Lucille Clinton, poet and distinguished professor of humanities at St. Mary's College of Maryland (SMCAN) has been awarded the 2007 Ruth Lilly Poetry Prize. The prize includes a \$100,000 stirpend, which will be given at a ceremony May 23 in Chicago. The Lilly Prize is given by the Poetry Foundation, publishers of Poetry Magazine. Cliffon is the first African American woman tow in this award since it was first given in 1986.

## Daughter Of Martin Luther King Jr. Dies

Yolanda King, the Martin Luther King Ir.'s eldest child who pursued her father's dream of racial harmony through drama and motivational speaking, collapsed and died. She was 51.

King died late Tuesday in Santa Monica, Calif., said Steve Klein, a spokesman for the King Center. The family did not know the cause of death, but relatives think it might have been a heart problem, he said.

"She was an actress, authorproducer, advocate for peace and nonviolence, who was known and loved for her motivational and inspirational contributions to society," the King family said in a state-

## Farmer's Branch Challenged On Immigration Law



Latino activists and civil liberties advocates asked a federal judge Tuesday to block a voterapproved ordinance that prohibits landlords from renting apartments to most illegal immi-

The Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund and the American Civil Liberties Union, which have already sued the city, requested the temporary restraining order in U.S. District Court.

The ordinance, scheduled to take effect next Tuesday, requires apartment managers to veri-fy that renters are U.S. citizens or legal immigrants before leasing to them, with some exceptions. Violators face fines of up to \$500. The Farmers Branch measure exempts minors and people 62 and over from having to prove their immigration status or citizenship. Families that include citizens and illegal-immigrant members can lease housing if they meet three conditions: they're already tenants, heads

of households or spouses are legally in the U.S., and the family includes only a spouse, their minor children or par

ents.
"It is unfortunate that the residents of Farmers Branch have chosen to implement a law which is not only bad policv. but is likely also unconstit tional," said Lisa Graybill, legal director for the ACLU of Texas. "Now the issue will have to be resolved in federal court.

Local proposals aimed a regulating illegal immigration often fail to pass constitutional muster, said Muzaffar Chishti, director of the Migration Policy Institute office at New

York University School of Law "There is significant frustra tion, so that's what's driving it," Chishti said. "But the sim-ple fact is they cannot do too much other than impress upor the Congress the need for immigration reform."

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# **Proud To Be An Active** Partner In The Community

In my career, I have had the pleasure (and displeasure) of working for several different types of managers. All were interested in changing people's behavior in order to achieve a common goal. Some managers used fear and intimidation to change behavior, while others used kindness and common sense. And a few of them even used lies and deception. I recall one manager who had a problem with people leaving dirty dishes in the sink of the break room in our small office. His method of solving this issue was to periodically go into the kitchen and start breaking the dirty dishes on the floor. At first, it scared people into doing the right thing, but eventually it just became a loud, ineffective and illogical approach to the prob-

The voters in Farmers Branch remind me of that

On Saturday, the suburb of Farmers Branch overwhelmingly approved a city ordinance, which essentially bans apartment complexes in the city from renting to illegal immigrants. The vote generat-ed national attention for the town of 28,000, particularly since this was the first time such a measure was put to public vote in Those in favor of the ordinance have cited their disgust with the federal gov-ernment's inaction on illegal immigration. They are, in the words of Farmers Branch City Council Member Ben Robinson, "trying to do what the federal government won't do," and "stopping unbridled illegal immigration that threatens to make the U.S. a Third

World country,"

This is the same type of logic used by my plate-breaking manager. The kind of logic

that causes sharp, piercing pain sensations in my brain and frus-trates me to the point of want-ing to pull out my eyelashes with a pair of pliers. I could write three or four columns on how stupid and racist the Farmers Branch ordinance is, but I'll settle for pointing out its flaws on the surface levels. For starters, the measure

doesn't do anything tangible about the immigration problem. One of the main fallacies at work in Farmer's Branch is that keepents from renting going to keep people from cross-ing the border into Texas from Mexico. I got news for Farmers Branch residents: when you are desperate enough to leave the ntry of your birth in order to find livable wages that you ille-gally cross a national border under the threat of arrest and deportation, finding a place to live after you get to the U.S. is not a major concern. These folks are going to find somewhere to live after they get here, and they are not going to be deterred by some ordinance about apart

ment rentals.

Additionally, the Farmers Branch ordinance is senseless because it will be virtually impossible to enforce. Apartment owners and management companies will rent to whomever they choose to unless there is someone around monitoring their practices. Anyone recall how Hurricane Katrina victims in Dallas were discriminated against while trying to rent apartments? Unless Farmers Branch decides to employ undercover agents posing as illegal immigrant apart-ment seekers, I would bet money not one apartment complex will be cited for noncomliance with the new ordinance. Then there's the litigation.

There are already two lawsuits pending against Farmers Branch with a whole lot more to follow. Attorneys in one law suit against Farmers Branch

asked a federal court on Tuesday to issue an injunction to keep the city from implementing the approved ordinance. The Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund and the American Civil Liberties Union of Texas are representing Farmer's Branch apartment complexes and ten-

So not only will the new ordinance likely not be implement-ed anytime soon, odds are it will probably be declared unconstiional.

"Its unfortunate that the residents of Farmers Branch have chosen to implement a law which is not only bad policy, but is likely also unconstitution-al," said Lisa Graybill, legal director of the ACLU of Teves

Forget the moral issues, the legal issues with this ordinance are too many to mention.
Among them: its unconstitutional because the city is trying to regulate matters exclusively reserved to the federal govern-ment, it violates the Federal Housing Act because it disproportionately affects Latinos (42 percent of Latino households in Farmers Branch live in apartments), and it puts an ndue burden on apartmen complexes.

If the ordinance were com prehensive, by perhaps banning illegal immigrants from working or living in Farmer's Branch it would make more sense to me. But as it is, it strikes me as nothing more than a modern day version of Iim Crow. The ordinance doesn't make it more difficult for illegals to enter Texas, or get jobs. What the people of Farmers Branch are saying is "we don't want you liv-ing in our town," and to me, that's racist. Over 60 percent of the residents of Farmers Branch voted for this ordinance. In a town of 28,000 that makes me wonder who exactly are these

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## Just Over Broke (J.O.B.) -Why Not Consider Hiring Yourself?

By: Farrah Gray -NNPA Columnist Recent findings from The Bureau of Labor Statistics (a branch of the U.S. Department of Labor, which collects and distributes data about the current job market) report unemployment rate increases to 4.5.

We often forget that behind

every statistic, every number there are real people, trying to keep body and soul together.

Labor Department findings indicate small employment percentage increases nationwide However, these minor increases represent little real movement in job market or additional od on the table" for people who remain unemployed Research suggests that African-Americans most typically suffer from the downturn, and the income gap is not narrowing unemployment num bers are staggering.

The idea of building "personal economy" around a job is naive and obsolete, especially when one believes that the job will provide a permanent means of earning a living. This misun-derstanding can lead to personal and economic collans

I meet many individuals at events around the country, who classify lassify themselves as unskilled" or "semi-skilled" because their jobs require limit ed technical skills, yet those same individuals make renova tions on their homes, repair their cars, service appliances for friends, and mend toys for their children. These skills far exceed those required on their respective jobs. In short, it is ridiculous not to utilize the wealth of untapped abilities and vocational interests that one already possesses. I have contended for years that the best way to explore these "beyond-the-job" skills is to provide opportunities to use them in a self-employ-ment enterprise, where one's earning potential is vastly increased

The sky is the limit for the earning potential of an entrepreneurial enterprise. A person working a job for an hourly wage may quickly increase their earnings through self-employ-ment. No matter how good a ended, where potential earnings as a self-employed person are virtually limitless.

In short, financial potenti much greater in a personally run, smaller business than in a salaried job.

Naturally, success in self-

employment requires tremen-dous effort and we all know that there are risks involved.

As an entrepreneur, I appreciate how difficult it is to tra tion from the workplace to being self-employed. If individuals are accustomed to working for someone else, they've learned to take instruction and follow other people's rules and regulations. They are seldom recognized for taking initiative.

In becoming self-employed, one must assimilate new con cepts and ways of doing things They must learn a great deal about people, and how to successfully penetrate the market-place. Very often, these kinds of skills and insights differ greatly from what it takes to fulfill the requirements of a "J.O.B." posi-

Being successful in business equires a realistic understanding of your own strengths and weaknesses. You must be willing and able to take honest look at yourself. This self-assessment should include (but not be limited to) what you have learned or done on prior jobs. As I have indicated, many persons pos sess a wide range of skills developed outside of the workplace. Persons who may perform simple job tasks (such a drilling three holes in plexi-glass) can be found at home on weekends rebuilding an auto-mobile engine, refinishing fur-niture, making lamps, making clothes, and cooking gourme

I tinkered in the kitchen and developed the ingredients of a real, moneymaking business for producing and procuring over a million dollars in contracts selling "Farr-Out Foods Strawberry-Vanilla Syrup" as a

pre-teen.

I hope that I can encourage those who are unhappy with their jobs or have lost jobs and lost hope. They should begin to look carefully at their own inner resources and strengths. There are so many hidden vocational skills and interests that people never seem to pur-

skills and reactive old interests Believe it or not, you have all you need to put yourself to work. If you are seriously seeking employment in this current economy, why not consider hiring yourself?

Once the decision is made it's only a matter of w out the details.

I hope my forthcoming articles provide the guidance and inspiration necessary to help make this change possible.

## Recovered Views: African American **Portraits Photo Exhibit Opens** At Mesquite Arts Center

Recovered Views: African merican Portraits, American 1912–1925, opening May 15, 2007 at the Mesquite Arts Center, presents 40 photographs from a truly extraordi-nary collection. The majority of the exhibit is currently attributable to John Johnson (1879-1953; Lincoln Nebraska) although some images appear to be from an as yet unidentified photogra-pher. Mr. Johnson was the son of a black Civil War veteran and a lifelong resident of Lincoln. Community elders remember his travels through Lincoln by horse and buggy with camera and tripod, tak-

ing photographs.

The black-and-white portraits were made by an African American photographer who lived and worked in Lincoln, Nebraska, in the early part of the 20th century. These por-traits are more than just stun-ning images; they document life in a vibrant black community in a small Midwestern city, a society rarely depicted in any medium

The story of how these photographs came to light is almost as fascinating as the images themselves. In the spring of 1999, local researchers learned of a group of glass-plate negatives held by a prominent black family in Lincoln. It was immediately obvious from both the unique subject matter of the negatives and their exceptional artistic quality that this constituted an important find. Local and national publicity about the find led to another huge cache

of negatives by the same artist. Over 300 negatives have surfaced so far





This year's Legislature had the luxury of a \$14 billion surplus. That's far from the \$10 billion shortfall lawmakers faced in 2003. Much of it was already promised to property tax relief and state service increases because of popula-tion growth, but it was extra money. The result: easier budget debates, mostly about where to spend money instead of where to cut it. The Texas budget covers a two-year peri-od and will total about \$150 billion, counting state and federal funds. Both the House and Senate have approved a budget bill, now in a conference committee where legislators from the two chambers are working n a compromise.

Cervical Cancer

One piece of legislation that sailed through was a bill block-ing Gov. Rick Perry's cervical cancer vaccine order.
Lawmakers sent Perry the
rebuff with plenty of time left for an override vote if he decided to veto it.

Perry announced Tuesday he'd let it become law withou his signature.. In February, Perry issued an executive orde requiring the human papilloma virus vaccine for certain-age schoolgirls starting in September of 2008. The virus can cause cervical cancer. Lawmakers objected to the order. Some critics said Perry's order interfered with parental decisions or would encourage premarital sex.

After lengthy, debate, the Republican-backed proposal to require photo iden-tification or two other forms of identification at the voting booth won House approval.

The Senate's eleven

Democrats are blocking it from coming up from debate. Supporters of the proposal say it's meant to prevent non-citizens and other ineligible residents from voting. Critics claim it's intended to suppress votes and say it would most hurt minorities and the elderly, who aren't as likely to have the quired ID.

### Texas Primary

There's little opposition to a bill that would move the Texas primary up from March to Feb. 5 in 2008, so it's expected to make it over its final hurdles before the session adjourns Democrats and Republicans

alike support the bill. The measure is awaiting a Senate vote. If all goes as expected, Texas would have a much bigger say in the presidential primary and wouldn't be relegated to an after-thought

### Journalist Shield Law

A proposal to give journalists limited immunity from testify ing or providing evidence in court cases has passed the Senate. On the House side, it hasn't made it out of a committee. House Speaker Tom Craddick has said he supports some form of a shield law. The question he has said is how far

lapsed in the doorway.

Her death came less than a year and a half after her mother, Coretta Scott King, died in January 2006 after battling ovarian cancer and the effects of a stroke. Her struggle prompted her daughter to work with the American Heart Association to raise awareness about strokes, especially

among blacks.
Yolanda King, who lived in California, was an actress, ran a production company and appeared in numerous films, "Ghosts including "Ghosts of Mississippi." She played Rosa Parks in the 1978 miniseries "King."

"Yolanda was lovely. She wore the mantle of princess, and she wore it with dignity and charm," said the Rev. Joseph Lowery, one of her father's close aides in the civil rights movement. He added she was "thoroughly committed to the movement and found her own means of expressing that commitment ough drama "

The Rev. Jesse Jackson, who lso worked with her father, said: "She lived with a lot of the trauma of our struggle. The movement was in her DNA." The Rev. Al Sharpton called her a "torch bearer for her parents and a committed activist in her own right

White House press secretary Tony Snow said President Bush and the first lady were sad to learn of King's death, adding, "Our thoughts are with the King family today."
Yolanda King founded and

Yolanda Higher Ground Productions, billed as a "gate-way for inner peace, unity and global transformation." On her company's Web site, she described her mission as encouraging personal growth and positive social change

The flag at The King Center, where she was a board member, flew at half-staff on Wednesday.

born Nov. 17, 1955, in Montgomery, Ala., where her father was then preaching. Her brother Martin III was born in 1957: brother Dexter in 1961: and sister Bernice in 1963

She was just two weeks old when Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat on a bus there, leading to the Montgomery bus boycott spearheaded by her father.

When she was 10 weeks old, the King family home was bombed in Jan. 30, 1956, as her father attended a boycott rally. Neither she nor her mother was injured when the device exploded on the front porch.

In 1963, when she was 7, her father mentioned her and her siblings at the March on Washington, saying: "I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character.

She was 12 when her father was assassinated in Memphis, Tenn., in 1968.

King was a 1976 graduate of Smith College in Northampton, Mass., where she majored in theater and Afro-American studies. She also earned a mas-ter's degree in theater from New York University.

Yolanda King was the most visible of the four children dur ing this year's Martin Luther King Day in January, the first since her mother's death. When asked by The

Associated Press at that event how she was dealing with the loss of her mother, she responded: "I connected with her spirit so strongly. I am in direct contact with her spirit, and that has given me so much peace and so

much strength."

At her father's Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta, she performed a series of solo skits that told stories including a girl's first ride on a desegregated

bus and a college student's recollection of the 1963 campaign to desegregate Birmingham

She also urged the audience to be a force for peace and love, and to use the King holiday each year to ask tough questions about their own

beliefs about prejudice.

"We must keep reaching across the table and, in the tradition of Martin Luther King Jr. and Coretta Scott King, feed each other," she said.

Funeral arrangements would be announced later, the family said in a brief statement.

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
