First-Time Homebuyer Credit Provides Tax Benefits to 1.4 Million Families to Date

(NDG Wire) With the deadline quickly approaching, the Internal Revenue Service today reminded potential homebuyers they must complete their first-time home purchases before Dec. 1 to qualify for the special first-time home-

buyer credit. The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act extended the tax credit, which has provided a tax benefit to more than 1.4 million taxpayers so far.

The credit of up to \$8,000 is generally available to homebuyers who

have never owned a home or have not owned one in the past three years and with qualifying income levels. The IRS has a new YouTube video and other resources that explain the credit in detail.

The IRS encouraged all

eligible homebuyers to take advantage of the first-time homebuyer credit, but at the same time cautioned taxpayers to avoid schemes that help ineligible people file false claims for the credit. Currently, the agency

Ron Kirk

(NDG Wire) Former Dallas Mayor Ron Kirk is the keynote speaker for the 3rd banquet of the Dallas Black Chamber of Commerce (DBCC), Friday, October 16.

The DBCC is the oldest and largest Black chamber in the nation. Its banquets draw over 1,500 attendees annually, and this year will

feature the special presentation of DBCC Lifetime Achievement Award to honor an individual for a lifetime of work, dedication and contributions towards the betterment and advancement of Dallas' African American community.

Kirk is the 16th United States Trade Representative, Ambassador Kirk where he serves as President Barack Obama's principal trade advisor, negotiator and spokesperson on trade issues.

Born in Austin, Texas, Kirk is the youngest of four children. He attended Austin College, graduating with a degree in both political science and sociology in 1976. He then went to the University of Texas School of Law. After receiving his Juris Doctor in 1979, he practiced

law until 1981 when he left to work in the office of then-Texas Senator Lloyd Bentsen. In 1983, Kirk returned to Texas to lobby the state legislature in Austin, first as an attorney with the city of Dallas, and later with a law firm.

In 1994, Kirk worked for then-Texas Governor Ann Richards as Secretary of State of Texas. The following year, Kirk ran for mayor of Dallas. With support from Dallas' business community and influential members of the city's African-American community, Kirk was successful in his bid and became the first African-American mayor of Dallas, Texas, winning 62 percent of the total vote.

During his tenure as mayor, Kirk earned the reputation of being a coalition-builder, managing to keep the always-tumultuous Dal-

las City Council and Dallas School Board together. Under his leadership, he proposed the "Dallas Plan," a vision for the next 25 years, which included the controversial Trinity River Project, a \$246 million plan that called for constructing a network of parks and highways in the flood plain of the Trinity River. He also pushed the construction of the American Airlines Center, whose opening he oversaw in 2002.

In 1999, Kirk was re-elected as mayor of Dallas in a landslide with 74 percent of the vote.

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What President Obama's Nobel Peace Prize Means for America

(NNPA) It was announced last Friday President Barack Obama was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. Within hours the Republican Party issued a statement declaring he was not worthy of such recognition. Others said the award was based on his potential rather than his accomplishments so far.

Let's look at the record.

During the last two years, President Obama was singularly credited for beginning a much needed dialogue on race with his impassioned speech on the reality of race relations in America. The speech was so inspiring and insightful that it propelled his candidacy forward when the political pundits thought his candidacy was about to come to an end. His speech detailed the cause and effects of racism from both a White and Black perspective, laying the groundwork for America to begin to work through old wounds and allowed it to elect its first African American President.

One of his first acts as President was to order the

closure of the detention center in Guantanamo Bay. President Obama has called for unprecedented reform of our health care system, a system one congressman called a holocaust on our own people. He has

President Obama is deserving of recognition for leading America's outreach to world leaders to work together for a more stable and peaceful world. The Nobel Peace Prize award should be celebrated by all Americans because the world sees us as righting ourselves on the track once again.

Their proactive initiative, grounded in their acknowledgment of the unacceptable conditions that exist in Black neighborhoods, has created a groundswell of support and involvement in other cities by other families who have pledged to do the same as the Anderson's.

As so-called political conservatives have said for decades, "Blacks should start doing more for themselves; they should take care of their

own problems." Well, John and Maggie Anderson are promoting exactly that, despite the fact that some of those same "conservatives" are responding by calling the Anderson's "racists" and "separatists."

Undeterred, this family continues to follow through on its pledge, and to date, according to their website, they have spent \$53,453.74 with Black businesses thus far in 2009." I say to my readers, "Did you EE today?"

I am so proud of Compro-Tax and the Anderson's, the perfect examples of Black businesses and Black consumers simply doing the right thing, not for self-aggrandizement, not for accolades, not for recognition, but simply because it's the right thing to do.

Battling Racial Disparities: Faith-based Breast Cancer Initiative Goes National with Capitol Hill Pink Ribbon-Pinning Ceremony

(NNPA) A recent report released by the American Cancer Society reveals that death rates from breast cancer across the United States have been falling, but African-American women are still 38 percent more likely to die from breast cancer than their White counterparts. This is true, even though White women are diagnosed with the disease at a higher rate.

This is why a growing campaign to call attention this disparity is so significant.

For more than three years, Chicago-based Access Community Health Network has addressed racial disparities around both breast and cervical cancer with its Pin-

A-Sister™/Examine Comadre™ campaign. The initiative works to educate women about breast and cervical health, to provide free mammograms and pap smears for underinsured and low-income women across the state of Illinois.

This initiative has now gone national. Many states are on board to hold pink ribbon-pinning ceremonies as a tribute to women and families affected by breast cancer, with pins indicating commitment to get screenings.

To bring national attention to this initiative, and to celebrate National Breast Cancer Awareness Month, ACCESS CEO Donna Thompson and ACCESS, in



conjunction with lead sponsor the Congressional Caucus for Women's Issues, will hold a Pin-A-Sister™/Examine Comadre™ pink ribbon-pinning ceremony Wednesday, October 28.

According to the most recent study by the Metropolitan Chicago Breast Cancer

Task Force, of which Thompson is a co-chair, mortality rates for Hispanic women are considered to be similarly high. Many factors work against women of color when they are confronted with health care decisions.

Many do not receive mammograms due to financial issues, or their dedication to their families prevents them from looking out for themselves many receive inferior mammograms and some don't have access to quality care, even if they are diagnosed with breast cancer. Also a major factor is family support. It's hard to concentrate on fighting breast cancer if you don't have anyone in your corner to provide sup-

port.

"There hasn't been much change in the breast cancer mortality rate for underserved women since 1980. While there have been many advances in mammography screening, which leads to early detection, a large segment of African-American and Hispanic women in particular are still losing their lives to breast cancer," said Thompson in a news release.

"Pin-A-Sister™/Examine Comadre™'s mission is to highlight these unacceptable statistics and encourage women to be proactive in taking care of themselves and each other. The power of the 'pulpit Mother's Day message' has been effective in

reaching women and encouraging them to obtain breast and cervical exams."

ACCESS has also become known as a national model for community health care, and Thompson recently spoke at the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation's 39th Annual Legislative Conference at the Washington Convention Center in D.C.

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is investigating a number of cases of potential fraud and is using computer screening tools to identify questionable claims for the credit.

Because the credit is only in effect for a limited time, those considering buying a home must act soon to qualify for the credit. Under the Recovery Act, an eligible home purchase must be completed before Dec. 1, 2009.

This means that the last day to close on a home is Nov. 30.

The credit cannot be claimed until after the purchase is completed. For pur-

chases made this year before Dec. 1, taxpayers have the option of claiming the credit on their 2008 returns, or waiting until next year and claiming it on their 2009 returns.

The credit is 10 percent of the purchase price of the home, with a maximum available credit of \$8,000 for either a single taxpayer or a married couple filing jointly. In most cases, the full credit will be available for homes costing \$80,000 or more.

The credit reduces the taxpayer's tax bill or increases his or her refund, dollar for dollar.

A home constructed by the taxpayer only qualifies for the credit if the taxpayer occupies it before Dec. 1, 2009.

The credit is reduced or eliminated for higher-income taxpayers. The credit is phased out based on the taxpayer's modified adjusted gross income (MAGI).

The credit must be repaid if, within three years of purchase, the home ceases to be the taxpayer's main home.

Taxpayers cannot take the credit even if they buy a main home before Dec. 1 if:

The taxpayer's income is

too large. This means joint filers with MAGI of \$170,000 and above and other taxpayers with MAGI of \$95,000 and above.

The taxpayer buys a home from a close relative. This includes a home purchased from the taxpayer's spouse, parent, grandparent, child or grandchild.

The taxpayer owned another main home at any time during the three years prior to the date of purchase. For a married couple filing a joint return, this requirement applies to both spouses.

The taxpayer is a nonresident alien.

GISD Green Classrooms

(NDG Wire) Every classroom in Garland Independent School District (GISD) can be a green classroom this year, thanks to the partnership between GISD and the City of Garland Environmental Waste Services Department (EWS). Each classroom has a green recycling bin and a poster depicting what can be recycled in the new single stream program.

Single stream recycling

means that paper products, aluminum cans, steel and tin cans, cardboard, chipboard (i.e., cracker boxes and cereal boxes) and plastics #1 - #7 can be placed in the same bin. GISD custodial staff empties the classroom bins daily, and EWS provides weekly collection and hauls the materials to Greenstar North America, where they are weighed, sorted and processed for remanufacture-

ing.

Because every school is recycling more, EWS has reduced the number of trash pick ups, resulting in a cost savings for GISD. "This partnership between GISD and EWS will conserve resources and increase the amount of valuable materials diverted from the landfill," reports EWS Waste Minimization Coordinator, Glenna Brown.

Rep. Johnson Introduces Financial Education for Teachers & Students Act

Congresswoman Eddie Bernice Johnson introduced the Financial Education for Teachers and Students Act, which will authorize the Secretary of Education to award grants to states for financial education in public middle and high schools.

The grants will fund financial literacy programs for students and their parents, as well as professional development for the teachers of the programs.

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

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An Open Letter to President Obama

Mr. President, without violating any civil liberties of the American people, there is a way to effectively protect the issuing and the use of the federal Social Security Number (SSN), where the SSN could be legislated for legal use as identity. Sir, by way of a created subsidized corporation, there is a way that the SSA could create a for-use fee, when state governments use the SSN and also when the SSN is used commercially to establish consumer accounts.

Knowing that you are a quick study, please permit me to present you with a known fact. In 2008, FDIC protected banks lost over \$50 billion to fraud. This does not include the fact that over 60 million retailers and merchants will require new compatible hardware for at the Point-Of-Sale consumer transactions.

President Obama, when the United States made the decision to enter World War II, the country was forced to mobilize for war. In the 1920s the needs of the War Department represented the bulk of requirements for a war production program. The supporting mobilization plans for raw materials, labor, power, fuel, and transport, as well as the associated development of economic controls, were seen as derivative functions. 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

Federal Tax Savings Program for Employers Expanded

(NDG Wire) Employers who hire unemployed veterans or eligible 16- to 24-year-olds are now entitled to receive up to \$2,400 in tax savings for each member of those groups added to their payrolls in 2009 and 2010. As part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, these groups now are included among Work Opportunity Tax Credit (WOTC) target populations.

In order for employers to qualify for WOTC, new hires who are unemployed veterans must have been receiving unemployment benefits for at least four weeks and youth must not have been regularly

employed or regularly attending school for six months prior to being hired.

"WOTC gives employers an incentive to hire from groups that face extra challenges in their efforts to find work," said TWC Chairman Tom Pauken. "It's particularly encouraging to me that unemployed veterans now are included in this program. By hiring job seekers from any of these groups, employers are able to receive tax credits and tax savings for their businesses."

The Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) assists employers by certifying the eligibility of individuals for

this federal employer tax benefit.

Other groups eligible for WOTC include:

- disabled veterans
- veterans receiving food stamps
- ex-offenders
- residents living within empowerment zones, renewal communities or rural renewal communities
- vocational rehabilitation referrals
- youth who live in empowerment zones or renewal communities and are hired for temporary summer work
- food stamp recipients
- supplemental security income recipients

• Temporary Assistance for Needy Family benefit recipients

Within each group, including the two new ones, additional conditions must be met. The tax credit amount is between \$1,200 and \$9,000 per employee, depending on which group the newly hired worker represents.

The film is not without its flaws, but it hits the mark in so many ways, the audience will be forgiving. Slip ups such as why Foxx practically quoted Denzel Washington's Alonzo from *Training Day*, almost take the viewer out of the moment. Also, one wonders if they ran out of special effects funding for the final scene.

This film combines the best features of director F. Gary Gary's earlier popular movies. *Italian Job* (2003) boasted an intricate plot with twists and turns, and *A Man Apart* (2003) focused on violent revenge.

Law Abiding Citizen is definitely entertaining, not only for its visceral satisfying acts of revenge, but also for the smart cat and mouse game it plays with morality. Throw in swagger, violence, a little nudity and a lot of hi-tech toys that go bang, and the film will satisfy a broad audience.
