

Juneteenth history and DFW celebrations

According to Juneteenth.com, this is the oldest known celebration commemorating the ending of slavery in the United States. Dating back to 1865, it was on June 19th that the Union soldiers, led by Major General Gordon Granger, landed at Galveston, Texas with news that the war had ended and that



the enslaved were now free. Note that this was two and a half years after the Eman-

ipation Proclamation, which was official January 1, 1863.

Later attempts to explain this delay have yielded several versions. Often told is the story of a messenger murdered on his way to Texas with the news of freedom. Another theory is the slave owners

were trying to maintain the labor force on the plantations, some speculate the federal troops actually waited for the slave owners to reap the benefits of one last cotton harvest before going to Texas to enforce the Emancipation Proclamation.

DART offering free bus passes to riders who "Dump the Pump" this month

North Texas commuters can swap a gasoline receipt for a week of free transit thanks to Dallas Area Rapid Transit (DART), the T in Fort Worth, and the Denton County Transportation Authority (DCTA)

The agencies are work-

ing together to encourage commuters to try transit the week of June 18-23. This effort is the local version of the seventh annual "Dump the Pump" campaign of the



American Public Transportation Association

(APTA), which emphasizes the economic and environmental benefits of transit.

Survey shows Plano residents generally pleased with city services

In March the ETC Institute conducted a random sampling survey on behalf of the City of Plano to assess resident satisfaction with the delivery of city services. On May 29 the City Council was presented the major findings of the survey by ETC vice president Karen Faulk.

Responses came from 444 of the 2,000 random households contacted to complete the survey that covered more than 50 services. At a cost of \$14,000, Plano had not performed a citizen survey since 2008.

Plano City Manager Bruce Glasscock said, "Feedback from our resi-

dents is a major component in our governance process, as we develop our actions and goals for Plano's future. This information is tremendously valuable as we strategically plan where and how we will invest in our community over the coming

Dr. Daryl D. Green

Many parents are hurting their college graduates by destroying their independence as they return home. The majority of recent studies have shown that many college graduates will opt to move back home. Consequently, many parents will find themselves helping them financially. As millions of Americans battle economic hardship, Dr. Daryl D. Green explains what can be done to deal with this pressing matter for frustrated parents with adult children.

Due to the economic

crisis, there is a massive exodus of adult children returning home to their parents. According to 2009 poll by CollegeGrad.com, 80% of college graduates moved back home with their parents after graduation. New research by Patrick Wightman at the University of Michigan noted that more than 62% of young adults get financial help from their parents at an average of \$12,185. Additionally, over 22% of parents assist their adult children in various ways, including paying their bills or

rent. Parents, who serve as financial supporters for their children, may be hurting them.

Dr. Green notes, "Giving an individual financial assistance without any accountability goes beyond common sense. Yet, we parents will do this same action with our own children when we know the long-term consequences." Dr. Green can recite a number of situations where these enabling actions of parents have damaged their children. Some people argue that parents who finance their adult children with no limitations have fueled this "Entitle-

ment Generation."

Dr. Green argues for parents making the hard decision of setting financial limits on their adult children. This process will allow their adult children to deal with their own financial situations, even if it means hitting the proverbial 'rock bottom.' Dr. Green continues that today's parents are fostering adults who cannot survive under the future economic crisis. The unintended consequences are adult children who can't cope under pressure." Dr. Green suggests that parents set their expectations upfront with their

adult children to ease miscommunications.

Hatcher earned a bachelor's degree in psychology from Spelman College in At-

lanta. She holds a master of social work degree from the University of Georgia and a doctoral degree in social welfare from the University of Kansas.

Most recently, Hatcher has taught courses on research and evaluation, policy analysis, crisis intervention and forensic social work. Her own research focuses on health promotion strategies in correctional settings, addressing mental health, substance abuse and HIV disparities, and the practice and policy implications for African Americans.

In addition to teaching and research, Hatcher is a licensed clinical social worker and has consulted with jail and juvenile justice facilities focusing on community re-entry services for offenders with co-occurring disorders, drug court program treatment curricula, jail suicide prevention protocol and im-

plementing continuous quality improvement program monitoring procedures.

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Consumer Alert: Beware of debt scammers

With so many Americans unemployed or underemployed, the social stigma of debt is not as harsh as it once was. Too many people who have played by the rules and worked all of their lives now find themselves deeply mired in debt. Young consumers, armed with a degree in one hand and student loans in the other, wonder when they can financially live independent from parental support. In this still-unfolding financial recovery, family standards of living are faltering, retirements are delayed and both generations worry.

For many consumers, the debt dilemma is akin to a seesaw. One side wonders whether available funds will stretch far enough to pay their bills. The other side worries whether remaining credit can see them through.

Unfortunately, there are businesses that prey upon consumer financial misfortunes, promising easy solutions to nagging and deep

debt. On urban radio and late night television these companies advertise how debt can be settled for pennies on the dollar. Some will even identify the amount of debt consumers must owe before they can 'help' them.

Consumers who believe this kind of advertising almost always get scammed. After paying thousands of dollars in fees, they discover that there was never a connection between the monies paid and real debt reduction services. Unfortunately, by the time this epiphany occurs, consumer finances are in worse shape than before. And the debt settlement firm moves on to its next victim.

Consumers using these services are also often told not to speak with their creditors or pay them directly any portion of the debt owed. If the consumer follows the instructions of the debt settlement firm, penalty interest rates – as well as late fees and other charges begin to accrue on the amount originally owed. In the mean-

time, the creditor often escalates collection efforts as well, sometimes turning the debt over to a collection agency hired by the creditor or pursuing lawsuits or wage garnishments.

If consumers stop paying their debts, their credit scores fall and make it more difficult to gain credit elsewhere.

Attorneys general and Federal Trade Commission enforcement challenged these practices in private litigation. With the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau, consumers have also gained a federal office dedicated to transparency and fairness in debt relief and debt collection.

The Federal Trade Commission also advises consumers to guard against further fraud by debt relief firms by avoiding any company that:

- Charges any fees before it settles your debts;
- Guarantees it can make your unsecured debt go away and stop all debt collection calls or lawsuits;
- Tells you to stop communicating with your cred-

itors;

- Guarantees that your unsecured debts can be paid off for just pennies on the dollar; and

- Refuses to send free information about the services until you provide personal financial information, such as credit card account numbers, and balances

For most people, money has a way of going more quickly than it comes. When debt is involved, bills seem to reappear even faster. The better way to resolve unmanageable debt is the simple one: speak directly with your own creditors to set up a manageable payment plan.

No one is better able to communicate your financial constraints than yourself. More importantly, no one will work harder to relieve your personal financial stress more than you.

Children and Asthma: The Goal is control

The news about children and asthma is both good and bad. Better treatments have banished the stereotype of the asthmatic child as frail and inactive, heavily relying on an inhaler to breathe. Children with asthma are now living active, independent lives.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) is working to make sure that the drugs and devices used to treat asthma—a chronic lung disease that inflames and narrows the airways—are safe and effective.

The bad news is that the number of reported cases of asthma in children has been



rising. In 2010, there were 7 million children with asthma, 9.4% of Americans under 18, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, up from 6.5 million, or

8.9%, in 2005.

One reason may be that doctors are diagnosing more kids; illnesses once known as bronchitis or a croupy cough are now being recognized as

asthma. Its symptoms may include coughing, wheezing (a whistling sound when you breathe), chest tightness and shortness of breath, according to the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute (NHLBI).

Uncontrolled asthma can lead to chronic lung disease and a poor quality of life, and may slow growth. Benjamin Ortiz, M.D., a medical officer in FDA's Office of Pediatric Therapeutics, recommends that parents work with a pediatrician, and an allergist or pulmonologist (lung specialist) if needed, to develop and follow an asthma action plan that de-

tails the treatment options when certain symptoms occur.

"Early intervention results in better health into adulthood," he says.

Knowing the triggers

"We know what makes asthma worse or better, but don't know the primary cause," Ortiz says. The things that make asthma worse are known as "triggers." They include:

- Season and climate changes
- High levels of air pollutants
- Tobacco smoke
- Mold
- Mites, roaches
- Plant pollen
- Pet dander

• Strong scents, like perfumes

In addition, certain factors may increase a child's risk of developing asthma:

- Family history of asthma
- Multiple episodes of wheezing before age 2
- Living in crowded housing
- A family member who smokes
- Obesity
- Early development of allergies or eczema

Uplift schools receive honors from *Washington Post* and *Newsweek*

years. The next step in this is surveying our business community, which is something that hasn't been done in the past."

ETC provided this summary of their major findings:

Residents have a very positive perception of the city. The results indicate 92 percent of Plano residents are satisfied or very satisfied with the overall quality

of life. When asked about the value they feel they receive for their city taxes and fees, 74 percent are satisfied or very satisfied. Satisfaction with city services rated 91 percent satisfied or very satisfied.

Overall satisfaction with city services is generally the same throughout the city.

Priorities for improvements were overall: 1) Police

services, 2) Fire services, 3) Maintenance of city streets and sidewalks, 4) Emergency medical services, and 5) Environmental waste services.

Other findings included:

- Residents would like to see more outdoor special events in the parks (45%), followed by water sports (34%) and an additional dog park (24%).

- In the last year, resi-

dents have most used the trails (63%), followed by playgrounds (35%).

- Library services information was most often received through www.planolibrary.org (78%), followed by the local media (53%) and library brochure (47%).

- The Texas Pure product purchased most often is the mulch (82%), which most use once a year.

meeting periodically for about two years forging plans for the tri-celebration. Committee members say they hope classmates will recognize the significance of observing the classes' golden jubilee.



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
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President Abraham Lincoln and the Juneteenth Celebration: Something you should know

It has been one hundred and fifty years since the 16th President of the United States, Abraham Lincoln, issued a preliminary copy of the Emancipation Proclamation, after the Battle of Antietam, September 22, 1862, declaring, "...all persons held as slaves within any state or designated part of a state, the people whereof shall then be in rebellion against the United States, shall be then thenceforward, and forever free", free as the first day January 1863." (The Confederates name for the battle was the Sharpsburg Battle) This Proclamation was scheduled to become effective January 1, 1863.


True to his promise, the popular and often controversial president, issued the official and final copy of the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863. We should note the Proclamation did not impact enslaved Africans held in states not rebelling against the United States -Maryland, Delaware, Kentucky and Missouri - they remained slaves! The Proclamation suggested one can not own another human being, unless one is loyal to the United States.

As Commander in Chief of the military, this Proclamation issued by Lincoln, 149 years later is still at the forefront of controversy because of the lack of agreement on the intent and meaning of the Proclamation. For example, did the Proclamation free some slaves in the United States as celebrations suggest, or did the Proclamation maintain slavery in states considered loyal, or with the prospect of losing the war, was the Proclamation an attempted bribe for the Confederate States to stop rebelling, lay down their arms and keep their slaves or was the Proclamation a military measure to end the fighting and killing among Americans for the

preservation of the United States of America?

Let's examine Lincoln's action and behavior and the celebration attributed to him. The policy pursued by him in August 1862 was, "My paramount object in this struggle is to save the Union, and is not either to save or destroy slavery."

After elaborating on his point he went on to state that, as Commander in Chief he had the right "to take any measure which may best subdue the enemy." To allay southern fears, in his first inaugural address, he made it clear he would not interfere

with slavery where it existed in the United States. In fact, he felt he had no legal right to do so! His job was to protect the constitution not violate it. An amendment to the constitution was required, considering that said constitution from its inception, did not mention the word (slavery) in the document until it was abolished, thus, said constitution recognized, encouraged and protected the institution of slavery! The Republican Party's platform were opposed to the expansion of slavery, however, the President felt the competition with slavery would have a negative impact on free White labor in the new territories.

We should also know that

on the issue of political and social equality, Lincoln was opposed to allowing Blacks the right to vote, serving as jurors as well as holding public office. In his words, "There was an immutable physical barrier of color and probably of mental and moral inferiority separating the Black and White races," and "Black men were certainly not his equal in color."

Lincoln believed in compensated emancipation with the owners approval, he had a strong distaste for the abolitionist and the abolitionist movement, but felt Blacks were to be included under "all men" in the Declaration of Independence by the Founders, not equal in all respect! No race-mixing, especially interracial procreation. According to Lincoln, if freed, the races must be kept apart to prevent the mixing of the bloods.

One of his solutions to the race problem was colonization. This policy was a solution advocated earlier by the 3rd President of the United States, Thomas Jefferson. In fact many of Lincoln's views on race, racism and politics were advocated previously by the 3rd President of the United States as outline in his *Notes On The State of Virginia*.

According to Jefferson, Blacks and Whites cannot live together in the United States. If freed Blacks must go, deep-rooted prejudice by Whites remembering of injuries suffered by Blacks, would produce confusion for both groups; they could never get together, he suggested.

In August 1862, one month before issuing his preliminary copy of the Emancipation Proclamation, Lincoln summoned the so-called leaders of the Black community to the White House and revealed his plans. He told the group that

money had been appropriated by Congress to colonize their kind outside the United States. The President further stated that the physical differences between the races and the problems created made racial harmony unacceptable and impossible.

The President's colonization plea divided Blacks, some left under the country under the plan, and some returned but for the most part Lincoln's plan to make ex-slaves equal in another country, whereas he could not do so in his own, was a complete failure.

This information raises the question of why Lincoln is showered with praise and, of course, why he is associated in a positive manner with the JUNETEENTH celebration! Why?

The story goes that the celebration of freedom began with the arrival in Galveston, Texas on June 19, 1865 of a little known military person, General Gordon Granger (1822-1876) armed with an alleged executive document, General Orders Number 3, citing the end of slavery in Texas. Was the military officer citing the Emancipation Proclamation? It was not an executive order signed by President Lincoln, he was shot on the 14th of April 1865, and died the following day, April 15, on Good Friday.

The controversy continues, but at any rate the response of Blacks to the military officer was joyous and with great praise! They were overtaken by the news of their 'so-called' liberation. It is a strangeness, and most perplexing, by numerous African American historians and scholars, that, often, we are so easily led.


So eager to believe, so blinded by praise, even if from those who have shown us ill-will and caused us to die needlessly and be treated like ignorant bystanders to history.

Ah, in the spirit of freedom, in the modern era, Lincoln and his Emancipation Proclamation is praised be-

cause for those who do not study or seek knowledge via our own books. It set us FREE! Nevertheless the 19th

In June 1865, when the General rode into the Galveston Texas area, he had no official jurisdiction, Texas were not part of the United States. Texas, like other former Confederate States, except Tennessee, had to comply with the Reconstruction Act of 1867 and other laws passed while they were not a part of the Union, in order to return to the United States. Commuters will be offered a free weekly regional transit pass in exchange for a gasoline receipt. The passes are good for any DART, T or DCTA fixed route service. The idea is not only to entice customers to try transit, but to help calculate the cost of commuting in a single-occupant vehicle. For example, a daily Regional Pass is \$10, which provides access to all DART, T and DCTA bus and train services, including the Trinity Railway Express.

Using data from AAA,

APTA researchers determined that North Texas commuters who switch to the region's transit network may save more than \$9,000 in the annual cost of driving to work (based on data from AAA). Transit also encourages environmental sustainability. DART, T and DCTA buses run on either clean diesel or natural gas and DART's light rail fleet produces zero emissions.

Ticket exchange locations cover the region

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

Father's Day in the United States is celebrated on the third Sunday of June. It honors the contribution that fathers and father-figures make for their children's lives. Its origins may lie in a memorial service held for a large group of men, many of them fathers, who were killed in a mining accident in Monongah, West Virginia in 1907.

It is this Sunday, June 17, 2012; and for the last 65 years my maternal side of the family has celebrated the third weekend and Juneteenth at the Baker-Smith Family Reunion in Mexia, Texas. benefit UT Arlington in many ways, said W. Marvin Dulaney, chair of the UT Arlington Department of History and a key organizer of the new center, which officially launches in August.

"Dr. Hatcher understands the significance of the center at this time and how to build its ability to respond to community needs," said Dulaney.

Hatcher said she is honored to have the opportunity to help shape the vision and mission of the center and provide guidance in the development to its degree program, research and advocacy agenda, and community collaborations.

"The center will facilitate the discourse that focuses on race and the significant context of historical, cultural, and community influences on the diverse experiences of blacks in America. It will serve as a vital intellectual and social resource for the community, on and off campus," she said. "It is my hope that our students, faculty and staff, and community stakeholders will be enlightened, inspired and prepared to be a part of social change."

The Center for African American Studies is a collaboration between the UT Arlington School of Social Work and the College of Lib-


eral Arts. It initially will offer an introductory course and a rigorous minor in African American Studies. The minor will require 18 semester credit hours comprising courses from various departments. The center will also

NDG BookShelf: God's Hotel looks at the care for the forgotten

the ones who don't have ad budgets or front-of-mind real estate? Read the new book *God's Hotel* by Victoria Sweet, and find out.

Victoria Sweet's family was shocked.

Becoming a doctor wasn't fitting for someone coming from a long line of "businessmen and intellectuals" but she was undaunted, and "intrigued" by death, resurrection, heaven and hell. This eventually led Sweet to the words of Hildegard of Bingen, a medieval nun who practiced Old World medicine.


Degree in hand, and wanting to further study Hildegard's methods, Sweet sought part-time work in a hospital setting

– something that's rare in the medical world – and found Laguna Honda Hospital in San Francisco.

Laguna Honda was a rarity, a Middle Ages institution in the 20th century. The French would call it Hôtel-Dieu (God's Hotel) but it was known in the United States as an almshouse, a hospital for the homeless and poor, a place for sick people with no money and nowhere else to go.

Sweet made a two-month commitment. She stayed for more than 20 years.

Laguna Honda was a "special place" where rare ailments were surprisingly common and staff cared personally about their patients. Obviously, Sweet loved it there, but things



changed when city officials took charge of the gently aging hospital: the old way of practice disappeared in favor of budget cuts, politics, government interference, lawsuits, and commit-

tees. Still, Sweet discovered a place for thousand-year-old medicine; for old-fashioned sitting, waiting, hands-on assessment, and for things she learned from a long-dead mentor.

As I read, I try to flag certain passages to jog my memory for writing this column. So let me tell you how much I enjoyed *God's Hotel*: I forgot to take notes.

It wasn't the patient anecdotes that pulled me in, although I couldn't get enough of them. It wasn't watching the hospital morph into something different, although that made me scream in sympathy. I think what I loved so much about this book is that spending time with author Victoria Sweet's words

is so calming.

Sweet shares her journey – both literally and figuratively – with readers in a voice that seems like a cool hand on a feverish forehead or a gentle rub on a shoulder. She lets us share her discoveries, both in hospital and outside, and we're often transported back in time with them. Sweet teaches her readers, and we become eager students.

"... none of us knows what is valuable to God," says Sweet but I think you'll find this book valuable to you. If you're concerned about social issues, especially healthcare, then *God's Hotel* is a book to check into.
