## Wells Fargo agrees to \$175 million mortgage discrimination settlement

More than 30,000 minority borrowers to receive monetary compensation

For the second consecutive month, one of the nation's largest banks has agreed to a multi-million dollar settlement of mortgage discrimination complaints. According to the U.S. Department of Justice

(DOJ), Wells Fargo Bank will pay more than \$175 million to resolve unfair lending claims against African-American and Latino mortgage borrowers from 2004 through 2009. It is the second largest fair lending settlement in the department's history.

According to DOJ, \$125 million of these monies will go to borrowers of color who were charged more for loans they got through mortgage brokers. Four thousand borrowers will be compensated for being steered into subprime loans with higher rates and fees, instead of re-

ceiving prime loans for which they qualified. An additional 30,000 borrowers will be compensated for higher costs they paid on their broker-originated loans versus other consumers. DOJ is now investigating

# Is Representative Marc Veasey dancing to the tune of his piper?

Our View

Prior to 1964, disproportionate representation on Capitol Hill was an ad rem concern. For example, in the New Hampshire General Court one township with a population of three had a representative in the lower house. Another district with a population of 3,244 had the same representation rendering the vote of a resident of the former 1,081 times more powerful. This is only one of many examples. Many of these disparities were in urban areas, so as a result, these communities were grossly underrepresented.

In 1964, basing their decision on the ideal "one person, one vote", the United States Supreme Court ruled in Reynolds vs. Sims that the state legislature districts had to be approximately equal in population. Chief Justice Earl Warren stated "Legislators represent people, not trees or acres. Legislators are elected by voters, not farms or cities or economic interests."

In a perfect system, the voterselect legislators, not economic interests. But in

Professional racecar driver Tia Norfleet has visions of giving to a community that supports her. As the first, youngest and only African-American female driver on the NASCAR circuit, Tia Norfleet has set the stage to opening the doors of diversity in a highly controversial and predominately male oriented


With lawsuits that have been filed as well by other minorities, which have accused NASCAR of racial discrimination, many people wonder why and how can Norfleet compete in this division of racing. "It is sheer passion and instinct that

drives this youngster to want to compete in this sport, she was born to compete," says Isaac Hayes, spokesperson/ CEO of the online fund raising organization, Tiapower.

Norfleet comes from a family with a history in racing. Her father Bobby Norfleet made his NASCAR debut at the Portland International Raceway road course on March 26, 2000, where he competed against NASCAR driver Bill Lester making that race historical. It was the only time in NASCAR history that two African-Americans drivers have competed at the same time

With many accolades of her own including being spokesperson for the Safe America Diving program, and appearing in commercials such as the Verizon wireless, numerous magazine ads and radio and television interviews. Tia Norfleet has given Black women everywhere new hope in following their

The million dollar question that many people ask is, will the NASCAR community accept Tia for who she is, and that is according to Hayes, a true competitor. "Our goal is to raise funds needed for everyone to find out," says Edward Williams, founder of the medium sized marketing company Team Tia.

### John Ellis Price

The University of North Texas at Dallas (UNT Dallas) announced Tuesday that President John Ellis Price will step down next year after his three-year presidential contract concludes. He has held the campus CEO role since the institution began in 2001. Price will leave office on August 31, 2013.

"Building a university from the ground up was an once-in-a-lifetime career challenge that presented me with growth opportunities few educators are given,"

President Price said. "This university is on its way to great things, and I'm a stronger professional because of my experience at UNT Dallas. More importantly, my time here has given me the opportunity to work with exceptional minds and committed, talented people, including faculty, staff and UNT Dallas and System leadership who have great ideas and a passion for higher education?

Price notified University of North Texas System (UNTS) Chancellor Lee Jackson and the UNTS Board of Regents in March that he would end his tenure as president on August 31, 2013, the end of his current contract. Since then, he has been working to lay the foundation for an orderly and smooth transition to new leadership.

'When I was offered this position, I said I would only do so if I could lead the creation of a different kind of university with truly innovative approaches. So, in coming to Dallas, I had three goals: create the university, achieve its initial accreditation from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS), and provide the university with a strong foundation for future success," Price said.

Price added: "We achieved goal one when we became the first public four-year university in the City of Dallas and the 38th general academic institution of the State of Texas on September 1, 2010. We were recently noti-



fied by SACS that our application for separate accreditation has been approved which authorizes SACS to assemble a visitation team and schedule a university visit as early as Spring 2013 so we are close to achieving goal two. Our current work with the Commission on Building the University of the 21st Century will yield recommendations on innovative approaches to creating a New Uni-

He enrolled in a string class in grade school to learn piano and read music and through a process of elimination ended up with the violin. Through high school he tried other instruments but always went back to the violin. While attending Southern University in Baton Rouge, Ward decided he would become a jazz guitarist because he felt he could not make a living playing the violin. His roommate gave him a tape featuring famous jazz violinists Noel Pointer and Jean luc Pointe and Ward again picked up the violin. He joined a group called the 4 am Band and worked throughout the city.

He later moved to New Orleans, started his own band and worked in neighborhood bars. He says he always felt as if the entire city of New Orleans was in attendance. Ward has tou-red, not only in the U.S., but many foreign countries and played with some of the premier musicians including Wynton Marsalis, Ronnie Laws, Marion Meadows, BB King, Bon-ny James, Norman Brown, Najee, Kirk Waylum and Gladys Knight. He has performed for two American Presidents, George Bush Sr. and Bill Clinton and at the New Orleans Jazz and Heritage festival every year for the past 27 years and the Essence Music festival in New Orleans for 9 years.

With five CD's to his credit and over 100 recordings with various artists with diverse styles

## **Voter Photo ID laws have harsh impact on** poor, elderly and minority voters, study says

(New America Media) If no one provides him with a ride, Jose Zuniga, 83-years old and wheelchair-bound would have to take two or three buses and travel 20 miles to reach the nearest south Texas government office that could issue the new photo ID he will need to vote in upcoming elections.

Zuniga is one of a particular sub-set of an estimated 500,000 eligible voters in 10 states who could be negatively affected by stricter photo ID laws. They do not own a car nor do they drive. They live more than 10 miles away from a state office that can issue the ID required to vote and that would be considered a fulltime facility, that is, one that is open more than two days a week.

In Texas alone, close to 13 percent, or nearly two million, of the state's votingage citizens live more than 10 miles from the nearest state office that can issue a voter ID.

Texas is one of 10 states examined in The Challenge cation, a newly released study by the Brennan Center for Justice. The states, selected because of their more restrictive legislation for government-issued photo ID requirements, are Alabama, Georgia, Indiana, Kansas, Mississippi, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Wisconsin.

"For this study, we wanted to look at how difficult it would be for those estimated three to four million voters in the affected states to obtain voter ID," said Keesha Gaskins, senior counsel at the Brennan Center and the study's co-author. "What we found really undercuts the claim by many proponents of these laws that eligible voters can easily obtain an ID to vote."

In some instances, the states' data corroborate the study's findings. The study does not speculate about the political intention of the supporters for more restrictive ID laws, though partisan opponents of the laws note that, with few exceptions, the legislatures that enacted them

of Obtaining Voter Identifi- have been Republican controlled. Rather, it graphically shows how poverty, states' persistent underinvestment in public transportation -- especially in rural areas -- and bureaucratic inefficiencies amo-ng different agencies, combine to pose daunting challenges for many Americans to obtain documentation required to vote in states where the laws have been proposed or allowed to

> In Wisconsin, one town's government ID-issuing office is only open on the fifth Wednesday of the month. Admittedly, the town's population is under 5,000, but the fifth-Wednesday rule results in the office being open only four times during 2012. With February and May behind us, it will open again on Wednesday, August 29, but not in September. If you miss August, wait until October 31.

"In other states," the study noted, "Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, and Texas — many part-time IDissuing offices are in the rural regions with the highest concentrations of people of color and people in poverty."

There are stark examples of how limited hours could affect working, eligible voters who need a new photo ID. "In South Carolina, only six of the state's 68 ID offices are open on Saturday. No state ID-issuing offices are open on Saturdays in Alabama, Kansas, Mississippi, Texas and Wisconsin. All ID-issuing offices in restrictive voter ID states are closed on Sunday," the study

The study also shows just how potentially pernicious structural barriers can be, and not just for rural populations. In Rock Hill, S.C., according to the study, "the city's largest concentration of eligible black voters nearly 42,000 of them live in the city center. Yet the city's one ID-issuing office is located seven miles outside the city center. The city has no regularly scheduled public transportation; the only available public transportation to an ID office re-

Senate Bill 21 relating to furthering competition in the communications industry pas-sed July 17, 2005.

House Bill 168 extending the hours of sale for alcohol passed April 21, 2005.

House Bill 3732 passed May 28, 2007 and was created to provide financial incentives for coal plants by allowing limitations on the appraised value of the property used for such purposes. Thus enhancing pollution control property tax exemptions, and exempting ultra clean energy sales from gross receipts tax-

House Bill 2683 diverts funds from TANF to promote marriage programs and other family strengthening programs passed April 12, 2007.

HCR 183 is a bill urging Congress to reject provisions of President Barack Obama's budget that would eliminate certain deductions currently available to the oil and natural gas exploration industry, passed May 30, 2009.

HCR 60 is a bill urging Congress to propose and submit to the states for ratification the Parental Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, passed May 18, 2011.

In all of the aforementioned bills, Rep. Marc Veasey cast a vote which benefited not those whom he promised to advocate for, but rather those who contributed to his campaign ac-

### Four new confirmed human cases of West Nile Virus in Garland

On July 23, 2012 the Garland Health Department (GHD) received a report of four laboratory confirmed human cases of West Nile Virus (WNV). The patients reside in the 2900 block of Western Drive; the 1500 block of Murray Drive; the 800 block of Woodland Drive; and the 1100 block of Intervale Drive. Five confirmed

human cases of WNV have been reported in Garland in 2012. Mosquito adulticide is scheduled to be sprayed to the surrounding areas of these cases on the nights of July 23 and July 24 to minimize the risk of additional infections.

Thus far, 2012 has been a very active year for WNV which has been detected in twenty four mosquito samples

collected throughout Garland. Citizens can view a map depicting areas where WNV virus has been detected and subsequently sprayed to reduce the adult mosquito population on the City of Garland webpage at www.garlandtx.gov.

WNV rarely causes severe illness or death, but citizens should remain vigilant

and take common sense precautions to minimize the risk of exposure. To protect yourself from exposure to WNV, limit outdoor activity during evening and early morning hours when mosquitoes are most active. While outdoors, wear light-colored, long sleeve clothing, and use an insect repellent containing DEET, according to its label directions. Most importantly, citizens should take measures to eliminate any standing water on their property, such as birdbaths (clean them twice per week), pet water dishes, clogged rain gutters, tires, and buckets. Containers that can hold an inch or two of water for just a few days can breed mosquitoes. Report any standing water that you are not able

to eliminate yourself to the GHD.

## DART Rail Orange Line opens new possibilities in Irving

Jill Martinez, owner and webmaster of IrvingOnline.com, and husband Robert, a lawyer and chairman of the Irving chamber's Transportation Management Association, are walking the talk when it comes to transportation matters. More than five years ago, the Martinezes downsized from a big house to an upscale loft just a short walk from DART's Las Colinas Urban Center Station, part of the first section of the Orange Line that opens on Monday, July 30.

"We wanted to make sure we got a good location and were willing to wait for light rail to come," Jill Martinez said. "It's been exciting to watch the Orange Line being built and we're proud to be urban pioneers."

The study cites 32 counties in Texas near the Mexican border with only two photo ID-issuing offices among them. Over 80,000 voting-eligible Latino voters reside in those counties.

In state after state, the study shows that the disproportionate, collective impact of limited offices or office hours for ID-issuing agencies and lack of public transportation falls on African-American and Latino populations.

Similarly, because of the

higher concentration of poverty among those same constituencies, the out-of-pocket costs to obtain photo IDs can be problematic. Even where states issue a "free" photo ID, there are costs incurred to obtain the documentation necessary to obtain one. Congresswoman Gwenn Moore, D-Wis., who opposes her state's photo-ID laws, said she knows of constituents who have spent hundreds of dollars in their quest to obtain a voter ID.

Where cost is not an issue, bureaucratic hurdles can still be vexing. The study

gave the example of an eligible voter caught in a Mississippi Catch-22: in order to get a government-issued photo ID to vote, one must present a birth certificate, but a photo ID is required by the state before a birth certificate can be issued.

Sundeep Iyer, the Brennan Center's principal quantitative analyst and co-author of the study, said researchers' conversations with Americans around the country seem to indicate that people generally think voter ID laws are a good thing, but they also feel an ID should-

n't be made too difficult to get. And that is precisely the point that the study reveals. "The difficulty of obtaining ID is part and parcel of what a voter ID law is about," Iyer said. "You can't divorce the voter ID law itself from the difficulty of obtaining voter ID." The negative effect on individuals and populations "speaks very strongly against the merits of these laws," he noted.

The status of voter ID laws varies among the 10 states surveyed. Alabama's law will not be in effect in time for this year's election

and the federal court ruling on the Texas law, which was opposed by the Department of Justice, won't be announced until the end of August. Similarly, South Carolina and Mississippi laws are pending federal approval. Photo ID laws are currently in effect in Georgia, Indiana, Kansas, Pennsylvania and Tennessee. Pennsylvania's law is also being challenged in a lawsuit, and Wisconsin's proposed laws are still tied up in state court.

Lawrence Norden, deputy director of the Democracy

Program at the Brennan Center, cast the issue of voter ID laws in moral terms. He noted that Jose Zuniga had voted for decades under Texas's prior ID laws and that there are thousands of Americans like him who will now have to struggle to exercise their right to vote.

The initiative behind the photo ID laws, Norden observed, "betrays the idea that, in the United States, we ensure that all people have equal access to the franchise."



Teaching past the school year was something that Maurice and Ruby Walker never thought of but at the end of the spring 2007 school year students in their tutoring program wanted to continue learning into the summer. With that the Walkers along

"Let's face it, the disconnection is where many of the disruptions in the learning environment often result from," continued Mrs. Walker, "and then couple that with almost tragic lack of involvement and engagement of too many of our African American parents in the education process of their children."

Mr. Walker added, "Once instructional control is expectations, with parents being involved and can be implemented more effectively.'

This is exactly what has been done in the Summer Reading Program at BCCC. Every Monday through Thursday at 7:30 a.m. students enter the fellowship hall knowing not to cross the line of what's expected and accepted from the Walkers and their volunteer staff of certified teachers, teacher assistants and community members.

The program is held at a church because the Walkers believe that young people today need to understand the role that the Bible and God represent in their lives. Unfortunately, the Supreme Court decision deemed it unconstitutional to present God and the Bible in public schools. Bible study is conducted every morning and students are engaged in a discussion of biblical principles.

The program also has a cultural/historical awareness component that teaches African American culture and history of the great contributions to American history.

Other programs that the program teaches include the dress for success program, public speaking component, voter registration campaign for parents, bone marrow donor awareness project, introduction of poetry, educational field trips and partnering with high school students seeking community service hours.

Hats off to Maurice and Ruby Walker, as well as the committed and dedicated staff because they have fostered a very successful program for the past six summers that has filled a very important void for the students of Irving and the surrounding communities.

similar concerns with consumers whose 'retail' mortgages were originated by Wells Fargo loan officers during the affected years.

The remaining \$50 million from the settlement will be used for down payment assistance in hard-hit communities across the country where DOJ identified large numbers of discrimination victims. These markets include Chicago-Naperville-Joliet, Cleveland, New York-New Jersey, Philadelphia, San Francisco-Oakland-Fremont and Washington, DC.

Commenting on the action, Deputy Attorney General James M. Cole said, "The department's action makes it clear that we will hold financial institutions accountable, including some of the nation's largest, for lending discrimination. An applicant's creditworthiness, and not the color of his or her skin, should determine what loans a borrower qualifies for."

By its own accounts, Wells Fargo has \$1.3 trillion in assets, and serves one in three households in America through its 9,000 locations, 12,000 ATMs and 270,000 team members.

DOJ's investigation into Wells Fargo's lending practices began in 2009. A parallel investigation by the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency (OCC) examined lending practices in the metro areas of Baltimore and Washington DC. OCC found that there was reason to believe that Wells Fargo engaged in a pattern of discrimination in violation of federal laws.

The DOJ investigation determined that Wells Fargo knowingly allowed its loan officers and mortgage brokers to subjectively vary interest rates and fees. The investigation showed that Wells Fargo systematically used these exceptions to over-charge Black and Latino borrowers with similar credit profiles paid less.

For example, in 2007 a Latino borrower in the Miami area seeking a \$300,000 mortgage paid on average \$2,538 more than a

similarly qualified white applicant. An African-American borrower at the same time in Miami would be charged an even higher "racial surtax" of \$3,657.

Last month and in a separate action, Wells Fargo reached a settlement also involving lending discrimination with the City of Memphis and Shelby County, TN. In that action, both the city and county governments received a \$7.5 million settlement; but no borrowers were compensated.

About the same time last month, DOJ reached a \$21 million settlement of alleged discriminatory actions by SunTrust Bank. And lest anyone think these lending practices are isolated cases, consider the Bank of America settlement following its acquisition of Countrywide, or the smaller banks that settled discriminatory lending cases in Detroit and St. Louis.

It is the persistence of these problems that causes the greatest concern. Decades after enacting multiple anti-discriminatory protections, people of color still cannot be confident that "fair lending" applies to all borrowers. While it is commendable that the DOJ and other enforcement bodies have vigorously pursued these recent cases, it remains deeply troubling that systematic discrimination still survives in the marketplace. For the people and communities affected, the shared consequences are severe. Even with some monetary relief, full financial recovery will not be easy.

As Assistant Attorney General Tom Perez, who leads the civil rights division, has said,

"This is a case about real people, African-American and Latino, who suffered real harm as a result of Wells Fargo's discriminatory lending practices."

He said he may return to teaching, research and consulting or may pursue another presidency of an established university, after a well-earned break.

"I believe my experience here will open many doors, but for now I am focused on the next year," Price said. "There is a lot of work still to be done and I intend to use every moment I am here to make sure UNT Dallas is well-positioned for success long after I leave."

As the first President of UNT Dallas, Price drove the boot-strap effort that brought the university from the drawing board to reality. The institution started with 55 students who attended classes at an UNT branch campus in leased space in a business park in Southern Dallas County. UNT Dallas now offers 19 graduate and undergraduate degree programs to more than 2,000 students who attend classes in stateof-the art facilities on its 264-acre campus near IH20 in the southern part of the City of Dallas.



There are people who live an outcome-based Christian experience. Their decisions are made based on the positive or negative outcome, not on absolute obedience to God.

Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego were three men who lived an obedience to God based life. When King Nebuchadnezzar passed a law that said all were to worship his idol, these young men determined they would not worship anything

other than God. You can be sure these men did not make this decision at the time of the decree. Their decision actually had been made years earlier. Their convictions were already in their hearts.

Each of us must come to a place of knowing what our boundaries are in any given situation. What will you tolerate from your family, friends, pastor, neighbors and employer? What situation crosses the line for you? Where are the boundaries for questionable practices in your life? If these are not worked out ahead, you will live a life of situational ethics, determining what decision to make based on the merits of the situation

Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego were willing to die for what they believed. In this case, they were delivered from the fiery furnace. God used their faithfulness to impact a king and they were promoted to higher positions.

Do you seek to only obey God in all things? Or are there situations that can move you based on the outcome? God wants to know that we will stand firm on the issues that are important to Him, no matter what the

outcome may be. God is looking for those who are radical and faithful in their obedience. Pray for this kind of conviction in your life. God had the power to part the Red Sea; He had the power to save the three Hebrew boys and He has the power to help you when you are uncertain through the difficult decisions and circumstances of life; ask Him for the courage and faith to step out and follow Him. Just give Him all the honor and glory that is due

The Word of God has been proven. He spoke to Joseph as a young boy through a dream and vision regarding his future. Joseph could not understand its complete meaning at the time, but he knew it had great significance. Joseph knew God had a destiny for his life. 
Author Jessie Klein did some research on bullying and what she found is stunning. In her new book The Bully Society, she tells the story of bullied kids, school shootings, and what we can do about them.

In October 1997, sociology professor Jessie Klein heard about a Mississippi 16-year-old who opened fire in a school, explaining that he'd done so because he was angry over mistreatment from peers.

Then similar violence happened again. And again.

"I continued to study these cases," Klein says, eventually finding 182 of them in a forty-year period. What she learned were three main reasons for school shootings: "everyday" violence of bullying, destructive gender pressures, and social demands on children at schools.

Our children, she says, are constantly enduring a culture that "places a diminished value" on students who don't measure up in social status. They have the "wrong" clothes or accessories, live in the "wrong" place, or lack money or "social capital." Klein found that this problem occurs even in schools that require uni-



forms. She also found that adults are often unaware of what's happening.

Boys are bullied for not being masculine enough, and any lack of athleticism is reason for beatings, sexual slurs, and derogatory name-call-

ing. This is doubly problematic for children who are gay or are perceived as such by peers.

Girls, Klein says, are bullied for similar-but-opposite reasons, a type of bullying she calls "slutbashing." Sexual harassment is common, too; so common that girls often don't realize it's hapSo what can be done?

Listen to your child when (s)he says there's a problem at school. Don't allow bullying from anyone, including coaches, teachers, or other parents. Nurture a mentor-and-model program in your area and help design laws that allow underage children to take bullies to court. Most of all, work with others to embrace "collective courage."

United, you stand... and make change.

The Bully Society is a hard book to read – not because of the way it's written, but because of what's written.

Author Jessie Klein shocks repeatedly with stories that'll make your heart hurt: accounts of

kids with nowhere to turn; memories of 40-something women who cringe from 30-year-old pain; tales of beatings and suicide; and jaw-dropping stories of adults who ignore or perpetuate the bullying of children. These are accounts that every parent needs to see and every teacher needs to

If you've noticed an epidemic of bullying in your community or your school and you don't know what to do about it, here's a good start. Before school reconvenes, you'll want to slip The Bully Society into your reading pile.


