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New Orleans To Probe Latest Police Shooting



Police officers shot and killed a man brandish-ing a knife in a confrontation that was partially videotaped by a bystander, setting off another internal investigation of the embattled department. Monday's daylight shooting on a busy treet was the first involving police since New Orleans reopened after Hurricane Katrina. It fol-lows the videotaped police beating of a man that led to two firings in the department

A police spokesman, Sgt. David Adams, said fuesday that the officers who fired on the man were reassigned pending the outcome of the

probe, but he defended their response, saying at least one offi-cer's life was in danger just before the barrage of gunfire. "You have a subject who's lunging at them with a knife... swinging wildly at them and they're fearing for their life," Adams said. They had no other bairs. 

"Faith And Poverty: Rediscovering The Back Story Of Christmas"

This year I viewed the familiar Christmas story through a new lens. Hurricane Katrina and the proposed federal budgard the proposed federal budgard with the complexity behind Christmas is trying to break through the holiday selling and shouring fremy. Let's look again bout fragile families, poverty, and the good community.
You don't have to be

Christian to know something about the foreground of the basic narrative. While traveling a great distance, an inconvenence imposed by a govern-nent census, a young, preg-nant mother realizes that she is bout to give birth. The couple earns that there's no room in the local inn (maybe, they lacked sufficient personal responsibility to make an advance reservation.) In an humble setting, surrounded by strangers and warm animals, a special child was born. For nost people, that's about as far as the plot goes. But there are

other interesting things unfold-ing in the background.

Earlier this month, Capitol police arrested more than 100 people of faith, many of them my friends. They were protesting a budget passed by the House of Representatives that Rep. Harry Reed (D-Nev.) called a war on the middle class and poor. 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





Dozens Indicted In Alleged Katrina Scam

Forty-nine people have been indicted in a scam to pocket Red Cross hurricane relief funds and more indictments are expected, according to Justice Department officials.

Authorities said 22 people working for a Red Cross contractor at a call center in Bakersfield, California, filed false claims, and by involving family members and friends, brought the number of people under indictment to 49.

"I'm really surprised people in this day and time would try to take advantage of the system that's intended to help those in need," said Jackie Smith, whose brother-in-law was named in

McGregor Scott, U.S. attor-ney for the Eastern District of California, said about \$200,000 in lost funds had been traced to the 49 people indicted, and that the total is expected to reach between \$300,000 and \$400,000.

"We anticipate in the coming weeks and months that we will indict a large number of people, perhaps even doubling the pres-ent number," Scott said.

Scott said most of the indictments involve charges of wire fraud, and the possible penalties for convictions will depend on the degree to which the person was involved in the scam, the amount of money the suspect netted and their prior criminal

Poorer Black Women Going Without Pap Smears Underserved Neighborhoods May Have Fewer Health Resources, Experts Say.



Black women who live in poor neighborhoods are less likely to be screened for cervical cancer than women.

The reason for the lower rate of screening isn't clear, and the researchers note that other fac-tors linked to lower screening rates, such as older age or lower education, didn't seem to play a

were professionals or who were educated, they, too, had decreased screening if they lived in neighborhoods with high poverty," said study author Gectanjali Dabral Datta, a post-

nection between socioeconomic factors and how they affected cervical cancer screening, most notably the Pap smear. They collected data on more than 40,000 black women from across the United States. These women all participated in the Black Women's Health Study of Boston University and Howard

University. Women living in communities where at least 20 percent of families lived below the poverty level were significantly less likely to be get regular Pap tests, areas where only 5 percent of the population lived below the poverty line.

The reason for the trend remains unclear. "We can specu-

late that deprived neighbor-hoods are just that, deprived," Datta said. "It might be that women do not have access to transportation, or perhaps they can't get day care. But all of that is just speculation at this point,

She believes the same phenomenon might be true for other types of screening, such as mammography and cardiovas-

cular testing.

To ensure that women in these communities get Pap tests, there has to be a concentrated effort to reach them, Datta said.
"There needs to be a focus on high poverty neighborhoods," she said. "We need to think of people's socioeconomic context when it comes to health behav-

One expert thinks that access to medical care may be the rea-son for these findings, and the reason that more black women die from cervical cancer than

"African-American women have twice the mortality rate from cervical cancer as white women," noted Elizabeth Ward, the director of cancer surveillance at the American Cancer Society. "Researchers need to investigate how those differences are related to socioeco-

nomic status."

Another expert said this screening "gap" is costing lives

"While this finding is not surprising, it is noteworthy just the

"No one should die of cervical cancer, because a simple screening test reliably finds the condition in its earliest stages when cure is almost universal ly achievable," Katz said. "Yet, several thousand deaths from this cancer occur each year in the U.S."

Identifying disparities and the toll they exact is the easy part, Katz noted. "Eliminating such disparities is the hard part," he said. "But it's a job that must be done, for lives are very clearly on the line."

Gables State Thomas Townhomes, Gables State Thomas Ravello and Saddle Brook Apartments, were the three apartment complexes

Gables spokesman David Margulies said the company was caught off-guard by the report, adding that Gables has provided housing for more than 470 hur-ricane victims and donated \$50,000 in hurricane-ear-marked aid to the Red Cross.

"We are surprised and dismayed by these allegations," Margulies said. "That is not we do we business

St. Louis-based Michelson ealty, owners of the other Dallas complex, did not immediately return messages left at

their offices.

Landlords who are found guilty of discriminating against applicants can face fines up to \$11,000 per complaint, said Bryan Greene, HUD's director of policy for the office of fair

Greene said HUD has received about 60 complaints from hurricane-displaced apart-ment seekers since Katrina forced tens of thousands to evacuate in August. He said

some cases have been resolved, adding that HUD tries to settle issues before getting courts

The NFHA's test included 65 sets of calls to apartment com-plexes in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Tennessee and Texas Smith said each complex was called three times within a short period, twice by white callers and once by a black caller.

Smith said more complaints could be filed but said the group will wait for HUD to investigate before taking any

The Washington, D.C.-based alliance is a consortium of 120 private, nonprofit fair housing organizations and civil rights groups from 37 states.

Fewer African-Americans Enlisting In The Military

By: Drew Brown Fewer African-Americans are oining the Army, a trend likely to nake it harder to keep the all-colunteer military at full

The percentage of Africanns among all those who Americans among all those wno signed up for active-duty Army service fell from 24 percent in 2000 to 14 percent in 2005, according to Army statistics. That's the lowest percentage since 1973, when the draft ended and the all-volunteer military began, say David R. Segal and Mady Wechsler Segal, sociolo-gists with the University of Maryland's Center for Research

on Military Organization.
In the past, African-Americans have enlisted at higher rates than their overall percentage of the U.S. population, which was 12.9 in the 2000 census

In 1974, blacks made up 27 percent of new Army recruits and 21 percent of new Marine recruits, 16 percent of Air Force enlistees and 10 percent of Navy enlistees, according to the study. S. Douglas Smith, a spokesman for Army Recruiting



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
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Domestic Spying Promps Talk Of Impeachment

"In my opinion, the President has violated the law, and the House and Senate must pursue their inquiries must pursue their inquiries into this illegal program... George W. Bush is the president. He is not a king. He is not above the law," states U. S. Rep. John Lewis (D-Ga.) in a release last week. "I look forward to further inquiry in the House and Senate on these matters. The American people deserve the truth. We must gather the facts and determine once and for all whether the law was violated. There is no question that the U. S. Congress has impeached presidents for lesser offenses."

Bush adamantly defended the program, first disclosed two weeks ago by the New York Times. He said at a White House news conference, "Tve authorized this program more than 30 times since the September the 11th attacks and I intend to do so for so long as the nation faces the continuing threat of an enemy that wants to kill our American

According to the Washington Post, two sources familiar with his decision says that U. S. Rep. John Conyers, D-Mich., rank-ing member of the House

Judiciary Committee, has intro-duced legislation to form a Select Committee with subpoena power to investigate alleged onduct of the Bush admin-

I look forward to further inquiry in the House and Senate on these matters. The American people deserve the truth."
