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Clinton, Obama Still in Dead Heat After Super Tuesday

The winner is still not clear, but the historic moment is.

"Many of us never dreamed that we would see such a day," says Dr. Dorothy Height, the 95year-old president emeritus of the Council of Negro Women. "This gives us a sense that if we want to we can join hands and work together."

Height was among a crowd at the national headquarters of the Council of Negro Women in D.C. that gathered for a "Watch Party" to view the

Super Tuesday primary election returns.

"But, we've also got to recognize that this stirs up the power forces in a new way," she warns. "So we'll have to be on our alert that we don't take it for granted. But we'll have to work harder to fulfill the thing that we've been working on."

The "it" to which Height refers in the interview with the NNPA News Service meant one of two historic facts that for the first time, a woman is about to receive the Democratic nomination for president

McCain appeals for GOP unity

WASHINGTON

(AP) -- Boosted by his big night, John McCain asked his loudest conservative critics Wednesday to "calm down" and support his Republican presidential candidacy, as Obama and Barack

Hillary Rodham Clinton girded for more rounds of their protracted struggle for the Democratic nomi-

McCain was referring primarily to radio talk show hosts and other pundits of the right when he appealed for unity now that he has a leg up in the nomination race.

"I think they've made

their case against me pretty eloquently," he said, adding wryly, "if that's the right word." He asserted that the pundits' conservative hero Ronald Reagan and his - reached across the aisle to Democrats just like he wants to do as president.

"I do hope that at some point we would just calm down a little bit and see if there are areas that we can

agree on for the good of the party and for the good of the country," he said. The critics argue he's too liberal for the party.

His victories stretched from New York to California, the biggest prize. Still, Mitt Romney in the West and Mike Huckabee in the South



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

THE TRUTH CLINIC **Obama Debunks Myth of Black Inferiority**

2008 Democratic presidential nomination campaign is destined to make history. Either a black man or a white woman will be the party's candidate for President of the United States America.

Even if Barack Obama does not win the nomination his candidacy has served to debunk what lingering credibility is given to the theory of inherent black inferiority by race proponents.

Throughout America's history there has been both an overt and covert movement supported academicians. bv politicians and religious leaders who theorized that blacks were naturally inferior in order to justify slavery, segregation, discrimination, and statutory inequality.

Early race advocates began to institutionalize racial stereotyping and negative imagery to create fear and divisiveness in the public consciousness dictated and rationalized every aspect of America's immoral racial relationships.

Although legal slavery in the United States ended in 1865 with the passage of Thirteenth Amendment to the Constitution, the ideology of race continued as a new and major form of social differentiation in America. The black codes of the 1860s

and the Jim Crow laws of the 1890s were passed in the United States to legitimize the myth of black inferiority.

Supreme

decisions, such as the Dred Scott case of 1857, made clear that blacks were not and should not be citizens of the United States. They were to be excluded from the social community of whites, but not from the production of their wealth. The Supreme Court decision in Plessy v. Ferguson (1896).which permitted "separate but equal" facilities, guaranteed that the racial paradigm, with its focus on a color skin based social structure, would continue to flourish.

Over time the overt legalized race based policies were outlawed but continued to flourish in subtle covert forms orchestrated by establishment leaders desiring to maintain the status

Therefore, it is not surprising that race, the great divider, has infiltrated the current political campaign in which the first black presidential candidate with a real potential winning involved. However. this is not the first time the race card has been played against black candidates.

One of the most noteworthy occurred in 1982 during the Tom Bradley California gubernato-

As the rial race. Democratic Party nominee, Bradley led in the polls going into Election Day. In the initial hours after the polls closed, some news organizations had even projected him as the winner.

He lost the race for California governor to Republican George Deukmejian 52,295 votes, less than one per cent of the 7.5 million votes

A post election analysis of Bradley's loss gave rise to the term "Bradley effect" which refers to the tendency of white to shade, voters deceive or lie to interviewers and pollsters when they say that they are undecided or likely to vote for a black candidate. They claim the only thing they look at is the competence and experience of the candidate. The final results do not usually conform to pre-election polls.

Still the Bradley Effect is murky, ambiguous, and virtually impossible to quantify. Yet, this uncertainty may cause the Obama campaign many nervous moments as Super Tuesday unfolds in the South, the West and other heartland states. One thing is sure. The Iowa, New Hampshire, and South Carolina voting did not provide convincing proof that the Bradley effect was

Barack Obama has

won the Iowa caucus and the South Carolina primary. He beat two strong opponents including the Clinton awesome machine. He did it in a system that favors the party favorite.

One supporter said, "Obama's courage, vision and sincerity transcend the borders of race, gender, religion, or age. While he inspires he also calls us to be our better selves, to be involved, to believe, to hope and to work for the changes we want. He enmeshes you in a grander moment, making you aware of history's presence and your role in it."

Obama's momentum is building. His sincerity, vision, and belief in the power of the American people to be the real agents of change in this country has attracted the endorsements of Ted the likes of Kennedy, Caroline Kennedy, The Los Angeles Times, Maria Shriver, Senator Kerry, Senator Leahy, Senator Claire McCaskill. Toni Morrison, and Oprah Winfrey.

No matter the outcome of the nominating campaign the Obama presence is causing the once solid foundations that support the myths of black inferiority to crumble.

US Warns Rebels Against Embassy Breach

— The United States on Monday warned Chadian rebels fighting government troops in the capital not to enter the U.S. embassy compound in downtown N'Djamena that was abandoned over the weekend for security reasons

"The embassy compound, if it has been entered, should immediately be exited, and certainly they should not attempt to enter the chancery or embassy buildings," said State Department spokesman Sean McCormack. "It is still American territory."

Over the weekend, the ordered embassy nonessential U.S. staff and the families of all U.S. personnel to leave Chad, and only four U.S. diploincluding mats. Ambassador Louis Nigro, are still in the country. The four left the embassy compound on Saturday and are now stationed at the international airport outside N'Djamena.

"The security situation was very fluid," McCormack said, explaining Nigro's decision to relocate to the airport, which is guarded by the French military. "The rebels were downtown and every ambassador has to make this call. Job number one is to make sure that our people are safe."

He said the warning not to enter the embassy was being passed to the rebels "through various channels" but acknowledged there was little guarantee the compound would not be breached.

"If there is a determined force with heavy armor and they want to go there, they are going to be able to go there, regardless of what sort of lightly armed local protection we might have," he told reporters.

The State Department has urged U.S. citizens to leave Chad, and around 100 of the roughly 500 registered with the embassy have gone, officials said.

Without any personnel at its embassy, the State Department has set up two telephone numbers to report the presence and whereabouts of Americans in Chad. Those numbers are (888) 407-4747 from the United States and Canada and (202) 501-4444 from overseas.

However, on Sunday, the department said its ability to help Americans in Chad was "extremely limited" and asked those who wished to be evacuated to "prepare to depart immediately and identify themselves to the French military, who will retrieve American citizens to escort them to the airport."

France, the former colonial power, has a long-standing military presence in Chad and is evacuating hundreds of foreigners from the country.

On Monday, the U.N. Security Council strongly condemned the rebel attacks and it gave a green light for France and other countries to help the government repel the threat.

In Chad, government forces were clashing with rebels for a third day with gunfire and shelling heard throughout the city. Thousands of people were fleeing and casualties were believed to be high.

The rebels arrived on the capital's outskirts Friday after a three-day push across the desert from Chad's eastern border with Sudan. Riding on 250 pickup trucks mounted with machine guns, between 1,000 and 1,500 insurgents entered the city early Saturday, quickly spreading through the streets and reportedly trapping President Idriss Deby in his palace.

proved to be go-to candidates for conservatives, and they vowed to stay in the thick of the race.

On Saturday, Louisiana and Washington state hold two-party contests while Nebraska Democrats and Kansas Republicans make their picks. Then comes a larger series of two-party primaries in Maryland, Virginia and the District of Columbia on Tuesday. Republicans will award 116 delegates in the trio of races dubbed the Potomac Primary.

McCain's victory in California dealt a crushing

blow to his closest pursuer, Romney, a former Massachusetts governor.

In the competition that counted the most, the Arizona senator had 613 delegates, to 269 for Romney and 190 for Huckabee in incomplete counting. It takes 1,191 to win the GOP nomination.

McCain won in California, New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, Missouri, Delaware and his home state of Arizona - each of them winner-takeall primaries. He also pocketed victories in Oklahoma and Illinois.

Huckabee, the former governor of Arkansas, won a series of Bible Belt victories, in Alabama, Georgia and Tennessee as well as his own home state. He also triumphed at the Republican West Virginia convention.

Romney won a home state victory in Massachusetts. He also took Utah, where fellow Mormons supported his candidacy. His superior organization produced caucus victories in North Dakota, Montana, Minnesota, Alaska and Colorado.

Popular Opposition Leader Shot As Fighting Intensifies

(GIN) - An opposition lawmaker died Jan. 29, shot to death as he drove home in Nairobi. His killing has dimmed hopes for an end to the monthlong standoff between supporters of Pres. Mwai Kibaki and opposition leader Odinga Raila.

Mellitus Mugabe Were was one of several opposition members who won seats in the legislative vote held at the same time as the disputed presidential election. The opposition accuses President Mwai Kibaki of stealing the presidential vote.

Meanwhile, in western Kenya's Rift Valley, homes were torched and store windows smashed while police and military helicopters flew over the crowd and officers began shooting, sending people running in panic.

Kenya's unrest has taken a toll on its neighbors the Uganda M a n u f a c t u r e r s Association reporting losses of \$34 million in delayed goods deliveries, merchandise burnt en route, and drops in productivity due to lack of raw materials.

Former U.N. chief Kofi Annan, launching a "dialogue process", has been joined by former Tanzanian President Benjamin Mkapa and Graca Machel, wife of Nelson Mandela.

Writing for Kenya's East African newspaper, Martin Kimani observed: "Kenya's choices are simple: life or death, penury or prosperity, a cohesive, well-governed nation that counts its diversity as strength or a suspicious, hateful one governed by the cynical and awash with the blood of its young.

"If Nelson Mandela could share power with the Nationalist Party, then it is not too much to expect President Kibaki and Raila Odinga to do the same," added Kimani, a member of Concerned African Writers.

Speaking on Nairobi's Capital FM radio, U.S. Sen. Barack Obama, whose father was Kenyan, said: "Now is the time for all parties to renounce violence. Now is the time for Kenyan leaders to rise above party affiliations and past ambitions for the sake of peace."

Why would you want to specifically target this population group? A new report from Packaged Facts, The African-American Market in the U.S. forecasts that the buying power of 39 million African Americans will hit \$1.1 trillion by 2012. What is notable is that in the U.S. there are 2.4 million affluent African-American households with household incomes of \$75,000 or more. They account for 17% of all African-American households but 45% of total African- American buying power. This buying power offers opportunities to marketers of a wide range of products and services.

vData shows that compa-

nies offering luxury items and financial services are at a particular advantage, because affluent African Americans are even more likely than other affluent cohorts to spend money on luxury items such as cruise-ship vacations, new cars, designer clothes, as well as investing in life insurance.

"The African-American cohort continues to be a significant consumer segment that in some wavs exercises more economic clout than the ever popular Hispanic one," comments Tatjana Meerman, Publisher of Packaged Facts. "African Americans' purchasing behaviors can differ in many ways, ranging from what is bought at the grocery store to clothing style and magazine preferences. Marketers should pay attention to these differences to execute marketing campaigns that target the many segments of this important demographic cohort."

back when we see them, in private of course, and tell them, "Keep on doing what you're doing?" Do we secretly deny them in our daily professional circles and corporate environment? Do we support them in their efforts with our intellectual capacity and financial resources?

Over the years we have seen so many Tree Shakers pass away, in many cases leaving their families with virtually nothing, mainly because they spent so much of their time fighting for us. I was saddened and disheartened by a recent email disclosing the death of a "Oueen Mother" in New York City. Elder Adunni Oshupa Tabasi, beloved and esteemed by Black folks, died on January 7, 2008, and her home-going is scheduled to take place on February 9, 2008.

The sad part is the scramble to raise funds for "embalming and ... to rent the Dempsey Center." Despite the fact, as the news release states, "Elder Adunni worked for over fifty years in the community, as she would always say for 'Free." Surely this Sister was a Tree Shaker. Surely along her fifty year road of working for Black folks for "free" she stopped and helped many.

Surely she deserves a great deal more than a solicitation campaign for donated funds to embalm her body and then to "rent" a hall to celebrate her life, and then to have her body shipped to Ghana for burial. Is this how we show our appreciation for Tree Shakers?

Of course, the ones who really benefit from the work done by Tree Shakers, the "upper economic people," as opposed to the "lower economic people" that Bill Cosby

referenced when he took Black people to the woodshed, are culpable as well.

Each time I raise the issue of economic discrimination and disparity against Black people in my hometown, some elitist Black person gets a contract, without ever having opened his or her mouth on behalf of Black people. Thus, the upper economic people always benefit, while the lower economic people remain trapped in the belly of a society that would only use them as cute rhetoric.

Despite the upper economic people having the funds to take care of some of the Tree Shakers, thus assuring their contracts and opportunities keep coming, most of them refuse to put their money where their mouths are.

During the Hillary/Obama Debate in Los Angeles, a person named Kim sent a question in for Barack Obama. She asked him about the negative effects of illegal immigration on "African Americans."

She specifically asked Obama to address the question and she was very specific about whom she was concerned: African Americans. Immediately Barack Obama started answering the question in relationship to whites, Hispanics, Asians, minorities, and then African Americans.

He emphasized the other groups and deemphasized Black people. A slowly pitched softball was lobbed at him and he chose not to swing on behalf of Black people.

Obama was presented with an opportunity to say something about Black people only, but he felt compelled to include everyone else in his answer, rather than deal specifically with the issue

as it relates to Black people, as Kim requested.

I don't know why we are afraid of anything in country, after what our people went through to help us reach the heights we have achieved. I do know that we should take better care of the Tree Shakers and their families by creating both local and national funds that can be accessed immediately when needed for causes such as the one involving the "Queen Mother" in New York.

We can take the Cosby tact of blaming the lower economic people for not holding up their end of the bargain, but we must also acknowledge the responsibility of the upper economic people as well.

It is irresponsible, it is shameful, it is insulting and it is embarrassing to all Black people, no matter what level you are on, to mistreat one another the way we do.

The work that needs to be done will never be done if those who are willing to do it are not supported by those who are unwilling but who also reap the benefits of that work. This goes for the conscious and the unconscious. Shame on us!





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

needs to be. The story of Carter G. Woodson, Father of Black

April 1950, is a captivating and inspiration story in itself.

Dr. Woodson said, "Those who have no record of what their forebears have accomplished lose the inspiration which comes from the teaching of biography and history." Dr. Woodson was a distinguished Black author, editor, publisher, and historian who put his money, life, blood, sweat and tears in establishing Black History Week believed that Blacks should know their past in order to participate intelligently in the affairs in our country. In the 1960s the "Week" was established as Black History **MONTH**.) Dr. Woodson strongly believed that Black history—which others (even some Black Americans) have tried so diligently to

erase—is a firm foundation for young Black Americans to build on in order to become productive citizens of our soci-

Prior to "Negro History WEEK;" that was founded in 1926; Dr. Woodson and several of his friends established the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History. The following year, the Journal of Negro History appeared (one of the oldest learned journals in the United States.) In 1937 Dr. Woodson published the first issue of the Negro History

In 1912 Dr. Woodson, received his Ph.D in history from Harvard University. He developed an important philosophy of history. History, he insisted, was not the mere gathering of fact. The object of historical study is to arrive at a reasonable interpretation of the facts. History is more than political and military records of peoples and nations. It must include some description of the social conditions of the period being studied.

Dr. Woodson often said that he hoped the time would come when Negro History Week would be unnecessary; when all Americans would willingly recognize the contributions of Black Americans as a legitimate and integral part of the history of this country. His concept has given a profound sense of dignity to all Black Americans; and we must not forget it! Nor should we stop Black History Month.

of the United States or for the first time, the nomination will go to a Black man.

Either way, civil rights leaders and political enthusiasts from their early 20s to 95 and perhaps beyond, defined the still deadlocked race between Sens. Barack Obama and Hillary Clinton as the result of a zeitgeist - the intellectual and cultural climate of an era.

"There are these change moments called the zeitgeist, a

movement moment. It's not always defined in the traditional issue sense. It's defined when people want change,' says Melanie Campbell, president and CEO of the National Coalition on Black Civic Participation. "It's just a level of enthusiasm that makes my job easier. My job is to increase Black voter participation. I am not having a hard time doing that right now."

The result of the returns Tuesday night showed enthu-

siasm - not only by Blacks but by Whites across the nation as Obama enthusiasts caused him to win in states with almost no African-Americans, such as Idaho with a Black population of 0.7 percent and Utah with 1 percent.

"Basically, what they say about him not winning the White vote, they can put that to bed," says Dr. Ron Walters, University of Maryland political Scientist.

Perhaps even more shock-

ing to some was Obama's win in Georgia and Alabama, hotbeds for historic racial strife, thought to be still just below the surface.

In the battle for delegates, Clinton won eight states, including the coveted larger states such California and New York, which she represents. She gained 823 delegates by winning Arizona, Jersey, California, New Oklahoma, Arkansas, Massachusetts, New York, and Tennessee.

Obama won 13 states for 732 delegates. They were Colorado, Alahama Delaware, Idaho, Kansas, Dakota, North Alaska, Connecticut, Georgia, his home state of Illinois, Minnesota and Utah.

New Mexico was too close to call by NNPA deadline early Wednesday. A total of 2,025 delegates are needed to win the Democratic nomina-

So, there are 23 more state primaries to go that could throw the election in either direction. The next major primaries are Virginia, Maryland and Washington, D.C. on Tuesday, Feb. 12.

Plus, at the Democratic National Convention Aug. 25-28 in Denver, there will be socalled Super Delegates, public and Democratic Party officials, who – if the race is still too close to call - could render the deciding votes.




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
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
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
