On Monday, June 8, the Plano Fire Department held a press conference along with area fire chiefs to express their concerns regarding the passage of Senate Bill 1410. The bill was opposed by several prominent groups such as the Texas fire chiefs

Association and the Texas Fire Marshal's Association. However, despite their concerns the bill passed the Senate on April 7 and with amendments received approval in the House on May 29 on the eve of the end of the leg-

2009, major league baseball will hold its annual Civil Rights Game in my hometown of Cincinnati, Ohio.

The game was previously held in Memphis, Tenn., the city in which our most notable civil rights leader, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., was assassinated in 1968. The game is the crowning event of a weekend comprising several

other activities to celebrate the Civil Rights struggle in America.

There will be awards, panel discussions, dialogues, and a Youth Summit on the city's downtown Fountain Square, featuring TV stars, former Major League players, and local personalities.

Former President Bill Clinton will deliver the speech at the Awards

Luncheon honoring my personal hero, Muhammad Ali, along with Hank Aaron, and Dr. Bill Cosby.

Who knows? Maybe President Obama will throw out the first pitch, especially since our Mayor, Mark Mallory, did such a poor job of it on opening day of 2007. It's going to be a big deal, folks, and it's happening in Cincinnati, Ohio.

You may recall Cincinnati in 2001-2004. In my book, Black-O-Knowledge, Stuff we need to know, the section titled, Home Cookin', describes the state of my city during that period. You may recall that, in this city where the 2009 Civil Rights Game will be played, there was civil unrest and a national boycott after Timothy Thomas, a Black man, was killed by a "frightened" White police officer; and even prior to that killing there was Roger Owensby, a Black man, not even wanted by police, who was choked to death by overzealous white officers during his arrest.

You may even recall a Black man named Nathaniel Jones who was killed by police officers on December 3, 2003. And, you probably have never heard of Lorenzo Collins, a Black man who was holding a brick and surrounded by 15 police officers, two of whom shot and killed him for some strange reason. Or, you may want to do a Google search on

Michael Carpenter, a Black man who was shot in the back of his head by a White police officer while Carpenter was sitting in his car trying to obey the cop's order to exit. Not one day of jail time was done for those murders.

While Cincinnati is known for many Civil Rights issues, those are just a few of the most egregious. The Cincinnati Reds with the support of Major League Baseball (MBL), while they will look at the history of Civil Rights, will also consider the current status and, I am told, make plans to contribute to better relationships among people of different backgrounds. Commendable objectives, to be sure, but the Reds have a big job ahead.

Margaret Kimberly, in an article on *Black Commentator* (2003), wrote, "My father tells the story of going to see a Reds game as a boy and buying ice cream with his brother. After making their purchase they were ordered to eat outside.

It isn't an occurrence associated with northern states, but as my mother says, Ohio is 'up south'.

Unfortunately, the perception of Cincinnati, is still that it is "up south," a city that really doesn't care much for Black people.

Did you see the episode of "Girlfriends" when the couple was stranded in Cincinnati during a snowstorm and one of the sisters asked, "Isn't that the city where they kill Black men?" (Admittedly, things have improved somewhat with the signing of the Collaborative Agreement, thanks to the Racial Profiling Lawsuit filed and won by the Cincinnati Black United Front in 2002.)

Even more unfortunate though is the reality of discrimination, inequity, injustice, and economic exclusion for many of us who live here. Thus, as I suggested to our City Council, during a public meeting on the disparities that exist in the city's contracting system, it is interesting that we are having a Civil Rights Baseball game in a city that continues to commit "Civil Wrongs" against its Black citizens, 48 percent of its population.

For every problem there is an opportunity, with challenges of course, but opportunities nonetheless. The Civil Rights Baseball Game and all of its accoutrements, dignitaries, and media coverage, can be a springboard for positive "change" in our city, if it is viewed and used not only as a moneymaking event but also as an instrument to win our new civil rights struggle: Economic Empowerment.

The culmination of freedom for Black people in this country is economic freedom, which comes from access to economic opportunity via education, training, equitable treatment, and, of course, collective work and responsibility, and cooperative economics on our part.

While I hope and pray something positive will come from this event, as Patrick Henry said, "I have but one lamp by which my feet are guided, and that is the lamp of experience. I know of no way of judging the future but by the past."

Black folks in Cincinnati have experienced many disappointments in this city after race and civil rights dialogues, discussions, and roundtables. So we must keep our feet on the gas pedal when it comes to our options in response to mistreatment and disparity.

To those who are coming to our city for the game, we want you to enjoy yourselves but we also want you to know what is happening to Black people. You can help if you are so inclined, or you can come and go without having said or done anything to make positive change.

Regardless of what nonresidents do when they are here, we who live here understand quite well what we must do, so if you see or hear something pertaining to Civil Wrongs during the Civil Rights Game, having read this, you will at least understand why.

islative session.

If enacted the law would no longer allow a municipality to enact an ordinance, bylaw, order, building code or rule requiring the installation of a multipurpose residential fire protection sprinkler system or any other fire sprinkler protection system in a new or existing one or two family dwelling.

The City of Plano's current code requires dwellings of 6,000 square feet or more to have residential sprinklers. Many of the other nearby communities have similar requirements. The fire officials are particularly concerned by the fact the bill will rescind the Texas tradition of "Home Rule" whereby local officials and citizens have retain control on fire and building code requirements.

According to information provided at the press conference when sprinklers are used in conjunction with smoke alarms, the risk of dying in a home fire are reduced by 82%. They are also 98% effective in containing a fire even before the fire department arrives.

Dallas Deputy Chief Joe Pierce stated, "Residential fire sprinklers saves lives. It is safer for fire fighters as well. However, the facts are that children, elderly and minorities die in fires and this is a cheap thing to do."

Newly elected Plano Mayor Phil Dyer was also in attendance at the press conference to lend support to the fire fighters and Plano's 260,000 residents. Mayor Dyer indicated, "I don't want to go to a funeral that is unnecessary families or fire fighters."

Advocates for the legislation of the bill include the Home Builders Association of Greater Dallas. Speaking by phone, Phil Crone, the Director of Govern-

ment Relations stated the home builders are also considering the welfare safety of Texas home buyers. He indicated, the cost issue also translates into a life safety issue. Accord-ing to a study by Texas A&M, for every \$1,000 added to the cost of a home approximately 28,000 buyers are priced out of an ability to buy a home. As a result

Crone indicated, "if you price all of these house-holds out of the market, you are leading them into an older home, which is more likely to have casualty and fire safety issues."

The sprinklers are estimated to add \$4,000 to the cost of the property and would result in over 100,000 homebuyers becoming unable to buy a

home.

The Texas Home-builders Association believes the homeowners should have the right to choose if they want to install the sprinklers. He counters the municipalities claim of local control with, "the greatest form of local control is the individual homeowner to decide whether they want this sys-

tem in their home."

Crone also stressed the new law would not impact any local ordinances in place before January 1, 2009.

Governor Rick Perry has not signed the bill into law, nor indicated if he plans to sign or veto the legislation.



# The City of Irving Says: Yes We Can...Have a Minority and Women **Business Enterprise Program**

The 2000 United States Census reported Texas was the fourth state to have a non-white majority population and concluded 50.2 percent Texans were minorities, according to an on-line MSNBC report.

One might ask, why it took Irving over 100 years to adopt a program that supports equal business opportunities for Minority and Women owned businesses. Anthony Bonds, Community Activist and Founder of Irving NAACP, did ask that question. Bonds states, "I have pursued the City of Irving to adopt a Minorty and Women Business Enteprise (M/WBE) program for 14 years and I am glad we have a City Manager who is in favor of this program.'

In January 2007, the Irving City Council unanimously adopted the Council Resolution No. 1-11-07-021 to demonstrate commitment to the inclusion of minority and women owned business participation in all its procurement processes. The resolution outlined three objectives: Establish a policy to provide equal opportunity in the city's procurement process for construction, professional services, other services and goods; Create and implement a formal compliance procedure for monitoring the M/WBE participation and goals; and Build community confidence to ensure there will be no discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin or sex in the award of contracts.

The purpose for the M/WBE program is to ensure minority and women owned businesses

are actively solicited and given an equal opportunity to compete and participate as strategic partners and suppliers of goods and services within the City of


Ramiro Lopez, Director of Environmental Services, states "The city leaders are committed to supporting the program because we know this is the right thing to do. This initiative will also encourage positive competition, increase awareness of our city, and offer savings for the city because it allows smaller minority and women owned firms with less overhead to participate."

The leadership recognizes the cultural change that has occurred in the city of Irving. "Irving Independent School District serves students that speak 54 different languages. This fact alone proves Irving is a diverse community. We understand it has taken the city some time to accept the cultural change and are confident the vision and plan of the City Manager, Tommy Gonzalez will be effective and successful,"



"We want to find an individual who has a strong partnership with the business community, strong community involvement, and the ability to come in and hit the ground running," states Lopez. The City of Irving is accepting applications and hoping to have the position filled within the next 60 days.

Lopez is very optimistic about the program despite challenges encountered within its first two years. One of the challenges they want to address by fiscal year 2010 is developing a centralized purchasing process as an effort to simplify the current system.

According to Lopez the current system can be complicated due to the many departments overseeing the procurement process. "For example, if a contractor is submitting for a project that falls within the Engineering Department, than the Purchasing Agent within that department oversees that process and the same applies for proj-

of past perceptions left by former city leaders is the major challenge the City of Irving's Purchasing Department is working hard to change. Ed Purchasing Matthews. Manager, states "We are meeting our goal of awarding 26 percent of the bids to M/WBE firms, but the response is only 18 percent of M/WBE firms submitting bids. I am very passionate about seeing the percentage of M/WBE firms increased in responding to the bids we solicit. There is one out of five M/WBE firms who are actually submitting bids and we are committed to changing those numbers."

Efforts the Purchasing

Department is making to increase awareness and response include: having Open Houses that gives M/WBE firms an opportunity to address questions and/or concerns; providing specialized workshops that offer training that will help improve their business practices: maintaining updates for bid solicitation on the City of Irving's website (www.cityofirving. org/purchasing/bids-table-2.html ); and sending notifications to all M/WBE associations to ensure firms are consistently aware of city projects available for bid.

Since the inception of the M/WBE program, there have been 25.9 percent contracts awarded to M/WBE firms. Muniz Construction, Inc., RKM Utility Services, Inc., McMahon Contacting, LP are a few of the over 20 M/WBE firms that were awarded contracts that totaled to over 16 million dollars within the first and second quarter of the 2009 Fiscal Year.

One of the most recent M/WBE firms who were awarded a contract was MACVAL, LLC. The firm

was hired to oversee sewerage repairs and installation for sections one-three for the City of Irving. The project was an estimated 1.1 million dollar project and MACVAL, LLC submitted the lowest bid. "We were able to win the bid by submitting a lower bid of \$868.664.25 and we were so excited to win the contract after addressing some minor discrepancies that occurred during the bidding process. I know the program is new and the city is working to simplify the process, but overall the experience was good and we are glad our organization could benefit from the M/WBE program," states Aloysius Attah, Certified Professional Engineer and Owner/CEO of MACVAL, LLC.

The true success of the program is measured by accomplishing a community where race is not an issue and equal opportunity is afforded to everyone. This is ultimately the long term vision of the M/WBE program and it is a sentiment that the City of Irving leaders want to communicate and execute throughout the entire city.

Oscar winner Denzel Washington and John Travolta co-star in director Tony Scott's latest film, *The Taking of Pelham 1 2 3.* Denzel elevates the film with his nuanced performance. Perhaps the bigger suprise is Travolta's in your face turn as the lead hijacker of a New York City subway train. Certainly Travolta has played the bad guy before, but this is a much harder, edgier role for him.

What begins as just an average day at work for Bernard Garber (Washington) becomes a life or death experience. Garber is a former executive currently under investigation, and thus demoted to subway dispatcher. His day is turned upside down when Ryder (Travolta) methodically takes over a subway train

and demands money in exactly one hour. Ryder promises for every minute the money is late, he will kill one of the nineteen hostages. When he refuses to deal with the hostage negotiater played by John Turturro, Garber is thrust into the role. The action is great and not overplayed. However, the film thrives on the faceoff between Garber and Ryder.

Now ladies let me warn you this is not the chiseled and sexy Denzel you have come to know and love over the years. In fact, it's a little jolting to see Denzel's midlife spread on the large screen. However, the other characteristics we love about Denzel shines through: his intelligence, humility and humanity. There are at least two scences that might require kleenex, and with a lesser actor the moments

might feel cheesy. However, Denzel and his costars draw you into the moment and you become enveloped in their fear.

Director Tony Scott filled out the cast with familar faces who each provide solid performances including Mr. Tony Soprano himself, James Gandolfini as the mayor of New York City. Luis Guzman is Phil Ramos, and he uses his knowledge about the subway trains to help Ryder execute his plan to hijack a subway train.



# The Sporty 2009 Lincoln MKS

Lincoln hasn't always kept up with the competition in the luxury sedan segment, but now, Ford's premium division is trying again with the 2009 Lincoln MKS; the company's new full-size flagship.

The 2009 Lincoln MKS comes in two trim levels: front-wheel drive and AWD. Standard features on both include 18-inch wheels; heated power sideview mirrors with memory and auto-dimming on the driver side; xenon HID headlamps; cruise control; a new capless fuel-filling system (used previously on the Ford GT and now appearing on new models); and a sleek, inconspicuous touchpad entry sys-

tem.

Inside, the MKS features include the standard Ford's voice-activated Sync system, a tilt/telescoping power steering wheel with memory, dual-zone automatic climate control, a rear center armrest with pass-through slot and an eight-speaker stereo with an in-dash six-CD changer, satellite radio and an auxiliary audio jack. Interior design is on par with other cars in this segment, featuring standard leather upholstery and an attractive dash layout. Lincoln's heated and ventilated 12-way power front seats are a nice touch, as are the MKS's standard rear heated seats. Both frontwheel-drive and AWD trim levels share the same powertrain, a 3.7-liter V6 matched to a six-speed automatic transmission. EPA fuel economy estimates for the 2009 Lincoln MKS are 17/24-mpg city/highway for the front-wheel-drive model and 16/23 for AWD. The MKS comes standard with stability and traction control, front-seat side airbags, side curtain airbags and antilock brakes with brake assist.

At it's price based at a very reasonable \$37,665, the 2009 Lincoln MKS has some things going for and is a star when it comes to incabin entertainment and information sources. But you will have to be content with a comfortable, rather than sporty, ride.






The sales person attached the GPS to my car







