the will of a peo-

American Song ple to endure and fight against oppression. I think

we call this the American spirit."

To quote John Steinbeck here is completely appropriate. The set and costumes designed by Bruce R. Coleman will have you searching the program for a character named Tom Joad. Theatre Three's basement space has all the trappings of an Oklahoma dustbowl without the dust

The ensemble cast, performed well together musically.

Daniel Svoboda, Willy Welch and Doug Jackson on banjo exhibited great versatility on several different instruments. Christine Harpine was an absolute virtuoso on the violin, though she mostly remained off-stage, and that is unfortunate.

Vocally, there were a couple of "dead spots" where the lyrics seemed to drop to the floor before reaching the other side of the room, especially as the actors moved around the limited basement space.

However, the vocal quality of N. Wilson King stood out among her cast mates in terms of richness and consistency. Alexander Roos singing "Dust Storm Disaster" was among my favorite numbers perform-ed. "We loaded our jalopies and piled our families in, we rattled down that highway to never come back again." Maybe Tom Joad was

there after all.

Chris Brown Apologizes for Rihanna Beating

(AP) Chris Brown on Monday publicly apologized for the beating of Rihanna, saying in a two-minute video that he's still seeking help and wants to live his life as a role model.

Brown released the video on his website apologizing to fans and saying he is sad and ashamed of his conduct. He also tells viewers that he has repeatedly apologized to Rihanna.

Brown was arrested Feb. 8, hours after he fought with his then-girlfriend in a rented sports car after a pre-Grammy party. According to a police affidavit, Brown tried to push the 21-year-old Barbadosborn singer from the car and repeatedly hit her and choked her.

He left the scene and later

turned himself in to authorities during the Grammy Awards, where he and Rihanna were slated to perform. He was later charged with assault likely to cause great bodily harm and making criminal threats. He pleaded guilty to the felony assault charge last month and faces sentencing Aug. 5.

He is slated to serve five years of probation and perform six months of community labor.

On the video, Brown calls the beating "the incident." He vows to conduct interviews and answer some questions about the beating, but said he wanted to speak directly to fans first.

"I felt it was time you that heard directly from me that I am sorry," he says on the video.

"I saw firsthand what uncontrolled rage can do," he tells viewers. "I have sought

vention July 16, Obama fielded a range of questions.

When Kevin Chappell, a senior reporter at *Ebony*, referenced the disparaging comments by Michael Steele, chair of the Republican National Committee, Obama said, "I think Mr. Steele should focus on the Republican Party."

What the President chose to focus on at the moment was entrepreneurship and urban affairs, "and we must particularly target communities most in need."

Equally important to the administration is health care and Obama responded to Cynthia Gordy of Essence magazine that "it is critical that we close some of these gaps in health care for all Americans, but particularly for Blacks and Latinos," where the incidence of HIV/AIDS is disproportionately high.

As the veritable flying White House touched down, Obama elaborated on health care reform in response to a question from BET.com's Pamela Gentry concerning the impact of his plans on African-Americans and the single-payer option.

"We don't have a final bill yet," Obama began, "And as I've said before, there are countries where single-payer plans have worked well, but we have a tradition of an employerbased health care system...if people are happy with their health care, we don't want to change it.

"But for those who don't have health care because their employer doesn't offer it, then they have an option," Obama added. "And we are confident that the bill we produce will provide a level of subsidy that will guarantee affordable health care for all Americans."

With the NAACP on his agenda, as a reporter with the Amsterdam News,

I wanted to know the extent to which he would deal with race relations, reminding him of a recent comment by Julian Bond, chairman of the NAACP's board While Obama's daughters can fly on Air Force One, little Black girls in the suburbs of Philadelphia were recently banned from a swimming pool, Bond observed.

"Obviously, this is a reminder that because of my election that racism is no longer an issue in America, and that is not true," Obama asserted. What needs to be done to eradicate the racial disparity, he continued, promising to address this issue during his speech at the NAACP, was "to improve substandard schools ... to focus on economic parity, economic development and access to higher education."

Derek Dingle, editorin-chief of Black Enterprise, keyed his question to the condition of small businesses and to what degree they could expect support from the Obama administration.

"First of all," Obama said, "we are focusing on small businesses already. The Small Business Administration (SBA) has increased its guarantees in terms of lending and it has been much more aggressive in trying to fill the gap as private lending contracted." He recounted a recent meeting with minority automobile dealers to discuss their plight.

"And the SBA is one of the primary tools to make sure those minority dealers are able to get the money they need to operate a show room." It was a point that was clarified by Valerie Garrett, one of his chief aids at the roundtable.

Obama believed that the main problem confronting small and minority businesses was not so much the lack of capital, despite its critical importance, but the overall dismal shape of the economy.

Foreign policy and Africa were among several issues posed by April Ryan of American Urban Radio, and the president listened intently.

"In terms of foreign policy, that's one of the reasons I just came back from Ghana," he stated, "and that was to focus attention on the fact that Africa was not just a side note in our foreign policy, but a central concern of our administration."

The economic development and good governance are among some of the key points in providing aid to African nations, Obama stressed, and he mainly reiterated a policy he outlined during his speech before the Ghanaian parliament.

Commentator Roland Martin of CNN had the final question and he touch-ed on the issue of vouchers and education,

which the president agreed was the most important issue for the African-American community.

"If we can close the achievement gap, then a big chunk of the economic inequality is diminished,"

Obama noted. "We have got to get our kids up to speed. Now, how do we do that? Better teachers, greater accountability, more resources combined with more reform."

He then invoked his Secretary of Education Arne Duncan and applauded his push for more aggressive reforms.

We were on the ground for 15 minutes and gradually Obama was surrounded by his aides, beckoning him for departure to the next stop in New Jersey and then on to the NAACP where much of what Obama shared with the reporters would be revisited with gusto at the Hilton.

It nearly turned violent when one man swiped at a self-identified Klansman named Rock Banks. Banks, who said he is a grand titan in the East Texas Ku Klux Klan, was holding a small patch displaying a Nazi-era Iron Cross.

Sheriff's deputies escorted Banks and others away from the scene while protesters called him "cracker" and shouted curse words. No one was arrested.

The protest was organized last week after a special prosecutor, citing a lack of evidence, had charges dismissed against Shannon Finley and Charles Crostley, who were accused of killing their friend Brandon McClelland.

His mangled body was found September 16 on a country road, and authorities estimated it had been dragged more than 70 feet beneath a vehicle.

The two former suspects were released Thursday with no restrictions

after more than eight months in jail.

McClelland's mother, Jacquline, said she believes Crostley and Finley were guilty of running down her

Senator West is calling on postal officials to allow more time for public input. There are no plans to re-open the public comment period.

Texas Workforce Commission Will Expedite Payments of State Extended Benefits

(NDG Wire) Recently the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) announced that it will begin paying benefits to jobless Texans who qualify for 13 weeks of state extended benefits by the end of July. TWC will begin sending letters to claimants beginning July 24, 2009 with instructions on how to file for the new extension. A dedicated telephone hot line will be established to take claims.

At the direction of the governor, TWC worked with the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) to expedite payments for eligible Texans after realizing it would have taken months to reprogram computers to address the extensive eligibility and reporting requirements.

"Earlier this week upon learning that extensive federal eligibility verification and reporting requirements could delay extended unemployment benefit payments to eligible Texans, my office directed the Texas Workforce Commission to address the problem and find a solution to provide Texans with timely benefits," said Gov. Rick Perry. "I am pleased TWC has worked with the Department of Labor on a solution that will allow eligible Texans to begin receiving extended unemployment benefits by July 31, without the months of delay that had initially been predicted."

Chairman Pauken added, "I and my fellow Commissioners learned as well this week of a potential gap in the payment to claimants entitled to extended benefits. I immediately instructed staff to come up with a plan to expedite the payments of those benefits. Specifically, I asked staff to come forward with a solution to this problem so that benefits could begin to be paid by the end of this month. I am pleased that the TWC staff has taken the necessary action to get this accomplished."

Since the end of May, after Gov. Perry worked with the Legislature to change the law to allow for state extended benefits, the agency began addressing the necessary transition of the system to accommodate the stringent federal requirements. Through an agreement with DOL, TWC will be allowed to temporarily defer certain federal requirements, allowing for immediate payment of extended benefits to thousands of long-term unemployed Texans.

This 13-week state extension is available to claimants that have exhausted 59 weeks of unemployment benefits. TWC estimates that as many as 100,000 claimants could exhaust their unemployment benefits by November 2009 and may be eligible for the new extension.

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10 Recession Gardening How-Tos'

While many are pinching pennies amid the economic downturn, there are a number of thrifty ways to manage a garden and landscape to ensure it looks good and flourishes while also costing less to maintain.

1) Plant perennials instead of annuals. Annuals are short lived, use excessive water and must be replaced.

2) Eliminate your lawn where you are not using it. Lawns are one of the most intensive maintenance and water consuming plantings in a landscape, requiring weekly mowing, edging and recurrent irrigation.

3) Leave lawn clippings - don't bag. Lawn clippings contain water and nutrients that can benefit your lawn. The result is a need for less water; fertilizer and you don't need to pay for landscape debris removal or dumping.

4) Prune naturally instead of formally. When you prune for the natural growth habit of the plant you will reduce the amount of pruning needed per year, resulting in decreased costs. Hedging and balling your plants will create a need for frequent pruning, and the tools and/or professional landscape maintenance services that goes with it.

5) Cut back on water. Reduce your watering schedule to the bare minimum required to keep the yard and garden healthy.

Over watering can cause excessive growth, requiring even more maintenance, a higher water bill and a greater instance of disease.

6) Fix irrigation problems. Keeping an eye on the condition of your irrigation system, including leaks, overspray, broken heads, incorrect water pressure and trajectory problems, you can reduce your water costs while also avoiding water damage to your home and hardscape. 7) Apply a ground cover

mulch to cut down on weeds, and the need to purchase weed killers and the time to apply, and also water usage.

8) Select drought tolerant plants. Native plants will need less water and maintenance.

9) Put the right plant in the right spot. Install plants that can grow to maturity where they are planted with minimal care or pruning.

10) Fertilize modestly. Fertilize only as needed based on the requirements of your individual plants. If you have good soil, some of your plants may need little or no fertilizer.

Not only is over-fertilizing expensive and time consuming, it can also require more water and cause excessive growth resulting in increased maintenance needs. An over-abundance of nitrogen and other fertilizer ingredients can also readily kill the plant material on which it was applied.
