Kaiser Street Baptist Church in Garland, Texas recently celebrated its 50th Anniversary, with help from founding member Mrs. Gladys Smith, friendships built along the way, and local, state and federal officials.

Smith, 84, was escorted into the church October 5, by the City of Garland Fire Department Color Guard, along with other seniors in the church. She said the day was wonderful and everything went

## N.A.A.C.P. Addresses Challenges at State Convention

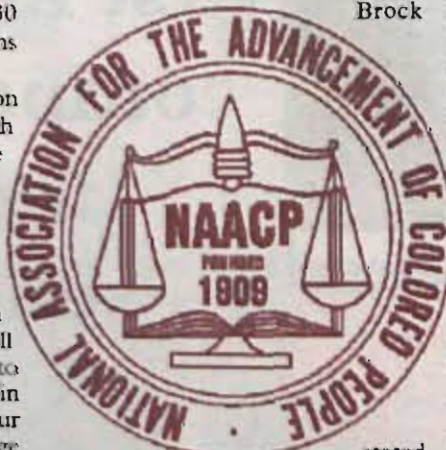

Delegates and members from across the state converged in Denton, for the 67th Annual N.A.A.C.P. State Convention. The conference was held October 2-4 at the Radisson Hotel. Dynamic speakers, seminars, and workshops were some of the ongoing events scheduled for the convention. The health fair was held on the last day of the convention, and had over 30 different health organizations present for free services.

The theme for the convention was "Having Our Say Through Changing Times" addressing the challenges facing the organization. Several speakers and members stated that "we" must adapt to the needs of the community, while still focusing on national issues, such as racism and discrimination. The overall objective of the conference was to go beyond dialogue, obtain information and return to your community with the knowledge presented.

The Welcoming Reception was held Thursday night, and allowed everyone to socialize with other members from the various branches. The reception was hosted by the Denton County Branch and included several Denton City

One such person that believes in the message of prevention is Carol Moore, State Health Committee Chair of the Houston Branch. Mrs. Branch states that one of her motto's is "Unhealthy soliders don't fight." "We must address the issue of our young people showing up in statistics with hypertension and diabetes. We have many issues on all fronts, but if we are not healthy we can't tackle the larger the issues." Mrs. Moore stressed that she wants to reach the people in the rural as well as the urban areas, in the past the rural problem has been overlooked. She further added, "This has been successful through 'Project Hope' where the N.A.A.C.P. and health professionals work directly with the churches and the community, by obtaining proper information and education."

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## THE TRUTH CLINIC Dallas Recall Faces An Up Hill Battle

In case any of the Dallas recall advocates are feeling enthusiastic because of the successful California campaign last week, they need to understand the two recalls have little in common.

California had a well organized, well financed, and a well focused recall campaign; none of which is currently evident in the Dallas effort.

Plus, the California recall was magnified by its international notoriety and celebrity participants. This made for Hollywood media "circus" attracted and motivated a large number of normally tepid voters.

By contrast, the Dallas recall leaders are still trying to define why a recall is necessary. The community has not been galvanized to action. Even the filing of the recall intent documents appears to be individual driven and not community driven. Mr. Williams and fellow activist Marvin Crenshaw initially spearheaded the recall effort, opting to move forward without waiting for the area ministers and other leaders who have been making recall gestures since the firing of Terrell Bolton as police chief almost two months ago. This has created some division in the community.

Now that the intent to recall has been filed, the clock is officially running and the organizers have 60 days to gather the required 72,873 valid signatures needed to put the petition on the ballot. Assuming this signature collection phase is successful the city secretary has 30 days to verify the signatures. The recall election must be held within 60 days following this

certification.

Recall leaders have several major hurdles to overcome in a relatively short time if the recall effort is to succeed.

A strong universal theme needs to be developed and articulated that touches a broad spectrum of voters across racial and political lines. Initially, the recall rhetoric was connected to Black protests following the firing of former police chief Bolton. Recently, some leaders have indicated the recall is about the mayor's charter violations and her advocacy for a strong mayor form of government. These will be tough to sell to Dallas voters and it is doubtful that either one is strong enough to strike the public's "mad as hell and we are not going to take it" nerve.

It will take 50 percent plus one of the recall votes to remove Mayor Miller from office. In the last mayoral election she won handily with over 55 percent of the final vote. Ms. Miller easily defeated council member Mary Poss in the regular May election and last year she beat insurance executive Tom Dunning in a special election to fill the unexpired term of former mayor Ron Kirk.

Since then, Mayor Miller continues to strengthen her hand with the Dallas Business Leaders and her North Dallas constituency that not only voted overwhelmingly for her but turned out in greater numbers than the Black voters who are now the driving force for recall. Is there any doubt they will vote the same way again?

It is obvious that a few coalitions will have to be formed outside the Black community to have even a gambler's chance at a

successful recall. And finding a common denominator that will entice a significant number of the pro-Miller camp into supporting a leadership change is a monumental task.

But if recall leaders do come up with an acceptable theme for the recall, they need to quickly get the message out. And this takes money. In the California recall, several wealthy individuals supplied funds to get the recall on the ballot. While plenty of money circulates in the Black community, it has historically been difficult to get Black sponsors for political related activities.

If the recall happens to succeed, then the heir apparents need to be identified for voters to evaluate. Or will this be a case of jumping out of the frying pan into the fire? In the six weeks that this issue has been discussed not a single potential candidate has shown any mayoral interest or made a public statement in favor of the recall. None of Dallas' Black elected officials has given the slightest indication of support for a recall.

The Black community needs to ask itself an objective question during the planning phase of this recall. Is it worth spending scarce resources of time, energy and money on an emotional feel good cause? Could the resources be better spent assisting the deposed police chief with the legal expenses associated with seeking an equitable settlement from the city or preparing and educating the community on how to put up better voting numbers in the next election?

## Belief and Attendance Vary Greatly Among Different Segments of the Population, According to National Poll

ROCHESTER, N.Y., (PRNewswire) -- Americans are far more likely to believe in God and to attend religious services than people in most other developed countries -- particularly countries in Europe where philosophers have written that "God is dead." However this new Harris Poll finds that underneath a broad consensus, belief in God varies quite widely among different segments of the American public. And most people attend a religious service less often than once a month.

These are some of the results of a survey by Harris Interactive(R) based on a nationwide sample of 2,306 adults surveyed online between September 16 and 23, 2003.

Belief in God and Attendance of Religious Services

This survey found that 79% of Americans believe there is a God, and that 66% are absolutely certain this is true. Only 9% do not believe in God, while a further 12% are not sure.

While most people (55%) attend a religious service a few times a year or more often, only a minority of the public (36%) attends a religious service once a month or more often, with about a quarter (26%) attending every week.

Reducing "Social Desirability" Bias These numbers -- for belief in God and for attendance at churches, synagogues and mosques -- are lower than those reported in many other surveys, we believe, because of the methods we use to measure them more accurately.

One of the problems with surveys where people are interviewed by people, whether face-to-face or by telephone, is that they may not tell the truth to an interviewer, if the truth is embarrassing or if another answer is more "socially desirable." This "social desirability" bias means that many surveys underreport the number of people who are homosexual, who don't bathe or clean their teeth, who drink alcohol, or whose children are not immunized, for example. Socially desirable behavior, such as giving to charity, voting in elections and going to church are usually over reported.

Differences in the Replies of Catholics, Protestants and Jews

Protestants (90%) are more likely than Roman Catholics (79%) and much more likely than Jews (48%) to believe in God. Religious affiliation here includes many people raised as members of a religion or religious group, regardless of what they practice or believe now.

Protestants (47%) are also more likely than Catholics (35%) to attend church once a month or more often. Only 16% of Jews go to synagogues once a month or more often.

Belief in God is higher in the Midwest (82%) and in the South (82%) than in the East (75%) and the West (75%). It tends to increase with age from 71% of those aged 25 to 29 to more than 80% for the three age groups of people over 40, including 83% of those aged 65 and over.

Women are more likely than men to believe in God (84% versus

73%). African Americans (91%) are more likely to believe in God than Hispanics (81%) and whites (78%). Republicans (87%) are more likely to believe in God than Democrats (78%) and Independents (75%). Those with no college education (82%) are more likely to believe in God than those with postgraduate education (73%). Church attendance (every month or more often) is higher in the Midwest (45%) and the South (40%) than in the East (30%) and the West (27%). It is lowest among people aged 25 to 29 (24%) and highest among those aged 65 and over (43%). And it is higher among women (41%) than among men (31%).

In theory, with probability samples of this size, one could say with 95 percent certainty that the results have a statistical precision of plus or minus three percentage points of what they would be if the entire adult population had been polled with complete accuracy. Unfortunately, there are several other possible sources of error in all polls or surveys that are probably more serious than theoretical calculations of sampling error. They include refusals to be interviewed (non-response), question wording and question order, and weighting. It is impossible to quantify the errors that may result from these factors. This online survey is not a probability sample.

## Great Outdoors Coming To Inner City For Harambee Festival

DALLAS, Texas - The Harambee Festival takes place from 10 a.m.-7 p.m., Saturday, Oct. 25 at 2922 Martin Luther King, Jr. Blvd just south of downtown Dallas. Visitors to the free event will be able to catch catfish, witness live birds of prey, see a Buffalo Soldiers living history camp and experience other facets of the great outdoors and Texas history.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, the Inner City Fishing Institute (ICFI) and other partners are bringing a new group of activities to the festival this year. These include a Youth Fishing area where kids will get five minutes to fish and can keep what they catch in that time limit, a Buffalo Soldiers camp where living history reenactors in period uniforms will portray 1800s African-American soldiers that helped tame the Texas frontier, an Operation Game Thief display from TPWD game wardens about how the public can help stop poaching, a Reptile Exhibit featuring live venomous and non-venomous snakes and other reptiles common to the area, a Bird of Prey exhibit from the Dallas Arboretum featuring live raptors such as hawks and owls, and a Boat Display with bass boats and pontoon boats, among other activities.

Harambee is a Swahili word meaning, "Let's Pull Together." The festival is an alternative to Halloween and brings

together families, businesses, organizations, corporations, and citizens in a celebration of unity. The event includes cultural activities, entertainment, food, the Frances Burns heritage parade and health fair. Many of the outdoors activities are coming to the festival through the efforts of the Inner City Fishing Institute, a non-profit organization based in Dallas/Fort Worth.

"I expect many kids may catch their first fish ever at the Harambee Festival," said Mark Cole, ICFI director. "We see the world of the outdoors as a positive alternative to urban problems such as gangs and drugs." The organization has taken thousands of Metroplex young people fishing and camping since ICFI was founded in 1981.

Maria Sweet, TPWD outreach and education coordinator in Dallas, said the state agency is trying to reach new customers who have not been historically involved in the world of the outdoors, including urban youth and ethnic minorities.

"We hope to build future support for wildlife conservation and state parks, as well as introduce urban families to the joys of nature and the outdoors," Sweet said.

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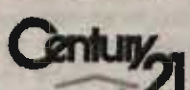
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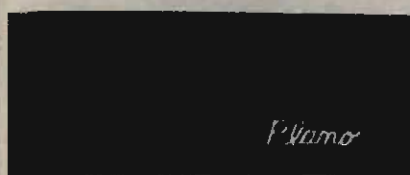

## Harry Connick Jr. Live In Concert Nov. 14 - NextStage

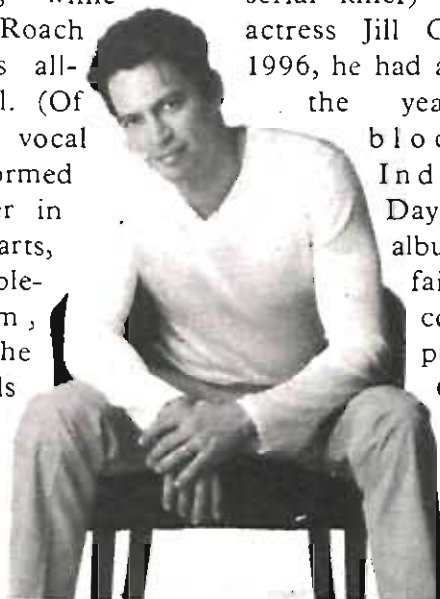
With very few exceptions, the career of Harry Connick, Jr. can be divided in half — his first two albums encompassed straight-ahead New Orleans jazz and stride piano while his later career (which paralleled his rising celebrity status) alternated between more contemporary New Orleans music and pop vocals with a debt to Frank Sinatra. Born in New Orleans on September 11, 1967, Connick grew up the son of two lawyers who owned a record store. After beginning on keyboards at the age of three, he first performed publicly at six, and recorded with a local jazz band at ten. Connick attended the New Orleans Center for the Creative Arts and studied with Ellis Marsalis and James Booker. A move to New York to study at Hunter College and the Manhattan School

of Music gave him the opportunity to look up a Columbia Records executive who had asked to see him, and Connick's self-titled album debut — a set of mostly unaccompanied standards — appeared in 1987. Jazz critics praised Connick's maturity and engaging style as well as his extended stays at New York hotspots during the year. His second album, named for his age in 1988, was the first to feature him on vocals.

Already well-known within jazz circles, Harry Connick, Jr. entered the American consciousness with the soundtrack to 1989's popular film *When Harry Met Sally*. Director Rob Reiner had asked Connick to compose a soundtrack, and he recorded several warm standards ("It Had to Be You," "Let's Call the Whole Thing Off," "Don't Get Around Much Anymore") with a big-band

backing. A world tour followed, and *When Harry Met Sally* eventually reached double-platinum status. With Connick a major celebrity, he diverged into an acting career, playing a tail gunner in 1990's *Memphis Belle*. That same year, he released two albums simultaneously: one, *We Are in Love*, was another vocal outing with similar standards as had appeared on *When Harry Met Sally*, while *Lofty's Roach Souffle* was all-instrumental. (Of course, the vocal album performed much better in the pop charts, hitting double-platinum, while the instrumentals worked better with jazz audiences.) Connick

toured again, this time with a big band, and recorded the group on 1991's *Blue Light, Red Light*. Though his celebrity decreased slightly during the mid-'90s, Connick's albums continued to reach platinum status, including 1992's *25*, a 1993 Christmas album, and 1994's *She*. Connick continued his acting work with a starring role in 1995's *Copycat* (where he played a serial killer) and married actress Jill Goodacre. In 1996, he had a brief role in the year's biggest blockbuster, *Independence Day*, but his album *Star Turtle* failed to connect with pop audiences. Come by Me, a return to big band sounds, followed in 1999.



## Luis Miguel Plays Smirnoff Nov. 1



Mexican performer Luis Miguel is an international star who is loved for both his well-produced albums and his strong live performances. Since 1990, he has been the most popular performer in Latin America. In the United States, he has become the only Latino artist to have two Spanish language albums, *Romance* and *Segundo Romance* go platinum. Both are comprised of tender South American romantic songs. In the U.S., Miguel

has earned three Grammys. *Segundo Romance* won him one of them. It also earned Miguel a total of 34 platinum records throughout South and Central America in 1995.

Follow-up releases included *Musipistas* and 1996's *Nada Es Igual*; in 1998, he co-starred in the film *Fiebre de Amor*, and also appeared on its soundtrack. *Amarte Es un*

*Place* followed a year later. Miguel's international stardom was heavily recognized in fall 2000 -- he won two Grammys (Male Pop Vocal Performance and Best Pop Album) for *Amarte Es un Place* at the first annual Latin Grammy Awards.

problems that we are facing in the community today. One of the main problems in our community is in the area of violence among our youth. Elizabeth Branch Ed.D founded "Man in the Mirror" a group mentoring program in 1993.
