Millions to Vote in Historic Election on Tuesday

For the first time in American history, millions of voters will cast their ballots on Tuesday in an election in which an African-American is the nominee of a major politi-

cal party, fulfilling the long-held dreams of civil rights veterans.

"I've always hoped so and I've also worked for this idea," says 96-yearold Dr. Dorothy Height, president emeritus of the National Council of Negro

Bradley lectures at colleges, universities, business organizations, conferences, and churches throughout the U.S. and abroad. Dr. Bradley is called upon by members of the broadcast media for comment on current issues and has appeared on numerous news programs. COMMENTARY Blacks and the Politics of Transition

In many ways, this has been a difficult time for Blacks who believe that a presidential election is an opportunity for policy accountability that must be taken advantage of, because they are afraid that such policy demands would be seen by potential White voters as Blacks playing on a racial connection that they might resent and use to vote against Barack Obama.

But if Obama wins, it would seem to me that the process of agenda presentation to the new president should begin and the immediate opportunity will be the transition period from the end of the election on November 5 to the point at which he takes office on January 20.

By law, both of the major candidates have met with George Bush and covered such issues as: what federal financial and other resources are available to the winner of the election, what responsibility the sitting president has to assist the winner, when and how the sitting president should vacate the White House, etc.

Then, each of the candidates has met with their own staffs to begin the internal transition process. And while John McCain has given minimal attention to the Transition, preferring to spend his meager resources on the campaign, Barack Obama has begun an extensive process that has taken into consideration, the logistical issues discussed with Bush, but also the personnel who will run key initial functions of government and the issues they will begin to address.

The Transition train is moving very fast now with respect to how the Obama

government will be structured and the New York Times recently proposed a lineup of probable appointees to posts such as: White House chief of staff and the secretaries of treasury, defense, state and the president's national security adviser featured three candidates none of whom were African-American with the sole exception of Susan Rice for national security adviser.

And while there may be some African- Americans being considered for other agencies, my distinct impression is that the cadre of close policy advisers who are African-American is thin as witnessed by the surrogates who have participated in various policy discussions on behalf of the campaign.

On the issue front, the Obama campaign has presented several policy issues that have been close to those that feature either barriers or opportunities for the Black community. They are social policies such as K-12 education, higher education, universal health care, urban policy, job training and development using the environmental engine and infrastructure repair. These and other initiatives are promising which, together with the passage of a substantial Stimulus Package, will help to begin the change toward human development policy that is needed by the middle class and poor, black, white and otherwise.

The concern I have heard is whether Black leaders will attempt to work with in the Transition process, which would be a natural move, or would there be a continued attempt to keep them at arms length in order to construct a "race-neutral" style of governance.

Then there is also concern that the specific issues that are of prime interests to the Black community will be received by the transition process. It would appear that the transition period would be an important time to test these assumptions rather than hanging back and celebrating while the governing structure and agenda of the President are being set in stone.

I remember that when Blacks helped elect Jimmy Carter, contrary to all signs that Carter was not a Lyndon Johnson, Black leaders stood by for over a year without making any demands upon his administration until Vernon Jordan who was then head of the Urban League said at a press conference, "where's the beef?"

Now is not the time to sit and wait. With the massive problems confronting the nation and therefore, the president, if Black leaders do not signal their concerns early in the formation of the administration, the policies of those who need government most could be put under a pile in the Oval Office.

In response to a question in the last debate about their priorities, Barack Obama himself said that presidents had to do more than one thing at a time. So, we should be confident in putting forth the Black agenda now that we will not be asking one or two years out, "Where's the beef?"

Land Disputes Could Upset Liberia's Fragile Peace

In a new report by the Liberian Truth and R e c o n c i l i a t i o n Commission, disputes over land ownership were named as one of the most serious threats to peace in this West African nation of Liberia.

A six-month survey also found concerns about a lack of information from the government and over management of the country's resources.

There's a "strong likelihood of reversion to violence" if such conflicts are not addressed, the report said. Government spokesman Laurence Bropleh said President Ellen Johnson Sirleaf was already taking steps to address the issue, including plans to appoint a land reform commission.

"We welcome the report because it enhances what we are trying to do as a government," Bropleh said. "Now that we have brought to an end this bloodletting, killing one another, Liberian people will have to pressure each other" to keep the peace, he said. Civil war and a series of coups between 1989 and 2003 left about 200,000 people dead and displaced half the country's population of 3 million. Nearly 12,000 U.N. peacekeepers help maintain order in the West African country.

Toys abandoned by families during home foreclosures and evictions are being recovered and used in play therapy to treat children affected by domestic violence.

A 2006 report by the Texas Council on Family Violence found that 74% of Texans have either witnessed or been a victim of domestic violence. So often, children who witness horrific acts of domestic violence are ineligible to receive publicly-funded victim assistance because they are not 'direct victims'. Crossroads Family Services has dubbed these young people as "shadow children".

nsurance – No one wants to talk about it, but everyone has to have it.

And with insurance comes the insurance agent: someone everyone tries to avoid and is generally equated with a high pressure salesman that bullies their customers.

Review: The Good Negro at DTC

The 1960s were a turbulent period in American History. Sydney Poitier came to dinner and Muhammad Ali explained why he had no quarrel with the Viet Cong. Tommie Smith and John Carlos raised their defiant fists in the air at the 1968 Summer Olympics and created a firestorm of controversy. Booed as they left the podium, Mr. Smith later said, "Black America will understand what we did tonight." White America did not understand.

Within the first two minutes of The Good Negro by Tracey Scott Wilson, racial prejudice and bigotry are ratcheted to a frenzied level of ugliness. Claudette (Joniece Abbott-Pratt) is beaten and arrested simply because her four-year-old daughter had to use the 'Whites only' restroom.

Claudette's arrest becomes the inciting incident that re-energizes the civil rights movement in 1963 Birmingham, Alabama. Ms. Abbott-Pratt portrays her character with such vulnerability that you fear she might be injured not necessarily from all of the rough handling, but most assuredly from the hail of racial epithets rained upon her. The Reverend James Sullivan (Billy Eugene Jones) sees the exemplary Claudette and her innocent child as the perfect embodiment of the movement. Reverend Sullivan also sees Claudette as a very beautiful woman. It's refreshing that Ms. Wilson has written her characters with the most basic of flaws then fully exposes them for the audience to see. Claudette's husband Pelzie (Francois Battiste) isn't very supportive of her involvement with the movement or with

Reverend Sullivan. Mr. Battiste gives his character an unvarnished, down-toearth realism that adds a great deal of substance to what otherwise might be countrified simplicity. As it turns out, Pelzie is no simpleton.

The nine-member cast is well balanced and completely synchronized with each other as scenes morph from one to the other at a frenetic pace. Rutherford (LeRoy McClain) and Henry (J. Bernard Calloway) respectively offer Reverend Sullivan voices of reason and instinct. Mr. Calloway has perfect comedic pitch, enabling him to deliver humor to a very dramatic piece. Steve (Brian Wallace) and Paul (Steven Walters) play well off of each other as FBI agents bugging the homes and offices of the movement. Joe Nemmers as Rowe, the See NEGRO, Page 15



Clinically speaking, grief is defined as "...the normal response to the loss of a loved one by death." More often than not, human responses to death and dying are anything but normal. A textbook approach to grief is about as useless as a textbook approach to love. However, textbook perfect is ironically the ideal description for Losing Daniel, the current production offered by Teatro delle Muse. Dallas playwright Lon Rogers takes us on an intimate journey through the unsteady landscape of grief. Everything about this play is textbook, from it's tightly written script with its beautiful language to its indefectible direction, dramatic set design, impeccable

sound and stylish costumes. The highest of praise must be bestowed on Director, John Mallory Land, who also served as set designer, for bringing to life a technically and artistically flawless production.

Mr. Land seizes the main theme of the play with such an exuberant embrace that the end result is an enormously entertaining and thought-provoking testament to the tragedy of hubris – "the pride that kills."

Twenty years after the death of their son Daniel, the mountain home of Matthew and Nora Shelton remains bordered on all sides by tragedy and loss. Matthew (Ray Gestaut), a famous American playwright, stumbles across a play he wrote twenty years ago in an effort to assuage his grief and to give his dead son a touch of immortality. Too painful to produce at the time of his loss, Matthew has decided to resurrect the project with the condition that he alone has final approval over the actor to play Daniel. Mr. Gestaut astutely portrays his conflicted character with a superb mixture of conviction and confusion

Tommy (Chad Halbrook) is the accidental actor who happens to bear a striking resemblance to Daniel, not only in looks but also in mannerisms. Mr. Halbrook does an exceptional job of playing a character playing an actor playing a character. Early in the play, Matthew describes the character

Women. "I think this will

help the whole country. people of all backgrounds...I know historically, African-Americans will feel good about it, but, I think everybody across the country will have the realization that there are people in all groups who have the capability to be president."

That hope that has risen in the race between Democratic Sen. Barack Obama and Republican Sen. John McCain has translated into massive voter registration numbers nationwide in the contentious and historic race.

"We're seeing that voting is becoming a true family affair, a true community affair all over this country," says Melanie Campbell, executive director and CEO of the National Coalition for Black Civic Participation. "We want the people to enjoy the process of making history."

Campbell says while a 60 percent turnout has been considered good in the past, this year, a recordbreaking 70 to 80 percent is expected in some communities. "And African-Americans are going to be leading the way," she said. "People feel like they are a part of the process. This is part of the definition of what a movement is. People are taking their neighbors to go vote. This movement for a change is also a change in removing apathy and we'll have to build on that."

In the close race, election officials are also hopeful that few glitches will occur.

"We really are confident that this is going to be a election," good says Donetta Davidson, vice chair of the Federal Election Assistance Commission. "The election community has really been working very hard, and the election officials, to make sure that this election runs as smoothly as possible," Davidson says. "Will there be a hick up some place? Possibly. That's because

there's a human factor in programming this equipment and testing it. Testing is the valuable point. If they do their testing right, they will catch any kind of program they have before Election Day."

'Equipment is only half of it. The process is really what insures that everything is going to run smoothly, training the poll workers," she said. "In some areas they do not have enough poll workers yet...They need even emergency poll workers the morning of election to ship them out to a polling place where somebody got sick or called in and said 'I'm not going to be there.""

Davidson said a total of two million poll workers are needed "because of the size of this election, the hype of it and the number of people who have registered...A lot of the states and jurisdictions are still looking."

Activists who have already observed long lines say voters must also take certain precautions on their own Nov. 5.

"On election day, the biggest thing that you get prepared for that length of time and celebrate it," says Campbell. "If you don't have the ability to take a lot of time off from work, make sure vou vote first," she said, echoing a new VOTE FIRST campaign enacted by her NCBCP, the National Urban League and the Black Leadership Forum. "And then when you go, make sure you have your ID in case you have any kind of problems. Even when you don't think you need it, take it anyway."

Campbell added that everyone should make sure they have the right polling place. And finally, "If you know you're registered to vote, do not leave that polling place without voting."

Daniel to the actor Tommy with an almost tearful affectivity. Matthew explains, "Daniel is looking for his father and his father is looking for Daniel. They've been separated, torn apart." Matthew's emotion prompts Tommy to ask if Daniel was real. Mathew evades the question and tells Tommy "you have to make him sound real."

This exchange signals that a hero is about to be reborn and a second chance conferred In the world of theatre, the omnipotent playwright reserves such privileges. However, Nora Shelton (Juli Erickson) fears the toll that such a prerogative will exact on her husband. Ms. Erickson convincingly portrays the protective and selfless wife. Nora is in fact, the only character of the play not primarily driven by a self-serving need.

Counter to Nora is Ruth

Fixler (Nicole Metcalf), a tough-as-nails director who'll stop at nothing to succeed. Cindy Miller (Elizabeth Robinson) is Ruth's assistant. Ms. Robinson is resplendent in her stage presence. In several scenes with Tommy, sufficient heat is generated to melt a Colorado snowfall.

middle class citizens from Main Street to Martin Luther King Boulevard who are suffering the most because of this economic meltdown. These thought leaders contend that government efforts to increase minority homeownership, including the Community Reinvestment Act, are at the root of what is now a global economic crisis.

This insidious myth has gone largely unchallenged by public officials and the media who should know better. But it has not gone unchallenged by the National Urban League.

Last week, in testimony before the Senate Banking Committee I reminded the members that for years - to no avail - the National Urban League has urged the Congress and the White House to take action to end the predatory lending practices that plague our communities.

I then asked them directly to disarm a false and dangerous weapon of mass deception and affirm the truth: Most of the subprime loans at the root of the crisis did not go to minorities but to middle to upper income Whites.

Another weapon of mass deception is being deployed in some states to prevent people from voting on November 4.

I am pleased that last week, the United States Supreme Court rejected an attempt by the Ohio Republican Party to challenge the eligibility of 200,000 Ohio voters because their names did not perfectly match a state

database.

States are well equipped to deal with these discrepancies, many of which are due to database errors. We agree with the Court's ruling that political parties should not be involved.

These types of voter-ID eligibility challenges are cropping up all over the country – in Alabama , in Michigan, in Montana, in Wisconsin. As reported in the Washington Post, Wendy Weiser of the Brennan Center for Justice called this "this season's big issue...and a new trend...in the battleground states."

In my view, this constitutes another weapon of mass deception designed to disenfranchise eligible voters and influence the outcome of the election. As we announced several weeks ago, the National Urban League has launched an unprecedented "Vote to Empower" campaign largely focused on voter-rights and preventing vote suppression. Again, we ask you to go to www.votetoempower.com or ncbcp@ncbcp.org for details on how to report voting problems.

Next week, we will have a chance to participate in the most important election of our lifetime. The economic, domestic, and foreign policy stakes are sky high. We must not allow apathy on our part, or mass deception on the part of others, to relegate us to the sidelines of history. It's time to deploy our weapon of mass empowerment - vote.

What are housing choice vouchers?

The housing choice voucher program is the federal government's major program for assisting very low-income families, the elderly, and the disabled to afford decent, safe, and sanitary housing in the private market.

A family that is issued a housing voucher is responsible for finding a suitable housing unit of the family's choice where the owner agrees to rent under the program. This unit may include the family's present residence. Rental units must meet minimum standards of health and safety, as determined by the PHA. A housing subsidy is paid to the landlord directly by the PHA on behalf of the participating family. The family then pays the difference between the actual rent charged by the landlord and the amount subsidized by the program

Am I eligible?

Eligibility for a housing voucher is determined by the PHA based on the total annual gross income and family size and is limited to US citizens and specified categories of non-citizens who have eligible immigration status. In general, the family's income may not exceed 50% of the median income for the county or metropolitan area in which the family chooses to live.

annual income and provide financial education about the benefits of asset building," City of Dallas Mayor Tom Leppert, said. "I know this great city will rally for the community and step up to volunteer to help their neighbors."

The EITC is a refundable federal income tax credit for low-income working individuals and families. When the EITC exceeds the amount of taxes owed for an individual or family, it results in a tax refund to those who claim and qualify for the credit.

The program, administered by United Way, will

recruit and train 900 volunteers, as well as provide computer equipment, to increase the hours and days of operation at 25 local Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) sites in an effort to double the tax filers in 2009. The VITA sites utilize trained community volunteers to provide tax preparation for low to moderate income individuals free of charge. The VITA sites will also serve as centers where families can receive services that help them develop educational credentials, job- related skills and financial education

knowledge that can put a family in a much stronger financial position.

"An EITC program is imperative in any major city which is why Citi did not hesitate to jump on board in support," Debbie Taylor, the Southwest Regional Director and Texas State Director for Citi North America Community Relations said. "Earn It! Keep It! \$ave It! is right in-step with Citi's philanthropic mission of financial education and stability for all hard working Dallas families. We are proud to support this program with a \$200,000 award and are also encouraging many of our 10,000 employees in the Metroplex to volunteer."

A large majority of eligible individuals that do file for the EITC pay a commercial tax preparer almost 10 percent of the refund for assistance. Many are also pushed to take out Refund Anticipation Loans - loans given to filers with their refund serving as collateral which allows them to get refunds quickly. Often times these loans are laden with many costs and fees which decrease the amount

of funds the family will receive. Therefore, the VITA site is a better option because individuals can file for free and, most often, filers will receive their refund within a week

"We are thrilled to be working with Mayor Leppert on this financial stability initiative for the City of Dallas," Gary Godsey, UWMD President and CEO said.
