### THE TRUTH CLINIC The Importance Of Purpose

America's ship of state seems to be sailing out of control and moving in the wrong direction according to approximately 80 percent of Americans surveyed in recent polls. The head of state captain and the first mate congress are allowing this great ship to bob aimlessly and rudderless in а treacherous sea of debilitating war and economic anxiety.

Sixty three percent of Americans continue to say the Iraq war was not worth fighting while nearly twothirds feel the economy is in a recession. More than half of the respondents said their personal financial situation has worsened as oil prices continue to hit record highs, food prices climb, home foreclosures skyrocket and healthcare is unaffordable.

Of greater concern are the surveys that reveal a growing unhappiness among Americans with their current political and corporate leaders. At a moment when the country is facing crucial tests both at home and abroad Americans are expressing an alarming lack of confidence in our key institutional leaders. Over three quarters of those interviewed use the term "crisis" to describe the country's leadership.

This week's congressional hearings on Iraq did not provide the lift to the country's psyche that many of the war's supporters might have expected after months of surge expenditures.

While taking credit for the security gains that 30,000 additional American troops have helped to produce, Gen. David Petraeus, the commander of U.S. forces in Iraq, and Ambassador Rvan Crocker warned that "We haven't turned any corners and we haven't seen any lights at the end of the tunnel."

One can only conclude that America has been on a five plus year odyssey in Iraq that has no definitive purpose while our myopic leaders continue to promise honor and success just around the corner with a little more time and a great deal more money.

Execution of well articulated agendas that are deficient of honorable purpose can drive once-great nations into an abyss of destruction and once-great armies into chaos and confusion.

Even with a well defined purpose the ensuing result can become questionable if not used properly. If purpose is constructed as just a means to accomplish selfish ends without a foundation in God's morality then it will not work. The moral ideas that undergird meaningful purpose define what is right and what is worthwhile.

There are all kinds of purposes, some noble, some not so noble. Millions of Americans have been going about their daily business assuming that their government is being motivated by high ideals and a God centered purpose.

Slowly but surely as recent surveys are proving they are facing the reality that their great nation is floundering without without purpose, honor and without integrity. As the burdens mount on the backs of the suffering people they are beginning to question how an honorable result can be created from a dishonorable action.

Everything that God created has a purpose — the sun, clouds, rain, trees, oceans, mountains, animals and man. Regardless of how large or small, we all exist to accomplish a certain task. It is the knowledge of that purpose that enables every soul and nation

to fulfill itself. Not only were we created by God; we were created for him. The ultimate goal of the universe is to show the glory of God. It is the reason for everything that exists, including man and his governments. What is the glory of God? Creation reveals the Creator's glory. We can learn a lot about God's character just by looking around. Through nature we learn about God's power. The "The Bible says, heavens declare the

### Kenya Steers Toward The Road To Recovery Kenya's Government and "Friends of Kenya" Take Action to Help Kenya's Tourism Get Back on its Feet after Recent Presidential Clashes

MINNEAPOLIS, MN -After Kenya's recent clashes over the contested presidential election in late December 2007, the country is beginning to take clear action to prevent additional tourism losses for 2008

Since strife broke out for the first few weeks of 2008 over disputed election results and both candidates were at an impasse in agreement on how to move forward, tourism to Kenya has suffered a severe blow. Overall, tourism in the first two months was down just over 50 percent from the year prior. The drop is being blamed on the "wait and approach see" many tourists and tour operators were taking during the situation, as well as the reaction of many European charters choosing to halt or cancel flights because of travel warnings to the country. Tourism, Kenya's largest industry, was on a record

breaking high in late December, surpassing the million arrivals mark for 2007. Difficulty finding space for Kenya's prized summer months was the biggest concern for Kenya last year. Now as the country is facing its biggest challenge ever, actions are being put in place to combat the effects of negative publicity caused by the presidential election reaction.

The Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife, in conjunction with The Kenya Tourist Board, the government body in charge of marketing Kenya's tourism, has started to take action to quell fears from incoming and potential tourists and to assure them that Kenya is back on track and ready to

Stage one of the process is to get the message out, so Kenya invited a group of 200 journalists from around the world to see for themselves that Kenya is safe. "This is the only way we can really prove to people that Kenya is a wonderful holiday destination without filters. We want these hardnosed journalists to see, feel and experience all areas in Kenya and make their own assumptions as to whether Kenva is ready to welcome its visitors again! We are confident they will see what we have seen for a while now; that Kenya is stable, safe and ready for tourists,' said Dr. O'ngonga Achieng, Managing Director of the Kenya Tourism Board.

Phase two will engage the trade on a similar initiative with visits to source markets, press conferences,

travel agent familiarization trips and finally, engage the channel of distribution through partnerships in advertising and other pro-motional campaigns with the media

With these initiatives between the Ministry, The KTB, distributors and travel agents, Kenya expects to help spread the good word and re-establish confidence in the destination.

"The strongest way to help get Kenya back on its feet is to come out on safari and experience our wonderful country. We believe the people who have already visited us will become our biggest ambassadors, as they have been for the past 50 years. By coming to Kenya, they helped us make tourism the leading sector. We expect they will help again, one safari at a time," stated Achieng. environment and genes affect the chances of getting the disease. Is breast cancer caused by something women come in contact with at home, at work, in their communities or in the personal products they use? Are some women at greater risk because of small variations in genes that interact with exposures? That's what the Sister Study is trying to answer.

Breast cancer risk may be influenced by our environment, but pinpointing specific environmental causes hasn't been easy. Previous studies have found some clues.

✓ Breast cancer rates vary over time and geographic region.

 Identical twins rarely both get breast cancer. Many chemicals cause

mammary tumors in animals. ✓ Lifestyle environmen-

tal factors, such as alcohol consumption, diet. and exercise appear to be related to breast cancer risk

✓ Exposures to radiation, solvents, or some pesticides appear to be related to breast cancer risk.

Fewer than 20% of women with breast cancer have any family history of the disease, and less than half of all women diagnosed with breast cancer have any of the known risk factors. Sister Study researchers believe there is much more to be learned about how environment and genes are related to breast cancer risk. Women ages 35 to 74 may be eligible to join the study if their sister (living or deceased) related to them by blood, had breast cancer; they have never had breast cancer themselves; and they live in the United States or Puerto Rico. The study is quickly approaching the goal of enrolling 50,000 diverse women, but to ensure the results benefit all women, researchers are asking African Americans, Latinas, Asians, Pacific Islanders and Native Americans to enroll immediately. Caucasian women with high school degree or less, or who are between the ages of 65-74 are also still needed.

During the remaining months of enrollment, the Sister Study is making

special outreach to women who have ever held blue collar or nontraditional jobs, because of the wide-range of environmental and chemical exposures that might be found at work.

"Our entire team is delighted to be close to reaching our goal of enrolling 50,000 sisters, so we can begin to focus on the real purpose of our research - finding causes of breast cancer," said Dale Sandler, Ph.D., Chief of the Epidemiology Branch at NIEHS and Principal Investigator of the Sister Study. She added, "Every year, thousands of women are diagnosed with breast cancer. One day we would like to be able to prevent breast cancer in our daughters and grand-daughters."

The study team makes every effort to ensure that participants feel safe and comfortable with the study and that participation is as convenient as possible. At the beginning, women will answer some over-the-phone and written surveys, and provide blood, urine, household dust and toenail samples. After that for about 10 years, the Sister Study will touch base once a year to learn about changes to a participant's address, health or environment. The Sister Study does not require participants to take any medicine, undergo any medical treatments, or make any changes to their habits, diet or daily life.

Women who may have felt helpless as they watched their sisters battle breast cancer now have an opportunity to help researchers learn more about causes of the disease. Zola Boone, who is over age 65, is a participant and spokesperson for the Sister Study. "I enrolled in the Sister Study because my two younger sisters were diagnosed with breast cancer, says Boone of Maryland. "My youngest sister is a five-year survivor and my middle sister has just finished chemotherapy.

### **Neurologists, Emergency Physicians and the** American Stroke Association Team Together to **Educate the Public About Stroke Symptoms** "Give Me 5" Campaign Kicks Off

The American Academy of Neurology (AAN), the American College of Emergency Physicians (ACEP) and the American Stroke Association (ASA) are raising awareness about the warning signs of stroke and the importance of getting to the emergency department fast with a campaign called "Give Me 5: Walk, Talk, Reach, See, Feel."

A stroke occurs when a blood vessel that carries oxygen and nutrients to the brain is either blocked by a clot or bursts. When that happens, part of the brain cannot get the blood (and oxygen) it needs, so it starts to die. Stroke is the third leading cause of death in the United States and a leading cause of disability. However, research shows the public remains unaware of its warning signs and the need for immediate med-

ical attention, even if the symptoms subside. Those symptoms include sudden difficulty walking, talking, reaching and seeing, as well as sudden and severe headache.

"Saving someone's life - or even your own - may be as simple as remembering 'Give Me 5,'" said Ms. Fairchild. "Do not ignore symptoms, and do not delay getting to the emergency department. With stroke, every minute counts."

"Give Me 5" offers a quick stroke check using five short words:

•Walk – Is their balance off?

•Talk – Is their speech slurred or face droopy? •Reach – Is one side

weak or numb? •See – Is their vision all or partly lost?

Is their •Feel \_ headache severe?

It goes on to say, "If you recognize the sudden signs of a stroke, call 9-1-1!" The comparison The campaign also urges people to say "I think this is a stroke," about themselves or someone they are with, when speaking with a 911 paramedic, operator, triage nurse or emergency physician. The campaign includes a toll-free phone number. 1-888-4STROKE, and a triwebsite branded www.giveme5forstroke.o rg where the public can obtain more information, brochures and a giveaway item. "I was driving when the

right side of my body suddenly felt weak," said Dr. Fite of Houston, Texas. "I realized it was a stroke when the car started to swerve. Because I am an emergency physician, I knew to call 9-1-1 to get help immediately, which is why I made such a great recovery. But I know from my experience as a doctor that too many people ignore stroke symptoms or wait for them to go away, with tragic results. 'Give Me 5' is a great tool for people to identify a stroke quickly and get help fast." The campaign coincides with new research

released in February showing a tripling in the rate of strokes among middle-aged women, the campaign's targeted audi-

ence. "This surge of strokes in middle-aged women in a short period is very alarming," said Dr. Ralph Sacco, Fellow member of the American Academy of Neurology. "The important message of the 'Give Me 5' campaign is early identification of stroke symptoms and early intervention by doctors in the emergency department. That can make the difference between life and death

Cooper Lavon, and Texoma) are full and ready to service our area without interruption.

In addition, the residents and businesses of Plano continue to show good stewardship when it comes to water use. Total water

consumption for the year 2007 was at a level not seen since 1996 when Plano's population was nearly 80,000 people less than it is today, demonstrating the commitment to conserva-tion by our Plano water consumers.

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### **DART Rail Green Line on Schedule, on Budget** Next Stop: Deep Ellum, Baylor, and Fair Park!

North Texans are just over 500 days away from taking the train to Deep Ellum, Baylor University Medical Center, and Fair Park when the first phase of the \$1.8 billion, 28mile Green Line rail project opens as scheduled on September 14, 2009.

"There is a long tradition of passenger rail service in the communities served by the Green Line, and we're excited to help bring it back," D A R T President/Executive Director Gary Thomas said.

Until January 1956 streetcars carried passengers through Deep Ellum and the neighborhoods by Baylor Hospital to Fair Park where up to four sets of tracks were in service in front of the fairgrounds, Thomas explained. "Not coincidentally, the Green Line will follow much the same path, and Fair Park Station will be in the same location as it was when rail service stopped in 1956. We look forward to transporting new generations of North Texans through these communities.

DART Rail doubling The first section of the Green Line will extend from Pearl Station on the east side of Downtown Dallas to Deep Ellum Station, Baylor Station, Fair Park Station (at the intersection of Parry and Exposition) and the MLK Station, adjacent to the J.



B. Jackson, Jr. Transit Center on the southwest side of Fair Park. Daily service to Victory Station also will begin September 2009. The remaining 25 miles of the Green Line, scheduled to open in December 2010, will extend southeast to Pleasant Grove and northwest from Victory Station to the Dallas Market Center, the Southwestern Medical District, Love Field Airport and downtown Farmers Branch and Carrollton. Green Line construction began in Summer 2006 following the award of a \$700 million Full Funding Grant Agreement from the Federal Transit Administration.

DART's current expansion programs will lead to the doubling of the DART Rail System to 90 miles by 2013. Altogether, the rail extensions are expected to add 60,000 weekday passenger trips, essentially doubling ridership on the DART Rail System.

A new Orange Line will branch from the Green Line at Bachman Station to serve Irving and Las Colinas in 2011 and DFW International Airport by 2013. Service also will be extended from Garland to Rowlett in 2012. DART also is conducting the Downtown Dallas Transit Study, which includes a second rail line through the Dallas Central Business District with revenue service scheduled for 2014. And a Blue Line extension from Ledbetter Station to UNT-Dallas is scheduled to open in 2018.

<u>Green Line creating</u> local jobs

More than 2,000 workers are involved daily in building the Green Line, and approximately 95% of the crews are local residents. The safety record also is strong. DART officials report the agency has experienced workers' compensation and liability insurance expenses significantly below the national average within the construction industry.

DART officials credit intensive safety training. 'We've conducted more than 250 safety-training classes on this project alone - including more than 120 in Spanish," Thomas explained. "What's more, we keep up with our workers after training. Working with our construction partners, we've developed an innovative mentor program where senior construction workers guide new hires through their first months on the job to make sure they understand how to work as safely and efficiently as possible.'

nal sin—racism. Drs. Wright, Joseph Lowery, Fred Shuttlesworth, Jim Wallis, Carolyn Knight, Gardner C Taylor, James Forbes, my father and other preachers have been carrying the legacy of the Christian prophetic social justice tradition rooted in love and criticism made popular by Dr. King, the greatest prophetic voice of the 20th century.

A veteran of the Industrial Revolution, the Great Depression and Technological the Revolution, Common Sense survived cultural and educational trends including body piercing, whole language and "new math." ## Munger Place UMC to Present Dr. Joseph E. Lowery

The Rev. Dr. Joseph Echols Lowery of Atlanta, the dean of the civil rights movement," will be the guest preacher at Munger Place United

Methodist Church, 5200 Street, Bryan Dallas, on Sunday. April 20, 2008, at the 10:50 a.m. morning worship service. Dr. Lowery will be in Dallas to accept the prestigious Robert  $\mathbf{O}$ Peace Cooper Justice and Fellowship from Southern Methodist University in M c C o r d Auditorium later that evening at 7

p.m. An internationally acclaimed minister and civil/human rights activist, Dr. Lowery began his civil right ministry in Mobile, Ala. in an effort to desegregate buses and public places. In 1957, he and the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. formed the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC). Dr. Lowery was named vicepresident. In 1965, he was also named chairman of the delegation to take demands to then Alabama Governor George Wallace during the historical Selma to Montgomery March.

Dr. Lowery became

president of the SCLC in February, 1977. In addition to serving as a local church pastor. he negotiated covenants with major cor-



porations for employment advances, opportunities and business contracts with minority companies. He has led peace delegations to the Middle East and Central America. Dr. Lowery's efforts to combat injustice and promote equal opportunities have led to the extension of provisions to the Voting Rights Act in 2007.

Dr. Lowery is a cofounder and former president of the Black Leadership Forum, a con-. Black sortium of advocacy groups. The Forum began protesting apartheid in South Africa in the mid-1970s and continued until

the election of Nelson Mandela.

After serving his community for more than 45 years, Dr. Lowery retired

from the pulpit in 1997. He also retired in January of 1998 from the SCLC as president and CEO. Despite his retirement, Dr. Lowery will tell you he doesn't "feel no way tired," as he continues his calling to be "the voice of the voiceless.

Dr. Lowery has received numerous awards, including an NAACP Lifetime Achievement Award, the Martin Luther King Center Peace Award and the National Urban

League's Whitney M. Young, Jr. Lifetime Achievement Award. Ebony Magazine has twice named him as one of the Greatest 15 Black Preachers.
