(NDG Wire) The organizers of the State Conference of NAACP branches were not the first to espouse the NAACP's program of equal rights in Texas. In 1918, four local branches sprang up to join the El Paso chapter established in 1915.

The Great War generat-

ed a renewed racial awareness, leading more Blacks to confront discrimination. NAACP memberships nationwide soared from 10,000 in 1917 to almost 80,000 in 1919.

In December 1918, national board member

Black Newspapers Omitted from Stimulus Package, NNPA Publishers Push for Inclusion

(NNPA) Black publishers of the National Newspaper Publishing Association (NNPA) are concerned nothing is "designed" in President Barack Obama's \$787 billion stimulus package to do business with struggling black newspapers in this flailing economy.

"While we publishers wholeheartedly applaud the president's efforts of making certain economi-

cally devastated communities of color are able to benefit from the billions of dollars within the stimulus package, it is unclear whether any of the money has been earmarked to otherwise help educate the very communities serviced by the black media, as well as how they are to access the myriad of opportunities," NNPA Board Chairman John B. Smith, Sr. wrote in an April 23 let-

WHO Raises Swine Flu Alert Level as Virus Spreads

The Geneva-based World Health Organization on Wednesday raised its alert level for the fast-spreading swine flu to its next-to-highest notch, signaling a global pandemic could be imminent.

The move came after the virus spread to at least 10 U.S. states from coast to

coast and swept deeper into Europe.

"It really is all of humanity that is under threat during a pandemic," said WHO Director General Margaret Chan. "We do not have all the answers right now but we will get them."

In the United States,

President Barack Obama mourned the first U.S. death, a Mexican toddler who had traveled with his family to Texas. Total American cases surged to nearly 100, and Obama said wider school closings might be necessary.

In Mexico, where the flu is believed to have orig-

inated, officials said Wednesday the disease is now confirmed or suspected in 159 deaths, and nearly 2,500 illnesses.

There were no other deaths confirmed from the flu. But health officials in the United States and

Too Big To Fail Myth Hurting Economic Recovery

The "Too big to fail" mantra has been at the heart and soul of all efforts to mitigate the economic crises that has Americans staggering, fearful, and uncertain of what the future holds.

Contrary to the touts of some financial pundits the recent Wall Street rally isn't the beginning of an economic turnaround because there isn't any concrete data supporting a significant change in the underlying fundamentals of either the Dow or the S&P 500.

It seems that anxious investors looking for any reason to get back into the market responded to the rash of billion dollar government programs and bid up depressed stocks in anticipation that the economic financial crisis had bottomed out.

But the one shot deal of cleansing toxic assets from the balance sheets of the banks has not unlocked the credit markets, stemmed the tide of home foreclosures, stopped the job losses or induced the public to return to old spending habits. In short, none of the indicators that would validate the stimulus programs have turned positive.

Weekly jobless claims have now topped 6.1 million setting a new record for the 12th straight week. A weak job market tends to forestall any economic recovery.

The decline in home prices is still accelerating, with the 20-city Case-Shiller index falling at an annual rate of 26.5 percent over the last quarter. Home prices

have further to fall to get back to their pre-bubble levels. Many people who lost equity in their homes when prices fell cannot afford the down payment for a new home when they have to move even with the lower home prices.

The number of American households threatened with foreclosure grew 24 percent in the first three months of this year and is poised to rise further as major lenders restart foreclosures after a temporary pause during the bailout negotiations.

The nation's household savings rate collapsed to zero as jobs were lost and the unemployment rate climbed.

The fear and pessimism that accompanies an economic meltdown results in less consumption and investment which exacerbates the cycle of declining output and employment.

After the billions of dollars pumped into the auto industry it has been reported that the Treasury Department is preparing a Chapter 11 bankruptcy filing for Chrysler that could come as soon as next week.

Thus the facts do not support the use of "Too Big To Fail" economic recovery plans that prioritize attention on big businesses and little or no attention on the small business sector.

Since the mid-1990s, small businesses have created 60 to 80 percent of the net new jobs. In the latest data published by the U. S. Small Business Administration

firms with fewer than 500 employees created 78.9 percent of the net new jobs. Meanwhile, large firms with 500 or more employees added 21.1 of the net new jobs.

Small businesses employ about half of U.S. workers, pay nearly 45 percent of total U.S. private payroll, and hire 40 percent of high tech workers such as scientists, engineers, and computer specialists.

The real innovation of the last half century came from the small business sector.

Yet, in spite of the facts we still prefer to equate bigness with success and seem to be focused on rebuilding the same economic model that has put the country into financial insolvency.

With the May 4 government deadline for releasing the bank stress test results fast approaching the Wall Street financial institutions are highly motivated to portray themselves as profitable, stable, well capitalized and safe. They do not want the stress test report to show them as less than desirable institutions which would further erode investor confidence.

The same big financial institutions that created, packaged, and marketed the deceptive investment schemes and practices that precipitated the current economic crisis are engaged in the questionable accounting practices that make their books look better than they are.

But instead of providing

a true picture of current fiscal condition the financial institutions are propping up their fundamental insolvency with reports that are long on fluff and short on real data. The questionable securitization model that was at the heart of the financial melt down is still being used to restructure the financial sector that is too big to fail.

We continue to throw good money at banks that are essentially insolvent in an attempt to justify a system that has proven it does not work. The US government and Wall Street are laboring feverishly to keep the securitization model alive when it should be allowed to die a natural death.

Although dealing with this economic crisis seems complex the data is proving that the downward spiral created by Wall Street and the financial sector is resistant to all the trillions of dollars thrown at it so far. It is time for new drastic surgery if the cycle is to be broken.

Why not use the money to incentivize the creation of a new economy, with new executives not wedded to the old "too big to fail" philosophy that will be viable over the long run and permit us to live prosperously without the threat of self destruction.

Big is not the answer to the current economic crisis.

ter to White House Chief of Staff Rahm Emmanuel; President Obama's Special Advisor Valerie Jarrett, and U.S. Rep. Barbara Lee (D-Calif.), chair of the Congressional Black Caucus.

With opportunities to use the proven outreach mechanism of NNPA's more than 200 Black-owned newspapers to educate those in need on how to take advantage of the money flowing into their communities, Chairman Smith, publisher of the Atlanta Inquirer, added that the omission of the Black Press from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act was "most disheartening and perplexing." He made reference to remarks made at a recent White House Black Press teleconference with Van Jones, special advisor to the president on green jobs.

Jones told Black reporters that officials with the U.S. Commerce Dept. were "very enthusiastic and excited" about using "their existing mechanisms to make sure that there is outreach to those parts of the country that may need more information" about the American Recovery and Investment Act.

But he also made clear that for now that doesn't include advertising in African-American newspapers.

"There is nothing in the recovery package as

designed to accomplish... advertising [in Black media]," Jones replied when asked by a journalist.

That's not sitting well with NNPA publishers, many of whom, during an NNPA Region 2 meeting hosted by the North Carolina Black Publishers Association in Raleigh, N.C.

April 17, said that while they certainly applaud the president's efforts to make sure economically devastated communities of color are able to benefit from the billions contained in the stimulus package, it makes no sense that none of those dollars are earmarked to help educate those very commu-

nities through their media about how to access those opportunities.

"Any tangible economic stimulus to African-American communities across our nation should begin with the institution that has carried the torch for these communities throughout our nation's history," said Paul R. Jervay, Jr. pub-

lisher of The Carolinian Newspaper in Raleigh.

At that meeting, NNPA black publishers from Alabama, Virginia, Georgia, South Carolina, and North Carolina, led by both Chairman Smith and Dorothy Leavell, chairwoman of the NNPA Foundation and publisher of the Chicago and Gary

Crusader Newspapers, agreed that their dire concerns about the economic future of the Black Press must be made clear to both the Obama Administration and the Congressional Black Caucus.

"It is unclear in the Black community where to go and what is available to help Black families and Black

Texas To Become National Leader In Solar Power, Utility Bills Rise

The Texas House of Representatives only announced the passage of two bills last week.

The first bill, House Bill (HB) 415, by Mike Villarreal, allows more small businesses to have child care services. In 2007, Rep. Villarreal created legislation allowing businesses with less than 50 employees to gain a child care permit creating child care programs for their workers. HB 415 amends the program allowing businesses with less than 100 employees to gain certification for child care.

To qualify, a business' child care facility must be inspected by the Department of Family Services, perform criminal background checks on all employees, meet certain safety and training requirements, have no more than one adult for every four children, and limit the amount of hours the parent

can be away from the office when their child is in the facility.

The second bill passed was HB 1633 by Armando Walle. HB 1633 changes the criminal code for graffiti and graffiti offenders. The code would now include all forms of paint, not just spray paint, and all acts of vandalism using paint. In addition, offenders are now required to do more community service, pay for damages, and courts are allowed to take away the offender's driver's license.

Also, people convicted three times of graffiti related crimes would now face jail time as their third act would become a state felony.

As of Friday, April 24, neither of these bills has been scheduled to be reviewed by the Senate.

This week the House has more committee meetings scheduled, including the Insurance Committee reviewing Senate Bill (SB)

1007, which was passed by the Senate on Monday, April 20.

SB 1007 changes the way insurance companies seek approval for rate changes. Currently, once a company files a rate change, they can use their new rate till its approval or denial by the state's Department of Insurance; if denied, companies do not have to pay penalties or rebate the difference to consumers.

SB 1007 would not allow the new rate, unless pre-approved, to be used until approved. If a rate change is denied after pre-approval, SB 1007 would force the company to rebate the difference in the fees to consumers and limits the time in which appeals can be filed. In addition, SB 1007 changes the review process for the Texas Department of Insurance from every 12 years to every six.

Senator Glenn Hegar said, "This bill better

defines the file-and-use system, with stronger prior approval protections as a back drop, to bring greater stability and consistent regulation in Texas."

Last week the Senate announced it has passed a total of 160 bills to the House for review this session. Some bills passed to the House in the last week were:

SB 11 creates "gang-free" zones where children frequent and enhances penalties for people who are convicted of gang related activities in these areas. This bill also makes it illegal for people on probation to associate with gang members, and makes being a gang leader a first degree felony.

SB 187 allows more families with disabled children to use Medicaid or buy into the program. The cost of buying into the program would be based on the family's income level.

SB 545 raising utility bills by 20 cents per house-

hold, or \$20 a businesses, a month to create a \$500 million fund used as rebates for homeowners who install solar panels on their home and help fund construction of solar complexes.

SB 545 would also ban Home Owner's Associations from not allowing solar panels and requires homebuilders to offer solar panels as an option.

Texas is the national leader in renewable energy and this bill would make Texas the leader in solar power generation.

SB 921 requires Texas electric co-ops to be more transparent by opening all records and board meetings to the public, notifying members of all board meetings, and elect for directors by the district that they are representing.

SB 1188 allows Texans to buy firearms and ammunition in other states without penalties.

SB 1200 requires legislators to report any

involvement in state contracts not related to legislative business.

SB 1387 makes the Railroad Commission regulate carbon sequestration. Carbon sequestration captures generated carbon dioxide and injects those gasses into oil wells to push additional oil out of the wells.

SB 2225 creates more laws and harsher penalties for gun smugglers. This bill is supposed to help stop violence along the Texas-Mexico border.

Senate Joint Resolution 25 requires proceeds from toll roads to be used for transportation projects instead of other state programs.

As of Friday, April 24, none of these bills are scheduled for review by the House. Also, late on Friday, the Senate announced their committee to review the House's version of the state's budget; they are expected to start reviewing it this week.

businesses, the very communities that we serve," Leavell said. "The Black Press has participated in teleconferences and have sought information locally, yet there are no clear answers to these two queries."

Leavell says this quest for information will continue.

"The NNPA Foundation, whose mission is to provide educational outreach to our publishers, as well as the communities we serve, will continue to vigorously reach out to the Obama Administration to make sure that our community and our industry is a part of this stimulus and avoid what has been the norm that we are outside looking in and devoid of stimuli," Leavell concluded.

Others agreed that just as other businesses are benefiting from the stimulus money, the Black Press

should also be respected for the viable business that it is.

"Saving the Black Press is paramount to all communities we serve," said Fran Farrar, publisher of The County News in Statesville.

The fact that the Recovery Act omits African-American newspapers seems to violate a campaign commitment that President Obama made directly to the Black Press exactly one year ago this week in North Carolina.

It was April 29, 2008, during the hot Democratic primary race for the presidency when then frontrunner Sen. Barack Obama, during an exclusive NC Black Press Presidential Roundtable in Winston-Salem, assured Black newspaper publishers that he was well aware of the struggles of African-American newspapers, and if elected, would do what he could to assure more access

to federal contracts and advertising.

"One thing specifically we can do in terms of federal procurement is just to break up some of these contracts. They are just too large," a video of the session shows Obama telling black

publishers, noting that when it came to legal advertising, the federal government traditionally does business with large newspaper chains, but not small independent enterprises.

"When it comes to legal advertising... legal notices

many [black newspapers] would be interested in, I do not think it's saving a whole lot of money to simply do it with one big [newspaper]

chain, as opposed to break up some of that work and make sure that everybody is able to access it," the future president said.

Grants Combat Teen Smoking

(NDG Wire) Tighter budgets may mean less money for schools and local police to enforce laws against teen smoking, but grants available from the Texas Comptroller's office can help keep tobacco away from underage users.

"Texas teens illegally

buy or smoke more than 67 million packs of cigarettes each year," Comptroller Susan Combs said. "Combating this threat to our children's health is critical, even during budget-conscious times."

Grants ranging from \$1,000 to \$150,000 can be

used for specific activities such as tobacco education, keeping schools and school events tobacco free and sting operations to catch retailers selling tobacco products to minors.

The deadline to apply for 2009-10 grants is May 4 for schools with on-campus law enforcement and

May 11 for police departments, sheriffs, constables and district attorneys. The grant amount depends on the number of local tobacco retailers or the number of students who will receive education about smoking risks and the law against teen smoking.

The Fort Bend County

sheriff's office says the numbers prove the grant program works. They sent underage decoys to buy cigarettes 377 times last year, and 10 retailers sold tobacco to the minor, a buy rate of 2.7 percent. The sheriff's office says that is a dramatic improvement since the first sting opera-

What is swine flu?

As defined by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Swine Influenza (swine flu) is a respiratory disease of pigs caused by Type A influenza viruses. Swine flu viruses have been reported to spread from person-to-person.

What are the signs and symptoms of swine flu in people?

The symptoms of swine flu are similar to the symptoms of regular human flu and include fever, cough, sore throat, body aches, headache, chills and fatigue. In the past, severe illness (pneumonia and respiratory failure) and deaths have been reported with swine flu infection in people. Like seasonal flu, swine flu may cause a worsening of underlying chronic medical conditions.

- Collaborating and communicating with the local health department and city officials.

- Monitoring this situa-

tion campus by campus with the cooperation of school nurses and principals.

- Using proper hand hygiene and instant hand sanitizer.

- Providing education about respiratory hygiene which includes coughing and sneezing into one's sleeve or tissue.

- Exercising proper and standard cleaning with approved agents.

- Following guidelines for exclusion regarding communicable diseases

which can be found in the student/parent policy guide.

What can you do?

- It is the responsibility of everyone to help contain this virus by staying

home if you or your child is exhibiting signs of this virus.

- Please notify the school nurse of positive test results.

- Contact your health care provider as there are medications that are useful in shortening the illness and duration of the virus if given in the early stages of

the illness.

- Avoid close contact with others if you are exhibiting signs of the virus.

- Encourage good health practices.

Mr. Bhargava has also overseen a dramatic internal transformation of the organization over the past years, resulting in a younger, more diverse board and staff, a new physical home at 1536 U Street, and greater focus of the organization's work on strengthening and aligning community organizations towards policy change.

Mr. Bhargava has provided intellectual leadership on a variety of issues including the future of the progressive movement in the United States, poverty, racial justice, immigration reform, community organizing, and economic justice.

He has written on these issues for a range of publications including *The Washington Post*, *The Nation*, and *The American Prospect*. His strategy memo co-authored with Seth Borgos "A Proposition for the Future" provided a roadmap for how the field of grassroots organizing and the Center needed to adapt to changing circumstances, and

proved highly influential in the field. His groundbreaking article co-authored with Jean Haridsty, "Wrong About the Right," influenced how many progressives think about the strategies necessary to achieve lasting social change. Mr. Bhargava has testified before Congress on over 20 occasions.

"Obsessed" Box Office Success

(NDG Wire) Sony Screen Gems' suspense film "Obsessed" captivated the domestic box office over its first weekend as the Beyonce Knowles-Idris Elba starrer proved more dominant than expected with an estimated \$28.5 million.

Three other wide openers saw mixed results. Universal's bare-knuckled brawling drama "Fighting" debuted about as expected with \$11.4 million in second place, while Paramount's DreamWorks-produced drama "The Soloist" -- in which Robert Downey Jr. plays L.A. Times columnist Steve Lopez -- registered a light \$9.7 million in fourth place. And the first Disney Nature documentary "Earth," narrated by James Earl Jones, fetched a pleasing \$8.6 million in fifth place with a \$14.2 million cume since unspooling Wednesday.

Industrywide, the weekend's \$114 million in collective grosses represented a 25% improvement over the same frame last year and the biggest-ever weekend gross for the final session of the spring box-

office season, according to Nielsen EDI. Spring 2009's final tally totals \$1.11 billion, or 20% more than in the same boxoffice season last year, with the industry outpacing its year-over-year comparisons for each

of the past five weekends.

Year-to-date, 2009 is up 9% over the same portion of last year, at \$2.88 billion. That's despite its featuring one less winter frame due to calendar fluctuations.

construction fences are up and demolition has been started the voters must still decide if they want to be the bearers of the half billion dollar mortgage of this proposed structure.

With early voting just one week away, both Dallas Mayor Tom Leppert and the hotel proponents and Anne Raymond, the leader of the Citizens Against the Tax-Payer-Owned Hotel political action committee has released television attack advertisements, hosted city hall demonstrations and community debates, placed yard signage to persuade taxpayers to vote for their perspective positions.

Since Mayor Leppert's campaign for Dallas Mayor, the talk of a city-owned hotel has been on his lips. In earlier reports, Leppert expressed that this hotel will be good for Dallas. Specifically, it is said to provide a better future for the City of Dallas and the idea that it will bring more business to the city of Dallas.

The statistics released

by the Dallas Convention Center and Visitors Bureau stated that approximately \$2.6 million are lost each year by the lack of a convention center attached to a hotel. According to Leppert and other proponents of the Dallas Convention Center Hotel this addition to the Dallas skyline will ultimately be its own profit-making property that will not incur much cost to the taxpayer. He encourages the voters to "keep Dallas open for business" by voting against Proposition 1.

Raymond, a veteran in the hotel industry that has made \$500 billion dollars worth of transaction in the 25 years of experience is staunchly against the hotel entity financing model and invites voters to vote "yes" to change the law and bar the city from its current payment model.

"We are talking about a half billion dollar mortgage that can not be supported here. The hotel will not be able to generate enough to pay the mortgage year after year and the burden will be on the taxpayer," said

Raymond. "This is why the private sector has not built the Convention Center hotel. The Dallas hotel market is such that it can not support it."

Referring to her position and currently employer, Crow Holdings, Inc., she added. "We have hotels all across the country. We are in the hotel business to make a profit. If we thought that we could make a profit, we would be an investor."

In 2007 Woodbine Development Corporation, once a contender for a private sector hotel, exhausted its talks with the city but are now a supporter of the efforts led by Mayor Leppert. "Woodbine is supporting the mayor, but it would not do it," commented Raymond.

Currently in the downtown Dallas area, there are vacant properties, renovations and new builds that is reminiscent of the old Dallas skyline but intertwined with future face of Dallas. Contemporary lofts and apartments with rooftop swimming pools are inhabiting the unused build-

ings, historical buildings and mixed use space is being rehabilitated to make the downtown area and destination spot to live, work and play.

RIP Dallas is a new party to the fight against changing the involvement of the city in development projects. This newly formed group of young professionals whose blog is led by the Grimreaper and simply identifies itself as future leaders of the city have embraced the reality that Dallas is changing. It has clearly shared its commitment to "vote no on May 9".

While seeming to support the mayor team, the group has not clearly stated whether or not, its position hinges on the open-shut, all or none language of the proposition 1 or if it is truly a support group of the mayor in his quest to build the taxpayer-owned hotel.

Its angle "We deserve a city and a downtown that never sleeps". RIP Dallas uses video technology to provide the page viewers a visual presentation of the

local landmarks developed based on city incentives such as The Stone Leigh Hotel which opened in 1923, The Joule Hotel- a property renovation of the Dallas National Bank building and The Metropolitan Condos - a 1200 Main Tower property renovation in the Downtown area. Each of these projects were partly financed by the City with tax incentives contributions that ranged between \$4.3 and \$8.5 million dollars. RIP Dallas' view wants to have the law remain the same to allow the developers and the city the opportunity to work together to build the new Dallas.

For Raymond, the

approach taken by the city in these developments is virtually applauded. There are normal tax abatements programs. The one that are spoken of on the RIP Dallas site is what the City should have done. The risk of the hotel is with the private sector and not the taxpayer."

With only a few days until early voting starts on April 26 and only 2 weeks until the city election day, the opponents and proponents are helping the voters decide on the fate and financing of the Dallas Convention Center Hotel. To Build or not to Build? The fate of the convention center hotel rests in the hands of the voters on May 9.



Mary B. Talbert toured Texas promoting Liberty Loans and organizing NAACP branches in nine cities. By 1919 Texas had become the Association's leading state with 7,046 members and thirty-one branches.

Several events that year, however, revealed how far the state actually was from harmonious race relations. In July a Longview mob burned Black homes and businesses and beat a Negro teacher during "The Red Summer Riots". Soon afterward the state attorney general subpoenaed the Austin branch's records to scrutinize its right to conduct business in Texas.

When NAACP National Secretary John Shillady learned of the impending challenge, he traveled to Austin to meet with the appropriate state officials. Shillady soon found himself an unwelcomed visitor and after sustaining verbal abuse, a gang comprised in part of local officials brutally beat him. When the NAACP's Vice President protested this violent act, Gov. William Hobby blamed Shillady and recommended that the organization stay out of Texas.

By 1920, Texas led the nation in lynchings and amid this atmosphere of fear, many of the state's branches discontinued operations, with only five remaining active by 1923. Yet Texas, as William Pickens noted in 1932, "is a big territory with big possibilities".

In the late 1930's an extraordinary group of Black Texans began to organize and direct the

state's civil rights movement.

As they revived the five languid branches of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, they built a statewide organization, the Texas State Conference of Branches. Through this structure they mobilized local branches and coordinated their programs with the policies and strategies of the NAACP's national office in New York. They also planned and initiated lawsuits against racial discrimination in the areas of voting rights, jury service, employment, housing, education, and public accommodations.

One man whose vision of a statewide NAACP organization was especially influential: Antonio Maceo Smith. Not only was he instrumental in its development, but he also spearheaded its activities for two decades.

A gifted practitioner of the political arts of compromise and consensus, he combined the administrative talents of the bureaucrats with the promotional skills of an insurance executive. Confident and charismatic, he was above all an organizer.

Born in Texarkana in 1903, Maceo Smith was educated at Fisk University and New York University, where he received degrees in business. Returning to Texas in 1929 after the death of his father, Smith moved to Oklahoma City in 1932. In January of 1933, he came to Dallas to organize a life insurance company. There he rejuvenated the Negro Chamber of Commerce and

played a major role in obtaining and directing Negro participation in the Texas Centennial Exposition in Dallas.

By 1936 he became secretary of the Dallas NAACP branch and the Progressive Voters League. Through these activities he developed ties with key Negro leaders in Dallas and other cities. Increasingly, he thought in terms of statewide organizations. From Smith's discussions with other Black leaders came the decision to organize the State

Conference of NAACP Branches in 1937.

The first conference of the State NAACP convened at the Moorland Branch of the Dallas YNCA on June 18 and 19th, 1937. Delegates came from five branches: Houston, Dallas, Waco, San Antonio and Marshall.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DALLAS:

SECTION 1. That a special election is ordered to be held in the city of Dallas on Saturday, May 9, 2009, between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m., for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of the city a proposition on whether the Charter of the City of Dallas should be amended. The proposed amendments will affect only the section listed below and will read as set forth below (the new portions being underlined):

**CHAPTER XI. THE BUDGET AND FINANCIAL
PROCEDURE RELATING THERETO**

SEC. 15. MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP, FINANCING, CONSTRUCTION, OR OPERATION OF HOTEL OR OTHER LODGING FACILITY.

(a) The voters of the City of Dallas declare that direct or indirect participation by the city in the enterprise of owning, financing, constructing, or operating a hotel or other lodging facility would inappropriately divert valuable taxpayer dollars and other civic resources and attention from the provision of essential city services, which is the primary function of municipal government.

(b) Notwithstanding any other section of this Charter,

(i) no money or other property of the city may be used, directly or indirectly, or transferred to any third party, for the purpose of siting, financing, constructing, acquiring, leasing, or operating a hotel or other lodging facility, nor may the money, property, or credit of the city be lent for any such purpose;

(ii) the city may not create, authorize the creation of, sponsor, or authorize the issuance of bonds, notes, or other debt instruments by, any special-purpose governmental entity, or any nonprofit corporation (including but not limited to a local government corporation or a public facility corporation) for the purpose of siting, financing, constructing, acquiring, leasing, or operating a hotel or other lodging facility; and

(iii) within fifteen days after the adoption of this section, the city council shall, in accordance with state law,

(A) assume for the city the powers and duties of any local government corporation theretofore created or authorized by the city, if the creation or authorization of such corporation would have been prohibited by this section had it been in effect at the time such corporation was created or authorized; and

(B) alter the structure, organization, programs, and activities of any public facility corporation theretofore sponsored by the city, to prohibit such corporation from siting, financing, constructing, acquiring, leasing, or operating a hotel or other lodging facility except as exempted by subsection (c) of this section.

(c) This section does not prohibit:

(i) the adoption of a tax increment financing district or tax abatement agreement in accordance with state law;

(ii) the siting, financing, constructing, acquiring, leasing, or operating of a hotel or other lodging facility located wholly within the boundaries of the Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport;

(iii) a subsidy paid directly to the sponsor of a convention, meeting, or other event in consideration of the holding of the event in the city or the renting of hotel rooms in the city;

(iv) the sale or lease of city property to a bona fide third party for fair market value;

(v) the siting, financing, constructing, acquiring, leasing, or operating of a shelter, halfway house, jail, dormitory, or other facility not providing lodging to the general public;

(vi) the acquisition of a hotel or other lodging facility through foreclosure of a tax lien or other governmental lien, provided that the property is not thereafter used or transferred in violation of this section;

(vii) the approval through the city's land use regulatory process of a hotel or other lodging facility; or

(viii) the expenditure of city funds for lodging in connection with travel on official city business.

SECTION 2. That electronic and computerized voting systems must be used for voting at and on the date of the special election in compliance with the provisions of the Texas Election Code, as amended, and the vote must be upon an official ballot prepared in such a manner as will permit the voters to vote "Yes" or "No" upon the proposition submitted, with the proposition to be expressed on the official ballot in a form substantially as follows:

PROPOSITION NO. 1

Shall Chapter XI of the Charter of the City of Dallas be amended by adding Section 15 to: (1) prohibit the city from, directly or indirectly, using, lending, or transferring city money or property, or lending the city's credit, for the purpose of siting, financing, constructing, acquiring, leasing, or operating a hotel or other lodging facility; (2) prohibit the city from creating, authorizing, or sponsoring any special-purpose governmental entity or any non-profit corporation (including a local government corporation or a public facility corporation), or authorizing the issuance of bonds, notes, or other debt instruments by such special-purpose governmental entity or non-profit corporation, for the purpose of siting, financing, constructing, acquiring, leasing, or operating a hotel or other lodging facility; (3) require the city to assume the powers and duties of any existing local government corporation previously created or authorized by the city for the purpose of siting, financing, constructing, acquiring, leasing, or operating a hotel or other lodging facility; (4) require the city to alter the structure, organization, programs, and activities of any existing public facility corporation sponsored by the city and to prohibit such corporation from siting, financing, constructing, acquiring, leasing, or operating a hotel or other lodging facility; and (5) provide certain exceptions?

SEC. 16. VOTER APPROVAL REQUIRED FOR CERTAIN EXPENDITURES.

(a) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Charter, and to the maximum extent permitted by state law,

(i) the city shall not provide more than a total of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) in financial assistance to any private development project as defined herein unless the city has

(A) provided at least 65 days' public notice prior to approval of any such financial assistance, and

(B) obtained voter approval for such financial assistance if 500 or more Dallas residents have submitted a petition to the city secretary requesting such vote within 60 days of the posting of public notice.

(b) A "Private Development Project" is defined as one a primary purpose of which is to construct or aid in the construction, renovation, repair, alteration or remodeling of any hotel, convention center, luxury residential condominium, or retail facilities, and/or the infrastructure for any of the foregoing; except that, retail development of less than 50,000 square feet to serve subsidized residential development shall not be deemed a private development project.

(c) "Financial Assistance" includes any of the following:

(i) Grant of tax concessions or relief for the project;

(ii) Authorization of any form of debt or debt instrument by the city to support the project; or

(iii) Expenditure of public funds, or exchange, grant or below-market sale or lease of city-owned land for the project.

(d) "Voter Approval" shall be defined as a majority of those voting on the matter in the election. The vote shall occur at a regular election unless the city secretary calls a special election for such purpose.

(e) "City" shall include all entities created or controlled by the city of Dallas, including any special-purpose governmental entity or nonprofit corporation.

(f) "Public Notice" must include posting during the entire 65 days notice period on the city's website any proposed financial assistance to a private development project.

(g) Each provision and application of this measure shall be severable.

SECTION 2. That electronic and computerized voting systems must be used for voting at and on the date of the special election in compliance with the provisions of the Texas Election Code, as amended, and the vote must be upon an official ballot prepared in such a manner as will permit the voters to vote "Yes" or "No" upon the proposition submitted, with the proposition to be expressed on the official ballot in a form substantially as follows:

PROPOSITION NO. 2

Shall Chapter XI of the Charter of the City of Dallas be amended by adding Section 16 to: (1) prohibit the city of Dallas (including any special-purpose governmental entity, nonprofit corporation, and any other entity created or controlled by the city) from providing more than a total of \$1,000,000 in financial assistance (including any grant of tax concessions or relief; any authorization of debt or debt instruments; any expenditure of public funds; and any exchange, grant, or below-market sale or lease of city-owned land) to any private development project (the primary purpose of which is to construct or aid in the construction, renovation, repair, alteration, or remodeling of any hotel, convention center, luxury residential condominium, or retail facility, or the infrastructure of any such facility), unless the city gives at least 65 days' public notice (including posting the notice on the city's website for the entire 65-day notice period) before approving the financial assistance and obtains voter approval for the financial assistance at a regular or special election when voter approval is required by a petition that is signed by at least 500 residents of the city and filed with the city secretary within 60 days after the public notice is posted; (2) exempt from the financial assistance restrictions any retail development of less than 50,000 square feet that serves a subsidized residential development; and (3) provide a severability clause?

around the world braced for them.

Dr. Richard Besser, the acting chief of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, said in Atlanta there were 91 confirmed cases in ten states, with 51 in New York, 16 in Texas and 14 in California. Two cases have been confirmed in Kansas, Massachusetts and Michigan, while single cases have been reported in Arizona, Indiana, Nevada and Ohio.

State officials in Maine said laboratory tests had confirmed three cases in that state, although those had not yet been included in the CDC count. And the Pentagon said that a Marine in southern California had tested positive for the disease.

In Washington, Homeland Security Secretary

Janet Napolitano was questioned closely by senators about whether the U.S. should close its border with Mexico, where the outbreak apparently began and the casualties have been the greatest.

She repeated the administration's position that questioning of people at borders and ports of entry was sufficient for now and said closing borders "has not been merited by the facts."

The WHO said the phase 5 alert means there is sustained human to human spread in at least two countries. It also signals that efforts to produce a vaccine will be ramped up.

Just Monday, the WHO had raised the alert level from 3 to 4. The organization is part of the United Nations.


