The DFW Metroplex is gearing up to celebrate all things 'heart' when the American Heart Association (AHA) celebrates National Heart Month in February Heart disease is still the No. 1 killer of women in America. This means mothers, sisters and friends are dying at the rate of one

per minute because they don't know that heart disease kills. That's why Go Red for Women is asking everyone in North Texas to participate in the 9th Annual National Wear Red Day on Friday, February 3, to make ending heart disease a reality.

Currently, nearly eight



million women in the U.S. are living with heart disease, yet only one in six women believe heart disease is her greatest health threat. In fact, 90 percent of women have one or more risk factors for developing heart disease. February is

Tax refunds: Yours to keep, not lose to high-cost lenders

Each year as W-2s begin arriving in mailboxes, commercials start promoting a range of services to 'help' consumers with tax preparation. These advertisements beckon consumers to take advantage of convenient and worry-free services. In reality, however, many

tax season services are less about convenience and more about taking a hefty portion of refunds consumers have already earned. Each year, high cost tax-related services drain an estimated \$11 billion

from the pockets of 30 million households with moderate and low-incomes. Two of the most prevalent and highcost financial 'services' are Refund Anticipation Loans (RALs) and Refund Anticipation Checks (RACs).

A RAL is a high-cost, short-term loan secured by

the taxpayer's expected refund. Interest rates on a typical RAL are about 150 percent. The fee for the RAL is in addition to the fee for tax preparation. Other add-on fees such as electronic filing, applications, and fees to cash

Romney has faces to mend to gain Hispanic votes

(New America Media) Mitt Romney, the Republican Party's presumptive presidential candidate, made his first attempts to gain critical support from Latino voters in January, but failed to confront his own negative record on issues of high priority to Latino voters.

During a primary race stop in New Hampshire Jan. 9, he spoke of the need to "convince more Latino Americans

to vote Republican" if the GOP wants to be competitive in November against the Democrats and President Barack Obama, who is already campaigning for reelection

Running against John McCain in 2008, Obama won 67 percent of the Latino vote.

Recognizing the Father of Black History

BY THEMAN R. TAYLOR, SR. PH.D.

If a race has no documented history, then it becomes a negligible factor in the thoughts of the world and stands in danger of being exterminated from the world stage. According the text. THE to AFRICANS WHO WROTE THE BIBLE, by Alex Darkwah, the African People appreciated the value of documented history and traditions as reflected in the Bible itself; thus they are still a factor in world civilization. Additionally, Carter Woodson states, 'The achievements of the Negro properly set forth will crown him as a factor in early human progress and a maker of modern civilization.'

When the Harvard graduate initiate Negro History Week in 1926, the main thrust was to correct the omission of facts by historians and others that gave little thought or information to Blacks as contributors in building the country's past and present history. He recognized that part of the problem stems from what people are taught and learned. If one's contribution to history is suspect, one's humanity and personality will be also. In America what Woodson started was a restoration project: the demand to be re-entered into history teaching

At the beginning of the 20th Century, African American History took a giant step when the movement to rescue the African American from "History or His-Story" oversight came under the leadership of Dr. Carter G. Woodson. The Woodson restoration project forced us to re-examine America's past record that has contributed to the miseducation of the American people and have unprepared us to deal with the present. Any environment or educational system which suggest that children be educated in an atmosphere of semi-permanent amnesia, humiliation, or small doses about their ancestor's contribution is a history not worth knowing. Recognition in some cases would be given in a passing note in the drama of Anglo-Saxon destiny and fulfillment.

Woodson, born of former slaves, Annie and James Woodson in New Canton, Virginia on December 19, 1875, is widely honored and recognized as the Father of Negro History Week (now called Black

History Month, changed in 1976. During the Bicentennial celebration the change was made to include the entire month in order for more time for programs and celebration) on February 7, 1926. Prior to that he created in 1915 the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History. (Changed in 1972 to the Association for the Study of Afro-American Life and History. Woodson selected February because he was attuned

Dr. Carter G. Woodson's restoration project and Black History Month challenges Americans to confront its past, good and bad, Black History Month should be used as a tool to measure African American people, past, present and future, not as a time for bring out of closets and boxes the picture of great, safe and approved African Americans (Knee-grows) only to tuck them away at the end of the month until next year. It must be observed twelve months a year with February being the month of reaffirmation, assessing the challenge and preserving African American Humanity.





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

According to FINRA Investor Education Foundation, a national survey of self-reported RAL users showed that while 13 percent of African-Americans reporting using a RAL in the last five years, just six percent of whites did.

Similarly, RACs, temporary bank accounts opened for the sole purpose of receiving tax refunds, are another costly loan. Once the refund is deposited, the lender issues the consumer a paper check or prepaid debit card and then closes the account. RAC fees vary, but as with RALs, consumers often elect to have the tax preparation costs deducted from their refund. RAC customers are also charged checking cashing and other add-on fees for this short-term loan

Consumers most vulnerable to the lure of expensive RALs and RACs are either unbanked or under-banked but are also eligible for the federal Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC). For 2011 and depending upon family size, the maximum EITC will range from \$464 to \$5,751. Anyone desiring to learn whether they qualify for this tax credit should IRS online at: visit http://www.irs.gov/individuals/article/0,,id=96406,00.htm

According to the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC), African-Americans alone account for 36.9 percent of the unbanked consumers without a personal account with either a bank or credit union. Further, Latino and African-American communities together represent more than 60 percent of the nation's unbanked households

Consumers with bank accounts who turn to non-bank fringe services for day-to-day monev management are 'under-banked' households. Under-banked households pay more for basic transaction and credit financial services, and additionally are more vulnerable to loss or theft. These families also, according to FDIC, often struggle to build credit histories and achieve financial security.

Most importantly, anyone who hires someone to assist them with their returns should be aware that IRS holds the tax filer accountable for their selection of a preparer. Every qualified tax preparer must sign the return and also enter their assigned Preparer Tax Identification Number. Tax preparers are also required to give taxpayers a copy of their own returns.

Tax refunds represent monies owed. Every consumer is entitled to keep as much of it as possible.

African-American head coaches at the start of the 2011 season, up one from 2010. Three were fired and seven head coaches job were open. Currently, there are seven African-American assistant head coaches on NFL sidelines, none were hired for open jobs.

In recent years, the NFL has increased diversity in the ranks of its game officials. Carl Johnson, Vice President of Officiating, is an African-American, as is David Coleman, Director of Officiating. In both 2010 and 2011, nearly 28 percent of the officials were African-American, Latino or Native American. Both represented an all-time high for the NFL as the number of diverse referees leading officiating crews has increased from one to three during that same time period.

This report card should be the template for other professional organizations when it comes to fighting diversity because it is here to stay.

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

signals. There are many stories of lives being saved because of the use of the cell phones, I-Phones, Blackberries. etc., which are used World-Wide.



everything.

That old mule eating out of the garden? Her name was Belle and she had been around a long time - ever since Dr. Martin Luther King visited Gee's Bend back in 1965

Dr. King had urged Benders to register for the vote, but white folks tried to stop them. Unafraid, Benders hitched up their mules, traveled a half a day to nearby Camden, and registered any-



across the street... Sometimes when you're little, big concepts are hard to grasp. For very young children, though, "Belle, the Last Mule at Gee's Bend" is a good start for understanding an important bit of history.

Authors Calvin Alexander Ramsey and Bettye Stroud tell this real-life story from an angle that children will love; partly because the storyteller is such a sweet character and partly because an animal is right in the middle of the tale (and what kid doesn't love animals?). Smaller children will also enjoy artist John Holyfield's accompanying illustrations, while older kids will appreciate the behind-the-scenes information at the back of the narrative.

Despite the grown-up story inside it, I was charmed by this children's book and I think your youngster will be, too. For kids ages 4-8, when it's time to learn a different angle on the Civil Rights story, "Belle, the Last Mule at Gee's Bend" is pretty super.
