

IRS Announces Economic Stimulus Payment Schedules, Provides Online Payment Calculator

WASHINGTON — The Internal Revenue Service announced that it will begin sending more than 130 million economic stimulus payments starting May 2. The initial round of weekly payments will be completed by early July.

The IRS also announced the availability of a new online calculator on IRS.gov to help people determine the amount of their stimulus payments.

Stimulus payments will be made by direct deposit to people who choose to receive their

2007 income tax refunds through direct deposit. All others will receive their economic stimulus payments in the form of a paper check.

“To receive an economic stimulus payment, people just need to file their tax returns as they usually do,”

said IRS Acting Commissioner Linda E. Stiff. “The payments will be automatic for the vast majority of taxpayers. Some lower-income workers and recipients of certain Social Security and veterans benefits who don’t normally need to file a

These emphatic words came toward the end of a speech that was vintage Paterson as he became the state’s 55th governor and its first African-


American to serve in the post, the nation’s second.

Julia Jordan amassed an amazing 48-year career as an educator with Dallas Independent School District. Twenty-two of those years were as a teacher, before being promoted to the position of counselor and eventually Director of Student Services. It's calculated Jordan personally handled well over 1,500 students throughout her career.

Jordan has been a tireless community worker



for numerous organizations, holding prestigious memberships with: Jack and Jill, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, the Priscilla Arts Club (the oldest women's club in Dallas), the CV Roman Medical Auxiliary and Links, Inc. In 2006, the Links, Inc. national chapter honored Jordan with a "Platinum Membership" and she received the Pearl C. Anderson Award for Community Service. She's also an original board member of the African American Museum and is

still active on the board. She was instrumental in organizing the Maria Morgan Branch YWCA and was a co-founder of Dallas Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority.

Jordan, a Wiley College graduate, has also undertaken the task of helping to preserve some of Dallas' rich Black history. She worked with The African American Museum to bring, 381 Days: The Montgomery Bus Boycott Story to Dallas this year. A 53 year

member of New Hope Baptist Church, Dallas' oldest Black church, she serves as church historian and is currently working to ensure the church's rich

history is preserved. She has also directed her writing skills toward authoring Beauty and the Best, on the life of Fredericka Chase Dodd.

Dr. Clarence Smith



Dr. Clarence Booker Taliaferro Smith, now 92, has been held in deep high esteem among prominent ministers around Dallas and the country. His pastorship of Golden Gate Missionary Baptist Church spanned 45 years - through 10 different U. S. presidents - before retiring in 1997. His ministry began 72 years ago when as a 20-year-old son of a sharecropper he saw a vision he said was so intense, his clothes were soaked in sweat.

Smith gained a stellar reputation as an old-time preacher who was

able to reach out successfully to all people, regardless of their socio-economic background. Smith's powerful preaching and his unique leadership style was instrumental in helping Golden Gate grow to a congregation of over 3,000 parishioners and an average income of \$1 million annually. He's served as a mentor to dozens of other preachers, including Vincent Parker, who ran Golden Gate's drug treatment program for five years before succeeding Smith as the church's senior pastor.

The Adult Rehabilitation Ministry, established by Dr. Smith before retiring, has helped several hundred drug and alcohol addicted men and women get their lives back in order, through a one-year program that addresses all of their spiritual, emotional and financial needs, includ-

ing housing and teaching them critical life skills.

As pastor emeritus, Smith continues to provide strong guidance to current pastor, Vincent T. Parker.

During his pastorship at Golden Gate, several other outreach min-

istries were established to meet the needs of the community, including: a jail ministry, a benevolence program, the Sunday School on Wheels and a senior citizens' ministry.

Smith has been married to his wife Rosie for 65 years.

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

Hypocrites Casting The First Stone

There has been extreme joy in some business and political circles over the past few weeks as the sexual transgressions of Eliot Spitzer and the political blackmailing of Barack Obama captured the media spotlight.

The Spitzer scandal erupted after federal law enforcement officials disclosed that a wiretap had caught the 48-year-old New York governor spending thousands of dollars on high priced call girls.

The resignation of Spitzer was met with outbursts of glee and celebratory champagne toasts by many Wall Street kingpins, investment bankers, mutual fund managers and insurance executives who hated him for his ferocious attacks on their onerous and abusive business practices. Spitzer became the scourge of the financial industry when his tenacious prosecution forced wrongdoers to pay huge settlements and change the way they conduct business.

Similarly, Obama has incurred the enmity of Republican status quo proponents because his high profile campaign to change the corrupt American political system has attracted huge grassroots support and made him a serious contender for the presidency.

The conservative muckrakers selected segments of fiery sermon's delivered by Obama's ex-pastor nearly seven years ago and released them to the media as evidence designed to undermine Obama's Christian beliefs and patriotism.

In this election cycle, as in each one since Watergate, the

people yearn for a plain-talking figure from outside the system. They want someone free of personal vice, someone who transcends daily politics, someone who personifies the values worthy to teach our children.

That is the partial truth put out for public consumption. In reality the public wishes are subverted by both the mercenary priorities of many of our public servants and also the negative effects of the American people's affliction with an apparent untreatable sadistic gene. For all our generosity and outpouring of compassion, Americans seem to enjoy watching public officials being pilloried and crucified.

Each time a public figure is paraded before the media cameras to become an object of public derision it is in reality a quick peek into America's skeleton closet. We see the part of our national character that takes pleasure in seeing anyone who has climbed the ladder to wealth, education, or success knocked down. There has always been a special niche in politics for punishing a high profile change advocate who can be tainted with a real or contrived flaw. Such is the case with former New York Governor Spitzer and Presidential candidate Barack Obama.

But the real issue should not be about whether Spitzer, Obama or any elected official falls short of some perceived ideal. Everyone does. American's perception about government

should not be disproportionately shaped by some inapplicable disappointment each time a public official is outed.

What is pertinent is does the flaw render a person unfit for public office? This is the national discussion that needs to take place if America is ever to replace the lynch mob action typically orchestrated by the enemies of the accused.

Over the years, whether the punishment of public officials was fueled by religious doctrine or civil law, the question remains concerning how much good have the moral police ever done?

In the case of Spitzer does dallying with a prostitute negate his years of being a hard-nosed politician hell-bent on ferreting out corporate malfeasance and cracking down on corruption?

Is Obama less qualified for the presidency because he listened to the controversial viewpoint of a zealot preacher years ago?

All of us live in some kind of shadow in which we hide all that we are ashamed to reveal in the light of day. And yet repression never heals us of the dark secrets hidden in that shadow.

That which is repressed erupts, either in one man whose sexual appetite drove him with reckless abandon or via a society that invents vengeful campaigns against the innocent. Until we learn how to own up to our own secrets and seek our own redemption the Spitzer's and Obama's will continue to be scourged.

These questionable

actions are not new. Look at the historical precedents that show that moral lapses and human vagaries, some contrived some self imposed, occurred in past cultures just as they do today.

The Christian bible does not hide the flaws of either the powerful or the common person. It provides realistic accounts of their transgressions and their path to repentance, restitution and reconciliation that lead to lives worthy of inspiration and moral example.

Consider that Rahab, the prostitute of Jericho, became a grandmother, several generations removed, in the family tree of Jesus Christ despite her past indiscretions. Or King David, one of the greatest biblical leaders, who before fulfilling his God purpose lusted after Bathsheeba and conspired to make her a widow so that he could marry her.

Perhaps the story of the adulterer brought before Jesus to be condemned best illustrates the point. Instead of condemnation she received forgiveness after her accusers were first asked to cast the first stone if they were without sin.

During this Easter season our hope should be that man will one day understand that it is more Christ like to be joyous when a fallen soul repents and is reconciled rather than reveling in the degradation of the accused.

Black Infants Are More Likely to Be Born Preterm and to Die at Birth

WHITE PLAINS, N.Y., -- The African-American infant mortality rate is more than twice as high as white Americans and the preterm birth rate for black women averaged 17.6 percent, compared to the national average of 12.3 between 2002 and 2004.

These statistics, and others related to birth outcomes, are discussed in a new PBS documentary "When the Bough Breaks." This episode, scheduled to air Thursday, April 3, at 9:00 PM, is part of the four-hour series entitled "Unnatural Causes -- Is

Inequality Making Us Sick?" that was produced by California Newsreel and presented by the National Minority Consortia of public television. The March of Dimes is an official outreach partner for the series in conjunction with other leading public health, policy and community-based organizations.

"Racial and ethnic disparities in premature birth are troubling and persistent," said Dr. Jennifer L. Howse, president of the March of Dimes. "We face an urgent need for effective prevention pro-

grams and interventions to reverse a serious trend that has lasted too long. That's going to take influencing lawmakers to enact meaningful policy changes that will increase access to affordable health care coverage and committing more public dollars to prevention programs and to research so that we may find answers."

This episode interviews many experts in the field, including a March of Dimes-funded researcher, Dr. James Collins, from Northwestern University. Dr. Collins and Dr. Michael Lu, who also

appears in the program, are members of the March of Dimes Scientific Advisory Committee. Some of those interviewed raise the hypothesis that the chronic stress of racism may have a detrimental impact on the health of African American women and on their children.

Preterm birth has been the leading cause of death for black infants for more than a decade. For those babies that do survive, approximately 25 percent of them live with serious long-term problems, such as learning disabilities, cerebral palsy, blindness,

hearing loss, and other chronic conditions including asthma. Infant mortality rates for blacks averaged 13.5 per 1,000 live births, compared to the national average of 6.9 between 2002 and 2004.

Committed to alleviating the racial and ethnic disparities in birth outcomes, the March of Dimes is involved in many activities to promote health equity including federal and state advocacy activities, funding grants for research, conducting professional education, sponsoring community-based programs, and collaborat-

ing with organizations such as Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc. and Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity and government agencies such as the Centers for Disease Control and the Office of Minority Health within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. In 2003, the March of Dimes launched a multi-year, multi-million dollar national campaign to reduce the growing rate of preterm birth among all racial groups. Kenya Turning the Corner on Election Violence

(NNPA) - As Kenya's political leaders patch up their disputes that brought the country close to chaos, the international Human Rights Watch has called for prosecution of those who instigated

the worst abuses.

"In many cases the chief architects of post-election violence were prominent and well-known individuals," stated HRW in a report entitled "Ballots to Bullets: Organized

Political Violence and Kenya's Crisis of Governance."

Unrest in January and February left at least 1,500 people dead and 300,000 forced into internally displaced persons' camps.

The report also faulted foreign governments for turning a blind eye to corruption, impunity and mismanagement by Kenya's government that contributed to the recent crisis.

Meanwhile, Kenya's president Mwai Kibaki this week signed into law two bills passed hours earlier by parlia-

ment, enshrining a power-sharing deal between his party and that of opposition leader Raila Odinga who will assume the newly-created post of prime minister.

Uganda Eliminates a Deadly Disease

(NNPA) - Hib meningitis has been virtually eliminated in young children in Uganda just five years after the country introduced a Hib vaccine nationwide, according to an independent study.

Haemophilus influenzae type b is a leading cause of pneumonia and meningitis, an inflamma-

tion of the lining covering the brain and spinal cord. It kills approximately 400,000 children under five years of age, most of them in the developing world, each year.

The Ugandan vaccination program now prevents almost 30,000 cases of severe Hib disease and 5,000 child deaths (under

five years) annually, equivalent to the successful control of measles in the country.

Said Rana Hajjeh, director of the Hib Initiative: "Uganda has been a frontrunner in the Africa region in adopting this life-saving vaccine... and reducing mortality in children."

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Road Scholar Honors Dr. Asa G. Hilliard's Vision with Travel Scholarship for Educators

Winstead Announces Winners of the 2008 Scholarships Targeting Diverse Candidates

Texas law firm Winstead PC selected the three winners of the Winstead Juris Doctor Scholarship program targeting first-year, top minority candidates. They are Aida Wondwessen, a student at Southern Methodist University Dedman School of Law; Sameer Saxena, a student from the University of Houston Law Center; and Suparna Salil, a student from the University of Texas School of Law. Each of the Winstead scholarship recipients will receive a one-time grant of up to \$20,000 and a position in the 2009 Winstead Summer Associate Program.

Unique to this scholarship award is that a portion of the grant (\$2,000) will be presented to each scholarship recipient's student interest group of choice. In the case of these three recipients, Winstead will present a portion of the scholarship to the SMU Black Law Students Association on behalf of Wondwessen; the UH Asian

Law Students Association on behalf of Saxena; and the UT South Asian Law Students Association on behalf of Salil.

"We are very pleased with the results of this scholarship program. The candidates were impressive and the interest at the three law schools in learning about the scholarship program was enthusiastic. Winstead is looking forward to working with these three law students and future practicing attorneys as we build a future of growth and success together," said Tom Forestier, chairman of Winstead's Diversity Committee.

The scholarship selection process began with a written application, a 500 word personal statement, a transcript of first-semester grades, and the candidate's resume. Candidates were encouraged to submit a written legal product. Winstead attorneys then conducted follow up interviews with finalists from each school and chose one finalist

from each school earlier this month as the scholarship winner.

Wondwessen is a member of SMU's Black Law Students Association, a Dean's Scholarship recipient, and a mentor for at-risk youth. Saxena graduated Magna Cum Laude from the University of Houston with a B.S. in Psychology. He is a member of UH's Asian Law Students Association and an avid golfer who plays on championship courses. Salil is the treasurer and a fund-raiser for UT's South Asian Law Students Association, a staff member of the Texas Journal on Civil Liberties & Civil Rights, and an actor and singer in a student musical theater company.

In April, Wondwessen, Saxena and Salil, their families, and their designated student interest groups, will be invited to a reception in each recipient's honor, at the Dallas, Houston and Austin offices respectively.



tax return will need to do so in order to receive a stimulus payment. IRS.gov has all the information people need to help them obtain a stimulus payment."

Stimulus payments will be sent out in the order of the last two digits of the Social Security number used on the tax return.

Because the IRS will use the Social Security number to determine when checks are mailed, taxpayers may receive their checks at different times than their neighbors or other family members. On a jointly filed return, the first Social Security number listed will determine the mail-out time.

Taxpayers who choose direct deposit on their federal income tax returns can expect to receive their economic stimulus payments between May 2 and May 16 provided their returns were received and processed by April 15, 2008. For taxpayers who did not choose direct deposit on their tax return but whose returns were processed by April 15, the paper checks will be in the mail starting

May 16, with the initial mailings completed by around July 11.

The IRS also announced the availability of an on-line calculator on IRS.gov to help taxpayers determine if they are eligible to receive an economic stimulus payment and if they are, how much they can expect. Anyone who has prepared a 2007 income tax return can use the calculator. It will ask taxpayers a series of questions, so they should have their 2007 tax returns handy.

Below are the schedules for economic stimulus payments related to tax returns processed by April 15, 2008.

A small percentage of tax returns will require additional time to process and to compute. For these returns, stimulus payments may not be issued in accordance with the schedule above, even if the tax return was processed by April 15.

All or part of an economic stimulus payment may be applied to back taxes or certain other debts of the taxpayer, such as delinquent child support and student loans. In such cases, the IRS

will send a letter to the taxpayer explaining the offset.

To accommodate people whose tax returns are processed after April 15, the IRS will continue sending weekly payments. People who file tax returns after April 15

and receive a refund can expect to receive their economic stimulus payments in about two weeks after receiving their tax refunds. To ensure taxpayers receive their stimulus payment this year, they must file a tax return by Oct. 15.

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legacy of Dr. King.

"We must keep his legacy alive, and this will serve as a reminder of the struggle and ultimate sacrifice that Dr. King made, so that his dream of equal treatment for all men can become a reality one day. We are not there yet so we must continue to move in that direction," said Reverend Derrick Bowman, Dallas president of the SCLC.

Dr. Martin Luther King founded the national arm of the SCLC in 1957 following the Montgomery Bus Boycott that virtually begin the Civil Rights movement. Dr. Martin Luther King served as its president from its conception until his untimely death on April 4, 1968. During the early meetings of this group, nonviolent mass action became the adopted cornerstone of the strategy and local

community organizations became affiliates with the SCLC across the South. The founders also determined to make the SCLC a movement open to all, regardless of race, religion, or background.

Today, the SCLC is a nation-wide organization made up of chapters and affiliates with programs that affect the lives of all Americans: north, south, east and west. Its sphere of influence and interests

has become international in scope because the human rights movement transcends national boundaries.

"In keeping with our national theme, 'A New Day And A New Way', our mission is still to preserve the ideals and principles espoused by Dr. King. We are committed to bearing the torch in the civil rights movement by advocating change through direct

action and nonviolent tactics. We must focus and continue to invest in our youth," said Bowman. "The SCLC currently offers youth mentorship programs and provide scholarships to high school and college students. Additionally, we aim to be the one that provoke change in the mindset of our community to end black on black crime and increase economic development."

The Dallas Chapter of the SCLC was reorganized and chartered in December of 2007. It currently has approximately 50 members and meets once a month at the Martin Luther King Center at 7:00pm. istration came to a stunning end a little more than a year after it began.

Before his speech, the spectators at the ceremony were schmoozing and glad-handing each other: There were former Mayors Ed Koch and David Dinkins waving hellos to each other; Rev. Al Sharpton shaking hands with former Governor George Pataki; a rabbi rubbing shoulders with the Rev. Calvin Butts; and Senate Majority Leader Joseph Bruno weaving gleefully amid a coterie of elected Democrats. The harmony and healing that suffused Paterson's acceptance speech was infectious, and on several occasions his remarks about unity were met with loud applause.

"Let us grab the unusual opportunities that circumstance has handed us today and

put personal politics, party advantage, and power struggles aside, in favor of service, in the interests of the people," Paterson said flawlessly, having memorized his speech as he always does.

This allusion to Spitzer was about as close as it came to mentioning the former governor, though there were hints that he would retain some of the reform measures promised by the previous administration. "I never expected to have the honor of serving of New York State," Paterson said, "but our constitution demands it. This transition today is an historic message to the world that we live among the same values that we profess and that we are government of laws, and not individuals."

Getting to the more substantive issues, Paterson said that if we

are going to build a viable future for New York, "we are going to have to help single mothers who have two jobs." He said, "We are going to have to give children better schools, and families who don't have health care some redress."

Those who may have been expecting a stem winder of an address, covering a litany of critical problems facing the state will have to await another occasion. This was his pleasant preface, a way of easing into a position that is fraught with a multitude of obstacles, including congestion pricing, a budget with a deficit of more than \$5 billion that must be completed by April 1.

Many Harlemites are already pondering what kind of administration Paterson will oversee, and if he'll repair some of the damage left by

his predecessor in which several charitable organizations in the community were victims of his overzealousness. One listener in Albany wanted to know if Paterson the governor will keep the promises made by Paterson the State Senator, a position he held for more than 20 years.

"He promised a moratorium on eminent domain," she said. "I wonder if he'll keep that promise and how that'll impact such projects as Willets Point, Columbia University, and Bruce Ratner's plans for the Atlantic Yards in Brooklyn."

Even more immediate for Paterson is the recent admission that he had more than one extra-marital affair. During a period of time more than seven years ago, when their marriage was in trouble, he told one of the local

dailies that both he and his wife had been involved in affairs. He said they had discussed these affairs and felt it was best to talk about them and then put them aside.

If Paterson can overcome the disability of being a Black man and legally blind to become the chief executive in the state, the old love affairs, the possibility of conflict of interest with his lawyer father who represents several unions, and dealing with the longstanding political gridlock in Albany will be a com-

parative walk in the park.

"I have confronted the prejudice of race, and challenged the issues of my own disability," the governor said during his speech, "I have served in government for over two decades. I stand willing and able to lead this state to a brighter future and a better tomorrow."

It will take all the fortitude and genius Paterson had shown in the past to accomplish just a portion of the enormous tasks that loom ahead.

The next time you hear the words "bottom-line" when you're sitting in the audience at a company meeting, don't roll your eyes. Instead, think about all the ways that you can help to boost that bottom-line.

Top Five Project Management Bottom-Line Boosters

1. Develop clear and quantifiable goals. If a goal is murky and indistinguishable, how does anyone know when and if it's done? Don't hide behind a curtain of vagueness. Be clear and make it measurable because a wise woman once said, "What gets measured, gets done!"

2. Track time and dollars spent. When you can show your boss and your team exactly where you are both in terms of time allocated and actual dollars spent, you're speaking their language. Nothing makes upper management quiver more than not knowing where they are on a mission-critical project.

3. Meet deadlines and milestones. If your team is missing every single deadline and project milestone, there's generally a reason why. Don't

accept this as normal. Do you have too many false deadlines in your company culture, so people no longer accept them as real? When you understand what impedes meeting deadlines, you can get answers that not only get your project back on track, but save your organization time and money.

4. Unearth the hidden gems in your project agreement and documentation. Too many people mistake documentation as busy work instead of using it to get at its real value. 

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Census: Texas Is the Hot Place to Live

DALLAS (AP) — Four Texas metropolitan areas were among the biggest population gainers as Americans continued their trend of moving to the Sun Belt in 2006 and 2007, according to Census Bureau estimates to be released Thursday.

Dallas-Fort Worth added more than 162,000 residents between July 2006 and July 2007, more than any other metro area. Three other

Texas areas — Houston, Austin and San Antonio — also cracked the top 10.

Atlanta saw the second-largest population jump with just over 151,000 new residents. Phoenix was third with more than 132,000, and was followed by Houston, Riverside, Calif., Charlotte, N.C., Chicago, Austin, Las Vegas and San Antonio.

Of the 50 fastest-growing metro areas, 27 were in the South and 20 were in the

West. Two were in the Midwest, one — Fayetteville, Ark. — straddles the South and Midwest and none was in the Northeast.

Detroit lost more than three times as many people as any other metro area — its population declined more than 27,300. Other areas losing more than 5,000 people were Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Columbus, Ga., Youngstown, Ohio, and

Buffalo, N.Y.

Experts credit much of the growth in the South to relatively strong local economies and housing prices that are among the most affordable in the U.S.

"People are running away from unaffordable housing, from the economic slow-down," said Karl Eschbach, a state demographer in Texas. "I would expect Texas to stay at the top of a slowing game."

According to figures compiled by Eschbach, 16 percent of Americans who moved to other states between July 2006 and July 2007 came to Texas, which led the nation for the second straight year in that category.

Home prices continue to be a big factor. A report earlier this month by Global Insight found that housing prices in the Dallas area were undervalued by as much as 30 percent.

Ann Sekesan, a pharmacy technician, moved her family from Pennsylvania to suburban Fort Worth last June after seeing spacious homes in Texas for under \$200,000 on a television show.

"After we saw that on TV, my husband and I looked at each other and said, 'Have you ever been to Texas?'" Sekesan said. "It's amazing the size of a home you can get down here. It's just incredible."
