film, The Princess and the Frog, set for release this Christmas. Media mogul Oprah Winfrey will play Tiana's mother, the *Herald Sun* reports.

Among the racially charged changes made to the film include a shift in Tiana's profession from a chambermaid to an aspir-

ing restaurateur; the character's original name, Maddy, was changed because some critics argued it was too similar to "mammy," a disparaging term for Black women.

The controversy boiled over after it was revealed that Tiana would find love in an olive-skinned,

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Meeting the Basic Welfare of Society

The most important moment of the 2008 presidential debates was one that was little remarked upon at the time. It was in the second debate that the candidates were asked whether health care was "a privilege, a right or a responsibility." Sen. John McCain said it was a responsibility -- of government and business. But Sen. Barack Obama said that it "should be a right for every American" and cited as "fundamentally wrong" his mother's experience of being denied payment for her treatments as she lay dying of cancer.

What was important about Obama's comment was not just his commitment to guaranteeing access to health care for every American but that the would-be President had framed a social good - in this case, health care – in terms of a human right.

Americans typically think of rights in terms of the traditional civil and political rights guaranteed in the U.S. Constitution: such things as freedom of speech, press and religion; racial equality; and due process. But the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR), which the U.S. voted for in 1948, has much more robust understanding of rights, encompassing such economic and social rights as the right to education, to work, and, indeed, to health care. Article 25 of the UDHR, for example, says that "Everyone has a right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and his family, including food, clothing, housing and medical care."

This doesn't mean that governments are required to hand out free housing and medical care to everyone. The old anxiety that by recognizing social and economic rights we invite socialism is foolish.

What it does mean is that government and other institutional centers of power are required to structure access to basic human needs (food, clothing, housing, work and health care) in ways that make them available to people in proportion to their capacities. Notice the reference to "other institutional centers of power." The obligations imposed by human rights do not end at the doors of city hall, the state house or the

U.S. Capitol. The National Committee for Responsive Philanthropy (NCRP), on whose board I sit, has developed its Criteria for Philanthropy at Its Best, including its recommendation that grant-makers "provide at least 50 percent of [their] grant dollars to benefit lower-income communities, communities of color and other marginalized groups, broadly defined" and at least 25 percent "to promote equity, opportunity and justice in our society."

NCRP's criteria do not tell foundations exactly how to spend their dollars. But they do recognize that the possession of power entails an obligation to meet basic human needs or, in other words, to help fulfill fundamental human rights.

Government can't do that alone. Corporations can help. But grant-makers, too, have a critical role to play. President Obama has reframed at least one critical need, health care, as a right and promised to see to its fulfillment. It is time now for foundations and other grant-makers as well to see their missions, diverse and complicated as they may be, in terms of meeting the basic welfare of society.

Childhood Immunization Requirements Change for 2009-2010 School Year

The State of Texas has adopted new immunization requirements for students in Texas elementary and secondary schools. Beginning with the 2009-2010 school year, all kindergarten students will be required to have two doses of Varicella vaccine, two doses of MMR vaccine, and two doses of the Hepatitis A vaccine prior to enrollment.

Also students entering the Seventh grade in the 2009-2010 school year are now required to have the Meningococcal vaccine, two doses of the Varicella vaccine, and a booster dose of the Tdap vaccine prior to enrollment.

"This new law greatly impacts all children entering kindergarten and 7th grade across the state,"

states Zachary Thompson, DCHHS Director. "We encourage parents to bring their children in now to ensure that their children's immunizations are current and up-to-date prior to the start of the new school year," Thompson continued.

Varicella or Chickenpox vaccine is the best way to prevent chickenpox. Vaccination not only protects vaccinated persons, it also reduces the risk for exposure in the community for persons unable to be vaccinated because of illness, including those who may be at greater risk for severe disease.

While no vaccine is 100% effective in preventing disease, the chickenpox vaccine is very effective: about 8 to 9 of every 10

people who are vaccinated are completely protected from chickenpox.

In addition, the vaccine almost always prevents against severe disease. If a vaccinated person does get chickenpox, it is usually a very mild case lasting only a few days and involving fewer skin lesions (usually less than 50), mild or no fever, and few other symptoms.

Measles is the most deadly of all childhood rash/fever illnesses. The disease spreads very easily, so it is important to protect against infection. To prevent measles, children (and some adults) should be vaccinated with the measles, mumps, and rubella vaccine. Two doses of this vaccine are needed for complete protection.

Hepatitis A is a liver disease caused by the hepatitis A virus (HAV). Hepatitis A can affect anyone. Vaccines are available for long-term prevention of HAV infection in persons 1 year of age and older. Good personal hygiene and proper sanitation can also help prevent the spread of Hepatitis A.

Meningococcal vaccines protect against most types of meningococcal disease, although they do not prevent all cases.

Tetanus (lockjaw) is a serious disease that causes painful tightening of the muscles, usually all over the body. It can lead to "locking" of the jaw so the victim cannot open his mouth or swallow. Tetanus leads to death in about 1 in 10 cases

Diphtheria causes a thick covering in the back of the throat. It can lead to breathing problems, paralysis, heart failure, and even death.

Whooping cough — known medically as pertussis — is a highly contagious respiratory tract infection. Although it initially resembles an ordinary cold, whooping cough may eventually turn more serious, particularly in infants.

Whooping cough is most contagious before the coughing starts. The best way to prevent it is through vaccinations. The child-hood vaccine is called DTaP. The whooping cough booster vaccine for adolescents and adults is called Tdap. Both protect against whooping cough,

tetanus, and diphtheria.

DCHHS offers childhood immunizations from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, on the first floor of the DCHHS building, Stemmons N. Freeway. The clinic is open Wednesdays from 8 a.m.—6 p.m. While the cost is \$10 for children on their first visit and \$5 for children who have previously visited the clinic, no one will be refused service due to their inability to

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DFW International Airport To Receive Stimulus Funds For Runway Renovations

(NDG Wire) DFW International Airport recently received a second grant from the federal stimulus bill, known officially as the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) of 2009. The stimulus funds, which will be distributed by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), total \$8.8 million and will be used for

the renovation of Runway 13L/31R, including lighting and surface repairs.

DFW CEO Jeff Fegan thanked U.S. Rep. Eddie Bernice Johnson of Dallas for her assistance in securing the grant.

"We appreciate Congresswoman Johnson's continuing support to DFW as the economic engine of North Texas," said Jeff

Fegan, CEO of DFW. "We continue to enhance the infrastructure of our Airport and rehabilitate its existing structures to benefit our passengers and the region."

DFW will use the new funding for the second phase of its rehabilitation project on runway 13L/31R. The funding grant will go into a capital account specifically earmarked for

improvements. Federal grants are not part of the Airport's annual operating budget.

"This grant will help keep DFW extremely cost competitive for our airlines," added Fegan. "These funds will also mean new opportunities for local businesses to do more work at DFW."

DFW operates seven

runways and handles more than 650,000 takeoffs and landings per year.

DFW is one of about 3,400 airports designated as part of the national airport system eligible to receive ARRA funds. The FAA is moving swiftly to work with airports to ensure eligible projects have completed or nearly completed design and planning requirements.

Under ARRA, the FAA received \$1.1 billion to allocate to qualified airports on a discretionary basis. Those funds will be distributed based on a project priority system that addresses airport safety and security, infrastructure, runway safety, increased capacity, and mitigation of environmental impact.

140 DAYS OF OPPORTUNITY

Education and Safety Discussed in the Legislature Last Week

It was a busy week for the Texas House of Representatives, who had an extended session last week in Austin as they met through Saturday, May 2.

The House committee started their review of the Senate's budget mid week; the Senate has been reviewing the House's version of the budget since Monday April 27 as well.

On Tuesday, April 28, the House passed House Bill (HB) 1736, also known as the Tim Cole Act. HB 1736 defines compensation for people who have been wrongly imprisoned in Texas. If the bill becomes law, people who were erroneously convicted will be entitled to \$80,000 for each year they were in prison, a monthly stipend for life, health care, and 120 hours of tuition at a state universi-

1736's Senate review started on Thursday, April 30, and is expected to pass the Senate quickly.

This bill is different from HB 498, which would create the Timothy Cole Innocence Commission; a commission to investigate wrongful convictions, handling of evidence, eye witness testimony, and establish more reliable policies for collecting evidence. HB 498 has been passed by both the House and the

Senate last month and is expected to be signed into law by Governor Rick Perry soon.

Also on Tuesday the House passed HB 1257. The bill allows small businesses a tax extension if their business was damaged in a natural disaster. The bill would give businesses a financial break in the aftermath of a disaster by allowing the business to pay their property taxes quarterly instead of in a lump sum by January 31 of every year.

HB 1257 was received by the Senate for review on Wednesday, April 29, and was referred to the Senate Finance Committee on Friday, May 1.

On April 29 the House also passed two bills to the

The first, HB 960 by Rafael Anchia, would allow cities access to the FBI's National Crime Information Center database to do background checks on people who have applied for a permit to open a sexual oriented business.

Anchia said, "This bill gives cities and counties a much-needed tool in their ongoing effort to protect communities against the bad actors in the sexually oriented business industry."

The second bill passed on Wednesday was HB 1799. This bill requires electric companies to print

The website lists all electric service providers and their rates for an area so consumers can make an informed decision about their electricity provider. The bill is designed to keep prices low and competitive state wide by letting consumers know how to easily see all options and available information to them when choosing a utility company.

Both bills, HB 960 and HB 1799, were received by the Senate, but as of Friday, May 1, are not scheduled for review.

On Friday, May 1, Governor Perry signed HB 873 into law. HB 873 promotes the entertainment industry in Texas by providing tax breaks for film makers if they decide to film in Texas. The bill's goal is to draw more movie and television projects to Texas generating revenue for the state, creating jobs, and encouraging tourism.

The Senate was also productive last week. On Monday, April 27, the Senate's State Affairs Committee reviewed Senate Bill (SB) 1164, which would allow students who have a concealed hand gun license to carry their fire arms to classes on university campuses and keep guns uled for any further action. in dorms.



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The Restoration of Hope Revitalizing West Dallas

Mayor Tom Leppert joined with three local non-profit organizations to officially launch the West Dallas Restoration Collaborative Project on Saturday May 1 at 3200 Puget Street. A lot of land near Singleton Boulevard and Hampton Road, once a sore reminder of the downward spiral of the West Dallas area, is now a glimpse of hope for community and the city atlarge.

Over the last threeyears, Builders of Hope, Habitat for Humanity and the Dallas Faith Communities Coalition partnered on the initiatives to return the joy of affordable home ownership, increase the economic development and to restore a sense of community back to this area of Dallas widely known for its high drug and crime rate.

Staged in a large, grassy vacant lot just behind the homes, the purpose of this event was to celebrate the milestone acquisition and elimination of forty-two dilapidated and vacant residential properties slated to be replaced with new and renovated homes for working families. Both public and private sector contributors spoke of the future and present value of this partially realized community investment.

Builders of Hope, a certified housing counseling organization and community housing development organization whose focus is on the West Dallas area, is one of the groups leading the charge.

"We are transforming neighborhoods like West Dallas to neighborhoods of hope and home ownership," said Norman Henry, the president of Builders of Hope CDC.

"It hinders the

progress of neighborhoods when there are drug-ridden houses. We have to deal with the blighted, abandoned and vacant properties in order for redevelopment to occur." Their goal is to make West Dallas a viable option for homebuyers through the building of homes on vacant lots, renovating existing residences and the offering of homebuyer education programs.

Scott Begin, chief executive officer of the Habitat Dallas for Humanity shares the mission of Builders and synced their resources to help reshape the western corner of the city. "We know that by building multiple houses in these neglected areas, we are creating a sense of pride for these new home-owners and their neighbors, impacting crime and bringing new businesses," he stated.

Habitat for Humanity, a Christian Ministry, is the largest non-profit homebuilder in the city of Dallas and has served 600 low-income families and invested \$50 million in 20 Dallas county neighborhoods to rebuild communities since 1986.

Leppert begin with applause for the community organizations and funding partners. "This is a celebration of what we can do," said Leppert.

"The City of Dallas is very focused on revitalizing neighborhoods that are centered on affordable housing. This investment is going to spur more and really change the community. When you have ownership and people are involved in the community and have their heart in it, it reduces crime, increases education and brings together all those things that make a community."

The communities and families were common threads weaved into the many conversations.

Builders of Hope have even incorporated a compensation plan for the members of the community to rebuild their own neighborhoods. He stated members of the community would rebuild the houses demolished.

"This will enable them to give back to the com-

munity and it will break the cycle." The citizens will be earning wages, which can reduce crime rate. By building their own homes, per Henry, it will create a sense of pride and a desire to protect your own property. "We pay them more than minimum wage," said Henry. "As a result, we are able to produce housing that is more affordable."

With the significant funding and resources of The Rees-Jones Foundation and Mr. Ray Nixon, the three non-profits were recently able purchase 26 properties from a landlord to further their project goal to the tune of about \$1 million dollars. This is the first step in their journey and increased their capacity to do more.

"Today we are making a new commitment to build 300 new and renovated homes in West Dallas in the next four years," said Phil Wise of the Dallas Faith Communities Coalition. "We are here to not only change communities but to change families. We are doing this one family at a time."

City of Dallas District #3 Councilman, Steve Salazar, estimated that the addition of forty-two homes could annually bring about at least \$1.3 million dollars into the West Dallas area if each household earned at least \$30,000 per year. "There is nothing more exciting to see families contributing to West Dallas and spending their money here," said Salazar.

The sound of the bull-dozers was the closing remark as Irby Walton, Sr., a demolition contractor of more than 30 years, demolished the first house. "It feel goods every time I tear one of these down."

Henry summed, "This is a great day for West Dallas!"

This marks the final production of its last full season in the historic Kalita Humphreys Theatre designed by famed architect, Frank Lloyd Wright. Expanded to a full length musical, Sarah, Plain and Tall is based on the award-winning novella by Patricia MacLachlan, and is directed by Joe Calarco. Think Little House on the Prairie meets Oklahoma!

The story opens with

Sarah Wheaton (Becca Ayers) a free-spirited young fisherwoman from Maine and her weak-willed brother William (Kenneth Boys) as he's about to marry the shallow, overindulged Estelle (Kate Loprest). Finding her honeymoon love nest a bit too crowded, Estelle cajoles William to convince Sarah to answer a personal ad placed by a widowed Kansas farmer. The farmer, Jacob Witting (Herndon Lackey) is looking for a new wife as well as a surrogate mother for his two children.

After arriving on Jacob's farm, Sarah soon discovers that Maine is a long way from Kansas, and not just geographically speaking. Her days spent fishing are all but over since the closest shoreline happens to be the one that surrounds the muddy pond where the cattle bathe. Though Sarah is undeterred, Jacob begins to wonder if luring this fish out of water was such a good idea. Jacob's children, Anna and Caleb, are divided over their new guest. Caleb (Max Ary) immediately takes to Sarah becomes staunchest supporter, whereas Anna (Kate Wetherhead) does not cotton to the idea of someone replacing her deceased mother. The bills passed by the Senate have been received by the House, but as of Friday, May 1, none have been scheduled yet for review.

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
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

Your Gut Wants A Meeting

Have you ever had a knot in your stomach? It's a commonly accepted indicator that something is amiss. You're stressed about a decision. It's a warning of sorts. Perhaps you're about to hire the wrong person or take your team into perilous territory. The tension in your belly is part of your intuitive physical system communicating, "Danger ahead. Redirection is needed!"

Many scientists believe we have two brains. The one between our ears, and the lesser known, but equally important one in our gut. They communicate with each other. When your head gets upset, your stomach takes notice and vice versa.

Do a Gut Check!

The next time you're faced with a decision, large or small, check in with your gut. Does an option you're considering feel off, or right, in your belly?

Is your stomach tied in knots at the thought of making an offer to the person you just interviewed or does it feel relaxed and at ease?

Here are some questions to ask:

- Is there an alternative that feels better?
- Is this the right time to make this decision? Does waiting a few hours, (days, weeks or months) feel better?
- Do I need more information before making this decision?
 - Does the whole thing feel wrong? Or just part of it?
 - What would make this decision feel right?

Is there a question or issue that keeps coming to mind that you've been dismissing? Pay attention to it. Bring it to your conscious awareness and check in with your gut. It may provide some valuable information about the correct course of action.

Intuition is a skill that, when practiced, can be honed to perfection. Imagine having a reliable "gut check" meter you can use each time you need to make a decision! As you've been reading this book, you may have begun to recognize the primary way you receive intuitive messages.

The term "gut feeling" is often used generically for a whole host of other body sensations. Physical sensations are a huge part of our intuitive guidance system. When I asked people to describe their "gut" feeling in more detail, I received a surprising variety of answers.

- A vibration through my whole body
- A mild electric zing
- · Chills up and down my spine
- · A warm surge of energy though my body
- A buzzing around my head
- "Goosebumps" on my arms
- · My left knee hurts
- My stomach knots up
- Indigestion
- Generalized tension in my body that wasn't there previously
 - · Cold feet

There were many more answers, but suffice to say, the body's owner was aware when they were receiving an intuitive communication.

One entrepreneur I spoke with said she was contemplating taking on a new piece of business. However, when

ever she picked up the phone to dial the prospective client

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and say "yes" she felt like "someone pulled the plug on my energy." She ended up turning the client down. So, how do you learn to interpret these physical messages? First, simply be aware of what's going on with your own body. Think back to a successful decision you've made over the past few days. How did it feel in your body? Where did you feel it? How would you describe the sensation? Repeat this same set of questions with an unsuccessful decision.

According to Disney, the film follows Tiana as she is transformed into a frog and travels deep into the bayous of Louisiana to find a cure from a voodoo


The Herald Sun quoted unnamed Disney source, who blasted claims that voodoo references and New Orleans setting propagate Black stereotypes.




