Supreme Battle Looms Over Court Appointments

The unexpected resignation of Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Conner creates a vacancy that, once filled, can radically shift the court to the right on social issues. And that can ultimately spell disaster

court to the right on social issues. And that can ultimately spell disaster for such issues as affirmative action, women's rights, and liberties, the death penalty and employees' rights. O'Conner, the first Supreme Court appointment made by Ronald Reagan, was the court's woring national endeath of the first Supreme Court appointment made by Ronald Reagan, was the court's woring paster, with her work helping constitute a 5-4 majority on many important issues. Court watchers had expected ailing Chief Justice William H. Rehnaguist to rentre after this session —and that's will a possibility – but he was expected to be replaced by another conservative, meaning the 9-member court would remain evenly divided, with four liberals, four conservatives and O'Conner darking back and forth between each camp. However, the resignation of the court's swing voter means that George W. Bunk's first court appointee could matantly shift the balance of power, creating a conservative majority.

Currently, there are conflicting stories on why Oprah and her party were denied an after hours shopping spree at the exclusive Hermes boutique in Paris, France.

Hermes apologizes for any offense taken due to such circumstances."

A Winfrey spokesperson said Oprah "will discuss her 'crash moment' when her show returns from summer hiatus." "Crash moment" is an out-growth of the film "Crash" and relates to situations where a person feels discriminated against because of skin color. If not, don't do a show on this incident just to capitalize on the huge TV ratings it would bring.



Grammy-award winning rapper Lil' Kim was sentenced Wednesday to a year and a day in prison and fined \$50,000 (U.S.) for lying to a federal grand jury to protect friends involved in a 2001 shootout outside

involved in a 2001 shootout outside a Monhattar radio station. It was far less than the 20-year maximum she could have faced and the nearly three-year sentence prosecutors had sought. The judge said he had considered the public perception of sending a young, African-American entertainer to prison for far longer than Martha Stewart, who spent five months in prison and remains under house arrest.

While many rappers have served time in prison, Lif Kim is the first big-name female arrist to do so.

Lif Kim, whose real name is, Kimberly Jones, could have faced up to 20 years — five years each on three counts of perjury and one count of compiracy — at her sentencing before U.S. District Judge Gerard Lynch. She was convicted in March.

The rapper has to report to

prison by Sept. 19. Her attorneys are hoping she will be sent to the facility in Danbury, Conn., so that she can be closer to her mother. LiF


