What is Juneteenth? this two and a half year Juneteenth is the oldest delay in the receipt of this known celebration of end-ing of slavery. Dating back to 1865, it was on June 19th that the Union soldiers, led story of a messenger who by Major General Gordon was murdered on his way to Granger, landed at Galveston, Texas with news that the war had ended and that all slaves were now free. Note that this was two and a half years after President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation - which had become official January 1, 1863. The Emancipation

Proclamation had little impact on the Texans due to the minimal number of Union troops to enforce the new Executive order.

Juneteenth is all about freedom. The joy of freedom, The God given right to free-dom. The struggles for freedom. The vigilance to maintain freedom. The horren-dous challenges that Blacks overcame for freedom.

Freedom was a long time coming for Blacks in Texas. But come it did – some two and a half years after President Lincoln had signed Emancipation oclamation that officially freed the slaves on January 1,

The freedom notification reached Texas Blacks on June 19, 1865. The city was Galveston in a location currently at 22nd & Strand in the

Granger of the Union army who had been dispatched to take command of the District of Texas delivered General Order #3 part of which stated:

"The people of Texas are informed that, in accor-dance with a Proclamation from the Executive of the United States, all slaves are free. This involves an absolute equality of rights and rights of property between former masters and slaves, and the connection heretofore existing between them becomes that between employer and free laborer. The freedmen are advised to remain at

their present homes and work for wages." There were many black faces in the crowd that day listening to the news. When the General finished reading the proclamation Blacks alter-nately sang, danced and syed. They hugged each recruit of the tree and infimiliar of the tree and infimiliar of states. Freedom had finally come for the 250,000 slaves in Texas. We can only imagine the depth of their emotions. These feelings are best described in some of the words of people who were there as recorded in The American Slave Texas

Narratives.

From that beginning in 1865, annually, on June 19, in more than 200 cities in the United States Juneteenth is celebrated. It has come to sym-bolize for many African-Americans what the fourth of July symbolizes for all Americans -- freedom. It serves as a historical milestone reminding Americans of the triumph of the human spirit over the cruel and inhumane

Ex-slaves entered freedom under the worst possible condi-tions. Most were turned loose penniless and homeless, with only the clothes on their back. Ex-slaves were, as Frederick Douglas said, "free, without roofs to cover them, or bread to eat, or land to cultivate, and as a consequence died in such numbers as to awaken the hope of their enemies that they

would soon disappear."

Despite living under the most inhumane conditions known to humankind, blacks contributed everything from agricultural inventions, to medical breakthroughs, to music. Enslaved artisans craftincredible sculptures designed beautiful building and helped build a nation Blacks preserved a culture and succeeded in passing down a legacy of music, language, food, religion and a lesson in survival.

As we are reminded about the horrors of the Jewish Holocaust in the German death camps during World War II many African-Americans are reminded of our own tragic history of slavery, the middle passage and the massacre of our people before and after the

benefits of one last cotton harvest before going to Texas to enforce the Emancipation Proclamation. All or neither could be true. For what-ever the reason, conditions in Texas remained status quo well beyond what was tatutory.
One of the General

Granger's first orders of business was to read to the people of Texas, General Order Number 3 which began most significantly with: "The people of Texas are informed that in accordance with a Proclamation from the Executive of the United States, all slaves are free. This

involves an absolute equality of rights and rights of property between former masters and slaves, and the connection heretofore existing between them becomes that etween employer and free laborer.'

The reaction to this profound news ranged from pure shock to immediate jubilation. While many lingered to learn of this new employer to employee rela-tionship, many left before these offers were completely off the lips of their former attesting to the varying conditions on the plantations and the realization of freedom. Even with

nowhere to go, many felt efforts of Al Edwards, that leaving the plantation African American state l would be their first grasp of freedom. North was a logical destination and for many it represented true freedom, while the desire to reach family members in neighboring states drove some into Louisiana, Arkansas and Oklahoma. Settling into these new areas as free men and women brought on new realities and the challenges of establishing a heretofore nonexistent status for black people in America.

Recounting the memories of that great day in June of 1865 and its festivities would serve as motivation as well as a release from the growing pressures encoun-tered in their new territory. The celebration of June 19th was coined "Juneteenth" and grew with more participa-tion from descendants. Grant announcements are issued throughout the year. Unfortunately, there is no single document that contains every Federal grant announcement and no uniform format for these announcements, although the Administration is working to change this. In the future, it hopes that Federal agencies will publish grant announcements electronically, in a single format and on a single web site (www.fichi.logopa.gov).

Currently, most grant announcements are listed in the Federal Register, a daily publication that can be accussed on the Interest (http://www.gros.gov/su_doc/sce/s/ee/sl (d.). There is no guarantee you will receive a grant if you apply, However, if you do not receive a grant, you should try to find out why you did not receive funding and how you could improve a future application. You can follow up with the program officer identified in the announcement. This individual will either be able to provide you with information about your application, or point you to the right person to contact. In addition, you may even be able to obtain written comments any your groups, which could be a good learning tool.
