Democrats want everyone to think that blacks are monolithic. Take, for example, that little statistic of the voting habits of black Americans. It ranges anywhere from 90% to 96% of the vote going to the Democratic candidate, depending

upon the race, the region of the country and the contest. One small detail is missing though... less than 30% of blacks even vote. So if you take 90% of 29%, you will get about 26% or about one quarter of the black population that actually votes for the Democratic candidate.

Arts panel criticizes MLK statue design for DC memorial

WASHINGTON - The centerpiece for the Martin Luther King Jr. memorial on the National Mall has drawn criticism from a federal arts panel, which says the proposed statue looks "confrontational" and resembles the head of a socialist state more than a

civil rights leader.

Models of the 28-foot tall statue depict King emerging from a chunk of granite, his arms folded in front of his chest, his legs firmly rooted, an intense gaze on his face.

But the U.S. Commission of Fine Arts, which reviews the design of projects in the capital area, said the design should be reworked to reflect a more sympathetic rendering of

Members thought "the proposed treatment of the sculpture - as the most iconographic and central element of the memorial to Dr. King - would be unfortunate and inappropriate as an expression of his legacy," wrote Thomas Luebke, commission secretary, in an April 25 letter to the foundation that is planning the

King memorial and the National Park Service.

The panel said the statue looked "confrontational" and reflected a "genre of political sculpture that has recently been pulled down in other countries."

Harry Johnson, president of the Washington, D.C., Martin Luther King, Jr., National Memorial, said a new design would be sub-

The Forest Service has made a change in leadership at the Southern Station Research naming Dr. Jim Reaves as the new Station Director. Dr. Reaves earned a B.S. from Voorhees College and a Ph.D. from the former Atlanta University (now Clark Atlanta University). He started the southern part of his career on the campus of A&M Alabama



University, where he held two positions, as a project leader for the

Southern Station and as USDA liaison to Alabama A&M. He was later promoted to assistant station director for planning and applications Station headquarters in Asheville before being tapped for the assignment the national office.

THE TRUTH CLINIC They Also Have Mothers

James Woodard, after serving 27 years and four months in prison, was released on April 29, 2008 after DNA tests and recanted witness testimony proved that he did not rape and murder his 21-yearold girlfriend in 1980. Woodard had just turned 28 when he was convicted. He is now 55 years old.

State District Judge Mark Stoltz told Mr. Woodard at his hearthat, ing "Unfortunately, you're not getting justice today. You're getting the end of injustice."

Mr. Woodard, who has spent more time behind bars than any other inmate in the country exonerated by DNA evidence, became the 18th person in Dallas County to have his conviction overturned since 2001. This number of exonerations is unmatched by any county in America according to the Innocence Project, a legal center specializing in overturning wrongful convictions.

Texas accounts for 14 percent of the estimated 216 DNA exonerations throughout the nation. A total of 31 Texas inmates. who have spent a combined total of 427 years in prison, have been formally cleared through DNA testing. The Dallas County District Attorney's office and The Innocence Project are still investigating another 250 cases that have the potential to be overturned.

In Woodward's case. prosecutors pursued originally murder charges against him. Woodard had been dating 21year-old Beverly Ann Jones for seven months before her

Woodard was visiting with his mother when word began circulating around the neighborhood that Jones' body had been found near the Trinity River. While he and his mother watched for details on the evening news the police arrived to arrest him.

Even though prosecutors are required by law to turn over exculpatory evidence to the defense counsel the post conviction investigation of Woodard's case indicates that the Dallas district attorney's maliciously office kept critical information from the defense and the jury. Prosecutors did not tell the defense that a witness had seen Ms. Jones in the company of three other men the night she was killed.

The decision to initiate a review of questionable conviction cases began a year ago when the new County Dallas District Attorney, Watkins, Craig teamed up with the Innocence Project of Watkins not Texas. only ordered that all prosecution files be opened to the Innocence Project's lawyers but he also gave them subpoena power so they could obtain witness testimony and gather other suppressed evidence.

The extraordinary effort to seek out justice is a direct refutation of the usual "convict at any cost" philosophy that has been the trademark of Dallas County D. A.'s for well over thirty years.

Wrongful convictions have cost Texas taxpayers \$8.6 million in compensation since 2001 according to The

Dallas News. Dallas County accounts for about one-third of that total.

Texas state senator Rodney Ellis said the total compensation amount paid so far confirms his suspicion that wrongful convictions are far more common in Texas than people realize. **Taxpayers** should expect to pay considerably more as the number of exonerations rises. These DNA exoneration cases have provided irrefutable proof that wrongful convictions are not isolated or rare events, but result from rampant systemic defects that can be precisely identified and addressed.

Almost half of the wrongful convictions overturned involved prosecutors withholding evidence from the defense.

But the years of incarceration are not the only hardship imposed on each person innocent wrongly convicted of a crime. He is robbed of his freedom, his family and friendships, and his livelihood. And the nightmare does not end there. With no money, housing, transportation, health services or insurance, and saddled with a criminal record the punishment lingers long after innocence has been proven.

Simple apologies, no matter how sincere, can't bring back the time that is lost or the missed relationships with loved ones that passed during the incarceration period. An apology cannot prepare the victim for reentry into a new world that didn't exist when imprisonment started. Twenty three states have some form

compensation statute while twenty seven states do not.

State officials and seven of the men who lost years of their lives behind bars for crimes they did not commit met in Austin recently to discuss potential solutions to reduce the disturbing number of wrongful convictions occurring in Texas.

Mr. Watkins who has gained national acclaim for his innovative actions to free the wrongfully convicted is also advocating for harsh sanctions against prosecutors who intentionally withhold evidence.

But he is fighting an uphill battle. Currently, no recourse exists to bring criminal charges against a prosecutor who intentionally violates a defendant's constitutional rights by withholding pertinent evidence from the defense. The Project Innocence plans to push for remedial legislation but speculates that the chances of success are very slim since state prosecutors are a powerful lobby in Texas.

Texas state senator Rodney Ellis argues, "What better way to get to the truth? Why shouldn't we have a criminal statute to keep prosecutors from lying when they know the truth?"

Such is the case for removing the biased thumb of injustice from Lady Justice's balance scale not only in Texas but across the nation.

Mandela to Mark 90 Years at British Anti-AIDS Bash




coming to the dentist."

degree from Baylor allows him to practice general dentistry, however, he plans to expand and get training in orthodontics so he can treat everyone and every problem that may be presented.



Moliere's Misanthrope - A Comic Masterpiece; Mid-Life! The Crisis Musical

Blunt honesty versus false politeness is a question civilized people have wrestled with since civility first reared its wellmannered head.

The title character, Alceste, played brilliantly by Adrian LaTourelle, has a jaded view of mankind. All actions no matter how considerate are seen through a sardonic sneer. Philinte (Matthew Gray) philosophically opposes Alcleste's unapologetic view. He defends disingenuous tact as mannerly. In the opening scenes, the audience witnesses the lengths Philinte goes in the name of fraudulent goodness. He embraces a presumably close friend

only to reveal after departing that he had no idea who the man was.

The

between the two characters would be less enthralling and entertaining except for the talent of the two actors. The effortless interaction between the two men with polar opposite views propels a dia-logue laden plot that might otherwise collapse under its own weight. After all the story is told in verse. In one particular scene, the colorful Oronte (Ash Smith), a mutual friend, asks their opinion of a sonnet he had just written. In spite of his insistence on honesty, honesty is not really what he wants. Yet, Alceste and Philinte each deliver with fluent ease their own brand of honesty.

Alceste's love interest, Celimene, is performed by the elegant Kelly

Mares. Ms. Mares has the ability to communicate volumes with a tilted smile. Celimene has many suitors much to the chagrin of Alceste. Her nemesis, Arsinoe (Lynnda Ferguson) elevates prudishness to heights that rival Celimene's promiscuity. Ms. Ferguson, a gifted actor, effectively uses her intense gaze to sufficiently condemn Celimene and her moral void.

This proficient cast is rounded out by the clownish characters Clitandre and Acaste, played by Regan Adair and Shawn Fagan. As additional suitors of Celimene, this dynamic duo brings energy with a bit of animation each time they appear on stage.

Technically, Misanthrope worked on every level. Fitz Patton's sound design exuded a power that underscored

Held on what I have called the "hallowed" grounds of Tuskegee University, this four-day Tuskegee event will engage the attendees in an economic impact strategy for the benefit of Alabama's famous "Black Belt." The conference will also do what many just talk about: Bring together various groups and individuals to create a synergy that stresses the principles of collective work and cooperative economics, and how to leverage that synergy into progressive action.

The Fly-In continues a tradition that has come to be the largest gathering of African American pilots in the nation. The weekend

became popular as many Black pilots and enthusiasts returned to Tuskegee to visit the "Chief," Charles Alfred Anderson, who passed away in 1996. Anderson trained more than 1000 pilots at the famous Moton Field in Tuskegee, including General Benjamin O. including Davis, Jr. and General Daniel "Chappie" James.

Anderson was responsible for the success of the highly regarded 332nd Fighter Group, formed entirely of Tuskegee pilots. It was one of the most successful fighter groups during World War II, and they have the lone distinction of being the only fighter group never to have lost a bomber to enemy fighters while they were flying as escort. That kind of feat required strict discipline and superb flying, both of which "Chief" instilled in his men.

The Fly-in commemorates the legacy of "Chief" Anderson and for the past 41 years has grown both in numbers and initiatives that have a positive impact on Tuskegee region. Leaders of the NAI, along with those of other organizations realize the importance of doing what "Chief" did. They teach others, and they work hard to provide economic opportunities to those residing in the "Black Belt" by collaborating with local businesses to assure they get the maximum benefit from the Fly-In being held there each year.

This year's event stresses Black people supporting Black businesses; it will also conduct forums with Black farmers on how they can gain access to additional markets and maximize their resources and expertise in the agriculture industry. Additionally, the Fly-In will explore opportunities in the energy industry which, with sky-rocketing prices, is a business area in which Black people must carve out a significant niche.

"Blackonomics" also be in the house during the Fly-In. Yours truly will be the keynote speaker for the Awards Banquet on May 25, 2008. Our theme is "Making an Economic Impact." Certainly there is a tremendous need for Black people, wherever we are and in whatever we are doing, to seek ways to help ourselves economically, via collective strategies and alliances. The huge amount of money we spend to travel, attending conventions and entertainment events, is embarrassingly high compared to the amount we earn from those activities.

For instance, as I noted in my very first book on economic empowerment, Tuskegee should be one of the places in this country that all Black folks should visit. Steeped in history and the spirit of economic independence, it is a city that should have been, by now, built up to receive millions visitors annually. Tuskegee University should be one the most endowed Black colleges in the country, not simply by those who attended the school but by Black people in general.

And, like the fine example of the NAI, other Black organizations should make every effort to hold their conventions there. I know it's small an cannot handle many of our large events, but there are smaller meetings that could be held there which would, over time, create more development and larger venues for more visitors and more business opportunities to take place in this historic

How can we celebrate the Tuskegee Airmen all across this country, as well as the accomplishments of Booker T. Washington, Washington George Carver, Charles "Chief" Anderson, R.R. Moton, Ben Davis, Chappie James, and others and yet be so reticent about supporting and continuing to build on their legacy? 

could prove a person's innocence not only violates the U.S. Supreme Court case Brady v. Maryland, but smacks of the sorts of antics in Communist era 'show trials.' It's not American and it makes a mockery of our criminal justice system."

Texas accounts for 14 percent of the estimated 216 DNA-based exonerations around the nation. Dallas County leads all local jurisdictions with 17 exonerations from genetic testing.

"District Attorney Watkins has taken a stance that may not be popular among prosecutors and some segments of the legal community. Nonetheless, the District

Attorney's stance epitomizes public service over self interest. That is precisely why we support the calls by District Attorney Watkins and State Sen. Rodney Ellis (Houston) for harsh penalties for intentional prosecutorial misconduct."

"As lawyers, we recognize that sending innocent people to jail, if not to the death chamber, is wrong. And as gate-keepers of our profession, we cannot sit idly by and watch grave injustices being perpetrated by members of our noble profession."

Mr. Bolden says that JLTLA will also work with other organizations to garner support on this important policy issue.

the formidable aristocracy of the period. Lee Savage's set reached a lavish level of decor that would make Louis XV blush then turn green with envy. Junghyun Georgia Lee's costuming was realistic with impeccable detail right down to the last shoe buckle. Lighting was off slightly with intermittent glare sharply reflected from the scenic art located upstage giving the otherwise bright colors a "washed out" look.

The comedic elements of Misanthrope resonate as much today as they did 350 years ago, a sure sign of a comedy masterpiece. However, some of the modern product placement seemed remarkably out of place and could have easily reduced the show to mere camp. Thankfully this didn't happen. Director David Kennedy's fine pacing and even direction made this production seem shorter than its two-hour run time. Misanthrope runs through May 18. Theatre Three concludes its 2007-2008 Theatre Too Season with the musical Mid-Life! The Crisis Musical as the sixth production of this current season. Never has a crisis been so enjoyable.

The simplistic set designed by David Walsh is just enough. With the amazing talent of this seasoned cast, they need nothing more than a few unit set pieces to explore the humorous side of "middle-aging." The promotional materials promise, "The series of musical numbers and vignettes will appeal to anyone with thinning hair, growing waistlines and ticking biological clocks." Even if you're not there yet, but know someone afflicted with these inevitable maladies, it doesn't matter. Humor always rings loudest when there's a glint of truth involved that causes us to laugh at ourselves.

Theatre Too is the smaller black box venue located in the basement of Theatre Three. But the space works well for this musical showcase. The intimate setting allows the facial expressions and the voices of the actors to reach the audience with the necessary wattage to deliver this brand of shtick humor. No need for hearing aids or spectacles here.

From one of the opening lines of the opening number, "Welcome to Mid-Life," you know you're in the right place. You can't help but feel that you're among friends who understand. "If you've come to curse your fate, or start to date at forty-eight. If you sleep through football recaps or if you've blown out both your kneecaps. If you still like Chuck Berry, if your ears are very hairy, welcome to mid-life!" Sure, the lyrics will entertain and at times, even cause uncontrollable laughter,

it's but the actors/singers who make the show work.

Jenny Thurman's rendition of "Biological Clock" early in the first act sets into motion a pacing that is nearly perfect throughout the When the three men, B.J. Cleveland, Randy Perlman, and Doug Jackson perform "Weekend Warriors" as wannabe basketball players, you can't help but think maybe these guys are exactly what the Mavericks need. Maybe they should be recruited, if not for their skill then for the sheer entertainment provided by trashtalking middle-aged men trying to dribble a basketball.

There is also a poignant moment in all this hilarity. It's the bittersweet song "The Long Goodbye," performed by B.J. Cleveland, Amy Mills and Sally Soldo. This number comes late in the Second Act. There's no spoiler here, so let's just say it's a fitting tribute and fine way to bring closure to a fantastic performance.






