Dallas Institute of Humanities and Culture will present the Seventh Annual Martin Luther King Jr. Symposium on January 16, 7 – 8:45 p.m. in the Winspear Opera House in Dallas' AT&T Performing Arts Center. The theme for this year's program is "The World Dr. King Inherited & Changed." Keynote speaker will be Isabel Wilkerson, the first African American woman to win a Pulitzer Prize in Journalism for her work as Chicago Bureau Chief at *The New York Times*. ALON USA and

Baylor Health Care System are presenting sponsors. Dr. Robert Green and Dr. Carol Francois, both with direct links to the Great Migration, will lead the discussion panel following Wilkerson's keynote address.

"The World Dr. King Inherited & Changed" will address an aspect of Dr. King's legacy which is in danger of being forgotten: the social and cultural conditions that led to the Civil Rights struggles of the 1950's and 1960's. Wilkerson, the author of *The New York Times'* bestseller *The Warmth of*

Other Suns, will be discussing the dramatic, untold stories of American history from the "great migration" of some six million black citizens who fled the South and Jim Crow laws from 1915 to 1970 in search of a better life. The Seventh Annual Martin Luther King Jr. Symposium will also feature Dallas citizens who can recall and relate personal experiences before, during, and after the Civil Rights Movement led by Dr. King.

"For this Symposium we felt it was important to take our audience back to the time before the Civil Rights Movement swept the na-

tion," said Dr. Larry Allums, executive director of The Dallas Institute. "

The program will begin at 7 PM with a keynote address, followed by an interview and discussion until 8:45 PM. The discussion panel will include Dr. Carol Francois and Dr. Robert Green. Dr. Francois is a career educator, having served over the years as Teacher, Principal, Dean of Instruction, and Chief of Staff for Dallas ISD. Dr. Green is Professor Emeritus and a former Dean



at Michigan State University who worked in the 1960's for Dr. Martin Luther King,

Jr., as Education Director of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference.

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son of the South preparing to help preserve for all times the memories of the first National Holiday for Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., one of the South's greatest sons.

During the celebration, I would interview. Mrs. Coretta Scott King, Bernice King, Mrs. Christine King Ferris, President Jimmy Carter, Dr. Ralph David Abernathy, Senator Ted Kennedy, Dick Gregory, Bill Cosby, Bishop Desmond Tutu, John Lewis and Rev. Jesse Jackson along with a host of others who came to celebrate the life of a man who helped America to fulfill "Freedom's Dream."

While time would only permit us to show clips of the interviews, I am full of the memories and moments that I spent with each individual as they shared their personal stories with me of their time with Dr. King. Their stories are as important as Dr. King's life itself, for their lives, interwoven with his and the countless thousands of others, who worked and marched with him, make up the fabric of freedom that has become the garment of the America we know today. Their lives and stories are the foundation

upon which we continue to build the promises of a better future for those yet unborn.

While 1986 was indeed an outstanding and moving moment for me, I would be even more moved to return in 1987 to experience the world premier showing of the documentary. It was truly a star studded affair of civil rights icons who gathered along with Mrs. King and her family, to view the documentary that we had spent the previous year producing.

There on the screen was the culmination of hours of shooting and editing that would now become the official story of the first Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. National Holiday Celebration. As I sat there with the audience anticipating each moment, I began to wonder had I asked the right questions, had we gotten the right shots, had we edited the right scenes? This was not just any documentary; this was the documentary by which the world would remember Dr. King's First National Holiday Celebration. Millions of individuals would come to experience this celebration through this

documentary. The documentary would be among the many sources that would serve to help future generations interpret the American story of freedom.

As we are facing what Dr. King prophetically called "some difficult days ahead" the documentary can serve as a compass to guide us through the rough waters of uncertainty today. Through his voice and the voices of others in the documentary, we today can gain new insights into what it means to organize and work for justice for all people; to call America to live up to its better self, and embrace the true meaning of the "beloved community;" to embrace non-violence as a life style that extends from our house to the "world house;" to work to insure, that justice rolls down like water and righteousness like a mighty stream.

"In Remembrance of Martin" is a documentary for all times. Its message is for all of us who dare to believe in the possibility of a shared humanity. As we reflect on those days in Atlanta in 1986, when thousands gathered to celebrate not only a man but a movement,

we also are carried back to 1955 and the beginning of the modern day civil rights movement birth by the actions of Mrs. Rosa Parks. We are moved and inspired as we began to see men and women, boys and girls, Jews and Gentiles, black, white and brown, work together and walk together to make real the promises of freedom for all Americans.

I invite you to join me Tuesday, January 17, 6 p.m. to 7:30 p.m., at the City of Dallas' Martin Luther King Jr. Library, 2922 Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd, for a commemorative showing of "In Remembrance of Martin." Admission is free.

As you and your family pause to celebrate the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Holiday this year, take the time to purchase "In Remembrance of Martin" from PBS and share it all year long. And as you do, I encourage you to become an active participant in the continuing civil rights movement to fulfill "Freedom's Dream."

Chief Consumer Watchdog arrives in 2012

As 2012 unfolds, America's consumers have now gained a top cop in a wide

range of financial affairs. Richard Cordray, a former Ohio attorney general and state treasurer was ap-

pointed this week by President Obama to become the first director of the Consumer Financial Protection

Bureau (CFPB). After the greatest financial collapse since that of the 1930s Great Depression, the historic Dodd-Frank Act created a new bureau to comprehensively address lending abuses and the accompanying power to enforce regulatory change.

With a director in place, CFPB can now take on oversight of payday lenders, mortgage companies and credit bureaus, writes rules for the non-banking industry, and becomes the consumer's voice in financial services regulation. Last year in late July, CFPB began ongoing monitoring and regulating of large depository banks.

Announced January 4 at an appearance in Cleveland, President Barack Obama said in part, "The financial firms have armies of lobbyists in Washington looking out for their interest. You need somebody looking out



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Walking often a battle of obstacles in Texas

Walking is good for the heart, but in many Texas communities, it can be hazardous to your health and safety.

As many of us make New Year's resolutions to shed excess holiday pounds and get healthier, we often find the deck stacked against us even as we take our first step... right in our own neighborhoods. That's too bad because walking is a wonderful form of exercise. In fact, some studies suggest walking 10,000 steps per day can yield considerable health and weight reduction benefits.

The fact remains that

while many of us truly enjoy walking, most of our communities simply aren't "walker friendly." They were built instead for motorists, resulting in unsafe intersections, streets without sidewalks, and a lack of benches for resting or waiting for public transportation. These and other factors prevent many of us from walking regularly and using this easy, cheap, physically and environmentally healthy mode of transportation.

Unfortunately, Texas' largest population centers fall in the "worst offender" category for pedestrian safety. A recent Transportation for America study identified

Houston, Dallas-Fort Worth, Austin and San Antonio among the 25 most dangerous places for pedestrians in the country. According to the report, more than 4,200 pedestrians were killed in Texas over the past decade, including more than 500 over age 65.

This is why AARP is engaging volunteers in a statewide effort to make more transportation options available -- such as bus and rail service -- and to design safer roadways and sidewalks. The initiative is supported by a coalition including businesses, cycling enthusiasts and aging groups. The premise behind the effort

is simple: Streets are not just for drivers but for everyone who uses them.

The ultimate goal is to pass a "Complete Streets" law in Texas that encourages transportation planners and decision makers to think in terms of access and safety when planning communities or renovating streets. This forward-thinking legislation wouldn't cost the state additional money. It merely requires cities and counties to plan with the needs of motorists, public transit users, cyclists and pedestrians in mind.

Last year, the measure was adopted by committees of both House and Senate but

not by the full Texas Legislature. The coalition will try again when the Legislature convenes in 2013. In the meantime, we'll continue to educate Texans about the problem and work with cities and towns on resolutions supporting such goals.

AARP and partner organizations are talking to local officials and doing pedestrian safety audits in places like Houston, San Antonio, Dallas, El Paso, Austin and San Angelo. Older Texans are among those who depend most on a variety of transportation options and, ironically, some of the worst intersections are in right in front of senior centers.

The solutions are often simple, and they can save lives. For example, older pedestrians or people using walkers and wheelchairs could benefit from curb cuts and walk lights that tell them how much time they have to cross the road.

There is no good reason why crossing a street in Texas should turn into a near-death experience. Any one of us can help make things better and safer for pedestrians, cyclists, motorists and transit riders across Texas. To learn more, visit www.safestreets-texas.org

gram aimed at coaching kids the fundamentals of baseball, while using the sport as a vessel to teach them discipline and life skills.

A lifelong volunteer with the Sickle Cell Anemia Foundation, having endured sickle cell traits since birth, Darjean also volunteers with Dallas Police Athletic League, the American Cancer Society. Darjean played the role of shortstop in the movie "For The Love of the Game" and he is currently making an independent film about African Americans in baseball. In 2010, he was granted the NAACP Humanitarian Award for his

extensive work in the Dallas community.

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New Life Skills Certificate program for African Women

The Life Skills Certificate introduces many basic elements of American culture through a weekly educational program for African women. The program seeks to help the women grow in self-confidence and personal leadership skills, while improving their family's level of academic and economic condition.

It is designed for women who have lived in the USA for 5 years or less. Also, women with a family situation requiring life skills development are welcome. The program is open to women who speak any of these languages: English, Amharic, Tigrina, French, Kuryndi, or Arabic.

The subjects covered in-

clude: USA culture, family health and wellness, using the public library, obtaining an ID or drivers license, raising a special needs child. They will also share financial literacy (opening a bank account, using a credit card) for economic education. Other topics include: domestic violence and family security issues, job skills, parenting for

success, steps to American citizenship, entrepreneurship, and much more.

Teachers will include community leaders and professional educators from the Dallas Public Library System, Catholic Charities, as well as professionals from the African diaspora.

The weekly Saturday classes are scheduled for Jan-

uary 28 – December 8 from 9:45 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at the Audelia Branch Library located 10045 Audelia Rd. (at Church St.) in Dallas.

the media, civic and business leaders from the North Texas area. School President Michael Sorrells who has been the doctor, nurse, and sometimes the ambulance driver for this institution since his arrival. Sorrells' presentation reviewed the history of Paul Quinn and recent progress of the school. Changes include cutting salaries by 10 percent, demolishing several unused buildings on campus and creating a surplus of \$1.2 million.

In attendance were representatives from the Real Estate Council of Dallas to present their \$40,000 donation to the school for the building of a greenhouse. The school food program of farming will produce foods to sell, generating income for the school.

A tour of the campus for the media showed off the upgrades and the state of the art classrooms, which include video conferencing capabilities. A freshly painted gymnasium sporting the Tiger mascot on the gym floor is an eye catcher.

Other amenities include a student center with computers, plasma TVs, and new carpet makes it an ideal place for students to hangout. A new fitness center equipped with modern cardio and weight equipment will occupy the first floor of the student center.

The school has created exchange programs with institutions like Southern Methodist University, Penn

State University and Yale University. In the spring, Yale will visit Paul Quinn to review the exchange curriculum between the two schools.

Sorrells, the Board of Directors and its Chairman, Bishop Gregory Ingram have worked together to create a

vision for Paul Quinn College. It is to maintain a reputation of excellence in technology and academic, attracting students worldwide.

Paul Quinn has come a long way. Their vision of 2,000 students by 2020 is an achievable goal for students,

staff, and alumni.

Students from Irving ISD participated in the two-hour, inspirational program designed to encourage STEM-related careers. The high-tech event, supported by Irving Schools Foundation's partner, ExxonMobil Foundation, featured interactive science experiments, a simulated shuttle launch and firsthand accounts from ExxonMobil engineers about the rewarding aspects of their careers. as a result of her injuries she suffered a ruptured spleen. Later that evening, Dee Dee Wilkerson died at the hospital. March 19, 2012 will mark the 26th anniversary of her passing.

For years Wilkerson never told another member of her family, not her husband or six surviving children. But speaking by telephone to the North Dallas Gazette in December, she said the Lord would not give her rest. So she told her family and spent two years to writing the book Memoirs of a Teenage Angel.

"God inspired me to be a help for those going through loss. All those years passed by, but I kept notes. I did not want to write the book, because I had to take myself back there each time I sat down to write," according to Wilkerson.

Essence Publishing, the first publisher to which Wilkerson submitted her manuscript, accepted and published the book. The company also publishes the popular monthly African American female themed magazine. Through booksignings at different

churches and networking of friends, the book has been well received.

"God is really blessing me to get the book out." Wilkerson is confident the book will help others facing loss, whether it is divorce, job, serious illness or significant change in their life.

Wilkerson encourages them to, "Believe God for whatever situation they were in."

for your interest and fighting for you – and that's Richard Cordray."

Ohio consumers would readily agree. As state attorney general, Cordray recovered more than \$2 billion from Wall Street to repay the state's wrongly-foreclosed consumers, the state's looted pension funds, and its cities and counties. His reputation as a fair and reasonable advocate attracted widespread support that included businesses, civil rights and consumer advocates, and 37 state attorneys general.

Speaking to the specific consumer needs in commu-

nities of color, Wade Henderson, president and CEO of the Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights said, "Communities of color have always been targets of predatory lenders who created a financial mess that resulted in losses of \$194 billion in the African-American community and \$177 billion in the Latino community, the largest exodus of wealth ever recorded for these groups. . . We are ready to work with Director Cordray to ensure that no community is ever victim to these practices again."

The biggest factor con-

tributing to this historic loss of minority wealth has been foreclosures wrought from high-cost and unsustainable loans. Published in November, CRL's updated foreclosure research, Lost Ground, examined disparities in mortgage lending and foreclosures. CRL found that although the majority of people affected by foreclosures have been white families, borrowers of color are more than twice as likely to receive high-risk loan products – even after accounting for income and credit status.

These mortgage defaults are strongly tied to abusive loan terms, such as prepay-

ment penalties, 'exploding' adjustable-rate mortgages and loans originated by mortgage brokers. In many cases, brokers received kickbacks for placing borrows in these more expensive and high-risk loans.

With the CFPB and other provisions of the Dodd-Frank Act, the kickbacks known in the mortgage industry as 'yield spread premiums' are banned. Further, lenders are now required to ensure a borrower's ability to repay a loan.

Another and lesser known duty of CFPB includes oversight on student

loans for higher education. With authority over private student lenders, CFPB will require lenders to follow fair rules and provide families with information they need to make informed and smart choices in financing a college education for their children. This particular provision will benefit African-American families – 36 percent of whom already fund college educations with student loans.

For consumer advocates such as the Center for Responsible Lending (CRL), Richard Cordray's appointment was viewed as welcome news not only for con-

sumers but also for businesses and the economy. CRL said in a statement "Finally, the agency can run at full speed, policing the financial marketplace to make it fairer and more competitive. . . By promoting sensible oversight of businesses and sounder choices in consumer financial products, the CFPB will help restore our economy and prevent another meltdown."

their families. These programs serve at risk, recently homeless and chronically homeless veterans populations who were honorably discharged.

Eligibility Requirements for the EASH program: If you are an unaccompanied homeless veteran with a disability and at least 18 years or older, have been either continu-

ously homeless for one year or more, or if you had at least four episodes of homelessness in the past three years, EASH will help you secure housing and case management services. For more info on the EASH program, call 214-915-4605.

The SSVF Program, in partnership with the Fort Worth Catholic Charities and the VA provides sup-

portive services to very low-income Veteran families residing in or transitioning to permanent housing.

Eligibility Requirements for the SSVF Program: A Veteran who is a single person; family in which the head of household, or the spouse is the head of household; very low income (at 50% below the area median income); veteran families

earning less than 30% of area median income; veterans with at least one dependent family member; chronically homeless veteran families; and formerly chronically homeless Veteran families. For more info on the SSVF program, call 214-915-4619.

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On January 16, 2012 our nation will celebrate the life of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., a Nobel Peace Prize winner in 1968, for his contributions to our nation and to the world.

Dr. King (January 15, 1929-April 4, 1968) was born Michael Luther King, Jr., but later had his name changed to Martin. His grandfather began the family's long tenure as pastors of the Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta honoring and praising God, he served from 1914 to 1931; Martin's father served from then until his death and from 1960 until his death Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. acted as co-pastor.

Dr. King attended segregated public schools in Georgia, graduating from high school at the age of 15; he received his B. A. degree in 1948 from Morehouse College, a distinguished Negro institution of Atlanta from which both his father and grandfather had graduated.

After three years of theological study at Crozer Theological Seminary in Pennsylvania where he was elected president of a predominantly white senior class, he was awarded the

Honoring Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

B.D. in 1951. Dr. King received his doctorate in 1955. In Boston he met and married Ms. Coretta Scott, a young woman of uncommon intellectual and artistic attainments. Two sons and two daughters were born into the family.

In 1954, Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr. became pastor of the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery, Alabama and he was a member of the executive committee of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, the leading organization of its kind in the nation.

and Whites rode the buses as equals.

In 1957 he was elected president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, an organization formed to provide new leadership for the now burgeoning civil rights movement. The ideals for this organization he took from Christianity; and its operational techniques from Gandhi.

In the eleven-year period between 1957 and 1968, Dr. King traveled over six million miles and spoke over twenty-five hundred times, appearing wherever there was injustice, protest, and action; and meanwhile he wrote five books as well as numerous articles. In those years, he led a massive protest in Birmingham, Alabama, that caught the attention of the entire world, providing what he called a coalition of conscience, and inspiring his "Letter from a Birmingham Jail", a manifesto of the Black revolution.

Dr. King planned voter registration drives in Alabama and he directed the peaceful march on Washington, D.C., of 250,000 people to whom he delivered his famous address, "I Have a Dream", he conferred with President John F. Kennedy and campaigned for President Lyndon B. Johnson.

He was awarded five honorary degrees; was named Man of the Year by Time magazine in 1963; and became not only the symbolic leader of American Blacks but also a world figure.

At the age of thirty-five, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., was the youngest man to

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
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
