

Mammograms: Digitally Yours

All mammograms start the same way—with an x-ray of the breast. But a newer type, called a digital mammogram, processes images differently. It records and stores images on a computer instead of on x-ray film.

Digital mammograms still require compressing the breasts to get quality images. According to the American Cancer Society (ACS), they have some ad-

vantages over film. Viewing and sharing -

"With digital mammograms, the radiologist can adjust the images on the computer screen to get a better look," said Kay Burnside, Medical Center of McKinney Women's Imaging Manager. "He or





During one of the worst economic times in the country's history, 30-year old Ash Cash has decided to take a leap of faith and quit his six figure job as a bank manager to pursue a dream of becoming an entrepreneur and teaching financial literacy. Born and raised in a single parent household in the St. Nicholas projects in Harlem, it was believed by Ash and most of his peers that they would be dead or in jail by the age of twenty-five. Somehow through faith, family support, hard work

and sacrifice he was able to avoid both.

With more than ten years of banking experience, Ash was able to work his way up the ranks from teller to personal banker, private banker branch manager. Throughout his career he managed a book of 400 affluent clients with assets ranging from \$100,000 to \$22 million, coached and trained over 100 sales professionals, opened and managed six branches and brought in almost \$90 million in deposits. Today he is an entrepreneur, motivational speaker, and the author of Mind Right, Money

carcerated youth. Simply put, Ash is on a mission to Financially Re-Educate Every Spectrum of Humanity.

Ash believes that the biggest problem in the community, as it pertains to money, is that "we spend money we don't have to buy things we

don't need to impress people we don't like."

He continues, "As a people, we are so used to not having money that we can't really grasp the concept of saving for the future and spending our money wisely. Couple that with the fact that a lot of us have low self-esteem and use expensive material things to make us feel better. Some of us would rather spend money on cars, jewelry and clothes than to become homeowners, save for emergencies or fix our credit. Our issues are deeply rooted and they become a cycle that is passed down from generation to generation making it more difficult to break. The good news is that there's a movement going on; people are starting to wake up and take more re-

sponsibility. We are seeing more of our people excel in positions that in the past didn't seem possible. This movement is what is spearheading the paradigm change and forcing many of us to put the first things first."

This is what led Ash to writing his book. Mind Right, Money Right: 10 Laws of Financial Freedom, is a book designed to teach readers how to effectively manage their personal finances. It shows, how with the right mental attitude and laser sharp focus, anyone

velop a following when she launched OutdoorAfro.com, the social media website that connects African Americans with the Great

Outdoors and with each other.

After all, there isn't any other place on the Internet

where African Americans who like outdoor activities such as camping, fishing, hikbicying, cling, rock climbing and river rafting can meet one another and find out about upcoming outdoor adventures with other African Americans.

W h a t Mapp didn't

expect was the continuing surge in website traffic and phone calls that have taken place since she publicized an RV trip with her family to Ponderosa Resort in the Sierra Nevada foothill community of Lotus two months ago.

"I'm getting people following me everywhere," said Mapp, a 40-year-old Oakland resident. "I'm getting lots of traction in California because that's where I'm from. But I'm also getting hits in New York, Seattle and Atlanta."

Mapp even got a phone call recently from an elderly Atlanta woman with a trailer, asking if she had any advice on how she could find other African Americans to go RVing with. Mapp did a quick Web search and put her in touch with a regional coordinator from the National African American RVers Association.

"These are the kinds of connections I'm trying to help people make," Mapp said, adding that the whole point of OutdoorAfro.com is to make camping and the enjoyment of nature accessible and relevant to the lives of African Americans, who typically are rarely seen in outdoor activities.

Mapp's next trip will be Oct. 21st to 23rd in a rental RV from El Monte RV. She'll head down Route 1, explore the coast, and camp overnight at Big Sur Campground and Cabins, which will serve as a base camp for Mapp and her family as they explore the many hiking trails, waterfalls and scenic coastline in the Big Sur area.

Mapp said she plans to shoot video, tweet and blog about her trip so that the roughly 7,000 African American members of OutdoorAfro.com can continue to follow her and share in her family's experiences as they explore scenic outdoor destinations across California

CampCalifornia.com and Big Sur Campground and Cabins are co-sponsoring her trip along with El Monte RV, which is supply-

Hey, Congress: My Future Isn't Just a Line Item in Your Budget

If you happened to be walking around Capitol Hill in Washington, you might have been seeing red. Plenty of it, and likely more than one kind.

In addition to the frustration many voters feel, hundreds of AARP members, volunteers and staff such as myself hit Capitol Hill this week in red shirts to deliver a forceful message to Congress: "Seniors aren't numbers. We aren't line items in a budget. And we're definitely not pushovers."

In Congress, a group of 12 very powerful law-makers, including Rep. Jeb Hensarling of Dallas, is now meeting behind closed doors to plan how to cut \$1.5 trillion out of the federal budget over 10 years

One proposal would cut Social Security benefits by \$112 billion, even though Social Security has not contributed one cent to the deficit. Another would raise the Medicare eligibility age, cutting benefits for younger retirees. For 65-year-olds alone--more than 200,000 Texans--this change would increase out-of-pocket costs by \$2,000 each year. Simply put, that's just wrong.

Who is being targeted to help solve the federal deficit? They are the oldest among us, those who have worked all their lives to make this country what it is today. And they are being treated like budget "line items" instead of people worthy of our respect... and of the Social Security benefits they've earned. It's just wrong.

But they're not the only ones who would be affected. While millions of Texans are working hard to keep food on the table and the lights on in this sluggish economy, the "supercommittee" is proposing stretching them even thinner. Premiums

for current Medicare recipients would go up, as the average cost of care would rise because only older people are in the system. Businesses would be hit hard too, as Texas workers would opt to stay on employee health care plans longer.

And it's not just potential cuts to benefits that are concerning. Supercommittee cuts could also endanger Texans' access to doctors and hospitals. That's just wrong.

really If Congress wants to look at seniors and numbers, let's look at these: Around 2.9 million Texas Medicare beneficiaries and 3.3 million Texas Social Security recipients could be harmed if Congress makes these cuts. Of those receiving Social Security, more than 49% rely on Social Security for half of their income or more. Cutting these crucial programs would be wrong.

For millions of Texans, Social Security and Medicare are vital safety nets. However modest, they're all the retirement assistance many people have. Half of Americans age 65 and older make less than \$18,500 each year, and the average person on Medicare pays \$3,000 each year out-of-pocket for medical expenses--a number that's continually on the rise.

On this issue, AARP members are solidly united. Republicans, Democrats and independents all agree that it's just wrong to cut the benefits they've worked for and depend on.

Now is the time for you to raise your voice. Call 1-888-322-1334 to tell your member of Congress to start focusing on cutting waste and tax loopholes. Harming millions of Texans who have worked their entire lives to earn Medicare and Social Security benefits is just wrong.

she can change the size, brightness or contrast to see certain areas more clearly." Some studies show that this reduces the number of women who need to return for further tests.

Both film and digital mammograms work well at finding breast cancer. However, several studies show that digital images may be more accurate in women younger than 50 and in women with dense breast tissue, reports the ACS.

Safe and effective -While all x-rays use radiation, the dose from both film and digital mammograms is small. In fact, one mammogram delivers about the same amount of radiation usually received in three months from natural sources

About half the mammograms administered today are digital. However, if there is only access to film mammograms, do not worry. Both types are remarkably adept at detecting breast changes early, when treatment works best

According to the ACS, women should start having yearly mammograms at age 40. If you are at high risk of breast cancer due to a familv history of the disease or other factors, your doctor may recommend that you be tested more often and at

an earlier age.



Sava Orthodox Church.



community," adds Hartley. One of the most pressing challenges she faces is addressing the general feeling of disconnect many members within the DCDP have felt. There is a famous saying...decisions are made by those who show up. Show up, be counted and make your voice heard because that is the only thing our elected representatives on any level will respond to," added Hartley.

year-old high school student Cheryl Dee Ferguson in Conroe, Texas, despite there being no physical evidence to convict him. Brandley, a janitor, was the only African American on staff at the high school, and it was reported that racial bigotry played a significant role in the case.

- · Gary Drinkard, sentenced to death in 1995 for the robbery and murder of an automotive junk dealer in Decatur, Ala. His conviction was overturned when it was ruled that inept legal representation left two key witnesses not being able to testify that Drinkard's recent back injury would have made committing the crime a physical impossibility.
- · Shujaa Graham, a native of Lake Providence, La., who was discovered to have been framed in the 1973 murder of a prison guard at the Deul Vocational Institute in Stockton, Calif. Before then he spent three years on San Quentin's death row.
- Jeremy Sheets, arrested for the rape and murder of 17-year-old Kenyatta Bush. He served five years on death row in Nebraska but was released based on unreliable evidence.

"The system is broken," Drinkard says. "I don't think the death penalty is appropriate for anyone. God is the only one who has the right to take a life."

Since 1973, 138 prisoners have been released from death rows around the country after they were shown to be innocent of the crimes for which they had been sentenced to die. This year marks 35 years since the United States reinstated capital punishment in 1976. During that time, 1,271 people have been electrocuted, shot, hanged, gassed or put to death by lethal injection; 475 of those deaths have occurred in Texas, which leads the nation in state-mandated executions. Virginia is second, with 109.

"The death penalty remains the most basic of all human rights violations, and its process is constantly called into question over issues of fairness, innocence and morality," says Rick Halperin, director of the Embrey Human Rights Program and Amnesty International USA's Texas State Death Penalty Abolition Co-

"All four of these men were subsequently freed and restored to their families in spite of the system and not because of it," he says. "They are living examples of all the tragic reasons why this nation shouldn't have a death penalty. Imprisoning and then killing people who are innocent is the worst mistake of all."

community relations for Walmart, said the return of the layaway program is the retailer's way to help customers ease their budgets.

"Our customers told us that they want a layaway option for Christmas. We also know the holiday season brings additional financial pressure and our layaway program will provide a worry-free way for our customers to fulfill their families' Christmas wish list."

Layaway allows customers to put merchandise

on hold and pay for the merchandise in installments until the full price of the items is paid in full. Once the layaway agree is fulfilled, the shopper is allowed to take the items home. However, there are more than a few requirements. According to Walmart's website, the total merchandise purchase price must be more than \$50 and each item must cost at least \$15. Furthermore, online purchases are not eligible for lavaway

Shoppers must claim

their layaway items by Dec. 16, otherwise the terms of the layaway are cancelled and the shopper will receive the payments made on the items, minus a \$10 cancellation fee and the \$5 service charge.

"We have learned that layaway enables customers to make payments when they want and for how much they want so they can focus on what's important during the Christmas season instead of stressing over mandated payments and how to tuck money away for gifts," Morales said.

Walmart, which did away with layaway in 2006, is not the only retailer to dig up the program. Sears Holdings, also owners of Kmart, brought layaways back to its stores in 2008 for back-to-school and holiday shopping seasons. Toys R Us also has a holiday layaway program for shoppers. DailyFinance reports Best Buy, Target, TJ Maxx, and Marshall's also have the program.



"But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and you shall be witnesses unto Me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." Acts 1:8 (KJV). "And five of you shall chase an hundred, and an hundred of you shall put ten thousand to flight: and your enemies shall fall before you by the sword." Leviticus 26:8 (KJV).

What most people need to realize is that the biblical definition "Church" is not an institution or building, but rather it is made up of individuals, more specific, Christians, individuals that believe in the virgin birth, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Jesus also said that wherever two or more get together for His name sake He would be in the midst of them.

In the Greek language the biblical word (Church) translated has the meaning of "the people of God." However, in the New Testament this word is used in two different ways. At times it refers to people of God gathered together in congregations, which is our traditional idea of the local

church. It also means believers in general, wherever they might find themselves.


