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Proposed State Medicaid cuts imperil seniors' care, risk local health jobs

(NDG Wire) State and national long term care leaders warned last week that the new round of cuts to Medicaid-funded nursing home care now being considered by Austin policy-makers places seniors' care in direct jeopardy, puts key

facility jobs at substantial risk, and undermines the economic stability facilities require to continue the provision of quality care to Texas' most vulnerable seniors and persons with disabilities.

The long-term care

leaders also noted that recently-passed \$725 million cuts to Texas seniors' Medicare-funded nursing home care, coupled with the threat of more cuts in the FY 2011 federal budget, also requires the Texas congressional delegation to act

with vigilance in preserving, protecting and defending their elderly constituents' Medicare benefits.

"A full eighty to eighty-five percent of Texas' nurs-

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Plano explores option for DART withdrawal



(NDG Wire) In response to citizen inquiries regarding the City of Plano's withdrawal from the Dallas Area Rapid Transit (DART) service area, Plano staff has worked with DART to determine the steps required to initiate such a process.

DART President Gary Thomas said in a March 5 letter to the City, "Chapter

452, Subchapter Q of the Texas Transportation Code requires Council action, a canvassing of the vote and a formal acknowledgment to DART to withdraw...the next opportunity for a withdrawal election is 2014."

While service to Plano would immediately cease if

Two Dallas mompempnurers have opened Pole'iticians Fitness Studio in Richardson, Texas to give women a new way to get fit while learning a few new



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Justice for Black Farmers has been denied for too long

When President Abraham Lincoln created the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) in 1862 he referred to it as the People's Department. The problem is that its services have never been available to all the people. Although more recently, with the Clinton and Obama administrations, efforts have been made to correct discriminatory problems at the USDA, it's an unfortunate fact that the USDA's history has been marred by rampant discrimination. This is why black farmers filed a 1997 lawsuit against the USDA that focused on discrimination in administration of its farm programs in the 1980s and into the 1990s.

The litigation -- referred to as *Pigford vs. Glickman* (now *Pigford vs. Vilsack*)

and named after Tim Pigford a black farmer in North Carolina and then-Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman -- was settled in 1999, and more than 15,000 black farmers obtained relief for discrimination at the hands of the USDA. But the settlement itself triggered such an outpouring of pent-up frustration and demands for justice that more than 12 years later the case is still ongoing.

Black farmers originally needed to file claims by Oct. 12, 1999. While thousands of farmers met that deadline, many others were unaware of the lawsuit. As a result, the judge let people who missed the deadline petition to get into the settlement, providing they did so by Sept. 15, 2000. Again, thousands of farmers filed petitions and are now re-

ferred to as "late filers."

Of these late filers, only 3 percent (2,700) were found eligible to file a claim in Pigford. This left a staggering 97 percent of late claimants (around 58,000 and more than 75 percent of all claimants) who were denied the opportunity.

Black farm groups and their advocates expressed concern that tens of thousands of black-farmer petitioners had been unable to file a claim. Many petitioned Congress and its leadership to resolve this issue. As a result, Congress included in the 2008 Farm Bill a provision to allow late filers into the suit, while establishing a budget of \$100 million -- which unfortunately was not nearly enough to serve the farmers.

Since passage of the

2008 Farm Bill, President Obama proposed adding considerably more monies to bring the total to \$1.25 billion for the Pigford lawsuit, an amount much closer to what likely will be needed to cover all proven claims. Based on that proposal, attorneys for black farmers and the government have negotiated a settlement of the late-filer lawsuit.

All well and good, but the job remains unfinished. The Obama administration has already submitted legislative language to Congress but the settlement cannot go forward until Congress appropriates the funds requested by President Obama, and they have set March 31 as a deadline to do so. Time is short, and

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1.8 million children die every year as a result of diarrhea caused by lack of clean water and proper sanitation. That is an average of 4,500 children per day.

Air pollution can aggravate symptoms of cardiovascular and lung disease, and can increase blood pressure in women 50 and older more so than in their male counterparts. Indoor pollution has been named a "silent killer" among women. Approximately 1.5 women die annually as they inhale poisonous gases while cooking or heating their homes.

Post-menopausal women who were exposed to lead early in life often suffer bone loss. This exposure also releases lead into the blood stream, which can precipitate kidney failure. Nearly half of all people in developing countries suffer from health problems caused by water and sanitation deficits -- and most of them are women.

Women play a critical

role in the quality of the environment and often depend on natural resources. In places such as Sub-Saharan Africa and Central Asia, women are responsible for 60 percent to 80 percent of crops produced.

When climate change affects their crops, domestic burdens are increased, which includes additional work to fetch water or collect fuel and fodder. As these domestic burdens increase, some young girls walk as much as 20 miles a day and because of time and fatigue, are unable to attend school. Without proper education, the needs and opinions of young women are seldom heard.

The World Health Organization encourages simple filtration and disinfection of household water. Improved or energy-efficient appliances to reduce exposures to indoor air pollution and washing hands with soap about 20 seconds can reduce diarrhea related illnesses by 40 percent. Ed-

ucation also is crucial -- innovative prevention and treatment protocols need to be developed and implemented for women at high risk for environmental-related illnesses.

Women in regions such as Africa and central Asia who are informed about environmental risks present in their homes and communities are better equipped to take appropriate action to reduce or eliminate exposure.

The United Nations says an estimated \$9 billion investment would achieve universal access to clean water and sanitation. Consider that Europe spends more than \$11 billion a year on ice cream. Every dollar invested in water yields an economic return of eight dollars in saved time, increased productivity and reduced health-care costs. Our economy cannot -- and will not -- achieve maximum sustainability without proper care of women.

Nearly all U.N. millen-

nium development goals have implications for women and the environment. Since 2005, the U.N. has supported women's roles in protecting biodiversity, indigenous knowledge and overseeing environmental resources.

In order to achieve true environmental justice, we need to empower women. As we take steps to sustain our environment we must not further undermine women's increasing vulnerability on the planet.

Women can play a larger role in the future of a sustainable environment and can be real catalysts for change.

From the green-belt movement in Africa to women working for environmental justice in Southeast Asia, around the world women are making a difference.

The secret lives of women and substance abuse

(NDG Wire) On Friday April 30th, just in time for this Mother's Day, the Orchid Recovery Center will be featured on ABC News 20/20 as part of a news story tackling women and alcoholism. It is a dark subject that has come to the attention of the public following the tragedy involving the Long Island mother who drove her minivan the wrong way down a suburban parkway before crashing in a wreck that killed eight people.

According to the prosecutor, the woman "was drunk and high on marijuana at the time of the accident." Her 2-year-old daughter and three young nieces died and three others killing a total of 8, in the July 26 crash. Most puzzling was her husband's reaction to news of the crash, claiming that he was "completely unaware of his

wife's drinking problem,' and that "it couldn't be,' the public cried foul in disbelief. But research demonstrates, 'he may have been telling the truth and really be unaware of her disease,' says Julie Queler, CEO of The Orchid, adding, "Alcoholism is the hidden disease and women become quite skillful at hiding it from their closest partner."

Looking for the Signs of Hidden Alcoholism

Because women who are suffering from hidden alcoholism are highly unlikely to admit that they have a problem (or seek professional help on their own accord) it is absolutely imperative that friends and family members become familiar with the signs and symptoms of this insidious disease.

The classic symptoms of alcoholism in women are:

- Suddenly poor performance at work or school
- Drinking at socially unacceptable times throughout the day
- Disappearing without warning for stretches of time
- Chronic illness (hangovers)
- Strong alcohol cravings
- Irritability and moodiness

Counseling and Hidden Alcoholism

Once a woman is lucky enough to enter into a professional alcohol rehabilitation program, she will need to take part in the various counseling programs offered at the facility. Hidden alcoholism counseling helps treat the condition at the core by addressing the "triggers" that have led to the unwanted behavior. Women are given more positive ways to respond to

these stressors – and learn the decision-making skills required to achieve and maintain sobriety.

However, simply knowing that someone cares and understands their pain can

lead to amazing breakthroughs.

After years of neglect from the research community, a number of studies in recent years focused on finding the most effective

way to treat women who drink compulsively. What these studies found is that women respond more positively to gender-specific alcohol addiction treatment –

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the whole effort is teetering toward failure.

We at the Federation of Southern Cooperatives / Land Assistance Fund recognize that work with farmers requires far more than a lawsuit can provide. This is why for 43 years we have offered Southern black farmers assistance with cooperative development, farm management, debt restructuring, alternative crop suggestions, marketing expertise and a whole range of services to ensure family farm survival.

Black farmers with late-filer claims, however, have waited for decades for relief for USDA denial of services and credit opportunities. In the 10 years since the original claim period closed, many of these farmers died, others lost their farms or left farming altogether. It is a tragic injustice that thousands of black farmers are still being denied relief for discriminatory behavior from their own government. The Federation of Southern Co-

operatives/Land Assistance Fund, the Network of Black Farm Groups and Advocates, and the scores of organizations around the country supporting the network's efforts urge Congress to act expeditiously on providing necessary funding for the black farmer late-filer settlement.

ing home residents are dependent upon federal and state programs that have already been cut in Washington, or now being examined for cuts here in Austin," said Tim Graves, President of the Texas Health Care Association (THCA). "This double whammy in terms of federal Medicare cuts just enacted and state Medicaid cuts now under consideration is an ominous development for seniors, caregivers and the ongoing economic viability of facilities all across Texas. Before Austin even thinks about cutting Texas seniors' key Medicaid programs, we must look first at the fact nursing home residents in rural, urban and suburban settings alike are already confronting a state and federal funding environment that also squeezes facilities' ongoing ability to recruit and retain high quality direct care staff. This is not in seniors' interest, nor the public interest."

Bruce Yarwood, President and CEO of the American Health Care Association

(AHCA), pointed out that beyond threatening patient care and undermining local employment stability and opportunities, the worsening Medicare and Medicaid cost-squeeze inhibits Texas' facilities' continued investment in cost effective care.

"Nursing homes in Texas, like facilities nationally, are caring for an increasingly diverse patient base, and providing a greater variety of acute care, rehabilitative and convalescent services that cannot be delivered elsewhere. These are the very services patients depend upon in order to recuperate and return to their homes. The ability to continue making progress on this vital front is being undermined by a seemingly never-ending barrage of state and federal funding cuts."

Wayne Culp, Licensed Nursing Facility Administrator for the Park Manor Facilities in the Houston area, expressed concern the worsening cumulative cost squeeze on facilities is hav-

ing a negative impact on his ability to offer expanded benefits in the competitive employment market. "The crushing Medicaid and Medicare cost squeeze – which has become more problematic over the past year -- undermines our ability to offer additional benefits to our staff, and undermines our ability to compete in the jobs marketplace," Culp said.

"And like other facilities throughout the Houston area, and across the state, we have been forced to defer investment in the new equipment and technologies we need to continue the provision of quality care in the years ahead – at a time when more baby-boomers are flooding the long term care system. It doesn't make sense and is short-sighted to reduce funding as demand for care is rising."

Graves said the negative impact of the federal Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) \$725 million cut to Texas seniors' Medicare-funded nursing

home care, which went into effect October, 2009, is adding to the chronic stress already inflicted on seniors' care needs due to the fact Medicaid rates paid to providers in 2010 are approximately \$200 million short of meeting the state's own conservative estimate of necessary funding.

"With the challenging budget conditions we face in this 2010-11 biennium, we want to make sure voters know and understand that state Medicaid cuts now up for consideration could precipitate the loss of far more in federal funding than it will save in state general revenue dollars," Graves continued. "Successfully meeting our most vulnerable seniors' long term care needs -- as well as sustaining a strong workforce and local jobs base -- will be predicated upon appropriate Medicaid funding levels from Austin, particularly in the face of cuts to Medicare funding in Washington."

From a health care policy perspective, Graves and

Yarwood pointed out Medicare's dangerous "cross-subsidization" of Medicaid - Medicare being forced to prop-up deteriorating Medicaid funding -- continues to play a vital role in sustaining nursing home care for Texas', and the nation's most vulnerable citizens. The long term care leaders

said it is their mission moving forward to help ensure Texas' state and federal lawmakers understand the growing inter-relationship between Medicaid and Medicare funding, and how additional federal Medicare cuts would reverse demonstrated progress in boosting facility care quality.

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McKinney announces lower ISO rating

(NDG Wire) Starting April 1, McKinney residents will reap the benefits of years of hard work by the McKinney Fire Department. A revised ISO Property Protection Classification (PPC) of Class 2 up from the former classification of Class 4 is effective on April 1, bringing savings on fire insurance to many home and business owners in McKinney that could total more than \$5 million.

The majority of insurance companies use the city's PPC from ISO to determine their fire insurance rates within the city, so the

better classification McKinney has attained results in lower insurance rates for many commercial and residential property owners. McKinney residents and business owners are encouraged to call their fire insurance provider to alert them to the new ISO level and determine if they qualify for a lower rate.

"Only 1 percent of cities nationwide reach this ISO rating, and we are extremely proud of our Fire Department for attaining this goal. It underlines our commitment to the safety of our citizens," said McKin-

ney Fire Chief Mark Wallace.

Companies relying on the ISO's PPC system should offer a reduced rate in their annual insurance premiums of about \$100 per \$100,000 of value of their residential property and about 11.5 percent reduction in commercial fire insurance rates, according to the Texas Division of Insurance.

"We have worked hard to reach this designation. Throughout McKinney, we estimate the aggregate savings to McKinney citizens will be over \$5 million per

year. Not only will many of our citizens save on insurance, but our fire department will continue to provide the excellent service to all of our residents," said Wallace.

Individual rate reductions may vary and are set by each insurance company for each individual property. Each insurance company sets its own rates, and the amount of any rate reduction may vary between insurance providers and affected properties. Neither the city nor ISO set insurance rates.

The program is offered at approximately 336 sites in Texas including senior centers, libraries and other convenient locations.

AARP Tax-Aide coun-

selors also visit assisted living facilities and homebound people to assist in their tax preparation.

Across the country in 2009, more than 34,600 Tax-Aide volunteers – trained in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service – helped over 2.6 million taxpayers at nearly 6,500 sites with the preparation of their income tax returns.

Metroplex-wide celebration of Horton Foote

(NDG Wire) Dallas-Fort Worth arts organizations and cultural institutions are uniting to produce the metroplex-wide Foote Festival March 14 – May 1, 2011, to celebrate the life and work of the late award-winning Texas playwright Horton Foote (March 14, 1916 – March 4, 2009).

"Horton Foote is widely considered to be one of the most influential American playwrights, and the most influential Texas playwright. When he died last year, theater artists and scholars across the nation began to reexamine and celebrate his immense body of work," says Kevin Moriarty, Artistic Director of Dallas Theater Center.

"It would be impossible for any one theater company or arts organization to produce a comprehensive look at the significant contributions Horton Foote made to American theater, film and television throughout much of the 20th century, but by bringing together Dallas and Fort Worth's leading theater companies and arts organization in an unprecedented community-wide collaboration, we can celebrate his legacy and introduce audiences throughout the Metroplex to his unique voice."

Organizations and institutions participating in the Foote Festival include: Booker T. Washington High School for the Visual and

Performing Arts, Circle Theater, Contemporary Theatre of Dallas, Dallas Film Society, Dallas Museum of Art's Arts & Letters Live, Dallas Theater Center, Kitchen Dog Theater, Stage West, Southern Methodist University DeGolyer Library, Theatre Three, Uptown Players, WaterTower Theatre, and WingSpan Theatre Company and 1:30 Productions, with more participants expected to join the festival in the future.

Foote, born in Wharton, Texas, was a prolific playwright whose plays, among the 60-plus he wrote, included *Dividing the Estate*, *The Trip to Bountiful*, the three-part *Orphans' Home Cycle*, and the Pulitzer

Prize-winning *The Young Man from Atlanta*. His work has been nominated for numerous awards, including Emmy Awards, Tony Awards and Writers Guild of America Awards.

Foote's Academy Award-winning screenplay adaptation of Harper Lee's *To Kill a Mockingbird* is perhaps his most well-known recognition.

The financing for the bonds would be supported by a property tax increase. If all propositions were to be approved, then the total impact would be up to 6 cents per \$100 in valuation. That amounts to about a \$110 increase for the average home owner's yearly property

tax bill which is about \$9 per month.

There are many projects included in the four propositions, including: street, alley, and sidewalk rehabilitation; a new recreation center and pool at Heights Park; the replacement and relocation of Fire Station No. 4; a new Fire Training Center; and funding for additional neighborhood parks and new trails.

The City's new Communications Department and Information Systems Department have compiled information concerning the election on the City's Web page (www.cor.net) And, residents will receive more information via the mail on the bond election.

- \$4 million for construction and improvement to flood control facilities including creeks, dams and lakes

- \$3 million for connectivity and improvements of municipal parking facilities in the Historic Downtown area



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Collin County real estate market continues recovery

(NDG Wire) The Collin County Association of Realtors reports that there were 8 percent more new listings in February 2010 in Collin County and surrounding areas than in February 2009. In addition, there was a 6.5 percent increase in homes under contract over the same month last year.

“The improvements

from a month ago represent normal seasonal increases we typically see this time of year, but the improvements over last year represent a strengthening market,” says Steve Haid, CCAR member services director.

The CCAR Pulse, which delves into the real estate markets of 36 local communities, also reports that most

local real estate market indicators improved in February from January, and from a year ago. For example, the time it took to sell a home in February 2010 was 19 days less than a year ago—94 days versus 113 days. Median sales price was about the same, \$167,000, in February 2009 compared to \$167,500 in February 2010.

“For the last several months, we have reported a strengthening local real estate market. While it is still not as strong as it was three or four years ago, we are encouraged by the progress, especially when compared to most other parts of the United States,” notes Haid.

From a buyer’s perspective, homes in Collin

County and surrounding areas remain very affordable, with an affordability index of 157. This means, the median family income is 157 percent of what it would take to purchase the median priced home. Mortgage rates also continue to be very low, and our local economy remains strong compared to most of the rest

of the country.

“It’s still too early to say this market has completely rebounded, but signs of progress are good,” says Haid. “While our local real estate market is always influenced by the national economy and world events, we have been fortunate to be in one of the most stable markets in the country.”

Does your business *really* have a strategy?

(NDG Wire) Many executives love blaming the bad economy for why their business may be tanking, but Rich Horwath thinks there may be another culprit for languishing revenues – lack of a strategic plan. According to a survey in the Harvard Business Review, nearly 50 percent of the business failures in the U.S. resulted from flawed strategies – not poor execution, which is where most execu-

tives place the blame.

Part of this phenomenon is that companies create strategies, write the plans, and then let them languish in a desk drawer, according to Rich Horwath, strategy consultant and author of Deep Dive: The Proven Method for Building Strategy, from Greenleaf Book Group Press (strategyskills.com).

“Many companies suffer from an organizational lo-

botomy: mindlessly doing the same things in the same ways as their competition year after year and expecting miraculous new growth,” Horwath said. “They act like zombie bumper cars, constantly spinning in different directions because they’re always being reactive, instead of proactive. The irony is that most of them wouldn’t dream of going a year or two without preventative

maintenance on their cars, like changing the oil, checking the filters and rotating the tires. Yet those same people will go a year or more without a similar type of diagnostic or tune-up on their business. Executives spend more time tuning up our \$40,000 cars than our multi-million dollar companies.”

Horwath believes that a simple five step process could unlock the potential

of the strategic plan.

- **Discovery:** In this phase, you are pulling together everything you know about strategy, market intelligence, competitive intelligence, customer data and industry data so you have a solid bank of information on which to base your primary business assumptions.

- **Strategic Thinking --** Getting together with your development team, you take the information from dis-

covery phase and then use tools and models to generate new insights and discover what is going on in your business and how your business is moving forward in the future.

- **Strategic Planning --** This takes the insights from strategic thinking and channels them into an action plan to achieve your company’s goals and objectives.

voters provided the required majority to approve withdrawal, contractual payment of sales tax to DART would continue for an estimated 8.8 - 16 years depending on collection rates at that time.

Since joining DART in 1984 Plano has contributed nearly \$794 million, with \$53.1 million in sales tax funding the current 2009 contribution.

While criticism of DART and the City’s funding con-

tribution has been questioned by some of Plano’s citizens, there is no indication how a public vote for withdrawal might go.

Plano officials acknowledge the downside to any future savings would be the elimination of both bus and light rail service to Plano residents. Nine Plano bus routes currently boast ridership of over 974,000 persons annually, with light rail service making Plano a regional des-

tination for not only daily commuters but for tourists and visitors as well.

DART estimates they have invested over \$126 million in direct infrastructure improvements in Plano through permanent transit facilities, with an additional \$40 million invested in street and signal improvements. Future plans call for connections to DART’s western service area, including DFW Airport.

Texas unemployment rate remained at 8.2 percent for February

(NDG Wire) The Texas seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady at 8.2 percent in February, unchanged from 8.2 percent in January 2010, and continuing to trend well below the U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for February of 9.7 percent. Now at more than 12.1 million workers, the Texas Civilian Labor Force grew by another 40,200 workers in February.

The total nonagricultural employment in Texas decreased by 13,000 positions

in February, offsetting the revised January gain of 12,600 jobs. Four industries added jobs including Professional and Business Services employment, which increased by 9,000 jobs, which is the largest monthly gain since January 2008.

"The Texas unemployment rate remained at 8.2 percent for the fourth month in a row," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Tom Pauken. "Although this serious national recession continues to have a negative impact here in

Texas, the unemployment rate appears to have stabilized."

Other industries adding jobs in February included Manufacturing, which added 2,900 jobs, Mining and Logging, which increased by 1,200 jobs and Information employment, which increased by 200 jobs.

"While it is encouraging to see job gains in February across several major employment sectors, our job market remains tight for those seeking new opportunities in the Lone Star

State," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton. "TWC and the 28 workforce boards are committed to assisting Texas job seekers and connecting them with available jobs."

In February, Leisure and Hospitality employment recorded a loss of 4,300, Education and Health Services decreased by 3,000 jobs and Financial Activities employment was down by 3,200 jobs. Construction posted a loss of 4,600 jobs, and Trade, Transportation, and

Utilities also decreased by 7,700 jobs.

"Although we sustained overall job losses in February, we experienced job gains in critical industries such as Manufacturing and Professional and Business Services," said TWC Commissioner Representing the Public Andres Alcantar. "Texans searching for work can look to TWC for assistance at workforce centers across the state and search for jobs on WorkInTexas.com."

- Strategy Rollout -- A lot of times, companies will create a strategic plan, but then they leave out the communication step. This leaves the employees who will be responsible for implementing the plan in the dark with regard to what they need to do in order to execute against that plan. Research suggests that 95 percent of company employees don't understand company strategy, so how can they be expected to work the plan if they don't know the plan.

- Strategy Tune-Up -- Like that diagnostic tune-up of your car, this step forces companies to look under the

hood of their strategic plans to evaluate what is different, what has changed and what is new since they created the plan. This allows companies to then make adjustments in their tactics to fit the new conditions. It helps answer the ongoing question "Are we on the

right path?"

"New growth comes from new thinking," Horwath said. "Expecting new growth for your business without new ways of thinking about it is like a farmer expecting new crops to grow without first planting the seeds."

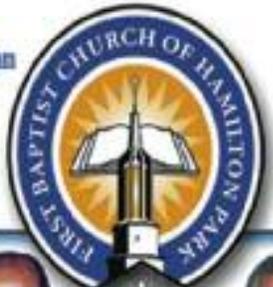


