There are two fronts to our ongoing battle against Medicaid fraud. On the criminal side,

the Medicaid Fraud Con-

trol Unit (MFCU) investigates and prosecutes health care providers and vendors who bill taxpayers for services that were never rendered. The criminal component of our Medicaid fraud prevention team includes 147 investigators

and investigative auditors, of which 58 are commissioned peace officers who conduct complex fraud investigations from nine field offices across the state.

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Significant **Highlights of President Obama's First Year**

Just before midnight on an unusually warm night in Grant Park, Chicago, President-elect Obama gave an inspiring victory speech before an estimated crowd of 240,000 ecstatic cheering support-

Percy Sutton



(NNPA) Percy Sutton, best known outside New York for his involvement in the civil rights movement and founding a communications empire, died on December 26. He was 89.

Sutton was born in San Antonio, the youngest of 15 children of a former slave and his wife. According to the New York Times, Sutton received education at three historically Black colleges or universities, including Prairie View A&M in Texas, Tuskegee University in Alabama, and Hampton University in Virginia, but did not complete a degree at any of those schools. served with the He Tuskegee Airmen during World War II.

Although he did not have an undergraduate degree, Sutton was admitted to Columbia Law School through the G.I. Bill and on the merit of his solid undergraduate performances. Because he had to work while attending school, he transferred to Brooklyn Law School. He was in class all day, and worked through the night at the post office and as a subway train conductor, the New York Times reported. He went for three years, with little sleep, to finish school and become a lawyer.

After a stint with Air Force intelligence during the Korean War, according

to the Associated Press, Sutton returned to New York to work as a lawyer.

Sutton's involvement with the civil rights movement included involvementwith the NAACP that earned him a police beating at age 15. As an attorney, he became an advocate for the cause and longtime attorney for Malcolm X and his family. The New York Times notes Sutton was arrested for civil disobedience while protesting the police shooting of the unarmed Amadou Diallo in New York in 1999.

Sutton was also a politician, and served as Manhattan borough president from

According to the New York Times, Sutton was instrumental in securing funding for the Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture in Harlem and worked to establish open admissions for the City University of New York. He was also the first serious Black candidate for mayor of New York City.

He was married three times, twice to Leatrice O'Farrell Sutton, his surviving spouse. He is also survived by a son, Pierre Sutton, and a daughter from his second marriage, Cheryl Lynn Sutton.

One Terrible Decade

Winter putting a chill on your exercise routine? Here are 7 ways to fight back

Humans do not hibernate, but many of us find it a seductive idea when trees are bare, winter skies hang dark and low, and streets are a mire of grey, melting slush.

In this dreary weather, it can be draining to deal with life's basic activities much less optional stuff like our daily fitness routines. That may be why people exercise about a third less in winter, even though physical activity is a surefire mood lifter for most. So, how to prevent our spirits and exercise levels from plunging into a steady downward spiral?

Here's some simple,

proven advice from fitness pros:

1. Ease into the cold. Many early morning exercisers dread a straight transition from a warm bed to cold, piercing winter air. So take time to warm up before you head outside. (This also focuses your mind and delivers oxygen and nutrition to your body.) Jog or walk around the house a few times. A warm shower also helps some people ease through the transition. Others swear by tumbling their workout clothes in a warm dryer before heading outside. Whatever works for you!

2. Split your workout. Reduce the weather's impact by dividing your exercise into indoor and outdoor sessions. For example, run or bike for 20-30 minutes, then go inside and finish up with some yoga, Pilates or weight training. recharge your motivational battery. When you exercise with friends or family members, you can encourage each other (confirmation

3. Beat the sundown. If darkness makes you feel sleepy and unmotivated, try moving your workout to mid-day rather than before or after work. Even if you can't work out as long as usual, you'll find yourself skipping fewer days - and perhaps enjoying the change in routine. If early or late are your only options, go to a well-lighted gym or health club. You may also find it energizing to have other people around.

4. Join or form a workout group. There's nothing like peer pressure to battery. When you exercise with friends or family members, you can encourage each other (confirmation calls the night before a scheduled morning workout are helpful for many), use conversation as a distraction from the cold weather, invent new exercise routines and devise friendly competitions to keep things interesting.

5. Have a post-exercise reward in mind. This need not be anything fancy or expensive. Just make it a simple, relaxing pleasure (for example, a visit to your favorite coffee shop on the way to work) that you can look forward to while you exercise — and that you don't get if you bail on the

workout.

6. Eat healthier. This is good advice year-around, but especially during a season when energy and alertness are at a premium. Simply put, you feel better and more up to exercising — when you cut down on fats and sweets and frontload your diet with fresh fruit, vegetables, wholegrain products and proteinrich foods.

7. Count your steps. Even when bad weather limits your outdoor activities or makes it harder to get to the gym, you still can fit more physical activity into a normal day at work. Get a pedometer and shoot for a goal of 6,000 to 10,000 steps a day. If you're coming up short, try walking the stairs in your office or parking garage, getting up from your desk for occasional strolls or walking to a friend's desk to talk rather than sending an e-mail. Even if you aren't working up a sweat those extra steps can make a big difference in your fitness level.

Just so we're clear: No one's saying these seven steps will make it fun to run three miles with sleet pellets melting in your hair. But they can help you keep exercising when every instinct is telling you to burrow into the sofa with the TV remote in one hand and a drumstick in the other. In a season when a strong will is as crucial as a strong pair of legs, that's a real accomplishment.

of the MFCU's investigative work focuses on protecting Medicaid patients who reside in nursing homes. Together with local law enforcement officials. the MFCU has conducted criminal investigations into illegal conduct by nursing home employees who neglected or abused their patients. We have also cracked down on staff members who abused their positions by stealing from their elderly patients' bank accounts. These enforcement efforts both protect nursing home patients and ensure that taxpavers are not footing the bill for illegal conduct.

Our work to reduce improper Medicaid expenditures has a civil component as well. In 1997, the Texas Legislature passed a law that encourages whistleblowers to expose and therefore prevent unlawful billing practices by Medicaid vendors. Thanks to a legislatively mandated expansion in 1997, our Civil Medicaid Fraud (CMF) section has become an entire division with more than 50 employees.

The majority of CMF cases pursued in Texas state courts involve the improper reporting of drug prices by pharmaceutical companies. State and federal law requires that drug manufacturers report the prices at which they sell their products to various providers, including pharmacies, wholesalers and distributors. The Texas Medicaid program uses this pricing information to estimate the costs Medicaid providers pay to acquire the drug manufacturers products. Medicaid providers bill the state run program for these costs so the program uses the sales data to ensure taxpayers get the best possible price. Medicaid providers bill the state run program for these costs, plus prescription dispensing fees, and Medicaid reimburses the providers. When a manufacturer reports inflated prices, the taxpayers are paying too much for Medicaid provided prescription drugs.

Nationally, most of the cases alleging Medicaid

fraud involve illegal marketing practices such as off label marketing and kickbacks. Off label marketing occurs when a drug manufacturer markets a drug for purposes other than those approved by law, primarily those approved by the Food and Drug Administration. CMF participates in national investigations of this conduct, and is also leading the nation in actively litigating against manufacturers who illegally market their products.

CMF is also pursuing

matters against manufacturers of unsafe products and pharmacy benefit managers that fail to comply with Texas Medicaid laws and regulations.

Collin County's first university center readies for January opening

(NDG Wire) Next month, Collin College will unveil its first brand new site in nearly 15 years as the Collin Higher Education Center officially opens for spring semester. However this time, the students will not be the usual freshmen and sophomores seen at the college's other six locations.

The new site is a university center, featuring juniorand senior-level college classes as well as master and doctoral programs from area universities The universities include Dallas Baptist University (DBU), Texas A&M University-Commerce (A&M-Commerce), Texas Woman's Univ. (TWU), The University of Texas at Dallas (UT Dallas) and the University of North Texas (UNT).

According to the college's board chairman, the concept for the center evolved from the needs of the community. "A decade ago, local residents needing upper-division undergraduate courses or graduate school could commute to a university after work. Today, that is nearly impossible with North Texas highway congestion," Dr. J. Robert Collins said. "Now, a full spectrum of degree programs will be available in the heart of Collin County."

The opening is a special celebration for the college district as the first campus was established in McKinney nearly 25 years ago. The new 125.000-square-foot facility is located on the northeast corner of Central Expressway and the Sam Rayburn Tollway/State Hwy. 121 on 5.5 acres of property donated by the McKinney Economic Development Corp.

"This is a watershed moment for the residents of North Texas, Collin College and our university partners," said Collin College president Cary Israel. "This is also sound educational policy for the State of Texas because we are not following the trend of several other community colleges that have created their own baccalaureate degrees. Instead, we believe collaborating with exceptional universities is a better means to achieve that goal."

The Collin Higher Education Center will serve as a multi-purpose facility housing administrative departments and the university programs. It will also provide space for meetings and training for the growing district as well as outside bookings.

The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board approved the plan for the new degree programs in October, and college and university partners officially inked the agreement establishing the center in Novemher

The center is welcome news for Collin College students like Pamela Ringener.

Ringener, who works at American Airlines and home schools her 14-year-old child, has neither the time to drive to a university nor the ability to move her family to earn a bachelor's degree. Now, she can pursue a bachelor's degree in business administration at the new university center.

"I thought it would be a smart next step," she said. "I loved the business administration class I took (at Collin College), and I've always wanted to go into management."

Research confirms that many local residents share Ringener's interest. In a recent study, 35 percent of Collin County residents were interested in bachelor's degrees and 65 percent were interested in master's degrees. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor, the number of job openings that require a bachelor's or master's degree will increase by 16.5 percent and 18.9 percent, respectively, by 2016.

DFW International Airport receives Recovery Act Grant

(NDG Wire) Congresswoman Eddie Bernice Johnson (D) welcomed the news from Department of Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood that Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport (DFW) has been selected to receive a \$2.3 million grant in American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (Recovery Act) funds.

"As the only Member of Congress from North Texas to vote for the Recovery Act, I am pleased to see these funds come to DFW," said Johnson. "The Federal Aviation Administration's most recent data shows that DFW is the fourth-busiest airport in the U.S., and this grant money will be put toward improvements that are critical to maintaining and enhancing capacity and safety at DFW."

The \$2.3 million grant will be used to rehabilitate a runway critical to the airport's capacity. With this grant, all of the Federal Aviation Administration's Recovery Act dollars have been committed, and many Recovery Act projects will remain under construction well into 2010.

"Thanks to Congresswoman Johnson's courageous vote, Recovery Act dollars are putting people back to work in good-paying jobs making needed improvements at airports across the country," said Secretary LaHood. "Without this money, many of these airport authorities would not have had the resources to hire workers and get these projects started."

Construction on the DFW project is expected to begin in early January and will include the rehabilitation of various concrete slabs and joint repairs on the 13,400-foot runway. This work will help enhance safety by eliminating the opportunity for debris to develop along the runway surface.

surance company," said Johnson. "In exchange for your premium payment, the insurance company guarantees you income, starting immediately or at some time in the future." This potential income can be a supplement to Social Security.

There are generally two types of annuities, fixed and variable. With a fixed annuity, the insurance company guarantees a minimum rate of interest during the time your annuity is accumulating. You are also guaranteed the option for periodic payments over either a definite period of time (such as 20 years) or indefinite, such as your lifetime.

Both fixed and variable annuities have two phases, one in which they help build your assets and another in which they help turn those assets into a stream of income. Clients assume the risk with a variable annuity, whereas a fixed annuity is guaranteed.

"With variable annuities, you have the chance to buy additional protection benefits that offer more guarantees," said Johnson. "In very basic terms, optional riders for income, accumulation and death benefits, guarantee a certain amount of payment for an additional fee, regardless of the current value of your initial investment."

The Bottom Line. You owe it to yourself and to your family to plan for your future. "Financial planning is a long-term commitment — a marathon that will evolve over time. So it's never too early to start and it's not as hard as you might think," said Johnson. A professional financial planner can help you work through the ABCs and get you on your way to a more secure retirement.

A re you financially ready for retirement? If you're feeling concerned about your standard of living after retirement, you're not alone.

Only 13 percent of workers say they are confident about having enough money for a comfortable retirement, according to the 2009 Retirement Confidence Survey conducted by the Employee Benefit Research Institute (EBRI).

Yet only 44 percent have taken the time and effort to complete a retirement needs calculation, the basic planning step for determining how much money they are likely to need and how much they need to save to meet that goal.

Why is that? "It can be an overwhelming process, and people often don't know how to start," says Jim Johnson, vice president of Advanced Markets for Allianz Life. "And especially in the current economy, many people may feel they just can't afford to set aside any more income."

But, no matter what your age, it's important to take the time to look beyond today's uncertainty in order to build a sound financial future for yourself and your family. Whether you make plans on your own or choose to work with a financial planner, it's time to start by following these ABCs.

The Basics

A: Ask yourself these questions.

Where do I want to be, financially? Goals can include secure retirement income, a home or a financial legacy for your family. Think about what kind of retirement lifestyle you want; write down your specific goals.

Do I know how much I'll need in order to achieve those goals? According to the EBRI:

• 42 percent of all workers think they need to accumulate at least \$500,000 by the time they retire to live comfortably in retirement.

• 19 percent feel they need between \$250,000 and \$499,999, while 28 percent think they need to save less than \$250,000 for a comfortable retirement.

• Workers who have performed a retirement needs calculation are twice as likely than those who have not to expect they will need to accumulate at least \$1 million before retirement.

B: Be mindful of your risk tolerance.

Every investment strategy has a level of risk. Generally speaking, the higher the risk of losing money, the higher the expected return. Less risk translates into a smaller return. The U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) recommends that you look at these factors to help you determine your risk tolerance:

Financial goals — how much you want to accumulate.

Current financial position — can you afford to invest in riskier options right now? Take less risk if you cannot afford to lose your investment or have its value fall.

Time horizon — how long can you leave your money invested? If you will need your money in one year, consider taking less risk than if you won't need it for 20 years.

C: Choose an investment strategy.

Once you understand your goals and level of risk tolerance, choose a strategy to achieve those targets. There are three basic strategies involved in investing: protecting your money, earning income and growing more money. The best strategy is a balanced combina-

tion of the three.

Protection. If you've saved enough for a house or car and you want to be sure the money will be there when you need it, a savings account or money market securities will keep that money safe.

Income. If you want a predictable stream of income, investing in bonds or bond mutual funds provide income from the interest payments.

Growth. Investing in companies through stock mutual funds can help grow your money, but this depends on the stock performance, and is usually considered a long-term option.

"Finding the right balance is key to reaching your financial goals," said Johnson. "A financial professional can help you find a balance that allows you to accumulate enough assets to retire the way you want and have enough income to maintain a comfortable lifestyle."

Johnson says that one simple way to help maximize retirement funding is to take advantage of retirement contributions that get fully matched by your company.

Another option is an annuity. "An annuity is a con-

The Idolatry of Black America

New book examines African-Americans' relationship to leaders, government

Wisdom enables us to take our knowledge, experience and intelligence, and use it to make sound choices and good decisions.

Create a balance – The next key is to create a balance in life between work, family, friends and personal interests - regularly sharpening the blade of the ax. Chasing worldly fame and fortune is in demand in the world we live in. Nevertheless, they are, as King Solomon, considered by many to be the wisest leader ever, could have expressed it, good servants but poor masters. When we pursue worldly success as objectives for our lives and leadership, we will never get enough. Solomon expresses it like this: "He who loves money shall never have enough. The foolishness of thinking that wealth brings happiness! The more you have, the more you spend."

Listen and learn – If you want to be a wiser leader, develop your willingness to listen and learn. Wise leaders learn from what others say to them. They are keen to find out what other people have to say. They ask many questions. There are two very good reasons for listening to other people. We are learning ourselves this way, and people open up to us if we listen to them. When we listen, we are showing respect for our co-workers and fellow man.

Take time for solitude – Regularly take time to be alone with yourself for receptive silence and reflection. Set aside time for personal reflection and some deeper thinking. Look back on how you have been living and leading. Look forward to what kind of leader you want to become. This will help you to see the bigger and longer perspective of your life and leadership.

"Wisdom comprises the foundation for your leadership," Winblad added. "It helps to crystallize the other qualities of vision, strategic thinking and innovation, so that you can do more than visualize success – you can achieve, sustai and enjoy success.

backs and false starts. There are many who won't agree with every decision or policy I make as President, and we know that government can't solve every problem. But I will always be honest with you about the challenges we face. I will listen to you, especially when we disagree. Guantanamo is part of a chain of politically embarrassing detention camps that includes Abu Ghraib in Iraq, the military prison at Bagram Air Base in Afghanistan and other secret locations which are part of a tightly linked global detention system with no accountability in President Barack law. Obama issued a Presidential Memorandum dated December 15, 2009 formally closing the detention center and ordering the transfer of prisoners to the Thomson Correctional Center in Illinois.

The President has scrapped the Star Wars missile defense program in Eu-

rope that was expensive, ineffective and needlessly provocative to European allies.

While unemployment still hovers in the 10 plus percent range hundreds of billions of dollars in stimulus money have been infused into the economy to prevent a total collapse. Controversy remains over the measures taken to support the auto, housing and financial industries but most economists believe that the consequences of inaction would likely have proven catastrophic without the government intervention.

We saw our nation's standing on the world stage restored and validated when President Obama received the Nobel Peace Prize.

During the campaign for the presidency Barack Obama was the candidate offering hope and change not only to America but to the world. Over the past year he has been tested and challenged. He has not faltered but has responded with tempered coolness and clarity of judgment and purpose on both domestic and global issues.

Overall. Obama has been a serious, mature, deeply intelligent presence on the national and international scenes. After eight long years of the dangerous form of insanity emanating from the White House it's comforting to know that we have a president who is an adept politician willing to use intelligence and persuasion to calm our fears and inspire confidence that the broken bonds of trust between government and the people can be repaired.

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Texas unemployment rate down in November to 8.0 percent

(NDG Wire) The Texas seasonally adjusted unemployment rate declined to 8.0 percent in November, down from 8.3 percent a month ago, and continued to trend well below the U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for November at 10.0 percent. The Texas Civilian Labor Force reached its highest level ever at 12.1 million workers in November.

Total nonagricultural employment in Texas increased by 17,300 positions in November for a total of almost 70,000 jobs over the past two months, while the nation as a whole lost 122,000 jobs.

"Texas employers added a significant number of jobs in most industries during October and November," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Tom
