reporters.



## Open Letter to Barack Obama

By Ron Walters NNPA Columnist I write this "open letter" to Barack Obama because I am concerned about one recently written by Harold Ford, Jr. That letter urged Obama to try harder to connect with White bluecollar voters by engaging them in states like Kentucky and Indiana in the Fall Elections. And while I would not argue that he should ignore these states, I worry that the agenda he would use to attract conservative voters could weaken the force of change.

To begin with, worry about the blue collar vote is

based on the perception of their strength as a part of the Democratic base, but this year will probably not reflect the 1980s when they went over to the Republican party en masse or in 1992 when they were a large part of the Ross Perot vote. This year, blue collar Whites are hurting more than any other time in recent memory and more than any other part of the political demographic with: significant job losses, high prices for everything from milk to gas, the loss of their homes and disaffection with the war policies of the Bush adminis-

## **Obama's Best Primary End Game Strategy**

The end game is usually associated with the final strategy implemented to win a competitive event. The Democratic Primary is sorely in need of an end game strategy. Not just one that closes out the primary contest but one that carries forward with a unified momentum powerful enough to capture the November presidential election.

Time is of the essence but not for the obvious reason that the extended democratic rivalry is severely wounding each candidate by giving the republicans ammunition to use in the fall campaign. The really important time consideration is that the republican nominee, John McCain, has a free hand at fabricating a mythical persona of himself for the public absent a challenging factual characterization by a democratic nominee.

While most would argue that there are still six months until the November presidential elections the reality is that many fence straddlers will be so indoctrinated by McCain's contrived message that even when presented with conclusive contrary evidence their perception of the truth will not change.

Consider, for example, that almost 30 percent of Americans, after being exposed to a tainted al-Qaeda public relations barrage orchestrated by the Bush administration still believe that al-Qaeda was responsible for the 9/11 attacks. This perception remains even after three independent commissions have dismissed any alOaeda involvement.

While the democrats, from the DNC to the party hierarchy to the candidates, continue to soft shoe and tip toe around this issue they need to stop, sit down at the negotiation table, and reason through what is best for the party and this country.

The best ticket for the democrats to put before the American voters is Barack Obama for President and Hillary Clinton for Vice President.

The Obama change message has taken hold as evidenced by the convincing delegate count with only three more primaries scheduled.

According to the CNN political website, Obama now leads Clinton by 1.969 delegates to 1,779, and is just 57 delegates short of the required 2,026 delegates under current Democratic National Committee rules. This total includes 309 super delegates that have declared for Obama and the 279 for Clinton.

The only thing keeping the Obama's change machine from having democratic unanimity is the loyalist core constituency broadly described as working class Americans and females devoted to Clinton.

Obama needs to forego any concerns he may have about the Clinton integrity and not only offer the VP position to her but to also convince her that she needs to pack up any residual ego she harbors about the presidency in 2008 and defer her instant gratification for a few years in favor of the greater need to turn this

country around economically, politically, and globally. Help her to understand the historic nature of her heroic efforts as this nation becomes aware that the glass ceiling of sexism and racism is forever smashed for future presidential candidates.

Her legacy must not be tarnished because she acted in the moment instead of for the long term. Remind her that she is by far the most prominent woman in America and as such she can raise her stature even higher by helping to develop the strategy that ensures the Democrats not only prevail in November but also defines her role as a powerful leader in government for years to come.

In return for her acceptance not only does she get the opportunity to keep her name in the public spotlight to enhance her ascendency in 2012 or 2016 but she will be positioned to immediately inherit the presidency should Obama (heaven forbid) become incapacitated in any way.

Even as he closes in on the Democratic nomination for the presidency, Sen. Barack Obama is facing lingering problems in winning the support of some white voters. A recent poll that classified white voters as high or low on the Racial Resentment Index gives some indication of the extent of this problem.

The majority of white voters who make up the high Racial Resentment Index were characterized as having less

than a four-year college education, over the age of 60 and living in the South. These voters are predominantly Clinton supporters and in a matchup with McCain they give her a 59 point margin over McCain as compared to Obama's 19 point margin.

None of the high profile names currently being advanced for the democratic VP position can interface with and relate with this American demographic like Hillary Clinton. None can match her inherent advantage to keep this constituency, estimated at some 16 million, from abandoning the Democratic Party in November and defecting to the McCain camp. In addition her strengths in the states of Florida, Ohio and Pennsylvania will enhance the chances that the democrats will carry those key states.

Why not structure the odds in favor of the Democrats with a trailblazing, cure the racial divide, blockbuster Obama-Clinton ticket that can overcome the most devious political treachery that right wing zealots devise to derail the irresistible appeal of the oncoming change express?

As Sam Cooke says in his signature anthem, "It's been a long, long time coming but I know a change is gonna come. A change is gonna come."

## South African Government Blamed for Anti-Immigrant Rampages

(NNPA) - Soaring rates of crime, unemployment, and corruption were among the triggers for a murderous burst of violent attacks over 10 days against Zimbabweans and other immigrants that left 22 dead in South African's main city of Johannesburg, and 6,000 others seeking shelter in

Johannesburg, and 6,000 others seeking shelter in police stations, churches and community centers.

Mobs beat foreigners and set some ablaze in scenes reminiscent of apartheid-era violence.

"[P]oor and ineffective governance created a tinder box of unmet expectations which exploded in Alexandra and has now spread to several other areas," the South Africa Institute of Race Relations said in a letter. "Essentially these failures contributed to create a perfect storm of lawlessness, poverty, and unfulfilled expectations which has now erupted into violence"

As many as three million Zimbabweans are thought to be in South Africa, having fled violence and poverty at home.

Pres. Thabo Mbeki, Archbishop Desmond Tutu and Nelson Mandela all condemned the violent attacks. A letter signed by Siphamandla Gumbi of United Cities and Local Government of Africa read: "The government of South Africa must use all its powers to stop this un-African behavior by people who have lost all sense of ubuntu, which says strangers are always welcomed with open arms, treated with respect and protected in an African home."

An estimated five million people from almost every country in Africa have migrated to South Africa; three million of these are thought to be Zimbabwean, but the Department of Home Affairs has no record of how many migrants might be undocumented.

"We are killing each other. Black against black; brother against brother," wrote "Anthony", a Malawian accountant on the BBC website. "The trouble is the influx of millions of Zimbabweans. Only a political solution to the crisis in Zimbabwe will solve this problem."

# African Liberation Day 2008 Celebrated

(NNPA) - The All-African People's Revolutionary Party (GC) and the National Council of Arab-Americans in Washington D.C. marked African Liberation Day last weekend with a look at the Guinean revolution: A Center of Struggle Against Slavery and The Slave Trade."

African Liberation
Day grew out of a meeting on April 15, 1958, in
the city of Accra, Ghana,
of the first Conference of
Independent African
States. Meeting again on
May 25, 1963, leaders of
thirty-two independent
African States called for
the founding of African
Freedom Day, a day to
"mark each year the

onward progress of the liberation movement, and to symbolize the determination of the People of Africa to free themselves from foreign domination and exploitation."

Africa Freedom Day was changed from April 15 to May 25 and Africa Freedom Day was declared African Liberation Day.

# "Maybe she would still be alive"

Pam, a freshmen at Lubbock, Texas' Estacado High School, lies peacefully still, eyes closed, hands crossed over her chest, beautifully arrayed in her Sunday best as friends, loved ones and acquaintances file by to say their final goodbyes. But she will not speak back. Her mother cries out in grief for her child, stolen from her so young in life, but her cries will not bring her back, nor will the mourners who fill the church to capacity be able to ease the mother's agony. No parent should know such loss, no human should know such pain. No one should have to die this way.

Pam had slipped out with her boyfriend hours after her mother thought she was in bed asleep. Thinking she would be home before sunrise, she left the bedroom window unlocked. But Pam never made it back through that

At 4 a.m., her mother was awakened with horrifying news. Her daughter had been in a terrible accident.

Bobby Kennedy was assassinated in June in California. I don't understand it," complaining that "people have been trying to push me out of this ever since Iowa," saying that that position "historically... makes no sense."

The campaign of Sen. Barack Obama reacted quickly. "Sen. Clinton's statement before the Argus Leader editorial board was unfortunate and has no place in this campaign," the campaign said in a statement.

Obama later backpeddled, blaming her remarks on fatigue and the longevity of the campaign and saying she meant no harm.

Despite her apology, her comments still sparked outrage and news stories from pundits and political observers who initially perceived them to have implied that she was remaining in the race just in case something happened to Obama.

The comments were also considered distasteful because the Kennedy family is dealing with news that U. S. Sen. Edward M. Kennedy (D-Mass.) has a malignant brain tumor.

But, even activist Al Sharpton, who spoke to Clinton about the remark, dismissed the notion that Clinton could have stooped so low as to have implied something could happen to Obama.

Referring to her comments as well as a recent gaffe by Republican vice presidential contender Mike Huckabee, Sharpton issued this warning on his radio talk show last Saturday:


"I don't believe either candidate meant it when they said it, but I do believe if you strike a match in a flammable environment, you run the danger of something catching fire...I'm asking them to be careful how they handle their matchbook."

The Clinton campaign first defended the remarks, saying that the New York senator had been making a historical parallel and any "any reading into it beyond that is inaccurate and outrageous."

Clinton has said she will stay in the race at

least pending the outcome of the final three primaries, Puerto Rico June 1 and Montana and North Dakota on June 3.

Ultimately, Robert Kennedy Jr., helped her to defend the comment. He released a statement saying, "It is clear from the context that Hillary was invoking a familiar political circumstance in order to support her decision to stay in the race through June. I have heard her make this reference before, also citing her husband's 1992 race, both of which were hard fought through June. I understand how highly charged the atmosphere is, but I think it is a mistake for people to take offense."

# Revitalizing Oak Cliff

### Introducing the Oak Cliff Community Renaissance Economic Development Corporation

A casual drive along West Camp Wisdom at 67 will offer a clear view of the remnant of a once thriving shopping corridor. Now, vacant buildings with for lease or for sale signage stand with plywood or metal sheets covering the place where windows once where. The businesses that are still in operation are facing high rental fees, theft or low profitability. Unfortunately, this is a seemingly growing norm for businesses in the Oak Cliff area of Dallas, Texas and a group of citizens have formed the Oak Cliff Community Renaissance Development Corporation in an effort to actively preserve, beautify and revitalize this part of the City of Dallas.

## **Intimately A Peril**

On most fields of play, particularly in the game of love, the maxim "nothing ventured, nothing gained" becomes the rallying call of someone about to take a giant leap rather than a small step. And no one knows the view from the edge of the lovelorn precipice better than Esther Mills.

The place is New York City, and the year, 1905. Esther, an African American seamstress, portrayed adequately by Stormi Demerson, specializes in the creation of intimate apparel. When she laments that her chance for love may have passed her by, one gets a sense that her colorful and impassioned garments mock the lack of color and passion in her life. After all, she's 35, unmarried and suffers a deficit of romantic prospects. That is, until she begins to receive letters from George Armstrong (Bryan Pitts), an admirer she's never laid eyes on. George works on the Panama Canal, and although he's "half way

around the world," the scenes shared with Esther are cleverly done. Reciting his romantic missives from afar, Mr. Pitts plays his character convincingly right

down to his West Indies accent. Unable to read or write, Esther relies on two of her customers, a prostitute (Lisa B. Whitfield) and a wealthy socialite, Mrs. Van Buren (Emily Scott Banks) to help her correspond with the persistent George.

When the highly societal Mrs. Van Buren mentions taking Esther to the opera and what a scandal it would cause, the audience is reminded that Esther's station in life does not afford her the freedoms of ingress and egress enjoyed by most. Esther's slice of the American Dream by comparison is no more

than a sliver. The voids in Esther's life quickly become obvious. Yet she is undeterred and remains mostly grounded through the help of two supporting characters, her landlady, Mrs. Dickson (M. Denise Lee) and a Jewish cloth vendor, Mr. Marks (Dan Forsythe). Mrs. Dickson manifests a unique combination of fashionable elegance steeped in street smarts.

On the other hand, Mr. Marks, an Orthodox Jew, is deeply rooted in tradition and wears only black. Both characters share more in common with Esther than is at first apparent. But the beauty of this story lies in its effortless demonstration of vastly different lives sharing a common trajectory. Mr. Forsythe hits the target dead-on with his interpretation of Mr. Marks. In one memorable scene, he cautions Esther that Rabbinical Law prohibits him from touching a female other than his wife or a family member. Yet, when he shows Esther a bolt of fine cloth, they share a visually striking and emotionally connecting moment when they both feel and caress the richness of the fabric together. They never touch, but most assuredly, they feel.

The relationship between George and Esther is born purely out of pen and paper and their affection quickly grows into a full-fledged romance. George, through his letters, offers Esther what she desires most. But is it what she needs? The sum of all these moving parts is the machinery that ultimately drives Esther into the arms of George. Will



tration. They have been let down by Republicans on both domestic and foreign policy and although about 20 percent in recent polls have said they would vote McCain if Obama were the choice in the Fall, the issue is what would happen to the

I think this year the blue collar constituency is likely to split. One group could go with McCain; another group may buy in to Obama's promise of change to an agenda that favors lower income citizens; and still another group, frustrated by the choices, is likely to stay home. This means that while the split in their votes may be a threat to the Democratic base it could be neutralized by the dynamism created by the Obama campaign.

There is the distinct possibility that a great deal of the loss of blue collar Whites could be made up by the new coalition that Obama promises to bring into the Fall election. Estimates by the Associated Press are that the new voters Democrats have attracted in the primaries thus far amount to 3.5 to 4 million. If this proportion holds up in the fall elections, one would have to triple the number of new voters to about 10-12 million. This substantial number of change voters should be the focus of the campaign rather than lavishing resources on voters in the conservative heartland of the nation that will most likely not vote for Barack Obama in any case.

The other path to increasing the change constituency is to focus on enhancing the turnout of those groups that have shown they are more likely to vote for a Democratic ticket, Blacks

and Hispanics.

To be sure, some of the increase in new primary election voters is reflected in the increase in blacks and Hispanics, but more could be done in the general election to increase these numbers, especially among the youth who are trending away from the Republican party by astounding numbers. In 2004, 35 percent of Blacks and 66 percent of Hispanics were not registered and 44 percent of Blacks and 72 percent of Hispanics that were eligible did not vote. The addition of new voters to the Democratic base should put into perspective much of the speculation about Hillary Clinton's strength in socalled swing states like Ohio, Michigan and Pennsylvania by considering the new states such voters might deliver.

Finally, some of Obama's perceived weaknesses are based on head-to-head polls during the primary season, but the tradition is that these numbers do not necessarily hold up in the fall. For example, in 1998 Michael Dukakis was ahead of George H. W. Bush but Bush won; in 1992 Bill Clinton trailed him in the Primary elections but Clinton won; and in 2000 Al

Gore was ahead of George Bush but Bush was given the election.

Therefore, the moderate wing of the Democratic party and the punditry that seems obsessed with blue collar voters should not dictate to the Obama campaign a strategy that both feeds into Obama's weakness among blue collar whites, and challenges the strength of a change oriented campaign and administration if

he wins the presidency. Such a strategy is disrespectful of Blacks by suggesting that they would stand still while Obama pursues conservative interests to their detriment, in effect, exchanging the progressive substance of change for

I think this is a dangerous course the Obama campaign should avoid.




