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Payday Lending Still Nation's Most Abusive Small Loan

While some economists and Wall Street traders see glimmers of an improving economy, a distinctly different perspective exists in America's heartland.

The number one concern

for people affected by layoffs or business closures is often whether unemployment benefits will last until a new job is secured. Others who watched their neighbors lose homes to foreclosure wonder whether their upside-down mortgage loans will ever be right-side-up again. Then there are students who heeded their parents urging to get a college education and now have a new diploma in one hand, a stack of student loans in the other and no job prospects on the horizon.

And despite several laws designed to ensure equality, when it comes to access to fair credit, being black in America still imposes an undeniable financial burden. Whether shopping for groceries, a car, a home, or in-

The American jobs crisis remains deep and real. Close to 15 million Americans are unemployed—26 million

counting the underemployed. Nearly half of all the jobless, a record 46 percent, have been unemployed for more than six months.

We don't even need statistics when we see our neighbors and friends losing work and watching their hours cut. According to a recent study by the Pew Research Center, more than half of all Americans have been im-

pacted by the Great Recession.

It is unprecedented for Congress to refuse to extend unemployment benefits in this time of need. But Republicans, looking toward the November elections, are acting in lockstep to block all efforts that could make things better and thus help the Democrats.

The consequences are profound. Our economy is at risk of a double dip recession unless we take steps now to deal with the lingering problems that are dragging the economy back down. Unemployment benefits are running out for millions of Americans—up to 5 million stand to lose their lifeline by the end of the year without an extension—and states are being forced to slash payrolls without essential aid from Congress.

The United States must invest in rebuilding our crumbling infrastructure, which will create good paying jobs and give our children the future they deserve. We must dedicate ourselves to creating good green jobs that update our power grid and help the environment while helping families. State and local governments need resources to keep people on the job and get people back to work. And we should put TARP money left from the bank bailouts to good use, by investing it in Main Street.

The counter argument to creating jobs is the national debt red herring, saying our economy can't afford to help millions of people until we've solved the deficit problem. The federal deficit is not an excuse for inaction. Most of our deficit today stems from the economic crisis, President George W. Bush's tax cuts for the rich and the cost of two wars that were never paid for.

It's time to let our representatives know that we are tired of Congressional inaction. Rather than cutting back, let's use our resources to put America back on track.

Plano Celebrates 20th Anniversary of Americans with Disabilities Act

City of Plano Mayor Phil Dyer will join Dallas Mayor Tom Leppert in proclaiming July 26, 2010 as Americans with Disabilities (ADA) Act Awareness Day commemorating the 20th Anniversary of the act's inception. The act has been hailed as a momentous civil rights law for the disabled community, striving to eliminate both architectural and cultural barriers for disabled citizens and caregivers.

"Plano staff was very proactive in addressing accessibility for citizens of all abilities actively engaging our community in 1989, a year before the 1990 ADA Act was signed into law." said Paul Glenn, Plano's Senior Facility Construction Coordinator. "We assembled a committee of Plano staff and citizens, many with varying disabilities, laying the foundation for municipal self-evaluation and transition plans to address the challenges faced by the mobility, hearing and visually impaired."

By 1992 Plano was actively remediating obstacles identified in all municipal the Dallas Chapter of the facilities and infrastructures, as well as addressing potential barriers in employment, public meetings and dissemination of information. "We worked as a team dedicated to understanding the new ADA and committed to removing existing architectural barriers," said Glenn. Plano assures compliance through an active municipal ADA Committee team with Deputy City Manager LaShon Ross serving as the

The cities of Plano and Dallas are partnering with

American Institute of Architects and the Texas Registered Accessibility Specialists Association in sponsoring the July 26 day of programming to enhance awareness of the law.

"We are proud to be an active partner in the development of ADA Awareness Day," said Glenn. "This is a day dedicated to not only awareness but to celebrate the free access to government, entertainment, employment and mobility shared by all."

Mayor Phil Dyer will present the City of Plano Proclamation during the July 26, 2010 City Council meeting, 1520 K Avenue, beginning at 7pm. Accepting the proclamation will be former TCU running back Kent Waldrep who sustained

a paralyzing spinal cord injury in a 1974 football game. He has since become a national champion for seeking cures for spinal cord injuries and paralysis. He will be giving a brief address regarding the impact of ADA policy.

Free preventive care benefits from health care reform

(NDG Wire) Last week Congresswoman Eddie Bernice Johnson applauded the new regulations issued by the Obama Administration to help make prevention affordable by requiring new health plans to cover recommended preventive services at no cost to the pa-The regulations, based off of provisions in the Affordable Care Act, will keep Americans healthier and help save money over the long term by increasing access to preventive care.

"We know that many Americans don't get the preventive care they need because of the cost. Seven in ten deaths in America result from chronic and often preventable diseases - this is unacceptable," said Congresswoman Johnson. "Thanks to the Affordable Care Act, free preventive care now will keep many Texans healthier and save money in the long run."

Americans who enroll

in a new health plan on or after September 23, 2010, will have access to preventive services without being charged a deductible, copayment or co-insurance.

Next year, an estimated 41 million Americans will benefit from these new prevention provisions -- 31 million in new employer plans and 10 million in new individual plans. By 2013, an estimated 88 million Americans will benefit from the provisions - 78 million in new employer plans and 10 million in new individual plans.

Comprehensive preventive care can save billions of dollars and thousands of lives. There are 69 million workers reporting missed days due to illness each year, which reduces economic output in this country by \$260 billion per year. Every dollar spent on immunizations could save \$5.30 on direct health care costs. However the costs of these services are often

prohibitive, and Americans currently use preventive services at only half the recommended rate.

"While Democrats are fighting to give all Americans access to free preventive care, Republicans are threatening to repeal this benefit and all of the benefits of historic health care reform," said Congresswoman Johnson. "This is one of the many important reforms Democrats created to save working families money and put them - not insurance companies - in control of their health care."

Depending on your age and health risks, the types of preventive services that will be available without a deductible, co-pay or co-insurance under these new provisions include:

- · Blood pressure, diabetes, and cholesterol tests;
- Many cancer screen-
- · Routine vaccines for diseases such as measles polio, or meningitis;

- Flu and pneumonia shots:
- · Counseling, screening and vaccines for healthy pregnancies; and
- Regular well-baby and well-child visits, from birth to age 21.

Americans are beginning to see the benefits of health reform. Seniors who affected by the Medicare prescription drug 'donut hole' coverage gap are receiving checks to lower their costs, 4 million small businesses have received notice that they are eligible for a health care tax credit potentially worth tens of thousands of dollars to help them cover their employees, young adults are starting to be allowed to stay on their parents' insurance, insurance companies have stopped their practice of rescissions – or dropping people's coverage when they need it most, and some outrageous premium hikes have been reversed.

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UNT Dallas senior awaits kidney transplant

(NDG Wire) When school starts Aug. 26, University of North Texas at Dallas senior David Delgado will need just one class to graduate in December with a degree in criminal justice, but his toughest assignment this year will come outside of the classroom.

Delgado was put on the national kidney transplant list, and he started kidney dialysis three days a week for three hours a day at the end of June. He goes to his doctor twice a month to have his kidneys monitored and has had to get several blood transfusions.

Born in Mexico, Delgado, now 28, has lived in Oak Cliff since he was three. He was a three-sport athlete at Adamson High School playing four years of baseball and two years of football and basketball. He said he was always active and never got sick.

But one morning last August while on vacation at Miramar Beach in Tampico, Mexico, Delgado woke up vomiting blood. He was taken to a doctor who informed him that he needed to see a specialist because his blood pressure was high and his red blood cells were attacking his white cells.

Delgado went to see a nephrologist, and after running tests, the doctor gave him the bad news: his kidneys were failing. He was diagnosed with IgA nephropathy, or Berger's disease. "This only happens to one in 10,000 people in the world," the doctor told him. "You're the unfortunate one."

IgA is a protein that helps the body fight infections. When too much of it builds up in the kidneys, it can cause the kidneys to leak blood and eventually to fail.

According to Dr. Darrin D'Agostino, chair and associate professor of internal medicine at the University of North Texas Health Science Center, the disease usually progresses slowly or not at all. It can exist undetected for years, and by the time symptoms appear, total kidney failure may be near. But only 25 percent of adults with Berger's disease develop end-stage kidney failure, D'Agostino said.

Berger's disease causes high blood pressure, high cholesterol, swelling of the hands and feet, and blood in the urine; so Delgado takes 10 pills a day.

"It's real strong medicine, so you kind of can't concentrate right, but you try to do the best," Delgado said. "You forget things sometimes. It's hard to concentrate in class and taking tests."

But the worst thing is the pain.

"I wake up sore. I go to sleep sore. It feels like somebody just hit my back really hard. Your back hurts all the time. You get nauseated in the morning throwing up. You lose a lot of weight. I've lost 50 pounds. Sometimes your face gets swollen in the morning because your kidneys are not processing the liquids."

He is not able to drink any alcohol and very few soft drinks, and he has to maintain a low sodium diet. "I don't eat that much outside. My wife does the cooking."

not the end of the world," he told her. After his diagnosis, he went to his priest and asked, "Why me?" His priest told him that things happen for a reason and that it could have been worse.

Delgado was put on the kidney transplant list after going through a series of have a lot of family support. I even have a couple of friends that have told me, 'If you need a kidney, I'll give it to you.' That makes me feel really good."

Last spring he had a biopsy done and had to miss two days of class. He called Assistant Professor of Criminal Justice Eric Coleman from his hospital bed to tell him that he wouldn't be in class. Coleman said he admired Delgado for calling him, especially from his hospital bed.

"I looked over at David in class one day and it became clear to me that I didn't have a problem, not when you think about what he is facing," Coleman said. "We encounter students that are not as engaged in coming to class and doing those things that they should be doing as a learner.

"Then you see David who is undergoing all of these personal life issues and crises but still performs at optimum levels and never misses. You don't encounter persons with those issues that have that sort of tenacity and spirit. Most people going through this would drop out of school, but this guy has stayed in. He inspires me."

Delgado said he has learned a lot from Coleman, not just as a professor but also as a regular person outside of class. "I told him that he's one of the best professors I've had in my college career."

UNT Dallas made it possible for him to get his degree, Delgado added. He had to take two classes at UNT and would have to get up at five in the morning to drive all the way to Denton.

"It's just really helpful having the Dallas campus here. I think it's a pretty good place, real good teachers. It's accessible. I think it's a pretty good campus," he said.

Delgado works full time for Smart Start installing ignition interlock devices on the cars of people charged with DWI. The system prevents cars from starting if it detects alcohol on a driver's breath. He hopes to land a job in corporate security after graduating in Decem-

Did he ever imagine something like this happening to him?

"No, I had big plans to start a family, finish my degree on time, travel and enjoy other things.

I like to travel a lot. My wife and I saved up money to go on trips. We've been fortunate to take trips to Europe

"I was a healthy guy. I don't do drugs. I don't do heavy drinking, nothing like that. It's sad that it happened, but like I said, it's something I have to get through."

Delgado said he had noticed on his driver's license the organ donation option and wondered why someone would agree to donate a kidney or a heart.

"Now I understand why."

The disease also causes anemia, which is difficult for someone who used to be so active. Sometimes when Delgado stands up his nose starts bleeding; and he can't exercise because he gets winded just walking the short distance from the parking lot into the UNT Dallas building.

Delgado told his wife, Martha,—a kindergarten teacher at Rosemont Elementary School—that they had to get through this. "It's psychological tests. He said he wasn't depressed after his diagnosis but that it is always on his mind, making it hard to concentrate.

"I'm going to have to take medicine for the rest of my life, and a kidney transplant is not a sure thing either because the body can reject the kidney. You can die."

Delgado tries to focus on the hope of getting a new kidney, and surviving.

"I haven't lost hope. I



surance, African-Americans often pay what should be illegal mark-ups. Moreover, a range of predatory products such as payday lenders, pawn shops and auto title loans are often more visible than any other retail operation.

According to Center for Responsible Lending research, each year, \$5 billion is taken from the pockets of working families to pay for interest on loans from one of 24,000 payday lenders now in operation.

This figure surpasses the number of McDonald's or Burger King Restaurants nationwide. The average payday borrower has nine repeat loans per year, which means he or she pays \$450 in interest on a \$300 loan.

In a recent edition of the NAACP's Crisis Magazine, Keith Corbett, executive

vice-president for the Center for Responsible Lending (CRL) put payday lending a historical context.

"I think payday lending is the Jim Crow issue of our time" said Corbett. "The payday lenders come in, and they charge the minimum of 400 percent interest. They borrow money from banks at cheap rates, then they loan it to people in the community at really high rates."

The irony is that despite seventeen states and the District of Columbia having enacted double-digit interest rate caps, the payday industry continues to find ways to evade state laws and continue its predatory lending - even in the face of resounding voter mandates to the con-

Real financial reform will only occur when legislation

and regulation is available at both the state and federal levels of government.

In the meantime, states are well-poised to enact legislation that addresses the core abuse of payday prod-

According to Hilary Shelton, NAACP Senior Vice-President for Advocacy, "The answer, really, is usury caps. You have to limit the amount of the annual percentage rate. There are states that cap the APR at 36 percent, which is the amount charged to members of the military."

Furor Over Painting of Mandela By White Artist

(NNPA) A white South Africa has stirred a furor over his painting of former president Nelson Mandela as a cadaver, surrounded by prominent African figures witnessing his autopsy.

Artist Yuill Damaso called his work "a modern take on the Rembrandt oil painting The Anatomy Lesson of Dr. Nicolaes According to Tulp." Damaso, his rendition is a tribute to Mandela.

"Underneath all his great achievements, the revered former South African president is flesh and bone, like everyone else," Damaso said in interviews.

But the work has infuriated local residents who are demanding it be removed from Johannesburg's Hyde Park shopping centre. The African

National Congress also has condemned the work, saying: "It is in bad taste, disrespectful, and it is an insult and an affront to values of our society."

In Africa, some believe it taboo to depict a living person — let alone internationally anti-apartheid icon — as dead.

Mandela, who is due to celebrate his 92nd birthday on July 18, has increasingly limited his time in the public in recent years. He made a brief public appearance at Soccer City in Johannesburg on Sunday about an hour prior to the World Cup final match.

Texas Unemployment Rate Drops to 8.2 Percent in June Texas employers add 166,100 jobs since January

(NDG Wire) Texas seasonally adjusted unemployment rate dropped to 8.2 percent in June, down from 8.3 percent in May, and continued to trend well below the U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate of 9.5 percent for the same month. Texas total nonagricultural employment grew by 14,000 jobs in June for a total of 166,100 jobs gained since the beginning of 2010.

"Texas employment has grown every month in 2010," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Tom Pauken. "Notably, Texas employers in goods producing industries added jobs in the month of June, which included gains in Manufacturing, Construction, and Mining and Logging."

The Education and

Health Services industry recorded the highest increase in June, with 8,900 jobs added, followed by Professional and Business Services, which increased by 8,600 jobs.

"While I am encouraged by the decrease in the Texas unemployment rate, times are tough for Texas workers and their families," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton. "Job seekers should turn to WorkInTexas.com and our workforce centers across Texas for reemployment and support services."

In June, Manufacturing added 5,700 jobs, Construction grew by 4,800 jobs, and Mining and Logging increased by 2,900 jobs. Employment in the Trade, Transportation and Utilities industry was up by 3,000

jobs, and Information added 800 jobs.

"Seven industries added jobs in June including Professional and Business Services, Manufacturing, and Construction – that's positive news for Texans seeking new opportunities," said TWC Commissioner Representing the Public Andres Alcantar. "TWC and the 28 local workforce boards are committed to helping job seekers find

these opportunities, and to helping employers with an array of services they need to run their businesses."

The Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) had the lowest unemployment rate in the state at 5.9 percent. The Amarillo MSA had the second lowest unemployment rate in June at 6.0 percent, followed by the Lubbock MSA at 6.7 percent (not seasonally adjusted).

"And the Lord said unto Joshua. Get thee up; wherefore liest thou thus upon thy face? Israel hath sinned, and they have also transgressed my covenant which I commanded them: for they have taken of the accursed (hateful) thing, and they have put it even among their own stuff. Therefore the children of Israel can not stand before their enemies, but turned their backs before their enemies, because they were accursed: neither will I be with you any more, except ye destroy the accursed from among you." Joshua 7:10-12 (KJV)

Christians need to know their spiritual vulnerabilities just as war commanders want to know the vulnerabilities of their enemies and businesses want to know the vulnerabilities of their competition. " Joshua 7:7a (KJV)

The people of Israel had been defeated because God could not bless them; something was done that was unacceptable to God. The people were not to take any possessions from the first battle, but one individual failed to be obedient and the whole army suffered.

As a Christian, sin makes our shield (armor) vulnerable to attack from our enemies, who then get permission from God to attack the Christian in the area where he/she have failed to uphold righteousness. If Christians break down in moral purity, their enemies come in and establish a stronghold. If Christians give place to bitterness and unwillingness to forgive

back at the center of controversy after allegedly ending the marriage of former Friendship West Baptist Church in Dallas, TX executive secretary, Elizabeth Payne, 39, a North Richland Hills, TX Hispanic woman. The two allegedly became sexually involved after Pastor Wright visited Pastor Frederick H. Haynes, senior pastor of Friendship West and protégé in 2008.

At the time of the alleged affair Payne married Fred Payne, 66, in 2006 but divorced once the affair was made known. Fred Payne

discovered more than 80 emails between her and Pastor Wright.

"There must have been about 80 of them, back and forth," Fred Payne said. "Wright said things like he was going to leave his wife for Elizabeth."

"I was downright mad about this bull- - - -," said Fred, who stated he was "in the oil and gas business" and belonged to a hunting

"People wouldn't be happy to know that my wife was sleeping with a black man," he added, "Rev.

Haynes doesn't like the interracial thing, either. This was quite an issue for him."

Pastor Wright is also married, a second time, to his wife of 20 years who he courted while she was in attendance to a marriage counseling session for her then current marriage.

Details were not clear, but speculations arose, when Payne was terminated from her position at Friendship West in 2008 which prompted her to file the wrongful-termination lawsuit against the mega church in the southern area of Dallas, TX in March

Payne sited that once the relationship between she and Pastor Wright was made public that Pastor Haynes immediately reacted and terminated her based on her race and their interracial relationship.

Pastor Haynes remained adamant that he knew nothing of the alleged affair between his mentor and former secretary and sited that Payne was terminated because of poor work performance and a breach of confidentiality when Payne

allegedly informed the media of Wright's 2008

During the civil case proceedings the emails sent by Wright were introduced as evidence and ultimately Payne and Friendship West agreed to an undisclosed


settlement on last Wednesday after the trial began on Monday.






