Many of us can remember the theory of 'trickle-down economics.' It proposed that if the haves acquired enough, their largess would eventually reach the have-nots. But 20 years later, the have-nots still have not. The trickle spigot was somehow capped.

But now it seems that the current economic crisis - triggered by the collapse of the housing industry three years ago that crashed Wall Street, that paralyzed the auto industry, that caused Americans to lose jobs at a rate of 700,000 per month found a way to tap the trickle spigot so that banks (the proponents of this catastrophe) could in part recoup their losses from the plastic-toting public.

Parents not satisfied with McKinney school officials' response to sewage stained carpeting

Monday morning a backed-up pipe caused sewage to overflow from bathrooms to classrooms at Bennett Elementary School in McKinney. Tuesday night parents met with the Superintendent J. D. Kennedy and district spokesperson Cody Cunningham. However, some were not satisfied with the responses received.

Although school officials stated students were immediately removed, parents in television news reports indicated that according to their children, the students remained in the area for up to 90 minutes.

The parents were also displeased to learn officials are not immediately replacing the carpet. The carpets have been cleaned twice and experts are administering tests to confirm the carpet is clean and the air quality is safe. However, parents stressed their desire to have the carpet removed. School officials stated they want to make sure that is in fact necessary in an effort to avoid any unnecessary spending of the taxpayer's



I truly believe that no event in life happens without the direction of the hand of God and over the past few years, it has become more and more apparent to me that the trials I have experienced have been for the purpose of educating others.

I am a 10 year survivor of triple negative breast cancer.

Having been married for 35 years to the love of my life, Harold, and a mother to three children, Jeremy, Jonathan and Jennifer, my diagnosis became more than my fight. It became theirs.

When I first heard the words "You have breast cancer," I knew that my life would change forever. What I did not know was how. At the time, I had no family history and my knowledge of the disease was very limited. As I soon learned, family

history has to start somewhere, and in my family it was with me.

My diagnosis left me stunned. I scanned my belief system trying to determine why this happened to me. Innately solution minded, strong willed, a tough and resilient woman who could handle whatever life dealt her, I immediately felt as though I was helpless and out of control.

After long thought and deliberation, I made the conscious decision to turn away from negative thoughts and began educating myself about my disease.

Education is the key to early diagnosis and survival. Education about breast cancer and your family's health history can help save your life.

That's why I'm educating my daughter, Jennifer, about our family history. Because of our discussions, she knows that I fought breast cancer. And that shortly after my diagnosis, my mother learned that she, too, had the disease. And that breast cancer took the life of her father's mother. Because of these conversations, she's aware of her increased risk and the importance of practicing good breast self awareness.

Leaving the littlest ones behind

(NNPA) When people talk about the "achievement gap" at-risk children face, they often think of it in terms that apply to school-age children—but that gap can start much earlier than most people might guess. A recent report by the nonprofit, nonpartisan research group Child

Trends showed that disparities actually begin appearing before children's first birthdays. The report, Disparities in Early Learning

ous when notice came from card issuers that the terms of revolving credit as we knew it, were about to change. Many consumers were hit with a triple shot from credit card companies. Attractive fixed rates were supplanted by variable rates. Lower interest rates would be raised in some cases from single digits, to something closer to 20 percent or more. This whammy of a trifecta was completed when card issuers converted existing balances to new higher interest rates. Consumers were left with the option of accepting the new terms or closing the account under old rates (opting-out): like it or not.

Outraged citizens complained and last May Congress and President Barrack Obama signed into law sweeping changes to laws governing banks and other credit card issuers. The new law goes into effect February 22, giving banks the time they begged for implementation. Their interim response included imposing the same rate hikes on their 'good customers' that had been used, along with exorbitant penalties and fees on the risky, to rake in profits. Effective soon, 45 days

notice must be given in advance of any increases in credit card rates or fees. The law requires that promotional rates offered to both new and existing accounts last a minimum six months and interest rates or fees on a new account cannot be raised more than once within a single year, unless the cardholder's payment is 60 days late.

Issuers must now set due dates on the same day each month and bills are due the next business day if due dates fall on a weekend or holiday.

Now monthly statements must be issued to customers at least 21 days prior to payment due dates. Current law requires just 14 davs.

The new laws also protect cardholders from over-

the-limit charges. For a transaction to be completed that would cause the cardholder to exceed their limit, the customer must be alerted and choose ('opt-in') to continue the transaction.

Banks and other issuers will no longer be able to charge for telephone or electronic transfer payments unless expedited service is requested. And payments made in the branch office of an issuer must be credited the same day.

Maybe you've taken advantage of those low- or zero-interest balance transfer offers. You may not have known that issuers were allowed to apply your payments to the low-or no-interest debt, while the interest accumulated on higher rate balances. This practice will end. The new law says all payments above the minimum will now apply to the balance bearing the highest interest.

How many parents were not aware that the student you sent away to college

was in possession of a credit card until the bill arrived at vour door? This too will end. Co-signors will be required unless those under 21 can provide sufficient proof of income.

Those who now think their account agreements look more like a loan shark deal will find solace in the new provision that requires all changes in credit card terms imposed after Jan. 1. 2009 to be reviewed by issuers every six months with rate reductions to be considered.

Purchasers and recipients of gift cards railed against industry practices that penalized holders for not immediately using the cards. New rules say no fees can be charged for 12 months and cards cannot expire until five years after purchase.

And lastly, all changes under this Act will be reviewed for their effectiveness and impact every two years by the FTC and Federal Reserve.

and Development: Lessons from the Early Childhood Longitudinal Study – Birth Cohort, found that gaps in children's development are already apparent when babies are just nine months old, and grow even larger by 24 months.

These disparities in infants' and toddlers' development can be measured across cognitive, social, behavioral, and health outcomes.

For example, when they looked at disparities by family income, they found infants and toddlers from lowincome families scored lower on a cognitive assessment than infants and toddlers from higher-income families, were less likely to be in excellent or very good health, and were less likely to receive positive behavior ratings. When they looked at disparities by race/ethnicity, home language, and maternal education, they found that in general infants and toddlers from more at-risk backgrounds (defined as the children from racial/ethnic minority groups, whose home language was not English, and/or who had mothers with low maternal education) also scored lower on cognitive and positive behavior ratings and were less likely to be in excellent or very good health than children from more advantaged backgrounds.

Poverty was the most prevalent risk factor in the study, and they point out that nearly half of all American infants and toddlersapproximately 1.5 million children-live in families with incomes below 200% of poverty at nine and 24 months of age. Of these children, they note 89 percent of infants and 88 percent of toddlers have other risk factors in addition to being poor-and the more risk factors a child has, the wider the disparities across outcomes.

So what can we do? Child Trends highlights four key implications of their study.

The first is that we should acknowledge that if differences in development can already be detected as early as nine and 24 months, interventions also need to start as early as infancy.

Second, because income was the most prevalent risk factor, we should address poverty's threat head-on and make children in low-income households the main targets of early interventions designed to improve children's health and wellbeing.

Since low maternal education is another key risk factor, a third implication is that we should engage and support parents of at-risk infants and toddlers through parental education.

The final implication in their report is that we should improve the quality of early care settings. They point out that research shows highquality early care and eduthe effects of demographic risk factors for young children. It also shows most infants and toddlers, especially those from low-income households, are cared for in home-based settings—so focusing on curriculum development and professional development in both home-based and center-based settings could help ensure infants and toddlers receive a safe, supportive, stimulating environment.

cation can help balance out

This important study underscores a key truth: if a price tag could be put on future workforce productivity in our country, the growing number of children in poverty is very expensive. Very soon, the line of credit we have been using by not investing wisely in children from an early age is going to bankrupt us.

Our nation simply cannot afford not to significantly increase investments in early childhood development and care, or to keep leaving so many poor babies and toddlers behind. Ending child poverty is not only a moral imperative, it is an economic imperative.

Alonzo had to quit the NBA to receive a life-saving kidney transplant. After receiving the proper treatment, he is living a healthy life today and educating others on the dangers of this disease.

Kidney disease often progresses so slowly that many of those who have it,

(NNPA) A bill to merge three historical Black colleges in Mississippi has died in the state's legislature. Mississippi Valley State University was faced with the possibility of merging their campus with Alcorn State and Jackson State after a bill to that effect was introduced to the Senate.

Tuesday, Feb. 3, was the last day for the committees to act on the bill, but it did not come up for a vote in the committee. Mississippi Gov. Haley Barbour had suggested the merger along with the merger of Mississippi University For Women and Mississippi State in an effort to save money.

Mississippi Valley State was founded in 1950, Jackson State in 1877, and Alcorn State, the nation's first state supported higher education institution for Black students, is reportedly the oldest Black college in the world, founded in 1871.

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
Congressman Sam Johnson visits local dialysis center in support of certification to benefit Medicare patients

First Lady Michelle Obama launches Let's Move: America's move to raise a healthier generation of kids



First Lady Michelle Obama

(NDG Wire) First Lady Michelle Obama announced last week an ambitious national goal of solving the challenge of childhood obesity within a generation so that children born today will reach adulthood at a healthy weight and unveiled a nationwide campaign -Let's Move - to help achieve it.

The Let's Move campaign will combat the epidemic of childhood obesity through a comprehensive approach that builds on effective strategies, and mobilizes public and private sector resources. To support Let's Move and facilitate and coordinate partnerships with States, communities, and the non-profit and for-profit private sectors, the nation's leading children's health foundations have come together to create a new independent foundation - the Partnership for a Healthier America - which will accelerate existing efforts addressing childhood obesity and facilitate new commitments towards the national goal of solving childhood obesity within a generation.

Over the past three decades, childhood obesity rates in America have tripled, and today, nearly one in three children in America are overweight or obese. One third of all children born in 2000 or later will suffer from diabetes at some point in their lives: many others will face chronic obesity-related hea-

lth problems like heart disease, high blood pressure, cancer, and asthma. A recent study put the health care costs of obesity-related diseases at \$147 billion per year. This epidemic also impacts the nation's security, as obesity is now one of the most common disqualifiers for military service.

"The physical and emotional health of an entire generation and the economic health and security of our nation is at stake," said Mrs. Obama. "This isn't the kind of problem that can be solved overnight, but with everyone working together, it can be solved. So, let's move."

Let's Move is comprehensive, collaborative, and community-oriented and will include strategies to address the various factors that lead to childhood obesity. It will foster collaboration among the leaders in government, medicine and science, business, education, athletics, community organizations and more. And it will take into account how life is really lived in communities across the country - encouraging, supporting and pursuing solutions that are tailored to children and families facing a wide range of challenges and life circumstances.

Earlier President Barack Obama kicked off the launch by signing a Presidential Memorandum creating the first ever Task Force on Childhood Obesity. Within 90 days, the Task Force will review every single program and policy relating to child nutrition and physical activity and develop a national action plan that maximizes federal resources and sets concrete benchmarks toward the First Lady's national goal.

While the review is underway, Administration and public and private efforts are already moving to combat obesity and reach the First Lady's national goal:

Helping Parents Make Healthy Family Choices

Parents play a key role in making healthy choices for their children and teaching their children to make healthy choices for themselves. Let's Move will offer parents the tools, support and information they need to make healthier choices for their families:

Empower Consumers: By the end of this year, the Food and Drug Administration will begin working with retailers and manufacturers to adopt new nutritionally sound and consumer friendly front-ofpackage labeling.

Provide Parents with a **Rx for Healthier Living:** The American Academy of Pediatrics, in collaboration with the broader medical community, will educate doctors and nurses across the country about obesity, ensure they regularly monitor children's BMI, provide counseling for healthy eating early on, and, for the first time ever, will even write a prescription for parents laying out the simple things they can do to increase healthy eating and active play.

Major New Public **Information Campaign:** Major media companies including the Walt Disney Company, NBC, Universal and Viacom-have committed to join the First Lady's effort and increase public awareness of the need to combat obesity through public service announcements, special programming, and marketing.

Next Generation Food Pyramid: MyPyramid.gov is one of the most popular websites in the federal government, and a 2.0 version of the Web site will offer consumers a host of tools to help them put the Dietary Guidelines into practice.

Empowering Change: USDA has created the firstever interactive database the Food Environment Atlas - that maps healthy food environments at the local level across the country.

LetsMove.gov: To help children parents, teachers, doctors, coaches, the nonprofit and business communities and others understand the epidemic of childhood obesity and take steps to combat it, the Administration has launched a new "one-stop" shopping website -- LetsMove.gov -- to provide helpful tips, stepby-step strategies for parents, and regular updates on how the federal government is working with partners to reach the national goal.

Serve Healthier Food in Schools: Many children consume as many as half of their daily calories at school. With more than 31 million children participating in the National School Lunch Program and more than 11 million participating in the National School Breakfast Program, good nutrition at school is more important than ever.

Reauthorize the Child Nutrition Act: The Administration is requesting an historic investment of an additional \$10 billion over ten years starting in 2011 to improve the quality of the National School Lunch and



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You can launch a business in 2010

(NNPA) A business plan. A website. A means to track spending and profits. An office space, retail space or home based business. Time. Money. Sweat equity. None of these, however, means anything if you do not know what kind of business you want to start.

Starting a business sounds scary, but before you can even do that you have to get past the first step, which is often the: figuring out exactly what you will found. The good news is two simple questions can provide you some answers right away-or at least give you a launch pad.

The first question is asking yourself, What comes easy to you but harder to others?

Whatever you come up with using these questions are the things you need to start paying attention to. .

As you evaluate your answers, make a realistic distinction between skills and desires. Desires tend to be lofty and vague goals: I want to be a millionaire. I want to play in the Super Bowl. I want to sit in the front row at the Grammy's. While it's perfectly natural to have our own version of these types of desires, it's important to realize they usually are not tied to any specific skills.



See if you can get more explicit with your desires based on your skills. For example, if you want to become a celebrated interior designer, identify a skill set already in place to match that desire—a keen eye for design and a notable talent for decorating.

Naturally, you'll learn new skills as you go forward, but at the start it helps to take concrete steps based on real skills. Remember, your skills are the things that you are capable of doing. They reflect more than a general interest or fascination. Are those things strong enough to turn into a career?

Once you've identified a possibility, your next step will be to research and analyze that specific market. Do not forget to study the competition, either. Industry associations, publications, media coverage, information from the financial community, and the competition's own marketing materials and websites are all excellent resources. The more information you gather, the greater your chances of capturing a segment of the market.

Keep expectations in check. Once born, a startup business is developed over time. Be ready to deal with setbacks along the way, but understand that behind each disappointment is a lesson you can take to move forward-closer to success.

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Reconstruction was the period immediately after the Civil War. From 1869 to 1901, there were 22 Black individuals in the House of Representative, but the defeated South remained determined that White supremacy should be maintained by any means necessary.

George H. White was the last Black Reconstruction Congress person and the last former slave to sit in the House. White, not surprisingly, found it difficult to make his mark in Congress.

However, he was able to obtain back pay for Black Civil War veterans, but his colleagues refused to hear his "Federal Anti-Lynching Bill "

In 1791 Congress created the District of Columbia (DC) where Washington is located; however, the City of Washington did not have its own local government or mayor until 1974. Walter E. Washington was elected by the people of Washington as their first mayor in 1974.

"Major" Marshall Taylor, also known as aka "The Black Cyclone" became the first Black to win

a national title in any sport in 1898. He won the World One-Mile Sprint Championship at a Montreal meet and set a world's record in a Chicago bicycle race.

Taylor had taken his motto from the great Booker T. Washington: "I shall allow no man to narrow my soul and drag me down." He concluded his autobiography by asserting, "I am a Negro in every sense of the word."

It has been said that the road to success begins with an education. A Historically Black College and University (HBCU) have been the backbone of Black education and they helped to build America by educating Black students when educational opportunities were limited.

Many of the early colleges were private institutions started by Black churches, African-Americans, the American Missionary Association and the Freedmen's Bureau. After the Civil War, public colleges and universities were formed by state legislatures.

The nation's 103 HBCUs continued to mold Black leaders and role models. HBCU schools award nearly one in every four bachelor's degrees earned by Black people.

In 1965, Congress defined an HBCU as "... any historically Black college or university that was established prior to 1964, whose principal mission was, and is, the education of Black Americans . . . '

In 1981, the White House Initiative on Historically Black Colleges and Universities was established to expand funding and strengthen the institutions, located mostly in the Southeast. Since then, the White House Initiative on HBCU has broadened the nation's knowledge of HBCUs, including their significant educational and economic impact on the nation.

The years following World War II were difficult for HBCUs and in 1944 HBCUs twenty-seven banded to launch the United College Negro Fund (UNCF) to fund-raise together and to influence the nation's thinking about educating Black Americans.

Principal organizer Dr. Frederick D. Patterson, a graduate of Prairie View A& M University in 1915, had a vision that "a unified financial campaign for several Negro colleges seems to be an idea worth toying with."

All readers may share any poem, book excerpt, or essay written by a published African-American Writer, and remain within 3 minutes. Spoken word


artists and dramatic interpretations are welcome (subject to approval).
