Curtis Ferguson, teacher at Carter High School, said the group is in need of financial sponsors to support the youth by investing the \$175 per youth summer camp fee. Part of the camp includes a retreat to Broken Bow, Okla. "A majority come from single-family homes," Ferguson said.

## DFW high schools dominate the Top 100 Public High School list

Recently *The Washington Post* published their Top 100 public high schools in the U.S. rankings with Dallas Independent School District's (DISD) Science/Engineering Magnet

rated number one, up from number four last year. During the past five years the school has been listed as number two twice and once at number five. Also, DISD's Talented and Gifted school located on 8th street was rated number two this

year. The school was rated number one the past two years, number three in 2008 and number one in 2007. Irving's North Hills Prep has featured the top 20 for a fifth year at #10, marking a significant leap from number 15 last year.


This marks the second entry into the top 10, including ranking number nine in 2009. Also, DISD's Peak Prep was rated #11, marking their first entry on the list.



## 'Maids' deserve protection against sexual assault

Flowers (NNPA) On Saturday, May 16, 2011, the western world was shocked to learn that a world banker, Dominique Strauss Kahn, had been arrested for allegedly attempting to rape a woman and sexually assaulting her in an upscale hotel room in Manhattan, New York. However, the reporting of the story rang all-too familiar for working-class and immigrant people in the United States and around the world. Nearly every report on the incident provided a

career biographical sketch on Mr. Strauss Kahn, but referred to the nameless victim as merely a "maid", "chamber maid", "cleaning woman", or other less than dignified titles. The effect of such titles on the victim reduces her to a status lower than mother, daughter, and human being.

One thing we know about her is the victim is a 32-year old single mother from West Africa, who falls into the economic category of "work-


## Bishop T.D. Jakes

For as long as I can remember, I have always looked forward to Monday. Throughout the years there have been very few Mondays that I have missed, although there are some Mondays I miss. After a long weekend of labor, I enjoy the slow pace that Monday brings with it. I can sleep in as long as I want, do anything my little heart desires and just simply enjoy the day.

It is the one day of the week when the Gracious Mistress of the Parsonage and Yours Truly can just take it easy and enjoy the day together. Sometimes we enjoyed the day together and sometimes we enjoy the day going our separate ways. Usually, my way goes by the bakery to sample a freshly baked Apple Fritter. As an Apple Fritter connoisseur, I need to constantly study and keep up-to-date on the world of Apple Fritters. Since this is not on my wife's diet, I save her the awkwardness and only go there when I am by myself. It is not that I am trying to hide it; I am just thinking of her.

Lately, something has been messing with my Mondays. In fact, it is becoming a little bit to the point that I am about to mark Mondays off my calendar. Then see what Monday will think of that.

It began several weeks ago. It was a Monday after-

noon and I needed to visit someone in the hospital. Usually I do not do this sort of thing on a Monday, but sometimes you have to do what you do not normally do. I went to the parking place and discovered there was only one parking slot, which was just as I went in through the gate. It was a tight squeeze, but I finally got my truck parked. Everything seemed in good order.

ing poor." Regrettably, the history of colonizing countries such as France, England, and the United States includes countless instances of poor Black women being routinely raped by wealthy White men. In most cases, the Black woman was portrayed as a "jezebel", "prostitute", or some type of wanting whore.

On the other side of the story most White wealthy rapists have been somehow given victim status. Immediately after his arrest, Dominique Straus Kahn was portrayed in French newspapers as a potential "vic-

tim of a political set-up", notwithstanding that Straus Kahn was widely known as "The Great Seducer" in French tabloids. In France, and many other European countries media outlets glorify sexual promiscuity of elected officials, who are rarely brought to justice.

Currently the International Monetary Fund—Straus Kahn's former employer—has very loose regulations on sexual assault by high-ranking diplomats on employees, with no mention of "lowly chambermaids."

However, there is an eerie irony in world history

for the impunity of rape by White men against Black women, predicated on the false notion of White supremacy; and the inferiority of Black women (and women of color). During the Trans Atlantic Slave Trade, African and African American women were routinely raped within prevailing law.

Conversely, imagine if a wealthy Black man stood accused of raping a White hotel employee? First, the woman would not be called a "chamber maid", but rather referred to by a more dignified title. The Black man, of course, would not

be allowed to post bail and live in a luxury condo while awaiting trial.

Therefore, the United States Congress and the United Nations should pressure the International Monetary Fund to: 1) Elect the first woman to head the IMF; and 2) Establish strict policies and regulations against the sexual brutalization of women. Out of this tragedy perhaps new rules with be enacted.

## 7 tips for cleaning fruits and vegetables

Federal health officials estimate that nearly 48 million people are sickened by food contaminated with harmful germs each year, and some of the causes might surprise you.

Although most people know animal products must be handled carefully to prevent illness, many don't realize that produce can also be the culprit in outbreaks of foodborne illness. In recent years, the United States has had several large outbreaks of illness caused by contaminated fruits and vegeta-

bles—including spinach, tomatoes, and lettuce.

Glenda Lewis, an expert on foodborne illness with the Food and Drug Administration, says fresh produce can become contaminated in many ways. During the growing phase, fruits and veggies may be contaminated by animals, harmful substances in the soil or water, and poor hygiene among workers. After produce is harvested, it passes through many hands, increasing the contamination risk. Contamination can

even occur after the produce has been purchased, during food preparation, or through inadequate storage.

FDA says to choose produce that isn't bruised or damaged, and make sure that pre-cut items—such as bags of lettuce or watermelon slices—are either refrigerated



or on ice both in the store and at home. In addition, follow these recommendations:

- Wash your hands for 20 seconds with warm water and soap before and after preparing fresh produce.
- Cut away any damaged or bruised areas before preparing or eating.
- Gently rub produce while holding under plain running water. There's no need to use soap or a produce wash.
- Wash produce BEFORE you peel it, so dirt

and bacteria aren't transferred from the knife onto the fruit or vegetable.

- Use a clean vegetable brush to scrub firm produce, such as melons and cucumbers.
- Dry produce with a clean cloth or paper towel to further reduce bacteria that may be present.
- Throw away the outermost leaves of a head of lettuce or cabbage.

Lewis says consumers should store perishable produce in the refrigerator at 40 degrees or below.

## EPA asks Texans to fight skin cancer in U.S. Friday

Every hour, one American dies from skin cancer — the number one cancer in the U.S. To help people learn easy ways to combat the disease, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) SunWise program has partnered with the National Council on Skin Cancer Prevention to designate the Friday before Memorial Day (May 27) as "Don't Fry

Day." EPA encourages Texas residents to learn about and practice sun-safe behaviors this Don't Fry Day to reduce overexposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation — the main cause of skin cancer.

"This is the perfect time of year to remind people to protect themselves and their family members from too much sun by taking simple

steps like putting on sunscreen, a hat, sunglasses, and a t-shirt," said EPA Regional Administrator Al Armandariz. "Teaching sun safety is crucial because nearly half of all new cancers diagnosed in the United States each year are skin cancers."

Each Memorial Day weekend, millions of Americans kick off the summer

season and begin enjoying the great outdoors. Though skin cancer risks exist all year long, the dangers are even greater during the summer months, when the days are longer, and more people are outside for longer periods of time. To help educate youth, the Council began its first ever video public service announcement contest this year, and it was a group

of Texas students that won first place for their sun safety video.

For "Don't Fry Day," EPA encourages Texans to practice the Slip, Slop, Slap and Wrap safety tips, which include:

- Slip on a shirt, preferably with sleeves;
- Slop on SPF 15+ sunscreen generously;
- Slap on a hat; and

• Wrap on sunglasses. SunWise also recommends that families seek shade during the sun's peak hours between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Checking the UV Index to plan outdoor activities is also key for identifying times that pose the greatest risk for overexposure to the sun.

In the U.S., skin cancer affects more than two million people each year, outnumbering the cases of breast, prostate, lung and colon cancers combined. One in five Americans will develop the disease in their lifetime. Meanwhile, melanoma—the most serious form of skin cancer—is on the rise. It is the most common cancer among young adults ages 25 to 29.

paper's website the formula used to determine the ranks are:

Waste oil collect by DWU is given to Dallas County Schools, which con-


When Dwayne Richards came to Evolution Academy in 2009, he was a sophomore and homeless after his mother was incarcerated. With determina-

our trash together because we recycle now;" and "we don't watch all that much TV anymore because we simply don't have time?" Umm hmm. Well, it's light outside. And while I can't vouch for the authenticity of your first two statements, I can tell you African Americans ARE spending almost 40 percent more time watching TV than any other American demographic group. I didn't get this from grandma – because she's probably sitting right there watching TV along with you– I got it from The Nielsen Company's recently released comprehensive report, The New Digital American Family.

The thing is, unlike eating greasy foods or not recycling, watching TV doesn't have to be a negative. If we use our consumer power for good, as I'm always stressing in this column that we should make it a point to do, we can use our viewing habits to our advantage. If we, as Blacks, are over indexing on television viewing – which means watching way more than anyone else – that means we should be demanding that we see people who look like us in the programs and commercials we're viewing. If we're watching more television than any other group we should be watching the type of programs that depict us in positive ways. And since we're watching more television we should have a stronger voice of dissatisfaction which we

exercise fully if we don't find these things happening. So the question shouldn't be, "how much television are you watching?" The question should be rephrased: "as a connoisseur of television viewing, are you making your viewing preferences known by what you're watching? And are you using your television viewing power for good?" Only you know the answer to that, but remember grandma's words: what you do in the dark will always come out in the light."

The Nielsen report also noted that TV ownership is down. While African Americans now own four or more sets per household, the number of American homes with a television set dropped to 96.7 percent from 98.9 percent. Why the decline? During a shaky economy, economics is always in the mix, especially with "luxury" items like televisions. Part of the decrease in TV ownership can be attributed to economic belt-tightening, particularly in rural or low-income households. You may also remember that back in the summer of 2009, the Federal Communications Commission mandated the switch from analog to digital broadcasting. After that transition, consumers were only able to watch TV via a newer TV with a built-in digital tuner, a satellite dish – or with a special digital-to-analog converter box to connect to their old analog set. Many people simply could

not afford that upgrade, even though the government tried to subsidize the converters.

But while Americans overall are watching less television for the first time in 20 years, now at 114.7 million, down from 115.9 million, Nielsen data shows that consumers are actually viewing more video content than ever before. Through the wizardry of technology, video can be viewed on multiple platforms, like laptops, tablets, iPods or smartphones. Another recent Nielsen study shows that the number of Americans watching video on their mobile devices rose more than 40 percent in the last two quarters of 2010. That's nearly 25 million people.

And, what does any of this mean? It means Nielsen still has a responsibility to measure all of this content and report the total picture of video consumption regardless of delivery method. # Keeping Your Mind in Perfect Peace

With turmoil all around us, people are edgy; their minds are being attacked by the enemy. They are doing things that they perhaps wouldn't ordinarily do. People have lost jobs and homes which causes stress. With the price of gasoline now days, it's getting harder to buy food and gas at the same time. For those still working, they can barely get to their jobs. Most people are living from paycheck to paycheck.

When a person's mind is being attacked, it would be a good thing for him or her to remember, "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on thee: because he trusted in thee." **Isaiah 26:3 (KJV)**

The philosopher Descartes once said, "I think, therefore I am." You are your mind and you are your soul. You are conscious because of your mind. When someone is asleep, they are unconscious. They are not aware of their surroundings or even their own existence. The Christian mind is spiritual not tangible (something

you can touch.) It can't be physically touched but it certainly has feelings.

Jesus told of a rich man that died and went to hell. The story is found in **Luke 16:19-31**. While in hell the rich man had a conversation with Abraham, he had recognized Lazarus, he felt pain, and he remembered his family back on earth. Many people are physically free, yet bound in their minds and they live in misery. The mind is like a sponge, it can absorb suggestions from certain types of music that we hear and certainly things that we see on TV. Certain types of music can affect a person's physical behavior as well. Some songs have a technique called "back-masking" meaning when the music is played backwards it has a different message that only the subconscious mind can translate. My former pastor, the late Elder Philip White, Pastor of Love Chapel COGIC in Dallas said many times, "Music can make an elephant dance."

The five senses that we should have can trigger the mind. It is said that the human mind is at least 1000 times more powerful and sophisticated than the most powered computer in the world. It can compute and process information at an enormous rate of speed no matter what a person's IQ may be.

In the Dale Carnegie's Golden Book, it states: "The Perfect Way to Conquer Worry is to Pray! Also, the Golden Book states that the "Fundamental Principles for Overcoming Worry," are: 1.) Live in "Day-tight compartments;" stay focused! 2.) Learn how to face trouble: Ask yourself, "What is the worst that can possibly happen?" "Prepare to accept the worst." "Try to improve on the worst." 3.) Remind yourself of the exorbitant price you can pay for worrying in terms of your health.

It may be hard to see how you're going to get through something, but, remember that it has been said



Renaissance. After graduating from the School of the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, at a time when racial and gender prejudices pervaded society, Jones began her career as a textile designer. She sold her bold fabric creations to department stores until a decorator told her that a "colored girl wasn't capable of producing such beautiful designs." This incident prompted Jones to shift her artistic focus to the fine arts so she could sign her name to her works.

During a brief teaching stint at Palmer Memorial Institute, a preparatory school in Sedalia, North Carolina, Jones created

several paintings that marked her transition from design to fine art. The paintings *Negro Shack 1, Sedalia, North Carolina* (1930) and *Brother Brown*

(1931) demonstrate the Regionalist character of her early paintings. Though far less vivid than the later works for which she became famous, these early paintings still clearly show her fascination with color and culture.

Jones' influences were extensive throughout the remainder of her career. Her lush oil paintings of the French countryside and traditional fruit and flower still lifes highlight her skillful observation of nature. The influence of philosopher Alain Locke, who encouraged Jones to

draw inspiration from African art, is evident in many of her later works, such as *Irma* (1972). She also conveyed the social struggles of African-Americans through powerful psychological portraits such as *Mob Victim* (1945) and *Jennie* (1943). Her marriage in 1952 to noted Haitian graphic artist Louis Vergniaud Pierre-Noël instigated a change in the subject matter and palette of her paintings. Her frequent trips to Haiti re-energized her strong design sense and inspired vivid acrylic and watercolor paintings that displayed a marked fascination with Caribbean culture. After additional travels that included African countries, her work became characterized by brilliant color, rich patterns and a variety of Haitian and African motifs.

In addition to her outstanding accomplishments as an artist, Jones was also a noted educator at Howard University in Washington,

D.C. for 47 years. It has been said that Jones was just as involved in her students' career developments as her own. Among her illustrious students are David Driskell, Elizabeth Catlett and Robert Freeman.

President Jimmy Carter

Washington, D.C. held an 89th birthday party for Jones and apologized for previous prejudicial policies. Loïs Mailou Jones continued to create her vibrant paintings until her death in 1998.
