Last week, jazz singer Rene Marie replaced the words of the Star Spangled Banner (Francis Scott Key) with the words of Lift Every Voice and Sing (James and Rosamond Johnson) at the State of the City event in Denver, Colo. Not good. Both Anthems should be revered equally for their unique history.

On September 14, 1814, two years after the War of 1812 began between England and France, and nearly 40 vears after the Revolutionary War declared which American independence from Britain, a young lawyer named Francis

Scott Key found himself aboard a British vessel attacking the American Fort McHenry in Baltimore, MD. The

Obama Distances Himself From Blacks: Is There a Cost?

Just back from the RainbowPush convention in Chicago sponsored by Rev. Jesse Jackson, Sr., I was struck by the fact that neither Barack nor Michelle Obama showed up and they live virtually right down the street.

The symbol of Obama's absence was made even more vivid to me because he was out making nice with Hillary Clinton to knit together a unified campaign in the fall.

I understand that, but I also understand that he could have showed up.,

I know, I know, it is common knowledge now that Obama has to distance himself from his community in order to make White voters comfortable enough with him to trust him and then give him their votes. And he will probably show at the NAACP Convention. But the troubling trend which finds him absent from other venues that are the substance of Black life looks like he is taking the Black community for granted because of their thirst for his victory.

I was not too put out when Obama did not show up at the State of Black America, because Michelle

Obama was offered to Tavis Smiley and Obama was campaigning to win a touch primary in Indiana

Jackson, however, not only was material in Obama's rise to the State Senate and the U.S. senate, he represents to most people the living legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

important That is because the Civil Rights movement is implicated in Obama's victories, since he won 99 pledged Delegates in nine Southern states during the primary elections. This performance was in states where Blacks constituted one-third or more of the Democratic party base, states where the Voting Rights Act worked to empower Black voters to make a difference.

Without those 99 dele-Clinton Hillary gates. would have won the pledged delegate race and the popular vote and most surely would have won the nomination.

The question this raises is whether the sophistication of Black voters in this case will eventually cost them. Blacks have a long history of voting for Whites when the potential returns were based on hope.

If we support a Black candidate for president of the United States, I think that it is fair to ask whether

we will have more or less access - at least as much access as we did to Bill Clinton - and whether he will deliver the goods for our community

My concern here is that theory of Black politics should be to move our community from just hoping their political participation will lead to resources, to exercising tough leverage over politicians to negotiate potential returns our community to exchange for our vote.

In fact, one of the lessons of Rev. Jackson's two previous presidential campaigns is that "Hope and Trust politics" is not as effective as the ability to trade votes for future support. The irony is however, that when a Black person runs for high profile office our leverage often disappears because we are asked to trust that the person will deliver based on their ties to the Black community.

The Black community didn't have to play the politics of leverage with Rev. Jackson because he had proved his fidelity to their needs through his history and in his presidential campaigns he spoke forcefully to their issues. I know, I know, he didn't win.

But I am driven to ask what the traditional notion of "winning" is worth under circumstances where the level of trust is not as high, because the message is absent and the candidate is absent. In other words, how much can the Black community count on the delivery of goods and services by a Black president who presence and message does not privilege his own community.

What concerns me is that we are involved in a great celebration without checking the guidepost that determine whether or not there will be sufficient returns to our community from a Black president in the White House. The irony is that Obama is likely to win, we will have to accept him, but under circumstances where he is essentially a White candidate, so we should "bottom line" our public policy requirements now as every other community is doing.

Texas Vehicle Crime Issues Emphasized in July

Every five minutes, a car is stolen in Texas, and every two minutes, a vehicle is burglarized for contents or parts. Stolen vehicles are often used to commit other crimes, including theft, drug smuggling, human trafficking, domestic/international terrorism, and countless other offenses. In addition, vehicle burglary incidents such as gas siphoning, stealing personal identification items, and theft of vehicle parts containing valuable metals are on the rise. Now, more than ever, Texas drivers must become actively involved in vehicle crime prevention by practicing "Lock, Take, Hide": lock vehicles, take

keys, hide belongings. The Texas Auto Burglary and Theft Prevention Authority (ABTPA) will highlight this philosophy throughout "Watch Your Car Month" this July.

During "Watch Your Car Month", hundreds of law enforcement task force representatives funded by ABTPA will be working in their communities reminding Texas drivers to take extra precautions when leaving their vehicles unattended. To raise awareness about the role of auto theft in secondary crimes, ABTPA personnel will heavily promote the "You Hold the Key" campaign, which is designed to

remind all owners and operators that vehicles should never be left running while unattended, and keys should not be left inside.

In 2007, approximately 94.000 vehicles were stolen in Texas resulting in financial losses well into the hundreds of millions. And in almost half of all auto theft incidents, keys were left inside, which means the vehicle owner was, in some cases, an unwitting accomplice to more heinous crimes. Recent statistics from Texas law enforcement agencies indicate the top three locations from which vehicles are stolen are: residences/homes (41.6%), public parking lots/public garages (28.7%), and roadways/highways/alleys (12.2%), which proves no area is truly safe from vehicle crime activity.

"We can not stress enough to Texas drivers that they 'hold the key' to auto burglary and theft prevention," said Michelle Lanham, program manager for ABTPA's Reduce Auto Theft in Texas (RATT) task force in Arlington, Texas. "Being aware of techniques to prevent these crimes, such as utilizing visible deterrents and antitheft devices, will help discourage thieves and make neighborhoods safer "

U. S. May Expand Security Role in Oil-Rich Nigeria

(NNPA) – Nigerian government officials are welcoming a wider U.S. role in the oil-rich Niger Delta where members of an insurgent group have attacked oil flow stations and staged kidnappings in an effort to redistribute enormous profits generated from the region's natural wealth.

Vice Pres. Goodluck Ebele Jonathan blamed "outsiders" for instigating the youths of the region. "Therefore it will be welcomed if the US government will assist Nigeria in curbing the criminalities within the area, since the US government has its security installations in the Gulf of Guinea, protecting its investment situated there.

"It is hoped that Nigeria will also be assisted considerably, especially in the area of power and rail transport networks," he said.

Unrest in the oil-rich region has pushed some companies to close down operations. Nigeria's oil production has slipped to 1.8 million barrels per day -far below its pro-

duction capacity of about 2.8 million bar-rels.

Meanwhile, plans for a sell-off of shared by oil giant Chevron Corporation of California are meeting stiff opposition from workers who are worried what will happen to their compensation packages.

"Any attempt to seal up the deal and sneak away through the back door with their portfolio without settling the workers will meet disastrous consequences," the oil workers warned.

16th Annual Festival de la Salud Offers Free Health Screenings in a Fiesta-Style Setting

women reach their educational goals. Not only does this scholarship program reflect our commitment to education and our military personnel, it will help them reach their full potential and provides an essential foundation for future success in life," Sessions wrote in a letter to UNT System Chancellor Lee Jackson. John Ellis Price, vice chancellor of the UNT Dallas Campus, said the campus began developing the framework for a military education assistance fund after repeated news reports disclosed the rising costs of college in comparison to static GI Bill benefits late in 2007 and into 2008. Articles in the Boston Globe, on ABC News, and even in the Times have Armv described how inflation is zapping GI Bill benefits at a faster pace than in previous generations.

But after a long congressional debate, President Bush signed H.R. 2642 on June 30, 2008. Under the terms of the bill, service members who have served 36 months after Sept. 11, 2001, are entitled to increased benefits. The bill also contains provisions for the transfer of education benefits to family members after reenlistment. Those benefits, however, do not become effective until August 1, 2009.

"The GI Bill is one of the greatest educational programs ever developed. The government certainly has fulfilled its promises to our soldiers. But we believe that we as citizens should be contributing as well to make education more affordable for those who have sacrificed so much," Price said. "If soldiers are receiving the GI Bill and do not need assistance, we will provide assistance to family members. If soldiers or family members need money for books or fees, we will provide money for books or fees until such time as the new education benefits program begins. We want to fill the gap for the coming academic year."

To be eligible for the UNT Dallas Campus Stars & Stripes Fund, soldiers, military spouses and their children must be eligible for admission at the campus. Spouses and children of military personnel must provide proof of their family member's military service. Classes must be taken at the UNT Dallas Campus in programs offered at the campus (online courses and courses at the Denton Campus are not covered under the assistance program). Soldiers who did not opt into the GI Bill are also eligible to receive assistance with proof of service, such as Form DD-214

When President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the GI Bill in 1944, he noted that the landmark provision would provide veterans with up to \$500 per year for tuition assistance. The annual cost of living in 1944 was roughly \$2,000. What could be obtained for \$500 per year in 1944 may now cost the average GI \$20,000 per year for tuition and fees alone at many universities.

UNT Dallas The Campus has one of the lowest tuition rates in the North Texas region, and avoided raising tuition for the 2008-2009 academic year. The low tuition rate coupled with the Stars & Stripes Fund could substantially lower the costs of a college education for military personnel and their family members, Price said.

"Our hope is that other Texas universities will also launch similar programs," Price said. "It is unlikely that the GI Bill will ever keep pace with college costs. These soldiers and their families have paid for freedom. We should help them pay for college."

Richardson/Plano Guide Right Foundation Brings Scholarship Workshop To Dallas

Jessica Johnson received her first scholarship, \$20,000, as a junior in high school. By the time she entered Howard University as a freshman in 2000, the Jackson, TN native had already received more than \$40,000 in scholarships. During her time at Howard. where she received a bachelor's degree in journalism, Johnson racked up more than \$130,000 in scholarships.

The Richardson/Plano Guide Right Foundation, a 501(c) (3) entity of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity is bringing Jessica Johnson and her Minority Quest to Scholarship Dallas. Created in 2001 when she was 19 years old, she founded the scholarship workshop to assist minority students in finding scholarships for college.

"Students don't realize

college is a major sacrifice – a luxury. For a lot of students, the reality sinks in too late," says Johnson. "Students need a process."

That's where Johnson comes in. She has students complete a personal development profile to figure out what kind of scholarships they qualify for. Then Johnson maps out a week-by-week plan and helps the student find a list of scholarships based on their profile. The student is responsible for completing the applications and writing any essays. Johnson will edit the essays and provide feedback.

"High grade point averages are no longer good enough to get scholarships. A scholarship is an award for students who have gone above and beyond in some area," says Johnson. "People aren't just going to give you money. It's for something you have

excelled in."

Shawntel Hebert, 23, used Johnson's services when she applied for law school. She received a \$75,000 scholarship to attend Emory. "Jessica has a writing ability like no other, especially when it comes to essays," says Hebert, a second-year law student. "She knows what scholarship committees are looking for in applications and essays."

"Kappa Alpha Psi recognized a need to bring Jessica and her workshop here when we reviewed applications for the scholarships that we award every spring," according to Elwood Shannon, member of the Richardson/Plano Chapter. "We saw students who had the GPAs, but their essay writing skills needed improvement. This is an excellent opportunity for students to obtain (for a nominal fee of \$50) what

some scholarship tutors charge several hundred dollars to receive."

Minority The Scholarship Quest Workshop will be presented July 21 - 23 at the UNT – Dallas Campus, 7300 Houston School Road in Dallas, TX from 10am -4pm. A major portion of the fee is being underwritten by the Kappa Foundation and the Richardson/Plano Guide Right Foundation as part of their scholarship program. become the United States National Anthem.

But how did he get there? One month prior to the assault on Fort McHenry, British ships invaded and captured the nation's capital, Washington, DC. During the invasion the Capitol building and the White House were burned. So much so that President James Madison and First Lady Dolley Madison fled the White House.

As the British soldiers returned to their vessels they captured a wellknown Maryland physician Dr. William Beanes. Attorney Francis Scott Key was requested by the townspeople of Upper Marlboro, MD to intercede and obtain the freedom of Dr. Beanes. Colonel John Skinner, an American prisoner for agent exchange joined Key. Under a flag of truce that was commissioned by President Madison, Key and Skinner boarded the British ship TONNANT between Baltimore and Washington, and began negotiating with British General Ross and Admiral Alexander Cochrane. After negotiations failed, Dr. Beanes, Attorney Key, and Colonel Skinner were placed on the H.M.S. Surprise to wait out the battle behind the British ships. The Battle of Fort McHenry lasted 25 hours and on the morning of September 14, 1814, Francis Scott Key peered through a telescope into the smoke from eight miles away by dawn's early light.

Routinely, the 30-foot by 42-foot flag was still there and raised over the ramparts with a garrison salute at 9:00 am, signaling the Americans had withstood the bombs bursting in air. Key began to write words to the English tune of Anacreon in Heaven and the Star Spangled Banner was scripted, saluting the soldier's stamina. Equally inspired were the words of Lift Every Voice and Sing. James Weldon Johnson and his brother John

Rosamond Johnson penned the words that truncate the history Africans in America into a splendid anthem. The brothers Johnson were from Jacksonville, Flo. and shared many talents, among them songwriting, including the musicals, "The Sleeping Beauty" and "Humpty Dumpty". James Weldon was a lawyer, ambassador, historian, poet, novelist and civil rights leader who became the first Black secretary of the NAACP and a leading voice of the Harlem Renaissance.J. Rosamond was trained at the New England Conservatory in Boston, Mass. and further studied music in London, England. Though well trained, J. Rosamond rose above the oppression of Jim Crow laws and was featured in the original Broadway productions of Porgy and Bess and Cabin

in the Sky. In 1900, James Weldon Johnson wrote Lift Every Voice and Sing (and music by J. Rosamond Johnson). James Weldon had become the principal of the racially segregated Stanton School in Jacksonville, FL and directed 500 of his young students to perform the Anthem as part of a celebration of President Abraham Lincoln's birth-

day on February 12, 1900 In condensing African American history to a poignant poem, the Johnson brothers petitioned Americans (particularly Negroes circa 1900) to lift every voice and sing and march on to victory. Referencing the triumph over the brutal tragedy of enslavement felt in the days when hope, unborn, had died, posed the question: Have not we come to a place for which our fathers sighed? Lastly. James and John, as though they were biblical disciples, summoned the God of our weary years, God of our silent tears to keep us on the path we pray. Lift Every Voice and Sing is a tribute to triumph over the tragedy of treatment of African-Americans.

In fusing the sacred words of each anthem, Rene Marie confused the Stars and Stripes with the Scars and Stripes. Stamina of soldiers is valiant. Resilience to racism is honorable. The Star Spangled Banner and Lift Every Voice and Sing are singularly American, and should both be raised in respect.
