All religious faiths and people of good will are invited to the participate in the rituals for those who perished in the Middle Passage along with those who were worked to death in the Americas.

Between the 15th and 19th centuries, at least 100 million African men, women and children were captured, kidnapped or brought out of Africa by European slave traders to be sold into concentration labor camps (plantations) in the Americas. "Our enslaved African ancestors provided labor on plantations in North and South America to enrich Europeans and it was this free labor that provide the foundation for the Europeans current economic well being," explains Third Eve member John Howard

face in this country? Who will benefit from the dollars we spend to accomplish our goals?

The answer to both questions should be, "Us." The revolution will not be televised, but it will have to be financed, and we should benefit economically from our expenditures and activities associated with our fight for freedom. Currently we are benefiting everyone else as we run for freedom, as we protest, as we demonstrate, and as we conduct our conventions and other meetings around the country.

I am proud to say that I will be attending the Bring Back Black meeting at the Black owned and operated Dudley convention complex in Kernersville, North Carolina; we have a Black caterer preparing our food, and everything else that can be done with Black vendors either has been or will be done.

No, every convention cannot do that, but if we create conscious Black millionaires, some of them would do what the Founder of Compro Tax, Jackie Mavfield, is doing in Beaumont, Texas: building his own meeting and convention center. Mayfield is, indeed, a conscious Black millionaire and, like others that I know, he is not only taking care of his family, but he is also doing a great deal to help others via business opportunities and his philanthropic efforts.

Now imagine what progress we would make if we created more millionaires like Mayfield. The good news is that we can do it! All we need to do is put our financial support behind the efforts of a conscious brother or sister who has demonstrated a willingness to sacrifice and walk the walk when it comes to the overall empowerment of Black people.

Look around in your city and see who is doing what; check out the Black business owners who are sharing their resources as they do well. Look for brothers and sisters who are committed to true freedom for Black people, and support them with your dollars, by buying from them,

or by volunteering your time to help them.

Then look around the country and find others you can support in some way. Send an encouraging message. tell your friends about them, purchase something from their business, and watch them grow. Then, watch those brothers and sisters use their resources to assist Black folks in 0111 fight empowerment. Conscious brothers and sisters consider it their "reasonable" service to support one another, to contribute to each other's causes. and to let their actions speak louder than their words.

We have created a lot Black millionaires by supporting them and doing whatever they tell us to do. On a local level as well as a national level, we should have some collective gain from the

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

Crack Mars Federal Justice System

By: James W. Breedlove disparity crack cocaine punishments has evoked racial overtones because crack is treated more harshly than powder cocaine and the vast majority of crack defendants are black.

This disparity is a direct result of the infamous and equally onerous Anti Drug Abuse Act of 1986 hastily passed by Congress in response to the death of Len Bias, the African American college basketball star who died complications from related to drug and alcohol ingestion three days after being drafted by the Boston Celtics.

Len Bias' death shocked the nation and sparked a media frenzy largely focused on crack cocaine that had been mistakenly suspected of killing him. Prior to Len's death on June 19, 1986 recreational use of cocaine made occasional headlines and its potential harm did not get much attention. But the death of this phenomenal athlete, who was being touted as the next coming of Michael Jordan, immediately placed crack cocaine in the spotlight.

Within a few weeks αf death, Bias' Congress under pressure from the media attention devoted to crack and approaching mid-term elections decided to act quickly. The regular legislative procedure was set aside based on the perception that the nation was under siege from crack. Because of the expedited legislative schedule there was no committee report to document Congress' intent for the law or to analyze how the legislation resolved the prob-

Few hearings were held in the House and the Senate conducted only a single hearing on the extreme 100:1 penalty ratio between a crack and powder cocaine offense. President Ronald Reagan signed the Anti Drug Abuse Act into law October 27, 1986.

The law established for the first time mandatory minimum sentences based on specific quantities of cocaine. The Act provided that individuals convicted of crimes involving 500 grams of powder cocaine or just 5 grams of crack (the weight of two pennies) were sentenced to at least 5 years imprisonment and that individconvicted of crimes involving 5000 grams of powder cocaine or 50 grams of crack (the weight of a candy bar) be sentenced to 10 years imprisonment.

Two years later, with drug-related crimes increasing, Congress its intensified war against crack cocaine by legislating a 5-year mandatory minimum and 20-year maximum sentence for simple possession of 5 grams or more of crack cocaine. The maximum penalty for simple possession of any amount of powder cocaine remained at no more

than 1 year in prison. In the twenty years since the passage of the Anti Abuse Act many of the myths and perceptions surrounding crack cocaine have been dispelled, as it became clear that there is no scientific or medial justification for the 100:1 disparity ratio. The United States Sentencing

Commission, created by Congress in 1984 to study fair federal senguidelines, tencing concluded that crack is not appreciably differfrom powder cocaine in either its chemical composition or the physiological and psychoactive reactions of users.

On three separate occasions the Sentencing Commission has urged Congress to reconsider the statutory penalties for crack cocaine. The discrepancv remains despite the Commission's recommendations and concurrence from judges, federal prosecutors, medical professionals, and other experts. On the 20th anniver-

sary of the Anti-Drug Act, the Abuse Civil American Liberties Union issued the report, "Cracks in the System: Twenty Years of the Unjust Federal Crack Cocaine Law." The report chronicles discriminatory effects of the drug law that continues to devastate African American and low-income communities. It also explains how the 100:1 disparity between crack and powder cocaine causes an unjustified racial disparity in our penal system.

As law enforcement focused its efforts on crack offenses a dramatic shift occurred in the incarceration trends for African Americans. This trend effectively transformed federal prisons institutions into increasingly dedicated to incarcerating African Americans.

The report includes data showing that African Americans make up 15 percent of the country's drug users, yet they are 37

percent of those arrested for drug violations, 59 percent of those convicted, and 74 percent of those sentenced to prison for a drug offense. More than 80 percent of the defendants sentenced for crack offenses are African American. despite the fact that more than 66 percent of crack users are white or Hispanic.

Policy recommendations included in the report are: The quantities of crack cocaine that trigger federal prosecution and sentencing must be equalized with the current of powder cocaine. Federal prosecutions should focus on high-level traffickers of both crack and powder cocaine. Mandatory minimums for crack and powder offenses, especially the mandatory minimum for simple possession, should be eliminated.

The Supreme Court heard testimony on October 2, 2007 on the disparity in crack and powder cocaine sentences. Hopefully, the justices will provide guidance on giving judges discretion in imposing equitable sentences for crimes involving crack cocaine and powder cocaine.

While it is fortunate the Supreme Court agreed to hear this case the public demand that Congress address this 20-year old unjust law. Since the sentencing disparity between crack and powder crime is a direct result of Congress' hasty and irrational actions the responsibility for correcting the inequity should also be theirs and not thrust upon the judiciary.

U. S. Opens Military Command Center In Africa

(GIN) - In a worrying sign of U.S. military expansion on the continent, a new command centre for U.S. military operations in Africa has been launched.

But with few African leaders willing to be seen linked closely Washington, the headquarters was set up in the German city of Stuttgart.

According to U.S. officials, Africa Command, or AfriCom, this week reached its "initial operating capability" to start functioning as Defense Department's newest regionally focused major command.

Some 1,500 US troops are already in Djibouti, neighboring Ethiopia and Somalia, on "anti-terror" operations in the Horn of Africa.

But Africans, citing Iraq and Afghanistan, see twin dangers from Africom in the form of increased US meddling and possible military intervention, and by making Africa a target of the

US's global enemies

Out of all the African countries, only Liberia has offered to host the headquarters, although access agreeements have secured been Senegal, Mali, Ghana, Gabon and Namibia.

"There will be no military base in Zambia or the SADC region," said Zambian President Levy Mwanawasa, current head of the 9-member state Southern African Development Community.

Zambian government spokesman Mulongoti told Reuters: "It is like allowing a giant to settle in your home. And what would you do if you find him with your wife?"

According to Emira Woods in Foreign Policy in Focus, what Africa needs least is U.S. military expansion on the continent ... What Africa needs most is its own mechanism to respond to peacemaking priorities.

Nigeria Nabs 'Foreign Spies' in Oil-rich **Delta Region**

(GIN) - With tensions again heating up in the oil-rich Niger Delta region, police this week made a highly publicized arrest of an American peace worker and two German companions, accusing them of "espionage and terrorism."

The Delta region is home to all of Nigeria's oil, responsible for 95 percent of hard currency earnings, but most of the residents of the Delta live in abject poverty.

Fury Over DNA Testing For Would- Be Immigrants From Africa

(GIN) - Senegal's president has criticised a French plan to carry out voluntary DNA testing of would-be immigrants who want to join their families in France.

"It is a serious mistake," Abdoulaye Wade told a French news agency. Trying to scientifically prove one's kinship was "not respectful of human freedom", he said.

The upper house of the French parliament is due to consider the DNA measure soon.

France is racing to deport 25,000 illegal immigrants by the end of the year - a quota set by President Nicolas

Sarkozy, as part of a tough new immigration bill which was approved by the lower house last month.

DNA testing is intended to speed up the visa application process for would-be immigrants. But critics believe such tests would exclude many people unable to

pay for the test. The new bill has been criticised by some members of President Nicolas Sarkozy's centre-right government.

The legislation would require immigrant family members older than 16 to demonstrate a good knowledge of French language and values.

Breast Cancer More Deadly In Black Women

A new study gives a possible explanation for why breast cancer is more deadly in black women: they are more likely to have tumors that do not respond to the hormone-based treatments that help many others with the disease.

The study is the largest yet to link a biological factor to the racial disparity, which also has been blamed on black women getting fewer mammograms and less aggressive treatment.

"This puts biology more to the forefront," said Dr. Julie Gralow, a cancer specialist at the University of Washington School of Medicine familiar with the work. "It's not just access to care, access to creatment and other factors that have been

implicated in the past."

The study was led by Dr. M. Catherine Lee of the University of M i c h i g a n Comprehensive Cancer Center and is to be presented at a conference starting Friday in San Francisco, organized by the American Society of Clinical Oncology and other cancer groups.

An estimated 178,480 new cases and 40,460 deaths from it are expected in the United States this year.

Blacks are less likely than whites to develop breast cancer but are more likely to die from it, doctors have long known. Blacks also are diagnosed at younger ages and at later stages of disease.

Researchers for the first time used the National Cancer Data Base, a tumor registry maintained by the

American College of Surgeons, to explore these issues, using more than 170,000 cases diagnosed in 1998. Ten percent were in black women.

The study focused on the 95,500 women whose cancers were invasive rather than still confined to a milk duct. About 39 percent of such tumors in black women were estrogen receptor-negative, or ER-negative, compared with 22 percent of those in white women

Drugs that block this estrogen, like tamoxifen and a newer class of medications called aromatase inhibitors, work against these cancers.

ER-negative tumors are resistant to such therapies and harder to treat. Other tools like chemotherapy, radiation and targeted bio-

3.5 college GPA and meet other requirements.

Prior to joining Paul Quinn College, Mr. Sorrell founded the public affairs/sports management firm Victor Credo, LLC. Prior to that, Sorrell served as a director at national public affairs firm Public Strategies, Inc, as Director of Communications and Government Relations for the City of Dallas' Olympic bid committee, as an attorney for Luce and Williams, Ltd. Ienkens & Gilchrist, and Donohoe, Jameson & Carroll and in the Clinton White House as a special assistant for the President's Initiative on Race.

Mr. Sorrell officially accepted the position Wednesday, Sept. 26. The inauguration celebration will take place in the fall.





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UT-Dallas Proposes to Develop Inventor's Identity Management System



Ray de Beasley's inexhaustible strength and unbridled spirit has lifted him over rough roads and carried him through troubled times. In his 45 years, he has seen a side of life that would have broken most mortals if not killed them. But Ray says his past is a mere blip on the radar screen compared to what lies ahead...proving to the federal government and the world's largest corporations that he can eliminate fraud to the point of deterring and preventing identity theft

Ray de Beasley's concept, called B-System, is a proprietary software and hardware design that couples massive data manipulation with existing technology. The model is so highly regarded and potentially lucrative that it is attracting the attention of some of Dallas' high tech heavy hitters.

Tom Hill, who is in charge of Applications Services and Field Operations for Electronic Data Systems (EDS), met Ray in April of 2006 and evaluated the discovered intellectual proper-"I reviewed the B-System concept document and found it engag-Hill believes that ing." the B-System, "Potentially solves an enormous identity management problem facing the United States Government and our state government."

The same sentiment is echoed in the halls of the University of Texas at (UT-Dallas.) Dallas According to Dr. Doug Harris, an Associate Dean and Research Professor, "With the current problems of identity theft, it is difficult to estimate the magnitude, value and impact of this program, but it will be huge." Dr. Harris knows of what he speaks. He is also the Executive Director of the Cyber Security and Emergency Preparedness Institute at UT-Dallas' Erik Jonsson School of Engineering and Computer Science.

Identity theft affects several million Americans every year, disrupting their lives for months, if not years, while costing the government and businesses tens of billions of dollars. Most of the fraud is perpetrated electronically. Lax safeguards allow thieves to by-pass security systems to anonymously steal from banks, merchants, and governments.

Ray de Beasley knows something of crime and how the system works. He was inmate number 592557 within the Texas Prison System for 15 years. Family and friends thought prison was the last place de Beasley would land. As a youth, he was a champion athlete who won state as a shot putter for a Dallas high school. After graduation he was given a scholarship to play football for the University of Houston. De Beasley's bright future began to fade in 1982 when a nagging high school football injury ended his college athletic career and bumped him onto a different course

By 1990, de Beasley was serving time on a drug charge. While in prison he lived and worked around inmates who were masters of financial crimes. Combined with his own expertise, de Besaley learned new financial counter-reverse-fix techniques. He would often challenge other convicts to see whether they could outsmart various security scenarios. "My first assigned job on the Coffield Unit was key punching data entry for Texas Driver's licenses and everyone around me seemed to have extensive fraud and forgery experience," says de Beasley.

"With my mother as my secretary and researcher on the outside, we started searching for common denominators that made financial crimes successful. I started an in-prison think tank with several convicts to kick around various criminal capabilities. By 2001, I discovered a technique that countered the illegal use of social security numbers. Shortly thereafter, I developed an algorithmic method that would prevent financial fraud without violating any civil liberty or challenging any banking laws or regulations."

According to de Beasley, the B-System method is based on social security numbers. It will be able to absolutely verify that:

• You are an American before being issued a social security number, and

• That social security cardholders are who they say they are.

Ray de Beasley says, "B-System works using a person's biometric print and sophisticated security methods. It would provide a nationwide ability to protect issuing of social security numbers on the front-end, while securing use by citizens' on the back-end. For instance, if B-System were in place during the post-Katrina aftermath it would have prevented the multi-million dollar fraud perpetrated with FEMA credit cards. B-System will provide the 'smart' technology without the need or use of any additional 'cards'."

Ray de Beasley's ingenuity is drawing important allies and opening exclusive doors His enthusiasm and smarts made Tom Hill into a Mr. Hill, as an fan. EDS Fellow, is considered as one of the company's finest minds. He is as impressed with the B- System concept as he is the inventor. "Mr. de Beasley has the determination to succeed, his idea has integrity, and you can tell he has a passion for what he is trying to accomplish," exclaims Hill.

Ray de Beasley approached University of Texas at Dallas on June 18, 2007 for a potential partnership. After reviewing the B-System proposal, Dr. Harris was convinced of the merits. "A working program such as B-System could save companies and individuals many millions of dollars. It would also eliminate the horrific problem for many people to regain their identity and reputation."

Dr. Harris hopes a B-

System Privacy Protection Method prototype can be developed quickly. "Our goal at the Cyber Security and **Emergency Preparedness** Institute is to develop a working 'proof of concept' system of the B-System based on Mr. de Beasley's patent application. This should be done with expediency before competitors develop an alternative system."

UT-Dallas is not the

only research institute interested in the B-System. Faculty members at Midwestern State University in both the Department of Computer Science and the Dillard College of Business Administration have expressed interest in being a part of the project. Dr. Ranette Halverson, the Computer Science Chair, thinks de Beasley has solved the puzzle. "de Beaseley had the vision to put together all the many existing pieces of technology. . . hardware, software, and people...that would be necessary to provide a global solution."

Not everyone share's de Beasley's enthusiasm, but that doesn't lessen his determination. Some people don't have the vision to see how B-System could work on a



national and international scale." "On the other hand," adds de Beasley, "who saw Google coming?"

Ray de Beasley's supporters agree. Dr. Don Hicks is a special assistant to UT-Dallas' President. He's also a professor at the School of Economic, Political and Policy Sciences. Without reservation he feels that, "While de Beasley's Identity Management System ultimately may not be commercializable for lack of resources, etc., de Beasley himself could make important contributions to a company or design team working on the problem. With luck Ray might be able to license his design to a corporation with the resources and scale to bring a product to market. Whatever companies – and there are/will be several – will face a global multi-billion dollar market."

On May 23, 2007, de Beasley filed for the Utility Patent Application for the B-System Privacy Protection Method. Since that time, he has worked towards obtaining the investments to develop a working model. Dr. Harris states, "The next step is to raise the funds to develop a working 'proof of concept' system. If it isn't started within the next 3 months it might be too late. After 'proof of con-

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cept', the full development and implementation of this program will cost a few million dollars before it is finished and ready for expanded commercial use."

UT-Dallas colleague Dr. Hicks adds that, "de Beasley will need to move his Identity Management System into a position where others can invest in it and provide the resources to make it 'market-ready'. That means that he needs to find a way to fund a formal technology assessment such as that performed by UT-Dallas or EDS."

The task could prove monumental, but his supporters have faith. "de Beasley does not take no for an answer," says Dr. Halverson. "As they say, the trip of a thousand miles begins with one small step. Ray de Beasley has taken many of the steps and is getting closer to reaching his goal and seeing his plan implemented."

Hill of EDS agrees, "Mr. de Beasley is doing it by the numbers; (1) he is legally protecting his intellectual property, (2) he is educating himself in start-up venture processes, (3) he will be open to changing his idea when a timely opportunity is on the horizon. Most careers can be summed up into three key elements: preparation, opportunity, and timing. When they all line up, you have a winner."

Dr. Hicks is amazed how far Ray has come and what he has accomplished. Hicks is also impressed with de

Beasley's growing number of admirers. "In an incredibly generous gesture, Tom Hill has agreed to fund out of his own pocket Ray's tuition in an SMU course that teaches formal entrepreneurship skills and how to launch a business. Whether his Identity Management System is eventually a commercial success or not, Ray Beasley is likely to be a success in whatever he does."

Breast Cancer Page 5 logical drugs then become more important for such women, and doctors should consider this when they evaluate black women with the disease, Lee said.

In the study, ER-negative tumors were more common in black women at every stage of disease and at all ages.

For example, only 17

percent of early stage tumors in white women were ER-negative, but 31 percent in black women were. Of the most advanced cancers, 31 percent in whites and 46 percent in blacks were ER-negative.

Echoing previous research, the new study found that black women were diagnosed at younger ages - an average of 57 years old versus 62 for white women and with more advanced disease: only 29 percent had early stage tumors versus 42 percent of white women. They also had larger tumors and more cell traits that are signs of a poor prognosis.

Smaller studies have suggested biological differences between breast cancer in blacks and whites. Earlier this year, the Carolina Breast Cancer Study found that young black women were more likely to have an aggressive form called the basal-like subtype.

Last fall, two studies by researchers from the University of Texas M. D. Anderson Cancer Center found that black

women were more likely to have larger, later-stage tumors and lower survival rates than Hispanic and white women given similar treatments.

But these findings do not mean that differences in screening and health care are not contributing to the trend, especially in certain parts of the country, said Dr. Wendy Woodward, a

breast cancer specialist at M.D. Anderson.

Dr. Len Lichtenfeld, deputy chief medical officer of the American Cancer Society, agreed. Racial disparity in breast cancer survival did not appear until the mid-1980s, suggesting that much of it is due to lack of screening mammograms and access to care, he said.
