Susan Rice, a former assistant secretary of state for African Affairs, focuses on U.S. foreign policy, weak and failing states, the implications of global poverty and transnational security threats. Rice, a Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institution is currently on leave as she has served as a senior foreign affairs advisor to President-elect Barack Obama during the presidential campaign.

Rice grew up in Washington, D.C., in the Shepherd Park neighborhood. Her father is Emmett Rice a Cornell T University economics professor and former governor of the Federal Reserve System. Her mother is education policy scholar Lois Dickson Fitt. Growing up, her father told her to "never use race as an excuse or advantage", and as a young girl she "dreamed of becoming the first U.S. Senator from the District of Columbia." She also held "lingering fears" that her accomplishments would be diminished by people who attributed them to affirmative action.

Rice attended Stanford University, where she received а Truman Scholarship, graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree in history in 1986. Awarded Rhodes а Scholarship, she attended New College, Oxford, where she earned an M.Phil. in 1988 and D.Phil. in 1990. The Chatham House-British International Studies Association honored her dissertation as the UK's most distinguished in international relations.

Rice served in the Clinton administration in various capacities: At the National Security Council from 1993 to 1997, as Director for International Organizations and Peacekeeping from 1993 to 1995 and as Special Assistant to the President and Senior Director for African Affairs from 1995 to 1997. In 1997, she became Assistant Secretary of State for African Affairs from 1997, serving in that capacity until Clinton left office on January 20, 2001.

As Assistant Secretary of State Rice was considered "young, brilliant, and ambitious," and she worked to "integrate Africa in the global economy while at the same time aiming to increase U.S. nation-



al security."

Susan Rice serves on the boards of several organizations, including the National Democratic Institute, the U.S. Fund for UNICEF, board of directors of the Atlantic Council, advisory board of Freeman Spogli Institute for International Studies at Stanford University, the board of directors of Bureau of National Affairs, board of directors of Partnership for Public Service, the Beauvoir School, and past member of the Internews Network's board of directors.

Rice married ABC News producer Ian O. Cameron in 1992; they had met as undergraduates at Stanford. Now they reside in Washington with their two children.

### Sen. Steven Horsford

Steven Horsford was elected to the Nevada State Senate in November 2004 where he represents Senatorial District Four. Following the elections this month resulting in a change in power of the Nevada State Senate, Sen. Horsford is now the first African American majority leader in Nevada history.

Senator has served on the committees of Judiciary, Human Resources and Education, and Legislative

Operations, Elections and Ethics. Additionally, Senator Horsford has been appointed to the Commission on the Administration of Justice, the Interim Committee on Healthcare and is Chair of Legislative the Commission's subcommittee on child welfare and foster placement. In June of 2008 Senator Horsford was named Democratic Leader to the Nevada State Senate Caucus.

Outside of his legisla-

tive service, Senator Horsford holds the position of Chief Executive Officer and President of the Board of Trustees for Nevada Partners, one of Nevada's largest employment training and career preparation organizations. Nevada Partners Inc. (NPI) is a non-profit organization that assists individuals to become more competitive in the job market by providing free industry-specific as well as overall job preparedness training.

In addition to his role at Nevada Partners, Senator



Horsford oversees the Culinary Training Academy (CTA). The CTA is a highly successful joint management and labor partnership between participating gaming companies and the Culinary

and Bartenders Unions and prepares more than 3,500 students annually for positions in the hospitality industry. In this capacity, he has successfully managed a capital campaign of \$10 million and was instrumental in the planning, design, and construction of the project - a 35,000 square foot stateof-the-art restaurant, hospitality and kitchen training and community banquet facilities which is housed on the campus of Nevada Partners.

Born and raised in Las Vegas, Senator Horsford has established deep roots as a prominent member of the business and government community. He currently serves on the Board of Directors for the Las Vegas/Clark County Urban Community League Action Agency and is Chair of the NAACP Academic, Cultural, Technological and Scientific Olympics (ACT-SO) Committee of Las Vegas.

Senator Horsford is married to Dr. Sonya Horsford and they have three children, Benjamin, Bryson and Ella.

### **Rep. Terrance Carroll**

Democratic Rep. Terrance Carroll was chosen last week to be the new speaker of the Colorado House, the first black named to the position.

The Denver lawmaker was nominated by majority Democrats and will be formally elected by the full House in January, when the next session convenes. Ratification is usually unanimous.

It would be the first time the state has black leaders in both houses after Senate President Peter Groff renominated to that position on Thursday.

"It just shows how, with the selection of Sen. Groff and president-elect Barack Obama, that there are no limits to what we can do. It really shows we made significant progress, but there is still much work to be done," Carroll said.

As an attorney Carroll represents clients in regulatory, civil and employment litigation matters. He also represents clients before various state and federal administrative and regulatory agencies. In addition to practicing law, Terrance is Colorado the State Representative for House District 7. He is the Assistant Majority Leader for the Colorado House of Representatives and serves as chairman of the House Judiciary Committee.



Rep. Carroll graduated with honors from Morehouse College in Atlanta, Georgia with a Bachelor of Arts degree in political science. He received a Master of Divinity degree from the Iliff School of Theology in Denver. Colorado. He is also a graduate of the Summer Leadership Institute Harvard at University Divinity School's Center for the Study of Values in Public Life and John F. Kennedy School of Government. He is currently pursuing a law degree at the University Of Denver College Of Law where he is Chancellor's Scholar. Rep. Carroll was a pan-

### THE TRUTH CLINIC Obama's Economic Migraine Can Be A Golden Opportunity

President-Elect Barack Obama promised to have America's rapidly deteriorating economic crisis high on his Presidential agenda during his first press conference since winning the election on November 4.

Appearing in Chicago with a star-studded cast of advisers, Mr. Obama said, "I am confident a new president can have an enormous impact." Weighing his words carefully he added that he would chart a measured course during his transition period because, "It is important to get it right...and make sure we are not so rushed that we make mistakes."

In approximately 11 weeks, Obama will inherit a daunting situation unseen since the great depression of the 1930's that includes not just the economic crisis but the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, international hot spots, and a demoralized nation.

Noting the lessons of history Obama obviously recognizes that the most successful transformative presidencies were patient during the period between the election and the inauguration. Hope and faith had to be restored and divisive walls had to be broken down before a divided constituencv could move forward as one nation.

Taking inspiration from Lincoln's transition of 1860 and Roosevelt's of 1932 Obama's initial message to the people, while giving deference to the current President, is his commitment to take immediate action come January 20.

"Our climb will be steep," Obama said. "We may not get there in one year or even in one term." Yet he remained upbeat, calm and

assured as did Roosevelt, who took the reins of a nation in the depths of the Depression. FDR used his optimism to lift up the downtrodden and refresh the American spirit. So did Obama.

Roosevelt's first act as president was to deal with the country's failing banking system. close. By the beginning of 1933 the American people were starting to lose faith in the banking system and a significant number were withdrawing their money causing a run on the banks.

The day after taking office president, as Roosevelt ordered a national holiday for all banks to stop the currency hemorrhage. He then called Congress into special session and urged Congress to pass a series of important bills that became the foundation of the New Deal.

The government created job programs, emergency funds for those in desperate need, relief programs for the unemployed, and the old age pensions program. These included the Works Projects Administration (WPA), the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC), the Public Works Administration (PWA), the Federal Emergency Relief Administration, the Federal Securities Act, and the Social Security Act.

The government, during the current transition period. continues to focus on the immediate crises using bailouts, with little attention to the underlying reasons for the continuing economic decay — stagnate incomes, an explosion of debt, and an outdated laissez-faire approach to government oversight.

Taking a step back, it's important to consider this action in the context of previous similar actions. Α



good way to visualize the problems associated with a finger-in-the-dike strategy is to look back to the first big bailouts of modern times. Before A.I.G., before Fannie and Freddie, before Bear Stearns, there was Lockheed in 1971 and Chrysler in 1979.

While both the Lockheed and the Chrysler bailouts resulted in saving the companies the actions did nothing to shore up the respective industries and prevent subsequent declines.

America is now faced with a growing cycle of bestowing special economic favors on companies deemed "to big to fail". The financial industry, the housing industry, and now the auto industry are lining up for their fair share of government largesse. AIG got a financial bailout, so why shouldn't we is the question asked? As the economy continues to spiral downward the line of corporations demanding breaks on financial obligations they can't afford grows and shows no signs of abating.

Thus the economic crisis facing the Obama administration presents both a challenge and an opportunity for the new President. It is a challenge in the form of the greatest financial problem confronting the nation and the world in the last 75 years. It must be fixed.

The crisis also presents an opportunity for Obama to step away from convention-

government political al based band-aid solutions and provide innovative solutions derived from bi-partisan smart government.

Almost ninety percent of Americans see government as corrupt and predatory and do not trust it. Laws such as the tax code are not thought of in terms of redistributing the wealth as former candidate McCain postulated but rather as a means of institutionalizing the greed and corruption via loopholes and special breaks.

The economic turmoil of the 1930's presented a similar situation that demanded a new era of governance in America. That need was fulfilled through the skill and determined ambition of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt who devised the New Deal.

President-elect Barack Obama has the requisite ambition for greatness and the intellect to recognize that the devastating economic crisis he inherits provides him with a golden opportunity to achieve greatness.

Most important, as he demonstrated by orchestrating the most brilliant presicampaign dential in American history, he has the skills to thoughtfully and deliberately make this opportunity a golden trophy for the American people.

## Fighting Escalates in Congo, As Peacekeepers Flee

Tutsi insurgents loyal to renegade General Laurent Nkunda launched a major offensive on Sunday, advancing to within 12 miles of Goma, destroying two UN armored vehicles and forcing thousands of civilians to flee south towards Goma town.

Some 17,000 U.N. peacekeepers have begun packing their bags to leave, angering local people who blame them for failing to prevent the rebel advance. Riots were reported at the UN base in Goma on Monday. Crowds shattered windows, damaged cars and one person was killed.

Nkunda claims he is defending Tutsis from Rwandan Hutu renegades who fled into the Congo after their military defeat in neighboring Rwanda in 1994. In that year, some half a million Rwandan Tutsis were slaughtered by Hutu militia in what has become known as the Rwandan Genocide.

Rwanda's now dominant Tutsi rulers fear these renegades could threaten genocide again.

A cease-fire between the government and Nkunda signed in January failed to hold and new fighting is underway with Nkunda declaring he will "liberate" all of Congo, a country the size of Western Europe with vast reserves of diamonds, gold and other resources. Congo's vast mineral wealth helped fuel back-to-back wars from 1997-2003.

According to the U.N., more than 200,000 people have been forced from their homes in the last two months, joining 1.2 million displaced in previous conflicts in the east. Outbreaks of cholera and diarrhea have killed dozens in camps, compounding the misery.

## Gatekeeper Program Equips City Employees to Help Seniors

City of Plano employees are learning how to detect the telltale signs of a senior in need as part of the new Gatekeeper Program. The program has been developed in coordination with the Geriatric Wellness Center of Collin County (GWCCC), Adult Protective Services and the North Central Texas Council of Governments' Area Agency on Aging to identify older residents in need of social services to easily connect them to local providers.

Training of employees began in late September with the Property Standards department and key employees of other depart-

participating. ments Property Standards will be the first department to pilot the program. Property Standards Department Director Cynthia O'Banner said, "Many times when an older person begins to need help, their yard and house maintenance begins to show signs of neglect. When our team speaks with an elderly home owner about a code violation, these assessment tools will allow us to be aware of and watch for potential signs of a greater personal need."

Employees are taught to look for indicators of unmet needs for social services, in addition to potential elder abuse, neglect and exploitation. The confidential referrals are made by the

Gatekeepers to the Geriatric Wellness Center of Collin County (GWCCC) for follow-up by a master's level social worker or to Adult Protective Services for follow-up by an investigator.

\GWCCC Elizabeth Kent said, "This partnership puts the City of Plano's front line of customer contact in a position to serve seniors at a deeper level. These assessment tools are great for an initial screening. The Wellness Center can then conduct a detailed assessment to determine what resources may be available to address the seniors needs. The Wellness Center may also collaborate with our private and public community partners to address

routers, shredders and copiers, entrainment electronic, car and home audio equipment satellite and cable boxes, cell phones, GPS devices, calculators, portable CD players, PDA and MP3 players, portable electronic, video games and accessories, sporting goods, golf clubs bags, athletic helmets and pads, baseball bats and gloves, basketball shoes, cleats, hockey sticks, ice skates, musical instruments, home and garden items such as air purifiers, baby monitors, vacuum cleaner, power tools electric razors, sewing machines and medical equipment. Nonfiction books such as cookbooks, crafts books

# Retiree to Franchisee

ave Wilson opened CertaPro Painters of Plano on July 21, 2008. He says that he has been in business since July 18, but that's just the day he retired.

When most people retire, they spend some time relaxing, work on unfinished projects, travel, or just enjoy the time they can spend with their family and friends. But not Dave Wilson; when he retired on Friday, he went right back to work on Monday.

But this time, he went back to work not as an employee, but as boss.

"I wanted to give something to my son" he says about why he decided to go into business for himself. That, and taking note of Hillary Clinton's run for the white house, he adds "She's my age; if she could do that, then I could open a business."

"We were originally looking at a home cleaning business," he says. "We were looking at many franchises opportunities, and we choose this one." He and his son, David Jr., both have a background in computers. Dave is actually an electrical engineer, and his son is a software engineer, and laughs as he says that they are just "computer guys now attempting to be painters."

CertaPro Painters of Plano paints interior and exterior areas of the home or small businesses and services all of Plano, parts of Richardson, Murphy, and Parker. They are very customer oriented and feel that customer care and experience comes first. They are also boned and insured and use only the best Sherman Williams paints. An average project takes 2-4 days and can happen about a week after your estimate.

Dave and his son decided to open a CertaPro Painters franchise, instead of going into business for themselves alone, because of the support. Truth be told, "We had no idea how to open a business" David says. CertaPro provides office support, a call center, marketing materials, and has a mentoring program so there's always someone to call when they need to ask questions. Dave hopes to one day be a mentor for a new franchise owner.

Just because CertaPro Painters have a great support system for their franchise owners doesn't mean that opening the business and maintaining it is extremely easy. Like every small business, Dave still has some difficulties being his own boss. "Some Monday's I wake up and ask myself, 'Where are we going to get customers this week?' But I get up, and go to work, and things fall into place." And that, "Instead of worrying about

yourself, you have to worry about your crew because they depend on you to find work for them" so they can make money and be responsible too.

Also, there's a huge transition in mind set that he and his son have to go through to be successful business owners instead of just employees. Dave has been with several start-up companies, but never has been fully responsible for all aspects of the business. He has learned that when dealing with start-up companies you have to be the person that is willing to do whatever needs to be done; sometimes run things by the "seat of your pants" just like starting your own business. He has also learned that "working with customers [professional clients], is very different than working with residents." Going into a very personal part of a customer's life, like their

home, can be challenging.

"Overwhelming" is how Dave describes their first paint job. He'll admit, that at the time, everyone knew and had a theory of how the process was going to work, but they didn't know exactly how much work and what to expect. It made Dave stop and ask "What did I get myself into?"

But once they got past that first job, things started to fall together and are continually getting easier. He says having a "phenomenal crew" with an amazing work ethic really helps and keeps the business going.

Despite the difficulties, Dave and his son David, Jr., are appreciating the benefits of being their own boss and owning their own business. Dave says that "Seeing a satisfied customer is a great." And seeing all 5's on an evaluation is the "most gratifying" feeling. Eventually, Dave would like to eventually really retire and let his son, and hopefully his grandson, take over the business fully. They would also like to be able to give back to the community, but haven't thought about it much, and "would like to do it in the future."

Overall he says that opening a business has been a good experience. He wants others to know that if they are thinking about it to be sure and put "customer care first. If you take good care of your customers, you'll get referrals and life will be good."

## **Akin Babatunde Gives Lively Performance in Obituary**



Irish author Brendan Behan once said, "There is no such thing as bad publicity except your own obituary." Akin Babatunde quickly dismisses this notion with his outstanding performance in Obituary, a play that brings to life, the subject of death. Presented by The Black Academy of Arts and Letters, Obituary is a one-man show about African American funerals and the cultural divide that separates them from all the other ceremonies that acknowledge mortality.

The tightly written, satirical script, authored by Mr. Babatunde, gives the audience an irreverent look at the most reverent spectacle of the human experience. The show appropriately begins at the end, as Mr. Babtunde's character Avon Von Schmidt sits reading the obituary section of the newspaper. Through him, the audience is able to fastforward to the ultimate ending. We are able to look beyond the final chapter directly into the very epilogue of one's life. The summation of a life lived, framed between the allegorical bookends of "sunrise" and "sunset." Director

Ed Smith allows the character to deftly change before our very eyes, as if to remind us that life is a series of transformations, until that final transformation unto dust.

Mr. Smith expertly showcases the immense artistry of both writer and actor. Mr. Babatunde the actor speaks, sings and even dances in a poetic symphony that mirrors the precisely coordinated obsequy rituals that Mr. Babtunde the writer so adroitly describes.

This energetic show was a definite crowd-pleaser regardless of race, age or background. Mr. Babatunde possesses that rare form of talent composed of equal parts hilarity and solemnity, and he is able to effortlessly dispense both. It would be nearly impossible to not feel the range of emotions that unfold onstage. Mr. Babatunde's fervor infected the audience who responded in kind with spontaneous shouts of affirmation. What better praise can

be bestowed on a life's work?

Regrettably, Obituary ended a two-night run on Saturday, November 8, 2008 at the Clarence Muse Café Theatre located at the Dallas Convention Center. Look for this show to return in the near future. It is well worth seeing.

Mr. Sorrell and encouraged citizens to join in supporting the oldest historically black college west of the Mississippi .

"He has brought passion and love, " said Mr. Leppert. "He brings a fresh perspective and renewed commitment. He has revamped admissions policy, overhauled a number of department and developed partnerships. He sees the possibilities and I am proud of what he has accomplished thus far."

Sen. West, who presented a proclamation to the

president, urged financial support of the Paul Quinn and pointed out that state support has increased to \$650,000 annually.

"Surely right in the city of Dallas we can match what they give and do better," said Mr. West, whose message was echoed from several other speakers as they pledged their support.

A group of Mr. Sorrell's Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity brothers presented a \$3,000 donation while also pledging more.

"I understand the challenges of historically black colleges and universities and I challenge everyone to match our support," said Hugh Allen, who is on the board of trustees for St. Augustine College in North Carolina . "This is a jewel. We can't afford to lose another historically college because of a lack of support."

In a strong message, Mr. Sorrell spoke of several moments in his life that brought him to this point. Throughout the program several references were made to the election of Sen. Barack Obama as the 44th president, earlier this week. Change and hope seemed to be the theme of the day. "This is such a special day," he began. "I am honored and humbled. I'm proud to accept my place."

At the ceremony, held today on campus in the Paul Allen Chapel, Mr. Sorrell praised a rich heritage and stressed the importance of insuring Paul Quinn's future and encouraged support of the oldest historically black college west of the Mississippi .

Calling himself an activist, instead of a "traditional academician," he said he learned about the importance and beauty of historically black colleges, from his mother and grandmother, both graduates of

HBCUs.

"I learned to love this college long before I came here," he said, as he discussed the need for black colleges and the demise of Bishop College . "As I assume the presidency, I know what I am facing."

And while the school has a laundry list of needs, Paul Quinn's 34th president says that does not mean the school will accept anything.

"This year's freshman class has the highest GPA in the history of the school," he said. "We can and we must do better. We will not beg for your sympathy. While we do need students we need the right student. This is a different place and we need you to become invested in our students' lives."

Dignitaries on hand to celebrate with Mr. Sorrell included: Dallas City Councilmembers Terrell and Vonciel Jones Hill, KKDA's Willis Johnson, WFAA-TV's Darla Miles, best friend Bruce McDonald of Wachovia Bank, UNCF area director Diane Stephenson, Pastors Frederick D. Haynes III and Sheron Patterson and Bishop Gregory Ingram, who serves as Chair of the Board of Trustees.
