# **UN Expert Reports Gross Violations Of Human Rights**

All parties to the Darfur conflict continie to carry out "gross violations" of human rights, including killings, disap-pearances, torture and sexual violence, an independent United Nations rights expert

the human rights situation in Sudan, vesterday called for greater action to protect civilians in violence-wracked Darfur from breaches of international law.

"While the [Sudanese] Government has the primary responsibility in this regard, I welcome the recent approval of the [African Union] AU-UN peacekeeping force for the region," she said in a state-ment issued in Geneva after her visit to Sudan, which took place from July 25 to

August 2. Samar said she had received allegations

of serious violations areas under the control of the wing of the Sudan Liberation Army (SLA) controlled by Minni Minawi, a faction that was a signatory to the Darfur Peace Agreement (DPA) last year. Those allegations include torture, sexual vio harassment and extortion.

In South Darfur, Samai said she had also been told of forced disappearances and killings in the town of Gerida. "These cases uld be investigated and the perpetrators brought to

## Oakland Black Editor 'Assassinated', Police Say

ncey Bailey, 57, editor-in-chief of all five editions of the Post Newspaper and long time reporter covering the African-American and other communities, was gunned down in the street by an unknown assailant at 7:30 a.m. Thursday morning, August 2.

Devaughdre Broussard, 19, has been arrested for the murder. Police say he has confessed to the shotgun murder, saying he killed Bailey because of stories he was writ-ing on the bakery where he worked as a handyman, according to reports.

Bailey had been reporting on the finances of Your Black Muslim Bakery. Already on probation for a robbery convic-

tion in San Francisco, Broussard was arrested last Friday along with six other people in an early-morning police raid on the bakery and adjacent buildings. Reports quote police as saying they recovered the shotgun they believe was used to kill Bailey at the house in which Broussard was living near the bakery. Bailey was shot at the corner of 14th and Alice streets in downtown Oakland, appar-ently on his way to work. Roland Holmgren, Oakland police spokesman, said witnesses

told police that a single gur man, wearing a mask, sho Bailey several times and fled. Police and Crime Stoppers

of Oakland had offered up to \$25,000 in reward money for information leading to the

arrest of the suspect.
For over 20 years Bailey covered the African-American community for the Oakland Tribune. Prior to writing for the Tribune, he wrote for the Detroit News, UPI, and the Hartford Courant. After leav ing the Tribune, he continued to distinguish himself as a reporter on issues of concern to all communities. He was popular reporter for KDIA radio and Soul Beat TV, and wrote for various other publications, including the Sur Reporter and the Globe. ## **SCLC:** No Post-Civil Rights Movement

Southern Christian Leadership Conference, cele-brating its 50th anniversary for the past week, made a strong case that it is once again a major player on the civil rights stage and strongly defended the need for the continued existence of

major civil rights organizations.

Many critics had questioned the need for SCLC, saving the organization had essentially died in 1968 with co-founder Dr. Martin Luther King Ir. Immediate past president Fred Shutlesworth, who quit in 2004 after clashing with the SCLC board of directors, said the organization had reached its nadir in 2004, when he stepped down. Now, Shuttlesworth is optimistic about SCLC's chances for recovery.

Steele, a former Alabama State senator, is widely credited with revitalizing an organization that was moribund and nearly bankrupt three years. In three ears, he has raised more than \$7 million and on Monday pre pared to move into a new \$3 million international headquar ters on historic Auburn Avenue

"As an organization, just a few years ago, people were writing us off as dead. I am an undertaker. I bury dead people, but not dead organizations...we weren't dead, but we were struggling on life support." He says that has now turned around.

"I came here tonight to strong pulse," Steele continued. "We are out of our sick bed. We walked out of the Intensive Care Unit on our own power. We disconnected the tubes from our arms, we removed the heart monitor, and we unplugged the oxygen tank because now, thank God, we can breathe on our

Conservatives – and some Blacks – try to portray civil rights organizations as having outlived their usefulness. According to their argument, the movement is a victim of its own success because it tore down the barriers of segregation.

There is no post-Civil Rights Era," Steele declared. "We're in a post-civil rights enforcement era," he said, emphasizing the word enforcement. One common complaint against the Bush is that under this administration civil rights cases are not pursued with vigor, a shift from the practices of the previous president. Justice Department official deny that assertion.

But in his speech, Steele cited what he said was proof that we don't live in a post-civil rights

We're not living in a post-Civil Rights Era when Don Imus sees accomplished Black women basketball players at Rutgers University as "nappy-headed

in a post-Civil Rights Era when the chairman of the board of trustees of Roger Williams University in Providence, Rhode Island, a lily-White board, can n-word.

We're not living in a post-Civil Rights Era when the president of the United States of America can call a news conference on Dr. King's birthday to denounce affirmative action.

We're not in a post-Civil Rights Era when a Democratic-controlled Congress refuses to cut off funding for a needless and senseless war.

We're not living in a post-Civil Rights Era when a White person with a prison record is more like-

ly to be called back for a job inter view than a qualified Black per son without a record.

We're not living in a post-Civil Rights Era when 15-year-old Shaquanda Cotton can be sentenced to seven years in prison for pushing a teacher's aide in Paris, Texas. Just months earlier, that same judge had given probation to a 14-year-old White girl who had burned down her family's home.

We're not living in a post-Civil Rights Era when it took the Georgia Supreme Court to throw out the conviction of Marcus Dixon, a 19-year-old African-American, who was serving 10 years in prison for having consenual sex with a White girl

We're not living in a post-Civil Rights Era when in Douglas County, Ga., 17-year-old Genarlow Wilson faced 10 years in prison on molestation charges because he had consensual sex with a 15-year-old.

We're certainly not living in

post-Civil Rights Era when for years they had a tree near Jena High School in Louisiana under which only White students sat. When Blacks decided to sit there. they later found nooses hanging from tree limbs. Subsequently, a racial fight broke out and six Black teenagers – now called the Jena 6 – were charged with attempted murder after beating a White teenager.

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

## Report Says 2,100 Texas **Bridges Are Deficient**

By: Liz Austin Peterson - AP More than 2,100 Texas bridges were classified under the same structurally deficient rating given to the bridge that collapsed in Minnesota and killed at least four people, but state officials insisted Thursday that all the spans are completely

Structurally deficient bridges accounted for 4 percent of the state's approximately 50,000 bridges in a 2006 report by the Texas Department of Transportation. Seventy-seven percent of Texas bridges were labeled good or better, while most of the rest were deemed functionally obsolete, meaning they were not designed to han dle the current traffic demand.

But department spokesman Mark Cross said there is no reason for Texans to worry about a repeat of the bridge collapse that happened Wednesday evening in Minneapolis. The eight-lane Interstate 35W bridge was in the midst of renairs when it buckled during the evening rush hour, sending dozens of cars plummeting more than 60 feet into the sippi River and injuring 79 people.

We talked to our state bridge engineer and that is the first thing he said: Texas has an aggressive bridge inspection program, and all bridges in Texas are safe," Cross said.

Texas ramped up its bridge repair efforts in 2001, setting a requirement that at least 80 per-cent of bridges be in good or better condition within a decade. That percentage has steadily increased to 77 percent as of September 2006, the department said in its report

The new standard was set a nonth before a towboat captain lost control of four barges in a strong current and slammed into the bridge leading to South Padre Island. The force caused the midsection of the Queen Isabella Causeway to tumble into the water 85 feet below. Motorists drove blindly into the chasm in the road, and eight

The 2001 accident ultimately was blamed on heavy currents, pilot error, and insufficient horsepower for the load at hand.

State Sen. Robert Nichols, a Republican from Jacksonville who was a member of the Texas Transportation Commission at the time of the collapse, said the incident made state officials even more cautious about proecting bridges.

Bridges are inspected at least

every two years. Cross said, and those with critical issues are checked out more frequently.

Inspectors look for corrosion deterioration and damage and check for cracks that signal fatigue, said Joseph Yura, a professor emeritus of engineer at the University of Texas at Austin who specializes in structural steel design.

"Like everything that gets older, there's some deteriora-tion, but that doesn't mean that the bridge is unsafe," Yura said. "If it gets to the point of being unsafe, it's going to be closed. That's all there is to it." Even bridges deemed struc-

turally deficient are still canable of carrying much more weight than could possibly be applied. Nichols said.

Engineers design bridges to hold two or three times more weight than they are expected to carry, Nichols said. That means a bridge is still safe even if deterioration has left it only capable of handling two-and a-half times the expected amount of weight.

"I think people in Texas can feel very comfortable with their safety on the bridges,

Nichols said. State Sen. John Carona, a Dallas Republican who chairs the Senate transportation com-mittee, said he hopes the new national focus on bridge safety convinces his colleagues to put more money into road construction and maintenance

More than half of Texas bridges were built before 1971, according to the transportation department. Of those bridges, more than 9,000 were built before 1950. Many of those aging structures will need to be upgraded or replaced in the near future, said Carona, who wants to raise the motor fuels tax by 10 cents and tie it to inflation.

"While our bridges are safe today, they won't necessarily be safe tomorrow unless we devise a more adequate funding mechanism," he said.







The moral, in a sense, is not that the Columbine High massacre could have been prevented, but that we should be grateful, in a culture as sprawling and vio-lence-ridden as ours, that it does not happen every day.

The Special Rapporteur, who reports to the UN Human Rights Council, noted that both the Council and the Sudanese Government have undertaken or pledged to carry out steps and measures to ame-liorate the conditions inside Darfur, where more than 200,000 people have been killed since 2003 and another 2 million people forced to flee their homes

"I welcome the Government's acknowledgement of the seriousness of the situation," she said, urg-ing Khartoum to quickly carry out the recommendations of a group of UN rap-porteurs and other experts – which she presides over – on the situation in Darfur.

Fighting began in Darfur, an impoverished and arid region of western Sudan that is almost as large as France, when local rebels took up arms against the Government, which then responded with the support of notorious militia known as the Ianiaweed.

In her statement Samar also said that civil and political rights are breached in other regions of Sudan, despite the Government's efforts to introduce legislative bills to ensure that its armed forces, police and national security apparatus

national security apparatus comply with international legal obligations. The situation is also tough in the "transitional areas" in the wake of the comprehensive peace agree-ment in January 2005 ending the north-south civil war, according to Ms. Samar. Those regions are officially administered by the north but its popula-tions are linguistically and ethnically closer to the south, causing "particular problems," especially given that two parallel judicial systems are in place

He also said people with minor injuries were sent to wait too long in the emergency rooms for treatment.

"People shouldn't have to spend all day in the emer-gency room," Ogwu said. The Alpha Medical Center

covers everything from pedi-atrics, physical therapy rehabilitation, work injuries, family practice and more

Ogwu said his center provides immediate treatment, and no appointment is nec-essary. The center also pro-vides free transportation within a 15-mile radius of

the clinic for patients.

"Our mission for the Alpha Medical Center is to provide quality and compre-hensive basic healthcare with compassion and con-venience," Ogwu said.

Ogwu currently resides in Plano with his wife, Banny, and their three boys: Austin; 18; Tony, 16; and Ike, 8.

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

"All the black men literally pushed (us) out the way to talk to the blondes," said Jones, who soon declared, "I'm going to date whoever.'

Black men and women have

openly feuded before.

"To a certain degree, black people are sick of each other. Alexander said "It would be better for black men and black women to open their options.

But Avo Handy-Kendi, creator of Black Love Day, argues blacks are simply reacting to messages linking success with whiteness. She referred to a string of successful athletes with white partners, including

golfer Tiger Woods.

"They normally rejected their culture and they went to the acceptable standard of a white wom said Handy-Kendy, thought it ironic high-achieving black women were mimicking the behavior.

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
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
