Rights Pioneer Arthur Fletcher Remembered

Special to the NNPA from the Scanner Group champion of civil rights for all SEATTLE (NNPA) Arthur Allen Fletcher, who was known to many Americans as "the father of affirmative action," has died at the age of 80. Fletcher's achievements included devising the nation's first equal opportunity policies and coining the United Negro College Fund's memorable slogan, "A mind is a terrible thing to waste."

The funeral took place in Washington, D.C. this week. Fletcher served as U.S. Delegate to the United Nations when the current president's father, former President G.H.W. Bush, was United Nations Ambassador.

"We lost a great civil rights hero for all people," said Lou Boston, director of business development for the Portland, Ore.-based technology firm Comotiv Systems. "He was a

people - not just African-Americans but for all people."

In his later years, Fletcher became a keen education advocate, working on a plan to increase the involvement of parents and grandparents in their children's education through enlisting church support.

Born in Junction City, Ark., Fletcher's life was packed with drama. He served in World War II, sustaining a bullet wound from a German sniper. But that didn't prevent him from later becoming the first African-

Black Stakes in the Supreme Court Struggle

The nelatively abrupt resignation of Associate Justice Sandra Day O'Connor took most peoole by surprise. Although, she intimated at a Washington cocktail party during the 2000 election that she was thinking about it, but wanted to be sure that a conservative was in the White House. Like Ronald Reagan's departure last year, this event has set off a celebration of her tenure on the Supreme Court as a "moderate" who was the swing vote among the liberal and conservative justices. This evaluation however, is always made with the racial majority in mind, rather than with an eye to the impact of her role in recent decisions on people of color.

Justice O'Connor is a conservative and her role in the delivery of the 2004 election into the camp of George Bush was an unprecedented ("activists") usurpation of the power of a state Supreme Court over elections. Historically, it was a bald, raw use of Republican power to install a Republican

Then, her decision in the Shaw v Reno case of 1993 was abominable, since her activist decision virtually invented a set of precedents that did not exist before. She regarded the use of race to draw district boundaries as "political apartheid" and as a practice lacking sufficient justification. Where has she been? Race had been used historically to exclude blacks from political participation and so the use of race to include blacks had a long history rooted in the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution. Her real exception to that history was her demonstrated favoritism of

states rights. In the affirmative action decision in the Michigan cases last year, some have applauded her for voting to retain the principle of "diversity." But

McKinney Arts Commission Preparing for 2005-06 Arts Grants

The McKinney Arts Commission has finalized the calendar for the upcoming FY 2005-06 Arts Grants. City Council has allocated \$100,000 to the Arts Commission for FY 2005-06 for the purpose of promoting and sustaining the arts in McKinney.

Area arts groups interested in applying for funding can begin the process by obtaining an application, available Monday, July 18. The Arts Commission offers 2 types of financial assistance: Season Support Grants and Special Projects Grants. Season Support Grants provide financial assistance for the costs associated with a full season of projects, performances or events. Special Project Grants provide financial assistance for the costs associated with a single project. These projects, performances and events must be held in McKinney between October 1, 2005 and September 30, 2006. Before submitting the application, the appli-

cant must attend one of two grantwriting workshops to be eligible for consideration.

The McKinney Arts Commission offers applicants a choice between two grant-writing workshops; the first one at 1:00 p.m. on Tuesday, August 2, and the second one at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, August 3. Both workshops will be held at City Hall, 222 N. Tennessee in the Council Chamber.

Toddler Killing Should Unite Not Divide Blacks and Latinos

The instant LAPD officers gunned down 13-

year-old Devin Brown following a car chase last February, blacks took to the streets in rage and protest. Black leaders loudly demanded that the officer that shot Brown be fired and prosecuted. The furious reaction from blacks to the Brown killing stands in stark contrast to the recent killing of Suzie Raul Pena. Police shot the toddler in the head during a shootout with her father, Jose Raul Pena in South Los Angeles.

The shooting again called into serious question the long-standing turbulent, and contentious relations between the LAPD and L.A.'s minority communities. LAPD violence against blacks and Latinos has continually gotten the department into

hot water, and tagged it as America's poster police agency for abuse. But the Pena killing also called into serious question the troubled relations between blacks and Latinos in L.A. The shooting of a toddler should have been more than enough to raise howls of protest from blacks.

It didn't. Brown was an African-American child, and Pena was a Latino child. The anger over the Brown shooting, and the relative deafening silence from blacks to the shooting of

The deadline is near for applications to be turned in for students wanting to be a member of Garland's first "Garland Youth Council". Members of this board will report directly to the City Council on matters that concern the youth of the community. This is an excellent opportunity for youth to learn city government works.

Garland residents who will be juniors in high school in the 2005-06 school year are eligible to apply. Each applicant should submit a completed standard Boards and Commissions application, two letters of reference, and an essay explaining why he or she wants to be part of the Youth Council. All applications are due by August 1, 2005. The Mayor and each of Garland's eight City Council members will select one applicant to serve a one-year term.

"We want to give our young people the opportunity to learn first hand that they can make a difference in their community by getting involved," says Councilman Mark Monroe, who represents district seven on the Garland City Council. Mr. Monore chairs the Community Services Committee, which recommended establishing the Garland Youth Council. "The City Council is looking forward to working with these young people, who will become the leaders of the future."

DCCD Selects site for Eastfield College Garland Campus

- Dallas County Community College District unveiled the sign that proclaims the property located on the Northeast corner of Glenbrook and Walnut as the future site of the Eastfield College Garland Campus.

"The campus and surrounding TOD development will mainly occupy the vacant land at the corner of Walnut and Glenbrook and the property (the Walnut tax office) that the City of Garland will be getting in trade for the old Kroger Building that is located at Main at Garland Rd.," Mayor Day said.

This particular corner has stayed vacant while businesses have been built to the North and the East and neighborhoods have sprung up to the West. While nothing permanent has ever been on this corner, baseball season would see a backstop put up for practice and occasionally the circus would come to town and use this site for their performances.

"I think this is great for Garland. This land has been vacant as long as I can remember. I don't think there could be any better use of this land than to build a facility for higher learning. Redevelopment of downtown is very important and this will go a long way to help get that started," said Jackie Feagin.

In May 2004 Dallas County voters approved a \$450 million bond program for Dallas County

Community Colleges. Projects included in this bond program include five centers in either underserved or fast growing areas of Dallas County. Garland's new facility is one of those centers that will offer credit and continuing education classes, plus services such as career development and workforce development programs.

"The purchase of this land and the construction of this facility signals progress for both Dallas County Community Colleges and Garland," said Jerry Prater, chair of the DCCC board of trustees. "It represents an educational and community partnership that will help us enrich lives

this new definition of affirmative action does not require that Blacks be included, based on their history of exclusion and on the remedy of the 14th Amendment standard of "equal protection." Rather, it is a definition that recognizes the value of having people of different ethnic heritages as participants in American higher education. So, in her swing vote role on court votes, Justice O'Connor has also played a role in de-constructing the legal basis of the rights of the disadvantaged, especially Blacks.

President Bush wants to leave a legacy of a Supreme Court that issues decisions with a reliable and strong conservative bent. This means that he must nominate someone to the Right of O'Connor. Seven Democrats in the Senate have signed an agreement that they will not use the filibuster, except in what that if a far right candidate is they consider a case of "unusual circumstances." But the nofilibuster pledge they made amounted to a sell-out of Blacks by permitting the Black conservative California Supreme Court Justice Janice Rogers Brown to accede to the federal bench.

Many thought that the first opportunity Bush might have to nominate a Supreme Court justice was when Chief Justice William Rehnquist left because of his poor health. Not content with simply answering questions, Mr. Mosely expounded on racial issues in America, and commented on the differences between how white and black people view freedom in the United States.

\$7.7M in grant money

The Federal Home Loan Bank of Dallas on Monday said it will award \$7.7 million in affordable housing program grants to help fund projects in five states, including Texas.

The grants will be used to help buy, build or renovate housing projects for very low- to moderate-income families in the five-state area FHLDallas serves.

FHLBank Dallas, one of 12 district banks in the FHLBank System created by Congress in 1932, is required by statute to return 10 percent of its profit each year to the communities served by its member banks in the form of affordable housing grants.

Texas will receive the bulk of the funds -- \$3.74 million. Louisiana will receive \$1.8 million, Mississippi will get \$864,000, Arkansas will receive \$825,000 and New Mexico gets \$536,528.

The bank, with assets of Louisiana, Mississippi, New \$65 billion, is a memberowned cooperative that supports housing and community development through lowcost funding and other credit products provided to more than 890 member and affiliated institutions in Arkansas,

Mexico and Texas.

FHLBank returned \$14.4 million in affordable housing grants in 2004, and it has awarded more than \$157 million in grants since 1990.

These newer findings support an earlier study, published in the September/October 1996 issue of the medical journal Advances in Therapy. In the two-year clinical trial, 90% of over 2,200 patients, who used Dr. Lewenberg's Formula as prescribed, started to regrow their lost hair in three months.

Computer Users Saying No to Noise

(FSN) For computers users, sleek, aesthetically-pleasing computers have become the norm. But now users are turning their attention to another facet of the machine - noise. Reducing the noise generated by computers has become increasingly popular, especially in light of the data that proves that it can have a positive effect on a user's

"Noise from a computer isn't just an annoyance - it can have a profound impact on your body," says Peter Kim of Silenx, a leading producer of computer noise reduction components. "There have a been numerous studies that show negative consequences from noise and loud computers."

According to a study that appeared in the 2005 issue of the journal Ergonomics, a test group reported "major deterioration" in their ability to concentrate due to the kind of background noise caused by computers. Noise can also contribute to the development and aggregation of stress related conditions such as high blood pressure, coronary disease, ulcers, colitis, and migraine headaches, Association of Noise Control Officials. "We've also heard people report the inability to rest due to 'echoes' or 'humming' sounds that result from the long-term exposure to noise," Kim added.

In the last five years, the heat production of processors has increased by 30%, and the average processor generates more heat per surface area than a nuclear reactor. It has spurred an increase in the use of noise reduction components, with users seeking out products from companies such as Silenx.

Unlike modifying the visual appearance of a computer, improving the sound output of a computer doesn't require the purchase of a new machine. "Two areas we focus on are quiet fans and hard drive silencers," said Kim. . "These are usually the loudest components of any computer. We've focused specifically on the noise performance of

these parts, and developed innovative news ways for them to operate silently. Our fans, for example, push more air at lower noise levels. And swapping them out for replacements takes just a few minutes."

To create equipment that runs quietly, Silenx used extensive testing in fluid dynamics modeling. The resulting technology was applied to power supplies, fans, heatsinks and hard drive cooler/silencers. The advancements have made noise reduction a viable option for computer users.

Whisper-quiet machines are particularly welcomed in the homes of computer users. "The movement towards home theater computers have created a real demand for silent components," Kim points out. "For many people, computers are no longer being hidden away in a back office. They are in major traffic areas of a home, and noise reduction has become an issue."





In addition to seeking to overturn the NCUA ruling, Community is asking the regulator to turn over \$10 million of its deposits that are depositmember deposits.

An NCUA spokeswoman could not be reached for comment Friday afternoon.

On Tuesday in Congress, including Plano Republic Sam Johnson filed a bill to limit the authority of the NCUA to block conversions like ones pursued by Community and Fort Worth's OmniAmerican Union.





"One thing you can say about him was that he was always on the cutting edge," said Bernie Foster, publisher of The Skanner. "He was an advocate for African-Americans and he was also an advocate for small business. Whether you agreed with his politics or not, he stuck by his beliefs and he didn't care whether you liked it or not."

"I was with Art in Philadelphia last week," Boston said. "It was the 27th anniversary of the Philadelphia Plan, which was the affirmative action program that started affirmative action across the country. Art was being recognized and he was also presenting his new program, Moving America Ahead. It's a strategy to build economic opportunities for minorities through using technology, education and faithbased programs.

"It's about getting churches involved and getting parents involved with their children's education. I'm sure it will continue."
