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Ed Welburn

(NNPA) Innovative design, understanding, and the importance of diversity are guiding philosophies for General Motors Vice President of Global Design, Ed Welburn. "Exposure. Reading. Travel, whenever possible...and don't be afraid to take risks," says Welburn about the preparation for living and working in an increasingly global world.

Since 2003, Welburn, 59, is only the sixth design leader in General Motors'

history and heads what may be the largest design organization in the world. He leads 10 design centers in eight countries and manages 1,500 creative personalities. It's not uncommon to find Welburn at a 6 a.m. design review or on a late night conference call -- he is, after all, accommodating the world's time zones. Design is around the clock work at a global company.

After the well-publicized news of General Motors' financial woes, subse-

quent bailout and new stock offering, the company is maintaining its commitment to design. And Welburn is leading the effort.

Welburn, one of the highest-ranking Black automobile executives in the world, says much of his inspiration comes from his background. Welburn has loved automobiles since he was a child when his father, a car enthusiast himself, took him to an auto show in Philadelphia.

Welburn received his art training from Howard University in Washington, D.C. He attended the historically Black college in the early 1970s and said the "interdisciplinary" aspect of the experience prepared him for his current role that an art school could not have.

"Life began to open up quite a bit for me when I went to Howard University. The School of Fine Arts was a fascinating place [to be.] Art, music and drama...with students like Debbie Allen, Roberta Flack, Phylicia Rashad and Donny Hathaway," said Welburn in an interview with the Black Press. He recalls hearing Flack play the piano when he was on his way to class and believes his time at Howard contributed to his creative development.

Welburn said studying sculpture at Howard made his drawings much "looser" and him a better designer. "Some of my favorite courses were the life drawing classes. Some of my first drawings were stiff and mechanical but by the time I left, my work had more emotion, passion...good car design has passion."

There were 192,370 women in the United States diagnosed with invasive breast cancer in 2009.

Safe, effective and (almost) painless flu shots are a no-brainer decision

(NDG Wire) Ever driven the family across town for all-you-can-eat barbecue and dessert buffet? Congratulations! You've already faced more expense, physical discomfort and health risk than a decade's worth of seasonal influenza shots.

So if you're an immunization holdout, the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) has an urgent message for you: It's flu season again, shots are available and none of the standard excuses for avoiding them hold water.

For example, DSHS' Dr. Bob Kaspar says there's no record of anyone getting flu from a flu shot — ever. "We use inactivated vaccines [containing killed viruses] in the shots. And when you're vaccinated it may reduce the risk of infecting other people with high-risk conditions."

And if you're relying on the old "I don't need shots because I never get the flu" excuse, Kaspar notes that influenza strains vary from year to year. Even in the (unlikely) case that you had some natural resistance to last year's flu, this year's model still could flatten you like a steamroller.

Some people, Kaspar acknowledged, are in great health and just not that worried about flu. "They should be concerned, though, if only for their kids, friends, co-workers and strangers they come in contact with. For all of



these people, seasonal flu means a week or more of lost school, lost work time and maybe even lost pay." The DSHS is hopeful that the 2010 flu season will be milder than last year and include no unusual threat on par with the H1N1 cases of last year. But even "regular" flu can pose a serious risk for children, the elderly and folks with chronic health conditions such as heart or lung disease, kidney disease, neurologic disorders or suppressed immune systems.

Other groups with elevated risk include pregnant women and people who are obese (with Body Mass Indexes of 40 or higher).


"Also, for reasons we don't fully understand, some perfectly healthy people without any high-risk conditions may become extremely ill and even die from influenza," Kaspar said. "It's worth protecting yourself regardless of your health status."

Even people who've had their shots should practice smart prevention strate-

gies at home, at work or in public. Learn more about these steps at TexasFlu.org. In addition to those tips, try to stay as warm as you can this winter. Although sweaters and mittens aren't quite the mighty weapons against flu that our parents and teachers once believed, Kaspar conceded that, "Mom wasn't totally wrong. There does seem to

be an association between cold weather, low humidity and respiratory infection."

As great as prevention is, the best way to avoid seasonal flu is to get your shots. If there's no program available in your workplace or school, call 2-1-1 or DSHS' toll-free hotline, 800-252-9152. You also can Google Flu Vaccine Finder to find a clinic.

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

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Former Dallas Cowboy, Robert Newhouse suffers a stroke and proving to be a champion in life

Robert Newhouse is one of the few athletes within the Dallas Cowboy team's franchise who carry the elite title of a football superstar and legend. Newhouse began his professional foot-

ball career with the Dallas Cowboys in 1972, where he was the second round draft pick. During his football glory days, nicknames like "The House" and "The Human Bowling Ball" were given to describe his incomparable physical strength as a fullback and running back throughout his tenure with the Dallas Cowboys.

Fans everywhere admired his amazing 44-inch thighs, which made it impossible

for opponents to knock him down. On July 7, 2010, Newhouse suffered a stroke and to no avail it was also unsuccessful in knocking him down

After having dinner with his wife Nancy of over 30 years, Newhouse began to feel ill and attributed it to complications with his diabetes in which he was diagnosed eight years ago. Newhouse drove home and

into the hospital on his own and was unaware he had suffered a stroke until the following day.

"My left side was numb and I had no feeling or control. I could not move my leg or my arm," adds Newhouse in a phone interview. The former Cowboy faces new challenges and is committed to the physical therapy program at Baylor Institute for Rehabilitation. Newhouse meets with a physical therapist once a week for almost eight hours. The physical therapy in-

volves: speech, occupational and aquatic therapy.

"I cannot use my left arm or walk. It is hard for me to push a cotton ball and I know the reality is it is going to take time because I am in many ways starting over," explains Newhouse.

"It is important to go to the doctor when something is wrong and go have a check-up on a regular

basis. Also it is very important that we educate ourselves on the warning signs, so a person knows when something is wrong," ad-



Physical therapy is not the only thing Newhouse is relying on with respect to getting back to full health. His faith, family, and friends are also critical components to his recovery.

Newhouse wife, children, former coaches and teammates have all been encouraging and supportive throughout his journey to full recovery.

"I am blessed to have a great family of wonderful caregivers. It has also been encouraging to hear from my former high school and college coaches, as well as former teammates like Roger Staubach, Too Tall Jones, and Drew Pearson."

After retiring from football, Newhouse joined the Dallas Cowboy organization where he served in Alumni Affairs and in the role of Player Development where he worked with new teammates to help them successfully transition into becoming a professional athlete.

Newhouse retired from the Dallas Cowboy organization after serving a total of 29 years (12 years as an athlete and 17 in Administration)

"Robert Newhouse has always been a very important part of our family. Robert happens to be one of the few individuals who have made such a contribution to the Dallas Cowboy organization both as a player and an administrator.

He is a man who led by example both off and on the field and the significant contributions he has made will be invaluable to the Dallas Cowboy players for generations," states, Rich Dalrymple, Dallas Cowboy's Vice President of Public Relations

Newhouse must now wear a pacemaker and defibrillator and has to walk with a cane. Although, he has encountered some physical changes, his will and determination has not changed.

The same champion who made an incredible play when he threw a 29-yard touchdown pass in Super Bowl XII, which led to a win over the Denver Broncos, is still making incredible plays just on a different field, the Baylor Institute for Rehabilitation.

And like the football field this new field has cheerleaders on the sideline cheering him onto victory.

"Robert Newhouse is a humble man and a man of great character. I am honored to call him my friend and he is a true champion both on the field and off," states Anthony Bonds, Chairman of the Irving Education Coalition (IEC) and founder of the Irving NAACP Chapter.

leaders in Washington know that political squabbling will do little to heal people's economic pain in the aftermath of one of the longest recessions since World War II.

"I came here to support the cause of the march," Derrick Griffin, 43, said. "Our leaders here in D.C. should be about saving jobs and trying to put forth the change we voted for in 2008," the Fort Washington, Md., resident said.

Event organizers estimated that 175,000 people gathered on a slightly breezy, but clear day to show a united front. They came from all walks of life and economic circumstances. Participants included the employed and unemployed, union workers and environmentalists, civil rights leaders and civic leaders, war veterans and peace activists, student leaders and those from the gay, lesbian, transgender community.

Speakers at the event included the Rev. Jesse Jackson of the Rainbow/Push Coalition, National Urban League President Marc Morial, NAACP President Benjamin Jealous, Rev. Al Sharpton of the National Action Network – all of whom stressed the need for jobs and emphasized the urgency of the situation.

The crowd congregated on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial and fanned out onto the grounds of the Washington Monument. There were throngs of people on both sides of the Reflecting Pool as well as those who hunkered down around the World War II Memorial.

The marchers may have been from different parts of the country, but the common thread among all who attended focused on their financial pain and the lack of jobs. Jeffrey Dunkin, 53, traveled from New York City to attend the march and to show support for fellow New Yorkers who are suffering in his home town.

"I want to help people that have lost their jobs," said Dunkin, who lives in Brooklyn. "Things do not look good in New York City and I know a lot of unemployed people. I hope this march will help secure more jobs for the unemployed because things are not looking good."

Trea Buck, a high school science teacher in Harrisburg, said that 57 teachers have been laid off since the 2010-2011 school year started. "I am here for my fallen brethren. Our school system has had to undergo a lot of cuts," said Buck, 39, and a resident of Harrisburg.

"Teachers who were emergency certified were cut and many of us will have to be furloughed at some point. Plus, our school system administration was cut in half," he said.

Buck said that she traveled to Washington to advocate not only for her fellow colleagues, but for the next generation. "What are we going to do for the children," she said, "How are these cuts going to support our future?"

A weak economy and a struggling school system have plagued Detroit for years. Members of the Metro Detroit Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta traveled to the District to voice their opinions during the rally.

"We came to show our support for President Obama and to stand up for jobs, justice, and education," Mardi Woods, president of the chapter, said.

"We also have a get out the vote effort to make sure our voices are heard on Nov. 2."

Woods, 42, and a resident of Farmington Hills, Mich., outside of Detroit, said that the Motor City has been hit hard by a high rate of home foreclosures and job layoffs. She said that the layoffs, particularly in the school system, have adversely affected her members. "Many of our members are educators and Deltas are at the table when these things happen," she said.

The Detroit Public School system laid-off nearly 1,000 school personnel last August due to budgetary problems. However, the action was stopped when money was located due to retirements.

A number of youth groups also attended the rally. They contend that young people care about what is going on in the country. Leilani Irvin, a senior political science major at Benedict College in Columbia, S.C., said that young people have been particularly

hurt by the struggling economy. "I know of many of my former school mates, who graduated in May, are still looking for jobs," Irvin, 21, said.

"This is a crisis with youth. I read where 27 percent of college graduates cannot find a job and I don't think my employment prospects for the spring will be better."

There is a belief that the retired are not affected by the economic downturn, but Kenneth Davis, a retired autoworker from Detroit disagrees. "I came to this march because too many people are

suffering," Davis, 54, said.
"As a member of the United Auto Workers Union, those of us who receive retirement benefits had to give up our dental [coverage]. That is not right that we are giving up concessions to the auto companies while their profits are going up."

Today, Welburn says he has friends around the world. "And, I connect with them as strongly as I do with my old friends from Howard."

Welburn says the future of General Motors is in global collaboration.


