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Webb still has faith in Irving's success

On a Sunday morning in April 2010, the walls of Texas Stadium were imploded and collapsed, ending an era in Irving. But, to the west on State Highway 114 was the sign of what might become for the city of Irving. The Las Colinas Entertainment Center is proposed to bring millions of visitors to Las Colinas and attract main events to the city. The construction of the venue has not had a teddy bear hug to welcome it, and marvel is also a topic of debate for the three men running for Place 3 on the Irving City Council. On May 14, Irving voters will cast their ballots in support for Dennis Webb, Kensley Stewart or David Gutierrez.

Allan Meagher - the current holder of the Place 3 seat – has decided not to seek re-election.

Dennis Webb, an Irving pastor and one of the leading developers of Bear Creek, knows what it takes to rally a community together and bring economic vitality into play. Webb has not dismissed the notion of the Las Colinas Entertainment Center coming to be, but he knows that with keen oversight is imperative.

"I want to insure the

city has in place a system that provides specific oversight of each project. I will work to develop solutions to the inadequacies discovered in the Entertainment Center Project. Ensuring oversight is provided by project-specific managers and not general city management is the key," Webb told the North Dallas Gazette last week.

His determination to lead the charge for change in Irving is why the North Dallas Gazette is putting its support behind Dennis Webb for the Place 3 seat on Irving city council. Webb is a longtime Irving resident, and he knows what Irving can become.

Since the city is at odds about the financing of the venue, ensuring oversight as Webb has suggested will alleviate the need for taxpayer dollars to pay for the venue. He is adamant that

funding should come from private donors. It is estimated that \$50 million of the venue's construction will come from investors, with hotel occupancy taxes as a secondary funding source

Irving has seen a drop in crime recently. Webb, a 28-year firefighter, has a vested interest in public safety, and he has a strong reason to plead the case of public safety as a councilman. The efforts of the city police department have resulted in a continuous drop in major crimes each year beginning in 2006.

The city of Irving is headed in the right direction. With individuals such as Webb on the board, a new day can become a truth in Irving. He is a man of God, and believes that all is possible with patience, prayer and cohesiveness.

While addressing the issue of immigration during his tenure, Gears did so in a manner that did not lead to large public outcries despite leading the area in deportation of illegal immigrants. Through Irving's Criminal Alien Deportation program over 6,300 have reportedly been deported without it devolving into accusations of racism or added expense to the City.

One of the current hot topics in this campaign is discussions regarding the financial viability of an ambitious \$250 million Las Colinas entertainment center. There have been concerns that the private developers are receiving a "sweetheart deal" however Gears assures voters the center will be paid 100 percent by "the user" of the facility at a recent candidate forum. He believes it is important for Irving to have a facility that will replace the recently demolished Texas Stadium. This project provides opportunities for vendors representing all areas of the City, and as it continues to go forward, much needed jobs.

Also, once completed the facility will not only be a crown jewel venue for concerts, plays and special

events, but will be a source for much needed tax revenues for the City. The new entertainment center will be compete for events cursimilar venues in the DFW area. In addition, the plan includes restaurants and shopping which will make the area a true destination

mit and License Appeal Board and Chair for the Business and Economic Development Committee to give a voice to citizens of Dallas who would not have one otherwise to effect change in their communities. I received the Samuel G. Winstead Award for raising more than \$1 million for Park South YMCA. I have led with and without authority to build consensus among my colleagues, working together to bring about transformational, not just transactional, change for the citizens of our city.

My main concern for the citizens of Dallas is simple – No neighborhood left behind.

First, I want to ensure that we transform Dallas from the inside out. The morale of the city-police, fire, citizens, and taxpayers is down. You have half a million people living in the Southern Sector without the very simple amenities afforded to other areas - no movie theater, no restaurants no Fedex Office Kinkos, no Container store. We have to address this issue and organically develop all of our neighborhoods so 'No neighborhood is left behind'. For example, the area surrounding the VA hospital in the Southern Sector requires high density development to attract residents and appeal to employees similar to the development surrounding the Parkland Hospital area and take advantage of the transit line.

Achieving this means a gallant effort on the part of the city council and citizens working together as one. My PhD (Passion, Hardwork, and Determination) along with city council will help Dallas be the best city for its citizens first and then for others and as someone who understands the needs of all citizens, I will create transparency in our local government and an open door policy.

Secondly, I will implement a budget initiative that seeks to minimize conducts and practices that enhance deficit and bloated budgetary practices. I will ensure that layoffs are only an absolute last resort and cuts are only done when a service is not needed. Since most in America adjust to changing times and most will not lay off their spouse or children because times are tough, the city must apply such austere [belt tightening] measures in dealing with public resources. I will seek to reduce redundancy in the budget to whereby it is no more than 5% as opposed to 15% that is typical in most municipal budgets and it gets wider as the budget amount increases and initideficit cushioning measures that will be used to fund budget shortfalls which will minimize inces-

creases.

Thirdly, I will seek to ensure public safety for everyone. Police officers living within the city limit will bolster police work and reduce crime in city they live. When officers of the Police Force live within the city, their presence will reduce costs associated with majority of them driving more than 40 miles to work and help Dallas neighborhoods. If we pursue a citizen backed program, so all members of the police rank and file live within the city, the revenue that will accrue from their real estate and sales taxes, will add a tremendous amount to the city. Most major cities in US seek and demand that their officers live in the city they police, because the presence of police officers reduces crime. It will not be a demand but an opportunity to provide an incentive to police officers

willing to live in Dallas. He asks "What do you do when you see a police car on the highway? You slow down and you make a mental check of your vehicles registration date etc'. The same applies to having police live (not patrol) in high crime areas. Dallas will experience a tremendous decline in high crime areas if such an incentive based program is adopted by our police department.

Fourth, I will work with the Dallas Independent School District and the PTA to collaborate on ways to get parents more involved with our children's educational future. Education is not an equalizer but an enabler. Schools are the ground where new leaders are nurtured. While other candidates feel you can throw money to improve this issue, it is my belief that this is not an issue that can be resolved by money alone. If the parent is not involved, the child will not have an appetite to learn. My goal as mayor is to engage the parent and to create the appetite for the parent to be involved with their child. My leadership is for 'NOW' and the 'future'.


Finally, I will work with small and big businesses to increase Economic Development and Job Creation. There are two factors that weigh in on the discussion about the Economic Development and Job Creation for our city. One is big businessthe Fortune 500; the other is small business-the backbone of our country. Eighty-five percent of our tax dollars are generated from small business. Charity begins at home. Before we reach out to try to bring Fortune 500 companies in to assist with our economic development, we need to take care of our own. That means, we patronize our small businesses and provide incentives. As your mayor, my goal is to look into the tax abatement issue which provides incentives for 15% of the businesses who generate over \$1,000,000 in annual income Once we assist in this area, we look at ways to attract big business. In

order to attract big business, we need to improve the look of our city as a whole, which includes the Southern Sector. If the eye does not like what it sees, you will not to eat.

Many people talk about endorsements from big names and political action committees, but there are no big fish without the little fish and I have been recommended by the everyday citizen. Dallas citizens have the unique opportunity to elect a man of vision, talent, and influence. I am about bettering Dallas through effective and responsive leadership that connects public needs to business opportunities. I desire to pursue effective neighborhood revitalization and make improvement in programs that unleash the full economic potential of its communities.



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Irving mayoral candidates face off on hot-button issues

The four candidates running in the Irving Mayoral election are not short on opinions when it comes to dealing with the issues facing the City. Incumbent, Herbert Gears (2005-present); Joe Putnam, former Mayor of Irving (1999-2005), and former Place 1 and Place2 City Council members Tom Spink (2007-2010) and Beth Van Duyne (2004-2010) were given a chance to voice their opinions during a candidate forum hosted by the Irving League of Women Voters

payer dollars were used to fund the Irving Entertainment Center. Gears opponents have accused him of not being honest about how the project will be funded. Spink, Van Duyne, and Putnam have expressed how the current financial structure of the Entertainment Center Project is set to fail and how it will be left up to the residents to pick up the pieces.

"It is a false statement to say that General Funds and taxpayer monies are paying for the facility. It is 100 percent paid for by the users in ticket, parking and hotel taxes; a tax



held on April 27 at Irving City Hall.

Supporters of each candidate attended to hear the opponents' response to the important questions voters have been asking during this election. The pressing issue that continues to come up is the controversy over the Irving Entertainment Center. Mayor Gears, along with other City officials, have faced media and public scrutiny over the recent news report by WFAA (Channel 8) on Irving Entertainment Center developers receiving unallowable expenses in excess of \$100,000 based on a recent audit performed by an outside CPA firm hired by the City of Irving.

On November 6, 2007 in a special election voters approved imposing a tax on customers and guests of the Irving Convention Center and Entertainment Venue Project, and taxes on Irving hotel guests as a method to fund the development project. Voters approved the proposition to allow the City to impose a maximum tax of 10 percent on tickets; a parking tax of up to \$3 per vehicle for events held at the Irving Convention Center and Entertainment Venue Project; and a 2 percent (maximum) hotel occupancy tax.

Mayor Gears has gone on defense over the claim that tax-

implemented and supported by the hotels. We blew up our entertainment venue (speaking about the Cowboy Stadium); there is no reason to come to Irving for your entertainment destination any longer and we are going to recreate that and help our hospitality industry," Gears states when asked the question about his support of the Entertainment Center Project at the candidate forum.

Putnam is pursuing legal actions against the City of Irving over the Entertainment Center Project. He argues the

deal is in violation of the Restaurant with Alcohol Beverages 60/40 Ordinance (R-AB 60/40) requiring food sales to account for at least 60 percent of sales and a maximum sale of 40 percent in alcoholic beverages. In October of 2009, the City Council approved an amendment to allow the sale of

alcoholic beverages in 'any city-owned facility whose construction or operation is funded in whole or in part by hotel occupancy tax revenue.'

According to Putnam, "I think it is important that we protect the R-AB Ordinance in order to keep bars out of our neighborhoods. The risk of having the rest of the City wide-open to alcohol sales is an absolute certainty that we would lose our 60/40 protection and that is too big a price to pay."

"The Entertainment Center project is so shaky financially. The City pledges they will sell construction bonds in order to fund the project which means they would have to take money from the Arts, Museum and Irving Convention and Visitor Bureau (ICVB) and that is too great a price to pay for one big bar. If they were to take away the bars and put the R-AB Ordinance back in place and take away the pledge for using the museum and arts money to build the facility than I would drop the lawsuit and as far as I am concern they could build what they want," states Putnam

"If we continue spending and throwing away money the way this Mayor has been we are going to lose our AAA Bond rating; and more importantly lose the integrity and fiber of this community," adds Spink in a phone interview.

"I agree we need this project. We have spent over \$36 million and not turned over a single shovel of dirt and all we have to show for the money spent is some pretty drawings," states Duyne.

According to a December 2010 Dallas Morning News report, a two percent hotel occupancy tax has been allocated for the Entertainment Center Project and the City wants to back the entertainment center debt with a 5-percent hotel occupancy tax that currently pays for the operations of the ICVB and City Arts programs, as well as utilizing a federal Build America Bonds subsidy which was set to expire this past December (visit www.dallasnews com/news/communitynews/irving/headlines/ 20101216-texas-challengesirving-finance-method-forentertainment-centercomplex.ece for the full story on the financing for the Entertainment Center).

Transparency in govern-



ment continues to be the platform shared among Van Duyne, Putnam, and Spink. These three candidates have been critical with the current City Council over the lack of transparency with various City projects.

Van Duyne has shared her objection to cronyism, backdoor dealings, and the good old boy systems. She has pledged to welcome citizen involvement in Council proceedings and business because she feels citizens have the right to know how much of their tax dollars are being spent as well as understand the determining factors involved in making those final decisions.

Gears supporters feel it would be a step backwards if he is not re-elected. (See the *NDG* Editorial on page 1) Voters who support Gears feel strongly about the accomplishments and the steps he has made in moving the City forward. A strong supporter and Civil Rights Activist, Anthony

Bond believes Irving would regress under the leadership of the Mayoral candidates opposing Gears.

"We need a leader who will represent all the citizens of Irving and understands the needs in moving this diverse City forward instead of backwards and Herbert Gears is the best Mayor to accomplish this," states Bond.

Gears is hopeful the accomplishments he has made over the past six years is what will be the deciding factors in re-electing him as Mayor on May 14. Gears campaigns on his accomplishments with the successful demolition of over 1,000 substandard apartment

and hotel units; the implementation of Irving's Criminal Alien Deportation Program in which Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) has been able to deport over 6,300 illegal immigrants from the City's jail; and maintaining record low crime rates for five consecutive years (40 percent drop in violent crime, per a report by the Irving Police Chief in a January 12, 2011 City Council work session).

"We lead the nation in one of the toughest issues which is Illegal Immigration; there have been more criminal alien illegal immigrants imported from our City jail than in other city jail in America and we were featured on the *New York Times* front page as having one of the most successful Immigration programs and this means a lot to the quality of life which seem to matter most to the citizens of Irving," remarks Gears.

The Heritage Crossing Redevelopment Project is another major issue facing the City and an issue neither candidate is reluctant in sharing solutions on what needs to be done to move the project along. McDougal is the company the City hired to oversee the development of the Heritage District located in downtown Irving. There have been various citizen complaints over the stall in the development of this project and the developer's lack of accountability in meeting project deadlines.

Van Duyne comments, "We need to get retail here because we need to be able to sell to somebody because no one is going to be willing to invest in our City if they do not have something to sell to and in order to have any sustainable development you have to be able to have people there. We need to be seriously looking at the McDougal development holding those developers feet to the fire in making sure we are on schedule."

Putnam and Spink feel the problems with the Heritage Crossing project is directly related to the developer. They agree the City should terminate the contract with McDougal and hire a developer that is more familiar with the Irving market.

The controversy over the Capital Improvement Project Initiatives (i.e. Irving Entertainment Center and Heritage Crossing Redevelopment) seems to overshadow the evergrowing challenge the City faces due to a sluggish economy. The City of Irving is looking to face a \$20 million budget shortfall, according to a recent report presented to the City Council by Bret Starr, Assistant Chief Financial Officer. Both current and incoming City officials will have to work to continue to maintain municipal services without sacrificing the safety of citizens.

In the area of continued commitment to the City's public safety and economic stability, Candidate Spink shared how the City Manager and Fire Chief made application to change the City's current Public Protection Classification (PPC) status from a PPC 2 to PPC 1, per his recommendation. According to Spink, this change could help homeowners save \$500 million in homeowner premiums and save \$25 million to the 70 percent commercial base within the City; thus allowing Irving to offer prospective companies the lowest insurance rates and in return this could mean enticing more businesses to the City.

In 2011, the City Council approved to increase property taxes to address the budget

constraints as a result of revenue reductions and in going forward the newly appointed Mayor will inevitable have to deal with the same challenge of how to balance the budget in a tough economy. It will be left up to the voters on May 14 to decide the best candidate who is worthy of their trust in stewarding the City's budget, services, and current/future economic developments.

to be disciplined under heavy pressure and creative to solve problems in a hurry. This government supported job is recession-resistant and comes with a pension, which makes the competition for even entry level position intense. The average firefighter will earn between \$32,00 to \$59,000 a year and can make an easy transition to become an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) if interested. The activity level varies depending on the day. One day may be full of excited and rushed responses to local emergencies while other days may not see any action at all. A high school diploma is required, but a college degree is not. However, candidates who have earned an Associate degree and receive EMT training on their own have an advantage. You will need emotional strength, excitement for challenges, and be flexible to survive firefighting.

School psychologists work closely with students and their families to monitor and address issues that affect student performance and success in

school. You set up meetings with parents and students, create plans of action to address any problem areas you may observe, and you encourage parental involvement in implementing a solution. Intensive education is required to be considered for such a prestigious and delicate position. Schools require a specialist degree in school psychology, which is offered at the end of a three year graduate program and one year in an internship.

Over the next ten years 16,800 new jobs are expected to open for school psychologists. This is because schools are now making an increased effort to offer mental health services for their students. Most school psychologists are self-employed to ensure higher pay and receive upwards of \$45,000 a year. While in school it is recommended that you keep a portfolio of all graduate work, and study in the area where you wish to work, or near it. Try to get an internship at the school you wish to work for because it can increase the likelihood of you getting hired at a school where

your skills and face are already familiar.


Court reporters record every single word spoken in the courtroom. Sound intense? These verbatim records are highly valued in our justice system because they help to keep the "record straight". There are other avenues outside of the courtroom for court reporters to explore; 70 percent of all certified court reporters have taken advantage of those avenues. Some options include: broadcast captioners and webcasters.

The number of jobs available for court reporters is expected to experience an 18 percent increase in the next 10 years because of the need to provide translation for the hearing impaired. You can earn an average of \$47,000 a year in an entry level position; official court reporters earn a per page fee for transcripts. Experienced court reporters say that it is important to establish an area of expertise with any of the following certifications: Registered Diplomat Reporter, Certified Legal Video Specialist, or Certified


Broadcast Captioner. There are 150 training programs for court reporting in the United States offered at community colleges, universities, and online; all programs last for a minimum of two years. All court reporters must receive a Registered Professional Reporter Certification. Further licensing requirements for employment vary by state.

Actuaries may seem uptight and stuffy, but their job is anything but. They assess the likelihood and monetary consequences of risks for insurance companies that involve death or serious injury. As an actuary you give insurance companies a heads up on possible expenses that could affect their profitability.

The job requires the use of statistics and mathematics; therefore, majoring in either field will give you an advantage when searching for employment. Statistics and Economics are also desired majors by actuary employers. Taking courses in accounting, probability, calculus and finance while in school will prepare a solid foundation for you to build upon when you begin to learn actuary techniques later. A Bachelor Degree is needed to get an entry level position as an actuary, which typically pays \$56,000 a year. Employers suggest that aspiring actuaries consider studying actuarial science offered at 100 universities in America. This field can anticipate a 21 percent job increase in the next decade as more and more insurance companies recognize the value of having an actuary on staff.

"If you want to test a man's character - give him power." George Washington passed that test. Twice in his life he walked away from power and proved that he was indeed the greatest man in the world. He demonstrated that leadership is something that you give – not take – and that power should be used responsibly.

Washington died in 1799, the year that Napoleon Bonaparte became the ruler of France. In contrast to Washington, Napoleon could not acquire enough power. His legendary lust for command drove him to take over much of Europe. "Power is my mistress," he once claimed, "I have worked too hard at her conquest to allow anyone to take her away from me.'

Years later, having lost all power and living in exile, he lamented "They wanted me to be another Washington.'

History is rife with stories of people who abused their power. Abuse of power, however, is not just reserved for politicians and tyrants. It can be abused by managers, spouses, parents,

others, when it motivates people toward leadership roles, that is revealing. It reveals uncertainty, lack of confidence and fear.

It is said that power corrupts, but more often than not, it is a corrupted individual who is attracted to power. It is a feeling of inferiority, sometimes called Napoleon Complex, that drives someone to control other people and to micromanage their surroundings. Today we call such a person a Control Freak. Science fiction author, Robert Heinlein noted, "Anyone who wants to be a politician shouldn't be allowed to be one.

When we look at Abraham Maslow's heirarchy of Human Motivation (Survival, Safety, Social, Esteem, Fulfilment), we see that someone who hungers for power is stuck in the second to bottom level which is Safety. A true leader has selfesteem and self-confidence and does not seek power to bolster his or her feeling of self worth. Thomas Jeffer-

son observed that, "An honest man can feel no pleasure in the exercise of power over his fellow citizens.'

A true leader is motivated by a goal. A goal common to his group whether that group is a company or a country. If you find yourself attracted to leadership, stop and check your motivation. Are you driven to share your gift of understanding in the endeavor of achieving a goal, or are you motivated by perquisites of position and the power you have over others? As John Quincy Adams said, "If your actions inspire others to dream more, learn more, do more and become more, you are a leader."

Protecting Texas Seniors From Counterfeit Check Scams

Fraud against seniors is more widespread than most Texans realize. Wellinformed seniors and their family members can help prevent the greatest generation from falling victim to fraudulent schemes - including a familiar counterfeit check scam that has reemerged in recent weeks.

Law enforcement officials recently notified the Attorney General's Office the so-called that "Reader's Digest Sweepstakes" scam has reappeared around the state. Some Texans – usually senior citizens - may have received letters claiming the recipient won \$1 million in a sweepstakes. The letter claims its "Prize Award Department" drew the recipient's "ticket number" from a pool of thou-

To appear legitimate, the letter fraudulently uses

the Reader's Digest business logo and the Better Business Bureau's accredited business seal – which falsely implies BBB accreditation.

Enclosed with the letter is a counterfeit check for several thousand dollars. Letter recipients are told to call a toll-free (800) number for further instructions. As is common in these types of scams, recipients who call the number are instructed to wire an up front payment to cover taxes or other administrative fees before the remainder of their "winnings" can be issued.

The scammers know that the up-front payment amount sounds trifling compared to the \$1 million in prize money the victim thinks he or she has won. The victim often thinks it is worth paying the upfront fee because the prize money far exceeds the al-
