## New Tax Rebate Deal Announced, Checks Likely in June

ST. LOUIS (NNPA) -Congressional leaders have unveiled a deal with the White House on an economic stimulus package that would give most tax filers refunds of \$600 to \$1,200, and more if they have children.

The Associated Press

reported that House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-Calif.) said Congress would act on the agreement — hammered out in a week of intense negotiations with Republican Leader John A. Boehner and Treasury Secretary Henry Paulson -"at the earliest date, so that those rebate checks will be in the mail." A statement delivered by

President Bush to reporters at the White House praised the agreement. "This package has the right set of policies and is the right size," he said.

The rebates, which would go to about 116 million families, had appeal for both Democrats and Republicans. Pelosi's staff noted that they would include \$28 billion in checks

to 35 million working families who wouldn't have been helped by Bush's original proposal. Republicans, for their part, were pleased that the bulk of the rebates more than 70 percent, according to an analysis by Congress' Joint Tax Committee — would go to individuals who pay taxes. ## THE TRUTH CLINIC **Beware Of Politicians Bearing Gifts**

President Bush and House Speaker Nancy Pelosi announced last week that they had agreed on a compromise emergency economic stimulus plan to give over \$150 billion dollars to the American people.

For some there was an automatic measure of skepticism prompted by the disbelief that President Bush and a Democratic House teamed up for an instant burst of bi-partisan economic legislation after engaging in bitter nonproductive budgetary fighting for two years.

At first glance the proposal appears to be a solution to America's economic anemia. Their plan would give individual taxpavers with adjusted income less than \$75,000 up to \$600 in tax rebates, working couples with adjusted incomes less than \$15,000 up to \$1,200 and those with children an additional \$300 per child. Initial estimates are that 117 million families will receive a cumulative \$100 billion and businesses will get \$50 billion in incentives to invest in new plants and equipment. As the world stock

markets hemorrhaged in response to America's economic woes the stimulus package, while making an appealing political statement, is in reality bad economics.

Paul Krugman writes in the New York Times: "Unfortunately, the plan which essentially consists of nothing but tax cuts and gives most of those tax cuts to people in fairly good financial shape -- looks like a

lemon." Sending checks to people in good financial shape does little or nothing to increase overall spending.

One segment of the needy population seems to be left out entirely. About 20 million senior citizens living chiefly on social security will not get rebate checks unless they have at least \$3,000 earned income or pay income taxes based on other sources such as earnings, interest, investments or private pension plans.

Even selected targeting for tax rebates and similar cash transfusions will not stimulate the economv. No concrete economic evidence validates that middle and upperclass families are more likely to spend rebate checks than the poor and unemployed. However, traditional economic theory holds that rebates will have limited stimulus impact unless recipients believe they will have permanent income. The reality is that once the rebate is spent the recurring expenses for basic necessities (rent, food, utilities, clothing, and transportation) remain. Without a weekly paycheck the short lived economic respite is nothing more than a temporary blip.

In reality, the rebate provision and tax incentive appears to be little political than more grandstanding to make it appear like something is being done. What is needed most are jobs that provide recurring income.

Perhaps the Works Progress Administration (WPA) model used during the Great Depression of the 1930's should be dusted off and tailored to address the current economic crisis.

The WPA economic stimulus program was initiated by Franklin D. Roosevelt to provide jobs and income to the unemployed in rural and urban communities across the nation during the catastrophic economic period preceding World War II. Created in April, 1935 by Presidential order the program was funded by Congress in July.

There were approximately 20 million persons on relief in the United States confronting the daily hardship of obtaining food, clothing and shelter. Planning for an economic stimulus to help the beleaguered families focused on creating jobs. Removing those considered ineligible for employment (children, housewives. students. incapacitated, aged) from the 20 million on relief it was estimated that approximately 3.5 millions jobs were needed via the WPA initiative.

WPA employed a maximum of 3.3 million by November 1938. At the peak of the WPA program about 15.2 percent of the jobs were held by blacks.

Program participants built many public buildings, roads, bridges, dams and other infrastructure projects. They fed children, redistributed food, clothing and housing. Additionally, they developed and operated large art, drama, media and literacy proj-The WPA was the ects. largest employment base in the country until closed down by Congress in 1943 because of the economic boom caused by the war.

While many are enamored with the proposed 2008 economic stimulus plan we should be reminded of the terrible pitfalls that can result following a self-serving rush to judgment. Five years of being bogged down in the quagmire of Iraq should serve as a cautionary history lesson.

The story of the wooden horse used by the Greeks to trick their way into the city of Troy was chronicled by Virgil around 19 BC. He advised, "Do not trust the horse, Trojans. Whatever it is, I fear the Greeks even when they bring gifts."

It is easy to be blinded by the dollars gushing from this hastily devised economic stimulus Trojan horse. The American people need to be keenly aware as they are seduced by the gratification instant falling from the mouth of the gift horse; there may be a horrible mess spewing from the backside.

Because the government is running a deficit the \$150 billion stimulus be borrowed. must Ironically, much of it will probably come from countries like China and other foreign creditors.

The net result is the borrowed rebate money will be spent buying more foreign goods thus exacerbating the deficits that helped create this economic crisis.

"Although one out of every three female adults will get cardiovascular disease - coronary heart disease, hypertension and stroke only 13% of women see this gen-

der-neutral killer as their greatest personal health risk," said Irene Pollin, the foundation's founder and president. "Another thing women must know is that heart attack symptoms are different for them. Women may feel shortness of breath, fatigue, abdominal pressure, nausea or heartburn, or jaw, neck, back or upper shoulder pain."

The 15-minute health screenings include cholesterol and triglyceride, blood pressure, blood glucose levels, Body Mass Index, waist circumference and review of family health history. Screening results are provided on-site and include an overall risk assessment and counseling with a licensed professional. Fitness and cooking demonstrations, stress management seminars with counseling and interactive activities, 100 exhibitor booths plus educational seminars are scheduled on five stages. The Univision Stage will feature Spanish-language presentations. Medical and health experts will participate in the panel discussions and Q&A sessions focusing on diabetes, heart disease, cardiovascular research and fitness (see schedule on last page). Zumba, body hooping (exercise with a hula hoop) and other exercise forms will be featured at the 'Fitness Through Dance" area. Guests are encouraged to join in the exercise sessions.

Those seeking daily exercise can take advantage of the large walking track surrounding the Health Fair area. The first-ever "Big Walk" for adults and family members will begin at 1 p.m. Also on tap are breast cancer screenings offered at the YWCA's mobile mammogram unit and free chronic kidney disease screenings.

Topics for educational seminars include "Women and Heart Disease 101," "Women and Fitness,"

"Women and Cardiovascular Research," "Women and Diabetes" and "Congestive Heart Failure." Discussing these topics will be medical and health experts from Baylor Heart and Vascular Hospital.

Mrs. Pollin, who also co-owns the Verizon Center and NBA's Washington Wizards with her husband, Abe, organized Sister to Sister in 2000. It is the only national organization focused on screening and prevention of women's heart disease.

"We must convince women to take the initiative to look after their own health and their families," said Mrs. Pollin. "Screening for potential heart problems is a critical first step. Unfortunately, many women who juggle multiple duties neglect their personal well-being and may be toying dangerously with their own health. Care-giving is great, but looking after one's health is just as important. "

The heart health fairs occur annually in 17 major U.S. cities. Of the 50,000 women screened since 2000, 80% of women screened have recognized for the first time that they are at risk for heart disease.

## **Shocking Testimonies at Liberia's TRC Hearings**

(NNPA) - "Ghastly horrible testimonies" was how one newspaper described the public hearings of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission now underway in Monrovia, Liberia.

Confessions of killing, torturing, and burning have been emerging in great detail from victims and perpetrators of the country's 14 year civil war, along with indictments of former government officials said to have masterminded some of the horrific events

On the 8th day of TRC hearings, witnesses described the so-called Duport Road Massacre of 1992, a heinous bloodletting drama during which nearly 30 Liberians were butchered in cold blood. James Makor of Liberia's non-governmental organization Save My Future says the public statements still contain surprises.

"One musician around here, I had never knew that he was a general, but during the public hearing we got to know that he was a general," said Makor. "So in that case now, most of his songs he had always won public sympathy that he was victimized, instead people now know that he was one of the guys that had a lot of power to himself."

Makor was referring to Michael David, known as Dearboy. Sundaygar Witnesses have accused

David of rapes and beatings. One of Liberia's most popular stars, he sang the campaign song for Liberia's president. Ellen Johnson Sirleaf when she ran for office in 2005.

Makor says it is good for Liberians to know the truth about what happened.

"It is necessary that we get to know some of the people, what they did. For us to have the past information, so we can know how to interact with them," added Makor.

Out of 88 cases, the commission has heard only 16. According to the timetable set by the TRC, it has about roughly 11 more days to hear the balance of 72 cases before going to other counties.

defeated Hillary Clinton 55 percent to 27 percent in South Carolina's Democratic Primary with John Edwards hanging in with 18 percent.

"In the South where we were lynched?...My God," marveled Tracie Powell, a middle-aged Black accountant on her way home to Maryland. "If the slave masters could only wake up and see this."

Another woman, 27year-old Stacy Stewart, a copyright lawyer from Trinidad & Tobago, quickly switched seats in order to get closer to the TV.

"The way the U. S. is viewed today around the world will change," she predicted in an interview. "Also, he will not only bring hope to the U. S., but around the world."

Joined on stage by his wife, Michelle, the voice of the man who would be America's first Black president boomed throughout the terminal and in homes across America:

"Over two weeks ago, we saw the people of Iowa proclaim that our time for change has come. But there were those who doubted this country's desire for something new - who said Iowa was a fluke not to be repeated again. Well, tonight, the cvnics who believed that what began in the snows of Iowa was just an illusion were told a different story by the good people of South Carolina," he says. "You can see it in the faces here tonight. They are young and old; rich and poor. They are Black and White; Latino and Asian and Native American...And in nine days, in nine short days, nearly half the nation will have the chance to join us in saying that we are tired of business-as-usual in Washington, we are hun-

gry for change, and we are ready to believe again."

Those "nine short days" have now been whittled down to less than a week as voters in 22 states will go to the polls in Democratic Primaries, called "Super Tuesday", Feb. 5.

A growing excitement appears to have set in – among people of diverse nationalities – at the mere thought that an African-American could possibly become president.

"I'm just happy...I'm a big supporter," said Abraham Kulungara, who identified himself as Indian. He sat mesmerized at the airport as Obama spoke, even as the last few people filed toward the plane.

Polls accurately predicted Obama's landslide win in South Carolina with a Democratic electorate of nearly half Black. But on Super Tuesday, anything could happen as African-American heavy weights, such as Reps. John Lewis in Atlanta and Charlie Rangel in New York, campaign on behalf of Sen, Clinton.

Obama also received major new endorsements this week as U. S. Sen. Ted Kennedy (D-Mass) and Caroline Kennedy, the brother and daughter of the late John F. Kennedy, announced their endorsements of him. Sen. Kennedy's son, Rep. Patrick Kennedy (D-R.I.) also endorsed Obama this week.

Pundits have called Obama the first African-American candidate perceived as having a serious chance of being elected president.

Obama rejects speculation that Independents and even some conservative Republicans could be setting him up to vote against him in the final

d election in November.

Right wing conservative commentator Pat Buchanan said in a recent televised interview that he would rather see Obama win because he would be easiest of the Democratic candidates to defeat.

"That's a silly argument," Obama scoffed in an interview with the NNPA News Service. He says his constituency has been misjudged.

"These aren't people who are...part of some grand conspiracy. These are people who believe that I can bring the country together to get some things done. And that's why the polls show me beating every other Republican who might be nominated."

If the chatter that started at the Atlanta Airport is any indication, he will continue to have broadbased support regardless of who ultimately wins the nomination and becomes the party nominee at the Democratic National Convention in Denver, August 25-28.

Discussions continued even among strangers on the plane, headed for the Reagan National Airport in Washington, D.C.

A White man and woman, initially strangers, held an intense conversation:

"My daughter, who is 15, is very excited about him," the man said. However he noted that he wouldn't mind if Clinton wins, especially since he liked her husband's presidency, albeit controversial. "I think he was a hell of a president. I don't care what he did."

The woman, apparently less enthusiastic about either Clinton, was conciliatory: "If she gets the nomination, I'll back her. But I'm hoping [Obama] will pull it off. But, there's an awful lot of racism yet."

## First Church Adopts Forest Lane Academy of Arts and Community

After a very successful, Back-to-School Rally to help students be prepared to start the 2007 -2008 School Year, (see story in the North Dallas Gazette's August 23, 2007 Edition) hosted by First **Baptist** Church of Hamilton Park (First Church) and Richardson School Independent District (RISD), the school district sought to collaborate more with First Church. RISD asked Senior Pastor Gregory Foster, D.Min, Ph.D., if First Church would be willing to adopt a school in the District. Pastor Gregg's answer was immediate and decisive, a resounding yes.

Sponsoring the Back-to-School Rally, without any outside help, First Church paid for the entire cost of the rally, and provided church volunteers to work at the rally. The school purchased school supplies and donated food (breakfast, lunch, and an evening meal) for the event from 7 a.m. until after the last student had supplies and food to eat. Church members stated they were tired after working late Friday night into the wee hours of Saturday morning getting supplies, food, and the booths ready for the rally on Saturday morning; but church members indicated it was very rewarding to help the children be prepared for school. For the rally, 500 volunteer Tshirts were ordered, and the committee ran out of T-shirts before 7 a.m.; the



desire to help and make a difference in the lives of students kept the volunteers on the parking lot and helping the entire time.

Prior to the second semester of the school year, First Church was asked to adopt Forest Lane Academy of Arts and Community on Forest Lane, this school is in close proximity to Hamilton Park

Community & Neighborhood, where First Church had its beginnings. Forest Lane is a school with an enrollment of approximately 618 students, where 79.2% of the students receive free and reduced lunch, and the school consists of 79.2% economically disadvantaged families. The students in Forest Lane Academy have a need for basic

household items, in addition to regular school items, that family members use in their homes: Combs, toothpaste/tooth brushes, deodorant, and Ms. Duana Kindle, the principal l said, "We need white socks, even those with holes in them (they are used to wipe the student's marking board; there's no need to buy fancy dry eraser markers.) The school has a need for student reinforcement items and staff incentives; these are things that a Parent, Student & Teacher Association (PSTA) usually helps supply for a school. This was when First Church discovered Forest Lane Academy does not have an active PSTA to help students and staff with project PSTA normally handles for a school.

The Yoke Fellows, a Men's Bible Study Group at First Church asked Senior Pastor Gregg if they could be the main sponsor and the link between the church and the school. Members stated that they have a desire to especially reach the male students and be mentors for students without an active father in their lives. After approval, the Yoke Group scheduled a meeting with Ms. Duana Kindle, Principal; Ms. Pam Aitken, Assistant Principal, Ms. Celina District Cardenas. Community Liaison, and Board Trustee David Tyson, Jr. to identify the needs of the students, staff and school. Senior Pastor Gregg, asked to Principal Kindle, "Tell us what you want and need us to do. Our agenda is your agenda."

Attendees at the meeting were: Senior Pastor Gregg; Brother Bertriam Thomas, Church Coordinator; Yoke members, Brothers Terrence Fuller, President; Fred Polk, 1st Vice President; Luther Hill, 2nd Vice President and Brother Clarence William; and District personnel Ms. Kindle, Ms. Aitken, Ms. Cardenas, and the Honorable Tyson, Jr., District Trustee.

Principal Kindle came to the meeting prepared with demographics of the school, a list of annual supplies needed and Fine Arts and General Support Opportunities that helps supports students and staff.

Pastor Gregg started with. his comments "Don't worry, First Church, is here for the students, staff, and school for the long haul. The Principal will give us our marching orders. From this point on we will not leave you alone. He mentioned that First Church had a long desire to find a way to reach that community, even to the point of negotiating to purchase a building and land near the school, but God said, "No." Pastor Gregg said that God had a better way and this was it. God made a way to help us fulfill the great commission until Christ Comes again, as in Matthew 28:18-20.

When Pastor Gregg was asked why the members of First Church have gone out of their way to support the schools in the District with their time, talent, and monies, his reply was, "Not for fame or glory, but to lift up His Holy name. To God be the Glory!" Their main focus is their motto, "Each One Reach One." and this helps to build the Kingdom of God.

Banished are not as distant as we would like to think," said Shawn Williams.

Shawn Williams publishes the blog *Dallas South* and will facilitate the discussion after the screening. "Even today historical African-Americans neighborhoods are slowing fading away. We need to take a closer look at why that is," he said.

Danielle Ayers, Minister of Justice at Friendship-West, says that this will not be the last film screening for the benefit of the community. "We plan to show more films that highlight the realities of our community and offer solutions to the troubles we face," says Ayers.

## Advertising Targeting African-American Consumers Exceeds \$2.3 Billion Annually

YORK (blackchipstocks.com) --In its first 12-month analysis of advertising spending on media outlets reach African that American consumers, The Nielsen Company reported today that spending for the period October 1, 2006 through September 30, 2007 totaled \$2.3 billion. The Nielsen African American ad spending analysis covers over 22,000 national, regional and local advertisers, across 130+ media vehicles.

Nielsen Monitor-Plus, the advertising intelligence service of Nielsen, tracked 5 individual media for this analysis: Local Radio, National Magazine, National Cable TV, Network TV and Syndication TV. Local Radio reported the greatest amount of spending on African American targeted media at \$805 million dollars, comprising 35% percent of total spending.

National Cable TV reported the largest ad growth with 14.5% during this period. This growth is the result of a number of factors including: Year over year growth for BET, the inclusion of TV One in the Nielsen Monitor-Plus service as of January 2007, as well as a number of high profile TV programs such as "House of Payne" on TBS, "Being Bobby Brown" on Bravo, "Flavor of Love" on VH1. and "Making the Band" on MTV.

"We think it is terrific that Nielsen has undertaken this analysis, demonstrating their desire to increase their reporting of ethnic advertising. It's the first-time that such a comprehensive analysis of advertising spending to reach African Americans has been undertaken," said Deborah Gray-Young, Vice President & Director of Media Services for Chicago-based E. Morris Communications. "This is an excellent first step, and we look forward to seeing the number of media included increase in future analysis."

"We're excited to be able to offer African American targeted media insights to our clients, and we look forward to continuing to provide analysis like this in the future," said Brian Lane, SVP of Client Strategy and Product Management for Nielsen Monitor-Plus.

National magazines reported more than \$600 million in spending, showing healthy revenue across a number of publications including Essence magazine. Nielsen Monitor-Plus also added the following publications to its monitoring during this time period: American Legacy, King, Giant and XXL.

Syndication TV reported \$102.4 million dollars in ad spend for programs that have a 50% or greater composition of African American audiences, and that's down year over year. Syndication is made up of a good mix of both established off-network programs such as "The Bernie Mac Show," "One on One" and "Girlfriends" as well original syndication programming, like "Judge Mathis" and "Showtime at the Apollo."

Network TV at \$193.3 million dollars saw a consolidation of UPN and WB into the new CW network. The Top Network TV shows based on total ad revenue are: "Girlfriends," Everybody Hates Chris." "The Game," and "All of Us" on the CW, as well as "Watch Over Me" on MNT.

With \$89.7 million in spending, Procter & Gamble is the largest advertiser targeting African American consumers. McDonald's is second with \$37.7 million, followed by Johnson and Johnson with \$36.1 million in total spending for the 12 months October 2006 through September 2007. Collectively, the Top 25 Advertisers spent a total of \$681.0 million.

Five auto makers are in the top 25 advertisers across all African American media: General Motors (\$35.8 million), Chrysler (\$28.2 million), Ford Motor Co. (\$25.9 million), Nissan Motor Co LTD., (\$22.1 million) and Toyota Motor Corp (\$21.7 million).

The top brands advertised by Procter & Gamble include Charmin, Bounty, Crest, Olay, Cover Girl and Tide. National Amusements, parent company to CBS Corp and Viacom advertised for a number of movies that featured African American characters or casts including "Freedom Writers," "Dreamgirls," "Norbit," and "Black Snake Moan."

Spending for the top 15 product categories across all media reached over \$806 million. Not surprisingly the Automotive category has the most spending at \$187.4 million, more than double the dollar amount of the number two product category, **Quick Service Restaurants** at \$79.1 million. Motion Pictures is the third highest ad spending product category at \$75.4 million. In addition to this

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## **Job Hunters Need Updated Resumes**

NEW YORK (AP) -- If you're worried about losing your job as the U.S. economy weakens, it's time to update your resume in case you need to hunt for new employment.

Your goal should be making your resume stand out from the hundreds of other resumes that employers receive.

It used to be that a resume - which is a brief, written summary of an individual's education, work and accomplishments started with a "statement of purpose," something akin to "I'm seeking a challenging position that offers professional growth." But that doesn't make the jobseeker distinctive from the competition.

"You really need to highlight your last five years of experience and concrete accomplishments," said

John A. Challenger, chief executive officer of the Challenger, Gray & Christmas Inc. outplacement firm in Chicago. "That's what makes you stand out."

Challenger said, for example, that "saying you are a marketing executive with experience in brand management" doesn't make you stand out because most market executives have those skills. But "saying that you are a marketing executive who developed the concept and designed the materials for an advertising campaign for a new

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brand" reveals much more, he said.

Job applicants also have to realize that they're applying to work for very busy people, so they have to keep the key items in their resumes brief and to the point, he added.

It should go without saying that all resumes have some things in common:

- They're attractive to look at, whether mailed or e-mailed

- The content has been checked for typos and grammatical errors

- The contact information

is correct Kate Wendleton, presi-

dent of the Five O'Clock Club, a career coaching and outplacement firm in New York, said jobseekers also should prepare a cover letter for their resumes.

> In brief, it should say you've been following the company's activities, that you have a number of years of experience in the relevant field, that your most important accomplishments are X and Y, and that you'd appreciate 20 minutes of the would-be employer's time to discuss the job.

income taxes would get up to \$600, working couples \$1,200 and those with children an additional \$300 per child under the agreement. Workers who make at least \$3,000 but don't pay taxes would get \$300 rebates.

The rebates, expected to go out in June, would cost about \$100 billion, aides said. The package also includes close to \$50 billion in business tax cuts.

The package would allow businesses to immediately write off 50 percent of purchases of plants and other capital equipment and permit small businesses to write off additional purchases of equipment.

Pelosi, agreed to drop increases in food stamp and unemployment benefits during a meeting in exchange for gaining the rebates of at least \$300 for almost everyone earning a paycheck, including those who make too little to pay income taxes.

"I can't say that I'm totally pleased with the package, but I do know that it will help stimulate the economy. But if it does not, then there will be more to come," Pelosi said.

Boehner said the agreement "was not easy for the two of us and our respective caucuses...You know, many Americans believe that is broken," Washington Boehner said. "But I think this agreement and I hope that this agreement will show the American people that we can fix it and will serve to move along other bipartisan agreements that we can have in the

The rebates would phase out gradually for individuals whose income exceeds \$75,000 and couples with incomes above \$150,000, aides said. Individuals with incomes up to \$87,000 and couples up to \$174,000 would get partial rebates. The caps are higher for those with children.

The agreement left some lawmakers in both parties with a bitter taste, complaining that their leaders had sacrificed too much in the interest of striking a deal. Many senior Democrats were particularly upset that the package omitted the unemployment extension. Majority Leader Harry Reid said the goal is to send the package to the White House by Feb. 15 for President Bush's signature. Bush has supported larger rebates of \$800-\$1,600, but his plan would have left out 30 million working households who earn paychecks but don't make enough to pay income tax, according to calculations by the Urban Institute-Brookings Institution Tax Policy Center. To address the mortgage

crisis, the package also raises

the limits on Federal Housing Administration loans and home mortgages that Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac can purchase to as high as \$725,000 in high-cost areas. Those are considerable boosts over the current FHA limit of \$362,000 and the \$417,000 cap for Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac's loan purchases.

The package was drawing fire from liberal activists and labor unions upset that proposals to extend unemployment insurance and boost food stamps had been dropped. Many Democratic lawmakers had assumed those proposals would make it into the package, and critics of the deal said those ideas could pump money into the economy more quickly than tax rebate checks that won't be delivered until June.

Democratic aides said greater GOP flexibility over giving relief to poor families with children — who would not have been eligible under Bush's original tax rebate proposal — was the catalyst that moved the talks forward.

### Harlem Artist With Downs Syndrome Paints Over the Odds

HARLEM (NNPA) -As a new year begins, 17vear old artist Haile King-Rubie looks back on 2007 with a great sense of happiness, satisfaction and pride.

In what can only be described as a break-out year, Haile - who is mentally challenged by Downs Syndrome - experienced the

confidence-building joy of a premier exhibit of 30 of his paintings, including 18 at a Harlem bank; the distribution of greeting cards using several of his paintings and the setting of a website, hailesimo.org, displaying his artwork.

It was a smiling, enthralled Haile who, with hugs and handshakes, welcomed attendees to the exhi-

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bitions, the first of which was held in his studio located in a Harlem brownstone owned by his parents, Bernardo and Audrey Rubie. Among the attendees was Ilyasah Shabazz, a daughter of Malcolm X and author of the book Growing Up X.

"It is always exciting," said Ms. Shabazz, "to see the first exhibition of paintings by a new, talented artist. And Haile is very talented."

This is an opinion shared by many who have seen Haile's colorful. acrylic paintings, including art lovers from Japan, France, Germany and Sweden.

His parents discovered Haile's affinity for painting when he was 4 years old and decided to send him to a school where he interacted with a broad diversity of school mates rather than to a special school for the Downs Syndrome. They are proud of their son.
