The mortgage foreclosure crisis is in full swing and not looking to ease soon. Mortgage lenders continue to report their highest foreclosure and delinquency rates in five

years. Rising default rates have not only affected those in the subprime market, but higher mortgage rates are putting a squeeze on borrowers with good credit, as they have in metro-Atlanta.

Mortgage reform legislation recently passed by

the House of Representatives and the U. S. Senate will go a long way in ensuring there is some relief for those families caught up in the current housing crisis.

H.R. 3221, the American Housing Rescue and Foreclosure

America, Did You See The Man?

America did you see him?

Did you see Barack Obama last Thursday as he challenged a new generation of Americans and Europeans to tear down walls between estranged allies, races, and faiths as he delivered a mesmerizing call for global unity at an unprecedented mass rally in Berlin? Did you hear him define his dreams of hope and change - not just for America, but for all nations?

Did you see him magically appear from behind the ornate gold topped Victory Column, the 226 foot monument that sits in the middle of a giant traffic circle in Berlin's central Tiergarten Park, and stride majestically, confidently, poised and focused across a length of blue carpeted runway toward the podium as if he were walking on a river of water?

Taking what he calls his "improbable journey" to the heart of Europe, Barack Obama succeeded in attracting a sea of adoring people who roared their approval as they gazed admiringly at this icon of hope that had come to their city; a phenomenon who in less than a year has become the world's most popular serving politician even though he has not been anointed with any title greater than the junior senator for Illinois. While he has drawn

record-breaking crowds to rallies all over the United States his appearance in Germany attracted his biggest audience of all-more than 200,000 people. They had flooded into Berlin's central park and occupied a full mile down the broad avenue, Strasse des 17 Juni, that connects the Victory Column to the

historic Brandenburg Gate. While Obama's voice did not emanate from the Brandenburg Gate as did presidents Kennedy, Reagan and Clinton it resounded further because Obama has become the hope of a Western world filled with concerns. Recession looms, high inflation is eroding the world's purchasing power, and increasing demand for commodities and natural resources is pitting user against supplier nations.

Also, no global leader has yet come up with a convincing response to global warming. No one has a master plan to bring peace to the Middle East, Afghanistan or Iraq. And no one has a promising strategy for dealing with terrorism.

At the same time, the West is searching for its place in an ever changing world order. How strong will China, Russia and India become? How should the West interact with these countries?

It is time for true leadership to fill this void. And only one man inspires the kind of confidence that would enable him to assume this role. Barack Obama. during his European tour, showed America and the world the validity of his claim for that position.

Indeed, polls show that many nations would welcome Obama as America's successor president after enduring eight years of Bush's dictatorial policies.

John McCain, who has touted his foreign policy experience, has traveled to Europe, Canada, Columbia, and Mexico. While he may have impressed his American constituency he has not improved his Bush-Lite image outside of America. A recent Pew Global Attitudes Project report



shows that in 20 of the 23 nations surveyed the preference for Obama over McCain is clear cut. The gap between perceptions of Obama and McCain is particularly large in Western Europe. In Spain the confidence for Obama is 72 percent and three times that of McCain. In France and Germany more than 80 percent opt for Obama to 33 percent for McCain. Similarly, Britons prefer him by three to one over McCain, and Italians by five to one.

Asian/Pacific countries also give Obama a high confidence ranking; 81 percent in Australia and 71 percent in Japan with McCain receiving 40 percent in both countries.

But Obama brings an important intangible to the table besides his unflappable confidence and charisma that seems to elude the American right wing but is instantly recognized by an overwhelming majority of the international community-- common sense.

If Americans could divest themselves of past social bias and the arrogance and ego of supreme omnipotence they would realize that the international community is trying to help America out of its self imposed ostracism.

Non-Americans have a vested interest in the American presidential election because of the impact it has on the rest of the world. They are being forced to deal with the consequences of inept U.S. polices from the Iraq War, to oil shortages and the subprime mortgage disaster. Many believe that few American voters are aware of the international repercussions of their presidential choice.

AndersWijkman, а Swedish member of the European Parliament, summarized what much of the world is saying, "I think Obama represents what the world needs right now. McCain would be very much more of the same, and we don't need more of the same."

America, with this presidential election you hold the destiny of both America and the world in your hands. It will be nearly impossible to turn this country's depressed economy around or to redirect funds into affordable healthcare for the 47 million uninsured, jobs for the thousands that have become jobless over the past year, or billions for infrastructure repairs without the cooperative partnership of the international community.

The world is saying that America's seat at the table of global mutual accommodation is better served with the new vision of Obama than McCain's resurrection of failed Bush policies.

"Left Behind! Black America: A Neglected **Priority in the Global AIDS Epidemic"**

The recently released report includes the startling facts below.

• Standing on its own, Black America would constitute the world's 35th most populous country, but would rank 16th in the world in the number of people living with HIV.

• A free-standing Black America would rank 105th worldwide in life expectancy and 88th in infant mortality. Blacks in the U.S. have a lower life expectancy than do citizens of Algeria, the Dominican Republic or Sri Lanka.

• Outside of sub-Saharan Africa, only four countries - and only two the Western in Hemisphere - have adult HIV prevalence as high as the conservative estimate (2 percent among adults) for Black America. Blacks represent about one in eight Americans, but account for one in two people living with HIV in the U.S.

• Despite extraordinary improvements in HIV

treatment, AIDS remains the leading cause of death among Black women between 25-34 years and the second leading cause of death in Black men between 35-44 years.

• Black women . are 23 times more likely than White women to be diagnosed with AIDS.

• Blacks make up 70 percent of new HIV diagnoses among teenagers and 65% of HIV-infected newborns.

Fuel Costs Prompt City of Garland Environmental Waste Services Rate Increase

Due to significant escalations in fuel cost, midyear rate increases are required for residential and commercial solid waste collection customers. The disposal gate rate charged to non-Garland residents and commercial customers using the City's landfill and Transfer Station will also be increased. The new rates take effect August 1, 2008. New rates will be as follows:

• The current monthly residential sanitation rate of \$16.25 will increase by \$1.84 a month for a total monthly rate of \$18.09.

• Commercial solid waste collection rates will increase by 10% based on the size(s) and type(s) of container(s) and the collection frequency

• Landfill disposal gate rates will increase by \$5.00 per ton (non-Garland residents and commercial customers). • New rate for automatic dumping vehicles: \$35.00 per ton

• New rate for trucks and trailers that do not automatically dump: \$52.50

• Transfer Station disposal gate rates will increase by \$5.00 per ton (non-Garland residents and commercial customers).

• New rate for automatic dumping vehicles: \$52.50 per ton

• New rate for vehicles that do not automatically dump: \$78.75

tributions he has made to the City of Garland and to Garland Power & Light, the third-largest municipal utility in Texas and the 39th largest in the nation.





Baptist Church. I found Rev. Clark to be a quiet yet engaging figure with an unforgettable chuckle of a laugh.

Speaking of unforgettable, once you heard Rev. Clark preach God's word, you could never forget it. Clark's sermon's began slow and deliberately. I wondered if his voice would ever rise above a whisper the first time I heard him. But by the end of the sermon, his whoop had the congregation on their feet shouting, lifting their hands, and praising Jesus.

Ceasar Arther Walter Clark began his service as pastor of the Good Street Baptist Church here in Dallas in 1950. His long and effective tenure saw Good Street rise to nationwide prominence and become major civic destination. Over the years many great figures graced the pulpit there, including Martin Luther King Jr. in 1956 (Dallas Morning News).

About 5 years ago at the Dawn of a New Day Conference here in Dallas, I had the opportunity to serve as an armor bearer of sorts for Rev. Clark. His body was slowed by age but his mind was still as sharp as ever.

As I took Clark around the room, we could not move more than 10 feet without someone stopping us so that they could reach out to him. I was amazed at how he recalled the names a story of everyone we bumped into. He would make a funny quip to each person which would get us all laughing.

-mending Riverfront Boulevard, which the council selected.

Naturally members of the Latino community and observers wondered aloud, why ask, if you were going to do what you wanted in the first place? In an effort to quell the frustration, the city offered to rename another street in Dallas to honor Chavez.

Alberto Ruiz, Chairman of the César Chávez Task Force and LULAC District 3 Director, spoke with North Dallas Gazette by phone this week regarding recommendation to change Ross Avenue to César Chávez.

Chavez is an American hero of value, of heroic and iconic proportion. Ruiz shared that many consider his stances on non-violence to mirror those of Dr. Martin Luther King, Gandhi and Jesus Christ – he should not be considered "just a Latino" hero.

Ruiz said Commerce Street was proposed and highly favored; North Central Expressway and Dallas North Tollway, was also considered. A strong candidate was Live Oak; it next door to the Latino Cultural Center.

However, Ruiz said at each meeting of the Task Force Ross Avenue picked up more adherences.

Furthermore, Ross Avenue was the site of, "The largest Civil Rights March in Texas history that happened April 9, 2006," according to the task force's website (http://www.cesarchaveztaskforce.com/) protesting immigration issues.

Ross Street was named in honor of two brothers. According to the Dallas Morning News, "William W. and Andrew J. Ross were early land owners who came to Dallas in 1866. One was a Civil War veteran, but, both men were farmers and real estate developers."

The Task Force recognizes the significance of their contribution to Dallas and made a commitment to create a memorial to the Ross brothers to ensure they are not forgotten. They are seeking to coordinate with the city in establishing a program that would celebrate diversity and non-violent messages of Chavez, King and others.

They have not received an official response from the city.

Surprisingly, they have not received an organized pushback from business owners on Ross. In fact, several have offered letters of support or indicated that while they will not actively support the initiative, they would not fight the issue. Also, they have been greeted with enthusiasm from businesses in the West End, where Ross Avenue ends.

Ruiz implores members of the community to, "Please write a letter or call your council member to urge them to be open to the renaming of Ross Avenue."

Futher steps include a vote on Tuesday, August 5th at the Trinity River Corridor Project Committee meeting to make a recommendation for the site selected. Then it goes to council for a vote.

The cost is less than the election – less than \$10,000 for the city to change street signs. Businesses would have a year to change their addresses on letterhead.

The New Face of AIDS in America: The Black Woman

The United States leads the global response to HIV/AIDS, but fails to mobilize the same commitment to address the large and growing epidemic within its own borders, finds a new report released today by the Black AIDS Institute. "The AIDS pandemic, including the epidemic right here at home, is a worldwide crisis. That is why we must ensure it is addressed it in a truly global way," says Barbara Lee, member of Congress from California and a co-author of the legislation that created PEPFAR.

"Left Behind!" reports that the Federal government is taking a fundamentally flawed approach to the epidemic in B l a c k

U. S. Leads Global Efforts Against AIDS, But Neglects the Epidemic in Black America, Says New Report

America, applying the prevention paradigm developed for concentrated epidemics, which focuses almost exclusively on socalled "high-risk" groups.

"The 'concentrated epidemic' approach reflects a fundamental misunderstanding of the social networks of Blacks in America. We are experiencing an epidemic with significant transmission beyond vulnerable populations. Nothing short of a mass Black mobilization will be sufficient to turn around the AIDS epidemic in Black America," notes Wilson. "The U.S. should understand from its work in countries with similar epidemiological profiles that a more effective approach for Black America would include a mix of protargeted grams for high-risk populations; broad-based initiatives that mobi-

l i z e entire c o m munities and efforts to address the role of concurrent partnerships and the rapid spread of HIV transmission in social networks."

"Black women are particularly affected by the domestic AIDS response and attention to their needs are inadequate. Lives are lost as a result," says Dr. Helene Gavle. President/CEO of CARE. "As in other parts of the world. Black women in the U.S. often face increased vulnerability to HIV due to lack of a perception of power in sexual relationships and low self-esteem. Many cannot insist on abstinence or the use of condoms because of fear of emotional or physical abuse by their partners. Development of femaleinitiated prevention methods is not only a critical priority for Black women overseas, but also for Black women here at home."

The report illustrates that young people in Black America, as in other parts of the world, are often at highest risk of infection because of inadequate knowledge of HIV infection, a high prevalence of inter-generational relationships, and a shortage of youth-tailored HIV prevention programs. And it points out that the silence that masks the particularly high risk of HIV confronting men who have sex with men in Africa and other heavily impacted regions also exacerbates AIDS in Black America.

"Among men who have sex with men worldwide, Blacks in the U.S. may have the highest HIV prevalence. In the U.S., Black gay men experience more than twice the rate of infection as their White counterparts," noted Jesse Milan, Vice President of the nonprofit health management consultancy Altarum. "Black men who have sex with men in the U.S. share important attributes related to HIV risk with their peers in other regions, including the experience of severe stigma and discrimination that often impedes HIV prevention efforts."

Drug use is one of the leading modes of HIV transmission in the U.S., particularly among Blacks, who account for more than half of drug-related HIV infections in the U.S. Black America experiences some of the same challenges to effective HIV prevention as other heavily-impacted regions of the world, such as government hostility to evidence-based harm reduction strategies and high rates of incarceration without adequate access to HIV prevention or treatment.

When it comes to AIDS treatment, the report shows that many of the same factors that contribute to excessive rates of HIV illness and deaths in developing countries also apply to Black America – including late initiation of treatment, a high prevalence of cooccurring medical conditions, and impediments to treatment adherence.

tries.

The report also presents an action agenda for bringing the U.S. response to AIDS at home on a par with U.S. - supported efforts to fight the epidemic overseas. Among these, the report calls for immediate action to:

•Enhance support for community mobilization against HIV in Black America, including efforts to mobilize Black America to fight stigma, overcome prejudice, and promote solidarity against the epidemic. Leading Black organizations, constituencies and media outlets are struggling to promote AIDS information and prevention with little or no government support. Far greater government support is needed to maximize the impact of community responses to the epidemic in Black America.

•Significantly increase support for the scale-up of essential HIV prevention, treatment and care services in Black America. In particular, the report notes the dire need for increased funding for HIV prevention efforts in Black America; the virtual absence of prevention strategies designed for Black Americans; and the need to prioritize research on HIV vulnerability and infection patterns that Black America shares with other coun•Break the silence on AIDS in Black America. The report calls on global AIDS leaders to speak out on the neglect of the epidemic in Black America. While the U.S. government should be lauded for the PEPFAR initiative, it must also be held accountable for its failure to address the epidemic within its borders.

"America has claimed a leadership role in the fight against the global HIV epidemic," says Wilson. "Yet, America's failure to respond to its own epidemic among its Black citizens undermines its credibility in addressing AIDS epidemic worldwide. For the U.S. to truly be a global AIDS leader, it must put its own house in order, too."





In my case, having been in the game for quite a few years, I am saying to the young people all over this country, "You got next!"

I did a three-part television series using that title and interviewed young entrepreneurs, all in the context of how important it is for young people to step forward into business. The shows were powerful, inspiring, and rewarding.

We highlighted entreand the preneurship opportunities therein while showcasing young people and their entrepreneurial endeavors.

Having started an inner-city entrepreneurship high school in Cincinnati, after much persuading of the school board and superintendent I might add, it is inspiring to see the students, after seven years now, completing their business plans and being bitten by the entrepreneurship bug.

They may be on the sidelines right now, but they know they will definitely be in the next game. We must support their efforts by encouraging them and providing them the tools and information they need to continuously improve their lives.

Back in 2001, immediately after the civil unrest in Cincinnati, among the "solutions" presented to deal with socio-economic problems among Black youth was my contention that economic empowerment through entrepreneurship was the answer, not a panacea but a major step in solving the problem. Although I was able get to the Entrepreneurship High School started, which has now graduated three classes and is doing a great job in educating future entrepreneurs, an overall program of economic empowerment among our youth has not yet come about.

My impression of the Chicago Urban League's program is exactly what I had in mind back in 2001.

Access to information and opportunity, guided by experienced and dedi-

My hat is off to Cheryle Jackson and her team in Chicago for changing the traditional paradigm that ostensibly suggests the only way Black youth can be helped economically is by displaying dysfunction.

The more dysfunction they show the more funds various organizations can receive; that's a Catch 22 proposition because dysfunction - not success must be continued in order for the funding to continue.

Again at the risk if dating myself, in the 1970's and early 1980's when I worked in social service programs, I had this "radical" notion that we should be working our way out of a job by helping our clients move completely away from being dependent on "programs"

I am hopeful continued negotiations on this measure will prove fruitful and the Senate acts soon to pass this necessary legislation. In my opinion, all involved should get

I posited that we as counselors should be more interested in eliminating the endless repetitive parade of clients starting and stopping and starting again to enroll in any and every program that came along.

Man, was I met with resistance. But now I am buoyed and quite frankly justified in my contention, then and now, that the answer is not just finding jobs for clients but having clients create jobs through entrepreneurship.



-islation incorporates a number of bipartisan bills designed to modernize the Federal Housing Administration (FHA), GSEs reform the (Government Sponsored Enterprises) Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac, and increase liquidity in the markets.

This legislation is designed to help borrowers who are at risk of default by allowing them to refinance with a loan guarantee from the government. The existing lender would voluntarily decrease mortgage debt below the home's current value, which will give the owner equity in the house. Lenders may also be able to recoup more money than if the house went in to foreclosure and the government would receive part of the gain if housing prices rise in coming years. Moreover, with fewer foreclosures

and forced sells, nearby homes would be more likely to retain their value, thus saving whole communities from devastation.

The legislation passed by the House and now under consideration in the Senate increases the Veterans Affairs home loan limit. The bill would also provide \$11 billion in tax benefits including tax credits for first-time homebuyers, a real property tax deduction for non-itemizers, an additional \$10 billion in mortgage revenue bonds for states and would improve access to low-income housing.

As a member of the House Financial Services Committee. I have worked with my colleagues to build greater financial literacy. To that end I have introduced legislation, H.R. 3133, the Financial Literacy for

Homeowners Act, which would provide grants to states and non-profit agencies to educate consumers on mortgage lending practices.

It would also create a national toll free number where consumers can report cases of abuse by lenders. It is of utmost importance that we provide consumers with education about lending laws, counseling and referral services. H.R. 3221 contains many of the provisions of my legislation, and would provide \$180 million for housing counseling programs.

I remain concerned about the inordinate percentage of minority families suffering during this crisis and the affects this has on our communities. The facts are disturbing at best: black and Hispanic individuals have been disproportionately targeted for high cost subprime






