Mr. President, It Is Time To Bring The Troops Home

It was like yesterday. We were attending a board of were attending a board of directors meeting at the US

Chamber of Commerce. As planned, we walked across the street to the Old Executive Office Building of the White House for a presentation by the President, George W. Bush. It was there on that rainy November afternoon that he told the business CEO's of America that he was going to lead us into war Iraq. He explained his logic and expressed utmost nfidence in our military leaders' war plan. The thing that surprised me the mostin retrospect, was that not one person leaked this meeting to the press. The world watched as the

White House built its case against Iraq from that date to February of the following vear. The deal was already done but there was a need to prepare the public.

Sooner or later you are going to be crippled or dead via a

war with no mission. This is not fair to those who sacrifice so much and bring grief onto their loved ones. It must really mess with

The Military the minds of young officers Industrial Complex, who lead their troops down who lead their troops down urban streets waiting for some bad guys, not enemy soldiers, to strike them with grenades and sneaky bombs That is not combat. It is police action and soldiers should not and cannot suc-cessfully do police action. Soldiers, especially American soldiers, should not practice and train for searching citizens' homes and chasing neonle down the streets whose total activity is ambush and run through a civilian infrastructure. This not military. How can the 'mightiest power on earth come down to this level? Russia, China, India, etc. must be thinking, "Their time is limited and our time is coming."

The MWBE program kick-off resembled a community celebration, with door prizes, snacks and city purchasing employees answering ques-tions for small to medium business owners. Among the participants however, were a small number of activists and minority business owners who remembered how those in power in Irving weren't always so willing to be inclusive of minorities seeking to do business with the city. That group has a heartfelt understanding of much time and sacrifice it has taken over the past thirteen years to make the city's MWBE program a reality. In 1981, the NAACP

nationally launched the Operation Fair Share Program ensure the reinvestment of African American consumer dollars back into the commu-nity through five areas, including minority purchasing. Locally, Irving NAACP founder and president, Anthony Bond, began a quest in 1994 to ensure that metroplex minority business owners were given a fair chance at competing for goods and services contracts in Irving. Unfortunately, the barriers were many and the results were mixed. "We me

met with Dallas Cowboy owner Jerry Jones and City of Irving officials to get commitments that they would consider minority vendors and contractors in the awarding of contracts," Bond reflected. I sat in Jerry Jones office when he signed an agreement to award 35% of work for the Cowboys to minority companies. The City of Irving never did respond in an organized way to our concerns; and we never made any real progress in getting them to adopt a formal minority procurement policy

Thirteen years later, after several city government administrations, an infinite number of meetings and propressively increasing com-plaints by minority groups, Irving, Texas has finally taken steps to include minority and women businesses in their purchasing decisions
